PHOSPHOROUS, OR WHAT? A strange story connected with the illness of the Rev. Thomas MacMasters has just come to light. The reverend gentleman is 83 years of age. He was stricken with paralysis on Saturday night. His venerable wife says he returned from a walk about 8.30 in the evening and sat down on the side of the bed. Almost immediately he was stricken with paralysis.

"He began to smile," she says, "and there came about his head a halo as if of fire so bright that it illuminated the room and transfigured his countenance. I called for assistance and my daughter, Mrs. Joseph MacMasters, and a neighbor, Mrs. Jarvis, came into the room. Both were terribly frightened at the bright halo of fire which surrounded my husband's head, and they fled."

The younger Mrs. MacMasters says the halo had the appearance of a luminous cloud about the old gentleman's head. It extended above him for a few inches and reached from shoulder to shoulder. "It resembled dancing sunshine, but as it happened during the evening, it could not, of course, have been that," is the way she tells it. The halo is said to have lasted until the old man was laid on the bed, when it vanished.

A reputable physician, who was told of the occurence, says the supposed halo is easily explained by the presence of phosphorous in the old man's hair.

PREMONITION OF DEATH. A noteworthy incident of the premonition of impending calamity is afforded in the case of Lewis P. Heller, of Potterville. Pa, the Reading Railroad engineer who was killed in the passenger wreck at Tuckerton. Sunday was Heller's day off, and on that day he visited his uncle, Mr. Lowis Beyel, at Tamaqua. In the afternoon, while conversing with a cousin of his, Mr. Lance Fairer, he declared that he felt he ought not go to work next day (Monday), but should instead remain with his uncle at Tamaqua. He added.

"Beyel, I shall probably never see you again. You may die before me, and yet there's no telling. I may die before you. If you just say so I'll telegraph to Pottsville and have a man take my place on the engine to-morrow."

Fuirer assured Heller that it was foolish to talk that way, and that there was no necessity for his remaining. Heller accordingly returned to Pottsville in the evening. Before leaving home in the morning Heller bade his wife good-bye twice, and then started off to the engine house. But he had walked only a block when suddenly he turned and came back to say good-bye once again. He tapped on the sitting room window with his hand to attract his wife's attention, and when she looked up he waved her a salute and bade her good-bye the third time. On the way to the engine house he called farewell to a number of friends and acquaintances. They now recall the circumstance as an unusual occurrence. Lewis P. Heller's brother George was freman on the same engine with him, and he relates that Lewis appeared very much depressed during the early part of the run to Tuckerton. An impending calamity seemed to fill him with a superstitious dread which he could not shake off. When the crash came Lewis P. Heller was instantly killed and George was seriously injured. The latter is now reported as improving at the Reading Hospital.

Another brother, James Heller, also an engineer runs an engine on the Reading Railroad between Philadelphia and this city. On the fatal morning, during the trip from Philadelphia, James says he felt strangely and unaccountably agitated. At 10 o'clock, the very hour at which Lewis P. Heller was killed and George was injured at Tuckerton, James grew very nervous, as he now relates, and every throb of the engine as it sped up the valley annoyed and unnerved him. He felt positive that something had happened, and was bowed down with apprehension. When, however, the news reached him that one of his brothers was killed and the other injured, he bore the shock with remarkable calmness, and

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



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

No policeman has a right to arrest without a written warrant, based upon oath, save for felony seen, or upon accusation of some one who saw it, or for misdemeanor or breach of the peace there must be blows or weapons drawn, or menaces or cries which show the beginning of an affray. Mere singing, laughter, and noises of like character are not offences, and do not justify police interference either by threat or the use of force. No counter-threat of resistance to the officer, if he without cause threatens to use force, will amount to an affray which will justify an arrest; for the offense must arise before he threatens or offers force, and he cannot, by his own menance of illegal violence, provoke an affray to justify an arrest; for in such case he himself creates the breach of the peace. He has no right to interfere at all, and if he does so, the citizen may de-

## NATIONAL ELECTION LAW.

The principal features of the election caucus committee may be summed up as follows:

Chief supervisor of elections in judicial districts are charged with the execution of the law, which is to apply to federal elections in citics of 20,000 inhabitants or upward, and in entire congressional districts exclusive of such cities upon application to the supervisor of 100 voters, or in counties or parishes form, a part of congressional districts upon aplication of hity voters. Crowds are reported along the line congressional vote, which is to be ap-pointed by the United States circuit court. The board is to convene on No-vember 15 each year and is to declare and certify the result of the election.

Such patriotism cannot but be admired; but the Democrats, also American citizens, on the other hand, call it a "forceremain in power. Be it as it may, it is a pity that such measure must be resorted to in a land of a liberty to have internal peace. There is nothing to commend it, yet it cannot be condemned, and therefore must remain a matter of opinion and experiment. It is a dangerous law to have on the statute, for it can be used against Republican as well as Democrat; should the latter ascend to power again.





## BEAUTY AT THE EASEL.

The Fair Copyists Who Haunt the Art Galleries and What They Do.

When the Pan-Americans visited the Metropolitan Art Museum, of New York, they were visibly impressed by many of the really wonderful things shown them by their guides, but candor compels the often fixed upon the pretty women copypaintings usually copied: ing the masterpieces in the various galleries than upon the masterpieces themselves. They also showed a marked disposition to ask the fair copyists about Coninck. the particular, picture before which the latter had placed their respective easels, and utterly neglected the polished gertlemen who stood at the elbows of the visitors for the express purpose of giving such information. Having learned all they cared to about the paintings, they proceeded to question the copyists about Makart. themselves, betraying a far livelier interest in the living subject than in the Brother and Sister, by William A. lifeless figures on the canvas. It is not Bouguereau. at all strange that this was so. These The Old Oak, by Jules Dupre. same women-and the men, too, for that matter-are far from being the least attractive feature of the Art Museum to those who visit it on Monday and Tuesday. Their work is, of course, confined to the galleries of paintings, the specimens of statuary possessing no attractions for the imitative sculptor. The rules of the institution allow only two days in the week, the two upon which the attendance is the lightest, for the taille. benefit of the copyists. The number is necessarily restricted, the greatest at any one time entitled to the privilege being about one hundred and fifty. The average daily attendance is about twenty-five. four-fifths of them being women. They work from ten o'clock in the morning until five in the evening, and work very hard indeed during that time. Most of them are students, but a fair proportion are there for the purpose of transferring from one canvas to another the work of a master hand and brain at the instance of some art-loving customer who is not able to pay the sum demanded for an original work of merit, but wishes to have in his salon at least a good representation of such a work. The visitor who has been through the art galleries of Europe is at once struck with the contrast between the copyists he has seen there and those he sees here. On the other side they are usually a shabby, down-st-the-heel set, most o whom, having met with dire failure in the studio, are driven by sheer necessity to make copy after copy of the work of some more fortunate artist, an occupation in which they wearily drag away their lives. Here the copyists are neatly, even smartly dressed, bright-eved, quick witted and full of hope. The women are all pretty, and the men rather prosperous looking. One looks in vain for the long hair, attenuated limbs, velvet cont and slouch hat of the typical artist, and finds instead the sturdy limbs, the sack coat and derby hat of commerce, or the slender waist, bright eyes and sunny hair of young womanhood. The workers are scattered all through the big building, but by far the largest number are in that portion of it which is occupied by the Wolf collection. Strolling from one gallery to another, occasionally stopping to look over the shoulder of some of the busy ones, is a tall, kindly faced man, who seems to and does exercise a supervision over them all. 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



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
