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

#### HOW THE EARTH WAS MADE

BY FRANKLIN H. HEALD.\*

N an able article in *The Truth Secker* of April 4, your correspondent, Leon Lewis, says:

"The earth was not the earth in any present sense when it came into being. It was a ball of glowing gas, thousands of times hotter than molten steel, and millions of miles in diameter."

This is, of course, the idea conveyed by the nebular hypothesis, but I believe I can convince Mr. Lewis, or any other thinking person who is not too old and "set" in his ideas, that the earth was originally formed at the outer edge of the present solar system; not by glowing hot gas, but by the condensed crystals of the gas of expanded matter which the sun is always throwing off by heat and which fills the solar system. must recognize the fact that matter has three forms, solid, liquid and gaseous, and two motions, expansion and contrac-When solid matter is expanded into gas by heat, it occupies thousands of times more space than when solid (depending upon the specific gravity or weight before expanded), therefore when the matter of the sun is expanded at the sun by its tremendous heat, its weight is thus raised to the great height of Neptune's orbit (every direction from the sun is up) by expansion, as it must have room to expand. At or beyond the orbit of Neptune the cold is so intense that this colorless gas of expanded matter condenses or crystalizes again into solid matter of exceedingly fine dust, and gradually gathers into larger and larger bunches, until a new world is formed, which gradually falls back to the sun in a spiral and continually decreasing orbit; decreasing the diameter of its orbit in the same inverse ratio with which it increases its speed, obeying the law of falling bodies, minus the check From Truth Seeker, 28 Lafayette Place, N Y., May 2, '03.

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which it receives from its continually increasing centrifugal force. If anyone will take the pains to figure this law out, they will find the planets from Neptune to the sun occupying the exact position required by the law.

There are a number of proofs of this, one of them being that fine dust is often found upon the snows of very high mountains, which is so fine that it cannot fall through the atmosphere of the lower altitudes (see "Microscopic dust," Cen-Its individual particles are so infinitestury Dictionary). imally small that the most powerful microscope will scarcely separate them, and they could not be seen at all were it not for the fact that they accumulate upon the snows. philosophers and physicists have attributed their origin to the eruption of volcanic dust, but when we come to investigate volcanic dust, or any mechanical process of grinding any matter into dust, we find the startling fact that the very finest grinding process known leaves the atoms of dust millions of times larger than the atoms of dust crystalized from gas. Therefore it is absolutely impossible to form these crystals in any other way than by dissolving matter into gas by heat, and then contracting it again into crystals by intense cold. This, then, must satisfy us that they have not a natural origin on earth. Another evidence that gas is condensed into crystals far beyond the orbit of Neptune is the fact that there is known to be a "Zone of Nebula," which is not dissolvable into separate stars by the most powerful telescope, at right angles with the Galaxy or "Milky Way." These Nebulæ do not give a spectra, as do bodies which shine by their own light (Lockyer's Astronomy, note 487). For the reason that these clouds or Nebula are visible in space by reflected light is sufficient proof that they are clouds of crystals. Great (?) scientific societies and political scientists and astronomers have heretofore seen fit to designate them as red-hot gas, which, of course, is an impossibility in Nature. In the first place, gas is colorless and invisible; in the second place, there is no reason or possibility for it to be heated in far-away space; in the third place, if it were ever so red-hot, and such a condition possible, it would become instantly cooled because of its great expansion; and, lastly, if it really was red-hot, it would shine by its own light, and therefore give a spectrum, a thing which it does not do. When the gas of expanded matter condenses into shining crystals in this immensely cold region, they are not heated, and cannot be heated until they have gathered

into a body large enough so that the revolution on its axis creates a friction of grinding, as we find them from Neptune to Jupiter, each larger in bulk, but no heavier, and more heated, until melted to a molten sphere, when the larger bulk is radiated again into gas and they become second-class planets in size, and cool gradually, form a crust, and evolve life. zone of nebula, or clouds of crystals, which are at right angles to the Milky Way, are on the plane of the sun's equator, or the ecliptic of the solar system. Upon this same plane, which is the plane of most active motion (the sun moving at its equator at the rate of 4,000 miles per hour, and its poles motionless), are all the planets, satellites, zodiacal lights, asteroids, and other matter which cannot be seen, with the exception of comets, which are smaller bodies formed too far from the active plane to be caught as part of the newly forming planet or as its satellites. Scientists have lately proved and measured an outward pressure from the sun, which they wrongfully term "the pressure of light." This pressure is the outward, or upward, expansion of heat, expanded matter, or gas which is being continually forced farther up by more solid matter expanding into gas below. When this leaves the sun's surface, we must admit that it leaves it at the equator, which is its active part, and travels from west to east around the sun in a continually increasing orbit, and when it finally reaches the orbit beyond Neptune, where the most of it condenses into crystals, it is still traveling around the sun from west to east, each atom in an orbit of its own, and has not and cannot lose any motion which it had while a part of the In fact, the solar system is all and always a part of the sun, no matter whether as atoms of gas it is being raised by the expansion of heat, or as solid matter it is falling back and returning the same heat which it cost the sun to raise it. There is absolute proof in plenty that solid matter is continually falling into the sun, which, being 146 times hotter than the Drummond light, suddenly changing it into gas of thousands of times greater bulk, causes such tremendous explosions as to tear great deep holes in the body of the sun and send its fiery flames and molten liquid fire tens of thousands of miles in height. At the instant that light reaches the earth from these explosions, delicate magnets and magnetic needles, which are suspended for the purpose, move and vibrate to the exact extent of the amount of additional gas added at the sun. Pens attached keep a record in ink, whether we are awake or

asleep, and scientists will soon recognize the truth that this is a true record of the amount of returning matter falling back to the sun. I cannot in a short article bring all the proofs of these statements, or show you how and why the planets explode after they pass the present orbit of Mercury (which travels two and a half millions of miles per day, and has long since turned its magnetic pole to the sun, as our moon has turned to the earth), and gradually fall into the sun, but I will be glad to, and can, reasonably and simply, explain any situation known to exist in the solar system or universe by the theory of a procession of planets, which is based upon the very simple fact that all motion and phenomena are caused by the expanding and contracting of matter by heat and cold, and that there is no motion, condition or form taken by matter produced any other way.

#### THE FORCE OF PAIN

N the August, 1902, number of this magazine I called attention to the probable connection between the pain of hunger and the motion of the jaws, or eating (page 7). After experimenting, investigating, and comparing the data of well known facts, for more than a year longer, I am now convinced that the act of chewing or eating is a kind of convulsion of the jaws, forced by pain. When hungry, we are in pain, and the pain is more and more as we lose heat from lack of food or fuel. I first had this fact brought to my attention a few years ago on the Mojave desert, when a friend offered to bet \$5.00 that our camp cat was a matcheater. Sure enough, when he took her on his lap and held a match in front of her mouth, she became interested, smelled it, and finally seized it, chew and swallowed it with apparent But there was a cause which I did not see; he was secretly pinching the tip of her tail with his other hand, and this pain was the entire cause of her apparently strange appe-She would have eaten a cigar stub or any other substance, with as much haste or apparent relish. experiment anyone may try, but be careful to keep your fingers This fact, and the fact that the caterpillar out of reach. crawls up the tree, trying to eat everything he passes, until he finds the soft bud, is enough to cause us to investigate. We find that great pain and convulsions first show in the working of the jaws, and that it often results in lockjaw. It is the great pain which causes the mad dog to run and bite everything he meets. It is a convulsion of the nervous system caused by the contracting that will result in death or stopping of the motions of life, if not relieved by heat. This is the basis of the psychic sense which we are supposed to be developing, but which we are in reality loosing, to make room for reason. The worm has very little feeling except that consciousness received by feeling or measuring the relative degrees of heat which drive him into the light and back to the shade. Fossibly some may have a dim sense of sight, but their principal consciousness is caused from pleasure and pain of expansion and contraction forced by different degrees of heat.

Prof. Porter calls those scientists cranks who claim they have been trying to signal from the earth to Mars. He says the theory that there are snow-capped mountains on this neighboring planet has few supporters, and that the apparent whiteness in the vision of the great telescopes is not snow.—Cincinnati Post.



#### DR. B. A. WRIGHT

R. B. A. WRIGHT, whose portrait is our frontispiece this month, died very suddenly at his home in this city May 17th. He was born at Keesville, N. Y., Feb. 27, 1823. Dr. Wright was a leading Freethinker most of his life, and universally loved and respected by those who knew him and were able to appreciate true worth. He was a very able physician, and was many years superintendent of the State Insane Asylum near Toledo, Ohio. The remains were laid at rest in the Rosedale Cemetery, attended by scores of his sorrowing friends. He must use force to make a vacuum, and the force, be it muscular, wind, steam, gas, electricity or any other force, must be made by expanding or contracting by either heating or cooling. The vacuum (or weight of air) would then (by contraction) raise water 32 feet at sea-level, or about 30 feet at New Sharon.

C. H. Hall has a long continued article in the St. Andrews Buoy, treating of the birth, life and death of worlds according to the theory of a procession of planets. It begins in No. 46, February 4. Showing how the great heat of the sun sends matter up beyond Neptune by the force of expansion, he follows it in its falling orbit back to the sun, near which it is scattered again into fragments, and, gradually falling into the
