THE OUTLOOK FOR NOVEMBER, 1920.

November comes in under the Full of the Moon which occurs on the 27th of October at \$18 a.m. Central Standard Time. The New Year for the moith occurs on the 16th of November at 10:05 a.m., On October 27th, we have the Sun 4° in the sign Scorpis, applying to a sextile of Mars, sextile of Jupiter and square of Neptune, and later a sextile of Saturn; this is quite a favorable combination of spects, and favors Business affairs in general, altho it would be some better if the asaccis occured at the time of the New Moon instead of the Full. However, I judge that the period from Fall to New Moon will be cuite active and generally favorable for business in general, and a two rable period for the average person to go cheed, jush affairs, start new aitairs, etc. The good aspect of the Fun favors come adverges in the prices of Cereals and stocks, and the laborang classes having a more even and satisfactory period to, employment than they have been baying

At the time of the New Moon on the 10th of Nevember, the Sun is applying to a good aspect of Schurn and is close to a sextbe of Mars with Mars in good aspect to Satarn, Mars is esalted and strong by placed. This also favors business in general, with many making plans for new business and many new business enterprises starting, considerable activity in land and real estate transactions, much investment of money in land, etc., Stocks and Cereal; having some good strength, some commodities still inclined to advance in price for a time. The Month as a whole, should be somewhat better than it has been for business and the outlook more favorable for the

maisses.

The aspects following the Full of the Moon are, in my judgment, more favorable for Republican success, because as a rule, aspects of the Sun and Moon to Saturn, or Uranus, that are unfavorable at the Une of an election, as a rule, favor Democratic success, and good aspects favor Republican success. It is true that the Sun is close to a square aspect of Neptune at the time of Election, Nov. 2nd, but the Sun is closer to a sextile of Mars and Jupiter than to the square of Neptune and the mextile is a stronger aspect than the square aspect.

NOTE-Students should remember, that If the Sun has a good aspect, then the aspects of the Moon which occur while the Sun aspect is good, are of a somewhat beneficial nature. A New or Full Moon that occurs with the Sun in a very good aspect may be a very favorable day.

THE SAINTS OF THE SANHEDRIM. By Prof. Weston.

The popular idea of the present day is that a Saint is a good old Thristian person whom the priests of early times wished to honor by having a particular church festival day after him. In general, however, a saint was a Christian martyr and the date of his death. or martyrdom, was usually set aside as a church festival day and named after him. For example, St. Polycarp was beheaded on February 23, 155 A. D., and for that reason Pebruary 23 of each year is said to be St. Polycarp's day. Again, on September 14, 258 Å. D., a religious fanatic named Cyprian was beheaded and consequently every September 14 is St. Cyprian's day, and so on throughout the These were the general principles of the idea in the early Christian church, but later many variations, contortions, misapplica tions and abuses of the original custom were introduced, so that tinally the whole thing was dropped as a mass of inexplicable confusion, the last few centuries being practically without saints, excepting, perhaps, the Mormon saints, who represent the last and the lowest get off in history.

The Christian church custom was an offspring of the Jewish San hedrim, which was an organization of 72 officers in the Jewish church, so chosen and elected that the date (Sun's place) of the birth of each member would fall in a certain half-decan of the zodical signs. no two members having the same birth date. The pedsonelle of the Sanhedrin therefore represented every five degrees of the zodlac.

Now the Greek word "san" means merely "the Sun" and "hedrim" means a seat or a place of setting, so that the word "Sanhedrian" was abreviated in Latin as "sancto" and this in English is equivalent to "Saint," The common word San is really Saint, and in astrology is a synonym for the word Sun, but in early Christian times all astrological truth was lost to the church fathers, they merely retaining in a sort of vague way in their memory that the word had something to do with dates, hence they took the date of death of their

martyrs and called it a saint day.

In the original Egyptian college of astrologers the "saints" were the half-decans of the zodiac and as such were used for the purpose of organizing their dramatic representations or correspondentials of celestial law and order. That is, the first five degrees of Aries are a signed to a male actor who was born when the Sun was in that half-decan, and the next five degrees, or the last half of that first decan of Aries was assigned to a female, an actress, who was born when the Sun was in that five degrees, and so on, so on, ground the zodiac until 36 men and 36 women, actors and actresses, y ere secured to play the parts of saints in the dramatization of astrological truth, at first called the "mysteries," then in Greece the "Bachanalian mysterics," at Eleusis "the Pagan mysteries," in liome the "orgies," and finally degenerated into church rituals after all knowledge of truth was lost.

The May-pole dance of the ancient English Druiads was a relic and a remnant of the ancient Egyptian organization. In this dance, celebrated about the time the Sun came to the vernal equinox, 36 men and 36 women took part, they being paired of, as partners, the cance consisting of an intricate circling about the May-pole, reprerenting the Sun, the dancers being feigned to move like the rodiacal decars around the Sun. We still have the dances but with all astrolegical significance lost, the fox-trot and the bunny-hug, to say pothing of the shimmy, being now the only representative of what

was once an astrological representation of celestial truth.

The equivalent of this word "saint" was used in the Book of Job. chapter 15, verse 15, where old Eliphaz the Temanite scolds Job for his folly by saying about him, "Behold, he putteth no trust in his saints, yea, the heavens are not clean in his sight." That is, old Eliphaz charged Job with the very greatest folly imaginable in an astrologer, namely, the folly of mistrusting the saints of the zodiac

and of considering the heavens themselves unclean,

A COMPARISON OF THE HOROSCOPES OF SENATOR HARDING AND COX.

The time of birth of Senator Harding is given me, for November 2d, 1865, at 2 p. m., Ohio; for Senator Cox, March 31st, 1870, at 12:10 a. m. Using this data to judge from, I find as folows:

Senator Harding was born with the last degrees of Aquarius on the cusp of the Ascendant; Uranus is the significator or ruling planet and is placed in the sign Cancer, in Trine aspect with Saturn. The Moon in Taurus, its exalted sign, sextile with Uranus, opposite Saturn and going to a Full. Jupiter the Greater fortune, was in Sagittarius, the 10th house, the house of honor semi-square with the Sun. The Sun was in Scorpio conjunction with Mars and separating from a conjunction of Saturn.

Governor Cox has Sagittarius ascending, with Jupiter the signi-

ficator in the sign Taurus separating from a sextile of Uranus. The Sun in Aries in close square aspect to Uranus, and leaving a conjunction of Mars; the Moon in Aries coming to a conjunction of Mars and the Sun, in its last quarter, decreasing in light, separating from a square of Saturn, with Saturn in the ascendant. Venus was leaving a good aspect of Saturn and in its best sign.

The very good points that Senator Harding has, are: Jupiter in the Mid-heaven. The Moon increasing in light, with some good aspects. His Sun with Mars in the night house of Mars gives him executive ability and Mercury in Scorpio, very good use of language. The aspects generally indicate that he is quite secretive and very Politic, smooth, as it were, and very sharp with a very strong

rsychological intluence.

Governor Cox has Fun in Arles, the day house of Mars, which also shows executive ability, and a very strong psychological influence, trains and the Sua in aspect indicate a great deal of determination and much independence, more independent than Senator Harding, and one that would use his own judgment more, and not be dictated to, at the same time, his Mercury square with Saturn and Moon with Mars, does not show that he would have G. Washington's most prominent trait. Saturn in the ascendant has caused many to fall to reach the height of their ambition, and of the many Horoscopes that I have seen with Saturn in the ascendent, they were not a tigdical enemy to the use of alcohol.

The aspect: in their Horoscopes for November 2d, 1920, are unusually strong for both. Mr. Con has an almost exact parallel of the Sun and Jupiter, and Mr. Harding has the Sun in close parallel and coming to a conjunction of Jupiter and also applying to a sextile of Saturn. The Moon in Mr. Harding's Horoscope is trine with Jupiter and the Sun late this year and also coming opposite Saturn. I judge that the aspect to the Sun will be the stronger. The Sun in Mr. Cox's chart is also within 2° of conjunction with Jupiter, his Moon

square with Mars by progressed motion.

On November 2J, 1900 of 6 p. m. Eastern time, when the polls will be closing, the Moon is 5 in Leo, the Sun 10 in Scorpio, Venus 11 in Sanitterius, close to the cusp of the Mid beaven of Mr. Harding's charl and trine with Moon, but his Progressed Moon as stated.

Taking all these indications into consideration, my judgment is that the Radical Horoscope of fir. Harding is somewhat more favorable and will give him the best run for his money that he ever had, and it may be in doubt for some time till all the votes are counted, as to who is elected, and no doubt, much cry of Frank.

A FORECAST.

I am given to understand that the time of birth of the I residental Staminous is as follows: Senater Warren G. Harding was born on Nov. 2nd. 1865, at 2 p. m., and Governor James M. Cox was born a

little after midnight on March 31st, 1870. By my method of Rectification, I get the Senator's birth time to be $2.06\frac{1}{2}$ p. m., and the Governor's birth time to be 0.02 a. m. If the time is approximately correct Senator Harding will be elected, although the contest will be

very close.

Schator Harding has the Third Degree of Piscus rising, which is very nearly the Ascendant 1 get for the signing of the Declaration of Independence. He has Jupiter as his ruling planet in Sagittarius in the Tenth House; his progressed Ascendant is the radical Descendant of my chart for the Adoption of the Constitution; his radical and progressed charts and the planets therein correspond better than do those of overnor Cox, with the charts and the planets therein of the United States of America. Harding has more planetary assistance from Cox than the Governor has from the Senator.

Strange that the Senator's progressed Mid-Heaven and the cusp of the progressed Fourth House should be the progressed Ascendant and the cusp of the progressed Seventh House of the Governor! They are the tenth degrees of the Zodical signs Leo and Aquarius, from which the Sun and Uranus were in opposition on August 2nd.

Governor Cox has the 20th degree of Sagittarius rising at the time of his birth, and he has Jupiter as his ruling planet in Taurus in the Fifth House. All of the planets with the exception of Uranus are below the Earth. He has better Lunar Directions than has Senator Harding in the spring of 1921, but the Senator's Lunar Directions are more in accord with the progressed Lunar Directions of the United States. Finally the Senator's progressed birthday for 1921 is December 28th, which is President Wilson's date of birth. This fact indicates that Senator Harding is President Wilson's logical Successor.

Compare the charts of both men with the charts of the Declaration of Independence and the Adoption of the Constitution, published in my little brochure "Horoscopes of the U.S. A. or Our Nation's True Nativity." Wishing the best man to be our next President, I am Yours truly.

EDITORIAL COMMENTS AND CRITICISMS.

October is considered a fortunate month generally, for one that has lived to October will generally live thru the year and it is safe to say that if your subscription to the Adept is renewed in October, you will not regret it. Remember that You get the Adept Three years for One Dollar.

be sent here. If you have your order in, you will receive it without delay. Fifty cents for them combined or 35 cents for the ephemeris alone for 1921.

In using Horary Astrology, you must not forget that you are supposed to use common or uncommon sense with it. The time to answer a question is when the action starts, or the thought first comes to you. In the question of Elections, the time to use is when the First candidate is nominated. You may consider the time of the adversary if you wish, but it means simply asking the same ruestion twice. The first time is the correct one to use, and the 7th house is the ascendent for the adversary, with its ruler, and the 4th house is the 10th house for the adversary.

The H. C. L. may be coming down somewhat, but so far, it is not very apparent; Uranus passing the opposition of Jupiter, has not made any material difference, it seems to have raised the price of Freight, transportation, etc., but no doubt this will prove detrimental and be changed radically inside of two or three years. Uranus is said to rule Railroads and travel to a great extent, and with Uranus Retrograde when the change took place is against good success for the Railroads. Sugar which is ruled by Venus, has dropped in price since Venus and Saturn came to an aspect, it may advance slightly after a time, but the radical high price is past. Coal ruled by Saturn still advances, and may hold up its high price till Saturn and Uranus come to unfavorable aspects. Labor is ruled somewhat by Saturn and Impiter, and I look for depressions in the price of labor to quite an extent by the latter part of 1921. One thing is sure, The Day for One king in a country has passed another thing, one of great wealth, is a King, for he can controll a multitude of Votes or people, if he wishes to do so, and as long as wealth can be used to influence Votes, so long will wealth rule the world.

In forcasting any business propositions, one should not overlook the aspects that are formed in the Zodiac, regardless of the Horoscope. It would not be wise to predict a very good business for one going into the real estate business, if the aspects generally shows a panicky period even the the individual Horoscope looks very favorable, for one cannot do a large business in a dull period. The average Astrologer overlooks Neptune, because so few of the Text books give its full tendencies as with the other planets. Neptune seems to be of a dual nature, very good under good aspects to some of the planets and very evil under other aspects, only a study of conditions for many years in the past will show just what its nature is.

Occasionally some Reader of the Adept will write us and object to the criticisms that are occasionally published, concerning Christianity, the different religions, etc. "Ye Editor" of The Adept believes

in Toleration to the limit; we know that no two are constituted the same or can think the same or see the same; but when we note what the great majority of the Daily Papers, Magazines, etc., are saying in their comments in regard to Astrology, the Occult generally, we like to see these fellows get some of the same kind of Comments.

The Average Editor of the Daily newspapers generally refer to the Occult, Astrologers, Spiritualists, etc., as "Bunk," Fake, Crooks, or imbeciles. These same papers will condemn the Socialist party on the ground that they have no religion, and in the next breath, five as an excess why the Government cannot run a business for the benefit of the public is because no Honest men can be found to run it. The two great parties that condemn the Socialists the most, spend much of what little time is left, in accusing each other of some kind of crookedness and the Chbristian Churches as a class, take great pains, to class the Spiritualists as imbeciles, etc., and the Spiritualist religion which is as sacred to them as any ones cincers religion can be, as "fake," "free love," etc.

The Adept rives occasionally some of the history of the Christian church, its origin, meaning of its expressions, etc., and in doing this, often refer to some of the unfavorable parts of it. Its hard to speak of come deceifful thing and not speak harsh about it. If we stand by and make no endeavor to defend ourselver, no one will have any respect for us, and it does no harm occasionally to call ones attention to the fact that they have an ugly blotch of mud, right square in the middle of the face, just where their own eyes cannot see it.

If you believe in Voleration, you can certainly tolerate the few remarks that The Adept makes occasionally in regard to some of the relies of Barbarism.

In the British Journal of Astrology he says in discussing the point, "It would appear from this observation that a direction can be possibly better interpreted in terms of the place in which a subject is located at the time than in reference to the place of birth, which fact I have already illustrated in the Manual of Astrology. Indeed, it was from personal experience of this nature when in India that I framed the idea of 'local interpretation.'"

NOTHING NEW.

In many cases it seems quite useless to attempt to tell people what they are not interested in, even though it may be a truth of vital importance to them. Their mind is occupied with some other When a person is interested in some special matter he is under the hypnosis of that particular interest. He generally is impressed with some particular view of that particular matter and it is hard for most people to think except on the line of their own Whatever you may say he is rather disposed to particular view. apply what you may say to his view. If it does not conform to his idea he is apt to reject your idea without any further consideration. In fact, he does not even catch the importance of your idea. is nothing more than an example of misunderstanding. All troubles in life are due to such misunderstandings. The misunderstanding may be on both sides, or it may only be on one side. Politicians are renerally so hypnotized to their own party view or presentation of an issue that they will not even listen to what the other party says, hence, it is uscless to attempt to tell them what they do not want to know.

It is the same in matters of Astrology. There are people whom I have met who do not want to believe Astrology to be true, hence they will seldom listen, and in other cases will actually deny whatever might be said of it, no matter how reasonable the facts might

be or how much proof might be presented.

Only recently I met a man who ranked in his class as a smart business man and considered to be quite intellectual. He said, "If I knew that Astrology was true as you say it is, I would go and jump overboard." "Well," I replied, "If you did, someone would fish you out, or something else would prevent you from drowning, unless it was time for you to be drowned." "Oh, fudge!" he replied, and that was as far as he was able to understand, or to consider the matter, Other people have ways of doing things. It has become habitual with them. If you should attempt to convince them that there was a better or an easier way to arrive at the same result, they would deny or spurn what you offered, because their mind would be so hypnotized to their habitual method that they would not be able to comprchend what you might say. They would not want to know ony better way, because it is "hard to teach old dogs new tricks." So, the world progresses by generations. Old ideas have to die out, and it takes a long time for new ideas to grow. Many of the new ideas of today were born long, long ago, in the minds of dreamers, or geniuses who were laughed at when they presented these ideas. yet the present generation imagine that they produced them. It is very interesting to study out by the law of progressive planets how these new ideas came to develope in the world. Some are pleased to call them "New Thought," When we trace them back to their inception and their slow acceptance, we find them to be Old Thought invariably, but the Old generations were so hypnotized to their old habits that they would not have them so long as they were able to stiver along with their old methods. Very evidently for the nonce Uranus has inverted Laurel Eliza Small into a Lure of Small Lies, and Uranus must have gotten into

Sagittarius temporarily to have so twisted her Mercurial or Gemini pen into launching such a bald and easily exploded theorem.

Tested on a score or authentic births, I find the formula yields Sagittarius but once -and even coincidence would favor the fib once in twelve were not its merit even less than that of chance. even had the rule any virtue it would establish the midheaven to the round degree only—a matter of 240 seconds of time, which is a rather respectable, if distressing, variance from "the exact second."

Of such a piece is the Neptunian honey that drips into print in the name of Astrology honey, sweet and alluring to the indolent only, who feign would make of God a half-wit as simple as them-

selves.

The Adopt readers have too much insight into the operandi of Divine Intelligence at this late day to seriously consider such ridiculous contributions to astrological science as occasionally appear in sorry attempt to emulate the great Swedenborg.

This R. A. M. C. 3410 35 is in the zodiac equivalent to 100 03 Pisces, so my M. C. projected at Cadboro Bay is 100 03 Pisces. My M. C. on Pacific Coast runs from 100 03 Pisces to 100 53 Pisces, covering the different Coast cities I have lived in, viz: Tacomo, Portland, San Francisco, and Vancouver, B. C. Now my Moon at hirth was at 100 22 Scorpio, in my fourth house, making a close trine to my Pacific Coast M. C. In my opinion, this strong aspect has been ONE of the factors in drawing me to the shores of the Pacific for though I have moved away several times, circumstance, destiny, fate, or call it what you will, has always moved me back again. Some of the astrologers of the old school tell me it is because I have Uranus in Cancer, but all persons born from early 1835 into the 70's have Uranus in Cancer and they are not all Fying on sea coasts, or close to large bodies of water, by any manner of means, so that answer is not very convincing!

At San Francisco my projected chart there shows Uranus rising, and it is stendificant that it was there I commenced to study astrology. Previous to that I had never met any one who believed in it

and rarely had heard it mentioned.

I am mentioning these few factors in the problem for there is

fruch more than I have indicated in these projections.

I think it would be of great interest to all progressive astrologer, and students, if Mr. Johndro could be persuaded to give his system more in detail in the paties of The Adept, and give illustrations by use of some one's nativity.

THE STORY OF CHRIST A FICTION. By Prof. Weston.

A correspondent writes to ask what reason I have for supposing that the gestel story of Jesus Christ is a fiction, and in a very brief reply I have add that there are ever two hundred good reasons for taking that story to be a more fiction. It would, of course, be a rether laborious and perhaps thankless task for me to write up the bulk of these reasons, pretty well scattered throughout the literature of fristory, but I can here give a few perfectly well known facts which

should indicate to any sine mind, capable of a little reason, that the Bible story of Jesus Christ cannot possibly be anything else but pure fiction.

The first fact is that the Jewish authorities living at the time of the first publication of the gospels, about the year 78 A. D., branded the story as false and scarcely any Jew, even at this day, can be made to believe it for a moment. It was poloriously false when it first came but and never was believed among the Jewish people at any time.

The second fact is that this very same story of Jesus Christ was published as a fiction by the Greek novelist, Megasthenes, about in the year 300 B. C. Megasthenes called the hero of the novel Herakles, but the whole story was a simple Greek translation of the Hindu story of Krishna. (See article in Itritial Encyclored), on Hindu literature.) Every real scholar is now perfectly well aware of the fact that the Bible story of Jesus Christ is almost absolutely identical in all respects with the older story of Krishna, and the story of Krishna was never pretended to be anything else but a solar myth derived from some of the very common dectrines of Hindu astrology regarding the calendar. Even the story of Krishna itself, as written up about 300 B. C., was a sort of get-off on the still older story of Vishnu, and the whole meas was nothing at all but an allegory connected with early Hindu astrology.

A third fact is that the very best historians of all time up to the end of the second century never once mentioned the story of Jesus Christ in all their extremely voluminous and absolutely exhaustive historical works. These historians were Josephus, Pliny the Second and Seneta of Rome. These men all wrote the history of the Jews and Romans, Josephus up to the year 70 Å. D., and the other two until late in the second century, yet they never even remotely referred to the story of Jesus Christ. Seneca, the great lawyer of Rome and the greatest of all law bistorians, never made any mention of the trial of any Christ before Pilate. He never heard of it.

Hundreds of other facts are known which point directly to a fictitious origin of the gospels of Jesus Christ, and even among the most insane religious fanatics it is now rare to find a real believer in the very shady story regarding the immaculate conception. is because the whole idea of the thing is utterly repugnant to all common reason and the human mind can scarcely ever be forced to adopt it as a fact. No good reason was ever assigned why the thing should be so and no really sane mind can believe that it is so. story of immaculate conceptions had been told of dozens of queer become for many centuries before the beginning of the Christian Era, all of them based on a false idea regarding the older Egyptian astrological doctrines. The Sun was feigned to be immaculately conceived each year at the time of the vernal equinox, by the Egyptian astrologers, but when the common fiction writers got hold of it they made it a man that was immarulately conceived and the religionists who insisted on worshipping something used the propositions in the story for their adverticing rurposes in gaining adherents to their propaginda. It was an old Egyptian solar myth, worked over by the Greek novelists and then adopted by a set of religious propagandists that arose near the beginning of the Christian Era.
Indeed, the best scholars of this day are perfectly well convinced

that this story of Jesus Christ would have been cast aside the same as all other worthless fiction of the kind if it had not been taken up seriously by a Jew, of Tarsus, later named St. Paul. This Jew launched a very powerful advertising campaign in favor of the churches that had lately been established and which even then showed signs of dying out. His very powerful boosting, by means of a series of mphlets, called epistles to the various churches, laid the foundation for a regular advertising movement that has been kept up until the present day. He states in his epistle to the Romans that his work is mainly that of an advertising agent, and in the third chapter of the Epistle to the Romans, at verse 7, he admits that the whole mass of stuff he was giving out was a common lie.

Not only does Paul admit that his own inventions are all lies, but he takes a great deal of pains in several places to impress the fact that the whole of the Hebrew Scriptures are mere allegories. the case where he says the story about Abraham's two wives is an al'egory. Galatians, 4th chapter, 22d verse. The Apostle Peter in his chapter 3 also says the whole of the story of Noah is an allegory.

I say over two hundred such examples tending to prove the falsity of the whole mass of gospel literature could be brought forward, but what is the use after Paul admitted the fact?

THE PRESIDENTIAL POSSIBILITIES.

Governor James M. Cox. born on Thursday, March 31st, 1870,

probably near 12:10 A. M., in Jacksonburg, Ohio.

The Solar aspects ere semewhat in favor of Schator Harding, but, judging the boroscope from an astrological viewpoint, Governor Cox will have the better aspects of the two and will, all political things being equal, be elected. The Sun and Moon p. Jupiter and the Moon sexfile Venus in the governor's horoscope operating during October and November, will be very strong factors for his election, and without bias or prejudice of any kind for, on all political, religious and national and international subjects, fam, as I alway; have been, absolutely neutral. In this turbulent age of so much social unrest, indecision and troubles between Capital and Labor, the Almighty Dollar seems to be at times much more important and powerful than even the influence of the planets. The transits of Jupiter in the Virgo sign will favor Governor Cox, who has Mars in the Taurus sign and Uranus in the Cancer sign, while in Senator Harding's horoscope Uranus will be transiting Fisces, while rules his Ascendant, and Saturn in Virgo, while rules his 7th House, such transits being considered more or less antagonistic to any person's personal affairs and political advancement.

Uranus is entering Pisces, the sign of reform, and for the next seven years reform in various forms will be in the air, Reforms will start, but all such require one or more generations to develop. By the time Uranus again enters Aquarius, in about seventy-five years, we may have a League of Nations that will be something it would be supposed to be; but while we have a system that considers wealth more important than life, we shall have occasional quarrels with other nations.


