Copies of charters to three organizations, known as the CHURCH OF AMERICAN SCIENCE, THE CHURCH OF SCIENTOLOGY, AND THE CHURCH OF SPIRITUAL ENGINEERING, chartered under the laws of the State of New Jersey, were proudly displayed in the Phoenix offices of the Hubbard Association of Scientologists. The Church of American Science is the parent organization for the three churches.

The news was received with mixed emotions. Some were outspokenly antagonistic to the idea. Some who'd nursed the glories of self-determinism since Book One couldn't subscribe to the new idea that the best way to win is to BECOME the enemy. Many from California feared that designating Scientology as a religion would classify it with that state's 9,857,385,237

L. Ron Hubbard, M.D., But He's Not a Doctor of Medicine, Yet

The English scientist, Mr. C. D. Darlington, in a Conway Memorial Lecture on "The Conflict of Society and Science," published by Watts and Co., 1948, very aptly states: "Scientific discovery is often carelessly looked upon as a creation of some new knowledge. This is true of the strictly trivial discoveries. It is not true of the fundamental discoveries, such as the laws of mechanics, of chemical combinations, of evolution, on which scientific advance ultimately depends. These always entail the destruction of or disintegration of old knowledge before the new can be created." He later says, "It is no accident that bacteria were first understood by a canal engineer, that oxygen was first isolated by a Unitarian minister, that the theory of infection was established by a chemist, the theory of heredity by a monastic school teacher, and the theory of evolution by a man who was unfitted to be a university instructor in either botany or zoology." He closes by saying, "We need a Minister of Disturbances, a destroyer of routine; and underminer of complacency."

The Church, Religion, and Scientology ∞ ∞

If you're asking: "Is Scientology a religion--and many were even before it had been incorporated as a church--you might better ask: "What is religion?" Webster defines religion as having been taken from the Latin "religion, meaning taboo, or restraint." This is a dichotomy of the connotation given the word by Scientologists. Scientology seeks to free man--not to bind him.

A few comparisons:

The church waits for the body to die before the soul can be freed to be judged and damned.

Scientology seeks to free the soul (thetan) from the current body while the body still lives; to give the thetan freedom to use or discard the body, when and as it sees fit.

The church makes man an effect of a God it cannot locate or identify; takes away from man any self-determined goals beyond the limited ones of today and the hopes of a nebulous tomorrow.

Scientology tries to show that man is a god in his own right, with full power and province over his environment.

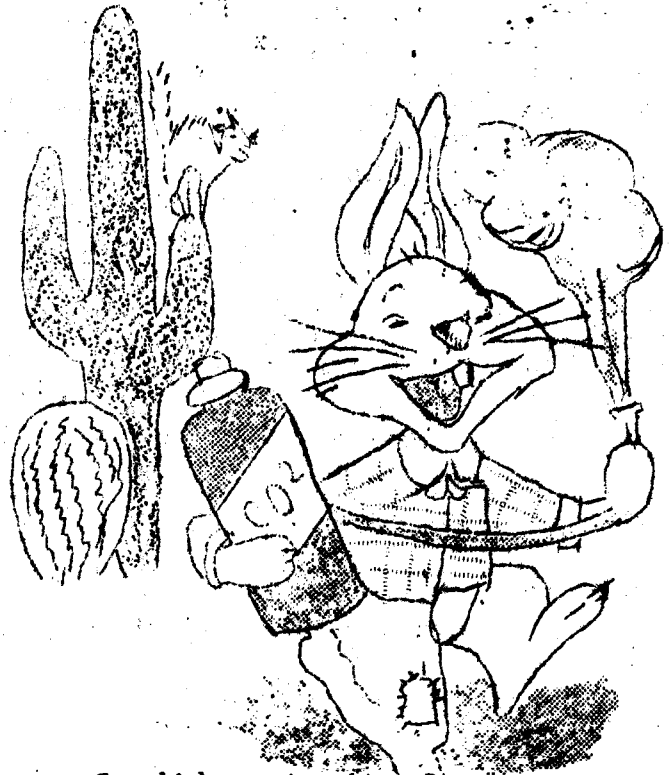
The church damns man for things that happened not of his own doing nor under his own control. For example: "The sins of the fathers shall be visited upon the children, even to the third and fourth generations". Or, Adam and Eve ate of the Tree of Life in defiance of God's order, therefore condemning all mankind to a life of sin for which he will be individually and eternally punished. Or, someone named Christ died for our sins so that we might have salvation; but if you don't believe this, you'll be eternally damned.

Scientology says: "In the beginning and forever is the decision, and the decision is TO BE". (From "The Factors", 1953). The sin of sins could be a refusal to recognize your own postulate "to

be", and to accept the implanted postulate that "you can be only if--".

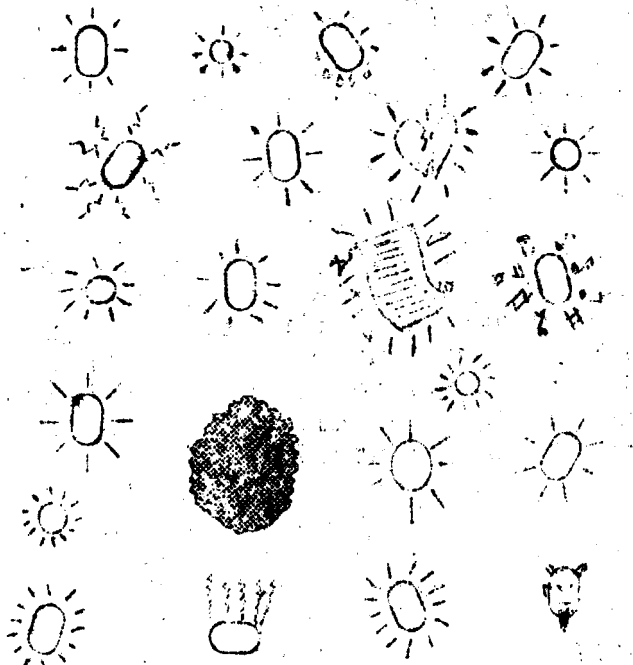

In announcing the action, officials of the H. A. S. stated that there is little doubt but what this stroke will remove Scientology from the target area of overt and covert attacks by the medical profession, who see their pills, scalpels, and appendix-studded incomes threatened. Several auditors who in the past have found themselves facing prejudiced courts or behind bars--or who practiced in fear that each pre-clear might be only a spy with a warrant behind his engram bank--had little sympathy with the Californians' arguments.

With the formation of the Church of Scientology in the State of California by Dr. J. Burton Farber of Glendale, and the granting of a charter, auditors in that area can avoid the recent fiasco in which a Pasadena practitioner is reported to have spent 10 days in that city's torture chamber for "practicing medicine without a license". On March 5, Dr. Farber appeared in Phoenix, and before an audience of more than 30 clinical students, taped a ceremony in which L. Ron Hubbard was made a Doctor of Divinity and awarded Certificate No. One. This gives him legal authority to lecture, perform marriages, baptisms, and other religious rites.

At the same time, as part of this ceremony, Dr. Farber, a minister in another church, was made a Doctor of Divinity in the Church of American Science under the New Jersey charter. Other ministers to be ordained will be graduates of the clinical courses.

The Church of Scientology also has been chartered in Arizona, giving it legality in three states. Similar action is being taken in Michigan, an area in which control is demonstrably bold and vicious.

2. To Charter Churches and Congregations.

3. To found and conduct spiritual guidance centers.

4. To engage in social work and to engage in charitable undertakings.

5. To accept fees and donations.

6. To own, rent real and personal property.

7. To found orders and societies within itself as needful.

8. To practice the teachings and beliefs and to propagate in accordance with its tenets healing of the sick and suffering by prayer or other spiritual means without the use of drugs or material remedy.

THIRD: The said corporation shall be located at 527 Cooper Street, in the City and County of Camden and State of New Jersey and it shall there have its registered office. The agent in charge thereof shall be L. Ron Hubbard, Sr. The corporation shall not only conduct its activities at the address given but shall conduct them likewise throughout the State of New Jersey and outside of the same.

FOURTH: The number of trustees selected for the first year of the existence of the said corporation shall be three and the names and post office addresses shall be as follows:

Scientology as Church



A copy of the charter given the Church of American Science, mother church of Scientology, is reproduced below:

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION of THE CHURCH OF AMERICAN SCIENCE

These presents are to certify that we, L. Ron Hubbard, Sr., of the Borough of Medford Lakes, County of Burlington and State of New Jersey, L. Ron Hubbard, Jr., and Henrietta Hubbard, of the City and County of Camden and State of New Jersey; John Galusha, R. R. #1, Box 394, of the City and County of Pueblo and State of Colorado; Verna Greenough of Bellmawr Park, in the County of Camden and State of New Jersey, and Barbara Bryan, of the City and County of Philadelphia and State of Pennsylvania, do hereby associate ourselves into a corporation under and by virtue of an Act of the Legislature of the State of New Jersey entitled "The Corporation and Association Not for Profit Act." (Title 15 of the Revised Statutes of 1937, N.J.S.A.) and the various amendments thereto and supplements thereof for the lawful purpose other than pecuniary profit as hereinafter stated and to that end we do by this instrument certify that:

FIRST: The name by which the corporation shall be known in law is "The Church of American Science"

SECOND: The purpose for which this corporation is formed is to act as the Mother Church for the propagation of a religious faith known as "Scientology". Believing that Man's best Evidence of God is the God he finds within himself, and trusting with Enduring Faith that the Author of this Universe intended Life to thrive within it, the Church of American Science is founded to espouse such evidence of the Supreme Being and Spirit as may

be knowable to Man and by their use the Church of American Science hopes to bring a greater tranquility to the State and better order and survival to Man upon this planet.

The Church of American Science exists upon this Creed:

1. That God works within Man his wonders to perform.

2. That Man is his own soul, basically free and immortal, but deluded by the flesh.

3. That Man has a God-given right to his own life.

4. That Man has a God-given right to his own reason.

5. That Man has a God-given right to free and open communication.

6. That the human spirit is the only truly effective therapeutic agent available to Man.

7. That a civilization can endure only so long as both spiritual and material needs find place within its structure and that a civilization is lost when God and the Spirit are forgotten by its leaders and its people.

8. That Man and the Nations of Man carry with them their own Salvation and that teachings exist sufficient to effect it.

The Church of American Science exists to assist the strong and the weak, to suppress the wrong-doer and to champion the right and Godly. Its mission is to carry to Man revelations and teachings and practices of the present and the ages past and to assist him, his family and communities to live in greater peace and harmony.

The Holy Book of this church consists of a collection of the works of and about the Great Teachers, including the work, St. Luke.

The Saints of this Church are the great messiahs and religious philosophers.

The specific teachings of this church concern its Holy Book and those contributions on the Mind and Spirit made in more recent times as a result of scientific investigations concerning the human spirit and the physical universe.

How Optimum Is a "Clear"?



NE OF THE most abused, maligned, and misunderstood words in the language of Dianetics and Scientology is the word "clear".

In L. Ron Hubbard's first book, "DIANETICS, the Modern Science of Mental Health", a "clear" was described as a person "without psychoses, neuroses, compulsions, and repressions", and "high above the current norm" in intelligence. A steady improvement in perceptics also could be expected.

Almost immediately, the word itself began to manifest the entire gamut of human aberration. It became both a beacon of desire and the "sour grapes" of unattainability. For the latter, the word took on magnitudes that would have given a "clear" the attributes of the highest of the gods.

The "clear" (Mr. Hubbard said) --even though he wore glasses an inch thick--might expect to start showing marked improvement in his eyesight, often changing glasses

four or five times during therapy. The exaggerationists, glossing over the gradient of expected improvement, immediately assigned to the "clear" superlative vision. To wear glasses was to place one low on the Tone Scale (a hypothetical chart predicting what might be expected of an individual under any given circumstance.) Many, fearing that their visual deficiency would be self-invalidating, tortured and squinted and strained in stubborn misery, "knowing" that in time even small print would be no harder to read than was that big sign across the street with the dancing, foggy letters. Sometimes, in the privacy of their rooms, they'd sneak out their "cheaters", but though they could read better, the "overt act" against Dianetics was a new "lock" on their guilt chain.

The moment a hen-pecked husband found himself driven to the necessity of sassing his wife, he "knew" by the exhilaration of redeemed self-respect that, at last, he was (Maybe there's more on Page 3)

How Optimum Is a Clear?

(Don't start here. See Page 1.) a clear. The loafer who could look at a job without being tempted by the salary it paid could gloat to the friend from whom he borrowed coffee money that he was a self-determined clear. The bedfast individual who had made life miserable for his friends and family for years could, by taking the few necessary steps that returned circulation to his feet and legs, regain the wavering attention by announcing that he had processed himself into the state of clear. There even was a way to do it with mirrors.

These persons were rid of neither their compulsions nor neuroses. They are part of the great family of aberrees that would gladly throw themselves on a pile of burning faggots if they knew that the deed would obtain for them a few minutes of hungered-for attention.

In the three years since the first book, the word "clear" has been changed, altered, and even hyphenated. No longer is a clear someone who has turned off a headache, or "remembered" what Mamma said to Papa during his conception, or decided not to act like Grandpa just because he hid Grandpa's cane which made Grandpa fall down and break his scrawny neck. Even the ability to read the small type on the editorial page of The Daily Sunation, or to hear the undertones of a symphony muffled behind the bleating of a tobacco auctioneer, do not guarantee the properties of a clear.

A MEST clear--1953 definition--had no present day problems, and had cleared up all the occlusion of this lifetime. It was a big order--but some, after only a few hours of processing (and that from auditors who were far from optimum themselves), announced boldly that they'd hit the jackpot; that, on this merry-go-round of life, they'd found the gold ring.

You don't evaluate, you don't

invalidate, but like Ernest, in "The Great Stone Face" by Nathaniel Hawthorne, many of us came hopefully to see, and having seen, sadly turned away. Instead of the miracle we'd expected, we found a person who, under other circumstances and in different environment, might have been expected to park a hand under the lapel of his coat and insist, with great certainty, that he was Napoleon Bonaparte.

With the transition from Dianetics to Scientology--and the discovery that the thetan and the body could go their separate ways--the "clear" became more of a variable. One who merely "gets out" is only a "release". A "theta clear" (Issue 24-G, Journal of Scientology) "is a relative, not an absolute term. It means that the person, this thought unit, is clear of his body, his engrams, his facsimiles, but can handle and safely control a body." In the Doctorate Course, the added ability of not being drawn back into the body if the body is hurt or injured is part of the definition.

There may be clears. There even may be lots of clears. It's even possible that some of those who say they're clears are clears. And maybe, to return to the analogy of Hawthorne's Ernest, those who look and turn sadly away are refusing to look upon themselves. We expect a miracle--not seekers of lost gold mines, not a person in rags and dirt living off the charity of the unarrived, not a person who'll lie to escape blame, even as you and I.

Apparently, the accomplishment of optimum goals as yet is merely theoretical. Possibly, too many have become over-sold on the idea that it's "simple--there's nothing to it", and a clever auditor can get results in a few minutes or a few hours. They're waiting for something to happen TO them--with a minimum of work and study. Or, if they can afford it, they think they can take course after course, and like the rich youth of Saint

Matthew, buy themselves into the Kingdom of Attainment.

There are goals above theta clear: cleared theta clear and operating thetan, but for the present, we'll settle for one person on the bottom of the ladder. Nor need they demonstrate the ability to levitate their car across a police-jammed intersection. In a nation becoming shackled by controls of church and state, and steeped in the belief that we must continually prepare to destroy another segment of the world in order to survive, there is much room for a clear to demonstrate his powers in these channels of government. Or in the educational system. Or the communications field.

Maybe it's the word itself that is jamming up the computing machine. When you "clear" a computer, you don't merely remove the implanted number that's giving you wrong totals, you reduce the entire sum to a starting point of zero. Maybe none of us ever will attain this hypothetical goal until we're ready and willing to erase the whole sum and quit trying to find one or two numbers that we think stand between us and it.

Mr. Hubbard has said himself that our goal is to be nothing--and that's all we ever can become. Maybe that's why we never see a real, honest-to-God clear--there's nothing there. As for the pseudo-type (quoting from I Corinthians), "God hath chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise; and God hath chosen the weak things of the world to confound the things which are mighty".

Miracles still happen! In a report by Rin Tin Tin, giving a play-by-play organizational meeting of the Dianetic Research Foundation's BOG (that's Board of Bovernors), He, She, or It wrote:

"After dinner Saturday night the Board decided to enter into the discussion of Dianetics vs. Scientology. This discussion lasted for a considerable length of time and all phases of dianetics and Scientology were discussed. (Try it yourself, some time, when you have a few spare after-dinner moments.) The purpose of this discussion was to determine the similarities and differences between the two as they are evaluated by the various individuals of the Board.

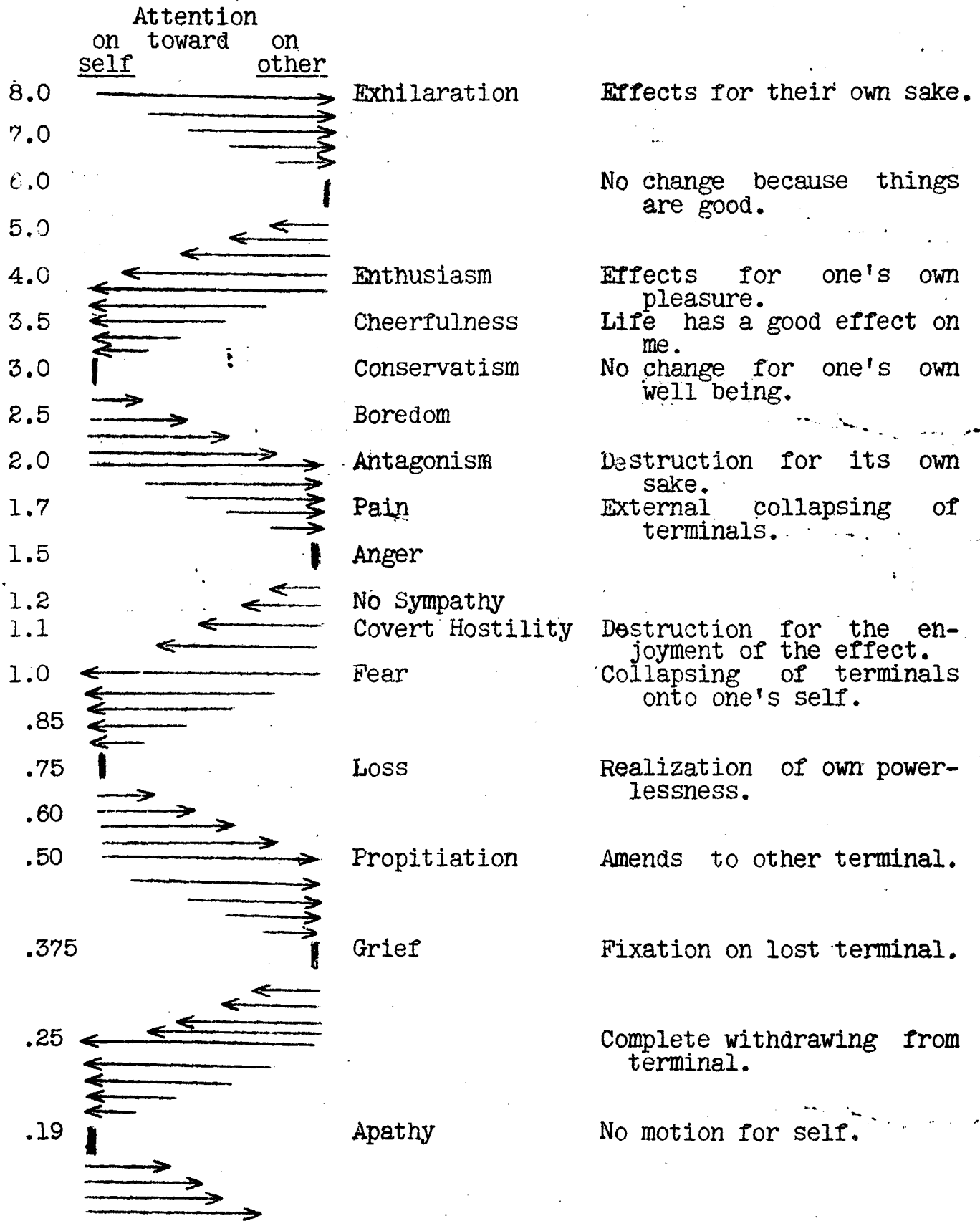
"Since dianetics is, by the definition adopted by the Board, 'The study of the potentials of the human being and methods of achieving these potentials', any work that can contribute to the study of Man's potentials may be considered as a part of Dianetics.

"The general consensus of opinion was that Scientology is a continuation of the basic studies inherent in dianetics from its beginning. The difference between dianetics and Scientology is one of terminology and presentation and not one of basic concepts, in the opinion of the Board. The major contributions of Scientology are in the areas of Concept Processing and Creative Processing."

Students of Scientology may be amused at the narrowness of difference placed by the Board's evaluation between Dianetics and Scientology--but if they remember Hubbard's First Book (Memo to Wichita: His initials are L. Ron) as well as his latest lectures and writings, they'll recognize the place on the Tone Scale of those who insist A equals A equals A equals A.

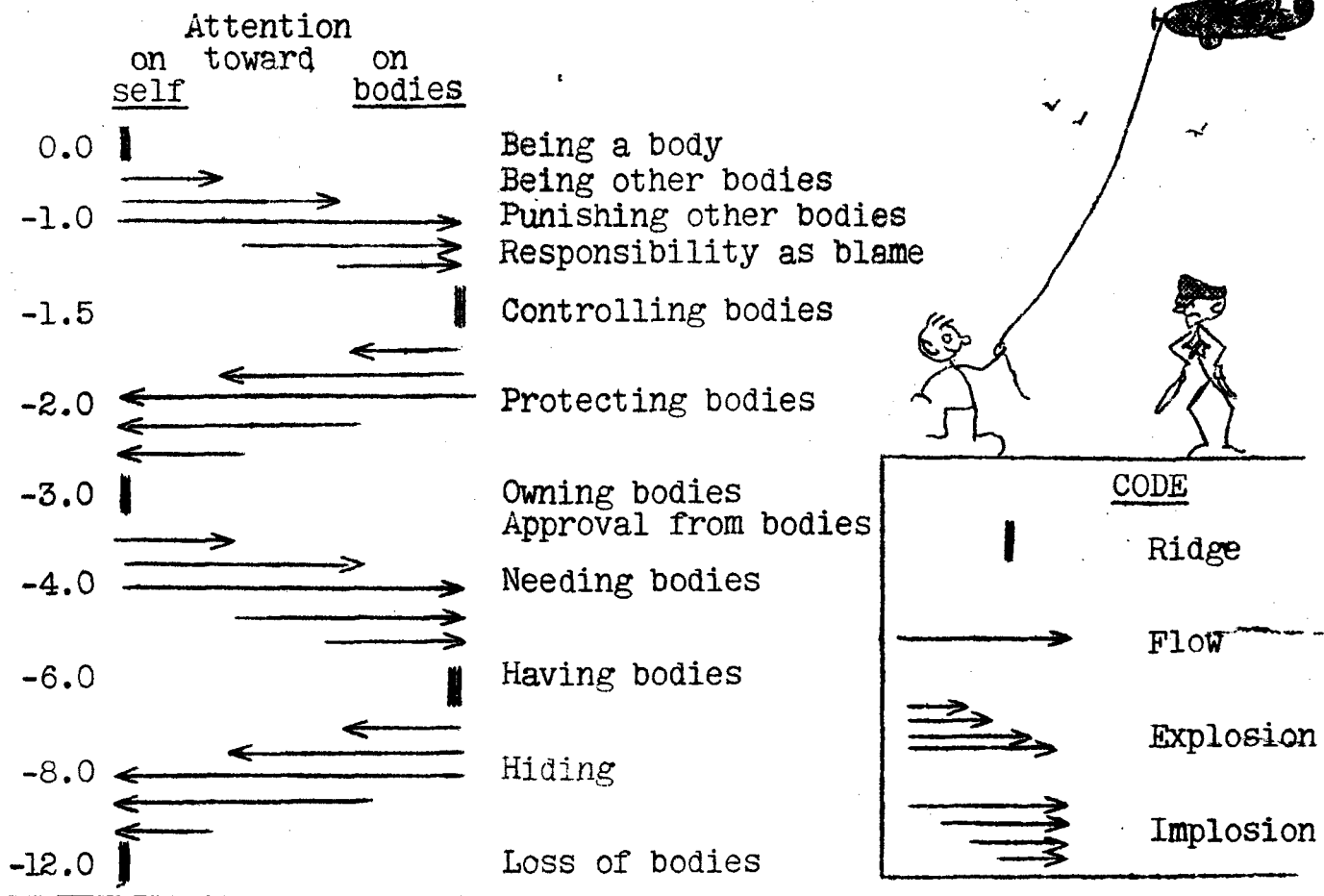
THE TONE SCALE...IN TERMS OF ELLOW

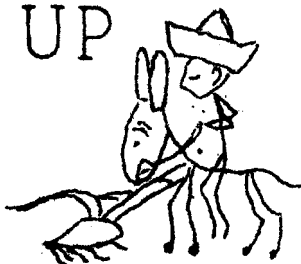

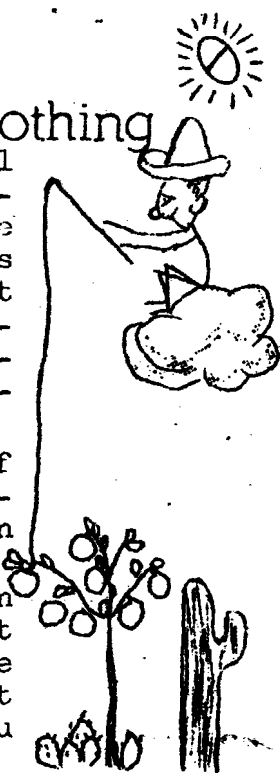
pleted his degree in physics at the University of Oklahoma, and eyes a location in the California desert as a physicist....

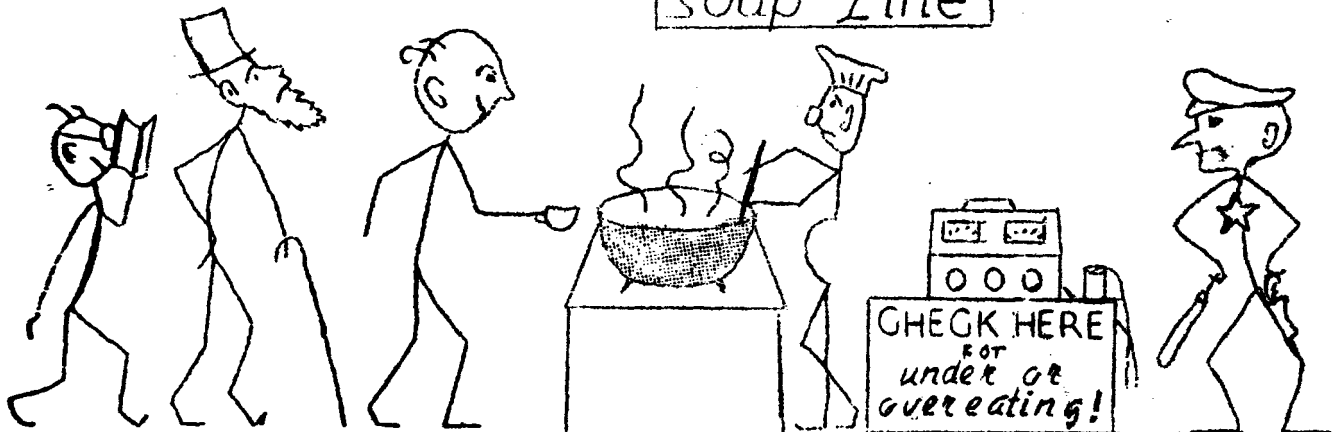

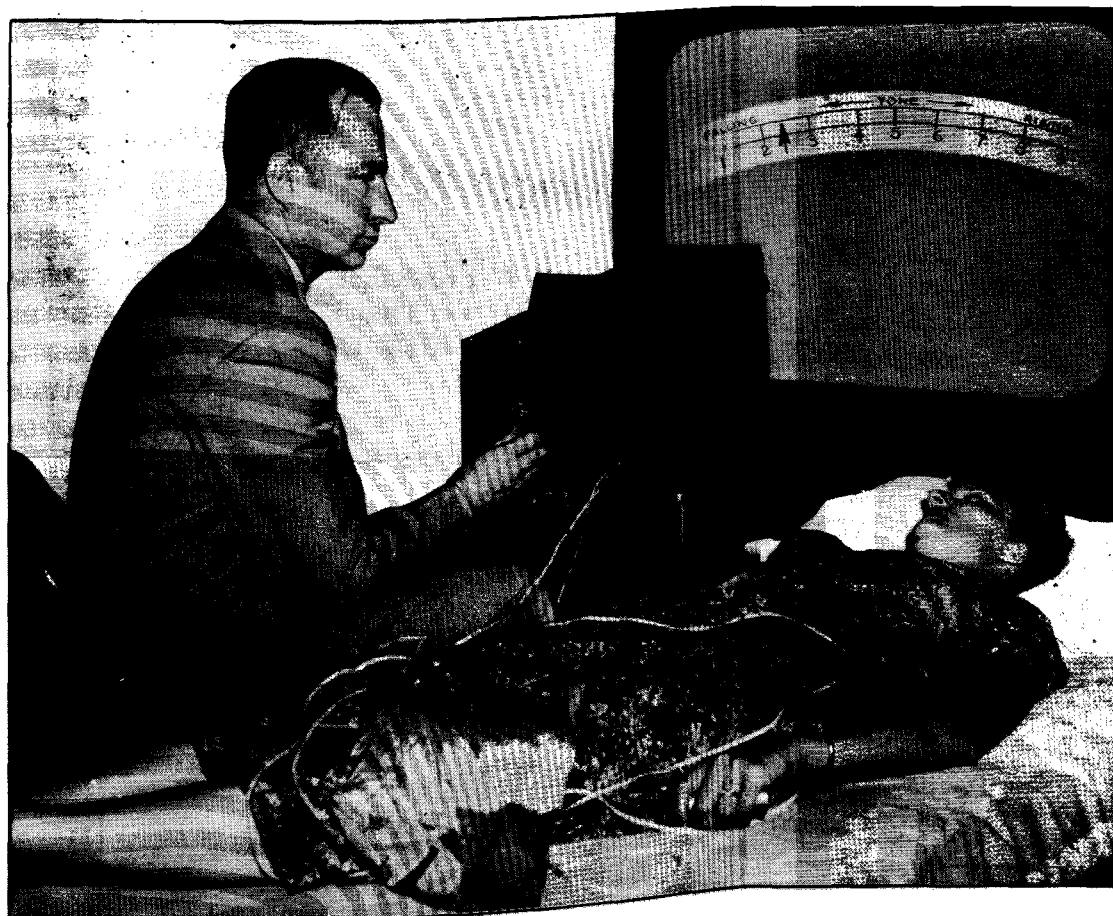

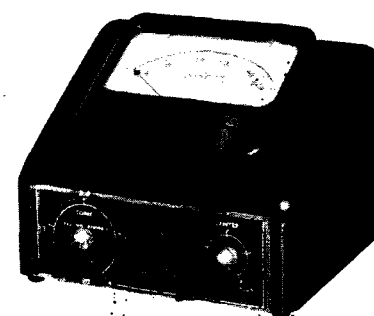

Jingles of Hubbard Link Past, Present Processes

How far Scientology and Dianetics parallel each other, and whether all the techniques of one have been made obsolete by the other, are questions that have aroused much controversy in the Dianetics-Scientology fields. This schism, in some instances, has resulted in a complete break between those who look upon Dianetics as decadent, and those who have obtained results with the old techniques and consider Scientology a weird upstart.

Persons who have read L. Ron Hubbard writings and have listened to his lectures recall that--no matter what magical properties he may ascribe to a new technique--he always has advised that the auditor is concerned with the case, and not the process. Auditors still report that they are getting results with Book One methods; others who have been in the field since the beginning--back in 1950--admit they use both old and new techniques, depending on what they think the pre-clear needs. The difference, they say, is that the new techniques work faster, but there are times when the old techniques must be used before the pre-clear can accept the new. These auditors seem to be the ones reporting the best and most consistent results.

Below is printed a copy of "The Dianetic Jingles" written by Mr. Hubbard when he first moved to Phoenix in March, 1952. These are particularly interesting because of their broad scope, covering, in brief form, almost every technique from those in "DIANETICS, The Modern Science of Mental Health", to the Beingness Process of 1954. To those who like to work with riddles, it might be much more profitable to look for next year's Scientology in these Jingles than to waste time looking for the hidden meanings and significances in the "Jingles of Nostradamus". (Not that we're pointing out a similarity.)

HAVE WE A Following Issue 2
FAITH? OR of The ABERREE, cor-
A SCIENCE? respondence indicates
there has been some
tendency in the field to believe
we are antagonistic toward Dianet-
ics and/or Scientology. Nothing
was further from our purpose.

After three years of investi-
gation into L. Ron Hubbard's sci-
ence--following more than 15 years'
research into religion, mysticism,
psychology, and allied fields--we
are convinced Scientology comes
closer to answering our questions
about ourselves and life than any-
thing we've ever found. In this
lifetime, at least. To us, it has
become a way of living, and unless
something comes along to supplant
it, we shall continue to use and
indorse Scientology and the major-
ity of Mr. Hubbard's books on the
subject.

Any opposition we have expres-
sed or expect to express is con-
cerned wholly with false, bombast-
ic claims about the science, eith-
er in whole or in part. As a re-

ligion, we feel that Scientology
comes closer to explaining the
where-what-and-why of man than any
other creed or dogma. As a thera-
py, we have seen it produce re-
sults neither the medical profess-
ion nor so-called prayer-and-faith
cults have been able to touch. But

We sincerely believe that
claims any technique will cure

But now to straighten up SOME of the confusion the preceding

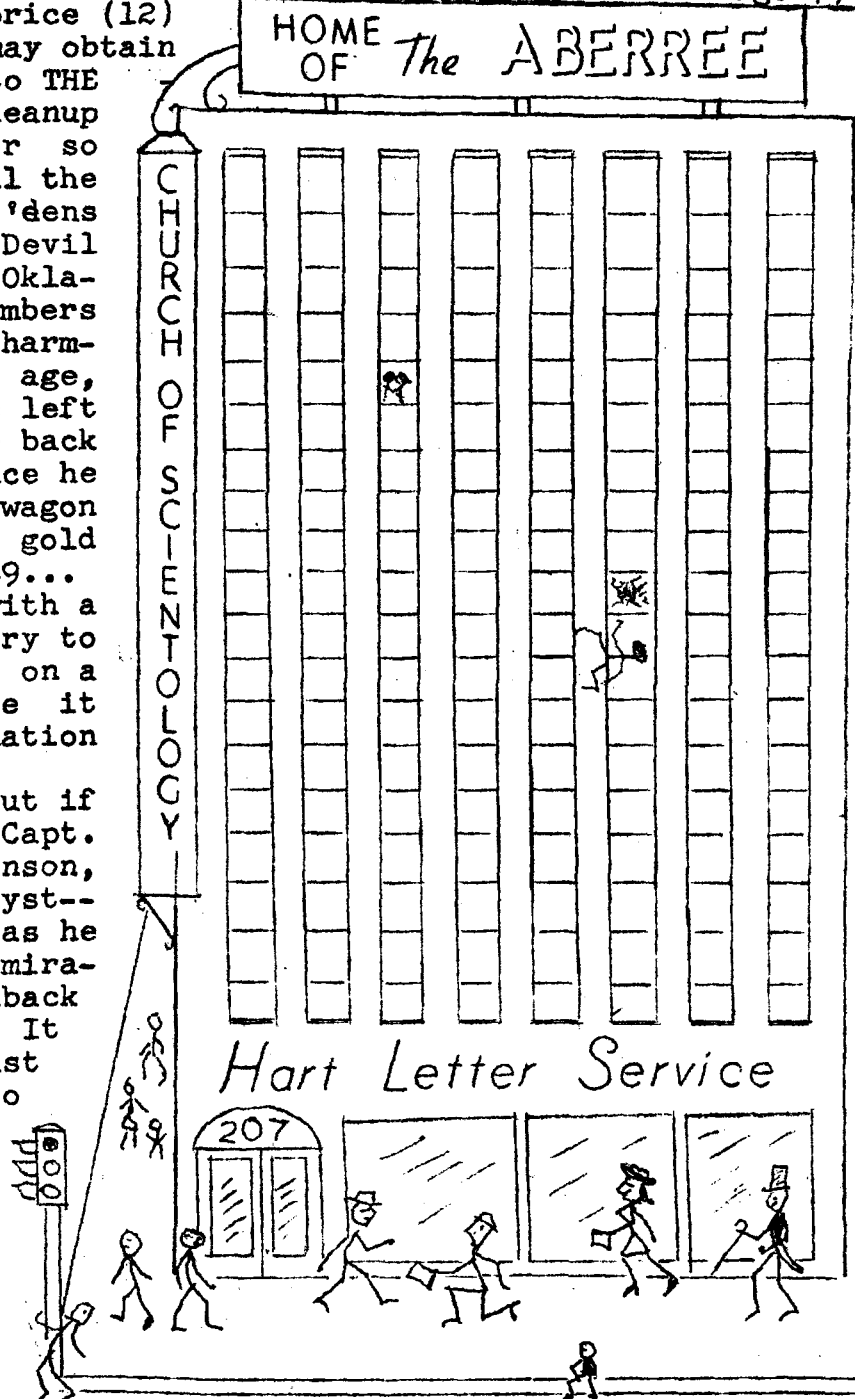

nest.

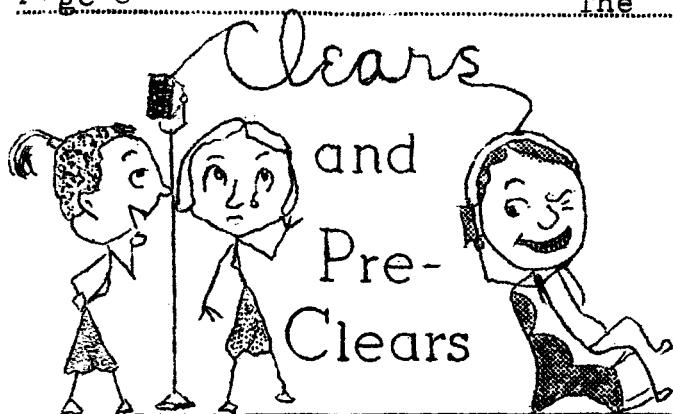

Wives of 1,000 construction workers in Columbia Falls, Mont., who refuse to cross a picket line, have suggested they take over the jobs their husbands have left idle. To them, food is more important than some small group's row with the firm that pays the bills.

Because Los Angeles protects pigeons, a 65-year-old tenant---forbidden by law from killing or molesting "city property" --moved out when a mother pigeon took over a corner of his room for nesting activities. He sent the City a bill for the extra rent.

Grave diggers in Detroit have ended a seven-month strike, permitting the interment of an accumulated 200 bodies.

Prompted by past experience, Enid, Okla., officials made it illegal to carry or use "pistols designed to discharge liquids". This action was taken a few days prior to the invasion of school children for the Tri-State Band Festival.

Chicago is to set up a laboratory for "crazy drivers", and "logical suspects" will lose their licenses UNTIL psychiatrists can report a cure. Which sounds like a good way to take everybody permanently off the road.

Don Abbott and Duane Lurkins, members.

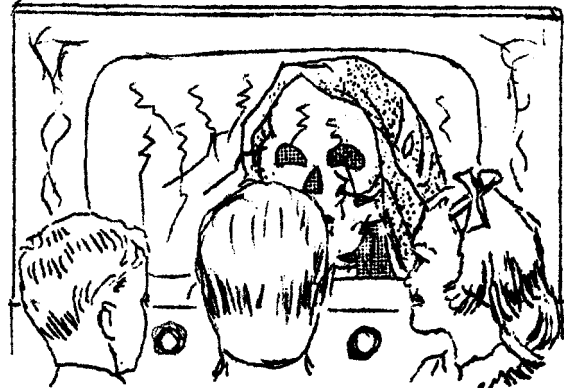

"Original Thesis" Is Printed Complete in H.A.S. "Journal"

Issue 28-G of the Journal of SCIENTOLOGY carried a full reprint of the book, "Dianetics, the Original Thesis", under the title, "Scientology: A New Science". ting the contract to a civilian organization to provide meals for this training center. Not only will they furnish the meals, but there'll be civilian service for officers AND enlisted men, with no dishes to wash, no floors to scrub, no sloppy tables to "G.I."

It's an economy measure. It was discovered that an outside firm could provide better meals at less expense than the Air Base itself. Which merely points up the inefficiency of a military organization. With hundreds of men idle most of the time, serving out a sentence in preparation for a war the top politicians may not be able

to maneuver us into in spite of their frantic efforts, it seems strange that cooks, waiters, dish washers, etc., can be hired, food prepared and served--at a profit for some civilian firm--cheaper than the Government can do it.

Yet there have been parallel instances in the past. On Operation Crossroads, the Bikini atomic bomb experiments of 1946, more than \$100,000,000 was spent to detonate and photograph two atomic bombs. A better job could have been done for one-tenth of this sum by even one of the "B" picture companies from Hollywood. It was no secret among military personnel that the pictures made by the Army Air Force of the A-blasts in 1946 and the preparations for it were far inferior to pre-explosion pictures made by a newsreel company.

In the name of economy--if the administration REALLY is interested in lightening the tax burden--maybe somebody will come up with the idea of fighting the next war by contract: give the contract to win the war to a low-bidding civilian firm and let them make the plans and hire needed personnel. It's certain experienced gunners wouldn't be pounding typewriters, typists picking up twigs and cigaret butts off the grass in the "Officers' Quarters", and cooks and dish washers operating the armament.

Besides, if it were a game as well as a job--instead of enforced servitude under incompetent rank-happies--winning a war might be fun.

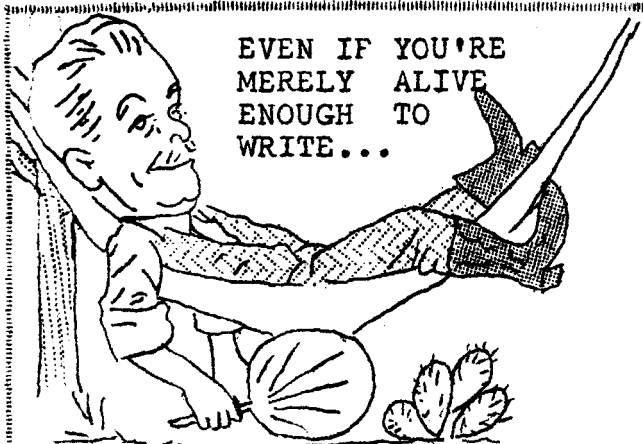

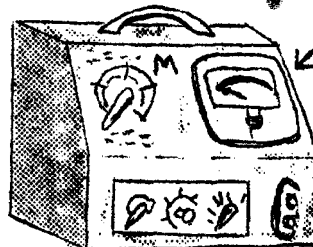

Formation of the Hubbard Association of Scientologists, International (HASI) to replace the Hubbard Association of Scientologists (HAS) was announced by L. Ron Hubbard during the closing sessions of the June Congress in Phoenix.

Death of the HAS, Mr. Hubbard said, was preferable to going through all the red tape and filling out the thousands of necessary forms to transfer the old organization into the new.

As far as the "field" is concerned, this will make little difference except to give auditors and schools complete security from legal interference. The new organization, the HASI, is a non-profit religious fellowship, and as such, Ron said, is entitled to the constitutional guarantees of a Supreme Court ruling that no state shall take action to prevent operation of any organization concerned with the study or advance of the human soul.

Facetiously, Ron added that the old HAS, set up for study into problems of the mind, was out of date, since Scientology has no

concern with problems of the mind but deals primarily with the thet-an, which is unknown in law.

This religious fellowship, Ron said, should prevent a repetition of such fiascoes as that in Detroit of more than a year ago in which two Scientologists were arrested and tried only in the news headlines.

Late in June, a direct mail program to start selling Scientology to the public was to start in Phoenix, where trained auditors are available to care for any returns from the direct mail campaign. After this test, the program will be extended to other cities and areas as quickly as possible.

In the Phoenix area, all auditors--good, bad, and indifferent--will take part in the project. These will be tested, and those failing to reach a set standard will be given an opportunity to have their own cases brought up to this standard free of cost. A board will be set up by the auditors themselves with the power to set standards and examine professional auditors.

Other changes contemplated deal directly with the associate schools, which will remain practically as they are when new contracts are negotiated. E. L. Kish, who has been operating the Scientology Foundation in Akron, Ohio, has resigned as a school, and the contract held by Dr. Walter E. Hanan of Spokane, Wash., has been cancelled and probably will be reassigned to Dr. Gordon Fleming, also of Spokane.

New tapes for use in the various schools are being prepared, and will be ready for distribution shortly. Ron announced these will be half-hour lectures, as it has been found that students will listen to live lectures for an hour or more, but will become bored

with long sessions on tapes. These tapes will put the training at each of the schools on a level with the training given at the clinical course, Ron declared.

In addition, an Instructor's Handbook will be issued students to assist them in learning and using the data contained on the tapes.

As part of the new training programs, associate schools will not be licensed to issue official certificates after July 1. The student, after taking the course, must appear before examining boards in Phoenix, Camden, N.J., or London, and pass an examination before he can be certified. Ability to pass the examination is the only requirement, and this could be done by a person who has attended none of the schools, although Ron thought it unlikely anyone could acquire sufficient know-how without attending classes.

Clinical course graduates will not be affected by this examination requirement. The next clinical course, the Seventh, starting 21 June and ending 1 August, will be the last, the HASI has announced.

Ron said that the clinical courses which he has been conducting have permitted him to extend and simplify techniques to a point where success with both the student and pre-clear is almost a certainty. Part of this technique, labeled "Technique 30", was demonstrated before the Phoenix Congress. Auditing today, Ron said, is directed toward the third dynamic with much better results than in the old days when the first and second dynamics were stressed.

Doctors of Scientology, a degree issued only to graduates of the clinical courses and B.ScN's who have proven themselves in the field, will have ministerial status, Ron said. A medallion is now being designed--with an explosion as the central motif--which men will wear on their tie and women will wear as a brooch. This will be the only ministerial "uniform" recognized for Scien- (Turn Page)

tologists, and will be registered as such with the National Board of Ministers.

All certificates issued under the old HAS are being validated by the new organization, and memberships--including Founding Members--are being transferred to the HASI.

No certificates have been issued recently, Ron said, waiting for the completion of the new organization. These now will be completed, bearing the name of the HASI instead of the HAS.

After the Congress, Ron said in an interview that the \$50 charge for Doctor of Divinity certificates would be refunded since it was learned there would be no cost of registering the certificates. However, in a bulletin put out by the HASI dated 12 June, it was announced this \$50 would be used for the medallion, a pin, a book containing all services which the minister of Scientology might be called upon to perform, and for the issuance of sufficient identification.

The HASI has three offices--Phoenix, Camden, and London--all incorporated under the new organization. However, the London office will continue to be called the HAS.

Officers in the HASI include: L. Ron Hubbard, chairman of the board; John Galusha, president; Mary Sue Hubbard, treasurer; Ralph Swanson, vice president; and Ken Barrett, secretary.

Mr. Hubbard announced that earlier plans for him to go to Europe in August have been cancelled.

Auditors, who have spent months and years--plus large sums in tuition fees--learning to be a competent Scientologist, were told at the Phoenix Congress June 5 to 8 just how simple it all is.

All an auditor need have his preclear do, L. Ron Hubbard said, is:

1. Duplicate anything he's looking at
2. Spot some spots in space, and
3. Remedy havingness.

This concatenation, Mr. Hubbard said, makes you an auditor.

For really tough cases, you have the preclear BE a problem, and BE others who are BEing problems. Below the "tough case level", you have the preclear find out what he can BE until he gets a certainty.

This technique, Mr. Hubbard said, linked with "Technique 30", will--even in the hands of beginners--get results far and above the fondest expectations of the most experienced auditors using the most advanced techniques back in the days of Dianetics.

Technique 30 has as its basic application the principle of Opening Procedure. In Technique 30, the preclear picks spots on opposite walls, or selects two dissimilar objects at some distance from each other in the room, and walks from one spot or object to the other at the auditor's command. He is told to put his finger on the spot, or pick up the object, tell its color, weight, and temperature, and in the case of the article, replace it in exactly the same location it was before he picked it up. Then he goes to the opposite article, or spot, and the procedure is repeated. This continues for hours, if necessary, with the command unvarying, until the preclear comes up through the entire tone scale, from apathy about the assignment to anger, antagonism, and finally, he should even get to

the point where he's cheerful about carrying out the commands. There's not supposed to be even fatigue (for the preclear) no matter how long the process is continued.

Mr. Hubbard said that the symbol "30" to designate this technique was chosen because of its connotation among communications workers--especially radio and news men--where "30" long has been accepted as meaning "finish", or "the end". This ends a long chain of 8's and combinations of 8's started more than a year ago which linked infinity (∞) and the thetan (o). Few present at the Congress were ready to believe that Mr. Hubbard means this in its full sense and that there will be no new techniques. Instead, they interpret the use of "30" as applying to the fact auditing now is directed toward the Third Dynamic instead of the First, and the Thetan (o) still is an important consideration in all processing.

In being an auditor, Mr. Hubbard said, don't put the spot in pictures, but in actual places in the physical universe. Check the distance and direction, for example, of the school room, and put the spot in the room--not in a picture of the room. This brings the spots up to present time.

If the preclear starts feeling ill while running this process, have him mock up his body doing "what it wants to do--flopping out of control and vomiting".

The only time an auditor fails is when he doesn't wait long enough on extended communication lags. It may be minutes, or even hours, Mr. Hubbard said, before a preclear has the answer to an auditor's command, and the case will be retarted to the amount the auditor interrupts, either from a mistaken belief the preclear isn't co-operating, or because the auditor believes he must earn his money and act professional.

Viewpoint Straight Wire, Mr. Hubbard said, is still a potent process, but isn't recommended for groups because of the (Turn Page)

long communication lags. While one preclear might be ready for the next command within seconds or minutes, another would bog down for even as much as an hour or possibly more.

Each question is asked over and over until there no longer is a lag in answering.

Finding three spots in the room and three spots in the body alternately will bring exteriorization, Mr. Hubbard said, if the auditor will remedy havingness in between. This is done by finding out what the preclear thinks he can have, and altering its quality until the mock-up of the object snaps into the body. The mock-up can be dim or flimsy, and doesn't even have to concern an object the preclear or auditor thinks is bothering the preclear. The main thing, in running havingness, is to get mass, not quality.

Mr. Hubbard said that you'd only have to print the first section of the First Book and add a short chapter on Havingness to bring the book up to date with modern techniques. He stated that you could run an engram by mocking up its duplicate and bringing it in on the preclear--whether he's in the body or exteriorized. "If a Black V would mock up black planets and pull them in on him, he'd start getting mock-ups. This is Dianetics, come to life," Mr. Hubbard said.

The less specific you are, the better: after an accident, it isn't necessary to spot the scene or the car--you even could have him mock up the Empire State Building and pull that in on him.

In one of his lectures, Mr. Hubbard dwelt at length on changes in his Theta-MEST theory, stating that theta is the solver of problems, while MEST is a problem to be solved.

"When Mother says 'You're a problem', she's saying 'You're the physical universe'," Hubbard said.

The auditor-preclear set-up is the auditor is being theta and there to solve problems, while the

preclear has set himself up as MEST and a problem to be solved. Your only chance to help him is to bring him to the point where he's a solver of his own problems.

If you can understand this Theta-MEST theory, Mr. Hubbard said, your own case will start to break up.

The willingness to grant beingness and the ability to duplicate and the ability to heal are parallel, Mr. Hubbard said.

"The new technique is entirely toward the Third Dynamic," Mr. Hubbard explained in an interview after the lectures. "The body itself is a problem in the Third Dynamic. Opening Procedure has busted the difference between having Scientology and not having Scientology."

Paralleling the lecture on how simple auditing can be was the distribution to Congress delegates of Issue 31-G of The JOURNAL, which was made up of an article by Jack Horner, entitled "Any Two People Can Do It". This outlines, in a few easy exercises, a complete auditing procedure.

Lie detector tests tried on full-blooded Indians show absolutely no reaction, Dr. W. H. Donahue, director of Oklahoma Mental Health, and O. K. Bivens, State Crime Bureau director, reported recently. Donahue credits the even graph, which has no quivers whatever, to the Indians' "stoic nature."

Donahue said the lie detectors used depended on blood pressure, respiration, pulse, and palm sweat. None of these showed any changes.

This is only true of full-blooded Indians, the director said. Those with mixed blood show definite reactions.

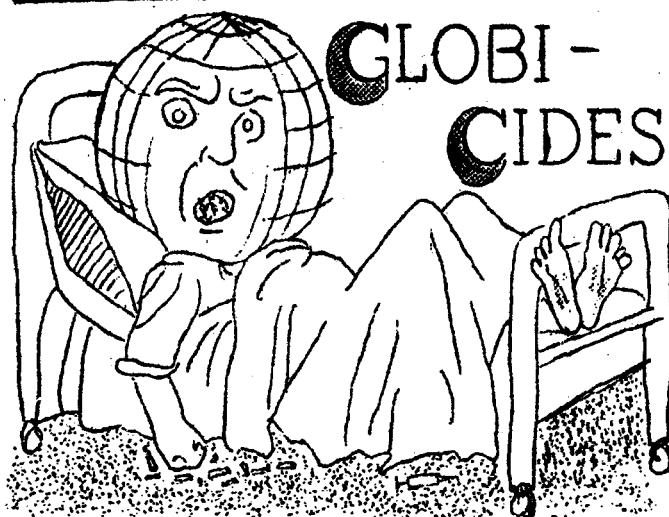

Californians Set Up Auditing "Bank"

An auditing "bank", in which auditors may make arrangements for a package of 5, 10, or 20 hours' processing, has been set up by the California Association of Dianetic Auditors. In return, each member of the bank agrees to give as many hours of processing to another member of the bank as he receives.

Several auditors, some of whom are rated tops in their class, already have subscribed to the bank. Associates also are listed whose activities are limited to reading Self-Analysis to a pre-clear.

According to the rules, the auditor can transfer his "credits" to another member of his family,



Because two Oklahoma state officials refused to actively support Mrs. Willie Murray's candidacy for governor, her husband, the incumbent governor, fired them. Others have been warned.

When a few elderly women of Sharpsburg, Md., demanded an ordinance banning shorts, Mayor Koontz told the press about it. The ordinance failed, but because the city found itself censured and ridiculed throughout the nation, the City Council muzzled its mayor: no more news unless the Council approves, in writing.

Each dead Red Chinese soldier cost more than 50,000 rounds of small-arms fire, an instructor at the Army Infantry School at Fort Benning, Ga., reports. This, he said, compares to 208 rounds it took a Confederate rifleman, using muskets, to kill one Yankee at the battle of Chickamauga.

Oklahoma voters have been subjected to a new torture: talking marathons, in which two candidates for governor each harangued over radio and television for more than 24 hours without stopping. Victims admitted that even a singing soap commercial sounded good when Candidates William Coe and William Gill finally shut up.

Because of investigations and security charges against some of the scientists at the radar laboratories at Fort Monmouth, N.J.,

"roughly a dozen" top scientists in atomic energy have resigned in protest. It may get to the point where research and national security will be completely in the hands of the suspicious snoops.

After the eighth death in Brooklyn, doctors were warned against indiscriminate use of penicillin. It seems that in some cases, penicillin taken orally, such as in chewing gum, can make a person allergic to it in the form of injections.

When the U.S. returned "freedom of the seas" to a 450-mile area in the Pacific, it was assumed the A- and H-bomb tests at Bikini and Eniwetok were over. In the meantime, radioactive ashes that fell on natives, removed hundreds of miles from their Marshall Island homes, made more than half of them ill. Medical aid was sent them.

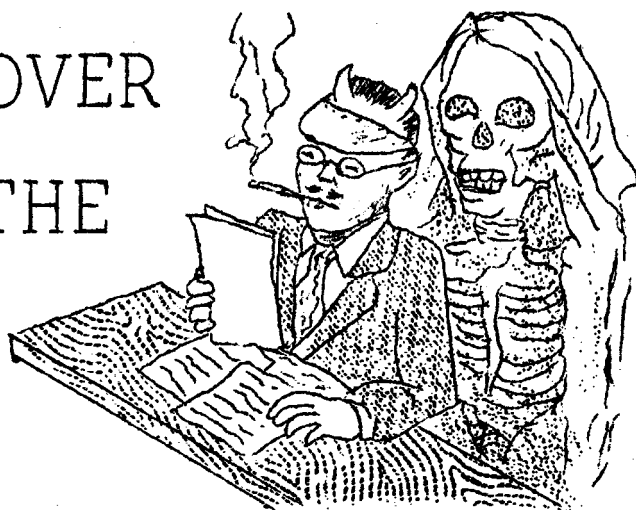
New Army script is under fire. It seems that models used for the women on it are so unbeautiful no one wants to keep it, spend it, or accept it.

What of the Book Auditor?

"In the beginning," it said, "the book auditor was reckoned to be the key person in Dianetics."

Being a book auditor myself, I plunged into the article, the first in BRISTOL DIANETIC REVIEW for May, 1954.

"Mr. Hubbard said," it continued, "that any two intelligent people could get together, and, with the aid of 'Dianetics, Modern Science of Mental Health', clear up their troubles. Of course there were to be professional auditors, but the spread of Dianetics through Society was to be the work of the amateur, the book auditor."

Well, this is the way I'd understood it, too. I kind of figured that the little group we'd gotten together, multiplied by a large number representing all other book auditors who'd organized groups, might build up to an impressive array of people spread around the globe. And that a lot of them would be able and willing to audit others and actually help them, as our people seemed to be doing.

BDR goes on to mention groups in Great Britain in the early days --at a time when the British hadn't much choice except to depend on amateurs grouped together. If anything at all was accomplished in the first year in England, amateurs and groups should be credited with it. The article continues: "Nowadays there seems to be a considerable duality in official attitudes towards the amateur, the book auditor. On the one hand, there is the oft repeated statement of Mr. Hubbard that techniques and processes are becoming simpler--that anyone can use them. And on the other, the implication (not often openly expressed, but there, nevertheless) that no one should undertake auditing until he has taken a course at the H.A.S. Now there seems to be the further inference that only auditors who have taken the clinical course really know what they are about."

To be quite fair, I think the

H.A.S. may have done a good deal for the book auditor in the past year. The JOURNAL has published outlines of processing procedures; PABs have gone into further detail in describing methods and discussing theory. In spite of this, a large question looms: Should the book auditor attempt to use this information?

It's my present guess that he should, and that he'll have a lot of success if he follows instructions exactly. But like the BDR editor, I'd like to have a direct statement from the H.A.S.

Good professionals are greatly needed. They offer fastest, surest results to those who want the best and can afford to pay for it. They can handle the psychos, the cardiacs, the senile-- difficult cases the book auditor might avoid. They can bring invaluable assistance and advice to groups.

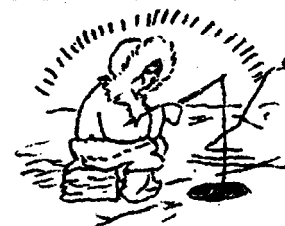
It's my sincere hope that book auditors also can have their place in the picture, and that the future will bring them fresh encouragement, validation, and data.

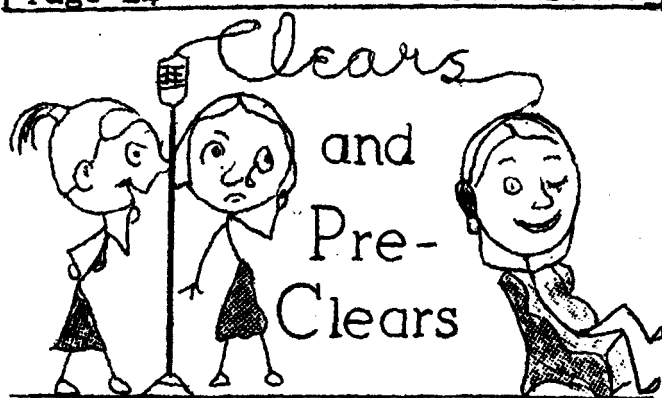

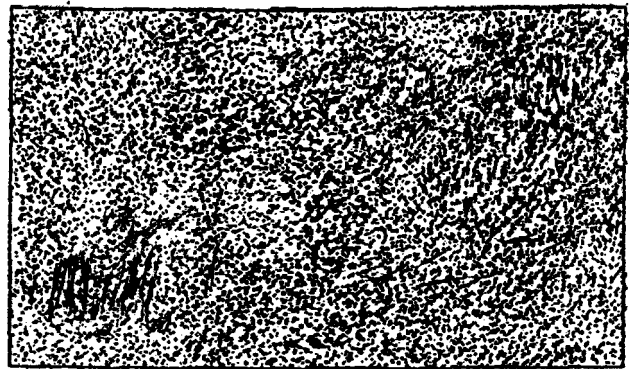

Mathison Wins Fight For E-Meter Patents

A two-year fight with the U.S. patent office over whether the electropsychometer is a patentable instrument has been won, according to a report from Volney G. Mathison, its inventor.

Volney claims that in 1951, the patent office offered to allow eight limited claims, pertaining to specific instruments. He appealed to the U.S. Patent Board, and two years after the appeal, all eight basic claims were allowed. The patent, Volney says, applies to the idea of the use of any type of hand-held electrode, any type of electronic bridge, and any type of indicating meter. This allowance covers 100 or more possible models.

The "E-meter", as the instrument is known in the "field", was built at the request of L. Ron Hubbard, and immediately became almost a badge for the practicing auditor.

Each of us has a universe which is filled chock full of old facsimiles and which contains a big lump of trouble which is our experience of the real universe. Historians may take an interest in these old facsimiles; geographers, physicists, and astronomers may take an interest in that big lump; but Scientists take an interest in something more pervading and more technical.

HOW WELL IS "Scientology," L. SCIENTOLOGY Ron Hubbard has said DEFINED? repeatedly, "is the science of knowing how to know". And parrot-like every writer since has repeated this original definition.

The science of knowing how to know what?

Apparently, that depends on whose universe is being used as a point of reference--your own, the other fellows', or the MEST universe.

There is a MEST universe, because we--far back on the Time Track--agreed there would be, and by now, it's pretty much the same for all of us, depending on our place on the Tone Scale.

We know the earth isn't solid--that a bar of iron is merely mocked-up atoms whirling about in mocked-up points of dimension. Yet, despite our "knowing how to know", we can be as badly bruised

by bumping into this bar of iron as the person who "knows" that "there ain't no space in a bar of iron--it's solid".

Our own universe is the certainty we have at any given moment, which is the result of training, environment, immediate stimuli, and the trillions of years of experience behind us. Much of that experience is occluded to us, yet the postulates and decisions we've made along the Track and apparently forgotten have much to do with what we think we should know.

Maybe the key to why Scientologists can't do all they should be able to do is hidden in the broadness of this definition of Scientology itself. If Scientology is actually KNOWING HOW TO KNOW, what would happen if any one of us ever should become a Scientologist?

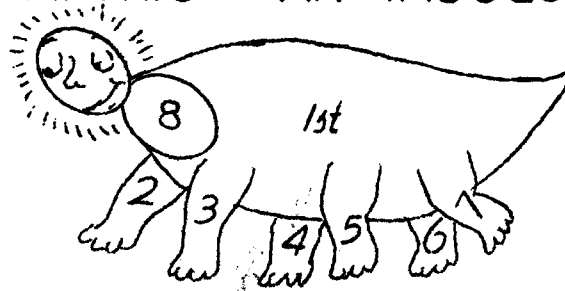
There probably are a thousand--more or less--adherents to Scientology in the world, yet no two of them can reach complete agreement on the subject of Scientology. Mr. Hubbard said--in lectures before the June Congress in Phoenix--that he was amazed at the stupidity of the Clinical Course students--yet he had carefully selected from applicants for the course some of the best auditors in Scientology. In other words, these auditors, with three to four years' training behind them, neither KNEW nor did they know HOW TO KNOW.

Most of us have experienced violent shifts in viewpoint over periods of time--sometimes years or maybe within days, or minutes. We are positive in our convictions. Today, if we remember or are told of our convictions of yesterday, we shrug it off, or invalidate it as a mirage.

When do you know? And what do you have to know to know that what you now know is what you should know? If John Jones KNOWS that "God is in His heaven and all's right with the world", and Henry Smith KNOWS that "God" is a mere mock-up we use to control, or to escape responsibility for our own actions, which one KNOWS? You'll

Sigmund Freud--although he had his own terminology--apparently gave most altitude to the Second Dynamic. Early in Dianetics, with much of the "field" stressing self-determinism as the end-goal, the First Dynamic dominated.

In the Doctorate Course, L. Ron Hubbard says the eight dynamics apply only to this universe. Outside this universe are the Dynamics of "aesthetics" and "ethics".

Reverting to Ron's revised theta-MEST theory (as given at the June Congress in Phoenix) that "MEST is a problem to be solved and theta is a solver of problems", then, apparently, the eight dynamics are MEST--and a thetan's self-imposed problems. Since the Eighth Dynamic is infinity, it also would

can be nothing outside the Eighth Dynamic, if the Eighth Dynamic is true infinity. In the accompanying sketch, we have theta as a Figure "8" operating in the MEST universe through the First Dynamic. Appended to the First Dynamic are the intermediate six: Sex, or Family; Group; Mankind; Life Forms; Material Universe; Thought Forms. None of these is important except where they concern the "problem".

You mocked up the problem--and the problem is MEST. Therefore, when you realize that the problem is yours and you have the solution, good-bye MEST. And good-bye, too, to most of the dynamics.

You are your own mystery. Any of you little enigmas want to try explaining yourselves?

find both "philosophies" practicing Scientology.

Any ten of us can be posted on a street corner where an accident will occur, yet no two will come away with identical versions of what happened during that brief interval of time. And the science of semantics is such that one who hadn't seen the accident wouldn't "see" the same picture being given him by any one who had been present. By the very act of telling and interpreting, a new version of what had "happened" would be injected into the test.

Scientology is the science of knowing HOW to know--not knowing how to KNOW. At this stage of its development--the Third Dynamic--we are tapping the fringes--finding out that within us is a power of knowingness that can't be measured or analyzed. However, with

this knowledge, comes the danger that we will accept for fact the aberrated mock-ups that come to the uncleared and partly cleared.

When we reach a state of absolute knowingness--where there is incontrovertible proof that what we then know is absolute and positive --we'll no longer be part of this universe.

Mr. Hubbard said in June--in revising his theta-MEST theory--that MEST is problem to be solved, and theta is a solver of problems. If we KNOW, we no longer have a problem. And if MEST is a problem, and we no longer have a problem, then we no longer have MEST.

MAYBE that's why we know all there is to know about money. But there must be something wrong with our theory somewhere, because money still is a problem to us.

As far as that goes, so is Scientology.

of things he cannot see or control. Scientology offers methods for altering that condition. It offers theory, procedure and drills for the application of attention to one's universe, in order to change it to something more acceptable.

If this were carried to the ultimate point, the individual would be absolutely clear, needing no universe at all, and particularly no real universe. Knowing would be with a capital K, and there would be nothing to know. Such a being would have no more use for a science of knowing than a ghost would have for a medical doctor. We are reasonably sure that none of the Scientology community has reached this pinnacle. Some, however, have unoccluded and taken responsibility for their universes to a degree which permits considerable rearrangement of the content and, through this, of the real world around them. This is an admirable effect: all by itself, it makes Scientology worth while for these people.

Others, instead of applying the methods of Scientology to their own universes, to improve them, have forsaken their own universes and have moved into a special universe created by L. Ron Hubbard as an experimental laboratory for the development of Scientology. Here, they worship the god O. T., play ceremonial tapes, and set out to conquer a "real" universe which is real only in their special laboratory universe.

Scientology contains methods for solving problems, but it will not solve these problems unless it is applied to them. It cannot be applied in a vacuum. It cannot be applied with any result in a false-front universe. Rote exercises, for example, are good, as rifle practice is good: they teach one to load, aim, and fire. But there will be nothing in the pot

Dick, who wrote the 50 Professional Course Booklets under the name of D. Folgere, the popular "Introduction to Scientology", and has been publicly rated by L. Ron Hubbard as one of the top auditors, proposed a new definition:

"SCIENTOLOGY: A study and theory of being which provides methods for the application of attention to one's own universe (one's mind) for the purpose of re-ordering and improving that universe."

Dick added that he wasn't too pleased with the new definition, but thought it better than the old.

Also, he wrote the accompanying article for The ABERREE. You might as well read it; it costs nothing extra, and you might get a good idea or two from it.

unless we bring the rifle to bear upon an edible target. "Knowing how to know--what?" is another way of saying, "Shooting at what?"

Mock-up and no-mock-up drills, by sheer volume and variety, bring the rifle to bear upon many targets, but the confirmed neurotic can always keep the prime target, his main activated delusion, out of range. Only when his goal to have that delusion changes will he allow the sights to swing over. Many of those who attend session after session of group processing are working on their courage to let the sights swing over. Eventually, some of them may make it. The drills help in this by cutting away minor problems and by educating the individual into a more

nopeful attitude toward his ability to change his mind.

Others use the sessions as a way of saying, "I am doing all that Ron has told me to do, and if I still look aberrated as h-ll to you, that is just because you are not attending the 16th clinical course!" These are the perennial students of Scientology who change their hats and their vocabularies with every meeting but seldom seem to change any of their problems.

The science of knowing how to know produces good works in the world where it is well applied to real or actual problems. A certain amount of courage and looking is required to isolate these problems so that Scientology may be applied to them. L. Ron Hubbard apparently has a plan for de-aberating the world, en masse, by the application of group drills. But the diabolical ability of homo sapiens to guard that structure of insanity called the normal mind seems to promise a difficult future for the plan. Ron constantly encourages his students to think that next week or next month the dream technique will arrive by which all this can be done. Indeed, he introduces each new thing as this dream technique, only to relegate it shortly to the classification: "Better than anything previous, but still not the ultimate".

We hope that Ron will develop the This-Is-It technique, but we are not counting on it. The present methods, sensibly applied, are what we count on. Each will solve a problem when it is applied to a problem, and it will solve nothing when it is applied to nothing.

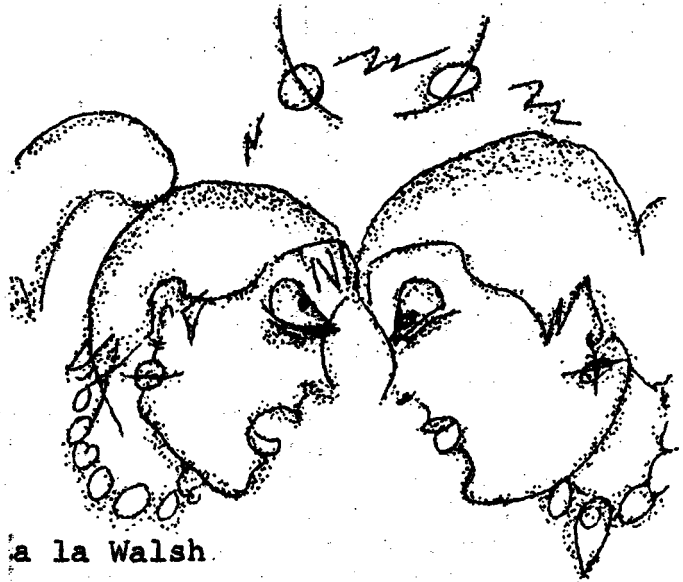

people who have been resisting change. Scientologists as a whole should have showed better results than they did.

Frank added that the classifications, "theta clear" or "Black V", have no meaning in ESP work; instead, a classification as to whether a person is resisting or accepting, compulsively or inhibitedly, would be useful.

A total of 44 persons made the test--running through 10 cards and naming each card. Two so-called "Blackest V's" made scores of 4.0.

Several refused to take the test, branding it as an "invalidation machine", Frank said. Some approached the machine with anger, others giggling.

"In the majority of cases, the machine was approached as a thing 'I must fight', or 'This is strange and it might hurt me', or 'I have secrets this machine will tell'," Frank said. "In only a few cases was the run made with the feeling of 'I don't care what happens'. In recollection, I would say that these were the people who made the highest score."

A writer friend of his borrowed the bound carbon copy of the first draft, and was so hilariously amused that the Rev. Hart took up Dianetics to run out his injuries. Instead, auditors pick-axed his Time Track, and discovered there had been a time when his was a name in the writing world to be reckoned with.

Dr. Hart, as we've said once or twice before, is a stubborn man. He's also persistent. And when he audited himself up to self-determinism, there was only one outcome possible: He'd publish the novel himself. And he did.

Harnessing his bride to a typewriter and a mimeograph, he waded in ink, stencils, and paper until SCRUB OAKS was no longer a dog-eared manuscript. There were 93,538--plus or minus--words, and with all the decorations and doodads of publishing, there were 336 pages to be fed through that balky duplicator. After printing, they had to be checked, folded, collated, and the sections assembled. But we won, Maw, and now his weary wife can sit down and admire her successful writer-husband because he's had a book published. Now,

Road Show Ends Tour of West; Soon to Go Abroad

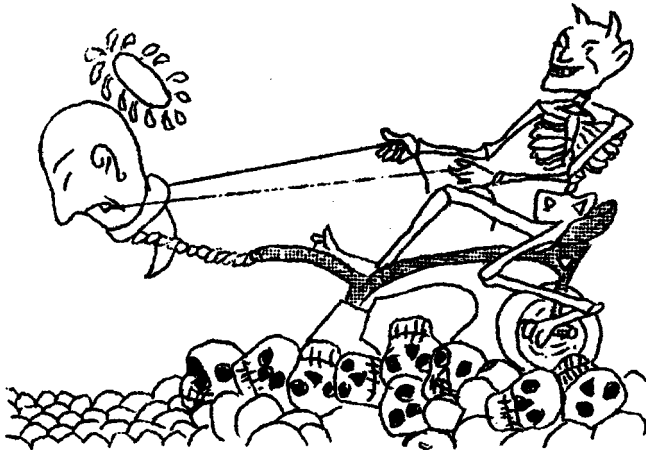
According to John Farrell, business manager for the group, not only are they stirring up interest among the general public but some Dianeticists and Scientologists are having their confidence and enthusiasm restored.

"The courts have repeatedly ruled that the protection of religious immunity does NOT apply to any minister who charges a regular fee for his services in helping individuals with their problems or cases!"

"The actual truth, unpalatable as it may be, is that the cloak of religious immunity cannot be stretched to apply to any commercial or professional type of functioning for which a definite hourly or session fee is quoted! The latest noteworthy example was the trial and conviction in New York this past March of Rev. Jessie Curl--reported in detail in Psych-ic Observer for May 25, 1954.

"At first glance, Christian Science practitioners might seem to be an exception to the rule, but they don't boast (as did Scientology Journal 31-G) of getting \$5000 from one case, nor do they admit to treating any bodily ailment, since they do not claim to

recognize the existence of ailments. Contrast 31-G's inference that psychosomatic ailments can be cleared up by Scientology at high hourly fees with less cost to the patient than medical treatment.

"The whole point is, if one is going to work in the spiritual field and benefit from 'religious freedom', then monetary rewards must be renounced, as well as any claim to being of aid in ailments or other terminology used in the field of medicine. But any auditor who wants to have a fee schedule that will permit him to eat regularly, and who holds out hope of helping those with psychosomatic or other ailments, will be in present time only if he realizes that the idea of religious protection is only a mock-up; while this mock-up may seem quite solid in his universe, it is definitely not supported by the real universe."--Mark L. Gallert, Los Angeles, Cal.

"How's for letting folks know The COMMUNICATOR is still at the old address, but the old Communicators, Chuck and Sadah, ain't? We done moved out to the country to experiment with group living in a huge old ranch house with five others and develop our rock-whomping, jewelry-making business (pre-clears aren't much harder to whomp than rocks, but the rocks are more fun!) "I love you, truly I do--or is it 'The Aberree' I love? Oh, dear, all this uncertainty is killing me.

"Dear devil, do continue your devilry; you've become one of my anchor points, and I get sick on the back porch and die by the yard when one of my anchor points is threatened or lost.

"Isn't L.R.H. & Scientology absolutely marvelous? I became a cleared theta clear in less than two weeks while undergoing my H.P.

A. course in London! And auditing is marvelous, too--the beautiful sadness of it all.

"Do you know, if I were a devil, I too would miss pages out, or if I had so devilish a mind as someone I wot of, I'd go so far as to say I missed them out when I hadn't. I might even thus get some poor fools to PAY for 'The Aberree' because they thought they would be missing some pages if they didn't! "There is surely much going on amongst Scientologists that would be suitable for gossip--there always has been among any such collection of people I have come across in the last three years. And there will continue to be as long as there are Scientologists drifting along in the lower tone bands. That such individuals have not been lifted up to less enturbulated levels is more a commentary on the use that Ron's techniques have been put than on anything else.

"The only flaw that can be found in Scientology, past and present, is that it is seldom used as directed. (In some circles it is seldom used.)

Ron said today that what he wants are not miracles, but true accounts of really using current techniques on 3 p.c.'s, whatever the results. He needs this data to improve SOP's so that the auditor in the field will have increased opportunity for success.

He said the last few lectures will be made into a package for all students. They are really good....

"The pulling power of the Aberree is great and incomparable and we are well on our way toward becoming wealthy, rich, famous, and wise."--Gordon Beckstead, Phoenix, Ariz. (Ed. Note: For this added "plug", Gordon, you should split 50-50 with us. Give us the "wealth and riches" and you keep the "fame and wisdom")

"Addressed about 400 doctors at Kansas City. After my talk, Dr. Fleet, the head figure of Concept Therapy, took me aside and disclosed that one of his major unpublished techniques is to set up a scene in your mind whereby you see yourself out in front of you OPERATING AS A THERAPIST AND NOT AS A PATIENT. That is, you create a scene in which you see both yourself and your patient; in this scene or mock-up you proceed to administer and try out techniques, while you sit back in the audience as it were and watch the whole procedure from this viewpoint. This tends almost at once to break you free from self-identification with the techniques; seems to produce a remarkable feeling of freedom and a high level of operating awareness. It seems to afford a mode of SCANNING THE TECHNIQUES THEMSELVES; one suddenly sees into them and through them; all sorts of possibilities flash into view. I saw at once a specific way to

apply that technique '30' to the problem of the patient's hand-held electropsychometric electrode;... it is from 50% to 100% effective in keeping the patient from consciously interfering with his sub-conscious mode of holding the electrode; hence extremely sharp and accurate registrations.

"Anyway, the evening after my talk, one of the doctors came up to my room for an assessment and in about 14 minutes we had pinpointed on the electropsychometer the precise primary psychic trauma that had been keeping him ill for 16 years and which had defied previous detection or relief by any means. Then I applied the idea just mentioned above: I created an image of myself and my doctor-patient as if they were out in front of me on a stage while I sat back apart and clear of the entire situation, and at once I seemed to become aware that in this case I could use the original 'let's go back over this again' idea of Ron's first book, but applied in combination with another idea based on some classified radar-electronic data I have: the application has the net effect of making it possible to run the complete 'let's go over all this again' sequence of the average trauma in about TWO SECONDS or 20 or 30 times a minute. In this procedure the treatment is always with specific psychophysical traumas pinpointed on the electropsychometer first. I dismissed the doctor after about an hour, went to bed, and thought nothing more of it.

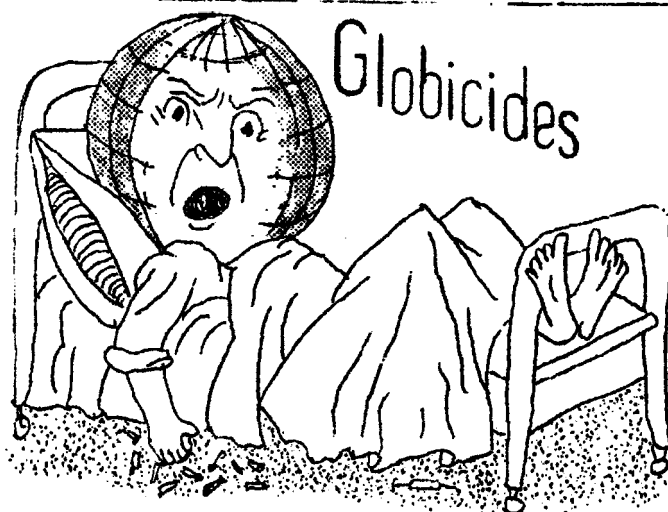

When Army Col. John H. Dilley outlined what he considered decent wear for women in the American zone of Germany --and made it a command--the wrath of a thousand outraged females descended on him. "I had no idea..." the Colonel said. Most Colonels don't.

And another anti-nudist, who hasn't the Army to back him up--the Arkansas hillbilly preacher--got his big hulk thrown out of a nudist convention when he tried to crash the gates in full array. Sputtering indignantly, he settled for photographing the license plates of cars "to show his waiting flock" the extent of nudism.

Nine conscientious objectors are to be fed food exposed to atomic radiation to see how harmful it might be to humans. The nine, according to the Fitzsimons Army Hospital at Denver, "volunteered".

Doctors, holding a congress in Brazil in their frantic efforts to find something for which they can blame cancer, heard a British biochemist point an accusing finger at chemicals manufacturers put in processed foods. Two suspected culprits: yellow used to color margarine and green used in canning peas.

Somebody, evidently, paved a street in Baton Rouge, La., but no one knows who. The city didn't; neither did the state--nor did the property owners. Anyone getting some reality on their MEST mock-ups?

When Denver police arrested 44 Lowry airmen for brawling near the

Capitol, they seized their weapons and turned the rowdies over to military police. Within 24 hours, some of the same gang were nabbed trying to crash a downtown movie.

Mexicans who swim across the Rio Grande to take jobs in Texas (wetbacks) are being shipped home by the Border Patrol--and charged for their "fare". Although they may be only a mile or so from home, the bus trip for which they are charged is by El Paso, 600 miles away.

Michigan, after keeping a woman in a mental hospital for 19 years, has released her, the court ruling she had been committed after an argument over a debt without sufficient evidence. The woman, who prepared her own habeas corpus, is now 61, and paid her fare to her family's home in New Orleans with money from greeting cards she made and sold while in custody.

Women who look like women must start wearing girdles as high as the arm pits--according to the latest decree from a Paris fashion dictator. Falsie manufacturers see deflation in their inflation business.

The governor of Oklahoma had to intervene when a disabled war veteran complained his wife and newborn child were being held by the state-supported University Hospital for a \$40 hospital bill.

An Oklahoma candidate for county commissioner refused to file a list of campaign expenses, as required by law, saying it was impossible to keep costs within limits, and he wasn't going to lie. He added that--as campaign manager for Governor Murray --more than \$250,000 was spent on his campaign, although the law limits such a campaign to \$3,000.

Ministers at Cushing, Okla., were given a special hour on two mornings a week so they could swim privately without having their ministerial dignity--and fat or bony knees--subjected to public scrutiny.

Volney Offers E-Meter For Unresponsive Indian

Claims by two Oklahoma state officials that Indians are so "stoic" they would not react to lie detector tests have been challenged by Volney Mathison, inventor of the Mathison electropsychometer.

Mathison, after reading the report in the July-August issue of The ABERREE that Dr. W. H. Donahue, director of Oklahoma Mental Health, and O. K. Bivens, State Crime Bureau director, "found" full-blooded Indians "showed absolutely no reaction" when tested on lie detector, promised to give them an E-400-A instrument "if they will send me one Indian who will not register on this instrument."

Mathison added that he wanted a live Indian, who could understand English--not the old wooden Indian that used to be standard cigar store equipment.

Mathison said there are several full blooded Indians in his employ, and before each is hired he is given an assessment. All register very sharply.

In FAITH, man expects--sooner or later--to have proof given him to confirm his faith. But if you KNOW, you would be quite upset to find out you were wrong. Daily, we can have our beliefs and faiths shaken and invalidated with merely a readjustment of our points of reference, but play tricks on WHAT a man KNOWS and you may have elected him a delegate to one of the state's torture chambers.

The Advanced Clinical Course opened in London the first week in September with an enrollment of 24 students, Jack Horner, D.Sc., reports. Dr. Horner, who is conducting the course, uses both tapes of L. Ron Hubbard and live lectures to present the newest data to "train auditors who know what they are doing and how they are doing it with certainty".

At the first London Congress given shortly after Dr. Horner's arrival, more than 125 were in attendance, and double this number is expected for the second Congress, Dr. Horner said.

Wichita Foundation Shut; Don Aims for New "Utopia"

The Dianetic Foundation of Wichita, Kas., has wriggled its last toe! Even the partitions in the building at 211 West Douglas, which cubicled offices, classrooms, and auditing rooms, are being torn out and the material will be used in the construction of homes.

Don G. Purcell, from whom L. Ron Hubbard split early in 1953--allegedly over the researches from which evolved Scientology--revealed to Ye Ed last week that he has offered Ron the return of all Dianetic books, records, mailing lists, and even "the copyrights over which Ron and The Foundation have been in dispute."

Hubbard's acceptance of the gesture, Purcell said, was immediate, and the former partners have been in daily communication ever since the offer was made.

This does not mean, Purcell said, that he is giving up research into means for the betterment of man, but merely that he is transferring his allegiance from Dianetics to Art Coulter M.D.'s "Synergetics". They are embarking on what they call "Project Nucleus", "the creation of optimum individuals who, in turn, will be the nucleus for an optimum community". Purcell said they hope to avoid the errors and pitfalls which have beset other utopias in the past by preparing the personnel in advance.

The new project, Purcell said, has no financial goal, and processing will be on a free rather than a fee basis. He added that the only qualifications for membership is that the applicant be human--regardless of creed, race, or color--and they "might even accept animals if they're smart enough to understand".

No decision has been made as to what will be done with the Foundation's publication, "Dianetics Today", now in suspension.

Uniform for Auditors—

CAP AND BELLS? OR WHITE COATS?



IT ISN'T the job of the auditor to entertain his preclear, L. Ron Hubbard often has stated--and yet, many auditors do not realize that unless they get the respect and attention of those they are trying to help, many pre-clears will go to sleep out of sheer ennui. This condition has even less therapeutic value than boil-off, unless the preclear is actually suffering from loss of sleep, and if the auditor is being paid, he might do better hiring himself out as a baby sitter and adding the singing of lullabies to his repertoire.

The following transcription of portions of a group auditing session given in Phoenix recently is reprinted by request. Although it may have little or no therapeutic value, none of the audience went to sleep:

AUDITOR (Facing 19 students instead of the five assigned to his class): Is all my class here tonight? or have I been duplicating? Will those not present please hold up their hands...All right, let's start with 10 minutes of nothing... Now, duplicate it...Duplicate it... Throw it away...Now, put two polished brass buttons in the two upper corners of the room, and sit there without thinking...Whatever they do, make them do it more. If they hold still, make them hold stiller...All right, now, put two brass buttons in the back corners of the room for someone else and don't let the one you put them up for think...Put up two buttons in the same corners--if it gets crowded, you can unmock the first buttons--and don't let the buttons think...Turn them red...tarnished green...Turn them into pre-Roosevelt gold coins with a picture of Eisenhower on them... Make them larger... Make them infinitely large...John, please pass the hat and pick up all those buttons...

We will now have some Creative Processing--1953 issue, LRH. Theta clears will please go on the ceiling and non-theta clears will put

their feet on the floor...I want you to create the most beautiful vacation spot you can imagine--the type of dream place where you could go and spend the rest of your life...If you like mountains, mock up an ocean; if you like horses, get a merry-go-round...When you get that all mapped out, I want you to go to an office over here on North Central and try to buy a ticket...Get into an argument with the head salesman, the cashier, and everyone all along the line when they tell you it costs \$800 for a ticket...Now, mock up the six weeks it takes you to get that ticket... (P-C in audience: "What's the hidden meaning?") ...No significance, at all. When you get that ticket, look at it and see that it says "You've got to walk"...Now, mock up all the courage it would take to walk to wherever you want to go...Duplicate it...Duplicate it...Put some more courage into it...

Has everyone present had enough Courage Processing this week?...O. K. Let's all walk back into the room now, and mock up all the courage it would take to meet yourself on the street... Let's take this more seriously, please... Get the courage it would take to see yourself ill...Get the courage it would take to see yourself dead... (P-C in audience: "In a coffin?")...If you wish, if that's your acceptance level. Any kind of handles you think necessary... Let's put out the courage it would take to look at your whole memory bank...(Much yawning in audience) ...Put all those yawns in the left wall and feel them back...Get the courage it would take to see yourself as a theta clear--a little button about three inches across and three feet back of your head...

Get the courage it would take to look into a dark bathroom window...(P-C in audience: "Did you say 'Dark'?")...Now, get the courage it would take to look into a lighted bathroom window with no one in it...Get the courage it would take to look into a lighted bathroom window and see someone looking out at you...Get the am-

What understanding would we have if we knew it?

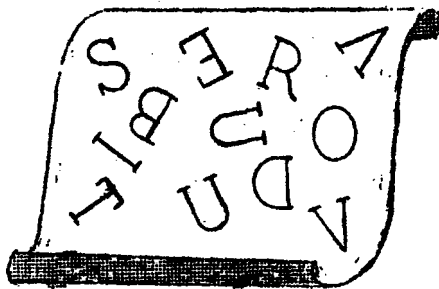
"An ancient Persian king once made a great effort to know this Word. He tried to discover it by having his sages boil down all the knowledge of the world.

"Yours truly has run into far too many Scientologists moaning about the lack of money and countless other things who, yet, had the complete solution of yours truly's problems in the palm of their hand. I hereby promise to have the utmost belief and give my fullest attention to the first millionaire Scientologist who claims he can solve my problems.

"My status in the field of Scientology is that known in criminal and political fields as a 'hanger on'. I have a special membership which has helped me a great deal. I am not very active as I refuse to evaluate the problems of others when I have still to uncover the solution to my problem which I am hiding from myself.

"The name of your publication matches right in with my acceptance level and I predict your magazine will go far in gaining many readers and a wide circulation..."--Roby W. Lalarche, Wakefield, R.I.

"As might be imagined, while selling Bibles, both Catholic and Protestant, I am having some interesting experiences. I have sold a couple of ministers, and have already been cheated by one and

side stepped by another. However, I have encountered beneficially many fine people, particularly among the evangelical and newer faiths.

"One thing that will amaze you among these 'evangelical' sects, including the Pentecostal Methodists, Assembly of God, Seventh Day Adventists, and Mormons, is the sense of very high tone among these people, especially evident among their children. The kids are happy, usually full of vim, but self-controlled and praiseworthy. They are healthy and darn handsome people, all of them. The ministers in these small groups may work at their carpentry or other trades during the week, and stay in the class of prosperous citizens who live in decent housing and eat well...

"Many of these people have the gift of healing. They can touch, and often cure, many maladies of long standing. I have been especially interested in their acquisition of these powers. In their words (I Corinthians 12), they would say Hubbard has the gift of Wisdom.

"One lady minister told me of her 'salvation'. While attending a service one night, while singing, she exteriorized and came to as an astral being on the desert. She then had a vision which I have found somewhat standard among these stories--either a stairway or a lighted road, many lighted beings, and special interest to her were some words of acceptance and cheer. Then she interiorized at the singing session, apparently a few minutes after exteriorizing. Since that event she has had the gift of healing, and speaks as beautifully as I have heard anyone.

"There are many lessons here for Scientologists. First, the exteriorization seems to provoke experiences depending somewhat upon the mood of the moment or period preceding the experience. The standard phenomena of projection of astral being are usually present.

"Second, the experience of ONE exteriorization seems to so fill the individual as to convert definitely to a different way of living, and often to endow them with physical healing power through the hands. Those I have met seem to have excellent health, and to be of HIGH tone.

"Third, on the basis of this ONE experience they are willing to give their lives to a goal of converting others to approach the same experience.

"Fourth, they accredit all experiences and powers to the Holy Ghost, or to Jesus, very sincerely, without the cantish rigmarole of many older denominations but

with a sense of living it today, being it now, working toward the immediate future. Perhaps this is the most remarkable thing about the whole group--they feel and talk of a LIVING presence, contact with a CURRENT POWER, as contrasted with the older denominations' historical versifying.

"I have wanted to get to know some of these people well enough to introduce some of them to Pelley's Soulcraft ideas and to ideas of Hubbard and Kitselman in their fields. For the time being, however, I have contented myself with listening, and questioning...

How to know how to feel good inside yourself. How to know how to be with other people with pleasure and profit to all concerned. How to know what you want out of THIS experience here-now in THIS universe, with due consideration for its MEST aspects and its theta aspects and its aesthetic aspects. How to know how to reach out across miles to give a lift to someone who needs it. How to know how to look to see the beauty and joyousness of a colt running for sheer pleasure of motion. How to know how to grow thriving plants that bring good crops. How to know how to be with a dog or a cat or a child or a person of any age or a bird so that they come to you and you meet them and participate in beingness with them. How to know the lovely feeling of true worship when you send up a 'Thank you, God!' How to know that man IS what the symbol 'good' implies to all of us. How to know how to go your ways and walk with simple acceptance of yourself and all you meet. How to know how to meet what seems to be disappointment or failure.

"But mostly, how to know how to feel good inside yourself, for feeling good there, all else feels good.

"All of these things, I realize, are here-now-in-from-and-with-this-body- and in-this-universe things. But, Alpha, that's what we're doing NOW, and that's where our concern and interests are focused. In the words of Ceuga, the philosopher, 'God imposes upon man no arbi-

traries in the creation of his usages but grants unto man the usages of his creations.' But Ceuga also comments that man imposes upon himself and other men arbitraries of the usages of his creations and that creation is for use and all that is has use or it would not be.

"It follows quite reasonable, it seems to me, that man, having created his universe and all that is in it can change and 'uncreate' that for which he no longer has use. Ceuga comments that the al-ways of anything is in the has-been of it, never in the now or the future of it and, sort of as an aside, remarks that there is no need for man to destroy that which he has created--when it no longer has a use it is not.

"Incidentally, Synergetics is the study of synergy--OFFICIAL definition." --Art Coulter, M.D., Worthington, Ohio.

"One item you may be able to help me out on--mostly for confirmation, if possible--and that is in these theta symbols. Particularly the awareness unit. I have on a couple occasions seen little spheres about a half inch in diameter, red, green and blue in color. Also have seen an item about five inches in diameter, like a dandelion bloom, pale blue in color. The latter item was at a Scientology session and I saw the item sink into the crown of a person's head. Apparently I was the only one who saw it at the time, due to my position in relation to the person. I believe it had one of the half-inch spheres at the core but am hazy as to this point. I wonder if Hubbard has given out any data on this item. It is inconceivable to me to think that I am the only one to have noticed such items. Have you seen such? If so, what are they and what is the difference in relationship between the two types of items?

"It seems to me that from the tone of endeavors in the field of Scientology

that there has been achieved a state of beingness wherein the subject has outgrown the exciting part, and is now tending to settle down to a MESTy, academic institution. It seems that the followers of the subject are just now beginning to realize that Scientology is not a wand-waving deal and those who have invested a lot of time and money on the field are beginning to flounder about in the attempt to reconcile the old problem of whether to make money or have fun. It is items like the Aberree that reflect still the idea of fun. Scientology as a church does not sound like fun, neither do these certifications and legalities. It is of course vital to the heavy spenders and no squawk on that point. However, it strikes me that when professional status is sufficiently developed and recognized in the country, it will then behoove the layman to lay off the subject or get arrested for practicing Scientology without a license. It could get to the point wherein owning an E-meter without a license or certificate of some kind could become illegal...

"In the early stages, having fun was stressed. High optimism was rampant that in a few years or so we would be telepathically developed, minds would function in high gear, all the desired results propounded by religion and philosophers and mystics would be laid bare for all to see. But now so much has developed in data, techniques, concept processes that there seems to be some confusion as to what this is all leading up to.

"It is obvious from subject matter read that the goal of creating a clear mind is slightly confused. Like these points on knowingness. If a person is not sure that what he knows is what he knows, irrespective of anyone else's knowingness, then he is just as bad off as if he had not dabbled in Scientology. Considering that MEST is a problem is in the same category. MEST is no problem to MEST. MEST is a problem to humans because they fight or reject aspects of it. Accept MEST strong enough and you run it out. It begins to become less solid. Reject it and it becomes more solid.

"The Scientologists tend to run into the same problem that mystics have run into for ages. The development of theta awareness brings about a realization of better states of beingness. The desire for the better states of beingness over the old MEST world as it is creates a strong dislike or rejection for MEST. This rejection, sometimes unnoticed but filed away somewhere in the mind, becomes the achilles heel in any mental endeavor. Rejection does not have to be direct. It can be indirect by the virtue of placing higher preference on the better states of being possible. The item of lower preference is a rejected item and becomes more and more solid, until the victim starts asking how do we KNOW--which point of view is the right one? Which is valid.

In answer to some of these learned colleagues of Scientology or other fields as to their problems of today, the suggestion is: Go back to the beginning. Go back and pick up the subject again and again. Like in Book ONE. The prime factor is to put the mind into a state wherein it can assimilate data and use it. The data of knowingness must be accurate and correct, regardless of other viewpoints, as long as the mind as a machine is CLEAR. KNOWINGNESS is the ability of the mind to accept data in proper perspective of the situation in which it is used or from which it is obtained. It is of absolutely no value to an individual to try and prove that what he knows is it; the absolute data, etc. It is the measure of data to be considered when it works. If it does not work, it is wrong. Any other proof is strictly authoritarian, theoretical, and hypothetical.

"Once an individual develops the art of knowing, it then is necessary to re-evaluate himself and determine what he wants out of life, what field of endeavor will best supply it, and then go out and study that field and learn the MESTy established academics that apply to it--and be a success...Business men have been doing it while you have been clearing your mind. Lots of fields are crowded and competitive. Even in Scientology it takes money to get started, local laws and ordinances to learn and avoid violating. The people who are best off are the ones who have studied less and had more fun and didn't sell the old homestead to finance a doctorate course."--J. R. Zubris, Dorchester, Mass.

"The Policy-- wonderful -- we've been saying that too...May the Merry Moody Aberree live long and happily."--Bob and Ann Bogart, Beaumont, Calif.

"Regarding your discussions on definitions in the last issue of 'The Aberree', may I say that I like the one on Page 3 of Issue 33G of Scientology Journal. It reads: 'Scientology, the science of spiritual and human affairs'. I also like 'Science of wisdom'. The quest for truth took the author of Scientology to the 'cradle' of knowledge and wisdom in his youth, and in recent years he has been examining the 'sacred lore' of the ancients (in such writing as rare translations of the Vedas), so there is every reason for referring to or defining Scientology as the 'Science of Wisdom'.

"One day soon we may be considering an extension of the name even, to convey the inclusion of knowledge and wisdom which are no longer mysteries which may be known only by blue bloods or those 'on the path'. This science rends the 'veils of mystery' and enables each individual to clear the way so he knows he is 'on the path'.

"And anent your discussion as to 'know-

ing how to know--what?' may I refer you to Tape #547C 427A given during the 7th Clinical Unit in Phoenix. In this lecture L. Ron spoke of 'extending the usual definition and adding the word answer'. Thus this definition would be: Scientology, the science of knowing how to know answers.

"Many thanks for 'The Aberree'. It is fun. Has anyone complimented you upon the clever drawings, as well as the clever articles? I think the whole arrangement is artistic and interesting."--Dr. Vivien Morris, Los Angeles, Calif.

"The definition of Scientology was one of the projects Ron assigned to me while I was in Phoenix and after batting my brains, my case, my soul, my body, and my theta against a brick wall for a week, I eventually came up with one which seems to be fairly satisfactory: 'Scientology is the observation and use of the knowledge, structures, and functions of humanity for the development and creation of man in his ultimate form'...I find it is a definition from which other simple though not comprehensive definitions can be derived."--Jack Horner, London, Eng.

"Another thing of interest here is an experiment which has been tried in a small way. Acting as ministers, staff members have been visiting hospitals and sanitariums to cheer people up. Their reception has been extremely good, and the results have been greatly worthwhile. Burke Belknap was one of the visitors. In ten minutes he exteriorized a nine-year-old girl who was in grave condition with blood poisoning, had her fix herself up, so that two days later she was discharged from the hospital. So now the training program has been slanted in that direction. People are being trained, and will be certified and commissioned as ministers. Then they will be assigned certain territory which they are supposed to cover in this manner and make regular reports to the HASI.

"By the proper use of this method, it is expected that auditors will build up private practices for themselves. These are supposed to be handled thru the HASI in some manner, so as to make sure of the quality of work being done, and otherwise to keep the organization informed as to developments. I don't know just what the mechanism will be here.

"Ron is going to give these auditors some personal training, in addition to the other work they are getting. The new professional training course has been the basis of this work up to now.

"That new course, by the way, seems to

be a really remarkable thing. I have heard the first several tapes, about six I think, and I like it very much. Also the HASI is at last and actually examining auditors. We had the first section of the examination last night...

"Your Xmas Aberree at hand and I find that it lives up to its name.

"I wish to comment with a historical (hysterical) note. In the very beginning we were told to eliminate or take out of the pc all engrams, and by this method some diseases were cured, mentalities improved, hair raised and new teeth grown. This taking the pc to a dry cleaning process and removing his engrams proved too long a process and Ron had to think up something else to keep folks guessing and keep the shekels rolling in for new procedures.

"At the early stage of dianetics I got the idea of taking the pc out of his engrams en masse instead of taking the engrams piecemeal out of the pc. I had several suggestions come to me with ideas for such procedure, but I insisted that the only way to take the pc out of the engrams was to run him in future time, this leaving the engrams by the wayside to wither from sheer neglect. This idea did not pan out well as the technique was not right.

"Ron...brought up the idea of exteriorization of the pc, stating that this was all that was necessary and that the pc would clear himself thus of anything he wanted to be cleared from. Bob Arentz in the latest Aberree hit the two nails on the head thus, 'Tis now possible to clear a person and leave all physical ailments intact and under the doctor's care'. This is an inspirational or perspirational gem, for that is just what is happening so far as I am able to judge. I have taken up this idea with Bill Bradner to see what he works out of it... There is a student for you and he will get there if anyone does.

"May I suggest for experimenters that they get the pc exteriorized, then suggest that he go one month, for instance in future time, and then suggest that en-

grams are thus left behind and disintegrated. This may not be the final technique, of course, but the idea I still think is good. Simply getting a pc exteriorized means nothing so far as his engrams are concerned. At present there seems to be a reluctance toward suggestion of any kind so far as pc activities are concerned; he is supposed to run engrams out as desired, but that does not occur and Arentz's observation still holds. When you tell a pc to become exteriorized and suggest to him how to do it, isn't that suggestion? Why stop suggestions at that point? Just because some folks might consider suggestions of any kind hypnosis?

"Ronald B. Howes is right back where he started from as a child in regard to religion. He is in someone's valence and has never gotten out of it. Naturally, when he becomes confused he runs back to childhood protective valences. He just hasn't gotten anywhere on the time track.

"Of all things, his return to his former religion is rather incongruous as that is the church that would not allow its members to take up dianetics in the first place.

"As to scientology being a religious movement--that is a scream--another of Ron's fiction stories. He is mixed up, too, for the theta is not the soul or God-self, it is simply the ego-I-self, a purely physical mechanism with nothing of the spiritual about it. Why make scientology a laughing stock? Or, is scientology on its way out? The surest way to wreck it is to hook it up with a religious trend which is not religious at all.

"To simplify it: There is just God and man. Religion is the study of the EXACT relationship between God and man, and it is not theta at all."--Dr. Addison O'Neill, Daytona Beach, Fla.

"Have just been reading your editorial and believe that Hubbard just might have the rub on you when he says that Scientology is a science of knowing how to know. 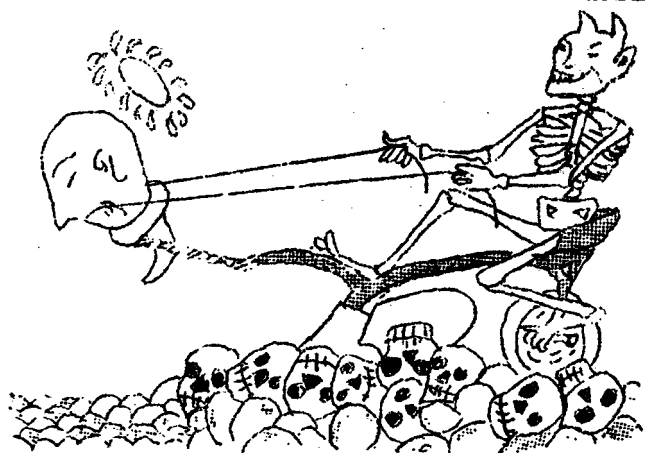

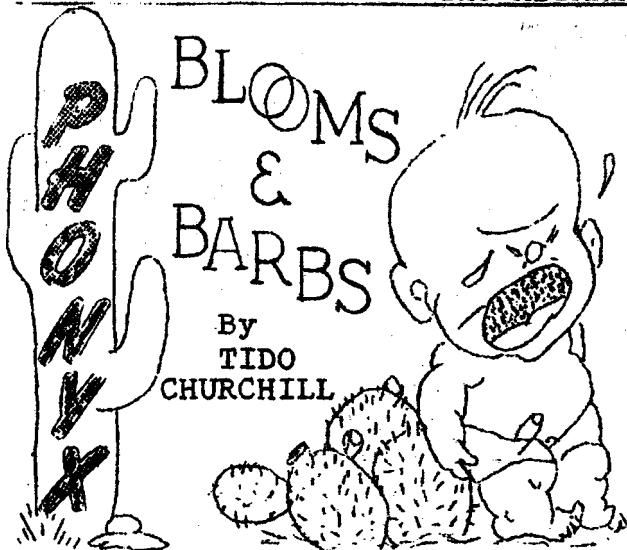
PLOWING Up the FIELD

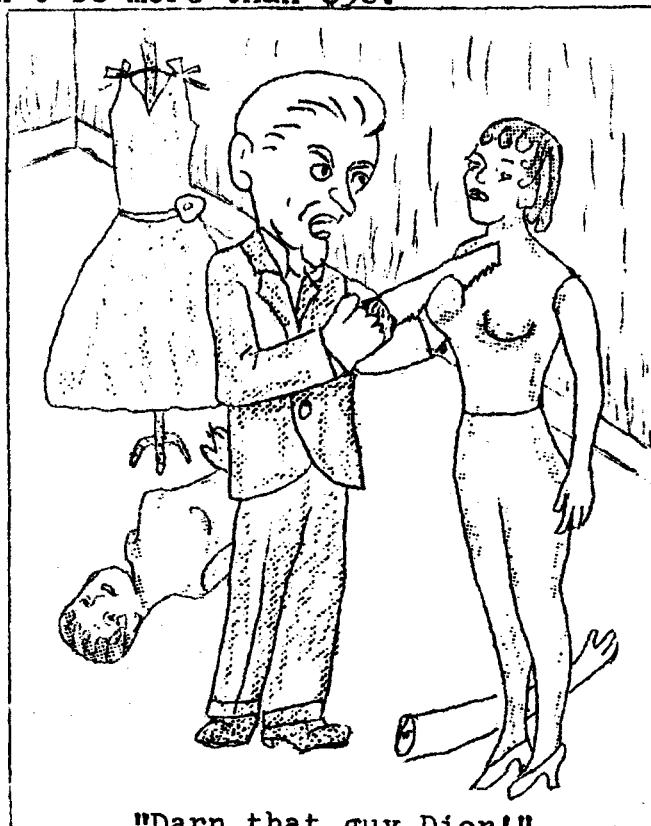

In an announcement that will come to few as startling or necessary, Art Coulter, M.D., of Worthington, Ohio, has announced his complete withdrawal from diabetics.

This follows within only a few months his resignation from the Dianetic Foundation in Wichita and the organizing of what he calls a "new science" under the tentative label of "Synergetics".

(Dr. Coulter's most recent definition of Synergetics: "You scratch my back and I'll scratch yours", which sounds similar to the type of therapy we've seen monkeys practicing in the zoo.)

Dr. Art's statement follows:

"In the interests of harmony and as a gesture of good will, among other reasons, I have decided to withdraw from dianetics.

1. "Please notify all concerned of the following:

"1. That Analytical Procedure should no longer be regarded as a 'dianetic' approach, but rather as a part of synergetics.

"2. That while there is no restriction on its free use by anyone, the use of Analytical Procedure by anyone charging a fee for processing is not authorized.

"3. That the path of synergetics and the synergetic movement will henceforth finally, completely, and irrevocably be away from dianetics and the dianetic movement."

John Noyga Takes Life with Fumes from Car

Sketchy reports reaching The ABERREE office tell of the death last month of John H. Neugebauer (John Noyga), who took his own life with carbon monoxide fumes. John's body was found in his parked car in Newland township, Penn., three days after his death. The coroner of Oxford, Penn., returned a verdict of suicide.

Neugebauer was 30 years old, and was one of the first auditors to be granted the degree of Doctor of Scientology. Following the December, 1952, training course in Philadelphia, the Phoenix office of the H.A.S. was closed and the organization moved to the Quaker City. Dr. Neugebauer was in charge of teaching the doctorate course at the Hubbard Foundation school in Camden, N. J., until after the September, 1953, Congress when L. Ron Hubbard returned to America, resumed control of the organization, and set up temporarily in Camden. After the December Congress in Phoenix, the H.A.S. was again moved to Arizona.

Private funeral services for Neugebauer were held in Kennett Square, Penn., and the body was cremated.

Neugebauer is survived by his widow, the former Helen O'Brien, whom he married in 1952.

Conference Attendance Is Small But Enthusiastic

Although only 50 persons showed up for the second Southeastern Dianetic Conference held August 21 and 22 in Atlanta, Ga., interest and enthusiasm made up for the lack of attendance, according to Ernest P. Pope, chairman, and Margorie Sapp, secretary.

Speakers at the conference, and their subjects, included: Paul Metcalf, "Practical Dianetics"; Bill Roth, "Applied Scientology"; Frank Silver, "Chemical Assists"; Alberta Elliott, "Point of View"; Dr. W.T. Bidwell, "Experience with People"; Harold Schroepel, "Being A Family Auditor", and John and Agnes Fitzpatrick led a panel on case histories. In addition, short tapes were played from Eph Howard, Stan Grady, Faith Rossiter, and Alpha Hart. A tape from A. E. Van Vogt arrived too late for the meeting.

A complete tape of the proceedings was made, and Pope reports these are being made into notes to be made available probably in late November.

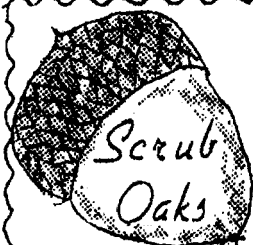

So, if there's something you don't like about The ABERREE, tell us. You see, we don't like it either, and that's why we didn't send you this issue. We didn't even print one this month.

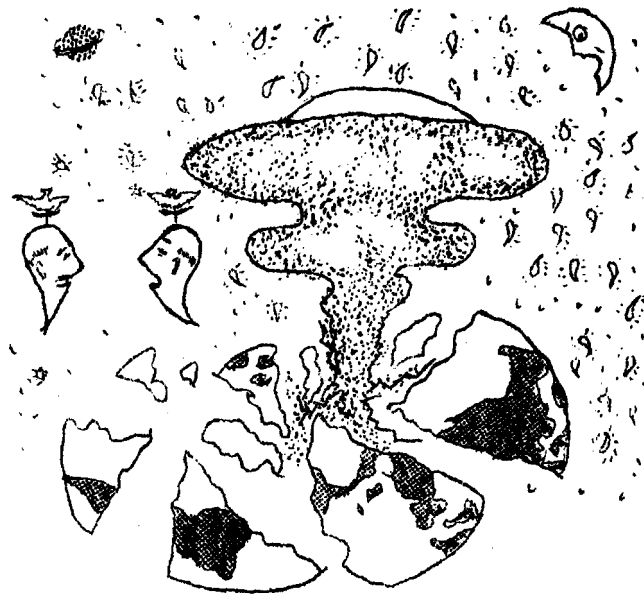

Then came the H-bomb, with the A-bomb merely providing the match to set off this suicidal demon. In recent Pacific tests, "freedom of the seas" had to be suspended over a 700-mile radius to "protect" any ships that might find their path in sequestered waters.

Now, two TIME magazine writers have published a book, entitled "The Hydrogen Bomb", which reveals for the first time (no pun intended) that the U. S. has perfected a "super H-Bomb" that can destroy an entire nation at one whoo-o-o-f--with the punch of nearly 45 million tons of TNT. Because of the square ratio at which an explosion is effective, this probably does NOT mean that the blast would level an entire country, unless it were directed at some tiny nation. However, it does show to what lengths a destruction-happy gang of licensed murderers will go, and

if they have a bomb that will destroy a nation, no doubt they already have at least done research on how to build a bomb that will wipe out a continent, or even an entire planet.

The book alleges that Russia went ahead of the U.S. in atomic research in 1953 because of political squabbles, and much of the blame is laid at the door of Dr. Philip Oppenheimer, who helped to father the A-bomb. This could be true, in which case no nation is safe, and the next war will be won with the first blast, and a world of radioactive desert, so often pictured by science fiction writers, will be a reality.

Then, too, there is the possibility that the charge is false, and merely a motivator for continued research into bigger and better death-dealing weapons.

The danger lies in the statement that the military forces did not dare test the super-weapon in the Pacific last spring because of the risk. This leaves us safe only as long as sane, death-fearing men control such tests. But how long will that be?

Recently, in West Germany, fire

fighting "tests" were made over stored jet fuel, and after the holocaust of stupidity, 25 burned and blackened bodies--victims of a "bad guess"--were just as dead as if they'd been slain in battle.

It may be only months, or maybe years, before the ultimate in global destruction comes about--not from war but because some grown-up child, told by Father he never could play with firecrackers, or matches, proves Father was wrong.

Auditing, Discussions to Stress Scientology

Hopes that the Midwest Dianetics and Scientology Conference, to be held in Enid October 30 and 31, will lay the groundwork for other get-togethers, was voiced by Norman Fritz of Wichita, chairman of the conference, this week.

Norman says a program has been arranged that will center around Scientology techniques and procedures, but will not be closed to a discussion of other therapies.

The convention will open Saturday, with registration at 1 p. m. in the East Lounge of the Hotel Youngblood, which is less than two blocks from The ABERKEE office. Earlier arrivals will spend Saturday morning in self-arranged "bull sessions".

Lectures and group auditing, either by selected leaders or by tapes, have been arranged for Saturday afternoon and evening, and following the noon luncheon Sunday. Tapes and tape recorders will be available for those wishing to use them Sunday morning. Also, a volunteer auditing system will be set up.

Much of the "live" program will be patterned after the one given so successfully several weeks ago by the Scientology Road Show when it appeared in Wichita. Tentative speakers for this presentation include: Doyle Longhurst, John Burch, Nelda Woodring, Genevieve Crist, and Norman Fritz.

Charge for the delegates, Fritz said, will be \$2.25 per person, which includes Sunday's noon luncheon at the hotel. For those unable to attend the luncheon, the assessment will be only \$1 per person to cover convention costs.

A large delegation from Wichita, and several from other Kansas and Oklahoma points, have announced plans to attend. Invitations have been extended several prominent auditors, as well as members of the H.A.S.I. staff in Phoenix.

Although advance registration is not required, it is urged that those knowing they will attend, or who wish further information, write Agnes Hart, 207 North Washington, Enid. Agnes is corresponding secretary for the convention.

Doctor Sues 'The Ghost' for 3/40 Million Dollars

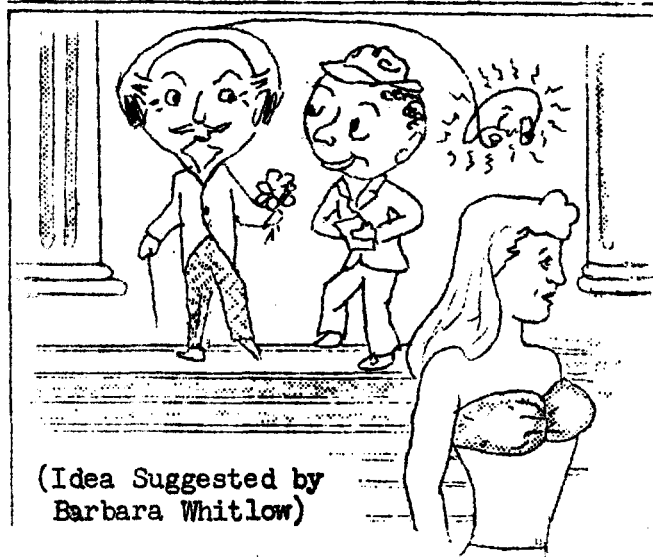
Several months ago, Dr. Clem Johnson, who has a unique way of expressing himself in "The Ghost of Scientology" about persons with whom he disagrees, took to task a certain "Dr. Vick's Vapor-Rub", whom he accused of "trying to seduce every lady preclear that he got for treatment."

There was much conjecture as to whom was meant by this unnamed "Dr. Vapor-Rub".

On Sept. 21, Dr. P. D. Napier of Orlando, Fla., a chiropractor and fellow graduate of Johnson's from the Fourth Clinical Unit, filed a libel suit in a Florida court, claiming it was he to whom The GHOST referred as "Dr. Vick's Vapor-Rub", and asked \$75,000 damages to his reputation. Much of The GHOST's article was quoted in Florida daily newspapers.

We don't know how much damage a story in The GHOST can do--we weren't hurt by an earlier GHOST report that we'd been driven from Phoenix in a police clean-up--but we can see how much more damaging might be The GHOST's story in newspapers which number readers by the thousands instead of a few hundred.

was: granting of beingness was being given to the past, and it began to materialize automatically.

When we talk of validation, we're not talking about running pleasure moments. That was running a pattern of flows.

Granting of beingness is having a machine run without wires or dynamos to it.

The universe is designed to stop communication; only cosmic rays come through MEST barriers, and they come through everything at a tremendous rate. Only special shields can stop them.

The only way everything can communicate with you is when you're dead. The thetan gets the idea it is necessary for communication to pass from him in order for him to feel it.

Granting aliveness to something is essentially good; not granting aliveness, and setting up resisting screens, causes it to materialize and jam the machine.

One climbs out of the hole by changing his frame of mind to where he doesn't resist an object; even ignores it. This can be done by Acceptance Level Processing--find out the thing he can accept, and run it.

Level One is what everybody thinks you want, and Level Two is what we want--what our grandfathers laid down solid screens against.

An acceptable movie to the public mind would make your hair stand on end.

Refusing life to something necessitates putting up a sheet of life to do the resisting. You give a thing energy by saying there must be no (whatever that thing is.)

A process does exist that can wipe out the ills of man. This isn't Validation Processing. We treat present time and future actualities as it is desired by the

individual, with minimal validation of symbols and abstracts.

All we're interested in is granting aliveness to actual things.

Ask: "Give me three places where the condition is not." Then ask: "What's there?" Tell them: "Find a place where you can be really sure."

Work with him until he tells you that things "there" have no significance. To hell with significances.

The preclear who can't exteriorize is usually under duress of some physical pain that is being held in abeyance by something he's not sure of. He's resisting, and therefore has collapsed his lines on it.

This process must be well audited--not with any significance or association. Until you take these out, he'll continue to resist. If you can get him to neglect his body, he'll exteriorize. But he won't as long as he fights the body, or keeps asking for the significance of blackness.

If there are scorpions or beetles "there", so what? How can they hurt a thetan?

Tell him to find three places in the body that hasn't anything wrong: Be sure he finds places in the body that are all right--NOT places in the body where the condition doesn't exist.

The thetan, when he gets dim on perception, is busy guarding the body against what's going to be wrong or what has been wrong.

Somatics will show up, but don't get unkind about it. Just find another place that's all right.

By finding these places, you're letting them be alive.

Sometimes somatics will get unbearable, but you just continue the process.

Have the preclear find three things INSIDE the body and three things OUTSIDE the body--alternately--that are all right (repeat

three or four times), until the body is alive enough to permit exteriorization of the preclear.

Somatics are over-tight communication lines. If you start to identify these as past communication lines, you're done. The only thing you can validate is present time and future form.

When you get the body more alive, you just neglect the entire past of the preclear at one fell swoop.

This is a complete break with all past therapies; it's why they were relatively workable instead of completely workable. You don't validate any of the past.

Once you barricade happiness to get unhappiness, you're going to get a flow--but they'll get less and less.

As we start this process, we begin to get him to neglect his body.

After having him find things right inside the body and outside for awhile, start having him find things right with each of the dynamics--with certainty. For example: "Give me some things right with cats (or other animals); some things right with the universe; some things you are absolutely certain are right with God." Get all the synonyms for "right" you can find to use in running these dynamics.

The more he ransacks the past, the slower you're going to pull him out of his past.

All exteriorization processes are present time processes. A cripple in bed can find something right with his body: he can move his eyeballs from right to left, or he can breathe, etc.

Those who predict dire things are going to happen, and if you argue against them, you are giving life to things they fear. When you mock up a screen against things you don't want, you mock up the things that go in front of it.

The curse in this life is that one only tries to give goodness. The horrible thing is that if you go down the street trying to deny a filthy beggar life by setting up screens, you actually give him life. It's impossible for you to give death--a thetan cannot kill

another thetan--and the thetan feels this is a terrible failure for him. He can destroy a form, but that's as far as he can go.

A fellow trying to conquer his enemies actually gives them life. The best you can do is to let your enemies go on being enemies. It'd be kinder to blow their brains out.

Why do people cling to life when they seem in such bad shape that it's hardly worth it? Because there's a thetan back there running the mock-up.

Use this process in groups or individually.

There are pitfalls--and this can't be used by just anyone. THE DANGER IS TO GIVE THEM SIGNIFICANCE. Like telegrams are significant. They frighten you because they're similar to one you received once that had bad news, etc.

That's what's wrong with the preclear. He has to guard a body because a minnie ball or tomahawk may land in his skull. He's guarding from the past. Have him point to places and have him say: "I'm there." Soon the lie will show up. Have him start pretending to discover himself in various places, and saying, "I'm there".

Also, have him point to places and find outrageous things wrong with them--find things wrong that aren't wrong. Pile it on thick.

DEMONSTRATION--Find 3 things right with your automatic machines ...find three things right in your body...Find three things right in the environment...In the body...In the environment...In the body...Find three things that you wouldn't change in the body...Find 3 things in the environment you could have without bad consequences...Find 3 things a body could have without bad consequences...Find 3 things right about the building you're in...Find 3 things others could give you... Three things you could give others.... Find 3 things you could survive... Three pleasant things you'd like to know...

The only thing that can live is that which you give attention to, so if you're always looking for things that are wrong, that's all you're giving beingness to.

Thank you for your letter to The ABERREE, offering it a chance to become a Bachelor of Dianetics, or even a PhD, if it will merely cough up \$250 or \$500 and take the Dianetics training for a month or two in Phoenix.

And, in keeping with the latest H. A. S. I. directive, we even contributed a couple sheets of blank paper on which to answer.

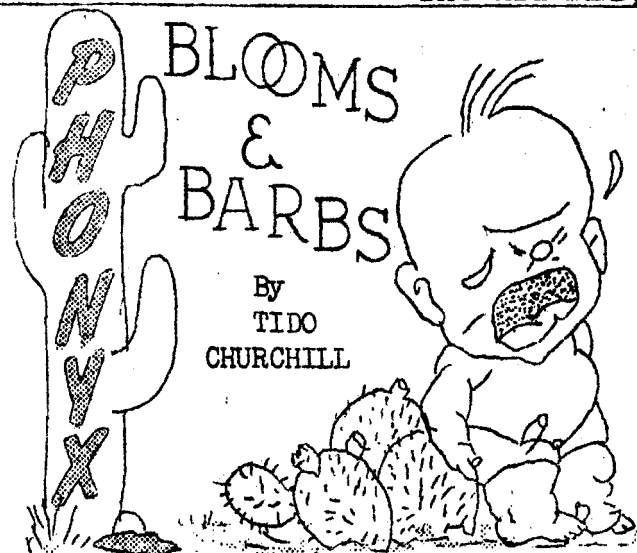
We've heard nothing more. We still don't know what it's all about. We wrote Volney, who gave us a statement, but we

Here's Volney's contribution:

"The invention and manufacture of Mathison Electropsychometers is and always has been completely separate and not related in any way to the activities of Mr. L. Ron Hubbard, the various mutually published publicity items or endorsements being concerned with sales promotion, and were for no other purpose.

"Mr. Hubbard did not ever at any time suggest to me that I should invent or how to invent the Mathison Electropsychometer, further than to recommend the use of tin-can electrodes instead of resilient sponges. (We no longer use either one.) A true and correct statement of the matter appears in Mr. Hubbard's own book, ELECTROPSYCHOMETRIC AUDITING, Pages 16 and 17."



PHONYX, Ariz., Oct. 7—Auditing on a "money-back guarantee" was outlined as a possibility to a group of assembled auditors tonight by L. Ron Hubbard as part of a series of lectures he's making on "How to Act Like a Minister".

The guarantee, he said, would become effective if—after a 20-hour intensive—the preclear's somatic or problem is not alleviated. Although he did not specifically, in so many words, refer to a \$500 fee for said intensive being refunded, the inference seemed plain. This would be specified in a written contract, with the preclear's problem (which he referred to as a somatic) being specifically described. The agreement would be that if the problem-somatic is not alleviated in the course of a 20-hour intensive, (or 25 hours on a rough case that complains) and does not stay alleviated for one year, the money is refunded.

Indeed, they will insist on refunding it. Under no circumstances will the pre-clear be permitted to wheedle an auditor into an additional 15 hours or so, even though that extra time might resolve the case. About eight cases out of 100 will be "refund cases", and this will demonstrate that this is a bona fide deal.

Ron then went over, in exhaustive detail, the procedure to be used on these \$500 intensives, to be given under the auspices (ostensibly) of the Church of Scientology of Phoenix.

The procedure: Two-way communication: get the p-c to describe his problem. If there is no communication lag, exteriorize him and do a routine Route I, plus having him fix up any somatics. If there is a communication lag, do Route II, 15 hours of Opening Procedure 8-C and five hours of Opening Procedure by Duplication—that's all! If he is not over his somatic, you reluctantly do four or five hours of Problems, a new version. It goes like this: How many problems can you be to you? Continue until he can invent a multitude of problems. This resolves the "scarcity of problems", and lets the pre-clear let go of his cherished backache.

Once, briefly, Ron said all cases will yield to Standard Procedure except neurotics and psychotics. I gather that the screening will be careful.

The week before, when Ron addressed the group, he spoke of a guarantee to be backed up by a \$5,000 insurance policy to be taken out by pre-clears at the beginning of the first session—if they don't get results, or if the results don't last, they collect on the \$5,000 policy. Ron said the insurance "deal" may be "about three months in arranging".

Ron told the assembled auditors that group processing was proving valueless—both from the standpoint of help to the audience and in revenue. Those helped weren't bad off to begin with, he said, and when these get past whatever may be bothering them at the moment, they go on their way—and that's that. Future attention will be directed toward individual processing, although some group processing will continue at the Church on East Roosevelt. However, only two sessions will be free, and anyone wanting more processing will be expected to contrib-

ute \$3.50 for membership in the Church.

During the talk, Ron also revealed that the portion of Operation Phoenix which originally called for continuous mailings to a select list was being abandoned, since the response from The GOLDEN DAWN had given him the information he wanted. Instead, auditors will be specifically trained in new classes under the Church of Scientology of Phoenix, headed by Bob Sutton, and when they can pass an examination for a temporary HCA and ministerial status, will be assigned to "a beat" for door-to-door canvassing, urging people to contact the HASI. These will be assigned an auditor, a processing schedule set up, and quarters arranged. A total of 38% of the processing fees will go to the HASI, and the remainder to the auditor.

Ron suggested a ratio of two hours' door-to-door canvassing and three hours' processing for each auditor in the "auditing pool", and an average fee of \$12.50 per hour was suggested as an acceptable standard.

Attendance at the Church of Scientology group auditing services has dropped off somewhat the last two week-ends, with three new visitors last Sunday and three the Saturday-Sunday previous. Sutton, however, at the last session instituted a new type of process, which probably will be rewarded by an attendance increase.

A recent change in the H.A.S.I. set-up puts Dale Kathary as recording technician and Jim Pinkham in a new office at 507 North Third Street as director for the Hubbard Dianetic Research Foundation. His four or more rooms are stacked to the ceiling with Dianetic literature, plus several thousand case histories. Jim is enthused about his new mock-up, and has been trying to catch up on an accumulated pile of requests for books or information on training.

Bob Sutton is now Reverend of the

Church of Scientology of Phoenix and director of training and certifying minister of the Church. John Galusha is dean of Hubbard Professional School and director of HCA training for the H.A.S.I.

The Eighth Clinical Course, which started October 4, has in attendance: Laurie Conway, Roman Mazurek, "Chubby" Crank, Gene Hobbel, Henry Maurer, and Russell Goodwin, who is a repeat from the Seventh Unit. Only debt-free graduates are now allowed to sit in.

The Phoenix Group, at its last meeting, decided on a series of lectures to review Dianetics. Paul Lyon will initiate the series.

The latest and hottest rumor is that a certain author and editor is, by action of C.E.C.S., about to have his green eyeshade wrenched because of Category 1 7/8 plus the first three words of Category 5! (See box at bottom of Page 8.)

The Big Trouble with Dianetics— NOBODY EVER TRIED IT

DURING the last four and a half years, I've heard a lot of "bull" about what is wrong with Dianetics--and lately, Scientology. Some, from people who should have known better.

But the main item has been missed completely. The big trouble with Dianetics is that nobody ever tried it!

It's true that there may have been a half-dozen conscientious auditors who tried to get Hubbard's real data from the first book, but most of them used "The Modern Science of Mental Health" as a springboard to dramatize their own engrams and sympathy excitors, or to prove some crackpot theory they already had.

It was a jolt in 1950 to see a graduate of the first Elizabeth Foundation school practicing a type of auditing that "The Book" warned against time and again--and from correspondence with other graduates, it appeared that the technique was being taught. This also was true with other so-called schools: California, Wichita, etc., as well as the groups.

All programs were aimed at ignoring the most important tenets of Hubbard's first book and substituting every kind of screwball substitute--from E-Therapy and self-hypnosis to the nonsense scattered from centers of idiocy in Colorado, Alabama, Florida, Washington, and elsewhere. Seeing supposedly long-term, fast friends of Ron's turn to the enemy for money, and later come back hypocritically contrite has only intensified my dislike for people who ignore data, and then blame Ron for the miserable failures attendant upon their efforts.

If the first book was ignored, still less attention was given to what may yet prove to be THE classic work: "Advanced Procedures and Axioms". Even Hubbard has re-

jected both of these works by implication, which might serve to validate F. Scott Fitzgerald's statement that writing and works of art transcend their creators' own understanding of them.

"Advanced Procedures" brought clear light and understanding to mankind's greatest mystery and suggested a means of solving that mystery. But it was used as a springboard to dramatize what was called "the service facsimile chain", and instead of following Ron's basic advice to always use light techniques on low-toned

preclears, the heaviest stuff possible was run by screwballs looking for blueprints on how to make a bap gun instead of how to get a preclear out of an engram he was stuck in.

As a result, many calling themselves "Dianeticists" got only the results they should have expected, yet they used their own failures to "prove" Hubbard was wrong--that his techniques didn't work.

Now we have the recent "Auditor's Handbook and Intensive Procedure", which stands with the first two as a major work on mental--or, if you prefer it, spiritual therapy.

This book is a full package, as were the first two. This book, if followed carefully, will produce the miraculous betterments in health and mind that Ron always has extravagantly claimed for all of his techniques.

But it has the same pitfall as the other two--the same "bugger factor" that auditors en masse used to nullify the preceding books.

Ron ~~again~~ has taken it for granted that auditors will follow his instructions and audit according to the outlines of Dianetics and Scientology already given. He has assumed that the stuff will be used with a modicum of horse sense.

Well, let's hope so. But

WE'VE known Bob Arentz nearly 3 years, and in that time have discovered he can get "madder" at L. Ron Hubbard than any one we know. Also, he can express his anger most convincingly, as many of the H. A. S. staff will testify.

let's not forget a few things that Hubbard knows darn well and hasn't overlooked, even if they are not emblazoned in glaring neon letters at the head of every page.

Most important is Ron's continued admonition to use LIGHT techniques on low-toned preclears.

For example, Ron has repeatedly stated that psychotics are low-toned preclears, and has urged auditors to avoid running the psychotic carelessly, if at all. He has asked over and over, in the paraphrasing of the first book, for auditors to find someone with good reliable sonic, clear visio, true somatics, and NO CIRCUITRY AT WORK, and "clear" a few of them before tackling the most horrible mental and physical wreck in town. Even on a case in "good shape", he suggests lock running and secondary engrams to clear up present time before going for prenatal engrams.

Not the same thing? The h--- it's not!

We've changed names on it, and we've gotten some extended concepts of just what we are working with, but a conscientious auditor working with only the first book, and a clear-cut knowledge of the chapter on Emotion and the Life Force, will produce an operating thetan just as surely as anyone else by later means.

Here's the new Book--with two routes: one for lower-toned preclears, and one for high-toned preclears.

The stumbling block is at Step 4--"Exteriorize". If the preclear does, carry on with Route One.

You watch and see auditors taking every kind of low-toned preclear straight through on Route One techniques, completely ignoring the BASIC DATA, and plunging in to use every conniving trick in the book to get the poor cuss more involved in heavy facsimiles that he is already dramatizing and can't knock out!

What Ron means here is that you take a high-toned preclear, and if he can exteriorize, run Route One.

Such people constitute a mighty small minority in our population. The rest you run on Route Two, whether they exteriorize or not!

Hubbard already has said that the main characteristic of a psychotic is rejection of responsibility for a body. Many of them have been exteriorized from childhood. Some of them never have been "in", in the sense that other persons are. They've never had any desire to do anything but "escape reality", to use a dubious term from another field. These need ARC straight wire only.

What will happen--based on the histor-

ical records of dianetic auditing to date? Well, a few auditors will take it easy, use the new outline to help clear up those light locks and emotionally painful engrams that foul up the preclear's present time. These auditors, using Route Two, and working always with the knowledge that present time is the goal, and referring constantly to earlier data on which Ron expects them to work, will use light techniques and produce some pretty extravagant results with the new Auditor's Handbook, because it is terrific.

The rest will be back next year with the same old complaint: "It didn't work."

None of these will recall such pertinent data as "painful emotion (unresolved) is the glue that sticks engrams together." None will realize that in the case of a real "gone" preclear the same holds true--the preclear is "gone" to escape an unreduced charge of terror, anger, grief, or even apathy, or an emotionally painful incident, and that the light lock is on this end and not at the point of regret for the overt act, or a motivator.

A few know from past experience that any damn' fool can jam a low-toned preclear into somatics or facsimiles that cannot be run. And they also know that it takes a smart and clever operator on the very lightest lock technique to get a preclear to give up that most illusive quarry of all--the pro-survival ally, on whom all basic aberration hinges and swings and rotates. And that the ally is the ally of the thetan and not the GE (Genetic entity), and goes with the thetan exteriorizing, whether he's a borderline psychotic or a very high-toned individual indeed.

The least foolproof element of the new technique is that in the hands of the wrong auditor, on low-toned preclears (exteriorized, or interiorized), some of the stages will prove to have a tendency toward hypnosis.

Past history indicates that these are the elements that will be leaped upon with glee by the fraternity. They will be magnified, intensified, misapplied, and pinpointed as the very essence of the whole. They will be pounded into preclears willy-nilly by trickery, by "new methods", by counting, by snapping, monotonousizing, until the preclear is turning about 14,000 revolutions per minute.

It's no wonder the guy acts as silly as a psychiatrist at times and makes some of the statements he does. This sort of thing has been going on for more than four years, without a let-up.

A VISITOR SEES PHOENIX "IN ACTION"

PEORIA, Ill.—This is the report promised you on my trip to Phoenix:

We arrived in Phoenix Sunday morning, got a bit of sleep, and then went to the 4 P. M. services at the Church of Scientology, which occupies a modern store building at 403 East Roosevelt. The window is attractive, painted black with the symbol and name of the Church in gold. The interior is plain but attractive, and the chairs are modern, comfortable aluminum tubing plus plastic webbing.

When we walked in the services had already begun, but we were greeted and ushered to a seat by a smiling lady. There were about 25 people present, and the minister, Richard Steves, D.D., informed us that "the processing has begun", and continued with it. Dr. Steves has a quiet air of competence and certainty, and was neatly dressed—even a tie! He proceeded to give the group some competent processing, and they seemed to be enjoying it. Like many of the recent techniques of Scientology, the processing was simple enough that even a new beginner could do it, yet effective at bringing a person to present time.

After the processing, the kindly lady saw to it that our names and addresses were put on cards, and gave us a "May We See You Again?" sheet which explained:

"You have attended a Group Processing Session of the Church of Scientology. Processing consists of a series of drills having to do with attention. By freeing the attention you can then yourself be free. Scientology makes the able more able . . . At such simple sessions as these a majority of the congregation benefits in terms of better Knowingness. A few of these, even in a short while, come to know that they are not bodies, that they are themselves the soul. A few come to understand that this can be so. Some only feel better physically and mentally. About 12 percent of any new group such as the one you have just attended receive little or no benefit and these would require many more hours of Group Processing and even individual processing (by a trained minister) before they would know the truth. In our congregation we do not try to improve you by talking. By drills and exercises of the spirit, we let you

find out for yourself, without duress or compulsion . . . If you feel better, you may wish to attend other free sessions and bring your friends. The Church will be happy to have you."

No charges were made, no collection taken. For those who wished to contribute, there was a box on the table at the end of the room—but it was just there, no one mentioned it.

Two days after attending the Church, we each received a letter from John W. Galusha, D.D., which said in part, "The ministers of the Church are ready to assist you. Our doors are open to you. The people you have met are your friends . . . Scientology is as old as knowledge, as new as tomorrow . . . You are a spirit, you can be free, you can help others."

As the son of a Presbyterian minister, and as a former Presbyterian minister myself, I was impressed with the alertness and efficiency of this follow-up. I liked the attitude of the Church and the simplicity and honesty of its services. Here was no dead weight of holy ritual and symbology, but the distilled essentials of what many religions have been talking about for centuries. My impression was, "Here is a religion in action, going about the business of improving the world by improving the people in it in a simple and practical manner instead of sitting and contemplating the navel of the past with repetitious reaffirmation and ritual."

I understand that the Church of Scientology will soon acquire a "churchy church" building in Phoenix as the place for its meetings.

On Monday, along with our friends, Dr. and Mrs. Harry Wood, we visited the offices of HASI. We were welcomed by the receptionist and ushered into the office of b.b.b. (Busy Barbara Bryan), who took time from her many tasks to talk to us. As we talked to her and looked at the office in operation, we saw Ron Hubbard's principles as set forth in "How to Live Though an Executive" being put into action. There was excellent communication evident in that office, and I discovered later that this included frequent conferences with Ron. Mary Sue Hubbard was right in the office, working alongside

the others. Enthusiasm and certainty was evident. As Dr. Wood remarked, "With the spirit that group has, they can't fail." I agree.

Monday evening we attended another group processing session, this time at 816 North Third Street, the headquarters of the Freudian Foundation of America. Again we found a competent auditor, Burke Belknap, and some good processing along with a group of about 20 people. We heard that the Freudian communication line to the public has not worked out very well, that the Church communication line was proving more effective.

Monday night we also visited with Joe and Marilyn Wallace, Joan Neilsen, Bob Cantwell, and John Sanborn. Again we got an impression of a new enthusiasm and hopefulness concerning Scientology--and some of these folk have been around the science a long time, and have been thru the discouraging times and the times of high hopes which failed to come true.

Tuesday night we attended one of the group retraining sessions at 403A East Roosevelt. Here we found about 30 people from the Phoenix area present, many of them HDAs. This group is being trained to HCA level of performance by the HASI. As a person qualifies, he will be given an intensive booster course by Ron, his HCA degree, and his certificate as a minister. Then, an area of the city will be assigned to him, and he will perform the work of the Church in that area. This may involve many tasks, but the one which was mentioned at this meeting was that of visiting the ill in hospitals, talking with them, straight wiring them, using simple techniques to help them. This is already being done by the staff auditors of the HASI in Phoenix with excellent results, we heard.

Tuesday night we also visited Ross and Lynn Lamoreaux. We were disappointed to find Ross and Lynn out of the main stream of Scientology in Phoenix, with Ross going into a "Clinical Psychology" practice. However, I feel that it will not be long until they are back working in the field of Scientology again.

On Wednesday we visited Gordon Beckstead, and found him busy with his Tape Library, along with the assistance of a secretary and his wife. Again, I was amazed that Gordon knew so little of what was going on in Scientology in Phoenix, but he said he had withdrawn until Hubbard stabilized things and stopped making fantastic claims. Meanwhile, Gordon is self-processing, using the "practice of the presence of God" as his technique. As

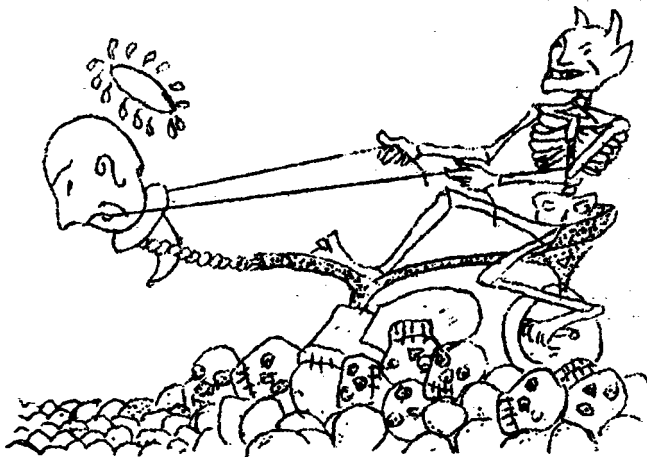
one who has indulged in this among other techniques, I reminded Gordon that first one must be CERTAIN that this is God whose presence one is practicing, and not merely some ancient mock-up! Secondly, I could not and cannot understand the attitude of some Phoenicians like Gordon who have benefitted from the use of the techniques of Dianetics and Scientology, but who now have failed to keep in communication with Hubbard and the offices of the HASI which are making every effort to make available the necessary processing and training so that Scientologists can get into action and effectively do something about the "state of mankind". Anyway, Gordon will apparently continue to supply data on tape so that the tape-worshippers of Dianetics and Scientology may continue to gather around their spinning prayer wheels and absorb data, data, and more data.

Bill and Rae Perrier were eating supper as we made our last stop before leaving Phoenix. We found them doing a good job as auditors, working particularly with a very tough psychotic case. Again, we found little knowledge of what went on in Phoenix right now in the field of Scientology. Bill informed us that out of curiosity he had inquired as to the status of Scientology with the Phoenix Chamber of Commerce and Better Business Bureau, and found that it had a high rating with these agencies--good news for those who recall what dismal reports the Better Business Bureau used to give to those who inquired about Dianetics.

In Los Angeles we stopped at Scientology Council and found Joanna and Hardin Walsh busy auditing. These folk are specializing on acceptance level communication of Scientology, and have just finished training a group of doctors and chiropractors. They jam the large home, which is their headquarters, with metaphysicians of every type, and are enthusiastic about their success in reaching this group of people. Here, again, I found the air of certainty and enthusiasm which I had seen in action at the HASI in Phoenix.

The time for data gathering seems to be over in the sections of Scientology at which I looked on this trip. Scientologists are in action.

What about Ron Hubbard? Very busy helping direct the activities of Scientology in action, rewriting and adding to the Auditor's Handbook for a new deluxe edition, and, I hear, writing a history of religion which should make most interesting reading.

It strikes me as good although maybe not so good as it is thought to be by everyone, that is, everyone who hail the newest as the best..."--A. J. S. McMillan, Bristol, England.

"John and Lillian (Bloomquist) reported that you were doing fine, and I guess the last issue of The ABERREE is proof of it. It meets my acceptance level even though one veteran auditor of my acquaintance stated that she 'had no time for scuttlebutt'. I like the stuff.

"If I can find anyone going that way to ride with I may try to get to your conference. It should be as interesting as the Atlanta one.

"Some comments on knowing--It may be faith that you can get to the end of the street without mishap, but it is possible to 'look' and see that (in the future) you did. It is possible to 'know' the future. Time is an arbitrary. The man who has only 'belief' about the future may well be stuck in present time.

Incidentally, people who have had one exteriorization by religious means are usually difficult to process. They feel they have the whole answer, when they have only part of it.

"The little spheres J.R. Zubris reports sound to me similar to the exteriorized 'thetans' we used to see around a faith healing meeting here in town. And his symbol 'like a dandelion bloom' like a group control center--exterior. He should try 'being a group' and see if the symbol

doesn't disappear or come under control. Note that the symbol is to be found in the cards of the Tarot. And some of us are telepaths. Not too good yet, but telepaths. Note that the recent issues of Astounding Science Fiction are slanted toward telepaths, and if there aren't a lot of them, John W. Campbell is going to go hungry.

"The dandelion bloom effect has shown up during Procedure 30 processing.

"The idea suggested by Dr. Addison O'Neill looks a little hot to me. I've probably processed as many people as anybody in the future. It is a favorite technique, and I use it to stabilize PC's, but the idea of trying to bypass the bank by this method looks a little rough. The roughest part of anybody's experience is usually in the future. Why do you think the past is so much easier to get at? I wonder if the Doctor hasn't spun in a couple by this technique. They did in California...

"When you got your people 'one month in the future', what were they 'in'? Some will be right in the middle of an atomic war if you do it that way"...--Harold Schroepel, Peoria, Ill

"Quick! Please enter my subscription for a year to The ABERREE before it goes up again. Already my avoidance technique has cost me the difference between \$1.68 and \$2."--Irene C. Brecht, Riverside, Cal.

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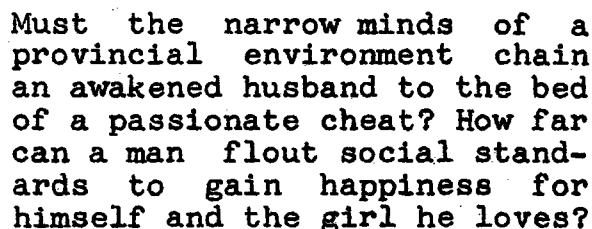

HURRICANES? Seaboard has been pounded by an unusual number of unorthodox hurricanes, taking a heavy toll of life and property. England has had one of the coldest summers in history. The Mississippi valley has felt tornado after tornado; and even Los Angeles has been so smog-ridden it's more than a mere radio joke. For once, no "authority" has had the temerity to blame all these weather malfasances on sun spots.

Recently, Drew Pearson, a columnist with little or no fear of Capital "brass", said evidence was growing that last spring's H-bomb tests, that dug holes where islands used to be, were responsible for these atmospheric upsets. He cited volcanic eruptions of the past that brought about similar manifestations.

If the H-bomb can do this, what of the super H-bomb?

When we bury our storm dead, or survey the homes that have been leveled by the "wrath of the elements", do we call this "an act of God?", or place the blame where it belongs--on ourselves? We pay the taxes that finance this mania of destruction. In the name of "security" (whatever that means), we impoverish our national treasury for the sake of a few big "booms" under full military show-

manship.

An atomic war wouldn't have to wipe out all living things in order to make of this a barren planet. A few H-bombs, creating a new and more wide-spread ice age, could be just as effective.

A THETAN? the bottom of the contract, it may startle you, in your belated research, to discover to what extent you are legally bound.

In religion, as well as scientology, adherents are enlisted because of fear--fear that something terrible will happen to them if they don't. They can go to hell, as one of the eternally damned, or be stuck in a series of bodies, as in the case of the Black V's. But in fine print (we have it from many "authorities") **MAN IS IMMORTAL.** In religion, this one-way "immortality" starts AFTER "The Resurrection", whatever that may be; in scientology, it is openly admitted that the thetan is, has been, and always will be.

Immortality, in our definition, means timelessness. If, to the thetan, there is no such thing as time, then there can be no past, no present and no future. Everything that ever has happened to you hasn't happened; in the same vein, everything that you fear will happen or de-

sire to have happen, already HAS happened. If there is no time, then one need not dread what can be only a product of time: namely, incidents. These are on a body level only, and have nothing to do with the immortality of man, the thetan.

Quoting from L. Ron Hubbard's Theta-MEST theory: "MEST is a problem, and theta is a solver of problems", then man's use of MEST--a body and its environment--can be only a part of the problem. At all times, the difficulties one gets into are no more than the product of the thetan's decision to add interest to his existence. He knows the solution, but if one knew in advance what the score was to be and every exciting play of a gridiron battle, how many college stadiums would be packed with howling mobs during the football season? His alleged "ignorance" (occlusion) about what is "happening" or is "going to happen", then, is in proportion to how well he is playing the game he mocked up for himself.

Why, then, all this drive to find out "what it's all about"? Is this a new game we're playing? or just part of the old game? And what would "happen" if we did find out? Wouldn't we merely mock up a new game and start the cycle all over again under the very same handicaps?

If the thetan is truly immortal, nothing's going to happen to him--in fact, nothing CAN happen to him--no matter whether he studies anthroponomy, scientology, or merely finds a way to contemplate a decaying navel for a couple hundred years.

Or, maybe, every once in awhile he has to be assured that he IS immortal--has to take a peek behind his own book of rules.

SECOND MIDWEST CONFERENCE IS SET

Delegates from 3 States at First Meeting in Enid

So successful was the first Midwest Dianetic-Scientology Conference in Enid October 30-31 that it was decided, during the closing moments, to hold another in January, either the week-end of the 15th and 16th, or the 22nd and 23rd. The same officers--Norman Fritz as chairman and Agnes Hart as secretary, will preside over the second meeting, which also will be held in Enid.

The January date was selected because it follows the Phoenix Congress to be held December 28 to 31, and it is hoped that a major part of the program can be devoted to a report on and demonstration of any new data or techniques L. Ron Hubbard may reveal at that time.

More than 20 attended the Enid Conference, held in the Hotel Youngblood. The weather was co-operative, and both days found blue skies and ideal light coat temperatures. Politicians, winding up their campaigns for office, provided the only jarring note as their sound trucks paraded past the hotel extolling virtues and promises. On the same floor of the hotel, Alcoholics Anonymous was holding a state convention, but there were only one or two incidents of confusion between the two groups.

The meeting started Saturday afternoon with Chairman Fritz welcoming the delegates and outlining the purposes of the Conference. He also straightwired the planning and development of

the Conference idea--from conception, through incubation, to birth as a reality.

The delegates sat around a long table, and the talks and discussions were recorded on tapes in true Dianetic-Scientology custom by Lee Lockhart.

After each person had introduced him- or herself, John W. Burch went into the history of Dianetics, and traced its development from "The Original Thesis" to "Scientology: 8-80". He mentioned briefly the various Foundations, and the advance in techniques from Engram Running in Book One through Effort and Postulate Processing until even the name of the science was changed from Dianetics to Scientology when Hubbard quit the Wichita organization and moved to Phoenix. Burch paid tribute to Don Purcell for the time and financial support he gave in keeping Dianetics alive at a time when its future seemed rather precarious. Purcell, he said, after returning to Hubbard all the controversial copyrights and Dianetic properties, has shifted his allegiance to Synergetics, an outgrowth of Analytical Procedure, and sponsored by Art Coulter, M. D.

Nelda Woodring spoke on "Communication", explaining that the term was broad enough to cover "any exchange between ourselves and our environment".

Genevieve Crist followed with an explanation of "Communication Lag", and its relationship to "the know-to-sex-scale". She placed the analytical mind in the upper brackets and the reactive mind in the lower brackets. The auditor, she says, acts as an analytical mind for the

low-toned preclear, who is able to use only his reactive mind. To wind up her talk, she acted as group auditor for more than an hour of processing with 8-C Opening Procedure and Opening Procedure by Duplication.

Following a two-hour dinner break, Alpha Hart discussed the publications of Hubbard and others from 1952 to present time. After his talk, the Conference divided into three groups. One, led by Harold Peck, held a discussion and demonstration of Analytical Procedure. Another group, led by Mrs. Woodring, was processed through use of the Group Auditor's Manual, and the third group became a "bull session" for the discussion of exteriorization and healing by persons who know nothing of Scientology.

Sunday's program started with a luncheon in the hotel, spiced by a program of songs and talks arranged by Miss Crist. In a report on group activities in each area, Burch outlined what the Wichita group was doing since the closing of the Foundation. Lee Lockhart said that of the more than 40 in Dianetics in the El Paso area three years ago, only he remained actively interested. He also talked of Concept Therapy, outlining its aims and gains. Jim Lear told of the tribulations in trying to maintain interest in his home town of Tulsa, or stir up interest at Oklahoma University, where he is now a student. Fred Hibbard reported that in the Dodge City area, it was almost impossible to find anyone interested in studying or being processed.

After a few minutes' adjournment for photography

while tables were cleared, Hart spoke of the sharp lines Hubbard has drawn between Dianetics and Scientology in the new publication, DIANETIC BULLETINS. Since Scientology is the study of an infinite being, Hart said, Scientology also must encompass Dianetics, as an infinite being is both the question and the answer; he can't be one-sided on any question because he is--at one and the same time--both sides. Tenets of a new organization he calls "The Infinites" was explained and "membership" cards offered free to all who needed evidence they were not outside infinity. Following this, Hart gave a group auditing session on "barriers".

The formal part of the Conference program ended with a "Sight Improvement" session by Arden Bergquist.

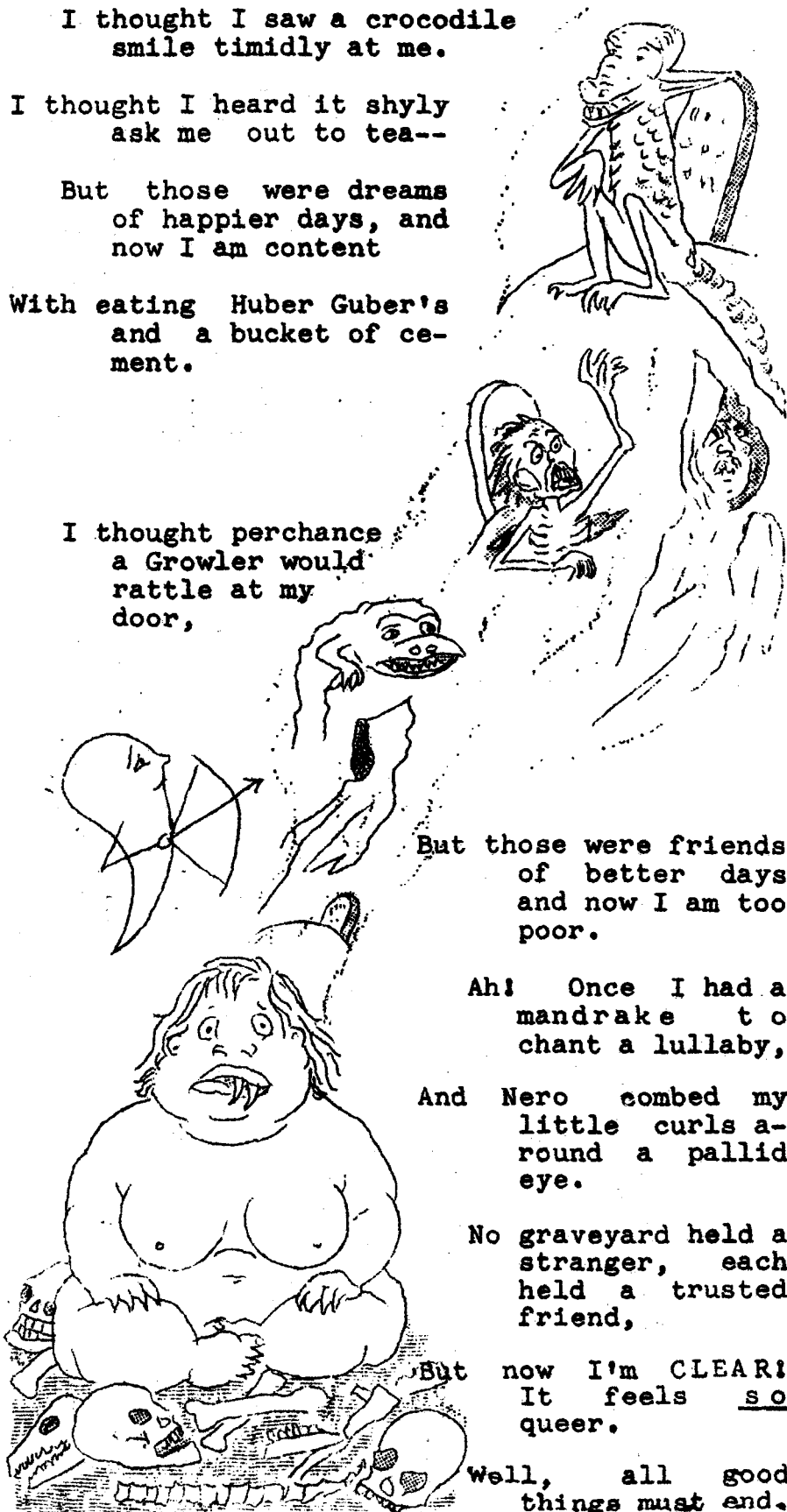

What Happens When an Earth Man Taps His Memory to Build Again the Machine with Which He Once Conquered Space? A Factual Report...

GALAXY T-8 PATROL BLOCKS DEATH RAY

FOR QUITE awhile, there have been garbled and conflicting reports about a radioactive explosion that allegedly occurred in my laboratories while I was experimenting with a "Facsimile One" machine. To put an end, once and for all, to these rumors and tales, I am herewith giving you the lowdown--a true, factual report on what actually took place.

Yes, there was an explosion. I can now, at last, calmly face this strange event as a consequence of recently having had the shocking effects thereof run out.

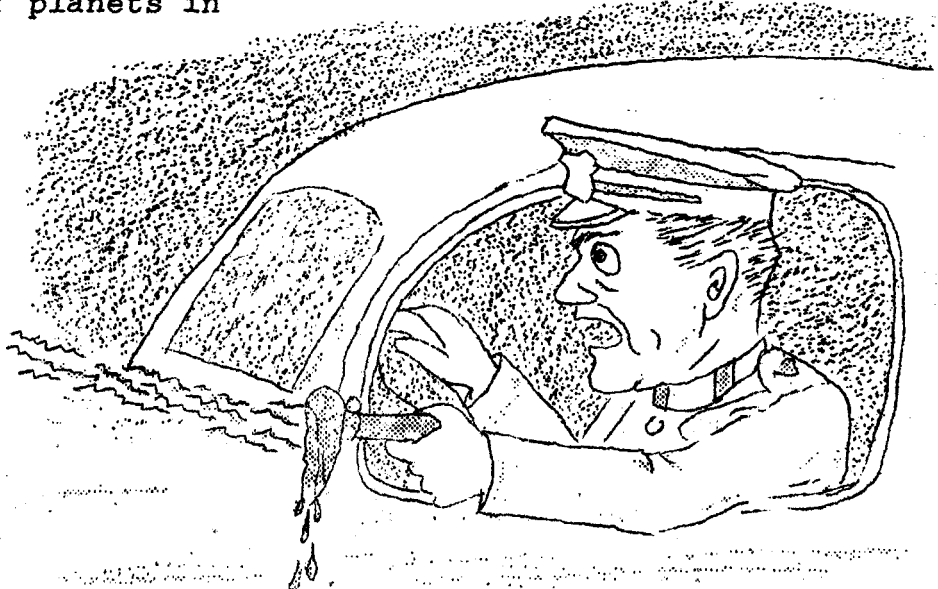
This adventure began in Phoenix during the June, 1952, Scientology conference. Ron audited me one afternoon, and through his remarkable methods of interrogation, caused me to disclose--theta-wise--both to him and to myself, that I am one of the principal inventors of a weapon allegedly styled as a "Facsimile One" machine, which I first developed in the T-8 Galaxy 42 trillion years ago, and which, as a member of the Eighth Invader Corps, I used 20 trillion, two and one-eighth years later to take over an entire system of planets in the Arcturus Area.

At the end of the above mentioned Phoenix conference, Alpha Hart, on Ron's instruction, gave me a \$250 check for "research". The actual purpose was to build a small model "Fac. One" machine operating in the manner which I had disclosed during processing; namely comprising the release of a jet of high-pressure incandescent mercury vapor from a negatively polarized tungsten-carbide nozzle toward and through a positively-charged nickel-steel tube, the nozzle

and the tybe being across the terminals of a pyranol condenser of extremely high voltage and capacity, so that the mercury-borne jet pulse, impelled by a power-potential blast of millions of microsecond kilowatts, would launch a lethal bolt through the positive tube, thereby generating a "killer ray". My data was that this ray, in striking a person, would cause a strange and deadly disintegration of certain brain cells, whereby the victim would eventually become inoperative because of myriads of fantastic delusionary images of all colors and dimensions dancing around constantly in his mind. (One of these cases can be detected easily on the electropsychometer.)

Although interested in making the experiment, I computed that the discharge of such a mercury jet might cause a dangerous "back splatter" of radioactivity. I advised Ron accordingly by letter.

"The description of the 'gun' is very intriguing and electronically enormously sound," Ron wrote. "May I actually suggest that we

I continued on with the experiment, but now I was greatly hampered, since one of my most highly skilled mechanics had inadvertently gotten hold of and read my original notes warning of the back-flash danger, and he was very reluctant to follow my further instructions. Also he stole and buried out in the yard a very expensive high-temperature trigger valve necessary to release the hot mercury jet. In an effort to use a makeshift valve, we suffered a premature mercury blast into the energized positive collector barrel. The results were simply and completely indescribable! My mechanic has never been the same man since.

As for myself, I was so charged that when I reached for a pair of pliers to turn off the mercury heater, a blinding arc from my hand disintegrated the handles of the tool, and for weeks, if I sat down anywhere, an arc would burst from my posterior into the nearest metal elements of the chair, with such a jolting effect that it would cause me to jump about a yard into the air.

Worse than all this, the night after the blast in the lab., at about 9:02 p.m., one of those so-called "flying saucer" interspatial patrol units landed in front of the lab. window, and the Commander, in green and gold uniform, and wearing the insignia of the carbottite ring with the plutonium center, stepped in and informed me that the accelerative effects of my abortive experiment were radiating all over space.

He said, "You know the penalty for disclosing this weapon on this planet at this time! Are you doing this by your own decision?"

I replied that I was.

"Impossible!" he interrupted. "YOU know better. Who is the CAUSE back of this?"

Then he spotted Ron's WHAT TO

AUDIT, thumbed through it, and really became grim.

"I see," he said. "Leave it to a ----- Arslycan to keep getting himself from one morass into another. It's intolerable, the way those Arslycans go around disclosing things all over the planets. SCIENTOLOGY WEARS A SABLE COAT



DIANETICS, at one time, was labeled "The Poor Man's Psychiatry". But Scientology seems to be taking on the valence of a sable coat.

Back in the days of Book One, "making a world sane and free from war" was very simple. And cheap. John and Bill, or Ted and Mary, could follow a printed formula, install a "canceller" as a safety valve, and from out of their pre-natal bank, the File Clerk would dutifully hand them all of the choice family secrets. It was a lot of fun--and worth the \$4 the book cost--to know that those shivers you got on cold wintry mornings weren't from the weather at all but from the ice man's exploring hands--a fact Mama had successfully buried all these many years.

There were courses, too, if you moved fast enough to find a Foundation, where you could get all the latest data and a gold-bordered certificate for \$500 down and a new \$500 course a year for the rest of your life. This course, however, was for those who wanted to be "professionals" and help others find what phrase made them bald, toothless, pigeon-toed, or shivery.

Comes 1954. The \$500 course is still available, but the ultra-ultra in six-week training costs now \$800, plus a few hundred extra to "bring your own case up to an acceptable level". For this "extra", the prospective student gets 20 to 25 hours of putting his finger on exact spots in diametrically opposed walls. This makes him worthy of spending the \$800 to learn how to make others put their fingers on exact spots in diametrically opposed walls.

What about Mama and the ice man? What if the E-meter (that's an ancient--mid-summer, 1954--gad-get American auditors mustn't use

any more but British auditors can buy from the London office of the HA\$I) needle drops 20 dials at the mention of cold fingers?

Fie on you! Come up to present time! Those were incidents that happened to a body--just a mock-up made by an immortal being (which is you, my son or daughter). To run an incident, validates it; go back to the left wall, put your finger on an exact spot, get its weight, temperature, color.

L. Ron Hubbard--in Book One, in science fiction magazines, and in his lectures and books--said Dianetics was for the masses to make a world safe from wars and ruin. When the Hubbard Association of Scientologists was organized in Phoenix in 1952, membership could be obtained merely by subscribing to the "Journal of Scientology" for \$2.50 a year.

What has happened since is a merchandising marvel. Not only has the JOURNAL been able to double in price, but it is one of the few advertising pamphlets known that can get away with making the customer subscribe. Membership in the HA\$I, a "non-profit" organization, has gone up to \$25 a year, and according to a recent ukase, membership is mandatory if one is to practice or use Scientology in any form. However, we have it on good authority, that in the case of graduate auditors who fail to keep up their memberships, a system of "categorizing" will be invoked, which has no relation whatever to "brain washing". You still can remember what you learned, if you don't use it.

Groups, which once were hailed as the mainstay of scientology and were encouraged with the offer of a certificate and a 30 per cent discount on books if they merely registered, have lost their free ride. All certificates now out have been revoked. To re-register, each group member must hold membership in the HA\$I--at from \$8.50

for General Membership to \$25 for Special or Professional Membership. In addition--to retain active status--each group must report activities for the past month as well as plans for the coming month. Those without HA\$I memberships will be considered "guests" until after they pay.

There are many less platinum-plated therapies and systems. Among these is Art Coulter's Synergetics, which has been "given" to those who will use it; William Furr's Telelogic Processing, which can be had for \$10 a month over a two-year period; and Jim Welgos's "Lessons in Living", which is a mixture of dianetics, psychology, and do-goodism and costs only \$18 for the course of 50 lessons. Without trying to evaluate them (they may be worth just what they cost, or much more, or less), it's certain they're going to attract people who--even at the risk of being branded "squirrels"--need and want help, yet can't afford seats in Scientology's diamond-studded horseshoe.

We can't help but wonder what has happened in Phoenix. Has Ron lost control of his own organization to a board which has sold him the idea of making Scientology scarce--and therefore valuable? And what of the graduates who've paid one or more \$500 for courses, and now are being told their certificates are invalid unless they take the newest training? obtain a new certificate that tomorrow may be just as obsolete as the one they now have?

But all is not lost. Schools, groups, and individuals that paid up to \$10 an hour for lecture tapes when another "This is it" technique was in its heyday, are told that these "obsolete" tapes will be redeemed by the HA\$I on new releases at \$3 per 1,200-foot spool.

If this is a non-profit organization, and it costs members this much for the HA\$I not to make a profit, it might be cheaper on the "field" if the HA\$I was re-reorganized into a profit organization.

Of course, the entire fault may lie at the feet of Phoenix landlords. Since it is taking so much of that high-priced city to house the many branches of the HA\$I, the CEC\$, the HDRF, the C of \$ of P, the FF, etc., it may be that only a key to the vaults under Fort Knox would support these tourist-sucking leeches in the manner to which they'd like to become accustomed.

However, in some of the requests for cards, there was a slight serious tone, too. They like the name. Also the idea. Maybe it was the dichotomy of not having to mortgage the family homestead they liked. But we've been asked to enlarge upon the organization and make it permanent.

Well, if infinity isn't permanent, we don't know what is. Anyone with some ideas on the subject is invited to expound.

And in the meantime, there are a few cards left. Of course, we've doubled the price—but even at that, double nothing still isn't very expensive.

Have a Goal, Be Deliberate, Enjoy Yourself,
and Don't Fire Your Auditor, Even
If He's Late, Stupid, or Unkind. For...

A GOOD AUDITOR IS VERY HARD TO FIND

PRESUMABLY you have a reason for being a preclear. I mean, a reason of your own--a reason why you want processing. If you have no reason for being processed, stop being a preclear, or make up a reason. You might decide to be curious, for example, or you might decide to want to become an Operating Thetan. If your father thinks you are a problem and is forcing you to see an auditor, you may want to become a bigger problem for him--anything, but do have a reason of your own.

Whatever it is, this reason for being a preclear is very important to you. It is called a GOAL. Keep this goal in mind. Never let anything get between YOU and YOUR GOAL for YOUR processing. Do not let the fee you are paying (or not paying) obscure your goal--nor the books you are reading, nor the pains in your head and back, nor L. Ron Hubbard, nor your worries, nor your panic. Most important, do not let your auditor get between you and your goal for your processing. If he is late, or stupid, or unkind, or tells other people about your case, help him through the temporary difficulty in your relationship--or get another auditor. But remember, a good auditor is hard to find. Do not give up the one you have until you have tried everything in your power to get him to help you reach your goal. However, if you are paying an auditor more than \$25 an hour, and, despite all your efforts to get along with him he continues to be an obstacle to your progress, fire him.

DO NOT LET YOUR AUDITOR GET OUT OF COMMUNICATION WITH YOU. If you discover that your auditor is not talking to you, do something to attract his attention. Do it kindly and gently--don't startle him. Do something amusing. If you can make your auditor laugh occasionally, you will rarely have any trouble with him. And if you want

to get the best out of your auditor, don't make him angry with you. If you can avoid it, do not say bluntly, "You're not in communication with me." He may disagree with you and maintain that he is. Then you really are in difficulty. Of course, if you want to say something uncomplimentary to your auditor, by all means say it. The damage is not irreparable, and he may not get angry, anyway.

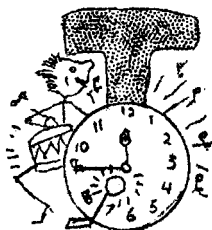
If your auditor disagrees with you, or becomes angry with you, I recommend the following: Take a short walk out of the room, and douse your face and wrists with cold water (preferably as cold as you can stand). This will refresh you and bring you to present time so that you can think of a good joke. When you have one, return to the auditing room and tell it. This will start you both laughing, you will be on friendly terms, and the two of you will be able to straighten out the difficulty which had arisen earlier. This effort on your part will also make your auditor realize that you are doing your best to cooperate, and he will work harder. If, when you return from your walk you find the auditor gone, follow the same procedure the first time you meet him again.

There may be times when you feel that the auditor is getting out of touch with reality. When this happens, remember that you do not want to antagonize him--you do not want to become an OBSTACLE. Before you flatly refuse to go along with him on his flights of fancy, try to do what he suggests. If he thinks you can do something, you need not agree with him, but you can at least try to do it. That will satisfy him and you will get along well together. Use your imagination! You should develop your creative ability anyway. You will find it extremely useful as you continue with your processing.

BE FOND OF YOUR AUDITOR. Nothing will

"Time Is an Illusion of Change of Particles"
--From a Clinical Course Lecture on Barriers

One Can Know Past Or Future, But Not Attain It



THE ONLY barrier that appears untappable is time.

The MEST Universe is a game consisting of barriers. This is important. When all seems lost, look at

that.

When the thetan enters the MEST Universe, he begins to put up barriers, and soon thinks there are more barriers than there are. When he gets to thinking of thought barriers, he's getting down below effort.

These are specific barriers, and these are all there should be:

1st--Space	3rd--Objects
2nd--Energy	4th--Time.

The problem of livingness is an obstacle race in regard to these barriers.

We get confused by giving time direction, and to get through time we think we have to get through an area of space.

Any process that handles time is of great benefit. Just because you handle all space on a case doesn't mean you've handled all the time on a case.

Knowingness is cut down by creating space; he says he doesn't know what's out there.

An individual can be in a high state of guessingness and not be in a high state of knowingness--and that's what happened in the East. Certainty and knowledge are the same thing.

When we have time as an obstacle, we don't have a span. Time becomes an obstacle because a person is having trouble with space. Time is not concerned by travel.

No matter what has been said before, past is not attainable, nor is the future, but one can know the past or future. Time is an illusion of change of particles.

The problem of competence is the abil-

ity to predict the position of 2-plus particles in relation to themselves. People think there's a prime particle around which all other particles position--but this doesn't work. This also is the position that has been given God.

Individuals will conjure up a prime particle, around which they move all other particles--prime post unposted.

A thetan could produce his own time span and own his own universe.

The undefined symbol throws language for a loop--no one knows what time is, nor how to define it. A physicist will practically spin on the subject of time with formulas that are balderdash.

If particles stopped when they reached the speed of light--as Einstein says--sun light never would reach the

Earth. It'd be stopped by its own infinite mass. Even a child can see this idiocy.

The Earth going around the sun are two particles which we look at to get some idea of time. We can observe that there's a tilt going on, and in addition, the Earth rotates. If you were standing in space, you'd never be able to observe these two particles and tell what time it is. We notice the sun and Earth are altering their position by the horizon. So, time acquires a viewpoint in order to see it.

Radium does a cockeyed job of measuring time by deteriorating at a certain rate of speed.

Time is always in relation to another time--unless you know what time it is. And we walk out of the universe the second we have knowingness.

There is a galactic time with two binaries that operate for this galaxy: two stars that flicker around each other so accurately you would get a precise time--but not by the erratic action of the sun and Earth. Even this would need a knowingness about time.

A person fighting time is worse than shadow-boxing nothing. You get down to "Time is a symbol", and there's not even

anything there.

Present time for this universe would be for the total universe at any given instant. There can't be a present time here and another time some place else.

A communications time lag comes from depending on particles to tell you what happened over that way—and you're always late. You get a late image because it takes "time" for a particle to travel.

The thetan goes around expecting a warning from particles—which he can't get because all messages from particles are in the past. If the sun were blowing up and you had the power to put it together, before you could know about it by seeing with your MEST eyes, the explosion would be more than eight minutes history. If you stopped all particles at once, you'd find a present time for each particle. The fact they're conveying a message has nothing to do with present time. Cause always precedes the effect; and it always is in the future, never in the past.

If you say, "I'm going to move this ash tray", and then move it, you know that cause is in the future.

The only way to handle this, if you don't understand, is by Opening Procedure, SOP 8-C, saying before you make each move: "Now I am going to..."

Havingness should be determined by masses of particles and objects. Losing would be having particles no longer under your control or ownership.

Particles remain the same particles but change form—so time is a matter of form.

An individual who won't let particles disperse or accumulate must be braced against something other than particles themselves. The basic objection is that two particles are going to disperse or come together.

A person only objects to motion because of particles going together or flying apart—and when he objects, he stops time.

A person concerned over his postulates is trying to stop time. This is basic on the game called MEST universe. When you brace yourself against anything happening, you stick yourself on the time track.

All that's wrong with any preclear is he's trying to keep two particles together or apart—yet the particles are no longer there. You may run a preclear and find him concerned over the particles

that are in the Santa Maria, yet they've undergone so many moves that they even may be in this room.

The business of the game—or control—is start, stop, and change.

A love affair (which is the motion of particles) that is dragged out becomes very sad.

MEST universe particles follow a law that is laid down—but your particles are handled only by you, or another thetan.

All we want to know is how many particles a preclear is trying to stop or pull together that aren't there any more; or someone trying to pull together or separate particles that aren't there yet.

You can handle particles as long as you don't use energy—and that's what those below 4.0 are trying to do.

When you talk about time, you talk about the pattern of particles as in the past, present, or future.

Communication itself is concerned with the departure, travel, or arrival of particles—involving space and time.

A person can communicate as well as he thinks he can communicate with or without energy.

TIME PROCESSING FORMULAS

The basic process is: Find two particles you don't mind having together. Find two particles you don't mind having apart.

A change of tone (rise on the E-meter) follows if you do this in brackets on objects, animals, people, spaces. Look for the fellow with a stuck needle—not for one with a needle that is moving. You'll keep your gains with this process.

Also, have your preclear get sounds he doesn't object to having next to his eardrums. You'll find anyone objecting to a dirty word has an aberration on the sound laid in thoroughly.

Don't go into particles you WANT together.

Even if you run this blind on a preclear, you'll get a tone rise.

Tell him to give you three persons he's not, and he immediately has to check the location of particles.

You'll find a person stuck in his head to the degree he has to have particles together, or out of the body to the degree he has to have particles apart.

Communication lag is an index, but how much he's using energy is a better index.

You can fancy this process up—have him give you particles he doesn't have to have in motion and particles he doesn't

have to have stopped, etc.

You'll find your pre-clear running out of people rather rapidly, and unable to think of more. Carry on in a limited bracket—at least, have him get somebody else who doesn't object to having two people apart.

Keep pointing at how certain they are about this.

With this process, you're also indirectly solving his problem of space.

Here is a lower process that covers communications directly, but it's not as valuable. It's more covert.

Start asking, in brackets, for knowledge, perceptions, emotions, objects, symbols, foods, sex, etc., which must not depart, arrive, travel, or start, stop, change.

To make an individual reach a higher reality, run him on: Get three things you don't have to agree with, communicate with, or feel affinity for. Run in brackets.

All are spooked on the Seventh Dynamic. Have him give three ghosts that are not present. He may start digging into ghosts of fiction. Maybe you're even dealing with a ghost afraid of ghosts, a spirit afraid of spirits.

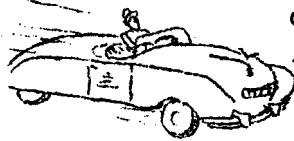

BDR Is "Off Limits"

The old A.R.C. (Affinity, Reality, and COMMUNICATION) triangle gets more and more deformed every month.

Latest twist in the A. and C. edges of the triangle is reported by A.J.S. McMillan, editor of the BRISTOL DIANETIC REVIEW, in Bristol, England. A recent letter from the London office of the HASI, dated November 1 and sent to all groups, warns:

"In order to avoid giving the impression that the Hubbard Association of Scientologists supports the theories on Dianetics and



The "New Look" In Dianetics

If you're earning less than \$500 to \$1,200 a month and not driving an occasional new Cadillac, you're in the wrong racket, Bud.

Some of the possibilities from auditing were outlined in Vol. 1, No. 1 of FOUNDATION BULLETINS, a new magazine supplanting all previous publications put out by the various Foundations, by the Hubbard Dianetic Research Foundation of Phoenix. One of these is the "guarantee" to students of the new Dianetic course that they'll either be good auditors capable of getting results on a money-back guarantee basis, or their tuition will be refunded—providing, of course, they study, permit themselves to be audited, and observe the 1954 Auditor's Code.

The BULLETINS is an 8-page, lithographed magazine, printed in green ink on cream-colored stock. It is available "only" to Foundation members. James F. Pinkham, HDA, BS (Dn), is listed as editor, and his first issue is the neatest, most professional-looking brochure coming out of

Phoenix for a long time.

The Dianetics courses, according to BULLETINS, require eight weeks to complete, and cost beginners \$500. HDA's pay only half price. All certificates issued by any previous Foundation are recognized in full force, but unless membership of \$15 a year is paid before January 1, these certificates will be considered lapsed, and the holders thereof denied the right to use or practice Dianetics. This is similar to the regulations set up previously in Scientology.

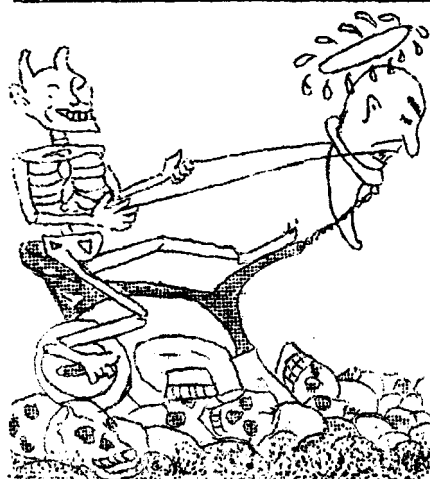
A supplement to the BULLETINS clarifies the difference between Dianetics and Scientology. Dianetics, it says, is a mental therapy, and covers the ills of man. It is limited to the first four dynamics. Scientology is "the science of Life", is religious in character, and takes in all eight of the dynamics. "Choosing between them", to quote the announcement, "is a choice between specializing in Man or specializing in Life."

BULLETINS, in listing "Standard Dianetic Procedures", said tests of Analytical Procedure have not been found to contain any validating material" and no further research into Analytical Procedure will be made unless "the Foundation is requested to do so by Dianetics Auditors and Groups". E-Therapy, according to BULLETINS, is "outlawed" as a Dianetic process because of negative reports and complaints from those who have used it.

L. Ron Hubbard's latest researches into the subject of Dianetics will be published in a new book to be available probably in December, entitled "Dianetics 1955".

Scientology expounded in the Bristol Dianetics Review, all members of standing are asked to refrain from contributing to that publication."

The BDR is in its third year of publication, and is one of the neatest publications in the field. Each issue contains letters, articles validating Scientology and showing how to use the new techniques, and has an aim similar to that of the ABERREE in the United States—wide open communication. However, Mr. McMillan is a bit more conservative in his editorial treatment than is The ABERREE.

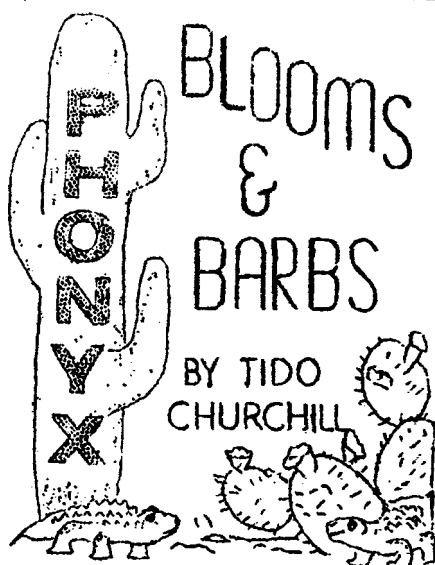

When I talk about SOP 8-C I mean every process derived from opening procedure techniques. You can take them through the rest of 8-C if you want to but most cases will stop right there because their main complaint will be gone. The hell of this business is that you'll get a PC who is in terrible shape physically, or mentally, or both. They'll cry for relief, which you give them with SOP 8-C. The minute they get their attention off the body and it no longer bothers them, you can, in most instances, kiss them goodbye and forget your goals for the case right there. They will be too busy going out and getting all wound up in something else to continue on to a full resolution.

"It might be an idea to print that last in the Aberree, and see if this is general throughout the field. Maybe someone has an answer. I sure don't."--Ernest Wirick, Detroit, Mich.

"Dear Ghost: I like The Aberree's hot tamale style of serving up the news about Dianetics-Scientology. If somebody doesn't inject a little humor into this movement, it will wind up a holy cow like Theosophy, et al."--H.E. Budzilek, Bridgeport, Conn.

"...It kind of looks as though the categories set-up provides for arbitrary and perhaps capricious action against any professional. Being critical, asking pointed questions, and providing a medium for the questions of others is not destructive. Arbitrariness and arrogance, on the other hand, can be very damn destructive. And the arbitrariness of CECS is not only unpleasant--it's unnecessary."--Bill Bradner, Winter Park, Fla.

"It has been a good experience to see myself thru John Bloomquist's eyes with the aid of The ABERREE. It is hard for us to see ourselves as others see us but it may be therapeutic if we wish it to be.

"The other day I had a conversation with Jim Pinkham for about two hours in which he very ably presented the core of present time Scientology. I consider it the supreme distillation from all these systems and, being so completely simple, it appears to be most difficult."--Dr. Gordon Beckstead, Phoenix.

"I spent a few minutes this morning trying to clarify my thoughts on why I have benefitted from Dianetics/Scientology. There seem to be many reasons but I still feel a little confused by it all. "I have tried to differentiate my reactions from that of others to find the factors that have enabled me to progress greatly while many others did not.

In the course of being rejected by many auditors on whom I wanted to lean, I discovered the strength of this feeling and recognized that I could make the decision to be apathetic or to continue alone. So I continued alone. I still felt and feel that under the proper auditor I could drop my aberrations and re-examine my postulates and decisions faster.

"This would not be 'leaning', I think. It would be a co-operative endeavor in which I could put full trust in the other fellow to guard me from harm while I turned all my attention inward.

"In the preliminary stages of testing out the situation, I know that I seem to be asking for somewhat more than that. So now I suspect that other people are acting similarly and that I simply was unable to accept the degree of responsibility they required in an auditor.

"I required less until I had experience with several who tried to push me around without reference to my own directions and feelings. I.e.: I would do as requested until I encountered something I wanted to explore. They did not have the patience or knowledge to help me explore, but tried to keep me going in their directions.

"Getting back to the question of why I 'succeeded', I think partly because I was able to 'visualize' my goal and various steps and to accomplish them; partly because I had made an extremely strong decision to go ahead after a long time feeling of failure; partly because I had been shaken up a bit some years earlier by an application of General Semantics so that I had a more efficient framework to think and analyze with.

"Partly because I lost or did not have a fear of change. I met many who feared instability, who insisted on two-valued speaking because it 'made things stable'.

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DIANETICS ABANDONS ILLS AND ENGRAMS AS GOAL OF PROCESSING

Dianetics, as a psychotherapy, is no more. Instead, it was announced non-surprisingly at the "Unification Congress" held in Phoenix December 28-31, that Dianetics, like Scientology, henceforth will concern itself only with the study and understanding of man.

"Unification", or the adoption by Dianetics of the goals and aims of Scientology, took up only the first few minutes of the opening lecture. From then on, emphasis, both in lectures and in group auditing, was on the value of two-way communication, especially between the auditor and his pre-clear.

Although no exact figures were given out, it was estimated that about 200--including students and members of the HASI staff--enrolled for the Congress. This is slightly larger than attendance at the June Congress.

Some of the talks were given by Ron, but the majority were by Dr. Hubbard.

In outlining the future scope of Dianetics, Hubbard traced the reception given

the first book in 1950, and said that this book is about to become HASI properly because of the royalties accumulated from continuing sales. When possible, he said, the book will be revised and reissued.

Ron said that the road to freedom, and out of a policed universe, was not followed by looking at one disability after another--such as psychosomatic ill--but at ability. Research, he said, is not completed, as there's no wrapper with which to wrap it up. "There is no ceiling on research into ability," he added.

However, he said that just because they have a new book doesn't mean that the old data is being discarded. Today, a "clear" and "theta exterior" mean the same thing, but the goal now is obtained without the erasure of engrams.

"We've found that the thing that produced the facsimiles can be taught to handle barriers," he said, "and when he does, he becomes a clear." The longest processing on record with the new techniques, he declared, was 150 hours, and he compared it to what could have been expected back in the days when Book One was all we had.

Taking up the subject of communication, Ron traced the development of the A.R.C. (Affinity-Reality-Communication) triangle which he conceived in 1950 while he was being audited. This triangle, he said, is even more important today than it was then, and one part

The ABERREE, like other human agencies, can err. It also can make mistakes. Furthermore, it can be wrong. But there the similarity with the other human agencies ceases. We, when wrong, are willing to admit, and lend space to correct our sins. So, we admit the following:

of the triangle cannot operate without the other.

Communication, he said, is the most important point of the triangle, but nothing can happen when one of the three points is missing.

Com. lag, he said, is technical, and could be called an agreement lag. A com. lag is the time between the posing of a problem or statement and a direct answer. A "social reply", in which the person addressed merely makes a polite response, does not count.

Persons who like only those they've known for a long time have an affinity lag.

A reality lag is a judicious decision from one who's always waiting to find out what it's all about before he commits himself. This person, Ron said, "is crazy".

All three--communication, affinity, and reality--must be instantaneous in order to obtain no time lag in reaction.

He pointed out that combat pilots have more accidents because they've been taught to hate, and have little, if any, affinity. That's also why military equipment is so difficult to maintain.

If a person is cold and

breast-plates, suspended on strings from around their necks.

The reason for the bullet shields is obvious. A "theta clear", Ron demonstrated, is one who has had his brains blown out with a .45. A polished breast-plate is more washable after this operation than a white shirt.

2. So, we'd like to apologize to those who have insisted over the last few years that they were theta clears. We didn't know.

calculating, affinity is missing, Ron said; then, so is reality, and therefore, he can make no sane decisions.

A contract, Ron declared, seeks to continue agreements without further communication, and that's why most contracts--especially if they're in force too long--wind up in courts.

Citizenship, he pointed out, is a contract between the State and the individual. Criminality is an abrogation of the citizenship contract, and if we made an effort to communicate with the criminal, instead of putting him in a cell and out of communication, the results would be more favorable to society.

"If you cut all lines to the body, you'd probably have no memory at all," Ron said, "because memory is an effort to communicate with the past. This is the facsimile, the engram. An effort to break communication with the past is what makes one bad off. Freud's idea was that one can be helped by getting him in communication with the past."

"People consider memory of the past THE thing, and become fixated on the terminal they want to communicate with. This is because

they have a scarcity of anything to communicate with in the present."

The author of "Silence is golden" was indicted as "the guy causing so much trouble in society". Also, he advised against teaching children that it's better to be seen and not heard.

"Answer", Hubbard said, means both the reply and the solution. When people don't get answers, they begin to ascribe strange motives and secrets to that which doesn't reply. As an example, he said that the failure of the Communist Party to tell McCarthy what they're doing gives the Senator the idea they have secrets, but if you know any Communists, you know they are incapable of holding anything. If they'd communicate, no matter what they communicated, that alone would convince McCarthy that the party was open and above-board.

A person having difficulty with any part of his body is having no communication with that part of the body, and one who wants to exteriorize from "that nasty old body" would first have to get into communication with it.

Hubbard spoke briefly of organizational problems, and said that if it were possible to get people confused by a large number of Dianetics and Scientology organizations, maybe he could get them to quit worrying about and fighting the organization and get out and start processing pre-clears. Now that processing is no longer a goal, with results certain, the immediate goal is an organizational one, he said, and that goal might be control of the A-bomb, if anyone was interested in this as a goal.

Most of the lecture material centered on Ron's new book, DIANETICS, 1955, the manuscript edition of which became available during the conference.

RANDOM CONGRESS NOTES

"Group Processing is just as workable as it ever was, but it wasn't workable in Operation Phoenix because people got well and never came back. It gave the auditors no practice. But group processing is the answer to the A.M.A., the Army, veterans' hospitals, etc."

"Passing of child labor laws created juvenile delinquency. Restrain a man from working or earning for 12 years, and what would happen to him? He'd wind up a bum. And the ages from 21 to 33 aren't as impressionable as are the ages of 10 to 21."

"Even entheta is better than no communication at all."

"If you come along as an auditor, and take away too many of a pre-clear's games, or pain, he'll pick up a new, and stronger, game, or pain. You never saw anyone in high emergency engaged in recognizing his pains."

"To play a game, you first need an opponent. As you bring a pre-clear up tone scale, he looks for an opponent, and often centers on his auditor."

"Getting out of communication is a liability of the game called Life. He can get lost. What do you think a tree is doing? It was a life form once."

A one-shot "clear" can be obtained only by applying the business end of a .45 to the forehead and pulling the trigger. Ron demonstrated -- firing a blank cartridge into the floor behind him. This, he

Man's "Considerations" Got Him Into His
Present Mess--And Will Get Him Back Out

Your Ills Are Products Only of Your Thinking!



IT SEEMS that I've always known a great deal about the thought side of mankind--but never have been able to give much consideration to the MEST side--effort, emotion, energies, and things like that. So, in my processing, I always used the thought side of life and living, along with the strictly mechanical processes, for what successes I did achieve.

Not until the latter part of April, 1954, did I take a look at man as he really is. This gave me a dichotomy--and having a dichotomy, I had a workable solution--a way in which to describe a theory.

Apparently, in the beginning, a thetan could know. He didn't even consider why or how he knew, because there was no reason to know how or why he knew. He KNEW HE KNEW--and that was all--until counter-considerations came into being.

And there we have the cycle: knowing; knowing one can make a consideration; considering one can consider; and finally considering things. Which is where you'll find any preclear--considering things--who can walk into your room, or even up to a case that can float into your room. Even a case that can't walk into your room--who lies in bed, but can talk about anything inside or outside the room, or even merely say "Hello"--is a preclear because he's considering things. If he knows that a glass is on his bedside table, he has considered the fact the glass is there. From that degree up to where he knows he knows, he considers. Knowing this, and

using it as a technique, you have a solution to any case level.

The theory behind this is the fact that the preclear, the individual, knows everything. He doesn't know that he knows it, but he didn't forget how to know; he didn't consider that he couldn't know. I have found this proven to my satisfaction with preclear after preclear. But he only considered specific things, thereby NOT considering that he still knew. If he considered that he couldn't remember something, then it would be necessary to pick up the consideration of remembering the thing and breaking that through before he could remember it. That is NOT the case. If you take a preclear and process him on his considerations about walls, about tables, about his hands or his feet

or his eyes, you will find that that preclear will get quite psychic. You will start telling them something and they will know the end of what you intend to say. You have not run a thing on his ability to know, but he does know. The consideration that he is considering some thing is breaking his consideration down to a very narrow route. Each and every thing he considers he can consider takes his attention away from other things. To him, after awhile, these other things do not exist--not because he considered they do not exist, but because he is busy concentrating on other things existing.

(I hope this is a little clearer than mud.)

I suppose you could run a preclear on being psychic--what would happen to him if he was psychic, and things like that.

In this processing, when I looked at mankind and saw the condition he's in now, I knew the route he took to get there. And that is exactly the route you take to get back out. How many times Ron has

said, "The only way out is through"! That is true! But we must accept what we must go through before we can consider that we have it. A human being who is not willing to accept the condition he is in as of today is not going to get better. He will change some of his ideas. He will shift some of his somatics around. And he will change. But until he is willing to sit down, look at himself, and say: "Look, I know that I cannot do these, those, and the other things",--and know in his own certainty that he is not a top-level person, he will never be able to get well, or change his condition. He must recognize with certainty the condition he is in, the condition the universe is in, the condition his MEST property is in. Until one accepts the need for something to be changed, altered, or bettered about themselves, why should they ever change, alter, or better anything about themselves?

In processing, you look at your preclear when he walks into the room, and you know that this individual should be able to start, change, stop all particles at will. Those are motions. Before that, he should be able to create. After that, he should be able to destroy. When a human being can create, start, change, stop, and destroy all particles at will, he no longer is afraid of anything. He will be completely free. That person will be able and willing to create faster than he destroys--not the other way around. Too many preclears want only to destroy, to get even with someone.

To get a preclear to where he can know, to where he can look, and to where he can do anything at will, you process him toward that goal.

First, you find out what his problem is. Ask him what would happen if he didn't have it, because you know that's the condition he should be in; he shouldn't have the problem.

And that's the technique. That's the theory. And that's all there is to it.

This is not strictly Scientology, as Scientology has been used, or as Scientology is. This is the theory of life--what it can be like, what it has been like, and what it is like--and the way out. This is a complete way out for any individual, in any condition, who can talk. Even if he's below that, try and get into communication with him via feeling, touching, any other perceptic. Take hold of their hand, look at them, give

them affinity, a feeling of well-beingness.

When you accept a preclear, know that the ONLY thing that was EVER wrong with him was his considerations. Can we say: "Mother was to blame"? No, the preclear only CONSIDERED Mother was to blame.

Every thing that every human being is doing today, he is doing for a reason! He considers that he has a reason. And the preclear's problem today is that he has misplaced that reason somewhere in time and space.

Counter-considerations, to me, as of now--in the amount of use to which I have put this theory--is of topmost importance. The only reason you ever want to justify things you do is because someone else wanted to know about it. What the other person thinks about you isn't important; it's what you consider the other person is thinking about you, and the amount of importance you give it. It isn't counter-emotion, counter-effort, counter-thought, or counter-anything, except counter-considerations. The other fellow is throwing thoughts at you? O.K. They're not going to bother you unless you consider they can, or permit them to.

I have found that the only thing necessary to tell the preclear before you start processing him (and this analyzes the technique and the theory behind it in one flat phrase): "We try to ask questions in any direction that will allow you to look at your present time considerations and decide whether you want to change them or not". That's all there is to it.

Each and every human being knows what he thinks, that he has a mind, and we don't care from WHERE he thinks, or where he thinks his mind is.

As for communication lags, the first answer your preclear gets usually is the truth. I do not wait for a com. lag, because the com. lag answer would not be true anyway. Ron has said, over and over: "The longer the com. lag, the less true the statement when you get it." So, why wait for something that isn't true, that you're not going to accept anyway?

I ask an individual: "What would you like to do?" If they sit there without answering for more than 30 seconds, I'd say: "Would it be to create something?" "Would it be something you could do on Earth?", "Would you like to grow things?" When you mention the thing in which the preclear is interested, he will brighten up, and you will know what it is. You'll have the truth.

Pioneer in Psychoanalysis Quick to Find
Results from Hypnotism Weren't Lasting

Many Myths Surround Teachings of Freud



IGMUND FREUD (1856-1939) was a Viennese physician who enjoys the dubious distinction of being one of the most misunderstood men of our times. He was a great pioneer in the study of the depths of human personality.

A supremely honest man, he had the courage to report objectively what he observed without fear or favor. Since most persons do not like to face the truth about themselves, Freud was ostracised for more than a decade, and even today, many myths exist and flourish about what he said and taught. Of parenthetic interest may be that he is reported to have had perfect eidetic recall.

The purpose of this series of articles is to present some of the more important ideas and techniques introduced by Freud, for the following reasons:

1. Those who prefer self-honesty to self-deception may be interested in trying some of these techniques to see for themselves the phenomena reported by Freud.

2. I personally have found a study of Freud's original writings extremely rewarding, and feel others may likewise. There are several excellent sources*.

3. Psychoanalysis is one of the leading schools in the field of integration, and any worker in that field owes it to himself to have a first hand knowledge of it.

4. In Synergetics, we are finding by entirely different techniques phenomena that are strikingly similar to those reported by Freud. We are encountering other phenomena as well, but his great pioneer work makes ours easier. The con-

tinued development of psychoanalysis by his brilliant co-workers is also helpful.

This article will give a brief historical survey and description of psychoanalytical technique. Subsequent articles will deal with sex, the interpretation of dreams, and the superego.

Freud began his work at a time when hypnosis was in vogue as a treatment for mental illness. Freud's teacher, the great French neurologist, Jean Charcot, had earlier shown that hypnotism was not a hoax, but a genuine phenomenon. Soon thereafter, incredible cures of all kinds of mental disorders were being reported. Gradually it became apparent that these cures did not last, but with this background, it is not surprising that Freud began his work using hypnosis.

Freud first worked with another Viennese physician, Dr. J. Breuer, who had earlier developed a technique for placing a patient under hypnosis, and "returning" him to an early painful experience he did not recall when fully conscious. In a paper published in 1893, they reported being able to trace "the most varied symptoms" back to an "exciting trauma", often occurring in early childhood. Such things as anesthetics, neuralgias, contractures, paralyzes, attacks which inexperienced observers mistook for epilepsy, chronic vomiting, visual disturbances, tics, etc., could be treated in this way.

They also discovered that "at first, to our own great surprise,...when we had succeeded in bringing the exciting event to clear recollection, and had also succeeded in arousing with it the accompanying affect, and when the patient had related the occurrence in as detailed a manner as possible and had expressed his feelings in regard to it in words, the various hysterical symptoms disappeared at once, never to return. Recollection without affect is nearly always quite ineffective; the original psychical process must be repeated as vividly as possible, brought into *statum nascendi* and then 'talked out'. In the case of ... contractures, neuralgias, and hallucinations --the symptoms appear again during this repetition in full intensity and then disappear forever." From this, they con-

cluded that "hysterical patients suffer chiefly from their reminiscences."

Freud and Breuer proposed the theory that the disappearance of the "reminiscences" produced by a painful experience depended "first and foremost...on whether an energetic reaction (discharge of feeling) supervened on the affective experience or not. By reaction we mean here the whole range of voluntary and involuntary reflexes, by which, according to experience, the affects are habitually worked off--from weeping up to an actual act of revenge...If the reaction is suppressed, the affect remains attached to the memory."

Freud did not like hypnosis and later discarded it when he found that patients simply lying quietly with their eyes closed could recall such incidents while fully conscious. Some remarkably rapid apparent cures were obtained with this technique; Freud soon noted that they were cures in the sense of relief of symptoms only, however, and that growth in self-understanding--which he regarded as the best measure of true progress--was slight. The tendency to form symptoms when new stresses occurred remained*.

Freud made two observations about this time which were to influence profoundly the future course of psychoanalysis. The first of these was the discovery that by simply having the patient "freely associate", without any attempt to control or censor his thoughts, material emerged that he and the patient could then analyze together. In such analyses, of course, the patient led the way, Freud offering suggestions for consideration which his remarkable insight and greater experience enabled him to make. The patient, of course, was always the judge as to whether or not to accept these "interpretations". Freud soon came to prefer this method as a way to "trap" what he called "the unconscious" into revealing itself. Symptoms could be relieved as quickly and self-understanding was more readily achieved.

The second discovery was the phenomenon

on of "resistance". By this, of course, Freud did not mean that the patient consciously "resisted" therapy. On the contrary, resistance is an entirely unconscious phenomenon. It takes the form of "not being able to think of anything", or "too many things happening all at once", or "wanting to do something else", or "arguing with the analyst"—in short, by a host of ways of avoiding, which one of Freud's students, Sandor Rado, later referred to as the "Black Panther Mechanism."

Freud's reasoning on this point was very potent. He saw that the unconscious forces producing the resistance must be the same forces producing the neurosis. Here, then, was the chance for making a direct attack on these forces, by observing their occurrence in the "resistance". Accordingly, psychoanalysis becomes largely a matter of "analyzing" the resistance--of getting the patient by one means or another to look at the resistance objectively and bring these unconscious forces into awareness. In this way, not only could "forgotten" painful experiences be recalled, but also the forces which prevented the "normal" abreaction (or discharge) of these incidents could be understood.

Any reader can easily test these findings of Freud, if he desires*. The "basic rule" is simply to abandon all attempt to control consciously one's thoughts, and to report everything that comes up, no matter how trivial or "petty" to the friend acting as observer. It soon will be noted that there are many ideas, feelings, impulses, etc., for which the subject can give no ready explanation. This is because "the unconscious" (or, if one prefers, the "reactive mind",) is producing them. When one, either by himself or with the help of a friend, seeks to analyze these ideas, etc., resistance soon will be encountered.

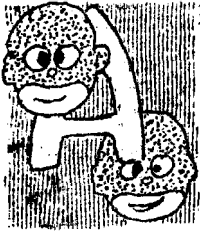

Thinking Is Reaction, Not Creation



N EXERCISE to X your eyes:

Relax.
Breathe very slowly.
Drop your jaw.
Look down.

Relaxing the jaw turns off the emotions. Looking down, eyes closed, is a method of turning off your thoughts. Whereas everything in existence, i.e., in exteriorization, i.e., in materialization is a result of thought, and whereas, observing said result as being less than desirable, be it therefore behooving to perish the thought.

"I think, therefore I am."

IT IS with constant interest that I observe the organizational activities of those people who identify with Dianetics and Scientology. Of equal interest is the reaction from the period of identification of those individuals who leave the fold, voluntarily or otherwise.

Painters, poets, novelists, architects (all artists, for that matter) continue to create and grow in the degree that they can let the forms they made yesterday be chewed by the twin jackals, Criticism and Praise, without forgetting that the form is yesterday and creating is an act of now toward the future. An artist has to eat. So, he copyrights his form and lets the jackals snarl and howl. The louder the noise, the better he eats. But he'd better keep out of it.

Now, to me, the one called Hubbard is an artist. The materials he uses are the organisms known as homo sapiens. His canvas is the planet, and the form he is creating is a new civilization. There are other such social artists working on this

planet. These are working with a new generation and have the task of demonstrating the ways for a generation of homo-saps to move as a species from where they are into creative motion and species harmony. It is an axiom of social artistry, as with any other, that one must work with the materials at hand. And homo-sap has some rather rigid organizational patterns that need to be run out one way or another. Now, what better way to do this than to do as Hubbard has done? Teach principles of life in social form by actually setting up demonstrations on a small scale of the known group patterns. Demonstrations which can be lived through in a few short months from beginning to end so that those who can or will look will learn to work in creative motion toward the future without making the mistake of starting once useful and now useless cycles of social behavior.

Whether Hubbard realizes it or not, he has done just that. Several times in the past, I've thought, "Well, he finally fell into his own trap", only to see him rise above the form he created to move forward to teach another lesson in action. He has demonstrated the lesson of organizational dependency and the permission to survive. He is demonstrating now the lesson of authoritarianism with all the trimmings. That he is doing this consciously is probable. One must know patterns to demonstrate them. One must identify with patterns to dramatize them. But consciously or not, dramatized or demonstrated, Hubbard has taught more people faster the principles of life function in group organizations than anyone in history.

Because of these lessons, there is an increasing consciousness in this generation of the advantages of open communication and the resultant harmony and co-operation of the species.

There is a grand opportunity in this time for the artist in all men to manifest. All those working from the creative motion are in harmony with one another, no matter what noises the jackals make about the apparent contradictions of form.

With each passing day--with each demonstration and/or dramatization of pattern--more people start looking; more people, having looked, start laughing; and others, having looked and laughed long enough, join the unlabeled crews who are creating a new civilization of man.

Philip Friedman writes from Florence, Ariz., that they have an experimental garden for the development of species of plants that deviate from the natural type, yet will grow in Ari-

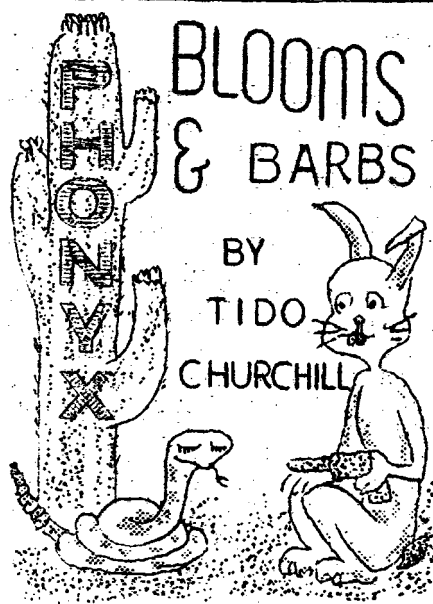

A very capable job as director was done by Burke Belknap, who, unfortunately, had a birthday, and as a consequence, all his announcements were accompanied by the audience singing "Happy Birthday to You". His mother was recognized as being a distinguished visitor all the way from Peru.

Ministers of the Church of Scientology were introduced and made an impressive showing, the men wearing charcoal colored suits with the medallion of the Church on a purple ribbon around the neck. The women were wearing black skirts and white blouses with smaller insignias of the Church pinned to their blouses. The HASI staff was introduced, as were the Clinical Course and H.C.P. students. 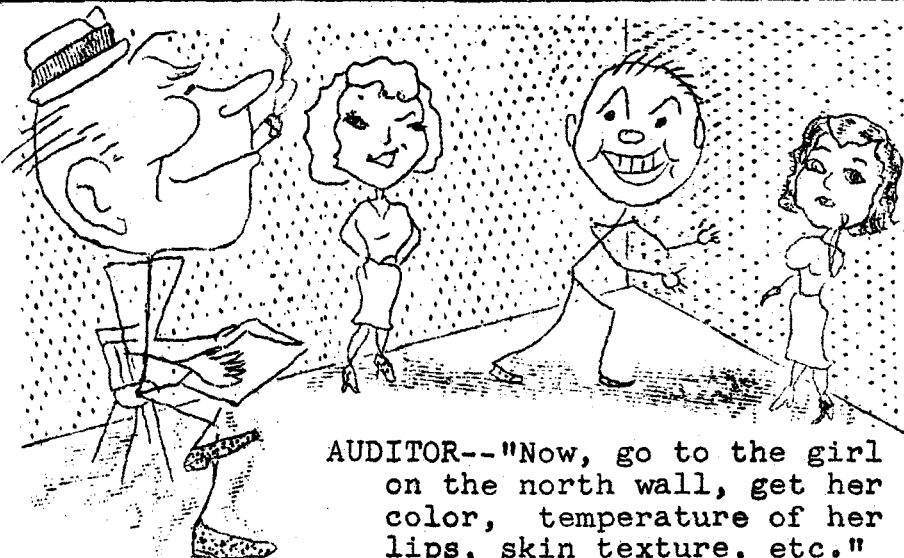
interesting. Just goes to show what can happen with some of the data brought out through therapy, and how charged up you can get. Shooting sparks. Wow! I've shot sparks at times but haven't melted any pliers.

"As to Scientology wearing a sable coat, how true. It is getting too expensive to keep up with prime publications, and with the ban on use of the E-meter and techniques without proper membership donation, it looks like I'll have to find an authorized member to sell my electronic ouija board (E-Meter to squares) to, and go back to the wooden board as in pre-dianetic days. I wonder if an ouija board might not prove superior.

"Eureka! I have the answer to those outside the fold. Mark up the floor as upon an ouija board, sit the pre-clear on a tricycle blindfolded and let him run around the room. The letters he passes over the most would be the clue to his problem and the only way that he could communicate efficiently would be to exteriorize and direct the body to ride over letters spelling out data. The auditor would direct the thetan to spell out words and those not complied with or misspelled would indicate a charge. The exercise would keep the pre-clear in shape and present time simultaneously.

"If the pre-clear is too low toned, have him walk the floor and stand on particular letters at random choice, the auditor noting the letters avoided. This would give an assessment. Then direct the pre-clear until all letters were accepted without a time lag. Then go to the blindfold and tricycle. This technique is superior to walking to two diametrically opposite sides of the room as it is more random and would interest the thetan immensely...This technique is offered freely...

"This is a 'natural' as an official *modus operandi* for 'The Ancient and Honorable Order of Infinites'. I



AUDITOR--"Now, go to the girl on the north wall, get her color, temperature of her lips, skin texture, etc."

"I've just made another Great Contribution to Dianetic auditing. This concerns the hypnotic elements of 'duplication'.

"As your cartoon depicted so clearly, it's an auditor's 'spin' technique. The auditor, without first finding out whether the pre-clear can handle this technique, sits and smogs up the atmosphere while looping the pre-clear. I'll bet that 99 percent of the people who looked at that cartoon took it to be an attack on Hubbard's technique rather than a very revealing testament on how no technique--not even one as good as '30'--can escape that kind of an auditor's mishandling.

"So, here's a suggestion. Instead of a spot on each wall, you locate a good looking dame on each side of the room...As this proceeds, I noticed that from repeated handling the objects get warmer and warmer. Same thing is postulated to take place in this new variation of mine, which will help keep the pre-clear awake, too.

outside the Hubbard office from writing anything on Scientology, for what author is likely to spend time and effort on books if such books could be snatched from his ownership and transferred to other parties? Fortunately, there is no law under which this can be done.

"In my case, at least, the attempt of CECS to rule by confiscation was a complete failure. I pointed out to Steves that it was well established that anyone may write a book on any subject, that authorization had been obtained from L. Ron Hubbard under a royalty agreement for use of quotations from his material in my 'Elementary Scientology Series', and that books which do not incorporate direct quotations of previously copyrighted material are not subject to monopolized control; hence we have 'Introduction to Scientology' by Richard deMille, 'Seven Steps to Better Living', by Bannister and Wood, and that others undoubtedly would follow.

"I continued: 'The rank and file decide by their purchases whether they believe any published work will be an aid to their study of a subject. I see no way by which you can prevent interested authors from making their own contributions to Scientology, nor by which you can prevent students of Scientology from purchasing and reading such volumes if they so desire. This, Mr. Steves, is a free country! We do not desire thought-control, or action control in any form...I am not interested in professional membership in any organization which imposes as a condition of membership arbitrary restrictions upon the actions of a member, and which deprives or attempts to deprive members of their own property.'

"When do you think HASI, in its day-to-day conduct, will start living up to the high ethical standards implied in the basic teachings of Scientology?"--Mark

"After reading the last Aberree, I took about a week examining my present time attitudes. The upshot of this examination was that I changed my payment policy to straight donations, made a decision that we needed more money before we could ever operate successfully here in Detroit, and decided that I would have to get out and find me a job. As I am not about to give up Scientology for a full time job, this posed a problem that is, to this moment, not resolved..."

"We need an organization of Scientologists which can operate on a group level as we know a group should be able to operate...All of us who have accepted Scientology as a way of life and livelihood have taken over ownership of Scientology--not in the sense that 'IT'S MINE', but rather in the sense that 'IT'S OURS'. Unless we are completely cockeyed, this is the only manner in which Scientology can be owned."

"From your Auditorial, you seem to urge a return to the initial principles of Dianetics, (A poor man's psychiatry). Well, I doubt if any return is possible, but I'm also of the opinion that that principle has not changed in the minds of most of the Auditors in the field. All we actually need is for each of us to re-evaluate the situation in the light of present time and present time techniques. From the letters in your paper alone, the whole field seems stirred up on this control factor. This could

be the time to form an organization which could operate along the group dynamic. The need of such an organization becomes more apparent each time the C.E.C.S. puts out a new directive. Nothing I know in Scientology predicated the type of control which is coming out of the central organization of Scientology, and if you'll go to the Communications Manual, laid out there is an explanation of what happens to any organization or individual who constitutes the type of block on the com. line as the C.E.C.S....

"The type of conference you had in Enid is a good start at the type of organization we need. As soon as possible, I am going to suggest a mid-western conference, either here in Detroit or in Chicago. Out of these organizations, loose as they are (and should be) perhaps we can form the type of organization which can really represent Scientologists....

"All that is really being asked here is that we begin to use what we know and work along lines that can benefit the entire field. Such an organization can give us the standardization of goals and ideals rather than attempt an enforcement of standardized ideas as is now being done by the C.E.C.S."—Ernest Wirick, Detroit, Mich.

"It's nice to be light-minded as (all?) most contributions are in the Aberree. Where, when do you stop? How is one to know what's serious and what is not? Everyone tries to be more hilarious than the other -- could die from laughing hiccups....

"It's time for a report on what results my letter to the H.A.S.I., with copies to the groups, accomplished. Out of 16 groups from whom we have so far received replies, 11, or 68.75%, were either in mild or strong agreement with

our stand and against the group policy. Three, or 18.75%, were in agreement with the group policy. The remaining 12.5% consisted of two groups who misunderstood the policy, thinking that to qualify as registered groups, only three of their members needed to become members of H.A.S.I.

"So, as you can see, of those who understood the policy, the tally is now running almost 4-to-1 with us....

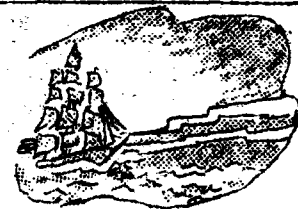
"In reply to our registered letter, Ron said: 'On checking through the answers from various groups throughout the world I find that out of some 250 groups that there are only two or three which are having a great deal of difficulty with this change of policy. Thus, it would appear to me those of you who are in the minority are apparently questionable from the standpoint of the type of group that we would like to have spreading Scientology for us.' His figures, if you will notice, are considerably at variance with the results from our letter... Maybe this is someone in the front office feeding doctored data to Hubbard. I have written him again, giving him our figures, and outlining what may be a more succinct outline of our objections to the group policy, as follows:

"To summarize, I believe our main objections to the group policy can be more succinctly put than we did in our letter of protest. Briefly, we do not disagree in toto with a purpose of prohibiting use of Scientology professionally by unqualified, incompetent individuals, or of prohibiting use of the name Scientology by individuals or groups who are not Scientologists; but we do not agree that limiting possession and use of Scientology materials accomplishes either of these, the sole qualification for membership now being a minimum of \$8.50. And, as we stated in a previous letter to you, we absolutely fail to see that a sum of money paid ever ensured compe-

tence in practice or understanding, or loyalty to any man or organization...' To date, we have received no reply...and it seems rather debatable now if he will answer until and unless the policy is rescinded; and that seems doubtful in view of the fact that subscription to the Scientological Shopping News, the Journal, is now \$8.50 per year..." Jon R. Skinner, Secretary, Scientology Group, of Portland, Ore.

"Here is what we've been doing since I returned from Phoenix?

"I got permission from the Board of Education to study our Doctrine, so organized two groups, one on Monday night, one on Friday, and a children's group on Sunday morning. Tonight Frank Sullivan starts a new group, and Dec. 5, Leo Hoenel and I, along with our children's group, are starting a Sunday morning group. So there is group processing Monday, Wednesday, and



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Friday night, 8-10, and Sunday morning 11-1.

"We hope to have the church in use every night, and after the first of the year every day, too. The study groups are 6-8 on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, and Sunday morning 9-11.

"The Aberree just arrived so I took time out to read it...Hey! Whose game are you playing? We are all playing, one whether we are aware of it or not.

"I have a rather good idea of the problems Ron has faced, when I look at my own problems in such a small way. People are at a certain place on the Tone Scale. You can bash your head against them, put out force and get it back, or you can grant them beingness, accept them where they are, and go on your way. This probably has been my stumbling block, but this aberration I'm conquering, too."--Refa Postel, Detroit, Mich.

"It (The ABERREE) certainly gave me a good laugh, and also a lot of good data on other people's reactions.

"Bob Arentz's letter was very good, and, I think, very true in its account of the process of Dianetics since 1st Book. I was one of the guys who dived in headfirst with the others,

"However, all is not lost, and I am even beginning to get interested in Scientology again. In the interim period, I battled along with studying diet, relaxation, body-awareness, Welgos' Nexology, and so on. And I learnt a damn sight more by so doing than I did by bawling about Dianetics and other stuff I did not understand.

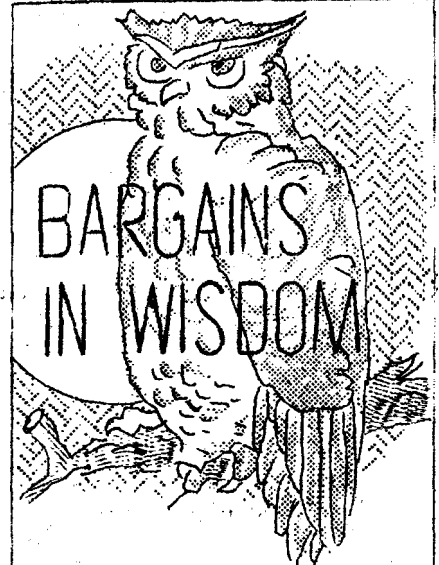

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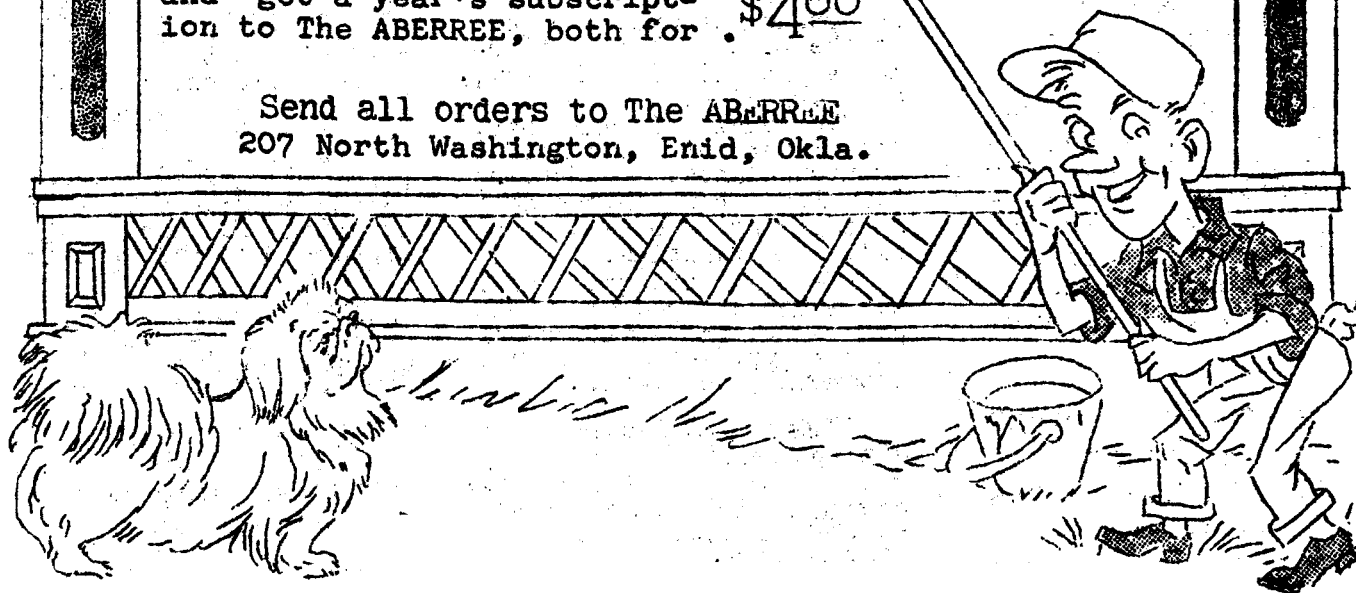
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PROCESSING STRESSED AT 2ND ENID MEETING

20 from Three States
Attend Conference;
Weather Is Perfect.

Blustery winter, hitting the midwest with Arctic fury, processed itself into a calm, nippy Spring for the opening of the Second Midwestern Dianetic and Scientology Conference, held in Enid Friday and Saturday, February 12 and 13.

Twenty persons, representing Kansas, Texas, and Oklahoma, attended. A dozen others who had signified an intention of coming, either altered their plans, were frightened by the possibility of storms, or attended theta-wise, thus avoiding the eagle eyes of the secretary, ready with labels, buttons, and data blanks to decimate their havingness (if \$12.50 was their fiscal state).

No census was taken of the delegates to discover how many were more of an operating thetan or "clear" on their way home than on the trip to Enid, but every effort was made to give a maximum of processing, both individual and group, during the two days. Lecturing, or the dissemination of "what one thinks someone else meant", was limited to the auditor's explanations of why a technique is run, and how it could be used in future sessions after the (Much more on Page 18)

ONE YEAR OF This is the
 ABERREE AND last issue in
 SCIENTOLOGY Volume I of
 The ABERREE. It
 may amaze many of our read-
 ers as much as it does us
 to realize that next month,
 we'll be starting our sec-
 ond year of publication.

It has been an eventful
 year! On that, most of us
 in Scientology will thor-
 oughly agree.

In March of last year,
 we were in Phoenix, and our
 dreams of becoming a theta
 clear were no nearer reali-
 zation than the "guarantee"
 we'd read when told we were
 "eligible"--we had \$800--to
 take the Third Clinical
 Course. We'd gone through
 six weeks of hard work, and
 were hangers-on with the
 Fourth Unit, hoping that by
 some miracle, the elusive
 goal we--and, so it seemed
 to us, most of the class--
 had missed, would coalesce
 and find us gazing down at
 the baldish, "horned" head
 three feet in front of us.

But on the less personal
 side, let us look at Scien-
 tology itself. Ron had just
 returned from wowing them
 in England and on the Con-
 tinent, with promises "to
 straighten out Scientology"
 in America--a promise he is
 letting the CECS carry out
 by turning it into a stiff
 corpse almost ready for
 burial. The Philadelphia
 regime had been "shot from
 guns", and publicly not-
 ised, and the school, under
 the personal ministrations
 of "the Maestro", had been
 moved to Camden for a short
 life before turning away
 from that "largest and old-
 est publishing center in
 the U.S.", and returning to
 Phoenix with its "limited
 winter resort facilities".
 Dianetics still was in Wi-
 chita, where Ron, in a let-
 ter to The GHOST--at that
 time, the most potent voice
 in the field--said he ex-
 pected "a lot more clowning
 on the part of the Mid-
 West". And "more suits to
 embarrass me".

During the last year, we

have seen the "only one or
 two" special Clinical cour-
 ses for "carefully selected
 students" continue on and
 on for anyone with the \$800
 tuition fee. We've seen the
 "science" changed into a
 religion and groups turned
 into churches and chapels.
 We've seen sub-organizat-
 ions set up within the mul-
 titudinous parent organiza-
 tion in a confusing array
 of alphabetical miasma. Au-
 ditors have been categoried
 and ex-communicated for
 daring to disagree with any
 of the HASI policies, or
 pay tribute at new and in-
 flated rates. And Dianet-
 ics, rather than becoming a
 "clowning threat", was giv-
 en back to Ron, free gratis,
 to be almost immediately
 disembowled of its original
 intent and cloaked in the
 ministerial robes of the
 theta church.

The former chain of
 schools, on which Scientol-
 ogy once leaned, is no more
 --and even the groups have
 devolved into assessed un-
 its that can listen to old
 Congress tapes and march
 monotonously from wall to
 wall in the new, simplified
 processing that is guaran-
 teed to do nothing more
 than raise one's ability to
 do everything except stand
 up for his own rights and
 beliefs.

The blue jeans and the
 bearded faces that showed
 self-determinism and marked
 the early Dianeticist have

given ground to charcoal
 black suits and medallions
 that compete with the an-
 cient battle shields for
 size and design.

Yes, in the one year
 since the first ABERREE was
 printed to inform our many
 correspondents that Scien-
 tology was a religion--our
 ONLY intention when we got
 out the first issue--Scien-
 tology has changed. And if
 one thinks these changes
 are optimum, he has only to
 read the "Letters to the
 Editor" in another section
 of this magazine. The wail-
 ings are loud enough that
 even Phoenix should hear
 them, despite its barriers
 against so-called entheta.

In a recent Bulletin to
 the field, Ron wrote: "The
 focal pt. is upon Scientol-
 ogy, not its organizations
 or personalities." Which we
 think is a wonderful adage
 if only those points upon
 which we must not focus
 would keep out of our hair.
 When a sub-organization on
 which one must not focus
 attention insists that all
 members pay it tribute at
 the risk of being brain-
 washed of the knowledge for
 which they paid large sums
 in training, then that "pt."
 is a little too pointed to
 ignore.

But it's all a lot of
 fun. And we don't intend
 to take any of it serious-
 ly. Not even the note by
 Ron to auditors referred to
 in the paragraph above.

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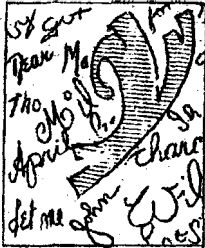

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Handwriting Given 3 Zones: Mind, Soul, Body



OUR handwriting is you! Every pen stroke is a reflection of a mental attitude, an emotional feeling, spiritual insight or the lack of it.

Handwriting is the mirror of your mind. No two persons write alike because there are no two persons exactly alike. Although we all learn from the same copybook, as we develop character and individuality, so do we alter our stroke formations. Persons who write EXACTLY as they were taught in school, with all the unnecessary initial and ending curliques, usually are persons lacking in any real character. They are not creative, original, or individualistic.

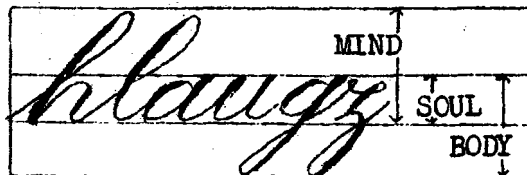
The more you develop in mentality and character, the more you learn to think for yourself, to this extent will your handwriting take on more character. "Bad" and "good" handwriting per se mean nothing. I've seen thousands of handwritings and often that of genius was almost undecipherable. And "nice" scripts--especially conventional, copybook ones--belonged to unthinking, characterless persons whose minds hadn't progressed far beyond the grade from which they graduated in school.

Handwriting analysis is a projective technique wherein one anatomizes the subconscious feelings, desires, phobias, traumas, and thought habits reflected in graphic symbols. One of my clients wrote each word ending in a downward zig-zag movement, so much so that the entire script took on a bizarre appearance. (There are three zones in handwriting: upper, middle, and lower, corresponding to the mind, the soul, and the body--or mental (intellectual), spiritual (psychical), and material (sexual) interests. The upper zone includes such letters as l, b, d, t, etc.; the middle zone such letters as a, o, e, i, etc.; and the lower zone such letters as g, j, y, z, etc.)

Looking at this man's script, I felt that his subconscious mind was being directed constantly to the lower part of his body, his feet, and in my analysis I asked him if he had trouble with his feet. He wrote back: "I've had a rash on my feet for four years, and nothing I take makes it go away!"

Sexual anxieties, frustrations, and abnormalities often are indicated in handwriting. The lower zone is usually the clue but all other factors also must be taken into consideration. I remember one classic example of a woman who was crippled below the waist, but beautiful and even buxom above, who formed the first part of her initial like a well-rounded bust but the lower part of the letter was practically non-existent. This woman had undeveloped, child-like legs, but a pretty face and well-developed bosom. This traumatized condition unconsciously showed up in the way she wrote.

Sex cannot be determined by handwriting. A good graphologist usually requests the age and sex of an applicant for analysis. The soul has no sex! Today we have masculine women and effeminate



men. There are men in what was once considered female occupations, and women in what once was considered "a man's job". There are weak, vacillating, nervous, passive, and modest men; and there are aggressive, active, boastful, self-seeking women. Your handwriting shows your CHARACTER, a thing on which neither sex has a monopoly.

Age cannot be determined because there are boys of 16 whose writings show the mentality of 30 or more. And there are men of 40 and 50 whose writings show their mental development to be that of a teen-age boy.

Anyone can spot the uneducated hand: misspellings, use of a small "i" instead of a capital "I" when referring to self, bad punctuation, schoolbook formations usually scrawled out, lack of any individuality.

Persons who are direct and to-the-point, efficient, and with the ability to

cut corners usually write with an absence of the initial stroke. Their letters begin with no superfluity. The t, b, a, o, all lack beginning strokes. Highly secretive persons usually have either compressed writing and/or nearly all ovals closed. Therapists would do well to look for this sign as it indicates a noncommunicative person—one who prefers concealment to confidence. Since this is one not inclined to "open up" readily, the therapist will have much more work on his hands to uncover the hidden meaningful material which is buried. In these scripts the a, d, b, o, and g are all CLOSED, some LOCKED with an EXTRA LOOP TIE. This is SECRETIVENESS, RETICENCE, CAUTION, NONCOMMUNICATIVENESS, which is often associated with inhibitedness or withdrawal.

Any therapist can "size up" his patient in person, but how many know the patient's psychological make-up and character traits BEFORE seeing his patient? Professional graphologists get handwritings from all over the country—from persons thousands of miles away—yet are able to diagnose these scripts accurately. Why? Because there are scientific rules most graphologists follow, rules which have been developed and established since Camillo Baldi in 1632 wrote the first official book on the subject:

"Tratto Come Una Lettera Missiva si Cognoscano la Natura e Qualita Del Scrittore (How to Know the Nature and Qualities of a Person by Looking at a Letter Which He Has Written)."

Graphology is, has been, and can be an aid to all therapists. It's a sure-fire way of determining your patient's personality in advance: expressive or reserved, impulsive or premeditative, outspoken or inhibited, aggressive or passive, self-confident or fearful, honest or deceitful, emotionally dependent or independent, mentally developed or retarded, potential talents or lack of these. The list is endless.

Under hypnosis, I've conducted many handwriting experiments, and one of the most fascinating is to regress a person back to childhood, and show how at each age level the handwriting will change until it becomes a jerky, printed scrawl when the subject "returns" to the age of six, or when he first learned to write. When we were able to obtain the subject's handwriting written when he was 19, 17, down to 6, it was the same as the writing produced under hypnosis.

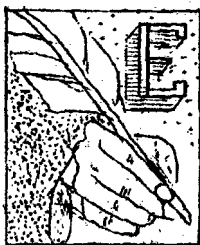
Future issues, the editor states, will be in a new pocket-sized format.

EVERYTHING that exists has a point to it. That point is its mean. A meaning is an averaging --is a middling--is a centering--is a polarizing--is a focalizing--is a zeroing --from whence all emerges and to which all returns. There is a destination that shapes our ends. Zero is our destiny.

Everything has an intent, a purpose, an aim, an objective--and that is to resolve to zero. The act of meaning may be objective or subjective. The point of meaning is always zero. It is the medium in which life begins and ends.

Zero is the go-between, the intercessor, the mediator, the midwife, the catalyst, the nothing and the all, the Christ and the Godhead, the Alpha and the Omega, the infinite and the absolute.

This, in plain words, is the plain meaning of everything. Opposites have their meaning point in the attraction of the nuptial embrace and their neutralization into a zero. Likes, repelling each other, have their meaning point in the void formed between them. The contents of the smallest atom, as well as that of the entire atmosphere, are loomed from zeros within zeros, in whole and in part.

So, also, languages are loomed alike. The vowels in the words are their meaning points. The ancient Chaldean language, in which the Old Testament was written, consisted of consonants only --no vowels, no words, no sentences. The vowels, the mother letters, that gave birth to the consonants, were, for some reason, hidden.

The School of Scholars, who translated the original Chaldean text, supplied various points and markings to the consonants, in order to indicate the missing

vowels, which, in their opinion, would give the correct meaning to the unpointed letters. From this was finally produced the King James version of the Bible--with accent on the version.

Now comes Charles Lathrop Warn, D.Lit., from California, who brings us a new translation and a new meaning to the Bible, by supplying a different set of points--another set of vowels--to the original Chaldean. Our present translation, he says, is the ninth in so many different cycles in the rise and fall of civilization. The Ninth is drawing to a close; a tenth might usher in another Period of Renaissance.

The Chaldean written letters G D S N W H R, continues Dr. Warn, may, by using the same vowels but spacing differently, be translated into two contradictory statements, i.e.: "GoD iS No WHeRe" and "GoD iS NoW HeRe".

That these two statements are both true, and are NOT contra-indicating, is the hidden truth in language. "No where" and "Now here" have the same intrinsic meaning when the Law, the Zero, is grasped. Now, the present, is the zero point in time. Now is never here and always here. God, the nothing-all, is really both "No where" and "Now here".

Upon a little personal investigation, the fact dawns that a change of vowels only modifies but does not change the fundamental function of the consonants. Furthermore, the addition of more vowels to a word, or a change in the position of the letters, likewise does not change the basic conception of the word. The vowels only point the words to their specialized meaning. English is apparently no exception to show the biological evolution of words.

Let us start with a simple example, taking the consonants S N to which we are to add any of the

vowels: a, e, i, o, u, w, and y--all of which are interchangeable. Note from the following how the essential meaning, the Essene essence, of S N always remains the same, I.E.--the nascent positive expression from a center point.

Whereas, Son is a nascent positive expression from a mother center, Sin is father sent. Sun is from a solar focus. Soon is from the zero point of present time. Sane is from the brain. Sign is from the hand--the signature. Sine is the positive relationship of the vertical element in trigonometry.

Noose is that still tied umbilically. Nose and its Latin Naso and its Scotch Nese are expressed from the face. News is the first of happenings. Ense or Ens means additional--on the plus side. Nesia is a suffix--an addition, as in Indonesia. Suan pan is a Chinese adding machine. Sino means Chinese--a prolific race for adding sons. Sown is to have scattered or expressed one's seed.

San is Sin in Greek. Syn is sin and means to be with. Sin is son in Polish. Sen-sen, in Egyptian, means to fraternize, another word for "to be with" and manifest the positive. Sen-sen is the name of a breath perfume which positively helps the opposite sexes to be with one another. Sinai was the mount with God, and expressed the first Commandment. Seen is the birth of an expression of light. Swain is a youth or a boy, and Swoon is what can happen when present with a female. Swan is symbolic of an expression of poetry and grace, floating in the watery mother fluid. Soniou, in Brittany, also expresses love songs and poetry.

Sayon is a garb of war--by way of positive action--the beginning of a malefactor. Sinew and Swine, both positively incline. Sain is to make a sign of a cross--to heal--to bless--to be beneficent. Seine is a vertical hanging net--vertical is positive. Sina or Senna is a physic drug that goes down and through--mainly manly. Sani means sound and healthy--creative.

Naus is a ship tossed up at sea like a foetus on the amniotic waters and Nausea is to toss up, or express, one's food. Aniso and Anis mean unequal--dissimilar--which describes the positive reaction from the negative mother. The Anise herb expels a positive aroma. Ense is to follow--to come out of. Anus is the end

point of the expressive posterior alimentary canal. Aenous means like red brass--red is a positive expression of color. Eosin is a rose-red dye.

The name Enos means man or through. Aenous, Oeneus, Eneas, Inuus, Auson, Iaseon, and Usan are male names of Kings and Deities. Oasean is like an oasis--an expression of life out of a desert. Onus is a charge--a duty--a service--a giving-off function. Oons expresses exclamation.

Unease and uneasy describe the restlessness of the sperm and the son to be born. Unsay is to renounce--to go back to zero--renunciation--rebirth. Unsee, to fail to see, is birth's blindness. Unwise is the son's lack of wisdom, or true knowledge. Unuse is a leaving unused, a throwing off, an expression. Usine is a factory--a creative medium expressing goods.

Insee is the same masculine action in relation to light--to see into. Insea is to enclose or mingle with the negative mother sea. Ins are ramifications--rams are males--certain positive peculiarities of manifestation.

So it seems that the consonants in words are soul mates and the vowels the soul. Because God made man like Himself, we have the Latin Homo meaning man and also meaning like. From the Hebrew we get Ish also meaning man and like. From Egypt we derive Ape, again signifying both man and like. "Gods and mortals from one source have sprung." Man is a mean, is a God.

Before building the Tower of Babel, we all babbled alike.

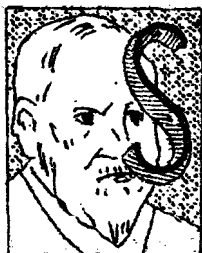

Sex Repression as Child May Be Neurosis Cue



IGMUND FREUD is best known for his work on sex. It is also that phase of his work that has aroused (and still arouses) the strongest protest. Yet even his opponents now concede he contributed much in this area, as well as in so many others. Whether one agrees or not, his ideas are worth hearing and knowing about.

That sexual disturbances are the root of many emotional problems may seem difficult to believe at first hearing. Yet consider:

1. Sexual prowess or attractiveness has a profound effect on self-esteem.

2. Sexual activity is the most intense source of pleasure, and the enjoyment of that pleasure is often thwarted.

3. Sexual activity, for most women, leads in many cases to pregnancy, childbirth, and motherhood, which is both her fulfillment and her greatest trial. For most men, it leads to domestic obligations, which restrict their freedom of action, as well as to the delights of fatherhood.

4. Physiologically, the sex hormones are involved in puberty, the menstrual cycle, and the change of life for women, and are related to the strength and virility of men.

5. Society has a vital stake in sexual activity (it means race survival) and exercises that stake in laws, customs, and taboos.

One of the striking features about sexual disturbances is that they are repressed. Many a reader, taking a serious look at this area for the first time, will probably feel at first: "Well, maybe so, but this doesn't apply to me." And he will be quite honest and sincere in feeling it. Only after he looks more deeply will he begin to find that: "Yes, I do have a sexual problem", and "By golly, it does have a relation to my an-

xiety (or aggressiveness, or insecurity, or guilt, etc.)".

It should be stressed that Freud's ideas on sex were not speculative, but grew out of extensive observations on neurotic patients in psychoanalysis. Later, they were confirmed by direct observation of children. The reader himself can check their validity by observing the child's activities in the sexual sphere.

Freud's first discovery was that the child has a sexual life from birth. This discovery was quite shocking to Victorian ears and even today arouses disbelief in many when first stated. Yet it can be confirmed easily by observing children. They will be seen to masturbate at a very early age, and suckling at the mother's breast gives them both food and pleasure. Of course, the sexual life of an infant is a vague and undeveloped affair, but it is quite clearly present and appears to be of major importance to him.

Freud distinguished three phases in the sexual development of the child:

1. An oral phase--from which derives later feelings of dependency (and insecurity if there are disturbances).

2. An anal phase--from which derives later tendencies to "being clean", or, in ideas, "being clear" as well as pleasure in "getting rid of" or "destroying".

3. A genital phase--which leads to self-love--narcissism as opposed to egotism. Later, it leads into another important phase--the Oedipal situation*.

One of the interesting theories resulting from this discovery was that sexual aberrations are simply a distortion of infantile sexuality. Whether this theory is so or not, it at any rate offers an interesting and provocative explanation for the "sex crimes" that seem

* "Oedipal" is derived from "Oedipus Rex", a Greek tragedy in which a king's son kills his father and marries his own mother, all unknowingly.

so horrifying and difficult to understand otherwise.

After about the age of 5--give or take a year--the child enters into an apparent period of "latency", during which his sexual activity appears to decrease. Actually, it does not--it simply is more strongly repressed. The reason for it is the Oedipal situation.

Very simply, the Oedipal situation is this: A child experiences undeveloped but definite sexual desires. If a boy, these tend naturally to be directed toward his mother. If a girl, toward her father.

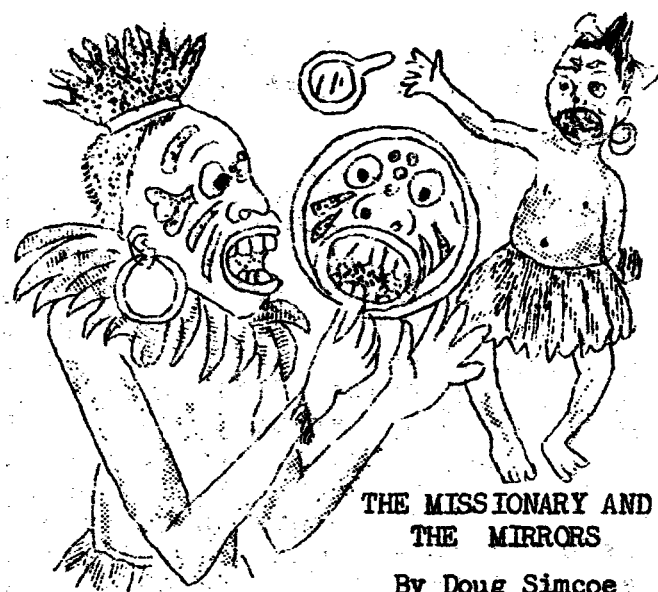
Such desires lead the child into "rivalry" with the parent of the same sex--boy with father, girl with mother. Since father is important to the boy, and quite obviously bigger and stronger, this leads to feelings of anxiety and guilt. Indeed, Freud maintained that all feelings of guilt have their origin in the Oedipal situation.

Whether this is so or not should be regarded with "benevolent skepticism" for the time being. Freud further maintained that because of these guilt feelings, the entire Oedipal situation is repressed. If this is so, then it would not be remembered easily by the average man, but could be found only after a thorough search. If such a search is made, and the Oedipal situation not found, Freud's hypothesis then can be judged false. Personally, I can report it definitely was present in my own case, although I would have denied this had I not looked for it. And certainly, it seems natural enough.

Freud further reported that in every case of neurosis, he found an "Oedipal complex", and that when this was resolved, the neurosis was cured. His findings have been confirmed by thousands of other observers now, in documented case studies kept on record at the Psychoanalytic Institute in Chicago and other places all over the world.

Those who have sexual problems, or emotional disturbances, may find it worth while to give a thorough exploration to this area. In my own case and those of others personally observed, the results have been of value.

He had a large supply of mirrors from the local 5-&-10.

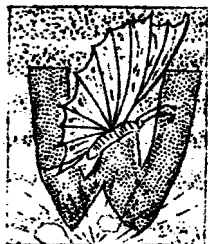
The savages seemed peaceful, but their "war-paint" made them horrid,

Thetan, Accepting All As Truth, Falls Prey to Ills



EVERY ALL ask, at some time or other: "How did we get into the mess we're in? And if we get out of it, how do we know we're not going to get into it again?" Well, the answer to that has become pretty clear to me in the past few months, working along with it.

It appears that in the beginning, Man knew—and knew that he knew. He didn't know why he knew, or anything like that, because he had no REASON to. So, our bridge, we found, was REASON.

We find that a thetan can only believe and understand truth, honesty, and decency. That's all he knows that exists. Until he found otherwise, or can find otherwise, he can understand only truth. MEST, however, makes mistakes, yet the thetan looks at these actions of MEST and says: "This is right."

A body is composed of ridges garnered over hundreds of thousands of years. One of these ridges—some part of the body—is going to get restimulated, and will say: "I'm broken". The thetan, believing only in truth, will accept this, and part of the body feels like it's broken. Here we have arthritis—any kind of pain that man can conceive.

If you can imagine a body that is being animated by a thetan, and each one of the ridges in that body—each cell, containing lifetimes of knowledge—each one of them saying different things—and the thetan taking all of them for absolute truths, then you can understand how the body got into the condition it's in. When the thetan looked, and saw all those things happening, he didn't know why—because he had no reason to ask why. It comes back to reason.

As we pull a thetan out, and by him changing his own considerations, making his own considerations, and deciding when and if he wants to make a consideration, then he can look at MEST and realize that in MEST, there are such things as time and space, and that MEST can make a mistake. When he realizes this, he can look at a ridge, and when it says, "I'm brok-

en," he can say, "Yes, you were broken back in 1620—but not now."

The thetan never made a mistake—he only considered that other things didn't make mistakes, and this got him all confused. He considers everything else is right and, like him, basically good, and therefore, he tries to be right and good, too. That's how he got into the mess he's in in this universe. When you pull your preclear out in that direction, he'll never get in that mess again, because he'll look at things, and say, "That's right for you, but it isn't necessarily right for me." That makes him free to go on and make his own decisions without considering your considerations, other than to consider you as a human being and allow you the right to be right or wrong for you as you see fit, and allow himself to be right or wrong as he sees fit.

What condition should your preclear be in? Your preclear should be able to create, start, change, stop, and destroy all particles at will. He should know, see, and be.

What condition is your preclear in? You ask him what would happen to him if he was in better condition all along the line; never what would happen to him if he were in a worse condition. At all times, you're sitting there, looking at your preclear, knowing the condition he should be in, knowing the condition he's in now, and the route in between. And your bridge from now to the condition he should be in will be somewhere along the line of reasons—reasons he will give you why he's not in that condition now.

That pretty well covers the theory. I'm now going to try and give a brief resume of the type of questions you would ask in this technique. These questions, given in groups, can be alternated, changed, shifted in any way you wish—but always on the UP side. Once in a great while you may ask a downward question, but only so the preclear can look at the way he considers now.

You start in by asking the preclear what is his problem. Your next question would be, "What would happen to you if you didn't have it?" Or, "How do you feel about that consideration right now?" Al-

ways start off with one of these two questions, because the only reason he's got what he's got is because if he didn't have it, he thinks he'd have something worse somewhere along the line.

When we get his idea of what would happen to him if he didn't have the problem, we try to get his considerations about the things he thinks would happen to him if he didn't have the problem. If necessary, we delve into it deeper by asking: "Who had the problem? When? When was then? When is now?" Let's don't go into the past very much, but get the fastest answer he can give you.

Suppose you ask, "Who had this problem?"

And he replies, "Father."

"O. K. When did Father have it; the first answer that comes into your mind?"

"I was two."

"O. K. Who had the problem then?"

"Father."

"Who has it now?"

"I do."

"When was then?...When is now?...When was then?...When is now?...Who had the problem then?...Did that give you a reason to have it then... Does that give you a reason to have it now?...And how does that seem to you now?...How do you feel about it now?... Who was it had it then?...And who has it now?...Do you have a reason to have it now?...Do you REALLY have a reason to have it now?...How do you feel about that consideration?"

You see, you're always asking the person to look at his PRESENT TIME considerations--and then choose whether he wants to change them or not. Does he still have a reason to have it? O. K. If he does, let him have it. We don't care. And we don't care from where he thinks, or where he gets his answers, or anything else.

You also pick up counter-considerations. You ask the pre-clear, and find out Father had the condition then, and you say, "Well, how did Father feel about that? Now, let's don't get the idea of what we think Father thought or felt, or how Father acted like he thought or felt. The first thing you think of--how did Father feel about that?"

"Well, he thought I was a little dickens," or something like that.

You see, it isn't important what Fath-

er really thought, but what the pre-clear thought Father thought--or considered Father considered. We all know that we think people are thinking things about us when they're not thinking that at all--but that is the thing that bothers the pre-clear; what he thinks the person is thinking or feeling, and not what the person is ACTUALLY thinking or feeling. That gets the pre-clear out of the other fellow's universe, as we have known this problem to be; he looks at his consideration of what the other fellow's consideration was, and pretty soon he will tell you exactly what the other fellow's REAL considerations were. It wasn't what he had considered it to be all along, at all. And that is interesting because it proves beyond a shadow of a doubt that we all know what the other fellow is thinking--whether we know we know or not.

Another thing we want to get in there in addition to our counter-considerations

is reason--and when (then and now). You can run past lives that way, and you can run other planets that way--but always wind up running the condition on THIS planet.

Perhaps the pre-clear says, "Well, I was killed in a space ship that crashed on Earth."

You ask, "When was that?" The first number that comes into his mind. Then you ask, "When is now?...When was then?... When is now?...Where were you then?... Where are you now?"...And if necessary: "What were you wearing then?" First thing that comes into his mind; you don't care whether it's true or not. Soon he will be pretty well present right there in the room with you.

That seems to be about the gimmick of the whole thing. On ccm. lags, as I told you earlier, I don't wait for them. If the pre-clear starts just sitting there, trying to figure out an answer--well, if he figures more than 30 seconds for an answer, I wouldn't accept it anyway. I won't accept that in real life, either.

One of the very important things to run is the person allowing the other person the right to be right for himself in present time. This does not mean he is going to allow that person to do what the

person wants to do--just allow the person the right.

I was running a preclear once who felt it her duty to warn a friend that she had a dress she thought other people might make fun of. She felt she would be causing the girl to be embarrassed in public if she didn't tell her about it.

You pick that up with: "How would this other girl feel if you told her about it?...And how would that make you feel?...Now, how would your feeling that way make her feel?...And how would that make you feel?... All right, now how would you feel if you knew she liked the dress?... How would that make her feel?... And how does she feel about it?...And how do you feel about it?" Getting them in the end to allow this other person to wear the dress, because, after all, there are a lot of other people's considerations besides mine --whether I like it or not, other people might. Allow her the right to wear the dress if SHE likes it--not interfere because I think SOMEONE ELSE might criticize it.

In allowing the other fellow to be right at all times FOR HIMSELF, you're allowing yourself to be right FOR YOU at that particular moment. No one ever is wrong--no matter what they do, it's right for that person at that particular moment.

The thing that got us into trouble was our considering that the other fellow, being right, made me wrong if he thought opposite to what I thought--but this isn't so. His idea of right is right for him now. Mine is right for me now. And each allows the other to change, even with-

in the next few seconds. We may or may not say so--but for each of us, what we do right now is right for each of us at the particular moment we do it. In that way, the other fellow cannot invalidate you, and you cannot invalidate him.

Another thing is running the thetan versus the body. "How do you feel about the situation?...Now, how does the body feel about it?... All right, how do you feel about the body?...How does the body feel about you?... How do you feel about the way the body feels about you?...How does your body feel about the way you feel about the body?... What'd happen to you if you liked the body?...What would happen to the body if you liked it?...What does the body want from you?...And what do you want from the body?...Could you control the body better if you had affinity for it?...Would it like that?...Would you like that?...Would you like the consideration the body has now?...How does the body feel about that?...And how do you feel about the way the body feels?"

You can ask these questions without limit. Anything that comes up--and however you want to handle it--feel your way as you go. As you can see, it is a technique where the auditor has to LOOK every second of the time. He must know what his pre-clear is doing. He must be on his toes and keep the pre-clear making considerations.

And that's all there is to it--keep your pre-clear moving all the time, and don't let him have a com. lag.

If this is one of your suppressed desires, you need suffer frustration no longer. In Phoenix, they have it all arranged for your debut.

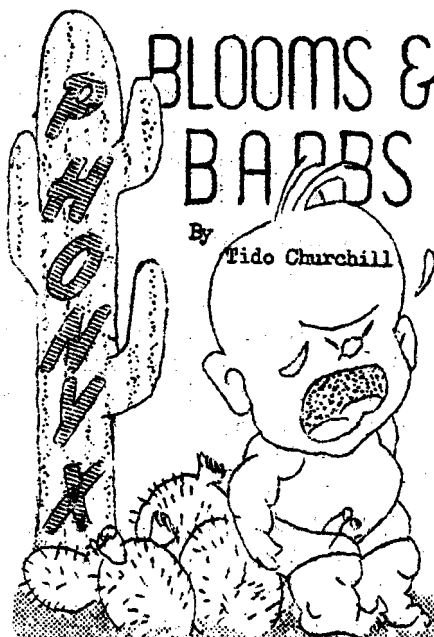

SOAP OPERA ON SEX was the most delightful bit of devilment I have ever read, and should anyone with a mislaid sense of humor take umbrage at your spoofing, quote Don Marquis:

"A goof
Can't spoof."

"A dianeticist since the First Book opened and at last successfully crowded out by Scientologists, my efforts have been redirected into writing a book. This book, now in the hands of a publisher, will be titled 'How to be a Scientologist'. And while it's guaranteed to make a Scientologist out of anyone in a very short time, I'm nevertheless magnanimous enough to give the readers of **ABERREE** a brief summary of its subject matter, that they'll achieve that lofty goal suggested by its title--and thereby kill some of my book sales...Maybe the **ABERREE** will find in it something commendable, if only the spelling:

"1. What to Wear--a Scientologist must never be seen when not wearing a smile. The purpose of the Perpetual Smile is two-fold: (a) it implies a superior state of being to that of the ordinary aberree (ER. Note--there is no 'ordinary' **ABERREE**) who is fortunate enough to be honored by the presence of such a personage; and (b) It is one of the best defenses against invalidation.

"2. How to Handle Invalidation--(a) Preventing invalidation before it gets a chance: Having just chanted to a layman the customary litany, 'Scientology is wonderful, scientology is wonderful', the layman might be low-toned enough to invalidate the invalidator before he has a chance to ask embarrassing questions. The moment you spot a look of curiosity... remark, in calm conversational tone, that you were up on Mars all last

week-end. This not only changes the subject but, if the layman happens to be a dianetic auditor who cured a case of cancer in a few minutes, even he will be made to feel pretty small.

"(b) How to invalidate after the fact: If the layman is aberrated enough to ask a direct question, such as, 'Have you cured any psychosomatics lately?' all you have to do is turn the Perpetual Smile on one of your colleagues, and--this is important!--widen the smile. Do not make the mistake of answering your questioner; the widened smile speaks for you. It says, in effect, 'Dear, dear. These aberrations. Oh, well...'

"(c) How to cope with persistent invalidation: If the layman will not accept on faith your statement that scientology is wonderful (which should be proof enough for anybody), then go ahead and be specific. You'll always be perfectly safe as long as you speak only about a case you treated and say nothing whatever about the processing. For example, suppose he asks what you've cured. All you have to do is describe the horrible condition one of your cases was in. Then stop. If your questioner grows more insistent, describe the case in more detail. It will seldom be necessary to do this more than three or four times before he gives up. But we live in an aberrated society and that means there are a number of people who still must have some evidence in order to form an opinion. And so, it's best for the aspiring scientologist to learn the next step. And in this step we tell our overly-curious inquisitor: (a) 'I cleared up the case'; or (b) 'He felt better'. Remember, keep it vague!

"3. What to Do When in the Wrong --That this is a catch question will be obvious to any alert student who hopes one day to become a scientologist. The answer, of course, is that there's nothing to do when wrong, because a scientologist can't be wrong...

"4. How to Handle a Dissenter--Infidels, blasphemers, nonbelievers must not be allowed to speak out. One of these, who had the lack of foresight to express an opinion of his own regarding the holy subject (a reader of **CADA**, named Lundberg) was scientologically dealt with by another reader who answered every one of Lundberg's arguments to wit:

'...if you are going to allow these dissenters in, to stink up the works, please don't send me the issues containing their evil.' Very scientologically spoken. But not, I'm afraid, to be compared with the fine subtlety of a true scientologist that was contained in another letter in the same issue and which took care of the base Lundberg expertly. I quote:

"Your letter of September 4, 1954, with reference to the **CADA** journal has come to my attention... We wish to call to your attention the letter you published in the copy we received written by Lundberg. The **HASI** feels that the printing of this letter was most ill-advised...For this reason we are unable to accept your offer of arranging an exchange of publications at this time..."

"I've seen no opposition squelcher to compare with this masterpiece...Touche! (Which is French for 'Touch something in the room--never mind getting well!')

"P. S. I'm not a dissenter myself, but something smells."--Jim Bartley, New York, N.Y.

"I enjoyed the first issue because it didn't take itself so stiff-shirtedly! Most new therapies or cults have a tendency to be on the defensive and thus lacking in good humor. I'm eclectic in all my beliefs; have done much independent research in psychological and occult matters and follow no definite school of thought. For years I've worked on an idea of my own and feel it'll take 15-20 years before I can put it into practice.

"Excellent Art Coulter's article on Freud. Glad to see the **ABERREE** a magazine of intelligence and diversified opinions. A therapist should study all schools of thought. If he sticks to one and refuses to read other therapeutic literature he is of necessity limited in experience and knowledge."--Leo Martello, New York, N.Y.

"The disagreements, estrangements, etc., which have taken place in the world of Dianetics-Scientology are a sure sign that there must be something seriously wrong with the basic claims made, as the very essence of these claims was that the doctrines freed people from the faults that have caused so much strife in the world. However, this does not mean to say that there is not much to be learnt from it, or that important discoveries have not been made. Books, such as 'A Doctor's Report on Dianetics', indicate that such discoveries have been made; but they also indicate that L.R.H. is quite a fallible and aberrated human being, with a tendency to let ideas run away with him..."

"His attempts to stop his followers from reading your publication is a very unhealthy sign (remember Hitler and the foreign radio?) and in contradiction with earlier attitudes in which, apparently, it was correct to have a sense of humor and criticize freely according to one's own opinions..."

"Just what has been discovered and really proved well enough to

convince me of unscientific mind? This is just conjecture from the L.R.H.?

"I am going to run a series of articles in the following lines: Start at the beginning and scientifically give us facts, which indicate or prove conclusions...In reading the works of L.R.H., although one may agree that most of what he says about other religions, etc., is true...if any person like myself tries to get at the real truth about these matters, all that really happens is that we get an invitation to pay some sort of high fee to take some kind of course...I wrote to the British branch some time ago, asking for actual details to be published of cases of people recalling past lives. I was told that they are only interested in 'techniques' for improving mankind."

"By what process (if any) were the conclusions reached about the eight dynamics? How about a little explanation of the Logics and Axioms? I do not think they are very clear to most people. How about a little explanation of how they were arrived at?...There is an entire lack of anything tangible to make Scientology convincing to anybody who is not caught in a wave of faith in L.R.H. and this is not just because the ideas are unusual and startling, for many people are ready to believe that there must be some extraordinarily different explanation of this universe than the

more conventional ideas founded on superstition...

California Bulletin Offers New Plan for Wider Communication

An effort to solve the communication problem in the field of Dianetics and Scientology has been undertaken by the California Association of Dianetic Auditors, and according to L.O. Anderson, editor of the C.A.D.A. BULLETIN and originator of the plan, is meeting with considerable success.

The BULLETIN, Anderson explains, has a program of printing material validating Dianetics and Scientology, articles explaining Hubbard's work, or work related to it, local news, and letters from readers. Its policy is to avoid deliberate entheta, but tries to grant beingness to all viewpoints.

Non-members of the C.A.D.A. receive the monthly BULLETINS only as long as they communicate with the magazine at least once each three months. Even inactive readers are asked to write a card or letter admitting their inactivity if they wish to keep receiving the magazine. Otherwise, they are removed from the mailing list as "deadwood".

Although there is no subscription price to the C.A.D.A. BULLETINS, cost of publishing each issue is published, and readers are invited to help share these costs on a contributing basis.

There are 18 editors, sub-editors, assistant editors, and just plain assistants listed on the BULLETIN's editorial board, but it is explained that their large salaries are not part of the expenses BULLETIN readers are asked to help share.

Auditing Stressed at Enid Conference

(This started on Page 1.) conference. L. Ron Hubbard's new book, "Dianetics 1955", was the basis for most of the processing.

The conference opened in the East Lounge of the Hotel Youngblood Saturday afternoon, with Norman Fritz as chairman. After each delegate had introduced him- or herself, Norman opened the program with a short session on "Body Awareness". This was followed by John Burch, illustrating two-way communication, and contacting MEST and putting up spots in space. Alpha Hart led the group in "Reach and Withdraw", and the balance of the afternoon session was by Norman, using Volume Two of the Group Auditor's Handbook.

After a two-hour dinner break, the group returned to the hotel, where they were paired off into co-auditing teams for the evening. A two-page mimeoed sheet, outlining the Six Basic Processes, prepared by Warren Collins from "Dianetics, 1955", was given each person to use as a set pattern for these sessions. Although no one was limited to the use of the processes described on these sheets, the simplicity of instructions was designed to bolster the confidence of beginning auditors who might be awed in the presence of those with more training.

Sunday morning services were conducted by Hart, who used for his theme the infiniteness of man with God and all matter. It was brought out, in a short discussion, that Scientologists, too, can be guilty of the very thing they condemn--narrowness of viewpoint--in refusing to grant beingness to other religions, faiths, philosophies,

etc. Hart cited the fact that all sincere teachers, at some point in their work, admit man's infiniteness, yet much more wordage is expended in trying to sell man the necessity for having something done to improve the body with which he is operating than is spent to convince him he is an immortal, all-knowing part of the Great Whole. This was followed by group processing, using a modified version of the "What would you do--if" technique used at the June, 1954, conference in Phoenix.

After lunch in a near-by cafeteria, the closing session developed into a validation of Scientology and other therapies, and a general discussion of what has been accomplished in the past and what may be expected in the future. Collins and Hart gave a short report on the Phoenix December conference, but there was little that could be added to the January-February issue of *The ABERREE*. Hart ended the meeting with a short demonstration of how to run out past auditing, in some sessions of which the pre-clear may find himself thoroughly bogged down.

No plans were made for a third convention, but in a post-conference discussion, it was decided to initiate designs for an open-air meeting to be held at some Southern Oklahoma park or resort in April or May.

Telegraphed greetings to the convention were sent by Ted and Tam Otteson of the Scientology Road Show, who recently have opened offices for processing at 14 East 72nd Street, New York. Sixteen hours of tapes on "Integration" were received for use of the Conference from A. L. Kitselman, but were crowded out by the heavy processing schedule.

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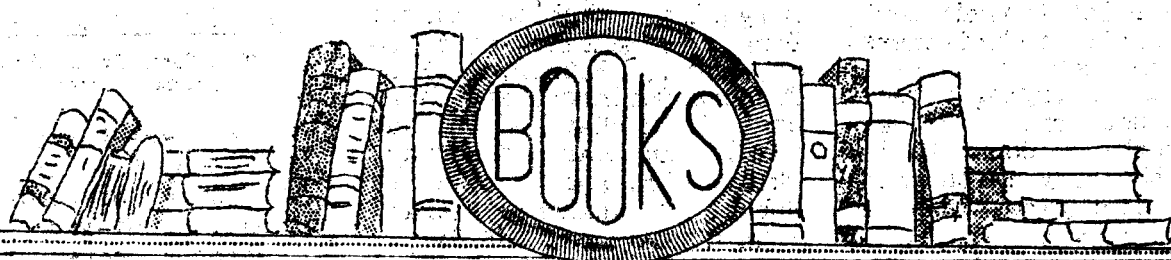
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
