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THE NEW RACE

A BABE BORN in a stable, laid in a manger, over whom the angels sang the song of joy, "Behold, I bring you glad tidings of great joy which shall be to all people;" around whose head the stars of heaven formed a crown of glory, and in whose heart existed in embryo all the wisdom, knowledge, fortitude and grace, love and tenderness, which developed to the world the living Christ, the first-born of many brethren—such was the infant Jesus, destined to become the type of the new man leading forth into a new and perfect race.

Philosophers have written of this new race, poets have sung of it, prophets have visioned it, Jesus realized it and today the multitude are bringing it forth.

All life is evolutionary, everything that one sees and hears is the embodiment of the past, and the new race which is coming rapidly will not only be heirs of the ages, but also the common-sense incarnation of God. Standing before the burning bush, able to catch the message of Spirit and listening to its voice, he hears the command of God taking form within him. How near the original Life-Spirit Moses must have felt when the message, "I am that I am has sent thee forth," came to his soul.

I am is the Spirit's word for every leader today as well as two thousand or four thousand years ago. It is only as he hears the voice within saying, "I am is leading thee forth," that he can accomplish the work of God and help in the upbuilding of a new and better race of men.

Such an attitude is found only in great souls. Thus it was that John was actually in touch with the Christ. For the Christ has at last appeared in Jesus and carries with him in manifestation all that has been written, sung and dreamed by the yearning heart of man. He is the consummation of its highest hopes; Jesus stands forth pre-eminent, the man of God in the flesh.

I should not be true to my soul nor faithful in my study of this evolution of the race life did I not at this point give a recognition, a place of holy adoration, to Mary, the mother of Jesus. For behind the babe in the manger, the boy of twelve, the growing young man, between twelve and thirty of whom we know so little, and the powerful miracle worker, stands the mother who "pondered these things in her heart," and who was the intuition and the inspiration of this Son of God and Son of Man. As we follow him in each step of his unfoldment until he is launched in his public ministry by the miracle at Cana of Galilee, we must ever keep in thought this Woman of God. She had the conviction of his power to an almost greater degree than

She commands the servants at the wedding supper when the wine had given out to do as he bids them; in his seeming timidity he says, "Woman, what is that to thee and to me, mine hour is not yet come." We must render to her the tribute of a deep inner consciousness, the recognition of silent power known only to her and this son who was to be the redeemer of the world. In his greatness we often fail to remember her power.

Through all of the race evolution we find, linked with great men great women, silent, holy influences, watching, praying, thinking, working, trusting and knowing God. Their work shall not fail nor their

prayers be in vain.

Out from this Man spring the many who make up the new race. Who have learned to cast aside all emotional and sentimental thought of God and find Him in the ordinary things of every-day life. This every-day life is known to be the God-life and since no day that passes will ever return it must be recognized to be God's day, a day of God. In it the most sacred laws of Truth and Life are being revealed and a God at hand in every single event.

We, however, are not sorry for any girls and boys who are sweethearts of Santa Claus. are we sorry for any love they have for the story of his coming from some mysterious land of cold and snow and bounty; clad in scarlet, fur and fuzz, bringing warmth and cheer and joy. We are not sorry for the imagination that pictured him riding in a fairy kind of sleigh drawn by incredibly fleet reindeer, harnessed with gold, silver and bells. Bells announced his coming to ears alert to hear, and yet he stole so silently and elfishly down small soot blackened chimneys with a big pack on his back which was filled with every kind of thing a child could want! We know that all their love for the white-haired Santa of legend is not really misplaced. For truly, the legend belongs to the Actual—to the Universal Santa Claus—the Great Hearted, whose warmth and cheer fills the Universe and makes this planet a livable, lovable and beautiful place. It belongs to the real Santa Claus who has inspired mothers and fathers, husbands and wives, aunts and uncles, sisters and brothers, sweethearts and friends to act as Santa Clauses,-to act like the Great Hearted.

I know a little girl who says God is Santa Claus and that is true, for God is the inspiration of all good. And the Real Santa Claus is that Something in God's nature by which, after he has given all that his children can need,—food, shelter, and clothes; life, protection and education; heart, mind and love; —still gives them more. It is that something by which mankind may have super-abundance for

beauty and elegance of environment, as well as joy and gladness of heart. It is that *something* which wants the children of men to have enough and to spare, and then to spare it; enough for sustenance and justice not only, but such abundance that their love may overflow in generosity as does God's.

But why is the mythological Santa Claus associated with our Christmas? And how does he correspond to, or represent, the Real Santa Claus? Yuletide, which is our Christmas, was an old, old Sun-Festival, celebrated long before the little Jesus Christ child was born in Bethlehem two thousand

years ago.

December 21st is the shortest day of the year and though the days begin to lengthen the 22nd, it is not noticeable for sometime. Is it not strange then, that December 25th should be chosen for a Sun festival? A time when there is so little Sunshine? And when in many countries it is mid-winter with storm and cold sure to follow? I'll tell you why. It is because it is a Promise festival, a Faith festival. It is a promise so sure of fulfillment, a faith so absolute that it makes it a Joy-festival,—a Givingfestival above all the festivals of the year. December 25th, is in the midst of winter with the long rest of nature before it—a long wait for new vege-tation, flowers and fruit; but between December 25th and January 6th a wonderful thing happens in what men call nature. Then the Sun turns again from the winter Solstice,-turns again from cold and rest with preparation, toward the Spring, toward the time of visible quickening and perceptible warmth. Its visible manifestation is at least three months away, but here is the promise, and after thousands of springs no one doubts that there will be another spring next March.

So this Jesus Christ festival was the Promise and the beginning of the Spiritual Springtime of the race though it looked a long way ahead to the Summer ripening of the precious fruit of Christhood. The little child born two thousand years ago came to be a Saviour indeed. He grew up pure-minded and clean-bodied, so that the consciousness of God in him could shine out; so he lived a shining Godlife as an example of the way each one can turn again toward God and come into perpetual summer and harvest. His coming marked the greatest conscious turning of the Suns of Men forward, from the winter of wrong, failure and suffering, toward God. And in him the entire race turned God-ward just as the sun turns the entire winter toward spring

during the shortest days of sunshine.

During these two thousand years of winter the shining of the Sun of Righteousness in mankind has been growing in strength and intensity, although we are now in what seems like the February and March blizzards of New England. But after these awful war storms have spent themselves, the Sun of Righteousness will shine out in burning strength and a new era of Peace, Joy and Plenty will begin and there will be no apparent retrograde even, of virtue or prosperity. Indeed, it began long ago for although it was midwinter in the ongoing of the race when Jesus Christ was born and it is midwinter in the mind when Jesus Christ is born into the individual consciousness, yet this birth is the real beginning of Spring in both. In the new era mankind will come to the full stature of Jesus Christ without suffering and we shall have the new heaven here

on earth. It is this great promise of the Jesus Christ birth which makes Christmas the greatest joy festival. And it is just as sure of fulfillment as the

promise of Spring, Summer and Harvest.

Fulfilling this promise, God through his whole, Holy Spirit gives himself and all he has and is, to and through mankind joyously and universally. This Universal Generosity,—this Spirit of God-giving, through mankind and individual man, is the Actual Santa Claus. This is the Spirit that inspires all real giving-giving where there is no necessity, no duty, no need, and no charity, but only a glad desire to make every one happier and richer in both peace and plenty. The war blizzards in Europe and the milder storms here, together with the winter quiet which financial nature or vegetation has experienced, have apparently dulled the desire to give. The great sums of money sent to the war sufferers, was not all real giving. It was not universal, but sentimental and partial because the horrid romance of war blinded its eyes to the needs at its very doors where there should be no need at all. Besides charity and need-giving are not Santa Claus-giving. Santa Claus-giving is like that which has added the beauties of sunset and sunrise to the glory of the day; the majesty of a Matterhorn and a Mount Mc-Kinley to the everlasting hills; that which has added the super-marvels of the Grand Canyon, the Yosemite Valley and the Yellowstone Park to the marvels of nature; that which has added warmth to light, color to luscious fruit, and fragrance to the rose; that which is prodigal of beauty in fruitless flowers; that which is prodigal of abundance in ten thousand ways. It is that Spirit of giving more than man can ask or think that is the Real Santa Claus or Jehovah giving.

But is all this superabundance only for children? Yes, for all are children of God whether young in vears or grown up. But the grown-ups do not always keep a childlike spirit of receiving and little children are not all taught the true spirit of giving, i. e., giving their best unselfishly and gladly. And we know what true generosity is by the way God gives, far beyond the needs of his children and for their pleasures; and also by the way Jesus, the Man of Nazareth, gave himself for his brothers and sisters in the human family. Both give all, even when seeming not to give at all even as winter is a giving of life and real preparation for the abundance of

Summer.

The Observers Column A CHRISTMAS MEDITATION

N the legends of Christmas in the collections of several centuries back, there is one of the four beasts and the blessed manger-The wolf, the bear, the lion and the panther had been led to the field of the Shepherds and their flocks, faint with hunger, and were about to fall upon and devour the tender lambs and the flesh of the shepherds, when the light of the Star and the parting of the Heavens affrighted them, and they stood transfixed, listening to the voices of the Angels. When the shepherds had found their way to the Stable in Bethlehem. the beasts had followed them, and in an old German print of the 15th century, we see them behind the shepherds worshipping in their turn the Child of Light as he draws all hearts to him, there in his humble resting-place.
