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

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


Daily struggling, though unloved and lonely, Every day a rich reward will give; Thou wilt find, by hearty striving only, And truly loving, thou canst truly live.

A large library could be collected of the volumes which have been written on Christian union alone, yet the breach has remained and the gulf of separation is still as broad as ever, so far as concerns the organization of the distinct parties.

so far as concerns the organization of the distinct parties.

"The expressions of sympathy and veneration which the death of the Pope has evoked from Prottestants suggest, however, that there has now grown up a unity of Christian sentiment never before exhibited since the great break came.

"Doubtless the outward and organized separation will remain, perhaps indefinitely, but in interior sentiment the Christian world is now more at unity than seemed possible even twenty-five years ago. Respect has succeeded hatred and suspicion.

"In the world of civilization there are now two

Respect has succeeded hatred and suspicion.

"In the world of civilization there are now two great forces opposed to each other—religious faith, religion, and infidelity, or denial of supernaturalism, and the first needs to be united in sentiment and purpose in order to contend with the relatively consolidated and increasing hosts of the second."


REV. R. J. CAMPBELL ON "THE LAST THINGS"

In a frank and striking sermon preached at one In a frank and striking sermon preached at one of the Thursday morning services in the London City Temple, the new pastor, Rev. R. J. Campbell, recently defined his belief in regard to the salvation of all men. Joining together Christ's answer to the question, "Lord, are there few that be saved?" and the words of the parable of the lost sheep, "Until he find it," he stated his belief that God can never be satisfied until he has brought back every one of his own sheep to the fold. He quoted, as coming near to what he feels to be the truth, Tennyson's lines:

That nothing walks with aimless feet,
That not one life shall be destroyed.
Or east as rubbish to the void,
When God has made the pile complete.

When God has made the pile complete.

He gave four reasons for the belief expressed in these lines. First, because of the sovereignty of God. "The eternally right and eternally good will prevail by the power of Eternal God. 'Until he find it'—but he shall find it. The soul that resisteth Him resisteth at its own peril. But God prevails, not the sinner." Second, because of "what I read in the atonement of Jesus Christ." Third, because of the divine compassion I read at the cross." Fourth, "because humanity has a claim upon God." "Yea, verily no words can be too strong to describe the terrible nature of sin, and he who would dare to prophesy smooth things in the face of the world is a false prophet; but I think there is no ratio between sin and punishment—save to bring the sinner to himself." This frank delivery of his soul upon a difficult question to his new congregation must do much to win their respect and admiration. 

In speaking of remarkable longevity in this country we have just noticed the following account in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch which speaks volumes:

"Campbell County, East Tennessee, holds the record for longevity of its citizens. It is located along the Jelico and Coal Creek coal belt. The county has only about 15,000 population. Now, there are three centenarians in one family there—Richard Vincent, a few months past 100; George Vincent, 102, and James Vincent, 104. Another

remarkable family is that named Paul. Miss Lindsay Paul is more than 100, while her father reached the age of 115. Mrs. Bettie Clepper is the oldest woman living in the county, being 110 years old. She has a son who is 90. Another "elderly" lady is Dollie Sutton, aged 105. Authorities hold that women average longer lives than men, and these three instances tend to prove it, do they not? The oldest living man in Campbell County is Jacob Hatmaker, who has passed his 107th year.

"These are facts. The census of the county, taken in 1900, will bear me out in part, while I have seen some of the parties mentioned. But—yes—people pass out of the body there. Nine centenarians passed away during the latter part of 1901 and the summer of 1902. The eldest was John Meyers, aged 112. John Hubbar was the youngest—100. Jennie Dessert was 110, and Fielding Lowe was 108. Up to last spring there were living only four widows of Revolutionary soldiers. One of these, who died there, but whose name I cannot now recall, was a resident of East Tennessee. She married a veteran at sixteen, and died at the 'early' age of eighty-eight."

mognature maniment Training of Thought as a Life Force By REV. R. HEBER NEWTON, D.D. warmen Caronner Caronner

RST of all among man's natural desires, uppermost in the minds of most men, is the wish for health. Without health, all other gifts of life are practically worth-less. It is the lack of health that sours all the sweetness in the cup of life for

most people. Every one can appreciate this bless-ing, however other blessings may be unappreciated. It is curious, then, how constantly and habitually the fundamental condition of health, if this philosophy of life be the true philosophy, is ignored by most men. Even the custodians of health practically ignore it. Medical men do not profess to be materialists. For the most part, they accept this philosophy of life, as already stated, unhesitatingly. So far as they are religious men, they are constrained to accept it. Nevertheless, the constant preoccupation of the medical man with the body, his absorbing attention to the physical manifestation of the mental being, tends to produce a practical materialism that is only too obvious. A myopia, or nearsightedness, is induced, which blinds him to all but the physical facts and factors in disease. Most medical men believe in the existence of the invisible substances that we call molecules, but they do not seem to believe in the unseen and

but they do not seem to believe in the unseen and unseeable substances that we call thoughts. They believe in the agency of microbes, but they do not seem to believe in the agency of mental microbes—the little devils of lust, anger, and jealousy. They believe in the body's reaction on the mind, but not in the mind's reaction on the body. They believe that secretions color imaginations, but not that imaginations color secretions. They believe that the liver depresses the mind, but not that the mind depresses the liver.

As with our medical men, so with the laity. Most of us act as if we believed not a whit in this underlying philosophy of life, but as if we believed altogether in the very opposite philosophy. We act as if we believed we were made up of matter and not of mind: as if we ourselves were these bodies and not the souls within them. If we have a pain in the stomach, we ask ourselves what we have eaten

the stomach, we ask ourselves what we have eaten that has disagreed with us—we do not ask what we have thought that has disagreed with us. When we have thought that has disagreed with us. When feverish symptoms make themselves manifest, we say that we have taken a "cold"—not that we have been inflamed by inward imaginations and desires. We believe in eating and sleeping and exercising, as means toward health—which is well; but we do not believe in any inward experiences corresponding to this physical regimen, as of at least equal moment in the preservation of health. "Oh, rest in the Lord! Wait patiently on Him, and He shall give thy heart's desire!"—this we believe in for the soul; but how few of us believe in the hygienic potency of such an attitude of spirit! How few of us believe that for the soul thus to rest in the Lord is veritably to rest every tired nerve in the body, to let down the tension of our high-strung lives, and to produce that quiet which we so much need! Opiates and anodynes—these we thoroughly believe in, as means of inducing rest, the sleep which in poetry we say the Lord "giveth His beloved;" but how few of us put ourselves into placid slumber by

thus resting our souls in the Lord!

"I have meat to eat that ye know not of;" "Man doth not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God—doth man that proceedeth out of the mouth of God—doth man live": these are great words, which we believe thoroughly for the spirit. Who of us believes them for the body? Yet it was of the body that Jesus was speaking, in the first of these sayings, as well as of the soul. He was tired and hungered when he sat down by the well of Sychar, and His disciples went into the neighboring village to buy Him food. While they were gone He entered into conversation with the woman of Samaria by the well-side. In trying to help her soul, inward refreshment came to Him. In the thoughts he shared with her, his very body found sustenance. When His disciples came back, His fatigue was gone, His hunger was apbody found sustenance. When His disciples came back, His fatigue was gone, His hunger was appeased, and He said, "I have meat to eat that ye know not of." Who of us ever feeds his body thus from his soul? Who of us believes that he can feed his body thus from the soul? "Give us this day our daily bread"—that is a good prayer for the soul; but for the body we believe in the prayer only for the fresh loaves from the kitchen, not for the fresh thoughts proceeding out of the mouth of the fresh thoughts proceeding out of the mouth of God, on which man liveth in his very body. And yet to receive into our souls a great new thought, what potencies are thus freed; what energies are thus liberated; what life-giving sustenance is thus imparted! "Give me a great thought, that I may refresh myself," said the noble German. Who of

refresh myself, said the noble German. Who of us prays this prayer?
"Herein do I exercise myself to have always a conscience void of offense toward God and toward man." How many of us find in such exercise the means of anything more than what we call spiritual

strengthening? Who really believes that by thus exercising his conscience he can circulate his blood, can slough off the impurities from his system, and can slough off the impurities from his system, and accomplish what otherwise he might accomplish by a brisk walk or a good ride? Yet, if the physical organization is the manifestation of a spiritual substance, then the spiritual action should manifest itself in the physical organization, a moral effort should be equivalent to a physical exercise, and man should be able to energize his body from his mind—to vitalize his physical organism from his soul.

Thus are we all unconscious materialists-deniers

in our lives of the inner philosophy of life itself.

Yet, if we do at all believe in our belief and trust in our philosophy, it must be true that the innermost and most vital powers of our body are mental and spiritual powers; that, in the development and training of these mental and spiritual powers, we are best making for the development of our physical powers—for health itself. If that philosophy be true, life is not a mechanical process, but a mental or spiritual energy; the body is not the creator of the mind, but the creation of the mind. A man's physical organization is then a growth around his

inward being.

inward being.

All this is, as yet, a matter of speculation, if you will. If it be a sound speculation it must sooner or later come within the ken of Science itself, and be capable of demonstration. We are rapidly approaching this point, as it seems to me. Take, for example, the remarkable experiments of Professor Elmer Gates. Here is a genius who has been for years devoting himself to scientific experiment along the line of the inter-relationships of mind and years devoting himself to scientific experiment along the line of the inter-relationships of mind and matter. He ventures to affirm that every cell in our body is a centre of mind; that its real vitality is mental; that it is endowed with powers of menta-tion; that it is a thinking organism; that it is, in its substance, thought itself. Each cell in our body is, then, a point of the force that we call thought. The real force at work in our bodies, through these wonderful cell centres, is the force of thought. Professor Gates shows, as the result of his long-continued scientific experiments, that a man has the power of directing his thought upon any organ or function of his body, and of perceptibly affecting the action of that organ or of that function. He claims that he can increase the temperature in the point of his forefinger perceptibly, according to the claims that he can increase the temperature in the point of his forefinger perceptibly, according to the record of the thermometer, as a result of a few moments of concentrated thought. He affirms that, by thus concentrating thought and directing it upon any organ in the body, marked and recognizable changes in the action of the organ will be effected at once. His conclusion is that at least one great secret of health lies in the systematic cultivation of thought, and what he calls "dirigition," or thought direction toward any part of the body where vitalizing and healing forces may be needed. Other interesting experiments by Professor Gates confirm his astounding statement that, under the action of mental emotion, love, hatred, fear, jealousy, etc., the secretions of the body are so affected that the eye and tongue may recognize the changes. The color of the thought, so to speak. The taste of the secretions will be determined by the taste of the thought, as it were. All this is but the beginning of a scientific demonstration of this ancient and most profound philosophy of life.

As the philosophy comes to be recognized, its application will be apparent. Already, that application is recognized by our most intelligent physicians. They know the power of suggestion. They habitually make use of a suggested idea, as a therapeutic agent. They systematically arouse and direct expectant attention, as a means of inducing a cure from within—by the action of the mind. They know that the different drugs they prescribe will have their potencies mightily reinforced if the patient believes in the physician, and not only desires health but expects it. They understand well enough the immense salubrity of a sunny and serene atmosphere in the sick-room.

I can still recall the horror created in my mind by our family physician, a most desperately pessimistic man, who had not sense enough to conpessimistic man, who had not sense enough to con-ceal his own anxieties when he came to my bed-side. He would feel my pulse, look into my eyes, examine my tongne, and then shake his head with a solemn from and turn away to the window, where my eye would follow him, as his head, shaking from side to side, betokened the perturbation of his mind over my condition. A fine way of helping me back to health!

Now, our present family physician comes into the room with a bright and cheerful air, makes the usual examinations with a pleasant smile, and has always something cheery and hopeful to say. He manages to inspire confidence in himself and assur-

ance in his patients concerning themselves, and leaves us feeling the better for his being with us. He carries part at least of his pharmacopæia in his own personality. He not only writes prescriptions—he makes them. He may leave his pellets or his powders behind him—he has already injected his thought, and it is the thought that vitalizes his prescriptions.

According to the adage, a man is his own physician or a fool at forty. Most of us, then, are fools. Yet each one ought to be his own physician by forty; ought to have so far learned what he is himself as to be able to regulate not merely the experience of his body, but also the interest ternal conditions of his body, but also the internal conditions of his mind. And, if we believed in our own philosophy, we should be thus regulating our internal mental conditions, and thus regulating our external physical conditions. For one thing, if we were not fools still, we would cease our habitual mental preoccupation with sickness. Talk is not Talk is not mental preoccupation with sickness. Talk is not idle. It is a mighty potency. Talk is the expression of thought. A word is the manifestation of a thought. Each word is a logos—a thought in manifestation or in action. According, then, to our habitual talk will be our habitual thought; and according to our habitual thought will we be our-selves. If we persist in constantly talking about sickness, how should we be otherwise than po with the idea of sickness, the thought of disease? So talking, we must be constantly overshadowed by the haunting presence of infirmity and suffering. We communicate the contagion of fear, and poison one another with our morbid imaginations. We thus seek to create an atmosphere of health by charging the mind with impressions of sickness. charging the mind with impressions of sickness. Yet our habitual conversation is thus largely occupied with questions of disease. When we meet we first ask one another how we are. Hindus Agree with Tolstoi

Tolstoi has received a remarkable letter from a Hindu. In it the writer says that Hindus find a striking similarity between Tolstoi's philosophy and their own cherished doctrines. The author of "The Kreutzer Sonata," he explains, dwells incessantly on the fact that all our public and private actions are in direct contradiction with the principles of true Christianity, and Hindus are of the same opinion, and, moreover, maintain that this contradiction is nowhere more manifest than in the social and political actions of Europe.

According to them, not only the evils from which Europe is suffering but also the evils of the entire world may be accounted for in this way. They claim that wherever Europeans have established themselves their acts have been entirely at variance with their generous principles, which are the cardinal feature of the Christian religion, and for example they point to China, "a country which was formerly so happy," but which has recently been overrun by foreigners. The Hindus themselves, too, says Tolstoi's correspondent, have suffered much through Europeans, and that is why "they greet so enthusiastically the noble and vigorous action of the great Russian reformer."

In conclusion, the writer says the Hindus do not believe that an artificial European civilization can ever be established in their country, but rather hope that a time will come when a conquest by

not believe that an artificial European civilization can ever be established in their country, but rather hope that a time will come when a conquest by force will be succeeded by "a peaceful co-operation of Hindus and Europeans on the basis of true Christianity." The main reason why they are confident that this hope will be realized is because the religious conception which learned Hindus have formed of the universe is based almost entirely on the very ideas which are the general work of Tol. very ideas which are the groundwork of Tolstoi's philosophy.

There was a rough fireplace in one of the cabins and a pile of wood in one corner, so I soon had a rousing fire. Christian America we have been accustomed to look upon idol worship with peculiar repugnance. We have repeated, in song: "The heathen, in his blindness, bows down to wood and stone."

To "bow down" to idols and offer them some liberance and the state of the state o

homage seems like such an utterly foolish, if not blasphemous, performance, that we can have no pa-tience with such an idea. Can the people who do such things be much above the beast in intelligence? We pity them and perhaps mingle contempt with our sympathy.

our sympathy.

But we should learn to be just if not generous.
Our judgment should not ignore the heredity, environment and especially the standpoint and motive of any human brother, be he ever so low and ignorant. We may well pity the superstition and foolishness of the worshiper of idols, but it would be fair to inquire, Does he mean wrong and are his motives bad?

We are assured by the more intelligent heathen, if we make careful inquiry, that even the lower and more degraded class do not worship a carving of wood or stone, well knowing the powerlessness, in itself, of any such inanimate and inert object.

Those who are both logical and sincere explain that such an idol is only a symbol—a representation to the eye—of an idea of an unseen Power. The visible object serves as a kind of sensuous fulcrum to rest upon and as an aid to more thorough concentration. In other words, homage is called out toward an invisible or spiritual higher Something—an "unknown God"—through the act of worship. We are aware that the typical idolater of India is, least of all, a materialist. His subtle philosophy for ages has had its whole scope, logic and action in the unseen rather than in what is objective and material. He may be poor, ragged and degraded, but an inherent prevailing asceti-cism leads him away from any emphasis upon external and inanimate things. By a simple and universal instinct men will worship only what they feel to be superior to themselves. We can hardly conceive of any devotee who would be so stupid as to have such a feeling toward a carved idol, in

The brief outline which has been given of the spirit of Oriental thought is not presented as any excuse for the use of idols, and much less for any excuse for the use of idois, and much less for any defense. But simple comparison often is instructive. We are inclined to study others from the bias of our own standpoint. Forms greatly vary, but human nature, in the universal, is vastly more alike in quality, motive and inclination than we often imagine. The unlikeness is mainly upon the surimagine. The unlikeness is mainly upon the surface. We would resent being classed among idolatrous people. The New Thought bids us to see the best side of our neighbor, not only as a matter of charity, but as being in accord with the law of development.

The great Occidental idolatry is THE WORSHIP OF THINGS. We do not bow down to them literally or offer petitions to them. But to give ourally or offer petitions to them. But to give ourselves to them may even be worse. A very deep and true, even though subtle and unconscious, homage is soul occupation. What does one think most about? What calls out his greatest admiration? What accomplishment does he rejoice most over when gained? What possesses the greater part of our consciousness? Is it spiritual ideals and entities or THINGS? Here is the crucial test. One will give unlimited thought space to what he loves most. Soul occupation constitutes homage—even though unconscious—in its truest sense. What draws out the most of yourself? draws out the most of yourself?

Do you worship an automobile, a gay equipage, a fine yacht, a palatial residence, a handsome coun-

try seat, a fortune, a successful speculation? This is no plea for asceticism, nor is it a disparagement of the things enumerated. They are good in themselves and in their proper places. There is a radical difference between owning the things and being anymod by them. owned by them.

Art, beauty and even luxury may minister to aft, beauty and even inxury may minister to refinement and may possess an aesthetic and even a spiritual element which is wholesome. It is when they occupy "the chief seats in the synagogue" of human mind and soul that they become idolatrous. "Thou shalt have no other gods before me." What are gods? Things which absorb the most of our

are gods? Imags which absorb the most of our interest, our thought, our life.

Blessed is he who is not swept off his feet by the present tidal-wave of materialism. Wealth is good and not to be despised. But the son or daughter of the modern wealthy man is under a serious handicap in the attainment of character, usefulness and even success, in the ordinary sense. An environ-ment of affluence in the formative period of life imposes a severe test. The poor man who, from force of contrast, cherishes envy and bitterness is also under a serious handicap of another kind, but no less destructive.

Material advantage, as the supposed summum bonum, has always been the ignis fatuous which has led untold thousands into the quicksand. We always are just about to be happy. Optimism is good, but it must be well based. If, when eight miles an hour by stage-coach was good progress, the traveler could have had a glimpse of the future modern limited express, he would have exclaimed, Oh, what bliss! Think of traveling forty miles an hour in a parlor! Suppose the sender of a letter which required three weeks' time and twenty cents which required three weeks time and twenty cents postage for its carriage of a thousand miles could have looked forward to the telegraph, the telephone and "the wireless." He would have proclaimed them as characteristics of the Milennium. Pope's familiar sentiment, "Man never is, but always to be blest," is true to the letter of conventional materialism. But in the pursuit of spiritual ideals the path shipes brighter and brighter.

If during this twentieth century the men of high moral sense show themselves weaklings; if they possess only that cloistered virtue which shrinks shuddering from contact with the raw facts of life; if they dare not go down into the hurly-burly where men of might contend for the mastery; if they stand aside from the pressure and conflict; then, as surely as the sun rises and sets, all our great material progress, all the multiplication of the physical agencies, which tend for our comfort and enjoyment, will go for naught and our whole civilization will become a brutal sham and mockery. The Phenomena of Dreams

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DREAMS have been defined to be "trains of ideas presenting themselves to the mind during sleep, and from time immemorial have been the wonder land of waking hours. It frequently, if not always happens during sleep that while some of the mental faculties are suspended, others are still active, and are busy with numerous ideas, which succeed each other with more or less regularity. This is dreaming. It is characterized by an absence of consciousness with regard to external things, and an sciousness with regard to external things, and sinentire suspension of voluntary control over the current of thought, so that the principle of suggestion—one thought calling up another according to the law of association—has unlimited operation. The subject of dreams is one of the most intricate and perplexing in the entire field of mental philosophy, and it has not yet met with that amount of attention which its importance would seem to demand. tion which its importance would seem to demand. Dr. Richardson and His Assistant, Mr. Franks, Sending Telepathic Messages 125 Miles Across England



All Collusion Barred in Advance

Every precaution, says noted editor, was taken so that telepathists could have no prior communication.

ONDON. July 18.—From positive evidence that I have at hand. I have to make without qualification the statement that the transmission of long-distance messages by direct mental vibration—i. e., telepathy—is an accomplished fact.

To myself and a committee of other gentlemen the seemingly improbable feat of mental telepathy at great distances was shown to be absolutely possible.

Indeed, it was positively proved.

It has been demonstrated in a manner that has left none present with the shadow of a doubt in his mind. Every precaution was taken to prevent imposition. Imposition was impossible.

From London to Nottingham is a distance of 125 miles.

In Nottingham was Mr. Franks, a telepathist, stationed.

In London was another telepathist, Dr. Richardson, who is an American and New Yorker, and who had undertaken to receive from Mr. Franks the telepathic messages

LONDON TO NOTTINGHAM

From the hour of 5 o'clock on Thursday afternoon Dr. Richardson was kept under observation

It was left to the committee to choose three messages, or more for that matter, to be transmitted by means of telepathy between the men.

At the time that Dr. Richardson was put under observation (5 o'clock in the afternoon) the committee of which I was a member telegraphed to Mr. Franks, and absolutely without Dr. Richardson's cognizance, the three messages that he was to send telepathically to Dr. Richardson.

NO APPARATUS OR POWER

Following are the messages: The word "Scotland," the number "579," the hour "7,20 p.m."

Between 7 and 8 o'clock, after Dr. Richardson had spent the time in serene mental concentration, he received, faultlessly, the three messages telepathed to him by Mr. Franks.

I repeat that there existed absolutely no chance of his learning what the two numbers and the word were in any other manner than by telepathy.

Experiments were made afterward with three other messages telepathed by Dr. Richardson to Mr. Franks, and two of these three messages were correctly transmitted

At the third a certain mental weariness had come over Dr. Richardson, which was only natural under the circumstances, and further exertions were postponed.

This is but the beginning of wireless telegraphy without electricity or electrical machines.

Here let me avoid the personal and add to what I have said the story of what took place, as related by an unprejudiced observer:

"The most astonishing experiments in thought transference were made yesterday in the offices of Mr. William T. Stead, at the Review of Reviews. A committee of six distinguished men, that included Mr. Stead himself and the noted Dr. Wallace, had the matter in charge, and none who witnessed the experiments doubts in the least that what he witnessed was a genuine psychological accomplishment, too marvelous to credit though it might at first have seemed.

"Telepathic messages were successfully transmitted between Nottingham and the Review of Reviews office instantaneously. Nottingham is 125 or more miles from London.

"Franks was stationed at Nottingham and was told to expect the messages from the committee by telegraph that he was to transmit back to Richardson telepathically.

NO POSSIBILITY OF COLLUSION

"The eminence of the men who formed the committee makes the thought that there was any collusion in the wonderful results subsequently attained absurd. Besides, Dr. Richardson, the American, was closely guarded in his room after 5 o'clock. There was no opportunity for a confederate to pass to him what went on in the committee-room. As for Franks, at Nottingham, he had no possible way of sending information other than the manner in which he did—telepathically.

"The first test was a telepathic transmission from Dr. Richardson to Franks at Nottingham. The committee gave him the number '579.' At 6.34 Dr. Richardson went into an adjoining room. This was done for the purpose of allowing him the solitude necessary for the concentration of his mind.

"Even had he wished to do so, there was no possibility of his establishing any no mal means of communication with Franks from this room. At 20 minutes of 7 o'clock the committee got an answering telegram from Franks. It read '579."

THREE MESSAGES PASS

"Then Mr. Stead's secretary sent by telegraph to Franks three messages—a time, a number, a name. In the course of an hour Richardson received three telepathic messages from Franks. The first was that of time—'7.20;' the second was that of a number—'777,' and the third was the name 'Scotland.'

"These were the identical things that Mr. Stead's secretary had telegraphed earlier to Franks at Nottingham. The telepathic communications were instantaneous. The two hours and a half consumed in the test were for the most part taken up by the exchange of messages regarding the telepathic communications.

"When the test had ended there was not one who had been privileged to witness the extraordinary demonstration, who felt himself assailed by the least doubt as to its genuineness."—W. T. Stead, in N. Y. American and Journal.



There is a spiritual centre in all experience, and there is an abstract truth in all concrete manifestation. While the truth is unchangeable, and manifestations change ever, yet through the fleeting only may the eternal be discerned. It is through the Infinite.

may the eternal be discerned. It is through the relative that the finite mind is cognizant of the Infinite.

Consciousness unfolds as the result of its interpretation of experience and its consequent absorption of wisdom. Without experience, consciousness would have nothing to interpret, nothing from which to absorb wisdom. Consciousness interprets what the senses report to it; but without environment nothing would be reported. The outer world is as necessary as the inner; not only as necessary, but, fundamentally, the two are One and inseparable.

As the Soul unfolds, it comes into conscious harmony with manifestations of greater number and variety, and with correspondingly broader spiritual environment. And, as conscious harmony is what constitutes love, what, with soul development, is received as wisdom is given out as love. Love is at the heart of all truth, and he who assimilates the most truth distils the most love. Thus it is that wisdom and love are related intimately.

One is in sympathy only with what he has experienced, which is all that he represents. Each individual is representative only of the experiences he has met, and the wisdom he has absorbed from them. He is inclusive of all unfoldment less than his own present development. He understands and appreciates the motives, the meaning and the influences that correspond to all he has passed through and assimilated; and he sympathizes with others as they meet the difficulties and obstacles that he has encountered previously.

Without experience, sympathy with others would be impossible. One can love only that with which he is in harmony; and he vibrates in harmony only with that which is duplicated in himself. He cannot be at one with what is foreign to him, nor can he vibrate in sympathy with what is not in sympathy with him. There is sympathy between individuals only to the degree to which they have unfolded qualities and conditions in common.

Unconsciously, the Universe is a complete harmony. Unconsciously, all harmonies are inherent in each individual. But each must unfold gradually to a consciousness of these inherent harmonies. Such consciousness constitutes love; and this is expressed actively by way of sympathy. The consciousness of love and the expression of it by way of sympathy open to each individual the avenues leading to further inclusiveness and higher wisdom.

To possess universal wisdom, one must love universally; his sympathy must be boundless; he must recognize within the Self that which actuates the murderer, the robber, the thief; he must know that their conditions and environments have been his. Universal love is possible to universal experience only. To be all-inclusive, necessarily one must be bad and good, low and high, sinner and saint.

In the course of man's evolutionary development, there were times when murder, theft and the like were meritorious and commendable. One does not have to be a thief, at the time, to sympathize with a thief; but, at some time, he must have nourished similar thoughts and manifested them. And the wisdom absorbed from an experience forever re-

mains a part of one, and enables him, at any time, to respond to its counterpart in others.

One can sympathize with what he has passed through—brute life, animal life, savage life, crime, lawlessness. And to the extent that their wisdom is absorbed is he the better for having passed through each of these thought conditions and physical manifestations. But one can have no sympathy with, and therefore condemns, that which he has not yet experienced or to which he has not yet unfolded.

The study of embryology and anatomy demonstrates that the physical body retains the essence of all its ancestral forms or—as they may be termed—its physical experiences. And the thought form of which the physical is the manifestation similarly retains the essence of all its ancestral thought experiences. But, as one progresses, he stores away; he does not eliminate. There is no summit without its base.

The wisest of men are those whose love is most universal. An unbounded love and an all-inclusive sympathy are the distinguishing traits of all Saviors and Christs. The conception of Unity is vitalized by these qualities, and they inculcate a Religion of Humanity. Love of God and Love of Man are One; they are as inseparable as God and Man.

The experiences his development demands come constantly to each individual, and they offer opportunities for the absorption of the wisdom they represent, and that he requires. This wisdom is appropriated and assimilated in proportion as he loves his experiences, and thus they are persuaded to disclose their own secret love for him. One uses his wisdom to the best advantage as he gives expression to the higher love it represents and the wider sympathy it prompts. The expression of wisdom, through love and sympathy, promotes receptivity to higher wisdom, and thus facilitates its further development. Love and Wisdom are the positive and negative poles of Being, and whatever divides them serves equally to unite them and to demonstrate their essential inseparability.

That the intelligence pervades all things is an absolute certainty, and still further, that kindred divisions or groups in nature commune, converse and exchange thought is a certainty, says The Mental Advocate.

Some of these are inviting and others are repellent. For instance, the Eucalyptus tree repels nearly all other vegetable creatures, while the clover, buckwheat, orange, magnolia and rose invite the presence of most other vegetable creatures. The object of this article is to show that the whole of nature is permeated with intelligence and that this intelligence is greatly diversified. Even the metallic world is full of intelligence, and, still better, full of love. Iron, copper, gold, platinum and silver all have the power of intelligent attraction, especially between their own atoms. It is almost impossible to separate the atoms of iron because of the law of cohesion—that is, the law of love. These atoms are mutually bound not to separate, and love is the bond that unites them.

In all nature there is a constant emanation—a constant interchange of intelligence. The iron greets the iron while the rose sends out its fragrant messenger to its neighbor. A millionaire in New York told the writer that, when he was a boy, he let himself out by verbal contract for five years, at seven dollars and fifty cents a week, in a large dry goods store in New York At the end of three years, this young man had developed such skill in judging goods that another concern offered him three thousand dollars a year to go abroad as its buyer. 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

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
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Krishna's Teachings and Modern Beliefs
