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UP AND DOWN

When we realize that the sun is the center of our solar system, we must admit that every direction from the sun is up and toward the sun, from any part of the solar system, is down. until we reach a point where some other sun helds an equal attraction or gravity, or point where we are near enough a planet or other body where its attraction overcomes the attraction of the sun. Let us illustrate it this way. nearest neighbor sun, is exactly the same size as our own sun, then at a point exactly half way between the two it would be down toward either of the suns. We must remember, however, that each atom of expanded matter is so exceedingly small that only gravity would be sensitive enough to measure the half way point or atom, and this point would be continually changing as other suns come in line with either of the other two, thus adding their small influence. Between the earth and sun there would also be a point at which an atom would be equally attracted by the earth and sun. This point would be nearer the earth than the sun, and depend upon their relative weights, which could be found in exact figures if we know the exact weight, of both bodies. Again, this point would be constantly changing as the moon and the planets changed When the moon was on the opposite side of their positions. the earth from the sun, for instance, the point of equal gravity for the earth and sun would be nearer the earth, than if the moon were at hight angles with a line from the earth to the The moon is many hundred thousands of miles nearer the earth than this point, no doubt, and, therefore, the earth is down from the moon locally outside of its own circle of As we go farther away to the planets attraction, to itself. which are farther away from the sun this circle of attraction around the planet is larger, because the sun's attraction is less as we leave it in a regular ratio, the same as the diffusion of We have no trouble now to understand that, locally, light. the center of the earth is down, no matter where we are. antipodes are standing with their feet towards us, although any man who said so 306 years ago would have been burned

at the stake, for the glory of God, who supposed He made it Why, then, should we have any difficulty in understanding that the sun is the center of the solar system and that down is towards it. If, then, we understand this simple fact, we have no difficulty in understanding why a planet moves, as it must by falling back to the sun, where it came from originally, There seems to be some next great center, and so much greater that the earth and all the planets turn one of their poles toward it until they reach about the orbit of the planet Venus, when the same pole turns to the sun. supposed to be the north pole, but I have never proved this to my own satisfaction yet. Our moon points one of its magnetic poles to the earth, because it has approached to the limit of attraction, and all the moons in the solar system, nearest their planets have done the same. This one fact should show us that they have once been farther away and have fallen towards their center.

THE MUSCLES PUMP THE BLOOD


The old physiologies and text-books of the anatomy of the human body and the bodies of all animals, teach us that the heart is the great engine of the body, which pumps so many tons of blood every twenty-four hours. They teach this regardless of the fact that the heart is not a muscle at all, and is almost as tender as the liver, lungs or kidneys, and can be cooked and eaten, while the muscular parts of the body which really do the work of circulation are tough and gristly. work of the circulation of the blood is really done by the force of expanding and contracting by heating and cooling, the same as all other motion is forced. When the muscular system forces the blood to come out to where it is needed away from the lungs and centers where it is heated, it immediately begins to cool and is contracted back again to the heat centers. heart is simply a set of valves regulating its flow. plenty of life-forms without any organ of heart whose blood circulates simply by heating and cooling, aided by muscular contraction and relaxation. The sponge has no heart and plants circulate their fluid (blood) by the expansion of the heat of the sun as it returns north and contract it again as the sun goes south and cools it. You can make a simple test of circulation, and the cause of it, on your own account by ex-Suppose your right hand is cold; you erting your muscles. can easily warm it by causing it to exert power. shut it rapidly, or make the muscles work tensely for a moment or two and the blood comes to the hand and it is warm. heart had nothing to do with forcing the blood to the hand except to allow the blood to pass through its valves. The muscles in the hand did the "engine" work. Suppose your feet are both cold; select one first, and rapidly work the toes. putting all the muscles at work, and it will soon be warm. while the other remains cold. What did the heart have to do with that but to open its valves as the blood was wanted? It is possible for the mind to do this, say by imagining the toes to work rapidly or by hypnotism or by suggestion, but the heart only acts as an automatic agency. I once made a series of experiments to prove that the heart is not the engine of circulation and that the arteries "beat" independent of the heart and independent of each other. We took a subject and hypnotized him. It really made no difference whether he was in a hypnotic state or not, as I learned afterwards, and it was suggested that his right side, arm and leg, be made perfectly tense, all his muscular power be put in them and that his left side be perfectly relaxed or passive. Immediately the right pulse raised to 120 beats, his left went down to 80 and his heart beat at 100. We tried it over many times, changing sides and always with about the same results. was afraid to publish it at the time, for fear I had been fooled by improper counting, until I had made another series of experiments with instruments to count the pulses while I counted the heart beats myself. Obtaining about the same results, I was, therefore, convinced that the arteries do the beating independent of the heart, as required by the muscles, which are in motion, the heart itself acting something like the governor of a steam engine in not allowing the blood to go through it too fast or too slow. I advise my readers, who want to convince themselves of the truth of this, to commence with the lowest life, say a plant and follow on up through the evolution of its respiration and circulation to man, through the fishes, serpents, toads, etc., to animals, where the heart has four valves and all the blood goes through the heart twice each trip to the lungs, where it is purified and heated, making the animal "warm-blooded."

MORE ABOUT TIDAL ACTION.

In reply to critics who questioned my ability to demonstrate a tendency of bodies to elongate in line with each other in connection with their gravity and revolving motions, would say that the tendency of bodies to elongate in line with each other, is a further manifestation of the "flattening at the poles." If, instead of one moon, we had two, which would always be at opposite sides of the earth from each other, there would be no "tidal" action on the earth, except the small

amount caused in connection with the sun, because the center of gravity of the three bodies (the earth and its two satelites) would be the center of the earth, whereas with but the one moon, the center of gravity is obviously at a point between the two bodies, around which they both revolve. Now, the earth being wholly outside of this center of gravity, around which it revolves, the effect on it is the same as if it were a section of the rim of a rotating flattened (at the center) globe, whose center was the center we are considering, bearing in



In the above cuts, Fig 1. represents the perfect sphere at rest, with hypothetical smaller sphere represented in the equentonal rim. Fig. 3 is the same sphere rotating and flattened at the poles with hypothetical sphere elongated in accordance with the laws of gravity and motion.***

mind the oblong spherical form this portion of the imaginary large globe would assume if freed from the local gravity of said imaginary large globe.

If the rotating will cause a globe to fiatten, and, consequently the rim to expand, it will likewise cause each portion of it to modify its form in the same order, according to its position in relation to the center of gravity of the whole.

AN ATHEIST COLLEGE

W. H. Kerr, the director of the Church of Humanity, of Great Bend, Kansas, has issued a long circular letter describing a large three-story building in that city which cost between twenty and thirty thousand dollars to build, which can now be bought for \$7000 on reasonable time, which he suggests a suitable building for college purposes for the church. If a child is taught how to think and analyze right in the very first thinking he ever does. he will get a much better education during the first thirty years of his life than with any other education he can possibly get from any college in existence at the present time. ent kindergarten training, though, no doubt, far from perfect, is the best possible education in right thinking a child can have, and that can only be given to babies at or near home. Personally, therefore, the editor of this magazine would recommend that any educational work on this line should be kindergarten work in such neighborhoods as can furnish enough scholars to take the time of one teacher. Let each member of the church give his opinion to Mr. Kerr as candidly as above, so that he may make the best decision possible.

I spoke again, with puzzled frown, "I thought the Saints all had a crown And subjects from the faithless crew Why do they lord it over you?"


The angel said, "The regal prize Is won by matrimonial ties; I was defeated in the strife; The biggest Saints got every wife."

True, if you have an education, or even ordinary horse sense, you tack that ignorant faith, necessary to make a Christian "sucker" who will take stock in eternal world's beyond.

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
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
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
