

THE SECRET OF HAMID BEY'S MENTAL POWER

E WAS a small man, this giant whom I was to interview, and yet a giant in the most exacting interpretation of the word—a giant not only in physical strength but in control of his highly-developed mental factulies, and he was to prove interesting enough to repay me for the untiring efforts I had to put forth to arrange this meeting. For many years in many parts of the country, I had heard of Hamid Bey. Strange, it seemed to me, that each report I heard of him painted him as a genius in a different line.

"What manner of man can this be," I asked myself, "who seems to be all things rolled into one?" I wondered if there could be truth, to any degree, in the reports of accrediting one man with so many different types of accomplishments. I was soon to discover.

Meeting with Hamid Bey

I first met Hamid Bey at a social gathering made up almost entirely of outstanding personalities. Those present were a cross-section of the upper crust of almost every business and profession. During dinner, which was served late enough for us all to have developed some semblance of friendship, I began as usual my studies. (I rarely miss an opportunity to study in the most interesting of all laboratories—the dining room.)

Before long the "quiet and peace" of the dinner was disturbed by the hostess, who was insisting upon Hamid Bey's eating some wild concoction specially prepared for her honored guests. Simply and firmly he refused it, saying, "I don't care for it. It is not good for my mind or body, therefore why should I burden my digestive organs with its disposal?"

Here truly was one man in a million, and I determined then and there to know more about the workings of a mind that could so gaily and lightly insult his hostess—for in America, is it not an insult to a hostess to refuse to eat what she puts before us, even though it be a little short of deadly poison?

I found him sitting in a studious pose, and was rather taken aback when he didn't rise to greet me. He didn't even engage in the usual American grace of saying how delighted he was to see me. After all, why should he be? It was I who had asked the privilege.

In reading about giants, one would expect the material to deal with men of gigantic physical proportions looking down from great heights on their less fortunate fellowmen; but we are living in a modern era. We find the giants in industry are frequently small men, outstanding professional people need not have large bodies to encompass a great field of scientific research. But there are other qualifications than a huge body necessary to success in any chosen field. I found without much questioning that Hamid Bey knew all of the secrets



of success, not in one field alone but in every line of endeavor that had ever attracted his attention. Hundreds of columns have been written in the newspapers of every language concerning his apparently superhuman ability to withstand pain and bodily torture without injury. Edi-

torial writers have referred to him as a magician. People of less understanding have branded him as a trickster. But he is certainly one of the outstanding men of the age; one of the world's giants, and I made it my business to find out "how he got that way."

My first question was "Hamid Bey, can you tell me why you are so different in your physical and mental makeup from other men I have known?"

He answered, "If I am different, then it is entirely due to the early environmental influences and training I have received, for fundamentally I am just like any other man." He continued, saying "Perhaps a short history of my life would give you a clearer concept of what I mean."

During the hour that followed I heard the strangest true story. I shall attempt to give it in these pages exactly as I heard it, in the hope that it will inspire my readers and give them a deeper appreciation of the true value of clean healthful living and careful eating habits; for as the story goes on, you will see more and more the importance of the "brick and mortar" of the body temple in successful living.

Hamid Bey is best known throughout the world for his astounding feats of physical control, including what has been termed "the living burial." In this ordeal, he has permitted himself to be buried beneath the ground without air, food, or water for a period of eight days.

Hamid Bey's Story

My parents and their neighbors were of the Coptic faith, which is the oldest branch of the Christian religion. In my home the religious laws governed our very existence, our every move, controlled our hopes and ambitions.

When contrasted with the great cities of America, the largest city of Egypt seems primitive and one might say almost uncivilized, but the careful observer will find that these simple folk live, in many respects, nearer to the fundamental laws of life than those who engage in the more or less artificial enterprises of ultra-modern

civilization. For instance, I was taught very early that my particular job was to build a strong healthy body which would permit me to live the clean active life that my parents had planned for me, without becoming a burden upon anyone else.

I was taught that sickness was the price or the penalty one must pay for violation of God's laws, and chronic sickness was an indication of a persistent refusal to obey the requirements of nature. In Egypt, Coptic children are taught to think for themselves. Figuratively speaking, they learn the dangers of fire by being burned and that is their only punishment. (To be continued.)

THE BIRTH OF THE CHRIST

ESUS, like all Lightbringers, symbolizes the individualization and manifestation of the Christ-Consciousness in man. This is not an intellectual process, but the overshadowing and, finally, the embodiment and birth of the spiritual consciousness of the Higher Self or Divine Man in and through the human personality. Therefore, Joseph, who symbolizes the intellect, is not represented as the father of Jesus, for no amount of intellectual activity can generate spiritual consciousness.

Spiritual consciousness comes from above and from within and is not brought forth in the mind, but first overshadows. It then descends from the higher realms of spiritual consciousness into the "cave" of the heart—symbolized by Mary—where it must be nurtured in Divine Love or by the Divine Mother-principle ere it can be brought forth in the life and illumine the consciousness of the personality and seemingly become the son of Joseph—the intellect.

This is the miraculous immaculate birth of the Virgin, because its generation is not mortal but divine, according to the angel's promise: "The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee: therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God." This refers not to a physical child conceived phenomenally without a father, but to the manifestation of the Divine Self, the Christ in us.

The intellect appears to the outer world as the father of the Christ-Consciousness, but is not so in reality, any more than Joseph is represented as actually being the father of Jesus, "Jesus himself...being (as was supposed) the son of Joseph." Yet the intellect (Joseph) is needed to guard, support, protect, and prepare conditions for the manifestation of the Christ-Consciousness, hence must grasp and understand the miracle.

This universal and spiritual interpretation of the story solves the whole problem of the conflicting genealogies of Joseph which would seemingly deny Jesus' spiritual origin, in spite of Jesus' own words: "Ye are from beneath; *I am from above*; ye are of this world: *I am not of the world*."

Even if the genealogies were historically accurate Jesus would still have no legal claim to the literal throne of David, for He was conceived by the Holy Ghost and not by Joseph. And if Joseph were not His father then he could not inherit Joseph's lineage. This spiritual interpretation also explains the seeming failure of the prophecy that Jesus should receive the throne of His father David, "reign over the house of Jacob forever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end."

Literally Jesus never sat on any earthly throne, hence never reigned as a king. But spiritually interpreted He does not need the genealogy of Joseph; for once the Christ-Consciousness is brought forth in the heart it does sit upon the throne of David—Divine Love—and "of his reign there shall be no end" in all our future incarnations.

To all faithful humble hearts who, like the shepherds, have been guarding their flocks—thoughts and desires—through the long dark night-period ere their spiritual unfoldment, there will surely come a time, as surely as Christmas comes, perhaps in their darkest hour, when the heavens of the higher consciousness will open and in a glorious expansion of their consciousness "the angel of the Lord"—the messenger of the Law of Divine Love—will proclaim the coming birth of the Christ-Consciousness in their hearts.

Then will "the glory of the Lord" shine round about them, and they will realize that there is with them a "multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men."

All spiritual prophecies have two aspects: individual and collective. They are first fulfilled in the individual hearts and lives of the few who can grasp their inner meaning and then, as such individuals become more and more numerous, they make it possible for the prophecies to be fulfilled for a whole nation, a Race and finally for all mankind.

Thus far only individually has this spiritual realization prophesied by the angelic host been fulfilled; for mankind has never yet collectively realized its common origin in the Divine and hence its essential spiritual brotherhood. Only the realization of this brotherhood can bring about the peace and good will so long promised by the heavenly host.

Every seeker for the Christ-Consciousness therefore has an individual responsibility in helping to bring about this universal fulfillment of every prophecy concerning His coming through exemplifying peace, good will, and brotherhood in his or her own life.

Everyone who has passed through this stage of development and realization knows in his heart that, since the promise has been fulfilled to him individually, it must ultimately be fulfilled to all.

As the Earth, in its annual journey around the Sun, passes through the

sign Capricorn during December, so is there a corresponding period in the spiritual zodiac of every Seeker for Truth which must be reached and passed ere the birth of the Christ-Consciousness can take place within. Only when this personal experience has been realized and exemplified in the lives of a majority of the worshipers of the Christ can the real Christmass be celebrated which, age after age, the angelic hosts have been waiting to sing, not for individuals alone, but for all mankind.

This experience is realized at various times and in various ways by different types of mind, but once experienced in the heart can never be forgotten.

The birth of Jesus is represented as taking place in Bethlehem—the meaning of which is "the house of bread" the sixth constellation, the harvest mansion, Virgo, whose symbol is a woman with a spike of corn in her hand—because the spiritual birth must take place in the house or center of spiritual nourishment, the heart.

An inn is a place where many passing travelers meet and sojourn for a time and perhaps discuss and argue over the topics of the day. It, therefore, fittingly symbolizes the head or the mind where many passing thoughts stop and sojourn for a time, where they reason and argue and then pass on.

Naturally there is no room in the conflicting vibrations of such an intellectual maelstrom for the tender vibrations of Divine Love (Mary) to find a resting place and to bring forth the spiritual conception, the birth of the Christ-Consciousness.

For were the birth to take place in such company the reasoning faculties would soon argue away the possibility of such a miraculous event ever taking place and so convince the rational mind that we ourselves might doubt that the birth has ever taken place.

Therefore, there is no room in the mind for the Divine Mother. She is forced to go to a center lower down in the body, into the cave of the heart, where she is surrounded by the lower animal centers which are domesticated and are quietly carrying on the functions of the body in peace and harmony, and are willing to recognize and obey the influx of the higher consciousness without argument when guided by Love.

Thus the birth always takes place quietly and in a most humble manner, often while the soul is facing some great decision or crisis or passing through experiences so bitter and painful as to be like the pangs of birth. Then there suddenly comes a great expansion of consciousness, an influx of Divine Light and Love - "the glory of the Lord shone round about" - a realization of the descent of something holy, something outside of and beyond the mind, something transcending the reason and all mere intellectual faculties and functions, like "a multitude of the heavenly host praising God," the illumination of the Christ-Consciousness.

When this new conception has finally been brought forth, we realize that it is too sacred and holy to be exposed to the incredulity, the arguments, and the scoffings of our worldly friends; for, until they too have passed through the same experience, they cannot understand or comprehend it. Therefore, we must not publish abroad to our friends of the outer life the news of this spiritual birth. It must be wrapped in swaddling clothes of silence, meditation, and cherishing love, both to protect it and support it until it has grown strong enough to stand alone.

From another aspect the swaddling clothes symbolize the misconceptions under which the Light of the Christ has been obscured, but which in this new Aquarian Age must be removed through enlightened understanding and realization, so that the Christ Light may shine forth to illumine all mankind.

Once this birth has taken place, it is soon recognized by the shepherds—the love nature—and worshiped by them. Later on it is also recognized by the Wise Men—the higher faculties—who then lay their choicest gifts at His feet. But the birth must still be concealed from Herod or King Desire, who has for so long ruled our lives and who will brook no interference and stop at nothing to continue his reign.

Thus do the selfish desires of the personality and animal man war against and seek to slay the spiritual conceptions which have finally been born in our hearts. But if we keep them wrapped in swaddling clothes they are never captured and slain. The first-born in every heart is a desire to express its joy at the birth, an overflowing enthusiasm to do great things for the Christ, for this mighty love melts our hearts. But

soon Herod — the desires of "the world, the flesh and the devil"— strives to find and kill the child but never succeeds. Although many of the mind-born ideals are killed by a scoffing world, the Christ flees into the darkness of Egypt for a time, only to return in due season.

Only to the shepherds and the Wise Men can the new-born Christ be revealed. And there, in the little manger of our hearts, must we bring Him forth and worship Him in Spirit and in Truth, in silent contemplation and adoration, that He may ultimately ascend and sit upon the throne of David, and that of His reign there shall be no end and in all our future lives.

Let us strive, therefore, to be truly Wise Men, patiently and persistently following the star of intuition through all the trials of the outer life until it finally leads us to His feet.

But the message of Christmas which this Order sends forth is not merely that of the Divine Birth in the heart of the individual, glorious as that is, but also of the Divine Birth for mankind as a whole, the advent of the Christ to humanity in the person of the coming Avatar.

The time of this Cosmic Birth is swiftly drawing near. In fact, the birth pangs of "wars and rumors of wars," of unbrotherliness, antagonism, and conflict which are abroad in the land, and the cosmic disturbances which fulfill the prophecy, are already taking place.

We have a promise to keep and, although this is a New Year and only new and fresh thoughts should occupy our minds, we must take up the matter of this promise under the heading of "unfinished business."

Remember what we talked about in the November issue? First of all you may ask, "Why is it so important now of all times to discuss the requirements of a husband and wife?" And we would answer you in this way: Granted the world in general is chaotic. Why is this so? Because man is functioning in a realm of ignorance.

How can this be alleviated? By proper training from childhood. By creating harmonious environment and directing that which is inherent within the child into channels of expression that are not only for his beneficial development but for the development of all of those who come in contact with him.

How can this be brought about? By realization on the part of the parent of the importance of environment and training. Where does this realization begin? In the contacts of the husband and wife.

After looking through the large end of the telescope, we discover the importance of harmonious marriage and what a stronghold it must come to be. So as we spoke of "The Good Wife" in the November Aegyptus, we will start the New Year by rounding out the nucleus of better things to come by discussing "The Good Husband."

Generally speaking, the same qualifications hold for either husband or wife, with three exceptions — that man's natural place in the household is that of provider, protector, and master.

If such is the natural role of the male, why are there not more instances of this in the family of today? Why the feeble cry on the part of man that woman is asserting herself in too great a degree? There is balance in all things and as soon as man does not fulfill his natural duties his other half must do so in order to create this balance.

Woman does not naturally venture into male provinces of authority until she is thrust there by the lack of power on the part of man. Fundamentally, woman, more primitive than we are willing to acknowledge, longs for a provider, a protector, and a master.

Woman's natural longing is for a home—a home of comfort for herself and family. It is man's duty to supply this home and its support.

Even as we write this we hesitate, when we think of those men who have said they could not find work and who, on the other hand, are willing in their acceptance of defeatism, to complacently agree to support from relief. Or, worse still, those who see their wives leave the house daily for work while they either sit at home or half-heartedly seek employment.

Work can be created, and created by the individual himself. Men and women daily are making their own jobs and making them pay. It takes thought, it takes initiative, and it takes the willingness and force to carry it out—which are more requirements for the "Good Husband."

Be clean and tidy in your appearance, gentlemen. Especially when you go out. Even the brilliant man loses some of his prestige when there are spots on his trousers. We can't all be brilliant but we can be clean.

We women would much rather see your suit a little threadbare than to see grease spots where you have dribbled soup over your vest or sat in the food you have dropped on your chair.

We like the disheveled appearance that goes with hard work and even the resultant grime. But we do not think it necessary, as a general custom for home wear, that you give the appearance of one who has just crawled from under a piston ring.

A good provider is such without

any thought of the act. His joy lies in the doing, not in what people say about him. He makes no play for the grandstand. No matter how great the genius of the man may be, if he is a "wise guy" he is unsound.

To be a true protector of his wife and family, a husband must be loyal. The average man treats every other woman with more courtesy than he does his wife. He must be cautious and yet courageous, for he is a reasoning being and is so physically equipped that he can maintain protection at all times. He must be moderate in all things, considering not so much what is conveniently thought to be right and wrong but as to whether he is creating an over-balance or excess.

In conclusion, in order to make this contact between himself and his wife an immutable basis for community, national, and world-wide growth and development, the "Good Husband" must be a master of his emotional life. Herein lies his weakness or his strength. Master and control are synonymous.

As long as man allows his emotions to engulf him the natural reasoning mind is absorbed and he is an erratic, abnormal individual. There is no stuff here from which to built leaders.

You may consider it a long jump, but it is not—for from "good husbands" come our true leaders of mankind!

THE PRINCIPLES OF APPLIED PHYSIO-PSYCHOLOGY

E NOW visualize the structure upon which this work is built. The foundation rests upon those qualities which are the basis of all true religion:

PATIENCE
RIGHT UNDERSTANDING
HONESTY
PROPER APPLICATIONS
PERSEVERANCE
CORRECT LIVING

You will benefit by this work in accordance with the degree of development of qualities such as the above examples. Your interest in and inclination for this type of work are proof that the capacity to receive great benefit lies within you. Be sure that you realize the fundamental truth. In working, you are using your body as the tool but your nervous system, mind, and emotional nature reap the ultimate reward.

This forms a part of the greatest cultural system ever given to the mind of man. Therefore, receive it with humility and appreciation and be faithful in your work, but do not attempt to directly teach it to others.

As the results develop within you, you will be aware of a new capacity to help others. In giving this help you will merely assist them to live more artfully. The capacity to handle fundamental forces is given only to those who by artful living have earned the right to further knowledge. Many others acquire portions of various practices and use them sometimes

for benefit, but usually with great danger to themselves.

Controls and powers beyond what is regarded as usual are given only as the student develops unselfishness. Thus the work enlarges those very capacities which are necessary prerequisites to it, and this is as it should be.

The first threshold is the recognition of these qualities within the student and serious-minded desire to culture, not for the self alone, but that we may become examples for others to follow.

The second is the posture work which may be called "fundamentals." This is given in a series of five lessons.

The third is movement work which may be called "fundamentals" and is given in a similar series of five lessons.

The fourth is advanced posture study which applies the principles to the elementals — earth, water, fire, air, and ether. These are the qualities and attributes. This may be called "application," and is given in a series of five lessons.

The fifth is advanced movement study which applies the principles to the elementals. This is also called "application," and is given in a series of five lessons.

When these five thresholds are passed, we are equipped with that degree of control of mind, nervous system, and emotional nature which attracts to us the capacity to artfully handle those more powerful forces within us skilfully and with understanding.

However, we do not necessarily wait in attempting some of the deeper work, but advise that it be done gently and with great caution.

Breathing is carried throughout this work. Safe and powerful breathing habits are formed. Advanced breathing is dynamite and should be handled as such. It must always be remembered that the wrong method or application in using these forces does as much harm as the proper method does good. Few, however, carry the controls into breathing or are sufficiently patient to damage themselves badly. Yet we have seen it happen to the unprepared.

The following axioms aid in understanding the work:

1. There are certain places of stiffness in our bodies that ordinarily remain so throughout life. To free these, frees the equivalent faculties of the mind, provided the mind is similarly exercised.

- 2. Ask yourself what would be the effect on a person—on you—if all points were normally flexible, circulation was free throughout all parts of the body, glandular and nerve center activity above average, and so forth. Try to answer these questions. Try to find fault and exceptions to your answers. See where this leads you.
- 3. Body toxins produce stiffness. They must be worked out just as selfishness, greed, vanity, and so forth must be worked out of our lives. but it takes years to rebuild.
- 4. You are activating new and unused nerve centers. These are weak and cannot stand much. But for every nerve center awakened, there is a similar awakening in some portion of the mind.
- 5. Gently force stiffness, but coax soreness.
- 6. It is relatively easy to re-educate some part of the nervous system, but it takes years to rebuild.
- 7. Overdoing is the most serious fault and shows mental immaturity. It is easy to begin with enthusiasm and lose interest. It is an art to know just the right amount of work to do.
- 8. It is necessary at times to work oneself into a "stalmate." When this condition approaches, stop abruptly for a few days. Discouragement, fear, worry, and all the morbid qualities are to be "worked" out and left back of you.
- 9. Plan, therefore, to do only a minimum of work and and let your own interest and energy guide you to do more.

- 10. Develop the consciousness of "when to do and when to stop." Apply this to your daily life.
- 11. In handling the more complicated controls, do grossly and slowly at first, refine later.
- 12. If you do not get results and feel better, something is wrong. Never neglect this condition but call it to the attention of your instructor.
- 13. We learn to direct consciousness into all parts of our body by attention to nerve flow and tension.
- 14. We learn to become our own best friend in doing this work, so that we may apply it in our daily life.

It will be noted in doing the movements that the feeling images which we are building into mantra are very similar in many respects to those used in the elemental posture series. This may cause considerable confusion in the minds of students. They will ask, "Why should we study practically the same type of feeling images throughout both the postures and movements?"

My dear student, if this has gone through your mind, dismiss it instantly. It is not the ability to handle large quantities of images, but to make a single image at a time a definite part of your life.

Why is it that images should be followed through both postures and movements? It is exactly the same principle as reading a person's character from the face. Observation of the face, at rest, gives us a certain

impression of the nature type and character of the person.

We can separate, classify and divide people into various categories by means of this manner of thinking of them. However, in understanding people it is important to watch the face in motion, especially in those motions which the person does not consciously project into his facial expressions. Then we have a much clearer understanding of the manner in which that patient's mind, nervous system, and emotional nature work.

It is absolutely essential to perfect the feeling image first in the posture, and the movement both, then it is taken up in our daily lives to a greater degree.

There will be more fundamental change in your life if you can thoroughly and consistently implant in your mind a new feeling image and carry it throughout your work. First, through the posture; then, through movement; then, through the breathing; then, through the emotional type of control; then as though you go searching about for multiple images, unless by natural endowment you are fitted to handle multiple images at one time.

We regard it safer, more practical, and more worthwhile to perfect, or what we call "nail down" one image thoroughly before we go on with another. However, in our practical work this would be entirely too monotonous for the western mind. Therefore, the images are built in a symmetrically progressing system and returned to again and again in different forms and by different wordings. But they are all the same fundamental images.

They all build up to one final great image which might be called proper living because through the mechanism of proper living we learn proper thinking, proper emotional reaction, and prepare the soil for higher forces to become active within us. Carry out this line of thought. It is worth spending considerable time on.

Remember that we do not discountenance mental dissimilation in this work, but we believe that those ideas are assimilated with the greatest value when they are later on to be put into actual practice in the work we do. We feel very strongly that persons can get their minds tangled up by over-balance of continual reading and thinking along lines which mean little or nothing to them from the practical standpoint.

The correspondence course lessons are not built along this type of thought. We can now tell you something which would not have been accepted earlier. Every single idea put into these lessons is simply a means of more clearly comprehending the thought in your correspondence course and has directly originated from that course.

MANTRAM

The breath flows in rhythm—exhale on compression or tension inhale on expansion.

MOVEMENT SERIES I

- On back—alternate to abdomen. Student lies on back and draws the right knee as far up toward the stomach as possible, bending the knee. The leg is then straightened out reversing the movement, and then the left leg is used in a similar manner.
- 2. Standing—Bend at the level of the umbilicus, forward and backward. The student places hands on hips and bends forward and backward, making certain that the hips do not move, but that all movement is from the mid-point of the abdomen or the level of the navel.
- 3. Monkey Walk The student stands and bends forward, touches the tip of the fingers to the floor in front of the toes. The hands are used in a similar manner to walking, arms kept straight until the body stretches forward in the snake pose. This is then reversed until the body stands upright again.
- Head Bends and Twists. The shoulders are held steady, the head is bent forward, backward, to each side and turned to either side.

Two meetings are held every week. Every Thursday evening at 8 o'clock meetings are held which are open to everyone.


On every Friday evening at 8 o'clock all memebrs of the correspondence course, known as the Inner Group, meet for study of the lessons.

Answer to Question 1
