PHILOSOPHY AND PHENOMENA BY J. H. PRATT.

If every man could understand the use and purport of thinking and think, it would unloose from the thrall of his enslavement, imposed upon him by the dogmatized theorems of assumed finished thought, and imposed too by the propagaudists of theorems as rank a capitalism as corporate and monopolistic as any granted to the feudal lords in the mediaval periods of our era. In the foregoing paragraph I have stated the consequences of unthinking by the great mass and its proxied effects by others thinking for them, and now I will define what is thinking by the appropriation of two paragraphs from a late article in the Kansas City Journal, from the pen of R. T. Van Horn. To me it is the best definition that my attention has been called to. It reads as follows:

"Thinking is the method by which we manifest our consciousness that we are not what we are capable of being. In another sense it is a sign of development and progress. "Mr. Pratt: I am a maiden who in disguise lead an army of nearly 5,000 men. I could not read nor write at that time, but have learned since coming to spirit life. They burned my body at the stake in the streets of Rouen, May 30, 1431, but my spirit freed from the body still lead the army on to victory and in 1453 the war was practically libred. If you cannot tell who I am I will tell my name at the next scance."

William Denton, who was well known to Mr. Nixon, was the first tostand by the stand and write, writing a message of thirty lines across the face of the tablet, and which was written at the rate of five hundred words a minute, next to write was the spirit Dr. Reed, Step by step we have increased the writing at the table in full view of all, vriting the following message:

"There is not one of you here this evening that can comprehend the marvelous change taking place in the philosophy of Spiritualism. Talking and writing as you may of the progressive development, it is at this juncture of the irrepressible conflict between Spiritualism and religion that a new philosophic light will burst upon the world, a light so intense that it will daze the skeptic for some time and then cause his heart to leap with joy over the triumph over religion." Signed by Reed, Prof. Hare, E. V. Wilson, Sam Smith, Abe. Lincoln.

Each of these signers stood materialized in full form before us, we witnessing the signing of their names, their disparity in size, gestures, and the individuality of the autograph of each. All the manuscript of spirit writing I describe is open to the examination of the doubting and curious. Nothing I state of phenomena need be taken on the weight of mere credulity. Our circle of inquiry is composed of men whose minds rest on an inductive philosophy. I. H. Nixon reports the phenomena of each one of these intellectual seauces at the following, when it is read, discussed, amended if thought to be in error, and then accepted by the full vote of the

Dwight L. Moody is a sensation wherever he goes. He has the personal qualities to inspire interest and enthusiasm. even though he mock at reason and mutilate moral sense. Mr. Moody is now in Buffalo, creating a wide interest, even among cultured people who in the quiet of home marvel at the absurdities put forth as authority, and the extravagant claims made for such a pseudo-religion. But he mixes much truth and good sense with the fiction and folly of his creed.

Brother Montague gave a sketch of his experience with the famous Evangelist, from which the heading of this article is taken.

His aged mother desired to meet Mr. Moody and take him by the hand-which might be a talisman and stay to her spir itual condition, trembling at the verge of the great mystery. Some interesting experiments have recently been made in Denmark in fellcumference.

At the recent meeting of the American Street Railway Association the belief was expressed that it was the last convention at which horse traction would ever receive serious consideration, as electricity in one form or another was bound to replace the horses.

Soundings in the Black Sea show that beyond a depth of 600 feet the water is so impregnated with sulphuretted bydrogen gas emanating from decaying animal and vegetable matter that living organisms are not found there.

The best pictures so far taken of the moon show that parallel walls, whose tops are no more than 200 yards or so in width, and which are not more than 1,000 or 1,200 yards apart, are plainly visible.

A hotel has been erected in Hamburg having a facade made of paper. Doors made of paper are said to be superior to those made of wood.

The Skill of Ancient Builders.

A personal inspection of the pyramids of Egypt, made by a quarry owner who spent some time recently on the Nile, has led him to the conclusion that the old Egyptians were better builders than those of the present day. He states that there are blocks of stone in the pyramids which weigh three or four times as much as the obelisk on the embankment. He saw a stone whose estimated weight was SSo tons. But then the builders of the pyramids counted human labor lightly.

They had great masses of subjects upon whom to draw, and most of their work was done by sheer manual labor and force. There are stones in the pyramids thirty feet in length, which fit so closely together that a penknife may be run over the surface without discovering the break between them. They are not laid with mortar, either. There is no machinery so perfect that will make two surfaces thirty feet in length which will meet together in unison as these stones in the pyramids meet. It is supposed that they were rubbed backward and forward upon each other until the surfaces were as similated.

I have before me a little book with the above title, by Florence Kelley Wischnewctzky, and published by the Wocago. As its name implies, in its pages may be found statistics regarding child labor in the United States. The wrong and evil resulting therefrom is also plainly set forth. I would that it could be read by every one in our broad land, for there must be a woeful ignorance on the subject. If the extent and enormity of child labor were generally known, I am sure it would not be allowed by the American people. That the children of the poor are oppressed and unjustly treated is evident. They are dealed the privileges and pleasures of childhood, set at hard work from their earliest recollection, what chance have they of education or time for the many games of child prostitute them, and, in many instances, hood. They know absolutely nothing of that period of human life that should be the most careless and happy. It is also during these years that nature builds up and perfects her growth in the human ployed in these saloons? The following is the sworn testimony of eigar workers, taken from the same report: "All children in tenement house eigar factories work. In the busy season any number ping and preparing tobacco; their age range from five to fourteen; they work from eleven to fourteen hours a day, sometimes more. The physical appearpauper schools that Dickens describes in England. When we take into consideration that they are to become the future mothers of the Republic, it bodes no good to the coming generation of workingmen."

This little book also tells us that children are employed in cruller bakeries, starting for these places at eleven o'clock at night and remaining there until four in the morning; they are from thirteen years old down to nine.

I would like to give the reports of the various factory inspectors as found there. showing the evils of child labor in those industries, for it is most cruel and atrocious, but space forbids. What I have recorded is but little of the inhuportion of the children of the poor. If we, as a people, are callous and indifferent to their hard and miserable fate, if for the sake of humanity and justice we do not arise in all the strength of a righteous cause and demand that they shall have the privilege of education and the opportunity to attain healthy man and womanhood, if we do not do this from a sense of justice to the children, try, our country, of which we are so pends upon the children. Let us assure Ignorance breeds immorality and crime, while knowledge leads to wisdom.

Yet no one can blame him that he should feel that his duty to himself and family should outweigh his duty to the cause he loves and adorns.

A few of our speakers are comfortably maintained and manage to accumulate a little each year, but none of them receive a compensation commensurate with their abilities or the amount of good they do. Brother Howe himself one of the most noble minded and amiable of men, and one of our oldest and ablest speakers as well, has, if I am not mistaken, been tempted more than once to turn his talents in other directions because of the hardships that constantly attend the path of the public worker. Three times has the writer of this article left the pub-lic field in discouragement and sought gether with a manuscript of parchiment, and to employ what little ability he possesses in secular pursuits, and each time was he forced back upon the rostrum by his spiritual influences and circumstances over which he had no control.

As I have already said, societies will not engage speakers for a longer period than a month and some demand a change every Sunday. Such a plan is not only unjust to speakers, but is, I am persuaded, injurious to the cause as well. It is unjust to speakers because it deprives them of anything like a home life and fills their minds with the worry which comes of constant change. It is injurious to the cause, it does not inspire the speaker with the local interest which a longer residence among his congregation will bring. Then, again, the unsettled state of mind produced by such conditions is inimical to the best work of which he is larged in the Holy Land it must be with the

I believe that the practice of settling speakers for at least six months or a year would be a grand step toward placing Spiritualism on a sound and permanent basis. They would then be freed, for a time at least, from the constant apprehension under which they labor, could settle down to the enjoyment of domestic life, and save the money which now goes to enrich the railroad companies.

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
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
