


Every man's work in life is born with him. Every man has a call to help his fellowman onward and upward, or to be helped, it may be.

The present Bishop of London has often declared, in the course of mission sermons, that we have no scriptural or other warrant for we have no scriptural of other warrant for assuming that five minutes after death the condition of a human soul will be in any way radically different from what it was five minutes before death. Tho' this has recently been regarded as a part of the official teaching of the established Church of England, it is identical with the incubations of multitudes identical with the inculcations of multitudes of communicating spirits who have not claimed to speak for any organization, but only to deliver their independent message based on their own actual experience. In the early days of excitement over the modern revelation, many people foolishly endowed communicating intelligencies with a sup-positious infallibility, thereby opening them-selves to a vast amount of pitiable dissillusion. As a reaction from this attitude we have

often been confronted with gruesome theories regarding obsessions, rigorously upheld by some Spiritualists and emphatically denied by others. Demoniacal Possession is a very old doctrine, and one which in the classic sense is of a very wide-reaching import, for we know that the Greek word damon only means a spiritual entity not now func-tioning thro' a physical body, consequently good as well as evil damons are often men-tioned in classic literature; even the guardian spirit of the noble and illustrious Socrates is thus designated. To be obsessed, or possessed against one's will and to one's detriment, by a tyrannical, and in every way unrighteous, influence, is to be in an insane condition, therefore in olden times insanity often been confronted with gruesome theories condition, therefore in olden times insanity and obsession were regarded as synonymous.

Doubtless there are many inmates of asy lums for the insane to-day who are just in the same condition as those upon whom exorcists tried their skill in days of old, and in India and other Oriental countries there are many practising exorcists at the present moment. Belief in obsession, when carried to an extreme, is highly dangerous and detrimental to the chances of recovery of an afflicted person who is showing signs of mental abnormality, for nothing so effectually weakens resisting power, and thereby opens wide the door to undesirable and intrusive unknown influences, as fear of evil, no matter what particular form that fear may take. The causes, and also the remedy, for obsession are much nearer at hand, and far more simple than most people seemingly suppose, and it is to bracing suggestive treatment of the best sort that recovery from the worst the best sort that recovery from the worst conditions of insanity is due. A very great risk is run when highly sensitive people allow themselves to be induced to sit in miscellaneous "developing circles," where all kinds of influences are invited to com-municate in any way they choose, and it has been largely on account of those ill-con-ducted seances that many people have taken umbrage and alarm at everything connected with avowed Spiritualism.
