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Form a circle of from four to eight persons, half, or at least two, of negative, passive temperament and preferably of the female sex, the rest of a more positive type. Sit, positive and negative alternately, secure against disturbance, in subdued light, round an uncovered table of convenient size. Place the palms of the hands flat upon its upper surface. The hands of each sitter need not touch those of his neighbour, though the practice is frequently adopted.

Do not concentrate attention too fixedly on the expected manifestation. Engage in cheerful but not frivolous conversation. Avoid dispute or argument. Scepticism has no deterrent effect, but a bitter spirit of opposition in a person of determined will may totally stop or decidedly impede manifestations. If conversation flags, music is a great help, if it be agreeable to all, and not of a kind to irritate the sensitive ear. Patience is essential, and it may be necessary

sensitive ear. Patience is essential, and it may be necessary to meet ten or twelve times at short intervals, before anything occurs. If after such a trial you still fail, form a fresh circle. An hour should be the limit of an unsuccessful séance. If the table moves, let your pressure be so gentle on its surface that you are sure you are not aiding its motions. After some time you will probably find that the movement will continue if your hands are held over, but not in contact with, it. Do not, however, try this until the movement is assured, and be in no hurry to get messages.

When you think that the time has come, let someone take command of the circle and act as spokesman. Explain to the unseen Intelligence that an agreed code of signals is

to the unseen Intelligence that an agreed code of signals is desirable, and ask that a tilt may be given as the alphabet is slowly repeated, at the several letters which form the word that the Intelligence wishes to spell. It is convenient to use a single tilt for No, three for Yes, and two to express depth to a preportion.

When a satisfactory communication has been established, ask if you are rightly placed, and if not, what order you should take. After this ask who the Intelligence purports to be, which of the company is the medium, and such relevant questions. If confusion occurs, ascribe it to the difficulty that exists in directing the movements at first with exactitude. Patience will remedy this. If you only satisfy yourself at first that it is possible to speak with an Intelligence separate from that of any person present, you will have gained much. have gained much.

The signals may take the form of raps. If so, use the same code of signals, and ask as the raps become clear that they may be made on the table, or in a part of the room where they are demonstrably not produced by any natural means, but avoid any vexatious imposition of restriction on free communication. Let the Intelligence use its own means. It rests greatly with the sitters to make the manifestations elements are friendly and over tricky.

lt rests greatily with the sitters to make the manifestations elevating or frivolous and even tricky.

Should an attempt be made to entrance the medium, or to manifest by any violent methods, ask that the attempt may be deferred till you can secure the presence of some experienced Spiritualist. If this request is not heeded, discontinue the sitting. The process of developing a trance-medium is one that might disconcert an inexperienced intention.

Lastly, try the results you get by the light of Reason. Maintain a level head and a clear judgment. Do not believe everything you are told, for though the great unseen world contains many a wise and discerning spirit, it also has in it the accumulation of human folly, vanity, and error; and this lies nearer to the surface than that which is wise and good. Distrust the free use of great names. Never for a moment abandon the use of your reason. Do not enter into a very solemn investigation in a spirit of idle curiosity or frivolity. Cultivate a reverent desire for what is pure, good, and true. You will be repaid if you gain only a well-grounded conviction that there is a life after death, for which a pure and good life before death is the best and wisest preparation.

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The Power of the Will.—'Volo, or the Will,' by Arthur Lovell (J. Wooderson, 23, Oxford-street, W., price 2s. 6d. net) has now reached its third edition. The author shows that many of the old romances inculcate the lesson: 'In all difficulties Advance and Will, for within you is a power, a living force which, the more you trust and learn to use it, will annihilate the opposition of matter.' In the language of modern science, we are told, 'the problem of the Will is to bring the vibration of grosser matter into harmony with the vibration of thought; in other words, to realise in the material world the ideals of the thought-world.' The first requisite in Will-culture is to believe in the possibility of this harmony through will; then to meditate on it and practise harmony through will; then to meditate on it and practise it. Mr. Lovell shows that the ancient systems of initiation had for one of their main objects the strengthening of the will had for one of their main objects the strengthening of the will until the effects of will-power were realised and proved by repeated tests. The 'arcanum,' he says, which has always formed the very core of occultism, is 'the development of will-force. Adeptship or magic means a more exalted and sustained development of will-force than is found in the ordinary individual.' Among the effects of trained and directed will-power are the preservation of health, the cure of diseases the prelongation of life and the development of disease, the prolongation of life, and the development of psychic faculties.

If conversation flags, music is a great help, if it be agreeable to all, and not of a kind to irritate the sensitive ear. Patience is essential, and it may be necessary to meet ten or twelve times at short intervals, before anything occurs. If after such a trial you still fail, form a fresh circle. An hour should be the limit of an unsuccessful séance.

If the table moves, let your pressure be so gentle on its surface that you are sure you are not aiding its motions.

After some time you will probably find that the movement will continue if your hands are held over, but not in contact with, it. Do not, however, try this until the movement is assured, and be in no hurry to get messages.

When you think that the time has come, let someone take command of the circle and act as spokesman. Explain to the unseen Intelligence that an agreed code of signals is

to the unseen Intelligence that an agreed code of signals is desirable, and ask that a tilt may be given as the alphabet is slowly repeated, at the several letters which form the word that the Intelligence wishes to spell. It is convenient to use a single tilt for No, three for Yes, and two to express doubt or unsertainty.

When a satisfactory communication has been established, ask if you are rightly placed, and if not, what order you should take. After this ask who the Intelligence purports to be, which of the company is the medium, and such relevant questions. If confusion occurs, ascribe it to the difficulty that exists in directing the movements at first with exactitude. Patience will remedy this. If you only satisfy yourself at first that it is possible to speak with an Intelligence separate from that of any person present, you will have gained much.


The signals may take the form of raps. If so, use the same code of signals, and ask as the raps become clear that they may be made on the table, or in a part of the room where they are demonstrably not produced by any natural means, but avoid any vexatious imposition of restriction on free communication. Let the Intelligence use its own means.

Should an attempt be made to entrance the medium, or to manifest by any violent methods, ask that the attempt may be deferred till you can secure the presence of some experienced Spiritualist. If this request is not heeded, discontinue the sitting. The process of developing a trance-medium is one that might disconcert an inexperienced inquirer.

Lastly, try the results you get by the light of Reason. Maintain a level head and a clear judgment. Do not believe everything you are told, for though the great unseen world contains many a wise and discerning spirit, it also has in it the accumulation of human folly, vanity, and error; and this lies nearer to the surface than that which is wise and good. Distrust the free use of great names. Never for a moment abandon the use of your reason. Do not enter into a very solemn investigation in a spirit of idle curiosity or frivolity. Cultivate a reverent desire for what is pure, good, and true. You will be repaid if you gain only a well grounded conviction that there is a life after death, for which a pure and good life before death is the best and wisest preparation.

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

If the table moves, let your pressure be so gentle on its surface that you are sure you are not aiding its motions. After some time you will probably find that the movement will continue if your hands are held over, but not in contact with, it. Do not, however, try this until the movement is assured, and be in no hurry to get messages.

When you think that the time has come, let someone take command of the circle and act as spokesman. Explain

When a satisfactory communication has been established. When a satisfactory communication has been established, ask if you are rightly placed, and if not, what order you should take. After this ask who the Intelligence purports to be, which of the company is the medium, and such relevant questions. If confusion occurs, ascribe it to the difficulty that exists in directing the movements at first with exactitude. Patience will remedy this. If you only satisfy yourself at first that it is possible to speak with an Intelligence separate from that of any person present, you will have gained much. have gained much.

The signals may take the form of raps. If so, use the same code of signals, and ask as the raps become clear that they may be made on the table, or in a part of the room where they are demonstrably not produced by any natural means, but avoid any vexatious imposition of restriction on free communication. Let the Intelligence use its own means. It rests greatly with the sitters to make the manifestations

elevating or frivolous and even tricky.

Should an attempt be made to entrance the medium, or to manifest by any violent methods, ask that the attempt may be deferred till you can secure the presence of some experienced Spiritualist. If this request is not heeded, discontinue the sitting. The process of developing a trance-medium is one that might disconcert an inexperienced

medium is one that might disconcert an inexperienced inquirer.

Lastly, try the results you get by the light of Reason. Maintain a level head and a clear judgment. Do not believe everything you are told, for though the great unseen world contains many a wise and discerning spirit, it also has in it the accumulation of human folly, vanity, and error; and this lies nearer to the surface than that which is wise and good. Distrust the free use of great names. Never for a moment abandon the use of your reason. Do not enter into a very solemn investigation in a spirit of idle curiosity or frivolity. Cultivate a reverent desire for what is pure, good, and true. You will be repaid if you gain only a well-grounded conviction that there is a life after death, for which a pure and good life before death is the best and wisest preparation.

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

He studies occult sciences, and becomes familiar with some part of the spirit world. Here we have a description of the spiritual planes, inhabited by spirits according to their former deeds on earth. Ahrinziman binds himself to the Spirit of Darkness, but fails him, and through much affliction once more soars aloft, and at last finds his twin soul, and everlasting bliss. The descriptions of the spirit world are very vivid, and the whole style of writing is thoroughly Oriental. The incidents are dramatic, and follow each other in quick succession, and the story of the old sorcerer is gruesome and thrilling. 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

If you wish to see whether Spiritualism is really only jugglery and imposture, try it by personal experiment. If you can get an introduction to some experienced Spiritualist on whose good faith you can rely, ask him for advice; and if he is holding private circles, seek permission to attend one to see how to conduct scances, and what to expect. There is, however, difficulty in obtaining access to private circles and, in any case, you must rely chiefly on experiences in your own family circle, or amongst your own friends, all strangers being excluded.

Form a circle of from four to eight persons, half, or at least two, of negative, passive temperament and preferably of the female sex, the rest of a more positive type. Sit, positive and negative alternately, secure against disturbance, in subdued light, round an uncovered table of convenient size. Place the palms of the hands flat upon its upper surface. The hands of each sitter need not touch those of his neighbour, though the practice is frequently adopted.

Do not concentrate attention too fixedly on the expected manifestation. Engage in cheerful but not frivolous conversation. Avoid dispute or argument. Scepticism has no deterrent effect, but a bitter spirit of opposition in a person of determined will may totally stop or decidedly impede manifestations. If conversation flags, music is a great help, if it be agreeable to all, and not of a kind to irritate the sensitive ear. Patience is essential, and it may be necessary to meet ten or twelve times at short intervals, before anything occurs. If after such a trial you still fail, form a fresh circle. An hour should be the limit of an unsuccessful seance.

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The Strange Story of Ahrinziman, by the author (or transcriber) of A Wanderer in Spirit Lands, has been placed before the public, and we have no doubt that it will meet with a kindly reception. The earlier work, in spite of some peculiarities in lits conception, won for itself considerable appreciation, and it is frequently quoted as an authoritative pronouncement on the subjects of which it treats. In America its diffusion has been very wide, although, as has been explained in 'Light,' this has not produced a corresponding benefit to the authoress, and the copyrighted publication of the present work is an attempt, which we hope will be successful, to procure for her more practical recognition.

In this work, the author thinks, the spirits of the higher spheres are helping, and the lesson of the book is an emphatic warning against giving way to the first insidious approaches of evil, and a magnificent incentive to keep the life influenced by, and in touch with, the higher planes of the spiritual world. The story is finely told, the various 'hairbreadth scapes and moving incidents,' on earth and in the Beyond, forming a narrative of thrilling interest as well as instruction.—'Light.'

Considered as a story, this is a decidedly interesting book. It purports to be the autobiography—written through the hand of a sensitive in half trance—of a Persian king who lived about 400 B.C., and who now describes to us not only his short earth life, but also his wanderings in the spirit world.—Annals of Psychical Science.

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Be that as it may, the real point of the book lies in its psychic interest; we follow the life and after lives of Ahrinziman with attention, and sometimes wonder. The first part of the book, Ahrinziman's life on earth, is in a somewhat heroic style. The hero is brought up among shepherds, unknown and unknowing, yet with a sense of destiny always present. He studies occult sciences, and becomes familiar with some part of the spirit world. His adventures remind us of the 'Arabian Nights,' and when, adventures remind us of the 'Arabian Nights,' and when, having ascended the throne of Persia, he is at length assassinated, the second part of his life as a spirit begins. Here we have a description of the spiritual planes, inhabited by spirits according to their former deeds on earth. Ahrinziman binds himself to the Spirit of Darkness, but falls him, and through much affliction once more soars aloft, and at last finds his twin soul, and everlasting bliss. The descriptions of the spirit world are very vivid, and the whole style of writing is thoroughly Oriental. The incidents are dramatic, and follow each other in quies succession, and the story of the old sorcerer is gruesome and thrilling. To those interested in such things this book should appeal specially, and to the others it should be a fairy-tale of some power and imagination.—The Tribune.

The descriptions of the spirit world are very vivid, and the whole style of writing is thoroughly Oriental. The incidents are dramatic, and follow each other in quick succession, and the story of the old sorcerer is gruesome and thrilling. 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THE CONDUCT OF CIRCLES.

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ADVICE TO INQUIRERS.

If you wish to see whether Spiritualism is really only jugglery and imposture, try it by personal experiment. If you can get an introduction to some experienced Spiritualist on whose good faith you can rely, ask him for advice; and if he is holding private circles, seek permission to attend one to see how to conduct scances, and what to expect. There is, however, difficulty in obtaining access to private circles and, in any case, you must rely chiefly on experiences in your own family circle, or amongst your own friends, all strangers being excluded.

Form a circle of from four to eight persons, half, or at least two, of negative, passive temperament and preferably of the female sex, the rest of a more positive type. Sit, positive and negative alternately, secure against disturbance, in subdued light, round an uncovered table of convenient size. Place the palms of the hands flat upon its upper surface. The hands of each sitter need not touch those of his neighbour, though the practice is frequently adopted.

Do not concentrate attention too fixedly on the expected manifestation. Engage in cheerful but not frivolous conversation. Avoid dispute or argument. Scepticism has no deterrent effect, but a bitter spirit of opposition in a person of determined will may totally stop or decidedly impede manifestations. If conversation flags, music is a great help, if it be agreeable to all, and not of a kind to irritate the sensitive ear. Patience is essential, and it may be necessary to meet ten or twelve times at short intervals, before anything occurs. If after such a trial you still fail, form a fresh An hour should be the limit of an unsuccessful séance.

circle. An hour should be the limit of an unsuccessful séance. If the table moves, let your pressure be so gentle on its surface that you are sure you are not aiding its motions. After some time you will probably find that the movement will continue if your hands are held over, but not in contact with, it. Do not, however, try this until the movement is assured, and be in no hurry to get messages.

When you think that the time has come, let someone take command of the circle and act as spokesman. Explain to the unseen Intelligence that an agreed code of signals is desirable, and ask that a tilt may be given as the alphabet is slowly repeated, at the several letters which form the word that the Intelligence wishes to spell. It is convenient to use a single tilt for No, three for Yes, and two to express doubt or uncertainty.

When a satisfactory communication has been established, ask if you are rightly placed, and if not, what order you should take. After this ask who the Intelligence purports to be, which of the company is the medium, and such relevant questions. If confusion occurs, ascribe it to the difficulty that exists in directing the movements at first with exactitude. Patience will remedy this. If you only satisfy yourself at first that it is possible to speak with an Intelligence separate from that of any person present, you will have gained much. have gained much.

The signals may take the form of raps. If so, use the same code of signals, and ask as the raps become clear that they may be made on the table, or in a part of the room where they are demonstrably not produced by any natural means, but avoid any vexatious imposition of restriction on free communication. Let the Intelligence use its own means. It rests greatly with the sitters to make the manifestations elevating or frivolous and even tricky.

Should an attempt be made to entrance the medium, or to manifest by any violent methods, ask that the attempt may be deferred till you can secure the presence of some experienced Spiritualist. If this request is not heeded, discontinue the sitting. The process of developing a trancemedium is one that might disconcert an inexperienced inquirer.

Lastly, try the results you get by the light of Reason.

Maintain a level head and a clear judgment. Do not believe everything you are told, for though the great unseen world contains many a wise and discerning spirit, it also has in it the accumulation of human folly, vanity, and error; and this lies nearer to the surface than that which is wise and good. Distrust the free use of great names. Never for a moment abandon the use of your reason. Do not enter into a very solemn investigation in a spirit of idle curiosity or frivolity. Cultivate a reverent desire for what is pure, good, and true. You will be repaid if you gain only a well-grounded conviction that there is a life after death, for which a pure and good life before death is the best and visest preparation.

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In this work, the author thinks, the spirits of the higher spheres are helping, and the lesson of the book is an emphatic warning against giving way to the first insidious approaches of evil, and a magnificent incentive to keep the life influenced by, and in touch with, the higher planes of the spiritual world. 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

Considered as a story, this is a decidedly interesting book. It purports to be the autobiography—written through the hand of a sensitive in half trance—of a Persian king who lived about 400 B.C., and who now describes to us not only his short earth life, but also his wanderings in the spirit world.—Annals of Psychical Science.

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The Strange Story of Ahrinziman. In his preface to this book Mr. Frederic Thurstan gives us some details as to how it was written, and compares its main incidents with actual facts of Persian history. 'The author, sitting in an indrawn state of half trance, would hear words, as it were, being dictated, and wrote them down as fast as possible without conscious effort of production. . . . The author was unacquainted with Persian history, and had, therefore, no idea whether the narrative was fact or fiction.' Mr. Thurstan finds many coincidences with actual fact throughout the story, and suggests that King El Jazid and his three sons correspond with Artaxerxes Longimanus and the three sons who succeeded him.

Be that as it may, the real point of the book lies in its psychic interest; we follow the life and after lives of Ahrinziman with attention, and sometimes wonder. The first part of the book, Ahrinziman's life on earth, is in a somewhat heroic style. The hero is brought up among shepherds, unknown and unknowing, yet with a sense of destiny always present. He studies occult sciences, and becomes familiar with some part of the spirit world. His adventures remind us of the 'Arabian Nights,' and when, adventures remind us of the 'Arabian Nights,' and when, having ascended the throne of Persia, he is at length assassinated, the second part of his life as a spirit begins. Here we have a description of the spiritual planes, inhabited by spirits according to their former deeds on earth. Ahrinziman binds himself to the Spirit of Darkness, but fails him, and through much affliction once more soars aloft, and at last finds his twin soul, and everlasting bliss. The descriptions of the spirit world are very vivid, and the whole style of writing is thoroughly Oriental. The incidents are dramatic, and follow each other in quick succession, and the story of the old sorcerer is gruesome and thrilling. To those interested in such things this book should appeal specially, and to the others it should be a fairy-tale of some power and imagination.—The Tribune.

Considered as a story, this is a decidedly interesting book. It purports to be the autobiography—written through the hand of a sensitive in half trance—of a Persian king who lived about 400 B.C., and who now describes to us not only his short earth life, but also his wanderings in the spirit world.—Annals of Psychical Science.

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Be that as it may, the real point of the book lies in its psychic interest; we follow the life and after lives of Ahrinziman with attention, and sometimes wonder. The first part of the book, Ahrinziman's life on earth, is in a somewhat heroic style. The hero is brought up among shepherds, unknown and unknowing, yet with a sense of destiny always present. He studies occult sciences, and becomes familiar with some part of the spirit world. DIET AND HEALTH.

Mr. Sidney H. Beard, President of the Order of the Golden Age, lectured, on the 18th inst., before the Psycho-Therapeutic Society at the Caxton Hall, Westminster, on 'Diet in Relation to Health,' Mr. George Spriggs (President of the society) in the chair. Mr. Beard remarked that while great care was often employed in the building of houses, few persons troubled about the science of dietetics, which might be termed 'the art of body building,' and it was owing to this neglect that hospitals, asylums, and prisons were overcrowded, and that physical deterioration was everywhere apparent. The more intelligent members of the community were, however, getting tired of taking pills and drugs, and of paying doctors' bills, to say nothing of parting with large fees for the privilege of being operated upon for appendicitis, and they were realising that pure food made pure blood, and that pure blood and strong vitality gave immunity from disease. Proceeding, the lecturer argued that flesh food was unnatural, unnecessary and injurious, and claimed that when properly nourished upon non-inflammatory diet, rich in proteid and nerve and tissue-building substance—such as nuts, cereal foods, legumes, fruits, and dairy produce-men were in little danger of taking alcohol to excess, and he pointed out that the land would support about eight times as many men when devoted to the production of fruit, cereals, and market garden crops, as it would when used for feeding cattle. 'Back to the land,' he said, was the real remedy for the sorrows of slumdom, and for our racial deterioration; and a national food reformation was essential as a preliminary step .- Cor.

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Form a circle of from four to eight persons, half, or at least two, of negative, passive temperament and preferably of the female sex, the rest of a more positive type. Sit, positive and negative alternately, secure against disturbance, in subdued light, round an uncovered table of convenient size. Place the palms of the hands flat upon its upper surface. The hands of each sitter need not touch those of his neighbour, though the practice is frequently adopted.

Do not concentrate attention too fixedly on the expected manifestation. Engage in cheerful but not frivolous conversation. Avoid dispute or argument. Scepticism has no deterrent effect, but a bitter spirit of opposition in a person of determined will may totally stop or decidedly impede manifestations. If conversation flags, music is a great help, if it be agreeable to all, and not of a kind to irritate the sensitive ear. Patience is essential, and it may be necessary to meet ten or twelve times at short intervals, before any-

to meet ten or twelve times at short intervals, before anything occurs. If after such a trial you still fail, form a fresh circle. An hour should be the limit of an unsuccessful séance. If the table moves, let your pressure be so gentle on its surface that you are sure you are not aiding its motions. After some time you will probably find that the movement will continue if your hands are held over, but not in contact with, it. Do not, however, try this until the movement is assured, and be in no hurry to get messages.

When you think that the time has come, let someone take command of the circle and act as spokesman. Explain to the unseen Intelligence that an agreed code of signals is desirable, and ask that a tilt may be given as the alphabet is slowly repeated, at the several letters which form the word that the Intelligence wishes to spell. It is convenient to use a single tilt for No, three for Yes, and two to express doubt or uncertainty.

When a satisfactory communication has been established, ask if you are rightly placed, and if not, what order you should take. After this ask who the Intelligence purports to be, which of the company is the medium, and such relevant questions. If confusion occurs, ascribe it to the difficulty that exists in directing the movements at first with exactitude. Patience will remedy this. If you only satisfy yourself at first that it is possible to speak with an Intelligence separate from that of any person present, you will have gained much.

The signals may take the form of raps. If so, use the same code of signals, and ask as the raps become clear that they may be made on the table, or in a part of the room where they are demonstrably not produced by any natural means; but avoid any vexatious imposition of restriction on free communication. Let the Intelligence use its own means. It rests greatly with the sitters to make the manifestations elevating or frivolous and even tricky.

Should an attempt be made to entrance the medium, or to manifest by any violent methods, ask that the attempt may be deferred till you can secure the presence of some experienced Spiritualist. If this request is not heeded, discontinue the sitting. The process of developing a trancemedium is one that might disconcert an inexperienced inquirer.

Lastly, try the results you get by the light of Reason. Maintain a level head and a clear judgment. Do not believe everything you are told, for though the great unseen world contains many a wise and discerning spirit, it also has in it the accumulation of human folly, vanity, and error; and this lies nearer to the surface than that which is wise and good. Distrust the free use of great names. Never for a moment abandon the use of your reason. Do not enter into a very solemn investigation in a spirit of idle curiosity or frivolity. Cultivate a reverent desire for what is pure, good, and true. You will be repaid if you gain only a well-grounded conviction that there is a life after death, for which a pure and good life before death is the best and wiscest preparation.

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
