CHRISTOPATHIAN PHILOSOPHY.

BY LEVI D'GURU.

INITIAL STATEMENT.

Christopathian Philosophy is the philosophy of the Christ as presented to the world in his teachings and life. It is not a system of theology; it is not a formulated creed; it is not a code of ecclesiastical laws; it is not a ritual. All these things are of human origin. The Great Teacher never authorized any such expediences; on the other hand, he often expressed a contempt for such things. He gave but few positive commands. To give the world an exalted conception of universal truth was his mission. He enunciated the underlying principles of right and wrong, and placed men in position to "work out their own salvation."

Christopathian philosophy is a re-statement of the teachings of the Christ—a re-statement given by inspiration, and constitutes the essential elements of the religion of the Empire of Universal Peace, which is, at the present time, being instituted.

The inability of men to govern themselves has been demonstrated and the days of overturning all earthly forms of government, referred to by Ezekiel (Chap. 21), have come, and the kings are now living and the Universal Empire work is now being done which Daniel, the Hebrew seer, described in language as follows:

"In the days of these kings shall the God of heaven set np a kingdom that shall never be destroyed; and the kingdom shall not be left to other people, but it shall break in pieces and consume all these kingdoms, and it shall stand forever."— Dan. 2:44.

All over the world the spirit of the Universal Empire of Peace is permeating the masses, and thousands of progressive teachers are being evolved. A large per cent of them, however have assumed to be themselves supreme, and have relegated the rightful head, the Christ, to the dominion of shades, and many even attempt to consign the idea of God to the tombs of superstition. The falacy of these efforts is apparent. The Christ himself hath now spoken, and the works of all false teachers must be gathered into bundles for the burning, and, together with the superstitions, dogmas, creeds, rituals, and all the ceremonial systems of ecclesiasticism, must be consumed in the rays of the rapidly rising Sun of Righteousness. Christ is Lord, and is coming to the throne of the Universal Empire of Peace, and "before him every knee shall bow, and to him every tongue shall confess."

To the noble few teachers who recognize the authority of the Emperor and have bowed to the Divine will, the message of the angel with the everlasting gospel comes sweet and clear, "Go ye forth and teach," and the benediction of the Universal Spirit is resting upon them.

BASIC PRINCIPLES.

MAN IN EVOLUTION.

I. UNIVERSAL SPIRIT.—Before the beginning of organized forms Universal Spirit existed, which was and is and ever shall be omnipresent. Psalms 139:5-12.

2. Father and Mother.—Universal Spirit is one and inseparable, the center and source of all being, the father and mother of all spirits, and the evolving center of all forms.

3. TRINITY.—As light is one and yet a trinity of colors, red, blue, and yellow, so Universal Spirit is one, yet a trinity of attributes, Love, Will, and Intelligence.

4. BI-SEXUAL.—Universal Spirit is neither masculine nor feminine, but bi-sexual, possessing all the powers of genesis

and evolution. Paternal Intelligence and Maternal Love, united by the fire, the Will, comprised the elements of primal existences.

- 5. SPIRIT OF MAN ETERNAL.—In the ocean of Universal Spirit rested from all eternity, in glory, the germ of every spirit that should be evolved into a distinct living entity, so that, like the first born, the Anointed, all spiritual beings "had a glory with the parents before the worlds were evolved."
- 6. The Great Breath.—The masculine and feminine elements of Universal Spirit—Intelligence, the magnetic positive force, and Love, the magnetic negative force—were manifestations of spirit life and constituted the outgoing and incoming movements of that life, the inspiration and expiration—the Great Breath.
- 7. MATTER ETERNAL.—Something was never evolved out of nothing; nothing was ever created; hence matter, like spirit, is eternal.
- 8. EVOLUTION OF INDIVIDUAL SPIRITS.—When Universal Spirit breathed out, threw out, the masculine positive magnetic force—Intelligence—it met upon the fecundating fields the feminine negative magnetic force—Love, and all spirit germs arose from their eternal resting places and began the mystic journey of evolution.
- 9. FORM GERMS.—Without a body, an envelopment, there could be no individualization, no conscious existence, and Universal Spirit breathed, and the universe was filled with a material ether, so exceedingly fine that it seemed but little inferior to the substance of the ocean of spirit; and this was the ether of soul substance, and in it lay at rest the germs of every form, not only those of the soul-bodies to clothe the evolving spirit germs of men and angels, but of every form on every plane of life soon to be projected through lower ethers.
- 10. EVOLUTION OF SOUL.—And Universal Spirit breathed and the soul-plane—the psychic ether—was peopled with its myriad life-forms and the spirits of evolved men were clothed with soul bodies, and the mystic machinery of mind was evolved. This soul-body of man was the universe in miniature, and the individualized spirit found a place of abode.

And it was thus that the Great Spirit "breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living soul," not a living physical body. Individual consciousness was evolved, and the intricate machinery of psychic mind was set in motion.

- of Intuition; not the plane of Reason. Men have called the soul-body "the subjective entity," and the name is well chosen. The mind of this subjective entity acquires all information intuitively, and, like Universal Spirit, it never reasons, so that the logical processes of deduction and induction are unknown to the soul.
- 12. EVOLUTION OF PRANA.—And Universal Spirit breathed, and from the soul-plane a wonderful ocean called Prana was evolved. Five grades of ether constitutes this pranic universe, each adapted to the requirements of one of the so-called senses:
 - 1. Sonoriferous ether, to evolve sound.
 - 2. Tangeriferous ether, to evolve touch.
 - 3. Luminiferous ether, to evolve sight.
 - 4. Gustiferous ether, to evolve taste.
 - 5. Odoriferous ether, to evolve smell.
- 13. EVOLUTION OF FORMS.—From this measureless prana sprang, as by magic, world, and systems of worlds, and by slow processes of evolution every form in the physical realm became manifest.
- 14. EVOLUTION OF HUMAN FORMS.—But there was no evolved recognized head over the intelligences, and the Great Spirit said, "Let us make man to have dominion," and it was done. And that man might exist upon every plane of his patrimony, Universal Spirit breathed, and the "living soul" became a living body, and was a manifested entity upon the physical plane.
- 15. COURT OF INQUIRY.—But the pranic ethers were too coarse to permit the free course of Intuition, and man's opportunities for gaining knowledge were most meager, and Universal Spirit instituted in the brain of man a Court of Inquiry, and Reason became the advocate and Will the judge.

and by inductive and deductive processes a comparatively broad field of information was opened.

- 16. Laws.—Because of the varying degrees of fineness of the ethers of each plane of existence the same code of laws could not be universally applied, and, hence, laws for each plane were enacted. Laws of spirit applied only to spirit; laws of soul applied only to soul, and laws of the physical applied only to physical forms. On the spirit-plane the measurements of time and distances were not known; but when matter was introduced into ether and the soul-plane was evolved, both time and distance must be taken into account. Though soul may travel faster than light, its speed can be measured, and time must be considered. Pranic ethers are many times coarser than that of the soul-plane, and locomotion is correspondingly slower. All things move in accord with the rate of locomotive vibration, and a code of physical laws was a necessity. So-called physical science takes into account only the laws of the physical plane, and as the origin of things lies far beyond all pranic ethers, physical science can be only a superficial statement of facts, and not a science at all.
- 17. MAN A TRINITY.—Man is a triune being; yea, he is three in one, and still each one is a distinct personage. The seers of all ages have recognized the existence of BODY, SOUL, and SPIRIT. Paul in 1 Thess. 5: 23, says: "May your whole person—the SPIRIT AND THE SOUL AND THE BODY—be preserved blameless in the presence of our Lord Jesus Christ."
- and the consciousness of the body act independently of each other, in fact are subject to different laws; but by culture they may come into correspondence. While the soul finds its habitat in the body, it may go out and return. The historian tells us that when Elijah brought back to life the son of the widow who had so graciously ministered unto his wants:

"He stretched himself upon the child three times and cried unto the Lord and said, O Lord, my God, I pray thee, let this child's soul come into him again."—1 Kings, 17:21.

Paul sent this expressive message to the Colossians:

"Though I be absent in the flesh, yet am I with you in the spirit, JOYING AND BEHOLDING, your order and the steadfastness of your faith in Christ."—Col. 2:5.

Read, also, Paul's wonderful story of his soul's visit to the third heavens, while his body remained on earth.—2 Cor. 12.

ARTICLE III.—THE BREATH OF GOD.

4. VAYU TATWA OR GASES.—This is the aerial plane where the substance is gaseous,—Oxygen. Hydrogen, Nitrogen, Air, Carbonic Acid, etc. In man its habitat or home is the lungs. It is called by scientists the critical state of matter.

- 5. Tejas Tatwas or Semi-Solids-Luminous.—It is the essence of gross matter,—mortar, mucous, jelly, ice, etc. In man its habitat, or correspondence, is in the muscles, ligaments, and sinews. On the exterior manifested on the legs above the knees to the body and across the shoulders.
- 6. Apas Tatwas or the Gross Ether-Liquid Air,—water, oil, milk, blood, etc. These are the watery or liquid substances or forces. The corresponding part in man is the blood, liquids, etc. On the exterior it is manifested on the ankles, abdomen, and jaws.
- 7. PRITHIVIC TATWAS OR SOLIDS,—rocks, earthy substances, wood, minerals,—the lowest of all.

In man the corresponding part is the periosteum, the bottom of the feet and the bones. This is the terrestrial force.

In the center of the above illustration place man's head, and his feet at the outer edge of the circle and all will be made clear.

Man's seven-fold nature corresponds to the septimal division of time: Sunday is the beginning of the week as Atwa is the beginning of the tatwic forces. Saturday is the end of the week as the solids are the completion of the vanous forces. Sunday corresponds to the beginning of life, (zone or atwa) and the other days to the progress.

The same law prevails as to years, i. e.: if life is limited within fifty years, we have a period of seven sevens for the first cycle.

The first seven years, or the beginning of life in this body, is a period of physical weakness and growth, and the protecting influence of parental love is needed. This is the Sunday period and corresponds to Atwa,—in other words physically weak, but spiritually strong.

The second, or Monday period, from seven to fourteen, is a period of more active and vigorous development, under the same protecting care, yet further from it. The PINEAL GLAND begins to grow at seven and rarely before, and by fourteen it is unstable but vigorous.

The third, or Tuesday period, from fourteen to twentyone, is a period of still greater vigor, still assisted by protection. At the end of this period, if properly developed, the child can rely on himself.

The fourth, or the Wednesday period, from twenty-one to twenty-eight, is a period of struggle, without protection; consequently of care and trouble.

The fifth period, from twenty-eight to thirty-five, or the Thursday period, is one in which care and responsibility is increased. It is a period of intense labor. The muscles are taxed and the sinews are tired.

The sixth, or the Friday period, from thirty-five to forty-two, is one in which the exhausting results of struggle and misfortune become apparent in laborious life, this period,—a watery one—from thirty-five to forty-two, being a period of seven, its sixth day or year is the forty-first, and that is the year in which calamity, disappointment, ill-health, and financial loss are most likely to appear. You rarely find anyone whose watery period—forty-first year especially—was at all satisfactory and free from disappointment.

The seventh, or the Saturday period, from forty-two to forty-nine, is a period of solidity and comparative rest, although some of the lingering effects of the sixth period may manifest themselves.

TRIPS TO THE PLANETS

MY FIRST TRIP TO MARS AND SATURN.

On Thursday evening, Nov. 13, 1901, I had my first successful attempt in travelling to the two planets most easily approached by the children of the Universal Brotherhood.

As soon as I retired to sleep, my mind became exceedingly busy in thinking. I felt some peculiar kind of trouble, and realized the need of some psychic or spiritual exercise, for I had not had such a practice for a few days.

A crowd of sages were meditating around the tables, on their seats.

The first table was occupied by Dr. J. M. P., Dr. D., Dr. B. and some others, who were strangers to me, except Mr. T. L. H., to whom my particular attention was drawn; and it was told me to note him carefully, for I had never seen him before, and desired greatly to have a personal interview with him.

But my surprise was great to see that there were no dishes on the tables, nor any kind of food for those who were present there.

As soon as I thought this an oval glass of food was brought on the first table, which glass contained grains like peas in tablet form. I asked if that was the meal they would take, but the one who brought in that food told me that that was their "Internal Food and External Glory." I intuitively perceived the meaning of that expression.

"I have meat to eat that ye know not of."—(John iv. 32.)
After a while I went out of the hall, because I did not want
to interfere with their conversation.

As I took a short journey around the town, I wanted to see some of the vegetables that grow in that planet; and someone brought me some onions, showing how they were all alike n a triangular form, and in dark red color. This is the special characteristic of their onions.

HEALING BY THE SUPERFINE FORCES.

LESSON I.-INTRODUCTORY.

I. DARK AGE METHODS OF CURE.—Men of all times have sought for efficient means of binding up broken hearts, healing diseases and washing sins away. have been ruthlessly taken, the deeper shades of sin that have been matured and the heart strings that have been snapped asunder by these crude and, usually, criminal Dark Age processes have filled the earth with groans and rivers of blood.

- 2. MODERN INSTRUMENTS OF DEATH.—In most parts of the civilized world sacrifices, incantations and fetich prayers have given way under the bright light of civilization; but the doctor is still abroad in the land with his calomel, arsenic, nuxvomica, morphine, alcohol and a thousand other instruments of death, and, under the protection of semi-barbarous laws, is still killing millions of people every year. The surgeon's knife, in the name of experimental necessity, has come to be a veritable instrument of torture, and the rivers of human blood—blood sacrificed upon the altar of professional ignorance—are still flowing on.
- 3. BETTER DAYS COMING.—Signs are growing brighter for the dawning of a better day. Men of culture and refinement are fast coming to realize the fact that there is no healing virtue in poisonous drugs. Even the advanced thinkers of the most antiquated school of medicine are bold and honest enough to let the truth be known. Sir John Forbes, M. D., F. R. S., late physician to Queen Victoria, said:

"Some patients get well with the aid of medicine; some without it, and still more in spite of it."

Prof. Alonzo Clark, of the New York College of Physicians and Surgeons, said:

"Every dose of medicine diminishes the patient's vitality."
Prof. Barker of the New York Medical College, said:

"The drugs that are administered for scarlet fever kill far more patients than the disease does."

John Mason Good, M. D., F. R. S., said:

"The effects of medicine upon the human system are, in the highest degree, uncertain, except, indeed, that they have destroyed more lives than war, famine and pestilence combined."

4. MUCH NEEDED LEGISLATION.—The millenium of freedom from disease and crime would be greatly hastened

if our legislators could be made to realize that they should at once wipe from the statute books every enactment savoring of class legislation under the excuse of protecting human life, and also every enactment protecting certain men in their practice of dealing out poisons to unsuspecting, ignorant, sick people, and instead thereof enacting laws making it a crime punishable by fine and imprisonment to administer or prescribe such substances.

- 5. THE BODY ITS OWN STORE HOUSE.—The humna organism contains within itself every element, every substance, every force ever required to heal broken hearts, cure disease or forgive sin. Love, unsullied, casts out all fear and fear banished, opens up the way for joy, health and forgiveness to enter, and enables the river of life, clear as crystal, to flow from the fountain of the Universal, making glad every tissue of the human form divine. Love, deflected, opens the floodgates of fear; joy leaves, health suffers and sin rests, like an incubus, upon the soul. Then, to restore conditions to normality the love-centers must be purified, the wasted tissues of the body replenished and the Breath of Life must be forced through every avenue of the body to drive out the Breath of Death.
- 6. THE TISSUE SALTS.—The human body is largely composed of organic substances; but these are only the materials out of which nerve, and brain, and muscle, and epithelial, and connective tissue are builded; and without skilled workmen this vast quantity of building material would be useless.

But the great architect has provided the workmen—twelve gigantic, skilled operators—each prepared to do a special work. And these workmen are inorganic tissue salts; some build up the gray matter of the brain, some white fibrous tissue, some bone substance; some work only with albumen, others only with water and others act as scavengers. When these twelve salts are present in proper quantity and quality there never is a diseased condition; when a deficiency occurs, disintegration results, and disease is in evidence.

7. NOT MEDICINE BUT FOOD .- These Tissue Salts

—phosphates and sulphates of potash, soda and lime, fluoride of lime and silica—are not medicines; they are necessary parts of the organism, and a pain, or an ache, or a flushed face, or a rapid pulse, or a wasting away of tissue is a special call of nature for a supply of the deficient salt, and the educated healer administers it just as he would a drink of water to quench thirst or a portion of food to satisfy hunger.

LESSON II.

CAUSES OF DISEASE.

- 8. OF MENTAL ORIGIN.—Since matter, per se, is lifeless, and life is force, and all force is directed by the mind, whatever requires force in order to be, must come from the mental centers. Force is the author of all activities; disease is an activity, therefore disease emanates from force, which is directed by the mind; hence disease must be of mental origin.
- DUAL CAUSATION.—Every diseased condition can be traced directly to one of two causes: 1. Uuholy emotions.
 Inertia of will.
- 10. EMOTIONS.—As all activities find their origin in universal Force—the fire attribute of the Infinite, so all emotions are children of universal Love, the maternal attribute of the Great Spirit.
- 11. FEAR AN ILLUSION.—Fear is not an attribute of Universal Spirit, and, of course, is never given by that Spirit to men, therefore fear is an illusion; it is but perverted love. John, the Christian Initiate, instituted a comparison between fear and love in these words:

"There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear, because fear has restraint, and he who fears has not been perfected in love."—I John, 4:18.

12. PRODUCTS OF LOVE AND FEAR.—This perverted love, known as fear, is the origin of all unholy emotions, as love is the radiating center of all holy emotions. Fear is the progenitor of anger, hate, wrath, envy, strife, jealousy, and such like, and every unholy emotion is peripheral in its manifestations—always originating in the outer mentality—external

vibrations—and proceeds inward toward the heart center. Every holy emotion is centric in its operations, welling up from the heart, the love center, and radiating outward, purifying every part in its peaceful course. From the love center comes joy, sympathy, trustfulness, hope and all kindred emotions an 1 are the health-producing forces. Unholy emotions are veritable poisons, polluting the streams of life and producting disease and death.

13. ISOLATED POISONOUS PRODUCTS.—Prof. Elmer Gates says:

"If an evil emotion is dominant, then, during that period, the respiration contains volatile poisons, which are impelled through the breath and are characteristic of that emotion. By applying chemical reagents I can detect the presence of these poisons, because a precipitate is produced, and this precipitate generally has some color. In the case of grief, for instance, if I use rhodopsin for my reagent, the color will be pinkish. Other reagents will produce other colors. I have isolated forty emotional products; but the worst of all is that of guilt. If the perspiration of a person suffering from conscious guilt be mixed with salicylic acid we get a pink color."

From the results of Prof. Gates' experiments and those of other progressive chemists, the disease-creating tendency of unholy emotions can be demonstrated.

14. WHY EMOTIONS PRODUCE DISEASE.—Physical forms are but coverings for soul forms. Soul forms are known to the physical senses only through mental action. All emotions are immediate products of mind and hence all physical conditions are first formulated, then suffered or enjoyed in the mind, and are then precipitated upon the outer form, the body. Fear is simply unbelief; and unbelief lies at the foundation of every affliction of man. From it arises the miasma of sickness, sin and death, and fear is a reality in the mind before it is projected upon the body. Fear is the predisposing cause of all pathological condition, and the unholy emotions which it produces stamp the character upon the disease. As an example, take anger, which is a daughter of Fear. The word

anger is but the Englisized form of the Latin word "angor," meaning "to contract, to choke, to strangle." Note the conditions of an angry man; every fiber of the body is contracted, the caliber of the blood vessels is diminished so that the blood leaves the face, and he becomes "white with rage." The eyes snap, and the teeth grind upon each other. And all these signs show the fearful contraction within the mind, and its precipitation upon the body; and shortly, the heart is involved and stasis of blood occurs in various parts of the body; congestion follows and some disease that may be induced by these contracted, congested conditions is inevitable. How many inflammatory diseases, stomach disorders and rheumatisms may be traced directly to a "fit of anger."

- 15. DISEASES OF FEAR.—Without exciting disease-producing emotions, fear frequently sets up a train of conditions in the mind that becomes pathological. The mind suffers untold agonies from an attack of bilious fever, typhoid fever, diphtheria, smallpox, or something of the kind, and the fearful disorder is precipitated upon the poor body and death may result.
- 16. INERTIA OF WILL.-Many people who have no unholy emotions, no external vibrations, get sick and die. But we need not search the decaying tissues of the body for a reason for it. Any skilful coroner could write the verdict: "Died from Inertia of will." Infants sicken and die, because the will power has not developed enough to enable them to pass grave crises. Thousands of adults pass to the beyond because of inertia of will. They could not make up their minds to live and be well. They were constantly in doubt whether they ought to live or die, and their doubts and weaknesses of will condemned them to death. Infidelity is the disease which carries many people away. They doubt, they fear, and disintegration of tissue commences; a doctor is employed and poisonous drugs mingle with the poisons of their doubts and fears and the end comes on apace, and the undertaker spreads the garlands of silence over the bier.
 - . 17. PRIMARY LAW OF CURE.—If fear be the pri-

mary cause of all diseases, love must be the all-potent medicine to cure, and any System of Healing that does not have this thought as the underlying principle must fail. The ingenuity of man may be taxed to devise helpful methods to kindle into flame the latent principle of love, which has an abiding place in every heart, but when that love-flame breaks out, all darkness disappears and health and forgiveness come.

This useful work should stand side by side with "God's Image in Man" on every book-shelf. Mr. Wood is a constructive prophet of the new thought, and it is one of the best signs of the times that such works as his and those of Trine should be so much sought after. These two teachers occupy a medium position between the two extremes, and they are doing noble service in this, their sphere.

There are many new Thought Teachers who need to ponder over such expressions as this, quoted from the chapter on "Evolutionary Reconciliation":

"The members of the most bigoted sect, JUST FOR THE PRES-ENT, find more of God in their chosen system than they can possibly find elsewhere.
