OUR BINARY COMPANION.

One of the great mysteries of astronomy has been to know where our sun is traveling to thru space. I have seen all kinds of theories and guesses. Many writers have not even dared to speculate upon the subject for fear of being made the butt of a joke. It has been known for many years that the sun is not stationary, but is traveling thru space, and within the last few decades its speed has been more or less accurately fixed at 45,000 miles per hour and its general direction established; but most astronomers still imagine that it is making a straight course thru space and that there is apparently no reason why it should not at some future time meet some other sun, which is making the same kind of an apparently aimless journey, and that at such a time there will, no doubt be a great catastrophy, probably something which would compare favorably with Dante's Hell. However, when we analyze the sun's motion and journey by the simple theory of a procession of planets we find it can do but one thing which the law compells it to do and it is absolutely impossible for it to do anything else. If it is moving, then it is falling. If it is falling, it is falling toward the nearest sun, which is Alpha Centura, and must be falling in a decreasing orbit around that star. Now, inasmuch as Alpha Centura cannot be stationary any more than our sun can, it must also be falling around Sol, and also in an orbit which forms what is called a Binary System of Suns, the laws of which have been thoroughly established to be, that the motion of each is preformed in an ellipse, which contains the center of gravity of the two suns in its focus. If there are more than two, or if there are two pairs, the motions are still more complicated and require the mathematical ability of skilled mathematicians to unravel-men who possibly would be entirely unfit for any other duty in life. That our sun and Alpha Centura are falling in orbits around and to this focus where they must sometime meet, must not be denied by men who expect to occupy a place of usefulness to science. Every step we take in analyzing the natural motions of matter and celestial bodies establishes the truth more and more firmly that all matter in space is falling in orbits around something else and gradually increasing its speed as it falls and approaches it. Then there must be an opposite force to separate them, because they can not always remain falling tow-


ards each other and gaining speed. This opposite force is the very force in nature which has baffled science so many centuries and is the simple fact and force of expansion or swelling of matter by heat. In most cases this enlarging occurs in nature by matter expanding into invisible gas and we therefore loose sight of it until it re-forms in the remote regions above its center again and begins to fall in its return journey. We have but one example of the separation of two great suns of a Binary System and that is hardly understood as yet by science because it is the only example since the great Lick Telescope has been on duty. refer to the new star in the constellation of Perseus which made its appearance about four years ago. Considering all the truths known in that notable example, by the laws of the procession, the whole process disolves into a simple solution of the separation of two suns (and their respective solar systems) which had fallen to the focus of their orbits. They had gained such lightning speed (force) in falling that, when they came in contact, rolling around each other in their fearful vortex, that the heat they develope in a few days made a star that could be seen as a bright star at the earth, thru the uncountable billions of miles of space between. The photographs taken of it from day to day recorded the fact that two principal centers began to leave each other in orbits and in a few months they were billions of miles apart. They had not separated in straight lines because they could not. They fell around each other and when the great heat came which their falling force generated and left them no gravity for each other, their expanding heat and their immense speed in orbits threw them apart by centrifugal force just as a comet is thrown up again from the sun, after making its perihelion curve. These two binary suns in Perseus did the only thing that it was possible for them to do, according to the theory of a procession of planets, which procession must apply to all matter. They may still be leaving each other but more and more slowly and by the time that they reach their farthest separation which must be the same number of billions of years which it will require for them to fall back, they will have accumulated enough of their following mebulous matter to make each a sun and begin the procession of each a solar system. These two systems must revolve on the same plane which must be the same plane upon which the stars recede from and approach each other, and the great new telescopes which are coming must show that the plane of the equator of Alpha Centura and the plane of Sol's equator are the same, because they came from the common focus, where they met, on that plane and must fall back to the same center on the same plane because it is the only thing they can do.

THE INCREASE OF KNOWLEDGE.


The greatest telescope in the world is now in the observatory at Mt. Hamilton, this State, and is 36 inches in diameter. It was a great achievement over its predecessors and has revealed and contributed many startling facts to science. What is revealed in the heavens helps us to solve nature's apparent mysteries on our own home planet, the earth, making astronomy the greatest field for investigation. There is, however, a telescope almost ready for use at the Mt. Wilson peak, near Pasadena, this State, which is almost twice as great in diameter, or four times as great in reality. which will increase our knowledge four times, or multiply it by four. You will understand this by the following diagram; in order to make the comparison more easy to understand, we will suppose the lens to be square instead of round, and suppose the Mt. Hamilton glass to be thirty inches in diameter and the Mt. Wilson glass to be sixty inches, or twice as large in diameter, then they would compare, as in the figure, the small squares representing four Mt. Hamilton glasses, which would be required to make one



Mt. Wilson glass; or, that it would require four Mt. Hamilton glasses to receive as much diffused light as one Mt. Wilson glass receives and concentrates to the pupil of the human eye. In effect, the Mt. Wilson glass will bring the human eye nearer in that proportion, to the celestial bodies. To illustrate, we are 240,000 miles distant from the moon with the human eye and the Mt. Hamilton telescope places our eye, in effect, within 240 miles of the moon. That is to say, we can see the moon with the glass as plain as if our eye were only 240 miles from the moon. Now, it is plain that the Mt. Wilson glass concentrates four times as much light and the distance will be reduced three-fourths and we can see the moon as plain as if we were within 60 miles of it. Only astronomers can fully realize the importance of the difference which this increase in the size of telescopes will increase our knowledge of celestial bodies.

Now, this is not to be the end of our increase of knowledge of celestial bodies, inasmuch as a wealthy gentleman of Los Angeles, Mr. Hooker, who is deeply interested in astronomy and science, has contributed the necessary funds to build a glass almost double the diameter of the Mt. Wilson glass, or four times its size, which, if it were exactly twice the diameter, would again decrease the distance to the moon three-fourths, or place the human eye with-

in fifteen miles of the moon, in effect. This great glass is now being made, and it is hoped that within three years it will be in place and doing duty on Mt. Wilson. Nor, is this the end of our increase of knowledge of the worlds and the suns around us. An inventor has discovered the secret by which he can make a lens twice as large in diameter as the Hooker glass is to be. This great lens is to be glass only on the outside surface, and to be filled with liquid after it is in place. This glass will reduce the

Wilson glass; Sixteen the Hooker glass and sixty-four the liquid glass. distance again three-fourths, or, to within three and three-quarter miles of the moon. By taking a photograph thru such a glass, and then magnifying the photograph under a microscope, you can readily see that we can examine the moon as minutely as if we were there, with our hands and feet tied, so that we could not use a hammer or spade. This will, undoubtedly, enable us to tell whether or not there is animal or plant life on our satellite, and if not, whether or not there ever has been. If there has been, we can, no doubt, obtain views enough of fossils or carcass remains, to judge of the kinds and sizes. Such glasses and methods which we will discover to magnify the photographs will undoubtedly reveal to us the solar systems of our nearest neighboring suns, and establish beyond doubt that there is a procession of planets to every sun in the universe and that suns fall to each other and separate by heat and centrifugal force, exactly as reason shows us they must do. Untold other billions of suns will be brought into view from incomputable distances, until there is no more space between them to see others beyond; and yet we will find no god, except

matter and its motions, forced to follow the line of least resistance, and if all these innumerable worlds should ever fall into one place or center, we can be sure that in so doing, they would develope sufficient heat and centrifugal force to separate them again to the same distances, the same weights and with the same individual motions which they had before.

What is true of our increase of knowledge in astronomy, is undoubtedly true in every branch of science. We must first get rid of the animal fear or superstition that there is a great monster jealous and angry god, who is overseeing all the forces of nature, and lose the fear of investigation as taught by the leading religions. Inasmuch as most religious superstitions have had their origin in what was then the mysteries of the movements of celestial bodies, it is incumbent on astronomy to take the lead in removing these fears and superstitions which it is doing rapidly and with the least possible resistance.

TRIAL MARRIAGES

It has been noticed that the clergy do not approve of trial marriages, but it was hardly to be expected that they would, for if any one can point to a time or place when they ever took the lead in progressive movements and were not found advocating repression and conservatism, the information will be gladly re-The idea has lingered in the heads of humanity long enough, that marriage is a sacrament or an institution more divine-whatever that means-than any other, for there is nothing in it. Marriage is the natural relation of the sexes under some form of law, and has for its object the establishment of the home —the dearest spot on earth—the perpetuation of the race, agreeable companionship, mutual benefit and happiness. Neither civil or religious ceremonies can truly marry people, for that union of head and heart and soul which must exist or prove a failure, is the work of nature, and if she places her stamp of disapproval on the union of any man and woman it will prove disastrous to ignore it. As a rule men and women marry young and, being inexperienced, the young make many mistakes very easily. That a mistake made in marriage should curse their lives until the grave ends it, is an idea so cruel and repulsive that common sense repudiates it instantly. A glamor of sentiment and sacredness cannot be made to hover around the marriage relations of a man and woman who hate each other, or feel an intollerable aversion in their companionship. If marriage, which brings close and intimate knowledge of each other-which courtship generally concealsreveals the fact that certain persons can no more live together without eternal friction, discord and repugnance, then certain chemicals can be mixed without an explosion; then any law, social custom, rule or edict that compels them to, is in direct opposition to the laws of nature, which no one can violate with impunity.

Conditions that annoy, irritate and disgust have their influence on health; and mental tranquility is the basis of comfort and happiness. A matrimonial hell is worse than death, for it destroys hope, kills ambition and the very love of life itself. So, notwithstanding the pain occasioned by being compelled to disagree with the clergy, I would say that where any marriage has proved a failure, from the standpoint of health and happiness, it should be nullified by the courts on demand of either party, and as quickly and easily as the invisible knot was tied. No other view can be taken of the subject by reason, and that person who is not living by the light of reason is either a clergyman or a chump. To declare that lifelong bondage in a mismated marriage, is a desirable thing for society or the individual, is to write "ass" on your forehead and reveal the fact that the preachers and the priests control your thinker. No man with a spoonful of brains will continue to make a mistake in his business affairs after he has discovered it, but one made in marriage is supposed to be a desirable thing to perpetuate, by those who get their thoughts second hand and have not acquired the habit of independent thinking. What some dead Jew thot thousands of years ago when the race was little better than barbarians, the stagnant section of society thinks should govern us now; but live ideas have a preference with all who know the value of liberty and demand their share. The conditions which the clergy wish to perpetuate have had a long trial, and they fail to meet the need of human requirements; therefore, it is time to try something else, and more liberal divorce laws are needed instead, or greater restrictions, and the signs of the times are that the clergy will be compelled to move along with the procession instead of holding it back as they have always tried to. The value and necessity of liberty in connection with human happiness is becoming too well known to give it up, and we are going to have more instead of less, for progress is the moving principle in the world today and its momentum is increasing so rapidly, the bible worshipper who tries to stop it will be subject to the same disappointment experienced by the male cow when he tried to stop the locomotive.

Either divorces will be readily granted in the near future, or marriages will decrease in number as is the case in Europe today, for by one way or the other men and women will escape sex unions that not only destroy their happiness but give to society vicious and undesirable offspring.
