
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

HEAVENLY BODIES MOVE BY FALLING.

The Nation Builder, of Danneviske, New Zealand, rather lightly criticises my Procession of Planets theory, as being rather oposed to the established laws of Sir Isaac Newton. I believe that his laws are only established, when they will stand the test. Some of them will stand for all time and some will not. Those which are true will stand and those which are a mistake will fall, the same as mistakes of religions and political powers. They may stand for a long time, on account of the reverence for grey haired age, but the time must come when that very age, later advancement and discoveries must count against them. The Nation Builder says in part:

The Procession of the Planets (second edition), by Franklin H. Heald, U. S. A. Price, 1 dollar.

The author of the above booklet is the editor of a monthly paper entitled "The Higher Science Magazine." Mr. Heald is an enthusiast on all matters astronomical, but we scarcely think that he has yet solved the riddle of the universe, although in "The Procession of the Planets," he undertakes to do so. * * * * * Newton discovered that there are two forces in the universe eternally working one against the other in balanced beauty that results in a harmonious procession of all the planets. The one force he called the centrifugal force, the other the centripetal force. But, as Newton, after he had tested the absolute truth of this theory and the universality of this law by endless mathematical calculations, modestly said, whatever the world may think of this discovery, personally he felt like a little child picking up pebbles on the seashore, with a great expanse of ocean lying unexplored beyond." And after he had proved beyond all dispute that there was such a law as he had discovered, he admitted that while he had conclusively proved the truth of his theories, the attempt to discover why two bodies, millions of miles apart, with no apparent connection between them, should have an influence one upon the other, put all his mental faculties to confusion.

Poor Newton! It was 80 years after he had made his great discovery before the leading colleges condescended to accept and teach his theories, and to avoid persecution in his own day he had to publish his theory in the first place in Latin so that only the more educated people could understand them. And he even had to set himself to the task of making his theories harmonize with the teachings of the Bible, so as not to offend the prejudices of his age, and thus did Newton, in fear and trembling and dreading persecution, usher his great discoveries into the world. And now Mr.

Heald tells his readers that if Sir Isaac had taken another step, after "discovering the force of gravitation by wondering why the apple fell to the earth instead of falling into the sky, and wondered why it came to be in the treetop, he would have found that it was placed there by the force of heat, and he would then have discovered the other great force of nature, or rather that heat is the other great opposite force in nature." Newton discovered that motion was the opposing force that balanced gravitation or stillness. But what is the true relation of motion to heat? We will look forward with pleasure to receiving a copy of the third edition of "The Procession of the Planets," which Mr. Heald promises his readers will appear as soon as possible. Price, 10s 6d.

Yes, it is true that Newton discovered what he thot true, that motion was the force that balanced the force of gravity, but I have discovered that it does not balance gravity, and that the planets are gradually approaching the sun, and are not balanced Newton did not discover what makes the motion of a planet in space, which is falling, and therefore was compelled to give god the credit. The real fact is if it were not falling towards the sun it could not move. The arrangement of the planets in their distance from the sun and their rate of speed as they approach the sun is absolute proof of their falling which no intelligent astronomer or scientist dare dispute. If they were balanced in space, the ones nearest the sun would not be traveling faster under a regular ratio, as they actually are. ning at Neptune, we find it nearly twice as far from the sun as Uranus; Uranus nearly twice as far from the sun as Saturn, and so on down to Murcury which is but (average) 32 million miles from the sun and is traveling at ten times the speed of Neptune. The solar system, with the sun for its great center, is a continual found of raising and falling of matter. Matter is radicated away (expanded) from this great hot center as colorless gas, as water is evaporated from the earth into colorless vapor and falls again when cold enough to again condense. Bodes law (see Page 38, PROCESSION OF PLANETS), is so plain that when a planet was missing in the space where the law would place it, its scattered remains were found in the shape of Asteroids, with a camera. The law which I have discovered proves a procession of planets towards the sun and is as follows: "The Planets increase their speed around the sun (as they fall or approach it) in the same inverse ratio, with which they decrease the diameter of their or-(Page 90, Procession of Planets). At the slow rate of speed with which Neptune travels, with very little centrifugal force to throw it away or up from the sun (every direction from the sun is up, in the solar system) it falls towards the sun 1,500 millions of miles, while Mercury moving at such enormous speed (and a correspondingly great centrifugal force to hold it away or up) only approached the sun 35 million miles during the same time. When Mercury gains a speed that shall increase its centrifugal force so much that it will almost be equal to the opposite force of gravity its own center of gravity

will be overcome by these two opposite forces, and it must be scattered into a zone of small fragments which will gradually feed the sun's fires, returning the same heat or force which were required to expand it into gas originally. I have had the advantage of Newton, in being permitted to doubt the story of god, and look for natural reasons why a planet can move around the sun, without supernatural assistance. That a planet gains speed by falling and loses speed again, as it receeds by centrifugal force (as it is thrown farther up) was first presented to me by the action of the planets, satelites and comets, which have elipitic orbits. The orbit of the earth is, for instance, 3 millions of miles nearer the sun at one point (perihelion) than at the opposite (aphelion). When at aphelion, and as it approaches its perihelion curve it gains speed. When it has passed the perihelion curve, and it is gradually getting farther from the sun it again loses speed. All this is well known to happen to the The same is true of the moon's monthly trip earth every year. around the earth and more especially is it true of the comets. some of whose orbits are so oblong that in falling towards the sun they gain such almost incredible speed that centrifugal force throws them away or up like a ball and their decrease in speed, as they go up, is easily measurable. It is hardly fair to assume that because Newton discovered and proved one great law, that he left nothing for future men to discover. He believed that light was composed of infinitismally small particles of matter radiated from the sun, individually traveling at the rate of 193,-000 miles per second; whereas it is but an impulsive motion traveling thru or by-way-of the infinitismally small particles of expanded matter or invisible gas. A jar or force of one against another with lightning rapidity as I have often illustrated by the gun-barrel filled with bullets. No matter how long the gun-barrel is, if you push another bullet in at the breach the one at the muzzle must be forced out. Indeed, Newton was simply "picking up sea shells on the shore of the great ocean of facts, as we are doing yet. He did not gather them all, nor did he rightly classify all he did gather.

WAS LINCOLN RELIGIOUS?

Chas. Collis of 430 W. 118th street, New York, writes to object to my listing Abraham Lincoln with men "who had brains enough to live without charity." He says in part:

* * I inlose you a pamphlet which I think will convince you that in order to evolve truth, we must have truth as a basis. * * * I think it were better for the truth of history, that you should blame him for what he was, rather than commend him for what he was not..*.*..*..*..*..

For my own part I am open to convicion, but allow me, out of curiosity, to ask this question; do you deny a God, or do you say "I do not know?"

Judging by the quality of your writings, I feel certain that you do not contend that this universe is the mere fontuitious conglomeration of atoms.

The pamphlet referred to is a 24-page paper covered booklet, written by General Collis and entitled, "The Religion of Abraham Lincoln. First comes a correspondence between General Collis and Colonel Robert G. Ingersoll, in which Colonel Ingersoll offers him \$1,000 to show that there is a single statement in General Collis' letter which is correct, which cash prize, as I understand, the General did not win. The balance of the book is taken up in giving letters from two other men, stating their opinions of Lincoln's piety. One of them General D. E. Sickles, states that Lincoln made the claim to him that the result of the battle of Gettysburg was due to the directions given to god in a long fervent prayer by Lincoln.

With all due regard to the honesty of General Collis, I believe he has been fooled into thinking Lincoln was foolish enough to make such a ridiculous claim. If Lincoln knew that god would take his advice, against all the millions of prayers offered up day and night in the South, he would not have been vain enough to have mentioned it. In all his history, and all the stories I have ever read or heard about Mr. Lincoln, there is but one thing that gives a suspicion of piety and that is the obscene stories he sometimes used to illustrate his points and I believe that ninety-nine out of a hundred of them are manufactured by self-admired wits and told at his expense, the same as the rumors of prayers. Even the letter of General Sickles to General Collis shows, on the face of it, that it was written more especially to call attention to a wound he received at Gettysburg and also a former wound, making Lincoln's "prophecy" an excuse for writing a good deal about them. The other man, a Mr. Munsell, originating in "Egypt," Ill., who was a total stranger to General Collis, and is also to myself, starts his letter by a barefaced falsehood in intimating that Colonel Ingersoll had attacked the character of Mr. Lincoln, whereas exactly the opposite is true. Colonel Ingersoll was defending Lincoln's character against the degrading and infamous religion, which the character of Jesus Christ represents, i. e., destroying the home, hating father, mother, children, brothers and sisters, and himself also; drunkenness, improvidence, mysogomy, anarchy, prostitution of women and virgins by supposed supreme beings which are unseen and unknown, witchcraft, cannibalism, slavery ownership and submission of women and a thousand other crimes, which the so-called Christ, god and the "holy" bible stand sponsor for, which Ingersoll in the greatness and goodness of his heart did not believe that Lincoln was ignorant enough to indorse or even believe. His whole life seems to prove it also. The stranger, Munsell, like General Sickles, also takes especial pains to parade his own importance, by pretending that Lincoln took such a fancy to him that he disclosed the whole inside workings of the government machinery in confidence. General Collis heads the letter as "The story of Mr. Munsell," which it no doubt is. No person of ordinary intelligence can believe for a moment, that Mr. Lincoln would be so silly, and we know that he never drank to excess, even at sacrament. Now if Mr. Munsell would make these false statements, to laud himself, there is no doubt that he would "see things for Christ's sake and lie for the glory of god," as the New Testament teaches its dupes.

General Collis himself is not a Christian, as he will find, if he will read the bible thotfully and then carefully examine his own mind. I will explain to him cheerfully that I do deny that there is a god. The only power in the universe has its origin in the different degrees of heat in matter, or by the expanding and contracting of matter by heating and cooling. General Collis is "open for conviction," and I can easily convince him that it is absolutely impossible for a god, or any power with intelligence to control nature. I can furnish the absolute proof, but as I have said before, I cannot furnish the brains to others, by which they can understand the proof. Frank Burns, the subject of this sketch, whose portrait is our frontispiece this month, has just passed his seventy-fifth birthday, was a practicing attorney until the beginning of the Civil war in 1861. Being a Southerner, he organized the first company in Blount county, Alabama, and received a commission as captain and was with it during the entire war. I first remember him at our home with my father in geological work for the state of Alabama. After several years of profitable service for the state, the United States geological survey took him from us, and finally, about twenty years ago, he was sent to the Smithsonian Institution to assort and classify shells, and has found more new species of fossil shells than any man in the world. He is the only living member of his family, but is followed by an army of children in Washington, as if he were the "really and truly old St. Nicholas," and has enough name-sakes to keep him poor. There have even been girls named Frank Burns, in his honor, and thus being with the children he has himself remained young. Born in the Palmetto state and raised a Presbyterian he became a pronounced Freethinker at the age of reasoning and has remained so thru life. There is no more honorable man or truer friend and this makes him doubly a more dangerous enemy to the human curse of religion. He is a relative of "Bobby Burns," and not afraid to say what he thinks.
