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NO LOSS OF FORCE

Force, like matter, can never be lost. It is made by heating (expanding or swelling) and cooling (contracting) of matter. If we say heating produces the positive motion of matter and cooling produces the negative motion of matter, we can more readily understand the phenomena of force perhaps. Suppose we we use 1000 horse power one day to pump water 1000 feet into a reservoir. We have simply stored the same power and can receive it back again, by the use of proper machinery to be turned by the weight of its fall or gravity. Is not that simple enough? And is it not true; and was it not some form of heat or force of heat which lifted it to the reservoir? Some of you ask which force, expansion or contraction was the first to act? This is the question of a person who has nothing to say. It is like "who made God?" We cannot conceive of a time when there was no motion. If there was such a time, then you must show how intelligence could start a motion. No one is so ignorant as to believe there was a time when there was no matter, and if so, then it must have been in motion, expanding and contracting. We see this law in every part of nature in the universe, as far as our greatest telescopes can take spectroscopic photographs and as near as microscopes can magnify minute atoms, growths and motions of nature in the opposite direction. We find a planetary system operating by these forces where its substance is being constantly expanded from its heat center to its outer limit, where it again condenses and gathers into planets, etc., and returns again, returning the same force or heat, the same as the returning water from the reservoir. We find these solar systems with their great heat centers or suns falling around each other and when they have finally reached their common center their speed and falling weight or returned force is so great that when they reach each other their combined accumulated force, weight and centrifugal motion is so great that they are almost entirely dissolved into gas by the heat they generate and they are again thrown apart into space as far as they were originally. So we may look farther and farther into space and always find this great law of motion and nothing to contradict it. In coming together they generate the forces which again separate them only to fall again. No god can either stop or start them and there is no history of a god, seen or unseen, who has as much intelligence or honor as a twentieth century school boy.

THOTS. NOT THINGS

It has become quite a "fad" saying, amongst people of advanced ideas that "thots are things." This is a mistake, if by things they mean material. Thot is but the impression made upon matter by a brain, which motion can be measured by another brain. It is a force as is also electricity, light, heat, feeling or any other transmission of force. It is a transmitted motion from a brain, the same as light is a transmitted motion from the sun or any other center of motion, heat or friction. It may be better illustrated to an inquiring mind by the motion of sound. Sound, or the vibration traveling thru the atmosphere, is a very coarse and slow motion when compared with the sound which travels thru a wire or other solid substance, because of the elasticity of the atmosphere. Let me call your attention to the first article which ever appeared in HIGHER SCIENCE, Nov., 1901, (then called The Procession) in which I showed you how the motion of light travels. The intense motion or friction caused by the chemical union of separated elements of matter which causes the phenomena we call fire or heat, is the foundation of all motion. It is the outgoing or positive motion or force resulting from the expansion of matter. Do not mistake the motions of expanding matter with expanding matter itself and you will more readily understand that when an atom is expanded into gas at the sun, the jar or motion of it jolting from one atom to another, travels to the earth in eight minutes, while the atom itself will be millions of years on its way before it passes up thru the earth's orbit. In the first case it is but a transmission of motion, while in the second case it is actual matter pushed gradually away or up from a There must then be a return of this center of heat expansion. matter and the return must be exactly the same force. For instance, if I use 100 pounds of force to throw a leaden ball into the air, it will return a blow of 100 pounds when it returns. If the ball weighs 50 pounds itself, it will go high enough so that its fall will make up the other 50 pounds. There can be no waste in force, any more than there can be a waste or destruction of matter, and we have no difficulty in understanding that there is no destruction of matter, but only a change of its form. Force is the same, whether it is light, electricity, thot, gravity, or any other form of force. Gravity is simply the return of matter to its center or the weight of matter which has been pushed up and is held up by the expansion of the matter below it. We must find less weight or downward pressure as we go up. Air or water can be used as an example of this law and expanded gas must conform

to the same law. As we go up into the air the pressure or weight is less and as we go down into the water the pressure or weight is greater. Now the human or living body is a center of heat, where matter is being chemically united, thus making the expanding motion of heat. This motion is more or less rapid (or the heat greater or less) according to the rapidity with which the food we eat unites in chemical friction, making its motion on the protoplasm of our body which is brain. As you know a man's thots can be changed by a drink of liquor because there is an increase of motion or heat. If we can change our thots by what is put into our stomachs, then we must know that the thots are only the impressions made upon the delicate brain by the force produced by the chemical action. If we eat nothing for many days these motions finally die out and we have no more consciousness or life, because there is no more motion made by chemical action of food and we cease to think. We are unconscious and dead and remain dead and our body decomposes unless food is furnished and heat restored before decomposition sets it. Surely then we must perceive that thots are not things, but are only the motion of things.

ADDRESS TO MINISTERS

I would like to call your attention to the fact that there are several thousand men and women in the United States who are continually writing arguments against Christianity. I will endeavor to explain why they are doing so, and give a few samples of the arguments they are using. Some of them confine their attacks principally to the church and say that it is not following true Christianity; while others attack the foundation—the Bible—and say that it is not perfect, and a religion founded on it cannot be perfection.

These men and women are intelligent, educated and honest, and think they are working for the welfare of humanity. They may be partly right

and partly wrong, but the church certainly is not perfection.

This is supposed to be a land of religious liberty and equal rights to all, regardless of their religious belief. The founders of our government having seen the terrible results of the union of church and state in Europe, framed a constitution which they thought would prevent any such condition here; and so it would, but unconstitutional laws are made to favor the churches.

Thomas Jefferson said: "It is wicked and tyranical to compel any

man to support a religion in which he does not believe."

"I don't believe in your religion, but you are compelling me to support it. Do you think that setting such an example before the people of the world is the way to make them believe in your religion? When I pay my taxes I have to pay extra on account of the exemption of churches and parsonages. I am taxed to pay chaplains to go to Congress and tell God what congressmen are doing; and when I pay my school tax I am supporting your religion. You put your religious songs, and wherever you can, your Bibles, into the public schools for other people's children to read and compel them to pay for it. How would you like it if we put the works of Ingersoll, Paine and Voltaire in the schools for your children to read? Unless you want your religion destroyed entirely, you had better follow the advice of Thomas Jefferson and keep it in your churches where it belongs. He said that was the safest place for it. You use your influence to close stores, museums and all places of business and amusement on Sunday except your own; you want no competition and forget all about the golden rule. Suppose we close your places of business on Sunday—your churches—and put you in prison if you attempt to open them.

In regard to Sunday laws, I would refer you to the teachings of Jesus Christ and St. Paul. They had no special regard for any day. Jesus scarcely ever mentioned the Sabbath excepting when he was accused of breaking it. Then He asked them, is it lawful to do good on the Sabbath day or to do evil? He said His Father worked every day and it was right for Him or any one else to do the same. Paul said: "One man esteemeth one day above another, another man esteemeth every day alike; let every man be fully persuaded in his own mind."—Romans xiv:5. "Let no man therefore judge you in meat, or in drink, or in respect to a holy day, or of the new moon or of the Sabbath days."—Col. ii:16. Sunday, the first day of the week, was the day on which the Pagans used to wor-

ship the sun.

Constantine, the Roman emperor, was a sun worshiper and murderer. He scalded his wife to death, killed his son, his nephew, two brothers-in-law and many of his neighbors, nad joined the Christian church and enacted the first Sunday law, March 7, 321. (See Encyclopedia Britannica, article Sunday.) When you make a Sunday law or enforce one, you are violating the teachings of Jesus Christ, St. Paul and the Constitution of the United States.

There are some brave, honest and intelligent preachers; but most of the preachers are afraid to meet a man in public debate who differs from them in religious opinion. They seem to be afraid that they might learn something. They reject the best teachings of St. Paul and follow the worst. He said: "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy."—Col. ii:8. "If any man be ignorant, let him be ignorant."—I. Cor. xiv:38. As they purposely avoid looking at the other side, their views are necessarily one-sided. But there is hope yet for the preachers. They are gradually drifting away from the hell fire religion of the New Testamnt.

Robert Ingersoll has probably done more to free the human mind from the fear of hell than any other man that ever lived. There are two reasons why he was not a Christian; he had too much love and mercy to believe that any being was cruel enough to burn another forever, and he was too intelligent to believe that God got so mad over the loss of an apple as to wish to burn people on account of it thousands of years afterward.

The Bible is a sectarian book, as there are different versions. But if any one version should be decided to be the standard, it would still be sectarian. When it is read in the public schools, certain chapters are selected. A Methodist can read a chapter that will teach Methodism. A Presbyterian can read a verse that teaches predestination. I propose to select a few passages that I think will convince you that a good many doctrines can be taught from the Bible by just reading certain selections. Here are some that we don't wish to have taught to our children: "Thy wisdom and thy knowledge, it hath perverted thee."—Isa. xlvii:10. "In much wisdom is much grief; and he that increaseth knowledge increaseth sorrow."—Ecc. 1:18. "Thou shalt bestow that money for whatsoever thy soul lusteth after, * * * for wine, or for strong drink."—Deut. xiv:26. My next selection I shouldn't think you would like to have read to your children even without comment: "That which befalleth the sons of men, befalleth beasts; as the one dieth, so dieth the other. All go unto one place, all are of the dust, and all turn to dust again."—Eccl. iii:19, 20. "The dead know not anything, neither have they any more a reward. Neither have they any more a portion forever in anything that is done under the sun. There is no work,—nor knowledge,—in the grave, whither thou goest."—Eccl. ix:5, 6, 10. "As the grave shall come up no more."—Job. vii:9.

The Bible is as good a book as we could expect it to be, considering the source it came from and the time in which it was written. It was written before printing was invented, before people had really learned how to make books. According to its own account of itself, many of its writers and most of its heroes were polygamists and drunkards. They were ignorant and superstitious; so the Bible naturally makes mistakes on every subject it attempts to teach—astronomy, geography, botany, zoology, mathematics and morality. It makes a mistake of sixty years in adding up the life of Terah, Abraham's father. Terah was seventy years old when Abraham was born; Abraham was seventy-five years old when Terah died. Seventy and seventy-five are one hundred and forty-five—but the Bible says the days of Terah were two hundred and five years. (See Gen. xi:26, 32; xii:4.) Ezra in adding twenty-nine thousand eight hundred and eighteen makes a mistake of twelve thousand five hundred and forty-two. (See Ezra ii.) Nehemiah (Chap vii) in adding thirty-one thousand and eighty-nine, makes a mistake of eleven thousand two hundred and seventy-one. "A lion is the strongest among beasts and turneth not away from any."—Prov. xxx:30. Travelers from Africa tell us that when a lion and a rhinoceros meet there is always a foot race and the lion takes the lead. I will mention some animals that

have killed lions: The buffalo, gemsbok, elephant and tiger. Mathew (Chap. xiii:31, 32) says "a mustard seed is the least of all seeds." To-bacco and mullen seed are much smaller than mustard seed. There are many kinds of seeds so small that they can be seen only with a micro-

The Bible has some good moral precepts, but it contradicts every one of them, and to attempt to use it as a moral guide only causes confusion.

In Exodus and Deuteronomy the command is given: "Thou shalt not kill." priests and prophets have erred through strong drink, they are swallowed
up of wine; they err in vision; they stumble in judgment."—Isa. xxviii:?.

"I the Lord thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquities of the
fathers upon the children. * * *"—Ex. xx:5. These words are said
to be the words of God, but they seem to be as much like the words of to be the words of God, but they seem to be as much like the words of a devil. The writers of the Bible have mixed their god and devil together so completely that it is difficult to tell one from the other. They say the devil is bad and God is good. But when they describe the devil they describe God as being more cruel and revengeful than the devil.

"Thus sayeth the Lord * I will raise up evil against thee * I will take they wives * and give them unto thy neighbor. * "—II Sam. xii:11. God in his anger killed Uzza because he put forth his hand to hold the ark.—I Chron. xii:19, 10. "God said, they have provoked me to anger * For a fire is kindled in mine anger, and shall burn unto the lowest hell, and shall consume the earth with her increase. * I will heap mischief upon them; I will spend mine arrows upon them. They shall be burnt with hunger, and devoured with burning heat * I will also send the teeth of beasts upon them, with the poison of serpents of the dust."—Deut| xxxii:21, 22, 23, 24. "... For ye have kindled a fire in mine anger, which shall burn forever."—Jer. xvii:4. "... Anger resteth in the bosom of fools."—Eccl. vii:9. Are God and the devil the same being? II Sam. xxiv:1 says, "The Lord moved David ... to number Israel." I Chron. xxi:1 in telling the same story says, "Satan provoked David to number Israel." Psalm xviii:8, speaking of the Lord, rays: "There went up a smoke out of his postrils, and fire out of his says: "There went up a smoke out of his nostrils, and fire out of his mouth." Psalm cxxxix:8 speaks of God being in hell. It also seems that heaven was well supplied with fire and brimstone. When cities were to be destroyed, fire and brimstone were rained down from heaven.—Gen. xix:24.

As God lives in hell as well as in heaven, and both places contain fire and brimstone, I make no choice; but leave it all to God or Nature. Whether we ever go to either place or not makes no difference in regard to our duties here. Ingersoll has said: "The place to be happy is here: the time to be happy is now, and the way to be happy is by making others so.

Though somewhat more refined in language, the teachings of the New Testament are as cruel as the Old Bible. And if its statements are true, Jesus Christ and his disciples were a band of tramps, traveling about the country, stealing and obtaining money under false pretense. We find in Matt. ii:6 that Jesus Christ came as a governor to rule Israel. And Luke xxii:29, 30, says he appointed kingdoms for his twelve disciples to sit on thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. Matt. x:5, 6, says he told his disciples, "Go not into the way of the Gentiles, and into any city of the Samaritans enter ye not. But go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." He had but little to do with the Gentiles excepting to deceive them. He told his disciples that he talked in parables purposely to deceive the people. "And he said unto them, 'unto you it is given to know the mystery of the kingdom of god; but unto them that are without, all these things are done in parables: that seeing they may see and not perceive; and hearing they may hear and not understand; lest at any time they should be converted, and their sins should be forgiven them."—Mark iv:11, 12. "But without a parable spake he not unto them; and when they were alone, he expounded all things unto his disciples."—Mark iv:34. "And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie. That they all might be damned who believed not the truth..."—II Thes. II:11, 12. According to Luke xvi Christ commended a steward for stealing and said he had done wisely. And we find in the twelfth chapter of John that Christ and his disciples also acted wisely; verses 4, 5 and 6 say that Judas Iscariot kept the bag in which money was put that was supposed to be given to the poor; but Judas was a thief and kept the money. John xiii:29 shows that Judas was their treasurer and was accustomed to buying what things they needed; so they were all thieves living on money obtained by false pretense.

'Did Jesus steal hogs?

Let us examine the evidence the same as we would if the same events were to take place with us at the present time. The fourth chapter of Mark, verses 35 and 36, say that he and his disciples started to pass over to the other side of the sea in a ship. And there were also with him other little ships. Luke x, l, says that he had seventy other disciples besides the twelve. The fifth chapter of Mark says they came over unto the other side of the sea and there was nigh unto the mountains a great herd of swine feeding. And the herd ran violently down a steep place into the sea and were choked in the sea. The next place we find thm (Chap vi:32) they are by the ship in a desert, feeding five thousand people with five loaves of bread and two fishes. There is nothing said here about how many hogs they had, but the thirteenth verse of chapter 5 of Mark says there were about two thousand of the swine. In chapter viii we find them having another feast. "There were about four thousand did eat and were filled; and they took up of the broken meat that was left seven baskets." Mark mixed in some devil stories, but I have left them out, as devil stories at the present time would not be admitted in court as evidence in a case of hog stealing. The eighty-two disciples were the devils, and it would be so decided by Christians if the same event was to take place now in any Christian neighborhood.

He prayed in public, made long prayers, called himself master and told his disciples to call him master. He spoke parables in favor of the poor and said, "Woe unto you that are rich." But when he dined with the rich man Zaccheus he turned his parables the other way. In regard to the man that had only one pound, he said: "Take from him the pound and give it to him that hath ten; for I say unto you, that unto every one which hath, shall be given; and from him that hath not, even that he hath shall be taken away from him."—Luke xix:24, 26. He said, "Love your enemies."—Matt. v:44. "But those mine enemies, which would not that I should reign over them, bring hither and slay them before me."—Luke xix:27. He told his disciples to forsake their relations, and would not permit them to go back to bid their wives and children farewell. He said: "If any

man come to me and hate not his father, and mother, and wife ,and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple."—Luke xiv:26. He forsook his mother, brothers and sisters, and treated them as if he hated them. "There came then his brethren and his mother, and standing without sent unto him calling him. And the multitude sat about him and they said unto him: "Behold thy mother and thy brethren without seek for thee.' And he answered them, saying, 'Who is my mother or my brethren?'" He didn't go out to meet them; didn't invite them to come in, and it seems from the account given in Mark that he never spoke to them afterward. Here is some more of the language of the meek and lowly Prince of Peace: "Think not that I am come to send peace on earth; I came not to send peace but a sword. For I am come to set a man at variance against his father, and the daughter against her mother, and the daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law, and a man's foes shall be they of his own household."—Matt. x:34, "And the brother shall deliver up the brother to death, and the father the child; and the children shall rise up against their parents and cause them to be put to death."-Matt. x:21.

Christian friends, how would you like to have Jesus Christ for your neighbor? You might put a lock on your chicken-house, also on your hog-house; but wouldn't you rather have him as your saviour, away off in Paradise, than to have him here associating with your family? The most terrible of his doctrines I have yet to relate. He threatened to burn and torment forever all who failed to believe in him; and at the same time was purposely deceiving the people to prevent them from believing on him. Well he might say, "Straight is the gate, and narrow is the way, and few there be that find it." "But he that believeth not shall be damned. And these signs shall follow them that believe. In my name shall they cast our devils; they shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them."—Mark xvi:16, 17, 18. We see by these signs that he spoke in parables to deceive the people. These signs are tests that no man can stand; let any preacher take a drink of nitric acid; it will kill him as quick as it will an infidel. The religion of Jesus Christ has been written in blood and fire. Millions of Christians, following his teachings, have killed each other with swords and burnt each other at the stake.

For more than a thousand years the Christian church ruled supreme over Europe; and during that time men, women and children were being burnt to death. I quote a few words from Chamber's Encyclopedia, Vol. VIII, page 311: "In France about the year 1520 fires for the execution of witches blazed in every town, The delusion became an epidemic, frenzy, devastating every corner of England Similar accounts are on record regarding the other countries of England on record regarding the other countries of Europe.... In the British colonies of New England the witchcraft mania raged with peculiar intensity; as in Scotland and elsewhere the clergy were the prime movers.... Dr. Sprenger computes the entire number of persons who were burned as witches, during the Christian epoch, at nine millions." There were millions more burnt as heretics; and other histories say that when a whole

family was burnt, the clergy took possession of their property.

After murdering and robbing humanity for a thousand years, and having no taxes to pay, you can now boast of your wealth and your power. The past record of the Christian church would soon be forgiven and forgotten, if the Christians would treat other people as they like to have others treat them. - Port Angeles, Wash.



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
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
