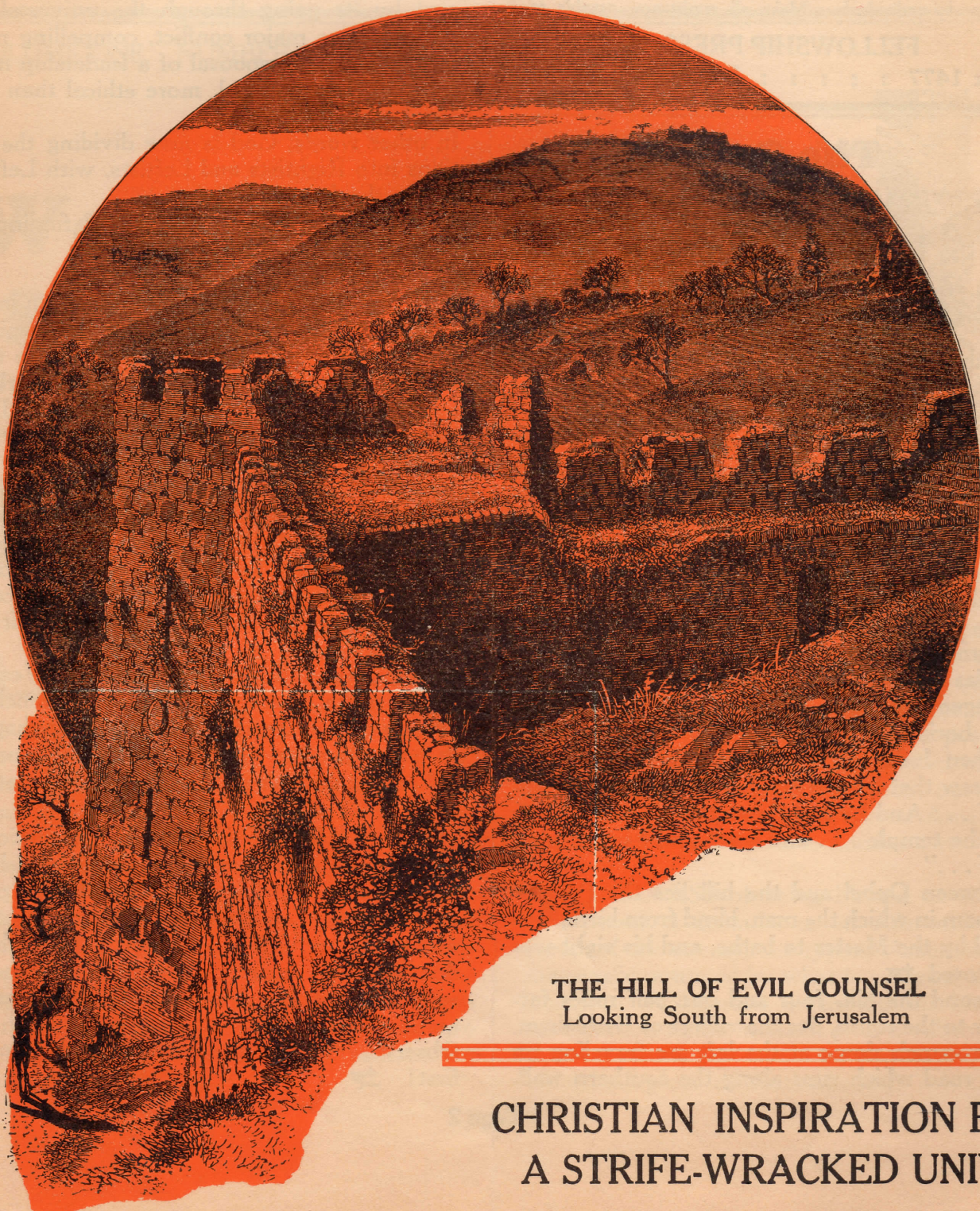

THE PICTURE on the front of this week's Galilean is a view to the south taken from the wall of Jerusalem which rises in the foreground, and which borders the gardens surrounding the mosque of the Dome of the Rock.

The cultivated hillside just beyond is called Ophel. It is a part of Mount Moriah, the hill on which the southeastern portion of the city is built. Ophel was at one time included in the ancient walls of the city, but when the walls were rebuilt after one of the numerous times the city was laid waste and the walls torn down, they were rebuilt so that the smaller city could be more strongly fortified.

The hill beyond is known as the Hill of Evil Counsel, and tradition has it that to this hill Judas fled after his betrayal of Jesus, and hanged himself to the old tree yet visible on the horizon.

"Then Judas, which had betrayed him, when he saw that he was condemned, repented himself . . . And he cast down the pieces of silver in the temple . . . and went and hanged himself . . ."

Between Ophel and the hill lies the Pool of Siloam in which the man, blind from birth, was told by the Master to bathe, and his sight was restored ✠

Beyond the hill, four and one half miles farther to the south, lies the village of Bethlehem. The camels down at the left are traveling on the road which runs along the southern wall.

Observe, however, the renovation that comes first! ✠

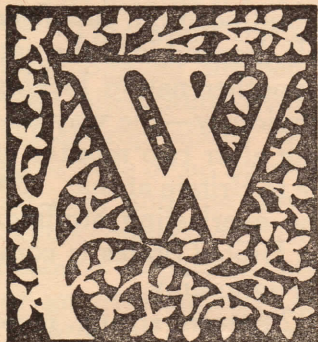
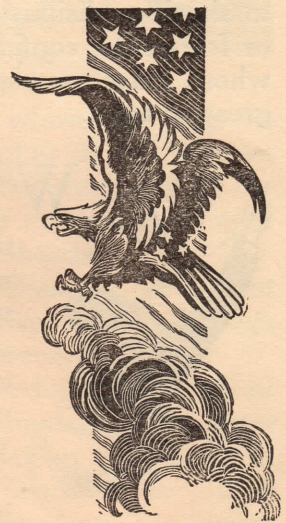

fronts and in imminent danger of confronting
disaster ✠


THERE is, of course, a
third line of conduct
for the intelligent citizen
to pursue. That is for
him to keep his mouth shut while the incompe-
tent, venal or queasy politicians plunge straight
ahead and dethrone themselves by their own
depredations or expensive nincompooperies.
The trouble with this last course seems to be
that permitting incompetent, venal or queasy
politicians to plunge ahead and dethrone them-
selves carries with it the insufferable possibil-
ity that the Republic will be wrecked or de-
feated before their deeds find them out ✠
It appears to be the characteristic American
reaction to embrace course number two.

REGARDLESS of being blasted as an ap-
peaser, a defeatist or an aider-and-com-
forter of the enemy, the typical American in-
creasingly outraged by what is reported as go-
ing on in Washington, is slashing into his Ad-
ministration at the moment with a vehemence
if not a rancor that bodes no permanency for
either marplots or featherheads.

The typical American who has something in his skullcase other than sawdust or cement, is disclosing by his private conversation in home, office and barbershop that he is getting utterly fed up on the clique seeking to prosecute this war on a basis of "social gains," and is reaching a mood of civic surliness where unwittingly he gloats when any of the Axis Powers report success abroad—even against our own forces. Here is an atrocious condition that threatens the Republic with major catastrophe. But the fault lies not in any treasonable inclinations in the breast of such American  The fault lies squarely upon the shoulders of a Federal oligarchy that by its own weaselings or blunderings has done, and is doing, about everything that human ingenuity could devise to shock or disillusion the loyal rank and file, or forfeit the confidence of the very populace whose mass morale should be the Republic's greatest asset.



WILL the plotters or dunderheads admit such castigation? Decidedly they will not. Being in command in war-time, they arrogantly or stupidly assume that their enactments must be considered as infallible, that any who are disposed to criticize them are enemy agents in disguise, and that any gesture toward their repudiation as a caste is a criminal onslaught on government itself  Meanwhile one catastrophe succeeds another on seas afar, while controversy rages at home over whether Melvyn Douglas-Hesselberg is a parasite, whether fan-dancer Chaney is worth forty-six hundred a year to doughboy morale or whether Congressmen should pension themselves for having messed up the Republic, world without end, amen!

It is all evidence of a once mighty nation in the throes of that tragic sickness that is political demoralization, due to flagellated operation of the spoils system as premise for executive stewardship 

None of it, of course, mitigates the plight of the naval stalwart, battling overseas to conserve the sovereignty of his Republic.

But the straight-hitting and straight-thinking American evidently decides that continued incompetence is going to paralyze victory anyhow, so of the two evils it is better to lay the


political oligarchy out in lavender than lay the final sailor or marine out in lilies, with the flag draped over him instead of waving splendorfully above him.

It is the premise for the editorial policy of this particular journal at least, that such is the expedient being embraced by Divine Providence for arousing the American public to a sense of the colossal chicane that has gone on behind every embattled government on earth, bringing international affairs to their current bedlam. Nevertheless, this journal in the instance of its own country, endorses only one policy for our activity in that bedlam—that is, to fight for this Republic only, and let the rest of the world go where the woodbine eternal twineth.

This world can run without our supervision!

What America Should Do . .



IN THE FIRST place, the United States should not have gotten into the war at all, for, aloof from it, and preserving a mighty neutrality, it rested secure in unchallengeable influence to shape the outcome from a dispassionate standpoint. Letting itself become a participant in actual hostilities, it lowered its proud position, sacrificed its prestige, and let itself descend into the caterwauling role of just another nation kicking into the stramash and obviously—the way that matters seem to be going after two months of it—playing second fiddle to Britain at that  Now if Britain gets the everlasting stuffings thrashed out of her, the United States is compelled to partake of her ignominy.

The American people, 92 percent strong, must have had subconscious premonition of some such eventuality when it frantically screamed to Congress to stay aloof from the fisticuffs. But Congress ignored this demand from the electorate and paid the more subservient attention to the British, the Judaists and the Bolsheviks. Each of them, of course, had separate axes to grind at America's expense.

To rationalize that the United States got into the war because of an unprovoked attack on Pearl Harbor, is fiddle-faddle. Unprovoked, indeed! All Americans are not fools!

Now the Republic finds itself in a vortex of the maelstrom, with its fleet dangerously depleted according to Winston Churchill's own admis-

sion before Parliament sometime since, its mooching or paper allies giving indications of withdrawal in their own selfish interests by Spring, some of its most vital war supplies cut off permanently, and its internal economy shot with wholesale disruption.

What the preponderant mass of home grown Americans want their Administration to do, therefore, is plain—

They want the Administration to clean its own political house—actually clean it—fire all the movie stars and fan-dancers out of it, blitz the communists and fellow-travelers of communists, and trim the decks of the Ship of State for a strong, clean, efficient manning by capable Americans—of integrity and dash.

They want their Administration to halt abruptly this unpatriotic and disastrous policy of stripping the ranks of our protective forces by shipping consignments of raw, half-trained recruits to aid strategizing Britain or sovietizing Russia on every battlefield on earth, call back all such forces wherever they may be located at present, and begin to put the American Republic in a condition of defense that can successfully withstand any sort of assault that can conceivably be launched upon it for the next twenty years.

THAT, however, is only the beginning.

They want this entire agenda of military boondoggling stopped, the financial affairs of the United States overhauled, these astronomical appropriations for fantastic projects that have little or no bearing on the war brought to an end, and the government of this United States conducted like a prosperous and efficient business corporation and not like the slush fund of an overlording Tammany.

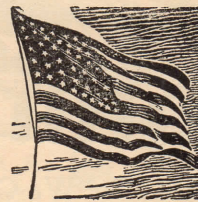
They want all of these traitorous projects for Unions-Now, United Nations, World Federations, and Leagues of Free Peoples—each grinding some axe at the expense of this Republic—squelched to stay squelched, the propaganda for more aggressive internationalism halted by stern fiat, the attention of officialdom applied solely and concertedly upon either extricating America from the chestnut-roasting bloodglut or putting her in shape to exhibit a flaming and unrestricted nationalism that shall evolve an economy dependent on no one but herself

More than all else, they want an Administration and a Congress that command more and more confidence from the electorate day upon

day and week upon week, instead of the reverse, because of the sincerity, economy, and factual enactment of all those measures that heighten morale and accentuate nationalism and not riddle and emasculate the Republic by making it a catch-pot of racial sanctuary under the control of Jews of Great Britain.

Keep the Flag Flying in Real Sincerity . .

THE NEWSPAPERS in obvious control of the British or the Zionists—people whose last end and aim is the conservation of the Republic unless it fits in with their crackpot plans for overseas—are swift to assail as sedi-



tionist or fifth columnist whosoever sees the United States and none other in this war, or dares to declare that its jurisdiction may be under the influence, direct or otherwise, of marplots, demagogues or rattleheads.

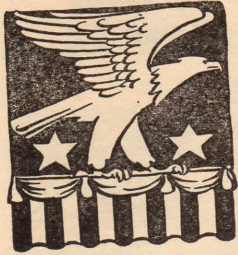
None are simon-pure but those in permanent control, and they must be kept in office though the Republic flies to fragments.

Comes now, for instance, Edward J. Flynn of the Roosevelt National Committee, who gives it out in a recent speech that for Americans in the coming congressional elections to fail to return a pro-Roosevelt majority to the House of Representatives, would be tantamount to a major military disaster on both fronts.

The warning by no means comes unexpected. Some such blither-dose was expected along at the present time.

Thus early is it attested that the identical gentlemen who have made a shambles of our internal economy over eight to nine years, and finally landed us in an international war to provide them forcibly with a "unity" that they never commanded in peace, propose and purport to make it appear to the public that they and no others must continue to control American affairs till the end of the age, and no others are competent, and no others can be tolerated. This "indispensability arrogance" is precisely what ails the nation in the conduct of the war. It is this "dog in the manger" attitude that is reflected in everything that the New Deal oligarchy says and does. And the rank and file feel gratified when something happens overseas that shows up its inadequacies.

It isn't that the public wants to see America lose the war. But the public is human. Steadily, hourly, it is acquiring a sense of disgust at its own leadership. Out here in the Middle West it behaves as though it were convinced that the New Deal Crowd doesn't have what it takes to pilot the Republic through this conflict. And so long as that psychology maintains, it is going to give only a lip loyalty to its government.



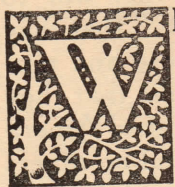
SO the satrap journals fly to the support of the Flynnians and class any potential breakaway from Perpetual Rooseveltism as sedition

WE SEEM to be under the protection of the British Fleet one moment, and "sustaining" Britain with our own fleet the next.

We are against Communism in all its forms on the one hand, yet we equip Stalin and Kai-shek with credits running into the billions to keep up their godless rackets in the name of Democracy, on the other—and admit of no inconsistency in the face of "military necessity."

We are cast into dithers over what happens along the Burma Road and yet look with pity-

ing disdain at the automobiles of tax-paying citizens abandoned through lack of tires along the Lincoln Highway.

We talk about keeping the flag flying from Boston to Bellingham but we tolerate the labor saboteurs and the union racketeers sawing down the flag-poles of industry in a labor autocracy that makes Stalin an amateur.

We have Mayor La Guardia and Eleanor Everywhere sirening around the nation telling the common citizens how to protect themselves from air raids by diving into the domestic bed-clothes and pulling the pillows over their heads—in the sacred name of Civilian Defense—while our expert air pilots are being shipped by squads to Malay, and bases in North Ireland seem to take major importance over bases in Massachusetts, Maryland, Florida and Oregon

A screwball New Deal economy pays farmers millions not to raise sugar beets and when war comes along there is a wholesale sugar shortage and sugar must be rationed to housewives in the sacred name of sacrifice.

The President of the United States sends a message direct to the Mikado over the heads of Nipponese envoys—who must cool their heels in the White House anterooms for hours after making appointments with him—both maximum insults to Japan—and yet when attack comes on Pearl Harbor it is unprovoked. The list is endless.

And let us not forget to add to it, the heroic MacArthur, abandoned in the Philippines with a handful of stalwarts while ship after ship leaves Atlantic ports by night, bearing our soldiers to the "protection" of Ireland.

Should a cynical citizenry root itself hoarse over such a political carrousel and agree that this Republic cannot win its war without it, or should hard Yankee common sense lay down a few ultimatums for a sweeping and drastic renovation, and consign the social-gain nepotists to the trash-bins of oblivion?

THIS WAR cannot be decided halfway in our favor till the Jacobins, jackals and Judaists have been junked. As Patrick Henry declared a long time ago, "If that be treason, make the most of it!" One thing is certain. The men with the intestinal fortitude to stand up to the Jacobins, jackals and Judaists for this interlude of public disillusion, may easily be the men to succeed the Jacobins, jackals and Judaists when ma-

chinery of State goes into reverse. And they won't do it by destroying or disrupting Government, either. They will do it by returning the nation to a Constitutionalism that scours. There's nothing wrong with our government or with our way of life or with our Republic itself but the internationalistic termites that have eaten their way into the country's staunch foundations.

All of which is contending in utmost candor that the present management of the United States is provenly incapable of supervising or handling this national dilemma, and if the flag is to be kept flying, a different breed of citizen must come to the political forefront.

Let us not worry overmuch—he'll come! ✎ Signs that he is already on his way, are appearing in the nightly blitherdoms of a dozen columnists, in the flaming criticisms by militant Republicans, in the deadly alacrity with which such a poor makeshift for outraged opinion as "Bundles for Congressmen" is being caught up and promoted across an outraged nation.

Minding Our Own Business . .



THIS time to lay down the clean-cut and unassailable policy that the United States has one concern, and one only: To apply its attention strictly to the continents that are North and South

America, to get out of every other part of the world and stay out, to set up a Monroe Doctrine for the Western Hemisphere and stick to it, to ignore the Germans, the Russians, the British, the Chinese, the Japanese and the Martians, and apply itself concertedly to the business of fortifying and stabilizing American territory from Canada to Mexico and from Baltimore to San Francisco so that Christian Americans can live in reasonable welfare from now till doomsday without let or hindrance from any other power on the face of the globe. When that policy is recognized and sincerely adhered to, nine tenths of the troubles of this Republic will vanish over night.

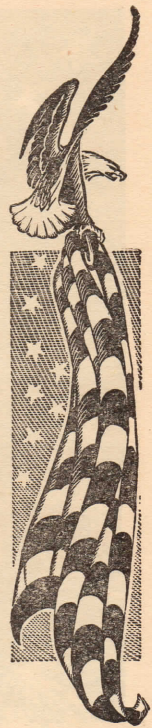
The claim advanced from some quarters that life has so changed that the United States can no longer live unto herself but must mess in all the vicissitudes and quarrels of Europe, Asia, Africa or Oceania in order to hold her

place, is balderdash. It is agitated by Stalinists, addlepates or vultures. For 150 years this western Republic lived unto itself alone, and in those fifteen decades it fought but two foreign wars—both of them of minor size and consequence—one with Britain over kidnapping of our seamen and one with Spain over her treatment of Cubans right at our southern doors.

This western Republic came to affluence and renown in that it did persist in its traditional policy of isolation recommended by Washington, and the coming of the airplane has nothing to do with a mighty nation's minding its own business, being civil to its neighbors, and considering it none of its concern what types of government peoples abroad may have wished on them, or tolerate. When the Wandering Jew got into the Federal saddle and began to use the United States to pull his racial chestnuts out of the fire from Berlin to Singapore, the Republic skidded, and is skidding at this moment. Jews simply can't keep their noses out of their Gentile neighbors' business, and when they are of major influence in a government, as they are in ours, that government is going to attempt to act as kibitzer for the universe. However, to get back to our participation in world politics . .

OUR MUCH-touted foreign trade, which it is claimed we must protect, to the extent of espousing Britain whenever she gets into a jam through her own muddling, has been shown to constitute less than six percent of our total volume of national commerce. We can write it off the books permanently and still maintain a living standard that surpasses that of any other nation on earth.

If God Almighty has given us two mighty oceans to protect us east and west, we can take advantage of them. We can withdraw into our own gracious strength of morale and resource, fortify our two coasts and twin borders to repel any assaults against them, and tell the rest of the world to go commit suicide at its eccentric pleasure; we propose in our own right to live our own lives as God gives us wits ✎





Lindbergh said, just as General Billy Mitchell said a decade before him, that the United States with a moderate but efficient air force could defend itself against any nation or combination of nations on earth. Hitler can't get at us. The Mikado can't get at us. We can establish our own sound economy, put up our military barriers, and let all these international squabblers fight it out. Hitler is not going to live forever—besides, what is it our business if he should? Japan may or may not conquer China—but one good-sized earthquake could smear the Rising Sun Empire into the Hereafter tomorrow morning and the troubles of Asia would continue from everlasting to everlasting.

No greater imbecility was ever hatched than a sovereign nation's going into major war over the existence of one mortal man.

This fantastic notion of carrying the Four Freedoms, whatever they may be, to all the nations of the earth, is saying in effect: "We propose to impress the American Way of Life upon you whether you like it or not."

Hitler expresses the same sentiment when he is alleged to declare: "We propose to impress the Nazi Way of Life upon you whether you like it or not."

What's the difference between the two, excepting that one is ours and the other Germany's. Who but God Almighty has divine right to say that any way of life shall be impressed upon anybody?

Because it's our way of life doesn't make the impressment proper. The Judaistic journalists screech "Nazi propaganda!" when any sort of suggestion is turned loose that would leave Hitler or Japan in possession of their gains. But it isn't a question of leaving anybody in possession of any gains. It's a question of seeing that the United States is left in possession of what she owns already and not letting it be jeopardized or confiscated by engaging in fisticuffs on the far horizons of the Seven Seas while the Republic is left wide open to an internal demoralization that is worse than Hitler's bombers.

Millions Are Saying These Things . .

MILLIONS of Americans are thinking these things, though they may not be saying them publicly. The fact that few beyond the politicians or Judaists are whooping it up for this war, is the converse way that the public takes of expressing its disapproval of the appalling predicament into which wider and wilder intervention is plunging the Republic.

What would Abraham Lincoln do in this or that situation? is always a sound criterion to apply to dilemmas as they develop, not to mention what the Father of His Country has already said—which we have disastrously disregarded.

At one time during the darkest hours of the Civil War, a member of Lincoln's cabinet proposed that a war be deliberately provoked with some foreign power in order to end the internal conflict and unite the nation in the face of common jeopardy.

Lincoln is reported as not having language strong enough in his vocabulary to squelch such imbecility. He saw this Republic as standing firmly on its own two feet at all times, minding its own business, conserving the welfare of its citizens and growing invincible because it refused to be weakened periodically by intercontinental quarrels.

That, however, would be an insufferable status for the United States to hold, with Britishers and Judaists sitting in the sidelines. They have recognized of old that the United States, so isolated, would develop to a strength and dominance that would constitute an everlasting menace to their State of World Bolshevia. So they move in on us, and pile us in the ditch!



ALL the same, it is not "gloating" over the nation's reverses, real or fancied, to see how Kismet is working from both Europe and the Orient to restore such a policy as America's birthright.

This Republic, barricaded and defended behind her own stupendous resources, could ignore the balance of the Universe for a thousand years. True, the Rothschild money

racket would suffer and probably collapse. The Judaists would have to give up the dream of reentering Germany and chastising the Germans for sponsoring Hitler. The Japanese would be left with a much swollen Oriental empire that would put them on a par with Britain or United States. But all of it could be viewed as happening upon another planet, if statesmen could get a foothold in the Republic who thought only of Americans and perfecting a system of life that became an insurance against more world shenanigans.

Well, suppose events happen that enforce such isolation ultimately? Isn't it better to envision plans for a renovated, protected and stabilized America, than to go on beating tom-toms for a wild, vague, improbable Americanizing of the world that makes the kaleidoscope of internationalism the Christian's morning headache?

Construction in a Collapsing World



THE WEEK'S news dispatches continue bolder in their implications that Hitler and Stalin may come to terms before spring fighting starts. It does not seem to be idle rumor. Rather it ap-

pears that forces in control of allied censorships are breaking the bad news gently that within another two or three months Russia may be lost to us as an ally and all the goods and money we have bestowed upon Bolshevia, she will keep—or possibly use against us. On Friday, February 5th, the dispatches from London stated baldly that Britain's Libyan campaign against the Germans had turned out a bust, that the British in North Africa were picking up their gear and skedaddling out in another "glorious retreat" and that therefore all the reports that had previously come through, about the African Nazis' being "exterminated," had been deceits and fabrications. In the Orient, Japan continues to press her gains, Singapore has been wiped off the allied map as an asset, and if General MacArthur stops or slaughters 300 Japanese in Philippine jungle, it is good for an eight-column scream head in American Sunday papers. That badly off do the Americans seem to be for reports of progress. In the British Parliament, Winston Churchill is fighting tooth and claw to maintain his place, with arrests report-

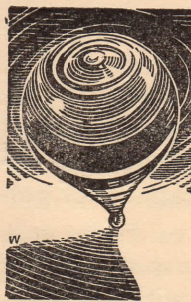
ed of members who oppose him too vehemently.

On the American front, in Washington, criticism flares to white heat over the antics of Eleanor Everywhere and the employment of her Jewish night-club protegees at salaries ranging from \$4,600 to \$8,000 a year for screen and social "parasites" in the Civilian Defense. It seems to be a fan-dance war—or so the plain people of the nation infer. Anybody who knows the President's spouse, and can shake a nifty ankle, can get on the public payroll at a fancy figure. Was ever condition worse in Babylon when "Mene, mene, tekel upharsin!" appeared on the walls of the palaces of piffle? However, such is Judaism, rife in Gentile governments!

TRUCKLOADS of "Bundles for Congressmen" start to Washington from the West, mainly comprising pants without pockets, as a cynical rebuke to Representatives that America condemns their waste of public moneys. The Judaists and their satrap publicists bethink to call it "gloating over Axis successes" to call attention to these trends in journals opposed to termite New-Dealism. That is the last shaft which they possess in their quiver of racial arrows to launch at their opponents. The stern cosmic fiat, however, increasingly seems to be that this is not so much another war in which we find ourselves engaged, as a colossal renovating of the Republic of its megalomaniacal or incompetent marplots, while Americans are disciplined into coming back upon their own continent which God has given them, and minding their own business there, as they have attention focused by dilemma on the condition of their own household.

small assurance that even the gains of Germany or Japan are going to be true and permanent ✎

If we were honestly engaged in winning a war for the United States and none other, that would be one thing. But we are committed to winning a war for imperial Britain and Bolshevik Russia and China—which is something else again.

We do not propose to retreat on our own battlefronts a single inch, but when a situation is overdrawn, unnatural and predatory, in fields afar, and when we let ourselves be committed to a policy of expending billions today for foreign nations that by the overturn of a cabinet tomorrow may employ all that resource and equipment against us, we are not engaging in legitimate war but illegitimate gambling with our sovereignty as jackpot.

Someone has to say these things. The nation from coast to coast is thinking them.

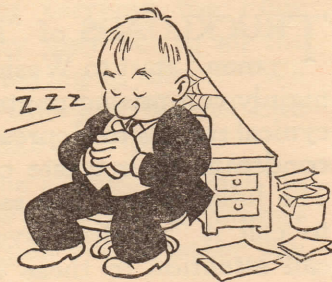
An Answer to Apathy . .

PAUL Mallon announced in one of his columns last week that the next "study" of the Administration is going to concern itself with the American people's "apathy" toward this war, and what could be done to jolt them from their coma. The nation is in grave danger—according to the Administration's view—but the Gentile citizenry does not seem to become sufficiently excited.

There is really no need for any long-drawn-out "study" of this public lassitude. The reasons for it can be counted on the fingers of one hand ✎

First—and foremost—the great mass of citizens of this nation have suffered nine years of financial impoverishment and emotional devitalization till they are scarcely capable of getting excited over anything;

Second, they were 92 percent, by poll, against participating in this war to start with and elected Mr. Roosevelt a third time because of his repeated promisings to keep them out of it; they now feel disillusioned and outraged that



these promisings were apparently more "campaign oratory" and they cannot become widely enthusiastic over what has every aspect of cynical bilking;

Third, the President's tendency to gather all reins of power into his own hands—in flagrant disregard of traditional Constitutionalism—while at the same time surrounding himself with political sycophants of communistic or crackpot philosophies, unleashes the deadly suspicion that all is not well in the upper brackets of Federal government and that the war has truly been manipulated for America for ulterior purposes that have little to do with conserving American sovereignty;

Fourth, the insolent and dictatorial attitude taken toward us by both Britishers and Judaists, and the emasculation of our military and naval forces that Germanic Europe may be crushed in the interests of English imperialism and revitalized Zionism, spreads the subconscious realization that this is truly a war of foreign accommodation and convenience, and America's role is neither rational nor honest; Fifth, New Deal leadership as exhibited to date has shown itself as an increasing demonstration of incompetence, nepotism, fatuity and at times downright silliness, with inconsistency and contradiction in most acts of its principals, and the whole martial gesture maintained in an atmosphere of ballyhoo, rancor, extravagance and favoritism.

HARKING to common-citizen comment, day after day out here in the cornbelt, both the patriotic and dispassionate observer grasp in legitimate alarm that instead of feeling like whooping it up for a quick and effective victory, the man in the street is bewildered and sickened by the predicament into which partisan or radical leadership has plunged his nation ✎

The British-Zionist-Bolshevist war bloc evidently built upon the psychology that all which would be required to put the American populace into a dither of combative patriotism would be the proper number of inflammatory editorials in the papers, the proper amount of propaganda films in the movies and generous programs of marine band concerts in the parks. As it is turning out, the public perspicacities in regard to our participation go deeper than that. What the public actually seems to be saying to the Administration by its alleged apathy is, "Apparently you wanted your war, and agi-

tated until you got it. The country didn't want it and was not prepared in the military sense to fight it. Things seem to have gone haywire from the opening attack. Now it's your pudding, and you cook it. Don't come around abusing the common citizen for indifference because you refused from the beginning to consider his opinions."

It is to be doubted if anything is going to abolish this apathy but a complete change in the personnel of leadership, and an ascension to influence of men whose prime purpose is to extricate the Republic from its unhallowed quandary while at the same time beginning the colossal task of curing the nation of its illness internally ✻

The American people are not merely tired out; they are inhumanly exhausted—one might almost say, prostrated. They have heard the cry of "Wolf! Wolf!" so long and so constantly that they now react with the comment "Oh, so this is the wolf? So what!"

The Administration may make a "study" of this insouciance at a probable cost of more millions that give sinecures to screen stars and fan dancers, but when all is said and done, it will know just what hard-headed Hoosiers perceive at this minute—you can't lash a dead horse into doing much plowing. Successful arousing of the public enthusiasm will come from another quarter and motive entirely. So watch that happen!

Sovieters Want Women in War

LONG have Mrs. Roosevelt and Frances Perkins been advocating that women be drafted. Speaking before the Congregation Sharey Zedek during the twenty-third annual convention of the Women's League of United Synagogues of America at Detroit on November 11, 1941, Mrs. Roosevelt said "women in defense will be a tremendous factor in making this a real war to end war."

January 24 in Washington, Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins said that by 1943 "it will be necessary to mobilize young women for factory workers." She indicated plainly that women would be drafted. That has been done in England—with disastrous results—and it is a part of the communistic scheme of sovietizing America.

"Growing fears over the real motives behind the Civilian Defense program are being expressed here by prominent women," said William Fulton in his November 11, 1941, dispatch from New York City to the Chicago Tribune, and he added:

"There is a growing suspicion that the wolf of Washington politics is lurking under the clothing of patriotism."

Those New York women leaders feel that the OCD is being used to promote the collectivist ideas of the Roosevelt Administration.

Concerning women in the Army—which is a communistic idea for the purpose of degrading women—let a top sergeant of the Austrian Army in the first World War tell his story, published in the Chicago Tribune January 26: "Let's keep women out of the Army if we are to win this war. A war is a job for men, not for women. What is the matter with our millions of young men? I saw women in the old Austro-Hungarian army. When they started in, that was the beginning of the end of it. Mr. Marshall and Mr. Stimson are for it. If they want some tips call on me."

There is plenty of work for women to do in wartime as in peace time, but any country valuing its womanhood will not degrade them by inducting them into the actual fighting services.



Apathy Perhaps Is Only Confusion . . .

"IF SINGAPORE goes down, the whole Far Eastern theater may be lost," said William L. Batt, chairman of the inter-allied raw materials board February 6 in New York City. Then he said:

"I find all around me a smugness and satisfaction which to my mind are entirely unjustified. "America is engaged in a life-and-death war. This is nothing new for us. But, not since the days of the Revolution, have we ever had so much of a chance to lose a war.

"And we have a chance to lose this one.

"Suppose we do lose the whole of the Far East and all the critical supplies we need from that area. Suppose the Germans finally succeed in Africa and take Suez, which would be tantamount to taking the whole Middle East. Suppose Hitler does start a new and successful offensive in Russia in the spring. . . .

"Suppose all these things happen, and all of them can happen. Where would we be? I do not like to think about the answer to that question. But I feel that I must think about it. And so must every other American. . . .

We must think about these things so we don't kid ourselves. . . . We're big. We're strong. We're tough. Yes, but so is the other fellow." Then the same day comes the columnist, Dave Boone, saying:

"The complacency of the average American in the greatest crisis America has ever faced is added to every day by the circus and side-show touches given war activities by leaders who act as though they were opening a new vaudeville circuit."

And why the apathy, smugness and indifference? Perhaps Eddie Cantor or Dorothy Thompson could explain.

OCD Boondogglers Boom and Bump!

SYMBOLIC of all that is wrong with the New Deal is Mrs. Roosevelt's Office of Civilian Defense. Scathing criticism of the conduct of that office reached new highs February 6. "Note to Mrs. Big: If air raids come and civil defense doesn't work letter-perfect—which few expect—better get set for terrific public criticism of yourself," said the weekly review, "Washington Calling," published in the Scripps-Howard newspapers, and that series of critical notes ended thus: "But there's only one man big enough to fire Mrs. Roosevelt, or is he?"

That writer pointed out that LaGuardia is on the way out, and that others are going, and for the good of the service Mrs. Roosevelt should resign also.

February 6 the Chicago Tribune dispatch told of the verbal blitz put on Mrs. Roosevelt in the House, saying: "Never in the history of Congress has a President's wife received such censure" ✻

Over a score of Representatives blistered the OCD and the part being played by Mrs. Roose-

velt for installing "fan dancers, movie actors, poets, and communistic writers" in the OCD. Hiring of Mayris Chaney at \$4,600 a year touched off the fire-works, although previously placing Melvyn Douglas—real name Hesselberg—on the payroll to draw an annual salary of \$8,000 had previously evoked a storm of criticism ✻

Representative Philip A. Bennett, Missouri Republican, said that if Miss Chaney is worth \$4,600 a year, "then Sally Rand, strip tease artist from my own Congressional district down in the Ozarks, ought to be employed because she would, on this scale, be worth at least \$25,000 a year to the civilian defense."

Representative Clare Hoffman, Michigan Republican, in discussing "The Eleanor Glide" dance, invented by Miss Chaney, said: "If that is the prime requisite for such an important job I promise you that I will persuade Sally Rand to name six of her ostrich fans—Capt. Jimmie, Capt. Elliott, Lieut. John, Ensign Franklin, Sistie and Buzzie."

Representative Ford, California Republican, thought that the "17 volunteers" serving under Mrs. Roosevelt for \$4,600 to \$8,000 a year salaries were excess baggage, and he ridiculed this division in these words:


"The funds supposed to be going for gas masks are being diverted for the benefit of actors and fan dancers such as Douglas and Miss Chaney. It does not seem to be hard to get these persons to volunteer for such salaries."

To which Representative Hoffman responded: "Let's start a 'Bundles for Eleanor' campaign as a reward for her serving as an employment agent for the idle rich. If the President wants the support or confidence of the public, instead of asking through Political Boss Flynn for the defeat of all Republican candidates for Congress, let him request that the first lady retire from the front of the public stage where she is making our war efforts ridiculous and causing her own good judgment and sincerity to be questioned" ✻

Representative Charles L. Faddis, Pennsylvania Democrat, made the following significant comparisons: ✻



"Melvyn Douglas is being paid \$8,000 a year, which is as much as we are paying Gen. MacArthur while he battles to save the white race in the Pacific. Miss Chaney, inventor of 'the Eleanor Glide' and protegee of Mrs. Roosevelt, is getting almost twice as much as was received by Capt Colin Kelly, who gave his life in our defense."

Representative John Taber, New York Republican, trained his artillery on the target, too, saying: 

"There are astounding and almost sacrilegious items in this bill which is supposed to be for national defense. The President has ordered 'parasites' to get out of Washington. I find in the dictionary that 'a parasite is a hanger-on, a toady, sycophant, or a plant or animal living on some other organism, at whose expense it obtains food and shelter.'

"Among the leading citizens who unquestionably fall in this category is Secretary of the Interior Ickes to start with. He has allocated more than 200 million dollars to Puerto Rico for communistic operations. Another is Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins, the great friend of Harry Bridges."

Clapper Objects to 'Eleanor Everywhere'

RAYMOND Clapper, always a supporter of the New Deal, devoted his entire February 7 column to the mess being created by Mrs. Roosevelt's OCD, beginning his column thus: "I hope Westbrook Pegler will come down here and do one of his justly celebrated scalping jobs on the Office of Civilian Defense. I mean on Mrs. Roosevelt, too, because half the trouble around there could be got rid of if the President would haul her out of the place." Later in his column, Mr. Clapper delivered this stiff punch: "It is incredible that President Roosevelt will allow this situation to continue much longer. It has become a public scandal." The storm brewing in January has now broken into violent hurricanes of criticism, and shows that Mrs. Roosevelt's activities have reached scandalous proportions. A January 15 dispatch to the Chicago Tribune said:

"There have been mounting complaints from Government officials against her putting her finger into their affairs. Mrs. Roosevelt has for years stepped into various offices offering suggestions, proposing plans, and giving gen-

erously of criticism. This activity has increased since her connection with the OCD and has brought her the name of 'Eleanor Everywhere' from harassed officials."


So Mrs. Roosevelt's friends are advising her to resign her position. They are concerned for her health, said the Tribune January 15 dispatch, which adds that "the strain is telling on her." The dispatch then makes this significant contribution:

"At the hearing yesterday she appeared worn and tired. She was extremely nervous. At her conferences she is said to display a critical attitude and a tendency to engage in tiffs, which she did not show before."

Perhaps Mrs. Roosevelt needs to go on a Vitamin B diet. Vitamin B deficiency will make anybody nervous.

What Washington really needs, however, are a few men like General MacArthur—at the top!

Will Congress Choose Pensions or Patriotism?

THAT "Bundles for Congressmen" campaign, while short-lived, performed a service in that it awakened many Members of Congress to a sense of shame. Senator Harry F. Byrd, Virginia Democrat, February 6 introduced a bill to repeal the pensions for Congressmen provision passed in late January and signed by President Roosevelt. The Virginia Senator asked the Members of Congress to set an example of patriotic self-denial, saying: 

"If we in Congress vote pensions and new perquisites for ourselves, then we cannot deny similar favors to all other citizens."

Let the Congress repeal that bill before any Member stands up to ask the people of this nation to make inhuman sacrifices to support the unconscionable heavy spending going on in Washington in the name of national defense.

In 1942, according to the February 4 National Observer column, Vice President Wallace is saying the same thing. In fact, this country will have to underwrite a universal WPA program.

Where Are the Reds?

STALIN'S Reds need rubber, and Japan appears to be taking over all the rubber growing territory in the Far East, and already has the richest plantations which are on the Malayan peninsula. Perhaps that explains the significant news in the Tokyo broadcast, picked up by the Associated Press February 6 beginning thus:

"Conversations between Japan and Russia looking to the Japanese-Soviet fishery question are progressing smoothly, Vice Foreign Minister Haruhiko Nishi said today. Nishi said Japan was endeavoring to reach an amicable settlement quickly."

Stalin was reported February 5 as being dissatisfied with the amount of lend-lease aid he is receiving, and the real situation on the German-Russian front was reported February 4 in the National Observer column which said:

"Our Army experts lean toward pessimism in their confidential comments on the winter fighting in Russia. They do not share the popular belief that Hitler has been wounded fatally or even badly cut up. British military liaison men left in Washington by Churchill concur in our G. H. Q.'s attitude. . . . The Germans are retreating slowly and methodically. It is no rout. They are reported to be inflicting heavier losses than they have suffered. Meanwhile the Reich is training millions of new soldiers, turning out more modern weapons, stocking food supplies."

Then the National Observer column says that in "the spring the Nazis will return to the attack on more familiar terrain. They will resume the offensive from a line deep inside the Soviet rather than on the Polish border. This prospect explains why every message from the Kremlin carries the postscript: 'Send us planes, tanks, artillery!'"

The realistic Reds in the Kremlin have all they can do in Europe without engaging Japan, which explains why several times Moscow spokesmen have said that they would not go to war in the Far East.

And Yet More Waste!

CONSIDER the hypocrisy of demanding sacrifices of the people while the boondoggling exponents of communism go full-steam ahead implementing their socialistic schemes to sovietize America.

The Farm Security Administration expenditures were called a disgrace February 6 by Edward A. O'Neal, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, in testimony given in Washington.

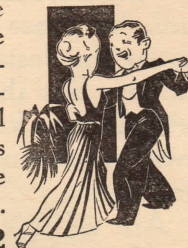
