The Star in The East

Our Christmas Message, December 24, 1922

OW when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem.

Saying, where is he that is born King of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the east, and are come to worship him.

When Herod the king had heard these things, he was troubled and all Jerusalem with him.

And when he had gathered all the chief priests and scribes of the people together, he demanded of them where Christ should be born. Matthew II, 1-4.

They told him that according to prophecy this great One was born in Bethlehem of Judea. Herod sent the wise men into Bethlehem to search for the child. He, the king, wished to come and worship. They departed; "and lo, the star, which they saw in the east, went before them, till it came and stood over where the young child was." But these wise men, warned of God, in a dream, did not return to Herod, but departed into their own country by another way.

Matthew gives the story vividly, and our imagination is kindled by the light of Truth that glows in the Apostle's words. We, too, would follow the Star in the East, the symbol of the first dawn of Truth in our consciousness, with the wise ones of all the centuries since, until it leads us to the greater light, the perfect day, prophesied throughout the world's story. "Follow the gleam," says the inner voice, "to the full light of realization".

Life is continuous progression, the unfolding in consciousness of the soul of man, from light to light—and on to the fulness of light, the new understanding. Rejoice in every step of progress you and your neighbor make, as the parents rejoice in the accomplishment expressed in their child's first word, because it is the promise, the prohecy of more words to come.

In each living soul is the promise of eternal unfoldment, for we are evolving in God's own being. Nineteen hundred years ago there was born one that typifies the supreme experience of mankind. He, also, carried the greatest message in the words, "He that hath seen me, hath seen the Father". Men were longing for a true message, and Jesus brought it to them. The earlier attitude toward him was one of external worship. But there arose a deeper

something through the sincere and true touch, a something bigger and more inclusive. Back of Jesus, the man, was Christ, the Spirit of the Infinite Love, which was demonstrated to all who touched his life's expression, as the vitalizing element of this universal man. Paul and John saw that the same Spirit which unified the man. Jesus, was within every man. Many other wise men have known the same truth. They have seen that the only difference between Jesus and other men is that Jesus was consciously co-operating with this vitalizing power—God, the Father, while others do not lay hold of the great principle that it is the Father within that doeth the works, and that there is no limit to the power within ourselves, if we are open and receptive.

When we touch the bigger realization, we see the meaning of the Star in the East, and we walk by its light always. It reveals the eternal progress and unfoldment of the soul, because its light shows us Truth in fulness.

Jesus knew the oneness of man and God. He saw that the keynote of sorrow is the false concept that we are separated from our source. And so it was that Jesus came to save the world, to unify in daily realization man and God. The thought of the salvation of the old ways of thinking has its beauty. Jesus was a savior, but he saved us, not by taking the sins of the world upon himself, but by showing us that the safe return into God in realization is our salvation. We must save ourselves. Salvation is an active individual process. We must turn in thought to righteousness, the right direction that leads to God. Love will cleanse us from our sin, wrong thinking, for it is the uplifting and unifying force of life.

Jesus, the child of Mary, was born into the world to lead us into a realization of the Christ; the Spirit of God the Father sent His Son to lead the world to love. Christmas is the birthday of all who are born anew in the knowledge of the Lord. To truly celebrate one Christmas day a year is only a very small part, for every day is a Christ Day, a day of new birth into Love and Truth. The Spirit of Christmas is the Eternal Spirit in expression bringing forth Sons of Love.

The Christmas Spirit is the spirit of conscious unity—the richness of great love. We shall not be lonely if we know the Christ within. It is only

he who is thinking self-centered thoughts who is lonely and alone. No one who loves can be lonely, for the Spirit of Love takes us out and binds us to humanity, to all who live. We all have our Being in One God, the Father Almighty. First there is love. Second there is wide tolerance in the Spirit of Christ. The true Son is conscious of his sonship and of his brotherhood.

The Wise Men came from many directions, and went their separate ways outwardly when they had seen the light—but they knew there was but one way—the Christ Way. All the wise men of all the ages have sensed the unity of life—a universal fount of living waters inexhaustible and perfect. Jesus said to the disciples who returned to him saying that they had seen one casting out devils not according to their light, that they should forbid him not. He that is not against us, that is separating himself from good, is for us, is co-operating with the Divine Activity. We must break through the dividing lines if we would know the beauty of the whole.

We are not all seeking in the same way, but we are seeking the same thing. There is individual expression, and there is free choice. The great point is the on-going. Rejoice with him who finds the Truth, for there is but one Truth, the Supreme experience, the realization of oneness. Following the Star leads us to see the Unity of the Whole.

Many will say that there have never been such dark places in the world's history as there are today. And still it is an age of hope. In past centuries the parts of the world were isolated, and even if the hard places of one part were seen in another, the response did not seem so ready. We, today, feel ourselves our brothers' keepers. We have traveled far from the conscience of Cain, who when he was questioned as to the whereabouts of Abel, answered with negative implication, "Am I my brother's keeper?" We are climbing toward the mount of consciousness, where man views the world as a unit. There are movements, clubs, organizations, for the great purposes of helpfulness. In fact all of these bodies, even the business clubs, have a philanthropic aim.

I attended a most interesting club meeting during the week, the Gyro Club of Denver. It is a phase of the Big Brother Movement where men are choosing to act as older brothers to lads who are alone. The fundamental purpose of the club, the president told me, is friendship; business is incidental.

The G stands for good fellowship; the Y for youth; the R for responsibility to do for the world; the O for the opportunity to do. Such organizations are expressive of the Spirit of Truth, the Christ Spirit, active in the hearts of men. The one great body in Christ is the hope of the world.

The Star of Truth which heralded his coming led Jesus, on his journey here. He never lost the gleam of the unity of all mankind. Those who have followed Jesus have walked the path of brotherhood, and have stimulated the minds of other men to see the true meaning of life.

The Star in the East has set, but the Sun of righteousness has risen in the hearts and souls of men. The darkness is disappearing. This is a

blessed age; thought is emerging out of limitation into freedom, out of the old into the new, out of unbelief into the joyous consciousness of unity. This is the Christ life, and "Christ in you is your hope of glory", the realization of true worship. The birth of love in the souls of men is the theme of the Eternal Christmas Day, of which the Herald Angels sing.

How to Receive Supply

Hurt Feelings: Cause and Cure.

We may roughly divide those who suffer from this malady into two groups. While these classes easily merge into each other they are nevertheless distinct and need different cures.

First are those who lack proper self-esteem. They depend upon the opinions of others for the estimate they place upon themselves. The extreme cases of this type may be so negative that they are forced to play the part thus cast for them by the minds of their friends, even when they recognize the bondage, and are chagrined at the performance. This causes great unhappiness, especially if the estimate is below the real or developed ability of such people, which is the rule. Sometimes, however, it happens that the estimation is overdrawn—a part these people play equally well.

The other class are those whose ruling passion is vanity. This motive may be so deeply hidden, so closely related to the first grouping, and so intermingled with the fine and beautiful qualities, that it takes a most determined and merciless analysis to discover it. Vanity lies deep in us all and has a definite good part to perform if it is recognized for what it is and properly held in control. When uncontrolled, it soon dominates the being with a superficial egoism. It is the rampant spirit of the enslaver—from those who say, "If you love me you will do thus and so," to that great world known type, the ex-Kaiser. These people long to bend the world to their wills, to feed this vanity—a type most easily recognized in others and hard to see in ourselves. It is a deep-seated jealousy or fear that some one will fail to recognize this dummy greatness and will detect the weakness that lies beneath Those who have great power to read their fellow-men are continually meeting the jealous, hurt guardian of that deeply buried vanity.

So, when we recognize the fact that whatever our cause is for hurt, it is a thing of which we may be ashamed, either weakness or vanity, we come to the parting of the way—of superficial building or of building on the firm foundation, Christ—the real or the unreal. Those who have carefully gone to this depth and have recognized motives for what they are, become Divinely conscious. They come out of that depth forever healed of hurt. Their weakness has fallen from them; negative natures become positive, with all that winning attracting power they so coveted and lacked in their superficial building.

The first great necessary step in regeneration is the determined laying down of any pride in hurt vanity. Then comes soul training in right thought, as we know it in the Truth. Determined effort along this line brings its usual results. We gain courage by thinking courage; we gain love by loving. Those who wish to do so may prove this as easily as they have proved other elements of character.

A few rules may help in the beginning. Those have not a naturally fine sense of justice and 'ty may need to think along these lines. The

first rule of conduct is: Set no code of conduct for others; allow none to set a binding code for you. Never do a kind thing for any one, unless you do it out of that bigness of nature which delights only in the giving—giving with no thought of any return. Even gratitude should never be expected.

Give only what you can give freely and still be just to yourself in giving—also just in giving what is deserved. The great law is: Love your neighbor

as yourself-not better than yourself.

Do not burden others with debts of gratitude—

they may not be able or willing to pay.

Beware of the loving friend who binds you in servitude—who absorbs your strength and time and always demands more. You will gain the friend's respect and increase his love, if, with firmness and justice and without resentment, you keep the balance of rights even.

If you can, give to others fully what is their due and give it in loving kindness; they owe you nothing

and neither of you has a grievance.

Expect nothing from your friends you do not win or earn. Do you wish your friends to call upon you because it is their turn or because they are anxious to enjoy your company?

If you love your friend as yourself, you cannot

help being glad when he succeeds.

These rules can be carefully and mechanically applied, so as to give you quiet and peace of mind; but if you wish to win the "joy of your salvation" you must apply them with love. The joy will be in exact proportion to your ratio of love.

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IN GOD WE TRUST

The Better, Larger Day

TF we have succeeded at all in giving the reader an idea of the great development of ideas and customs in Israel during the centuries that lie between Samuel and the exile, it is not necessary to point out that the dogmatic view of the Bible, quoted at the beginning of the volume, is impaired beyond recovery. In the face of such evidence the assertion that "the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are without error or misstatement in their moral and spiritual teachings and record of historical facts," is to create that serious situation in which faith and truth part company.

However, the faith which is abandoned on these terms is no longer faith, but superstition. What is more, it is a very harmful superstition, for in the minds of many it creates the mistaken impression that they must choose between their religious faith and their loyality to truth. The saddest aspect of the matter is that armies of young people, trained in schools and colleges to think true to evidence, resolve the fictitious dilemma in favor of unbelief. And yet their choice is a moral choice, because they prefer truth to dogma. Their loss to the Church is the penalty which must be paid for the defense of truth by untruth.

There is nothing in the spiritual history of mankind that is comparable to the passion for righteousness which the Bible represents in the true progress of the world. The new interest which historical criticism is arousing in its study may be the means of freeing it from the abuses of ignorance

and superstition, that it may, under God, serve the new age even better than the past. And those who are dreading the new light will find, as thousands have already found, that textual and historical criticism take their charter from Christ himself, and are only instruments for the furtherance of his mission.

Bible study on the factual and historical side has become a science and has taken its place in the brotherhood of sciences. For though on the surface they differ as the waves, in the depths they are one as the sea. In every department of knowledge the wide-awake student hears "deep calling unto deep": "All things are yours, whether Paul or Apollos, or Cephas or the world, or life or death, or things present or things to come; all are yours, and ye are Christ's, and Christ is God's."

Will men in the face of the tremendous, thrilling sweep of development, which we have tried to delineate, go on teaching the Old Testament in the foolish patchwork way of four inches here and four inches there? Without recognition of the gradual growth of moral standards? Without recognition of Hebrew methods of historiography by which literary documents dating centuries apart were interwoven or placed side by side in contiguous chapters? Without historical criticism of conflicting sets of facts? Without the slightest attempt to interpret folk-lore as folk-lore, and each form of literature in accordance with the demands of its type? Will they, like amiable tourists of religion, continue to carry home bottles from the Jordan, when full rivers of knowledge, eager to shape new channels and refresh virgin soil, are rolling for the baptism of eager-eyed new generation? The better, larger day must come to gladden the eyes of those
