THE VALUE OF MODERN METHODS

SPIRITUAL TEACHING.

Attention is called to one or two features of modern Christion Evolution teaching, as possessing great possibilities for good. We must accept the human family in the various conditions in which we find it. Between the parallels twenty and fifty degrees north latitude is contained the highest state of civilization; and in the central part of this belt are most of the largest cities of the two hemi-spheres where wealth, science, art and superior intelligence focalize. Statistics of church and church societies in 1890, pertaining to Brooklyn and which probably is relatively true of other cities and large communities, are worthy of remembrance and careful study At the time named, in Brooklyn there were three hundred and forty eight churches and church societies, which include all kinds devoted to religious worship. In these three hundred and forty eight churches there were in all two hundred and forty eight thousand six hundred and eighty six sittings for a population of about nine hundred thousand inhabitants. This leaves about six hundred and thirty one thousand of her people unprovided with church accommodations.

It was ascertained that the actual attendance at church worship was about one hundred and sixty five thousand—eighty three thousand less than the accommodations already provided. Allowing this eighty three thousand as an offset for children too young to attend church, we still have six hundred and thirty one thousand persons non-participants in church work and worship; the greater number of which it is safe to assume, have no positive convictions as to the spirituality connected with physical life.

Now this is the work the modern phase of spiritual teaching has come to do—to reach the great army of thoughtless, indifferent people and do it by demonstration, by object teaching, of the spiritual side or element of their life and nature.

There are two methods of teaching the mind and awakening the heart to consciousness; one of which we will call the abstract or verbal expression of thought through various processes of abstract reasoning The other is by object lessons or demonstrations, after which, the flow of reason comes intuitively blending the cold methods of mentalily with the finer soul emotions. In the first instance the mind is overwhelmed with mysticisms, logic and dogmas unable to see its way clear to a magnified

life, a haven of rest. In the other method, no matter how untutored the mind may be, it catches a thread of demonstrated truth and follows it to a satisfying conclusion. Is there not then virtues in the modern method worthy the consideration of divinity teachers? A city with more than half its inhabitants content on the plane of materialistic thought or no thought at all, yearning, unconsciously for that which will awaken spiritual perception within.

And here we wish to emphasize the point, that the demonstration of medial power, which power of late has been wonderfully developed, is most efficient as a preliminary method of leading the mind to an apprehension of the design, duty and destiny of the real entity of man; far in excess of any current methods of moral and spiritual Think of this, reader, and then teaching. see if you can resist saying-I believe there has now come a method, in keeping with that of the first century, well calculated to convince the skeptical of the endless spirit entity existence, and should they be induced to seek knowledge in this direction their lives be made the richer, sweeter and happier; the church the purer and humanity the better for it. This method has not come to eclipse, destroy and paralyze; but to aid and quicken the impulses for correct understanding and a life of fraternal love.

It is with pleasure and pride the "Leaflet" welcomes in its list of associate meetings, the meeting for Ethic I Culture held at 108½ Madison Street near Bedford Avenue every Thursday eve'g under the supervision of Mrs. Holmes. She ante-dates all spiritual workers in Brooklyn in retaining the initial spark, and showing the ever increasing illumination which comes from persistent effort in that line.

The afternoon meeting for psychic culture at Arlington lodge room is well attended and under the discreet management of Mrs. Cutting is proving of great interest to all present.

Here is offered an opportunity for spiritual expression which the cause in Brooklyn has been in great need. At Co-operative Hall on Sunday November 1st the meeting was a particularly interesting one The lecture, "Is it a dangerous line of thought" was treated in connection with the present unsettled state of politics, finance and religion. The special features of the services rested with Miss Terry and Mme. Albert.
