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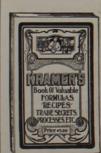

#### WHAT LIFE DEPENDS UPON.

#### By Victor G. Rocine.

When we study man from the standpoint of brain science, we find that God has implanted four different brain centers or dynamos of life that are at the foundation of life itself. In phrenological language, these brain centers of life are called:

Alimentiveness.

Bibativeness,

Amativeness,

The medulla oblongata.

These are the vital centers. They look after the heart, the lungs, the stomach, the bowels, the circulation. They enable the stomach to digest food, the lungs to breathe, the heart to pulsate and the blood to circulate. It is very difficult to say which one of these brain centers is the most important. Alimentiveness gives sense of hunger and enables the stomach to digest food. Bibativeness gives sense of thirst and qualifies the system to absorb liquid for the system. Amativeness secretes the substance of life for brain, muscles, nerves and soul. The medulla oblongata keeps the heart going, the lungs in action and the blood in motion, so that the river of life can float the cells of vitality to such parts where they are needed.

Disturbance of the nutrimental center leads to dyspepsia, appendicitis, gas on the stomach and disturbances of the digestive function in general. Weakness of Amativeness, or wasting of this brain center, leads to nervousness, sexual diseases, lost manhood, female trouble, hysteria, nervous prostration, spermatorrhea, insanity and death. Weakness of the medulla oblongata or disturbance of the same leads to pleurisy, pneumonia, consumption, heart disease, disturbances of the circulation, hemorrhages and death. It is the medulla that keeps the lungs active; it is the medulla that keeps the heart going and the blood moving in the arteries and veins. The stronger the medulla is the stronger the heart. As long as the medulla is in a good state of health, the heart beats, throbs and pulsates. It keeps the heart beating before birth and keeps it going until the thread of life is spun and the eye glazes in death. The spark of life comes into the system through the lungs and stomach; it is secreted by the faculty Amativeness. Amativeness is weak, the spark of life is not secreted to such an extent as it should be. When the medulla oblongata is weak, the heart is weak. When the medulla dies, the heart stops and no human invention can set the machinery of life in motion again. Thousands of people have gone to their death in the flush of health simply because the medulla was injured, causing the heart to stop.

To improve these four brain centers is to prolong life. In the development of these brain centers is the secret of life; it is upon these four vital centers that life depends. It is the duty of every man, woman and child to develop these brain centers by some system of culture. Vital culture or life culture is the duty of every man who wishes to perform his mission in life and to prepare for eternity.

God, life, time and eternity demand this of every man and every woman. When the energies of life are left to themselves, they drift to weeds. It does not matter in the least whether the life is contained in the plant, or in an animal, or in man. The tree is made to grow and improve by controlling its energies by prudent culture; the most cultured man can be similarly trained. If the wind blows in one direction only, the tree leans in the same direction; when the forest is crowded the trunks of the trees are long and slender and the foliage is found at the top of the trees; if the fruiter is left to itself, suckers will spring up and sap the strength. The vines can be trained. It will serve the use that man gives it. A low side bud, if given the full life strength of the plant, will send a ground branch a long distance and become a creeper, or if cut to a single bud on the upper side it will climb a trellis and grow at your bidding. You can train it to grow as a bush, a side-rack vine, an arched trellis climber, or a ground creeper, if its energies be directed by the intelligent hand of culture; but if neglected it becoms awkward, tangled and ugly and produces sour and shrunken fruit. If a garden be left to take care of itself, its energies will drift. Nature does not take care of it. Weeds thrive where the hand of culture is not at work. A flower garden must depend upon care. Let it drift for a short time and a mass of weeds will choke the beautiful flowers and drink the sap of the roots.

Let cattle remain without care and they will not thrive. Your sheep, horses, vegetables and fruit all depend upon the hand of culture. If left to drift they will not thrive nor improve.

Is not this the case with man? Take a man away from civilization and culture and he will soon become coarse, ugly, profane and low in his tastes. There is no culture so great that the drift of life will not level to barbarism.

Take a man from culture and civilization for a few years and he will soon be unclean from head to foot. His hair will soon become shaggy, his nose red, his face dirty, his whiskers greasy, his manners coarse, his face unshaven, his hat faded, his clothes torn and his highest ambition centered on beer, blood and tobacco. He will soon live on cooked hog, whisky, coarse food, fermented drinks. He will never care for pure air. Soon he will take interest in dime novels and bloody descriptions of robbery and war.

That which is not protected and cared for will drift down stream. As soon as a person does not do something for himself from the standpoints of culture, he degenerates physically and spiritually. When a person lets his energies of life drift, he is attacked by germ life and disease. When the vegetable kingdom is not guarded by the intelligent hand of culture it is attacked by enemies whose mission it is to destroy the useful and beautiful. When the fruit is not protected, it is slain by mycroscopic enemies. When the milk is not protected by an inteligent hand, germ life grows by the thousands. When the lungs are weak, they are destroyed by germ life. There are weeds and microscopic enemies at work everywhere. Leave the bread and it molds. Leave the meat unprotected and it decays. If you do not take care of your teeth, they decay. man does not do something for himself, his skin becomes wrinkled, his flesh shrinks, his bones dry and harden, his heart weakens, his blood becomes impure, his brain shrinks, his brain centers grow weaker and at last he succumbs to his waiting conqueror, without having performed his mission in life.

Life depends upon the four brain centers mentioned, but these depend upon CULTURE. The passive man floats with the tide. It is a pleasure for the negative woman to drift. It is easy to let animals take care of themselves. But a person who drifts through life without developing his faculties and making a prudent use of his energies, that same person does nothing for himself. Weeds will grow in his brain the same as weeds will grow in the flower garden where the hand of intelligent culture is not at work. He has sickness ahead of him in this life, and sin, misery, perdition and spiritual death in the life which is to come.

Man is surrounded by enemies on every hand. He has impulses and habits that run to weeds; his mind, his body and his soul becomes coarse and deformed every day that he neglects his duties. Therefore it is necessary for every man to have some system of culture, some method of developing himself, so that he may direct his energies, improve his physical functions, develop his faculties and unfold his soul.

Every man who has any respect for himself and his future is interested in systems of culture, but every man who is not interested in his physical and spiritual welfare is like a seaweed tossed to and fro by the angry waters.

#### THE CHARACTER OF THE NATIONS.

The American people as a nation are weak in a certain set of faculties and strong in another set, in consequence of which they have a character peculiar to the American nation. This is the condition with every nation in the world, and it is caused primarily by their special environment, general way of living, the kind of work followed, their government, climate, food, political systems, etc. All these things, when they are brought to bear on each following generation of a nation, result in a certain head formation, which will then be peculiar to that nation. A phrenologist can tell the nationality of a person probably nine times out of ten, by his head formation.

The Americans, because of their policy of "freedom for all and favor toward none," their government by the people, their opportunity for equal competition in business, freedom of thought and expression, the general shoulder-to-shoulder position of women with men, all these conditions have produced the following strong and weak faculties:

The Chinese, on the other hand, who are almost diametrically opposed to the American in character, are

You will see by comparing these faculties that they are almost entirely opposite, that is, those faculties that are strong in the American are weak in the Chinese, and vice versa.

The Chinese are conservative, reserved, suspicious, unpro-

gressive. The faculty of form in the Chinese is wonderfully developed, which is the reason that their eyes are shaped as they are, being crowded down at the inner corners, making the eyes run on a slant down toward the nose, and because of Secretiveness, the eyes are small and seemingly almost closed. Destructiveness, acting with strong Secretiveness and weak Friendship, gives them that suspicious, cunning and unfriendly characteristic. Strong Self-esteem, Inhabitiveness and Veneration, acting in this combination, make them feel that they and theirs are superior to all others. They are self-satisfied.

Is there a reason why every Chinaman has a leading faculty of Form? Think of their language, which consists of 85 thousand characters or symbols and has neither alphabet, declensions nor conjugation. Form necessarily has to do the work in their education. Their language is one of the chief factors also in keeping the Chinese people unprogressive, and their government is what chains them to it and to their old and unprogressive customs.

The Jewish people are similar to the Chinese, with the exception that the Jew is positive in Acquisitiveness.

The English people as a nation are combative, aggressive, domineering, proud, ambitious and self-sufficient. Or in other words, they have strong Combativeness, Destructiveness, Conscientiousness, Approbativeness, Self-esteem, Amativeness, Alimentiveness, Bibativeness Conjugality and weaker Friendship.

The French people are artistic and frivolous, polite, clever, acute, subtle, brilliant, versatile and energetic. All of which means that their faculty combination is as follows: Strong Ideality, Sublimity, Destructiveness, Comparison, Color, and all the perceptive faculties, Approbativeness, Agreeableness, Friendship; weak in Veneration, Conscientiousness, Conjugality, Combativeness.

The German people, on the other hand, are slow, calculating, philosophical, prudent, industrious, metaphysical, solid and practical. They love their homes, and they love to accumulate property in a plodding, careful, conservative sense, but there is nothing of the dashing speculator in them. They are large in the temporal, in the pareital, in the reasoning and in the basal lobes of the brain. Or, they are strong in Alimentiveness, Bibativeness, Amativeness and the part of the brain that takes care of the physical organs of the body. They are large in Combativeness, but weaker in Destructiveness. Strong in Cautiousness, Conscientiousness, Firmness, Spirituality, Causality, Friendship, Conjugality, Parental Love, Inhabitiveness, Self-esteem; but weak in Veneration, Human Nature, Comparison.

The Indian is persistent, dignified, cunning and cruel. He is weak in all the esthetic and religious faculties, with the exception of Spirituality, and he is weak also in the social faculties except Amativeness. But he is very strong in Destructiveness, Secretiveness, Firmness, Self-esteem, but weak in Combativeness.

The Irish are impulsive, enthusiastic, ardent, sociable, lively, witty and patriotic. Their two leading faculties are Destructiveness and Approbativeness. These two faculties they have very large. They are strong in Comparison, Mirthfulness, Combativeness, consequently they are witty; but they are always witty at the expense of some one else and they are very "touchy" and sensitive, as far as they themselves are concerned. Their seeming sociability is not real sociability, but springs mainly from Approbativeness, and the lively, witty combination spoken of above. They are really weak in Friendship. They associate very much, but it is not because they love the people, but rather because they want to be noticed themselves. If you notice, their jokes all take the form of sharp little digs to the discomfiture of the other fellow. For instance:

#### HOW TO READ PEOPLE

HOW YOU MAY KNOW WHETHER YOU ARE SUBJECT TO CONSUMPTION AND HEART DISEASE.

Character Reading Signs Enabling You to Diagnose Yourself and Others.

Every person who is weak in the myelencephalon and the posterior lobes of the cerebellum, that same person is subject to consumption, pleurisy, pneumonia, hemorrhage of the lungs, sexual disease, nervousness, hysteria and insanity.

It is very easy for a phrenologist who knows his business to determine in which direction a person is weak.

A man who is fleshy and plump, who has a well developed chest and abdomen, whose neck is thick and short, who has a rounded and harmonious face, whose pulse is full and symmetrical, whose cheeks flush quickly, whose hands are broad, square, plump and warm; whose complexion is rich and sanguine, indicating that his blood is full of the red and white corpuscles and charged with the healthy and invigorating oxygen of the air; whose myelencephalon and cerebellum are well developed, and who eats, breathes and enjoys himself—that same man will never die of lung diseases, nor of disturbances of the heart and circulation, nor is he likely to spend his time in the gloom of an insane asylum.

Strong respiratory power is indicated by a large, spherical, broad, deep and even chest, extended nostrils, flushing cheeks, warm hands and feet, a broad, heavy and prominent chin and by a harmonious and full development of the face below the eyes.

A man having these signs has ability to oxygenize his blood, to circulate the same and send it bounding to the utmost extremities of his body.

But when the chest is sunken, the nostrils small, the face pallid, the chin weak and retreating, the hands cold, a man lacks power of respiration.

When the lungs are small and sunken, they do not contain very many air-cells; but when they are large and convex, the air-cells are more numerous, giving him greater respiratory capacity.

The air-vesicles, which are held in place by connective tissue, number, according to the estimates of scientific men, 170 millions; all situated so as to bring the circulating blood in the closest proximity to the air, and when the myelencephalic brain center is healthy and strong, these air-vesicles are numerous and very active, giving a man great respiratory capacity. He will never die of heart disease, nor of consumption. It is the medulla oblongata that runs the chest department, including the lungs, the heart, the bronchi and the bronchial glands, the diaphragm, the vocal organs, the air passages and the entire veinous and arterial circulation.

When the medulla is weak a person may suffer from catarrh, bronchitis, spasmodic dyspnea, dysphagia and various bronchial and vocal disturbances. As soon as we hear a man talk, we know the condition of his chest, brain and vital apparatus in general.

The signs of a weak medulla oblongata, weak lungs, heart and bronchi, together with a consumptive tendency are the following:

A relatively small and slim stature.

Long and small fingers.

A stooping and narrow chest, a sinking of the chest where the arms join the body.

A long neck.

A long and sunken face and cheeks.

A pallid countenance.

Thin, soft and delicate skin.

Long and rounded finger nails.

Cold hands and feet.

A clammy skin.

Night sweats.

A combination of the mental and osseous temperaments.

A high degree of mental action.

Intensity and excitability of mind and nerve.

A positive falling of the cheeks under the cheek bones, making the face appear long and the cheeks sunken.

A sunken appearance of the heart and lung poles.

A flush below the cheek bones, called the hectic flush, denotes inflamed action of the lungs, or already attacked lungs.

#### WOMAN GETS ODD CONTRACT.

Is Only Member of Her Sex to Get Big Government Contract.

Hartington, Neb., May 24.—Mrs. Mary D. Lydick of Hartington is, so far as known, the only woman harnessmaker in the United States. Mrs. Lydick has just received a contract from the war department at Washington, D. C., to make harnesses and parts of harnesses for the western forts, Mrs. Lydick believing that the contract comes as a compliment from President Roosevelt.

#### WHAT WE SAW AT DUNNING, THE COOK COUNTY IN-

Mr. and Mrs. Pottenger, who are dear friends of phrenology, entertained the editors and a few of the students from Human Science School, at Dunning County Asylum for the Insane one day last month, showing us through the insane wards and also through the Hospital for Consumptives.

We understand there are about 3,000 poor unfortunates in this place—consumptives, poor-house inmates, physically sick insane, epileptics and insane. It is most distressing to see such congregated misery, but still we are far from being converted to the much talked of chloroform cure first mentioned for the destruction of people beyond the age of sixty, and which is now also recommended by a county physician for the destruction of those who suffer from contagious and what they call incurable diseases.

We believe that under favorable circumstances and with a proper understanding of their individual conditions, a number of these unfortunates at Dunning could be brought back to sanity and health, in the intelligent cases. However, we saw enough to convince us that in the majority of cases, though, there is very poor material to work on. The best way to overcome this miserable condition is to prevent such people from being born, for, born as they are, they are so incomplete that they have scarcely more soul than an animal.

We believe that the physicians and attendants in charge are doing the very best they can, but we are convinced that if they had an understanding of the functions of the brain from scientific phrenological standpoints, they would be far more successful in affecting cures.

There are at the present time 180 tubercular patients, and some in a dying condition. We had a splendid opportunity to note the facial poles of weak lungs, and the physiognomical signs of consumption.

An interesting fact to note is that there are more than four times as many men as women consumptives. Out of 951 patients in one year, only 165 were women. This proves that women as a class have more vitality than men as a class. Another fact which we noticed was that there were quite a few negroes suffering from this disease, and the nurse told us that "negroes are subject to tuberculosis." There is a phrenological reason for this, as there is for all other human conditions. Negroes are weak in Combativeness; there is no tension in their make-up; they are listless and phlegmatic, the circulation is slow and sluggish, consequently the system is not able to throw off impurities.

A significant fact for students of brain formation was that almost, without exception, the insane at Dunning that we saw were weak in the faculty of Benevolence and the social faculties and strong at Destructiveness. The majority were gloomy and unsocial, paying little or no attention to each other in a friendly sense. We saw only one happy, optimistic and sociable woman.

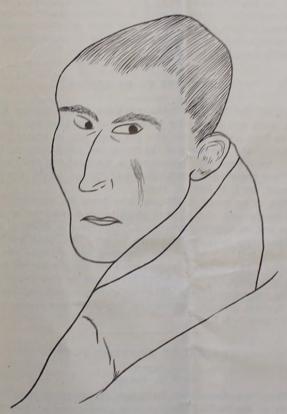
In all cases, the quality of organization was coarse. Out of the hundreds we saw, there was not one of fine quality. Insane people of fine quality are relatively scarce, and where they are found, the trouble comes from external causes, as for instance, a brain lesion, and is not a matter of head formation. In this case, it is not really insanity, but brain sickness.

Sexual abuses and sex diseases are the most fruitful among the direct causes of insanity, and this only proves that the sexual system and the nervous system are very closely related. It also proves that sexual abuse in any form means waste of the life principle and this is the most fatal curse of the human family. We are not afraid to make the assertion that there are no insane people who have a healthy and strong sexuality, except possibly in case of accidents.

Because Benevolence and the social faculties are weak, the softening, toning qualities of the mind are taken out, allowing the feelings of harshness, anger and low passions full sway.

Because the moral, esthetic and intellectual lobes are weak and the quality coarse and low, he can enjoy nothing of an elevating nature.

Consequently because Destructiveness and Cautiousness are very strong he is compelled to live in the passions and fears; and after he has so lived for a few years, the mind-equilibrium is destroyed.



General Head Formation and Facial Type of the Insane at Dunning.

The following facts taken from the yearly Report book, submitted to the President and Board of Cimmissioners, is interesting:

Out of 591 insane men,

230 were laborers,

136 trade workers,

55 commercial pursuits,

14 professional men,

1 artist.

The balance consisted of a few butchers, cooks, farmers, sailors, teamsters, etc.

Out of 417 insane women,

188 had been employed in housework,

85 housewives,

15 seamstresses,

15 commercial pursuits.

Out of 1,008 of those admitted,

734 had a common school education,

133 were illiterate,

7 high school education,

10 college.

After summing up the results of our visit to Dunning, we have reached this conclusion, viz., that insanity simply means a low degree of intelligence and of the life principle, in all cases where it is not a result of external causes.

And this suggests the rational treatment for the prevention and cure of insanity, viz., development and conservation of the life principle, including a diet of the most vital foods, and cultivation of the reasoning and refining faculties.

There should be a law passed, making it possible to take all prospective mothers of the lower classes, and separate them from their degrading environments during the months preceding the birth, and every possible external method brought to bear upon them for the evolution of the coming child. This would be a great step in the right direction.

#### EXTRA COMMANDMENTS.

- 1. Attend to your health; health will not take care of itself.
- 2. Talk that which you want to develop in yourself or in your children. If you want them to become beautiful and tidy, talk about beauty and tidiness. If you want them to become evil and criminal, talk evil and criminality to them and supply them with dallies full of beer, blood and scandal.

There is nothing more important for digestion than cheerfulness at the table. Laughter and good cheer at meal time should always be cultivated. Laughter is the best doctor and nurse that the liver has, but depression, irritability and melancholia are characteristics that act like poison on the liver. Cheerfulness stimulate the secretion of the gastric juices. Love acts like oil upon the liver, and mirth and laughter acts upon the liver like a zephyr. People who are gloomy, who are absorbed with serious thoughts, who are angry at the table, those same people suffer from dyspepsia, liver trouble, biliousness and many other sicknesses. Gloom, anger, fear and melancholia suppresses the secretion of the gastric juices and dries up the gastric follicles.

There is comparatively no indigestion and liver trouble in families in which each member of the family is cheerful, happy, loving, mirthful and sociable. Love, cheerfulness, happy thoughts and mirth are states of mind that are important for the secretion of the digestive juices.

If a person suffers from stomach trouble, liver trouble, costiveness and indigestion, we know that his home life is not a happy one, that he does not love, that his mind is gloomy and that he is not a success, whether he be rich or not. Rockefeller is a good example of this. He is a millionaire in purse but a bankrupt in stomach. Such a person does not love, nor does he laugh at the table.

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#### MAGNETISM, OR YOUR HIDDEN FORCE.

The Magnetic Apparatus of the Mind.

The medium by winch the mind acts upon dead matter and Hering beings is the nervens system. The nervens system consists of the brain, the spinal cord and the nerves. The connection times connecting the neurons, the convolutions, the hemispheres, the internal parts of the brain, the spinal cord, etc., are of three kinds, namely; commissural fibres, connecting the hemispheres; as sociation filtes, connecting parts of the same hemisphere; and projection filmes, connecting the cortex and the brain with the spinal cond. The projection fibres centralize, principally, in the internal capsule, and radiate from this part to the perphery of the brain, This fibrous radiation is called corona radiata. From the brain and spinal cord run nerves earrying impulses to and from the brain and apinal cord. Cell-centers (nucles) and ganglions (nerve-knots) are found throughout this magnetic apparatus, which cell centers and ganglia are, in reality, nothing more than magnetic storehouses where the may notic energies of the system are stored. Thus the human system is a complete magnetic plant of stations, hatteries, transmitting and receiving instruments, a connecting network of nerves capable to centralize, connect, sective, transmit, charge, use and feel magnetic impulses.

#### The Magnetic Forces,

From the earliest times, philosophical minds have noticed that the whole universal common is pervaded by a magnetic finic or torce, which is capable to centralize taselt more in one body of matter than in another, and to mantest itself differently in different beings. It is nothing but this magnetic agent that holds together molecules of the same kind, and which molecular force the physicist calls cohesion. It is nothing but this force that holds together molecules of a different kind, and which force is called achesion, by the attential. It is this agent that serves as an attraction between solids and liquids, which the physiciat calls capillary attraction. It is this magnetic agent that attracts one body to another, which the physicist calls gravitation. It is this agent that is seen in the attraction exerted by the earth, and which attraction we call gravity. It is this force that causes elements of matter to unite and form new compounds, and which the chemist calls chemical affinity. It is this agent that is seen in the magnetic needle, in the compass, in the electroscope, in the electrical machine, in the electrical battery, in the galvanic current, in the electrical fish, in animals and in human beings. It is this force that rolls in thunder, flashes in lightning, illuminates the atmosphere with its surora horealts and that causes the magnetic needle to tremble, as the streamers dart to and fro. It is this same force that obeys the touch of the psychic hand of the medium, as the table rises to the ceiling without any visible manipulation. It is this mysterious agent that flashes in the eyes of the magnetic orator, as he holds his audience spellbound with his magnetic and metaphorical expressions. This agent is concealed in every cell; it plays in every fibre of the body; it permeates every drop of blood; it trembles in every thinking neuron of the human intellect. It gives charm to manners, beauty to appearsace and influence to personality,

Man is a concentration of energies; a collection of magnetic forces that he neither knows how to use nor how to study. It was through the ruling influence of the magnetic forces that Alexander the Great conquered the world. It is through these loress that man can rule nations, subdue the wild beast with a glance of his eyes, and win favors wherever he goes.

The whole universe is pervaded by this agent. Its manifestations may be different, but the force is the same. It is especially centralized in a human being. The ganglionic cells are but batteries of magnetism, capable, under favorable conditions, of storing up magnetic energies and capable of develoring the same. Bones, tissue, vocal cords, muscles, nerves, plexuses, brain centers, nerve filaments and mental facultieswhat are they but parts of this wonderful magnetic machine. Magnetiam lives everywhere, but magnetiam has reached its highest development in man, expecially the man who has taken a course in the magnetic art.
