In 1876 she published in two large octavo volumns, "Isis Unveiled" a statement and defense of theosophy; in 1888, the first two volumes of a work entitled The Secret Doctrine, the Synthesis of Science, Religion and Philosophy:" in 1889, "The Key to Theosophy," and also 'The Voice of Silence." She also started in London a theosophical magazine called "Lucifer, the Light Bringer," Mrs. Annie Besant being her assistant. Her tireless pen has also been active in contributions to three theosophical reviews published in France.

Madame Blavatsky was a Theosophist and not a Spiritualist. There is scarcely anything in common in the two philosophies of life. That she, at one time, was a Spiritualist is true, but that she discarded its philosophy for what is now known as Theosophy, is clear from her writings. # THE INSANITY OF SANITY.

There is an added emphasis to our recent comments upon the late imprisonment of Anna Dickinson in a mad-house on the charge of insanity, in a very recent case in Massachusetts.

A Mr. J. W. Shaw, of Woburn, had a very severe illness resulting in gastric troubles which prevented the digestion and assimilating of food, forcing him to restrain himself from its use. His physicians could not deal successfully with sis of its character. They insisted upon his eating when the condition of his system made it a horror of pain. When he Two specialists were sent for from Boston, who, having heard the statements of the two doctors, made a brief examination of the patient pronounced him insane, received their fees of \$25 each, and he was taken to the McLean hospital. He was received there by two doctors and a judge of some court; was asked to describe his feelings, but being weak referred the questioner to his doctor. That opened the doors of the madhouse and shut them also, behind him. The two doctors who ordered his incarceration never saw him before, and the only ground of their judgment of insanity was that he would not eat. Poor fellow; he could not!

The young man was soon "discharged cured." A large number of citizens of Woburn, including the mayor, his clergyman, his neighbors, all knowing him the records of the asylum in his case, but the application was refused repeatedly. A legal suit may grow out of it.

The case is a fitting commentary upon the late attempt of the Medical Society of Massachusetts to secure the passage of a law conferring class rights of practice for their members and the legislature honored itself in denying their peition, by a vote of nearly two thirds in the House against it.

The futility of attempting to convince minds of different calibre by the same processes of demonstration has over and over again been proven. On Saturday April 18th, at noon Mr Edson, president of the First Spiritualist Society, and a committee of three carpenters and builders made the examination. The carpet was taken up, and the floors which have been laid mitted and signed by M. C. Edson, Pres. about twenty years, found to be in their primitive condition. The 7 inch base. board was found to have been untampered with, and the walls were solid, and the paper upon them intact. I enclose herewith the certificate given by this committee and also one signed by the President and Vice President of the Society, and by eight of the committee of investigation. It should be remembered that the seance was not held for the purpose of fully identifying any spirit or spirits who might appear on the occasion, but simply to prove that neither Mrs. Ross nor any confederates produced the manifestations. This was clearly proven. Mrs. Ross, by her cordial submission to a very crucial form of test has nobly vindicated herself. On Sunday night last Mrs. Ross held a materializing seance at the house of Dr. Wheat, one of the many persons converted to our faith through her mediumship. The circle was composed of the doctor's own family and ten persons invited by them. The bay window lined with dark stuff and curtained by a portier served as cabinet. Mrs Ross attired in a close fitting walking dress, entered the cabinet a little after So'clock. Almost immediately little Patience Adams, or "Patie" as she calls herself, appeared and announced that she was coming bye and bye to fulfill a promise made to the doctor the evening before, which promise was that she would come out of the cabinet and sit in a little child's chair provided for the purpose. Thus, latter on she did. As she seated herself she laughed merrily and said she could rock if it was not a rocking chair, and then tilted back and forth, and sang a bed song. Her voice was clear and sweet and infantile. She was quite visible to those who sat near, a little child of apparently five or six years, clad in white. She remained out a little longer than the force held and so disappeared in front of the cabinet, the chair falling over as she dematerialized. Quite a number of materializations presented themselves, differing from each other in individuality and all of them recognized by one or other of the circle. Ross, at her seance room on Monday evening, April 13th 1891, at the request of a committee representing the local Society. We agree that the test conditions were absolute. and were all that the committee desired. The medium besides being locked securely in the wire cage was placed in a large sack, gathered with strings at the top snugly about the mediums throat the ends of the strings passed through the wire meshes of the cage, and securely sealed on the outside to a corner post. The doors of both parlors and the shutters and windows of the seance room were securely sealed. The washboards, carpets and walls examined, two of the committee with lamp in hand examined the floor of the seance room from the kitchen below. The carpenter who made the wire cage was present and stated to the committee that it had not been tampered with, thus disproving the statements set affost in regard to it. #### SPIRITS PHOTOGRAPHED.

Below we present the statements of Messrs. Buddington and Nixon in regard to a photograph which many of our citizens have seen purporting to be the likeness of a spirit form. It is not conclusive evidence that spirits come to this world and permit themselves to be photographed-except to those who saw every detail of the performance and know positively that no jugglery or deception was used in making the photo graph. As only Mr. B. and N. witnessed it-to them only is it of scientific value. However, it makes interesting reading and we give our readers the benefit of their investigation and statements.

On the 7th day of April, 1891, about the hour of 3 o'clock p. m. I went to the photo gallery of Mr. T. C. Buddington in Spring Hill, Kan., obtained from him a Cramer sensitized photo plate which I saw him take promiscuously from a box of plates in his dark room with only the ruby light of course. Mr. Buddington placed a private mark on said plate, put the plate under cover and gave it to me. I took the said plate immediately to the photo gallery of Mr. W. W. Aber some three squares distance had him go with me into the seance room and focus his camera properly on me as a target, leav-Aber go with me into his ruby light room. He there took his plate holder showed me that it was empty, and plainly in the ruby light I placed that plate in the plate holder, shut up the holder with the slide. took the holder to the camera in the seance room put it in proper position in





St. Louis-Through the efforts of your kind and earnest medium, Mrs. Sheeban, Miss Jennie B. Hagan, J. 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

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
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
