ditions surround the 8th, with quick fluctuations and a general feverish tone to values. Manipulations at that time must be with a view to quick profits. A downward tendency on the 3rd, with a bull movement probable between the 6th and 8th.

The position of Mars in the third house points to accident by rail, and some mishap to a pleasure party. A calamity to the travelling public is very likely in the early days of the month, and agitation in railroad traffic may be anticipated.

At the time of the New Moon on the 14th the cardinal sign Cancer will be on the eastern horizon, with the luminaries conjoined in the second mansion, in aspect with Mars. This chart holds rule to the middle of the ensuing month, which period will abound in extravagance, and there will be considerable waste of public means. Mercury rising, in trine with Uranus, shows advancement along electrical, scientific, and literary lines, a stimulus to occcult thought, and something incidental thereto will attract much interest.

Venus in the third is excellent for postal interests, and this branch of the Government will reap advantage of some nature. Much amicability in neighboring relations. The disruptive Mars in the lower heaven is a menace to public buildings as well as private property, giving danger of fires, explosions, etc., close to the 18th and 25th. Criticism of the governing factions will grow out of this position.

A bearish tendency in the stock market may be expected about the 18th, with recoveries on the 21st, and from then till the close of the month there will be marked activity; very staunch on the 26th and 27th, with combinations in evidence; wheat will advance.

The position of the malefic Saturn in the sixth, afflicted by Uranus and Neptune, and Jupiter in close proximity in evil aspect of the luminaries, will give rise to chronic complaints. Those addicted to hay fever will suffer much, and not a few cases of influenzea will be reported. This disease was so named in Italy in the seventeenth century "because it was attributed to the 'influence' of the stars" (Dr. Parkes, F. R. S.). This position of Saturn inclines to pandemic conditions, and the health outlook for the month is not good, particularly among the aged. This is especially indicated on the Pacific coast, where Saturn, the Destroyer, occupies the house of death at the time of lunation. Some catastrophe to a school, hotel, or theatre will occur in that section.

Local municipalities in the middle sections of the country will experience oppositions, and official peculations will crop up. Scandals, domestic infelicities, and a full divorce calendar, may likewise be expected

At Manila The 23rd degree of Capricorn ascends, with Jupiter and Saturn near conjunction therein. Health will be far from good in the eastern archipelago; east winds will prevail, and this Saturnine action upon the atmosphere will produce chronic maladies, and increased mortality is to be feared. A similar disposition of these planets occurred at the spring equinox, this year, in our home country, which accounted for the increased downfall and the lateness of the season. In the Phillipines native treachery will be to the fore, and the militant powers will be active. Some concerted action on the part of the native islanders will necessitate greater stringency in measures of government. There must be allowance made for their slowness in assimilating ideas of civilization so entirely alien to inborn racial standards; and though rigid rule is perhaps necessary in the interests of progress and good goverment, yet our authority should be administered in benevolent doses, lest chronic nausea be engendered in the body politic of these people.

Weather Forecast for August.

The preponderance of solar aspects in August will cause considerable atmospheric perturbation. The month opens with very warm weather, storm conditions will form around the 3rd, and in the next few days will travel across the country from SW. to NE. On the 3rd the Sun will aspect Saturn simultaneously with the lunar equinox, producing aqueous condensation, a fluctuating temperature, and a general revolt in the elements. Barometric depression marks the 4th, and by the 5th or 6th, with the Sun forming a magnetic angle with Uranus, much downpour may be expected, extending up to and including the 7th. This storm belt

Short Talks on Astrology.

Let us have a little chat on Astrology and see if we can't strike up a more familiar acquaintance with the subject.

The relationship between the stars and mundane matters should be comparatively easy of comprehenion and acceptance. One need only admit the inseparableness of the All, As before intimated, man is possessed of a sidereal organism whose operations accord with the mutations in the ambient. Thus, when Saturn is afflicted by contrary aspects in the heavens a diverse temper of the atmosphere may be expected; when he is ill-conditioned in a horoscope, the spleen becomes disordered, coinciding with a case of the "blues," When Mars aspects the luminaries in the solar system, calorific influences send the thermometer up; if he afflict the Sun or Moon in the individual constitution, red or inflamatory conditions result; if he afflict Jupiter the liver is affected, and the biliary ducts become obstructed. Is it any wonder that Hippocrates, the "father of medicine," should have said, "A physician is incompetent to practice physic if he be unacquainted with astrology?"

It will thus be seen that when we speak of Jupiter, of Saturn, or of the other planets, we do not attach an importance to them as merely conglobate bodies moving in space, but refer rather to the principles of which they as symbols are the manifestations. They are gigantic batteries from which irradiate the creative energies, and have not within themselves the element of causation: as the combination of zinc and copper does not *create* the electricity generated thereby, but only brings to a point of individualization that which is everywhere existent. And so when Jupiter comes to an aspect of Venus (copper) the conditions, as in the metals referred to above, have been formed for an efflux of the celestial magnetism in quality and degree according to the polarities which these planets possess at the time of such combination,

Does Astrology begin to look to you more rational and scientific than you had formerly supposed?

For many, many centuries the science has been anathematized because misunderstood. But we propose to clear away some of the cobwebs that have gathered because of this stricture and neglect, and to prove to you that our universe has a *soul*, and that the lesser souls *must* and *do* respond in conscious vibration with the outworking of the general plan.

B. G. JENKINS, F. R. A. S., of England, in an article published in *The Pall Mall Gazette*, London, says:

"The reason why people of the present day do not

believe in planetary influence are two-fold—first, it is held to betoken ignorance and superstition; points on which educated people are very sensitive, and secondly, they cannot imagine how such tiny objects can affect their great globe, unconsciously forgetting that our earth among the planets is as a pea among cannon balls. From a lengthy study of this subject, I can come to no other conclusion than that the planets of the solar system are intimately connected with the phenomena or what takes place on this earth, and I shall, in as few words as possible, lay before the reader my reasons for such a conclusion."

Also from the same article is the following :

"From the lofty heights of modern science we have been accustomed to look down with pity and contempt upon the Astrologer of the Middle Ages—the weak dabblers in science, who were foolish enough to believe that the stars had an influence upon man. An allusion to Astrology was always good to raise a laugh at a science meeting, and the Astrologers and Alchemists were classed together as either dreamers or charlatans. Of late years, however, a reaction has set in. The Astrologer is becoming habilitated very rapidly. The influence of the planets upon the earth is now admitted to be very distinct, and fresh proofs of their disturbing influences are constantly cropping out."

GOETHE begins his autobiography with these words: "On the 29th of August, 1749, at midday, as the clock struck 12, I came into the world at Frankfort-on-the-Main. Mv horoscope was propitious : the Sun stood in the sign of the Virgin, and had culminated for the day; Jupiter and Venus looked on him with a friendly eye and Mercury not adversely, while Saturn and Mars kept themselves indifferent; the Moon alone, just full, exerted the power of her reflection all the more as she had then reached her planetary hour. She opposed herself, therefore, to my birth, which could not be accomplished until this hour was passed. These good aspects, which the astrologers managed subsequently to reckon very auspicious for me, may have been the causes of my preservation; for, through the unskillness of the midwife, I came into the world as dead, and only after various efforts was I enabled to see the light."

lines divide the map into twelve mansions, or "houses not built with hands," each of which bear rule over certain divisions in nature, those in nativities pertaining to affairs connected with the individual, while in Mundane Astrology —of which I am treating—they refer to matters affecting the welfare of the people in general. A peculiarity of these maps lies in the fact that the points of the compass are reversed from those observed in geography, east being on the left and north at the bottom. This is explained in occultism on the basis that everything is reversed by passing through the astral plane, a fact easily illustrared by the inverted image reflected through a photographic lens.

The first house and its ruler is significant of the people, their general condition, etc.; the second, the world of finance; the third, the postal, telegraph, the carrying service, and neighboring interests; the fourth, the landed interest, and matters opposed to the Government; the fifth, pleasures and amusements of the public, schools, hotels, children, etc.; the sixth, the people's health, and the Navy; the seventh, public enemies, diplomatic affairs, war, marriages, and our foreign relations; the eighth, mortality, also the Cabinet; the ninth, legal courts, clergy, maritime and commercial powers; the tenth, the Government, and aristocracy; the eleventh, the Nation's friends, and the legislative branches of the Government; and the twelfth, prisons, public institutions, and criminality.

The benefic planets are Jupiter and Venus; the malefics are Neptune, Uranus, Saturn, and Mars; the Sun, Moon, and Mercury are convertible, being good or evil according as they be favorably aspected or otherwise. The benefic aspects are the conjunction of good planets, the sextile (60 degrees apart), and the trine (120 degrees apart); the evil configurations are the conjunctions with malefic planets, the semi-square (45 degrees apart), the square (90 degrees apart), and the opposition (180 degrees apart).

This is necessarily but a very brief exposition of the very simplest rudiments of Judicial Astrology, proficiency in the practice of which involves not only familiarity with much technical detail, but that rare aptitude for divination which qualifies a specially constituted mind. Let it be added that the rationale of this system is based upon a

psychic geometry as true in its postulates and as open to mathematical demonstration as are the Propositions of Euclid.

Learning through observation and induction the existence of sequential values in the universal law of progression, the astral philosophers of an age in which this order belonged by right to the kingly and priestly class, realized the importance as predictive factors of the four angles of the year, or the times of the Sun's entry into the four cardinal signs. They perceived in these phenomena the reflection, or convergence, of a definite chain of causes which, as active forces in the Univercaelum, must, through the law of sequence, terminate in effects consistent with the character of the celestial agents thus brought into requisition. Harmony is the composite principle of all manifestation, hence a definitive cause must produce a consonant effect.

It is therefore the psychic and scientific interpretation of these conciliations in the ambient which constitutes the judgment of the astrologer in his judicial forecast of terrestrial conditions. The principal data is furnished by the figure for the Vernal Equinox, the three other ingresses being regarded as correlative segments of the solar revolution, of which the neomenias, or monthly conjunctions of the luminaries, are but subsidiary points in the celestial circle of motion.

Hints on Husbandry.

Common peas if sown on the day following the new Moon will grow quickly and with abundant flowers, but will be barren in the yield; those sown immediately after the second quarter will blossom and bear but little; if sown a day or two after the full moon, blossom and fruit in abundance will result; but if sown just before the moon is out they will little more than break through the ground. Similar results will attend the planting or pruning of fruit trees. These interesting experiments were thoroughly tried some years ago by an astrological society in London known as the



29th will be the proper time. This is valuable advice to farmers who do their own butchering, and whose supply must last through the winter.

Veterinary surgeons are cautioned against operating on animals while the Moon is southing, i. e., transiting the upper meridian.

Trees should be topped or trimmed during the hours of ebb tide, which is after the Moon has southed. An Italian chemist, after fourteen years' investigation, established this fact of sympathy of tree sap with ebb and flow of tide. Vines thus treated will develop better and bear better crops.

Cutting or clipping hair in the wane of the Moon will tend to baldness. With the Moon increasing it will grow faster with that luminary in Taurus, Virgo, or Libra, and more luxuriantly if in Cancer, Scorpio, or Pisces.

Corn should be gathered and cribbed in the wane of the Moon.

Bed and seed plots should be made while the Moon is above the earth.

Trees should be planted at the full of the Moon, and if the Moon be Gemini, Libra, or Aquarius they will grow higher in the air; if in Taurus, Virgo, or Capricorn, they will take deeper root

Perhaps in no branch of nature is planetary rule or interaction so perceptible as in the herb kingdom. Botanical treatises, without suspecting the real importance of the suggestion, make frequent allusions to the influences of the Sun, or to the Moon in its waxing and waning, upon certain growths. A little observation along astrological lines would have revealed a more extended analogy in this respect.

Astro-medical herbalism has had some very illustrious disciples, from Hippocrates and Galen up to Culpepper, and to Simmonite, all of whom recognized and taught the im-

portant bearing of the astral forces upon the remedial qualities of herbs and plants.

While these curative properties as such have never been a matter of question, the irrational and empiric methods in their use as practiced by the legalized pharmaceutist are both inexcusable and deserving of censure. One cannot proceed contrary to a single natural law without the sacrifice of some specific good which Nature intended. The question at issue between the modern school and the astro-botanical system which flourished in the age of Avicenna, resolves itself into one of *time* and *circumstance* in the gathering and manipulation of the nature growths to be found in our woods and our fields. The later scientist presumes Nature to be devoid of essential mutations except those which relate to the seasons, and therefore ridicules the fact of constantly varying fluxes in the regions of celestial magnetism.

Know that every plant and every herb is constitutionally in sympathy with one of the magnetic planes as indicated by planetary rulership, and that the active period of this rule coincides with the rising or southing of said planet. This fact became known through experimentation, coupled with a knowledge of the correlations between these vibratory planes.

In speaking of the *rulership* of planets I would not have one infer the power of a greater over a lesser. The Moon does not bring the tide in, any more than the tide impels the Moon to the zenith; the two are but simultaneous interactions of the same occult principle in nature. And so from the rise and colmination of a planet do we gauge the time at which such principle to which the herb or planet stands related is in most virile activity, for its *magnetic tide*, or inherent virtue, waxes strongest in sympathy with the rise of its attendant star, subsiding again as it wanes from the zenith.

Thus may readily be perceived the rationality of piloting the herbal processes along the currents of this magnetic ocean, which flows and ebbs the same as the waters of the sea. Is there, after all, anything so very strange or difficult of acceptance in this fact? To doubt it as a fact is to question the existence of a law of sympathy as the equilibrating force in the universe. In this Department will be given from month to month instructive hints on botanical medicines, that every family may, by a knowledge of these simple mendicaments become practically its own physician. One often pays a licensed medico an exorbitant fee for writing in hifalutin Latin what in its simple English is ready at hand in nearby lanes or fields. A remedy for dropsy or jaundice if marked Tr. *Coch. Armorica*, will mulct the patient for consultation and prescription fees out of about \$3. And then he won't get the full medicinal potency of this garden *horseradish* as if gathered by himself, and an infusion made therefrom under the proper astral influence.

As the season for the gathering of herbs is at hand, we subjoin the planetary rulerships for the guidance of those who care to provide themselves in this particular. In another part of this Almanac is given for this purpose the times of the rising and southing of the planets.

If not convenient to gather roots or herbs at time of rising or southing of their ruling planets, then proceed when the Moon is making a good aspect thereto, according to above.

Key to Birthday Information.

(1) Sun in good aspect of Jupiter. To males it augurs success in business or speculation, gives excellent judgment in the management of affairs, and will bring some new and influential friendship. Those in employ will meet with promotion or preferment according to sphere of birth or situation; will advance in honor, credit, or professional interest; also favorable for health. To *females* good health and peace of mind are indicated, being also a very powerful and beneficial direction for marriage, if eligible. Natives who come under this planetary influence should push their affairs throughout the year ahead of them, and take every advantage of the opportunities which are sure to arise.

(II) Sun in evil aspect of Jupiter. Those under this influence will need be guarded in business and money transactions, lest they lose that which has been previously acquired; all speculation or new enterprises should be especially avoided, and let economy be the watchword, as there will arise necessities for increased expenditure. This conciliation will affect both sexes alike, and is apt to derange the health, tending to blood disorders, pleurisy, liver troubles, or other ills according to the signs occupied by the planets at birth.

(III) Sun in good aspect of Saturn. This insures an advance over the present conditions, and will bring success in the various employments. Some marked esteem or gain will be received from aged persons, or from those in power. This astral force will create stability of mind, and incline to gravity, patience, and severity in both sexes. Some will benefit through legacy or sudden gain; while it is especially favorable for those interested in agriculture, farm implements, real estate, mining or matters connected with the ground generally. *Females*, if engaged in business, will also benefit as above, and will form new and substantial friendships; if single, there will come offers of marriage, more likely from elderly suitors; the conditions being of a favorable character such are advised not to forego the opportunity.

(IV) Sun in evil aspect of Saturn. This points to a lingering dull period, with a tendency to melancholy and chronic complaints, colds, rheumatism, or bowel disorders; much mental anxiety, and trouble through saturnine persons; the death of a parent or male relative is among the indications. These natives had best look well to their personal and business credit throughout this year of life, and guard against deceptions through so-called friends. Servants and tenants are likely to cause vexation. Envy and malice will be active in those horoscopes. The feminine sex will be affected similarly to the above, and in danger of domestic sorrow, the loss of husband or parent.

(V) Sun in good aspect of Uranus. This points to sudden benefits through unexpected sources—beneficial friendships, publicity, and such honor as would be pertinent to one's pursuit. Those associated with municipal affairs, engaged in public capacities, or seekers after political or civic dreferment, will attain to dignities under this influence. It favors those who may be engaged in unique and speculative transactions. This direction generally brings a "windfall." With the gentler sex it will not be so favorable, affect-

ing them from the domestic or affectional standpoint; to the unmarried causing hasty unions, with speedy and earnest repentance; to the married it gives a tendency to alienation from the marital and home influence, leading to deceptive acts, and creating great danger of domestic pitfalls. Let such keep most carefully to the line of propriety.

(VI) Sun in evil aspect of Uranus. This induces to sudden and unlooked-for calamity, attended with great anxiety of mind, danger of law, or subject to business duplicities. Some proposition will be made to the native likely to lead him into a bad investment ; makes one exceedingly restless, and will lead to nervous disorders if constitutionally subject to same. Sudden losses by bad debts or speculative enterprise, also liable accusations and danger to personal liberty. With *females* this aspect is pregnant with misfortune, tending to involvements in questionable love affairs, with great temptation to elopement. Marriage under this planetary environment will result in speedy separation or death of husband. Too much caution cannot be urged upon these natives. To the married members of the opposite sex it will produce an unaccountable antipathy towards the partner. In a general way and with both sexes this astral condition tends to unfortunate changes, the breakup of home and similar troubles, the exact degree and character being determined only from the individual horoscope. Business men and women under this aspect are likely to be confronted with some Utopian scheme which to all appearances promises well, but leads ultimately to loss and disappointment.

(VII) Sun in good aspect of Mars. Most fortunate for surgeons, physicians, workers or dealers in metallic goods, and for preferment through such sources. Will bring enterprise, an increased and healthy activity, inclines to changes or journeys, good health, and augments the mental and physical energy. To females, some sudden attachment may be expected, a probable offer, but such a union would prove infelicitious. From a business standpoint it affects both sexes alike.

(VIII) Sun in evil aspect of Mars. Sharp or sudden effects, disposes to accidents, cuts, bruises, burns, and feverish complaints. The mind will be irritable and erratic, and disputes and misunderstandings will enter into the life. Both accident and fire insurance should be looked after. Surgical operations are to be avoided. Unfortunate for the opposite sex in the domestic economy, and the affections should be well guarded.

NOTE.—It must be understood that there are often multiple subsidiary aspects in operation at the same time which might either modify or accentuate the above *principal* conditions, to which attention is called as being of *prime* importance to the individual. They are in character fortunate or unfortunate as herein determined, but the exact department of life's affairs thus affected will depend much upon the *hour* of birth. If soon after midnight the aspect will bear upon journeys, kindred, neighbors, letters or writings; if near 3 or 4 A. M., finances; just preceding sunrise, mind, and immediate personal inter-ests; if around 9 or 10 A. M., aspirations, hopes, friends; if immediately pre-ceding noon, business, credit, preferment, and position will be influenced; if shortly before sunset, it will reflect upon the affections, marriage partner, and business transactions; if shortly after sunset, health, servants, affairs conbusiness transactions; if shortly after sunset, health, servants, affairs con-nected with servants, uncles, aunts; close to 9 or 10 p. M., children, pleasurety speculation; if near midnight, the home, domestic matters, and propers, interests.
