

Brothers, we send greetings from Egypt, the land of wonders, of mys-Egypt, the land of wonders, of mystery and achievement. After thousands of miles on sea and land, at five o'clock on the morning of August 10th, Mystics No. 1 and No. 7 were privileged to catch their first glimpse of Egypt. Flocks of goats driven from place to place to be milked, donkeys, heavily paniered, carrying melons, hay, merchandise, furniture and what not, varied groups of Arabs, Jews, Nubians, Egyptians with their blue, brown, striped or white gowns and their crimson fez and white or bandana turbans, all made a scene never to be forgotten. And these, too, unkempt, strange, repulsive even, were our Brothers. Did we shrink from acknowledging in our hearts the relationship? A little; yes, perhaps more than a little. But a little incident brought back our better selves. And then a carriage was called and we were whirled away through the more handsome streets, where we gained a glimpse of Pompey's column or pillar, one of the few relics left of the ancient city. You will see it as the column on the right in the picture. Its height, including the triangular pedestal and Corinthian

capital, is ninety-nine feet.

According to tradition this pillar marks the tomb of Pompey the Great. Originally it was a landmark for sailors (another testimony for Brotherhood), and was built three hundred years before Christ.

Among other fine buildings in this city of the old and new civilizations are the mosques, some of them most beautiful, but the one in the picture on the next page is among the finest. Note the exquisite pattern of the dome ornamentation, the cornices, windows, etc. The mina-

rets and domes of the mosques give a most pleasing and picturesque variety to the architecture of the


are reading these words.

He began in the most humble way to cook and serve food to any who applied so far as his means would permit, and, after a time, seeing his self-sacrifice and intense sincerity, the well-to-do and wealthy began to contribute, "and this you see is the result," concluded our friend, as we rang the hell at the door and waited for answer. A wide. bell at the door and waited for answer. A wide, hospitable vestibule, with hall and dining tables on either side, savory smells from a kitchen immaculately clean, greeted us as we entered and were ushered upstairs to the private rooms of the master and his most interesting little family. Most cor-dial were the greeting and welcome from Brother Rudolph, a genial, big-hearted, elderly gentleman, who spoke good English and warmly proclaimed his allegiance to the United States, in which he was an adopted citizen and of which he had fond memories

Cool lemonade, an invitation to lunch and every possible thoughtfulness for the comfort of his guests, marked our host at once as a true Brother. But

"I was born a Jew, but my father was very liberal in his views, and, being a judge, was in contact with all kinds and conditions of people. 

I felt a profound call to be a helper to all, and not merely the Jews; so, after some years' hard work, finding the theological restraints hindering my efforts, I sent in my resignation. It was not accepted for some time, everyone urging me to remain, and then, thinking it was more salary I wanted, they offered me a generous addition. But I said I was working for a Principle, not Money, and money could not buy the Principle. My Principle. and money could not buy the Principle. My Principle demanded that I work for humanity according to the Divine revelation within, not according to instructions from without, which I was paid to obey. So at last they let me go, and with less than two piastres (about ten cents) in my pocket I left the missionary organization, free to do whatever the will of God led me to do. What was to be next I knew not, but waited, believing God would show me the way. In a few days I found an old, low, filthy loft and entered by a ladder from the outside and over an absinthe shop. It was the only place obtainable, and there, with an old quilt on the floor for my bed and my books in the corner, I betook myself. One way and another I managed to live, eating some cheap Arab bread and fruit, and believing that in His own way the Lord would take care of me. 
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
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# アスプスプスプスプスプスプスプス "A SHINE" KKKKKKKKKKK



REV. GEORGE H. HEPWORTH

They have thirty journals devoted to the promulgation of their faith. They have a library of five hundred volumes advocating their sectarianism. The moment your eye glances over these figures you ask. 'Why is this?'

"The answer is plain: First, because the doc-

"The answer is plain: First, because the doctrine of communion has put off its oppressive robes of selfishness and personal aggrandizement, and put on the white garments of good news to the world; and second, because nothing is more evident to my mind than that the world longs to believe, and needs to believe, something of this sort. It is essential to our religious well-being. The very minute that desolation enters a house and robs the family

of its loved member, leaving as a sacred memento of the past only the 'vacant chair,' the holiest part of our natures looks up to heaven with a vague expectation, with the belief that has never taken definite shape, perhaps, that though we cannot see them, they do see and know us. . . . I have the very firmest faith in that kernel of inspiration which has given to the sect all its value, the assertion that heaven is close to us, and that its inhabitants walk the earth both when we wake and when

we sleep.

"It seems to me that this truth is at the centre of all true religion; and when I bid the sect Godspeed, it is with the grateful feeling that it is reviving the truth which the prophets and the Christ Himself have taught us. Yes, I do believe in this possible communion with all my heart."

### REV. A. D. MAYO

Extracts from his sermon on Spiritualism: "Spiritualism is the natural awakening of the American masses to the doctrine of the Immortal Life taught by Jesus.

"A portion of the churches have welcomed it, and we will be saved by their wisdom; but woe to the sect or church that sets its face against it. It is not to be stayed by criticism from a theological or atheistical point of view. We shall learn out of it what it means to believe in the immortality of the soul; and it will be found that this doctrine will come to us fraught with vaster relations, suggesting larger duties, and elevating with nobler aspirations than to the darkened masses of the early ages of hearthenism or widdle area of Christianity.

of heathenism or middle ages of Christianity. . . "Invisible hands leave upon our tables gifts of faith and deathless love and immortal love, of which our fairest Christmas flowers and our greenest wreaths are but withered and vanished types. The pavement is thronged with a mighty host that crowds no hasty passenger, and speaks in no audible voice, but all the time holds sweet converse with the hearts of them that go to and fro. The school and the senate, and the places where men congregate for the serious work of life, have their empty chairs; empty to our mortal vision, yet to the eye of the soul filled with forms of unearthly wisdom and dignity and grace.

"I preach not to-day to this congregation alone; but this church is thronged and overflowed, yea, the whole air is populous with an audience you cannot see; for every beloved spirit that has left its mark on mine, and every weary and stricken soul that I have tried in feebleness to help, and every countenance that only for once has gleamed out in spiritual recognition from the strangest crowd; all who have heard my words on earth will hear them no more; all whose words I have heard for the last time in this valley of mortality, all are here to-day."

### REV. THEODORE PARKER

"This party has an idea wider and deeper than that of the Catholic or Protestant; namely, that God still inspires men as much as ever; that He is omniscient in spirit as in space. For the present purpose and to avoid circumlocution, the doctrine may be called Spiritualism.

"This relies on no church tradition, or scripture, as the last ground and infallible rule. It counts these things teachers, if they teach—not masters, helps if they help us—not authorities. It relies on the divine presence in the soul of men—the eternal word of God, which is Truth, as it speaks through the faculties He has given. It believer God as near the soul as matter to the sense; thinks the canon of revelation not yet closed, nor God not exhausted. It sees Him in Nature's perfect work; hears Him in all true scriptures. Jewish or Phœnician; feels Him in the inspiration of the heart; stoops at the

same fountain with Moses and Jesus, and is filled with living water. It calls God Father, not King; Christ, brother, not redeemer; Heaven, home; religion, nature. It loves and trusts, but does not fear. It sees a Jesus in man, living man-like; highly gifted and living with blameless and beautiful fidelity to God-stepping thousands of years before the race of men-the profoundest religious genius that God has raised up; whose word and works help us to develop the natural idea of a com-plete religious man. But he lived for himself, died for himself, worked out his own salvation, and we must do the same; for one man cannot live for another, more than he can eat or sleep for him. It lays down no creed, asks no symbol, reverences exclusively no time nor place, and therefore we can use all time and every place. It reckons forms useful to such as they help. Its temple is all space, its shrine the good heart, its creed all truth, its ritual works of love and utility, its profession of faith a divine life, works without faith, within love of God and man. It takes all the help it can get; counts no good word profane, though a heathen spoke it-no lie sacred, though the greatest prophet had said the word. Its redeemer is within, its salvation within, its heaven and its oracle of God. It falls back on perfect religion—asks no more, is satisfied with no less."

### REV. H. ELKIN

"The Bible is full of these revelations, sights and manifestations, and if we believe the Bible, why is it not as easy to believe that spirits can communicate with men now as anciently? If spirits ever could appear unto men, they can to-day; but no doubt certain physiological and physical conditions are necessary, else all men could hold intercourse. Not all men at the present time can commune with spirits. But the same faculty which aided them to see and commune with spirits anciently, can, if rightly developed, aid them to-day; and modern manifestations are as real as ancient ones.

"Spiritualism comes to the aid of the churches and they reject it. It supplies to atheists and infidels the lacking evidence of immortality, and they receive it. It thus resembles Christianity In its first movements, which was rejected by professedly religious men. The doctrine of immortality must ultimately rest upon proof, or be rejected. And if all the phenomena attending the modern movement be accounted for on physiological grounds, without the intervention of spirits, ancient phenomena will have to pass the same ordeal and receive the same sentence.

"Whatever physiological law will account for involuntary polyglot speaking and writing moderally, will account for speaking in unknown tongues anciently; whatever physiological law will account for the modern prophecies, gifts of healing, revelations, poems, hymns and doctrines, will account for the ecstasies, prophecies, gifts of healing, etc., in ancient times. Whatever physiological law will account for the apparitions or seeing of spirits, lights, hearing of music, etc., modernly, will account for the visions and voices heard anciently. Whatever physiological law will account for the lifting and moving of tables, pianos, etc., by invisible power, modernly, will account for the unbarring of the doors of Peter's prison anciently."

# MINOT J. SAVAGE

"A belief that has come to be practically a religion to millions of people in the most civilized countries of the world may rightly claim at least, whatever else may be said about it, to be regarded as one of the 'signs of the times.' And this belief is not held by the supersitions by the ignorant is not held by the superstitious, by the ignorant, by the vicious, by the socially reprobate alone. Nor does it find a home among them. For better or for worse, it is shared by lawyers, by doctors, by ministers, by philosophers, by men of science, by men in every occupation, in every rank of life. There are believers among the social outcasts of the world, there are believers on thrones, there are believers in palaces, believers among the nobility of every country, believers among diplomats, those engaged in the public service of their respective States. So for better or worse, as I say, we find this permeating all modern society, in the high places and in the low, and it seems to me significant of one of two things. If it be true, then the fact that so many in all walks and range of life have accepted it contradicts neither the brain nor the culture of the adherents. If it is only delusion, contemptible, pitiful superstition and fraud foisted upon so many, then it seems to me one of the saddest commentaries on what we dare to call the civilization of the century, that here at a time when we had dared to think that the world was coming to be fairly intelligent, it is overrun, fairly swamped, with what the many are supposed to regard as merely a survival of old barbaric superstitions.

"It seems to me, then, that it is worthy of our careful, earnest, candid attention. If it is true, we certainly want to know it. If it is false, we want

to know it, not only for our own sake, but for the sake of helping so many people out of a pitiable delusion. Liberals, at any rate, at the first blush, ought to be touched with a little feeling of sympathy toward it; for whatever else it may be, it has proved itself the most remarkable, the most widespread, the most effective solvent of the old dogmas that the world has ever known. Educated people those who have time for critical thought and study can be touched and influenced by criticism by philosophy, by science; but here is a power that has come to work through the affections as well as through the intellect of men, and at whose touch the hideous and awful dogmas of the past have faded away, to give place, at least in other respects, to what are rational and humane ideas concern Father in heaven and the destiny of His children. . . .

"What is, then, the first grand belief? Simply that death is not an end; that it is merely an expression, an incident in the onward and upward struggle and progress of the individual life. It claims to have demonstrated this, to hold it not as a hope, not as a belief, but as knowledge. It teaches that inside these gross physical bodies there is an ether body, a body that has grown with it, shaped by it, adapted to it, perfect in every part and faculty; and that this ether body is disengaged at death, like a germ delivered from its sheath, and that it goes on, the soul taking this ether body with it as a perfect equipment in every faculty for the fullest expression of its higher and better life. According to this teaching, the soul simply goes on with its power to think, to remember, to love, just as of old.

"It further teaches that this universe everywhere is under the law of cause and effect, and that we begin life hereafter, just as we leave it here—precisely what we have made ourselves by ourthoughts, our deeds, our words on earth. Therefore, this other life is not peopled with ghosts, with ghastly, thin and unreal beings, such as we have imagined in the past; they are real folks—our fathers, our mothers, our neighbors, our friends—just as we have known them here, only released from their lower, physical condition, but carrying with them the same kind of character, of thought, of personality which they had here.

"It also teaches that, under certain peculiar conditions, there can now and then be manifestations of the reality of that life to this life; that sometimes there comes a whisper, sometimes a hand is reached across the abyss, and that they are demonstrations of the fact that those we have loved and that we talk of as lost, are not lost but are living as we are living

as we are living.

"This higher Spiritualism is in perfect accord with the finest and highest philosophy of the world. It is in perfect accord with the finest and highest moral principles that have ever been discovered. So there is nothing that we know that is contradictory to these claims of higher Spiritualism. Therefore, whether it can demonstrate itself as true or not, it is not in contradiction with any known truth that science or philosophy has to offer, and is in perfect accord with the finest ethical teachings and the highest hopes of man. So much must be said in defence of this claim of what I have called the higher Spiritualism.

"Now, I wish to offer a few suggestions, of which you will see the force and drift. I speak now as a Spiritualist. I am speaking, or trying to, as a perfeetly fair and sympathetic critic from the outside. These claimed facts which Spiritualists offer us as proof of that which they declare to be true, are not new facts. What is called modern Spiritualism itself is half a century old, but these general manifestations of a certain class and kind of facts have been reported down from the very dawn of human history. In the household of old Dr. Phelps, of Connecticut, father of Professor Phelps, of Andover, there were unquestionably certain manifestations of abnormal power that have never ye found any explanation, onless indeed they find it here. In the home of the Wesleys there were similar manifestations continued for a long period. From most every nation, every religion, every age, there come to us these stories of abnormal, unusual occurrences, things that usually the people have called miracles, that they were not able to explain. Now here is a point that I wish to emphasize. Are these stories—hundreds of them—told of the greatest and most reliable writers and historians of the world; are they true? They certainly are not considered to the contract of scious falsehoods. Do they mean that the people things in all ages were so little who reported these to be relied on; that they should be constantly liable to this sort of delusion from the beginning of the world until now? I simply wish to say this, if I may believe in the central thought of modern Spiritualism, that fact would run a line of light, a line of sanity, back up the ages through every re-ligion, through every nation, through every tribe, and would give me added respect for the ability of the average man to observe and tell the truth. It would explain not only the Bible, but the scriptures of all ages and the writings of grave, old Roman writers, like Livy, and almost all writers of angles of and put of ancient times. "Here also might be found a rational explanation of the ancient oracles, and of such claims as that made by Socrates concerning the daimon that was his constant attendant and teacher,

"Then what a light it would throw upon the whole Bible! For the Bible looked at from a whole Bible! For the Bible looked at from a standpoint of the rationalist is nothing but a Spiritualistic book from beginning to end. Its entire significance is in its Spiritualism. It is full and running over with it from one cover to the other. Must we put everything there down to the wildest kind of delusion? Must we not, unless there is some ground for these beliefs? I would like to believe something a little more to the credit of these reporters.

"Let me indicate to you one kind of influence it would have on my thinking. I do not believe at all in the physical resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. On the testimony contained in the New Testament, I see little cause for believing even in His spiritual reappearance. The testimony of the New Testament concerning the resurrection of Jesus, if it were paralleled by testimony in a court of justice, would not be accepted, for it is simply the anonymous testimony of people whom we cannot crossexamine as to certain very strange and wonderful things that happened nearly two thousand years ago. One of the strangest things to me is to find people who believe in these stories told in the New Testament, but who do not believe the modern ones. For the modern ones are of precisely the kind, and have this advantage over the old, that they have the living testimony of hundreds of credible men and women, while the old stories are no more credible on their own account than the modern ones, and have no evidence that would be allowed if it were standing simply alone.

"In view—and here is what I have in mind—in view of this, if I may be permitted to believe in the visible spirit appearance of any modern man who has died, why then, it would be perfectly easy and rational for me to believe that Paul saw Jesus on the way to Damascus. It would not seem a super-natural fact, but a perfectly natural occurrence.

"And here let me remove one natural prejudice. Spiritualism makes no demand on us that we believe the supernatural. At most, it is only a question of words. A spiritual world, if it exists, is as natural as the physical world. All the mightiest forces are invisible, but not therefore supernatural."

WHOSE IMAGE AND SUPERSCRIPTION?

HE Master had been called upon to decide whether or not they should pay taxes, or tribute, to Casar. He called for a coin of the realm. When one was handed Him, He asked, "Whose image and superscription are these which I see stamped upon this coin?" They replied, Casar's. "Then," He said, "Render to Casar the things that are Casar's, and to God the things that are Casar's, and to God the things that are Casar's.

The image and superscription of the owner or author are stamped upon all things appearing in the outer world. That to which each individual belongs most in thought and deed makes its sign of ownership upon the surface to be known and read of all men.

Is there sickness marked upon this surface? Whose image and superscription is it? Is it God's? Are you in this mark showing forth the likeness of your perfect Father?

No; it is the sign of some erroneous conclusions about God-some falling short in comprehension of the Truth. Render back to this source the things that originate in it.

But what are error and shortcoming? Nothing. No sane person will claim that there is either substance or reality in a mere mistake, or a missing of the mark, or a wandering from the right path.
Then render to Nothing the things that are Noth-

Stop calling such things realities. Never again denominate them positive states. To do this is to say that they are God's. How can you render Nothing to God? Can God be sick? It is true that the conditions created by error

must be overcome, and in overcoming you rise to a higher plane of individual being. But you never can overcome while you fear and submit to them as positive things. You must come to realize that they originate in a belief of vicinity, in a fear of that which is not, and so relegate them back to the realm of nothingness: that is, rise in spiritual knowledge and perception to a point where shadows will not scare you as ghosts of unholiness. to darkness the things that originate in darkness.

Are the image and superscription on your body in the form of wrinkles, gray hairs and failing facul-ties? Whose are they? Are they God's?

No; a belief in an unreality is responsible for these marks. It is a belief in death, and death is not real. Render back to this realm of unreality its own products. You have no business to hold on to them.

If there were no belief in death, there would be no such marks. Long before this belief became a fixed habit of human thinking, men lived to be many hundreds of years old. The Lord God told Adam that he should surely die because he had believed in evil but he did not know when, fixed no limit, yet he still kept on expecting it to come some time. So he came to be almost a thousand years of age before his belief and expectancy were fulfilled. Then people began to fix a sort of limit about there, and many lived to be almost a thousand years old, but none over.

But some died younger, and then they began to fear earlier demise. This fear caused still more to be cut off in their youthful days of two or three

hundred years.

Thus the time of human life was shortened on down the ages until the pitiful average came to be

about thirty years.

Since this Spiritual renewal has come upon the earth and thousands of people are saying that there is no death, the average has shot up to about forty

To say there is no death is to render to nothingness the things that are nothing. To say that death is a reality is to try to render to God the things that are nothing. This cannot be done, and so the marks and effects remain until the work is completed. But you can render them back to their origin, and thus escape them.

If this work of calling things by their right names and placing them where they belong continues—and it must continue, for there is no power to retard it-life in the body will be extended by the renewing of the body, until every mortal phase of the personal life shall be swallowed up in immortality and no form of death will remain.

Don't rise up now and talk back at me, saying, "Ah, well: you'll die, just the same," Such predictions are unbecoming a child of God. How do you know I will? I hold that you know nothing about it—you are only judging by what has here-tofore appeared to be. But that appearance may any time prove to be founded on a false basis, as many other appearances have before. Until 300 cears ago people thought that certain tubes in the body carried air, and so they called them arteries, air-tubes. But this turned out to be a mistake. So did the beliefs about water and fevers, and the revolution of the earth, and many others.

Sometimes people who have a very strong belief in death ask me, "Why, don't you expect to die?" And when I say, No, they seem to take it as a personal affront. If I were to dare not to die at the

time they have decided to be the proper date, they would become very angry, I presume. But I have found better business than to be expecting to die. I only expect to live, and I shall live forever. I render to Nothingness the things that are nothing and to God the things that are real.

Have you the marks of poverty upon you, and hold you the attitude of mind which seems to shut down the gates against the swelling floods of Nature's exhaustless bounties so that you have not at command that which is necessary to make your life happy? Whose image and superscription are these? Are they those of the King of the universe who owns all wealth? Are they those of your Father in heaven, who is more willing to give than you are to

No: they are the marks of denial of God's limitless bounty. They are the results of ideals of weakness and limitation held by you and a long line of ancestors before you.

Render to denial and limitation the things which belong to them. Lay not such things to the charge of God. There is no limitation in God. If you have poverty and want, it is because you have de-nied the power and presence of the All-Good, and have so shut yourself off from your rightful attitude of possession.

Take with you now other words of denial, and turn unto God. Deny the ideals of limitation and want. They are not founded in reality; the conditions they have brought upon you are not necessary, are not inevitable. You were not born to be poor. No iniquitous laws of any country can hold you in rags and starvation if you only come to know yourself and your divine right to the best there is. Deny all such concepts of limitation and affirm your power over circumstances, over affairs, over that which you need.

That which you need is yours—take it. Arise

in the strength of your divine nature and draw that which you want.

Whatever would make you happy is yours—enter into possession through the development of your own opulence.

But the only way to get wealth that brings true happiness is to draw it. You cannot enjoy or be satisfied with that which you get possession of through grasping, stinting economy or gift. You have no place for it in your nature if you get it in that way. You have not had the discipline that prepares you to enjoy it. Greed knows not when it has wealth because it represents no need.

Need, or a place ready to be filled up with some joy, some pure happiness, will naturally attract that which will supply it, if allowed to work unthat which will supply it, it allowed to work untrammeled by thoughts of denial and limitation. In God's wise economy the need would not be if there were not that in being which is able to satisfy it. It is neither right nor necessary that you should be poor and denied the happiness that plenty may secure. You deserve the best.

The best thing this world has is money, because with it you can secure every external appliance for

with it you can secure every external appliance for happiness that is in the world, and with no other

thing on the outer can you do this.

For this reason some men love meney. They even get to love it for its own sake, although it has no value within itself. It has only an exchangeable value—it is worth only what it will buy. If there were nothing to buy, it would be worth nothing.

Hence the love for money is an empty, delusive, foolish love. It satisfies not and blesses no one. Money has the stamp of Cæsar upon it, and-must be rendered to Cæsar.

Yet it is the best thing the world has to give you, and is a very desirable thing to have control of in this sphere of being, for the reason that it is the thing that will meet Cæsar's demands.

But the man who loves it, holds it when he gets it, or spends it selfishly, and so does not render it to Casar; the man who gets it by grasping and defrauding, never, never gets any good out of it, even temporarily.

The only true way to get money so as to get the good that 't may buy, is laid down in Jesus' rule, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things shall be added."

not giving it to Cæsar, nor to Cæsar's coin-and in this attitude you become a magnet able to draw abundant supply for every need.

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
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
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

IAT is the cause of this continual state HAT is the cause of this continual state of invalidism, this inability to overcome chronic conditions, even when I feel that I know and understand how to apply the laws of mental healing?" This is the question often asked and one which seems to require a thoughtful

reply. Out of my own experience, as well as an observation which extends over many years, I can say that very often the cause of continued physical pain or inharmony is some deep-lying cause in the

character rather than the mind.

The mind may entertain an image of disease which, so long as it is held, will create corresponding conditions on the body; yet after this image of disease is utterly displaced and the mind perfectly free from even a fear there still remain the old conditions. Evidently, then, the cause is deeper than the mind. Look carefully, dear hearts, and see if there be not some quality in your character which needs changing, some continuous irritating condition of the emotions which perhaps has nothing whatever to do with the disease itself, yet which may be the cause of its expression. In such cases it is only the correction of the character which will

make a cure of the disease.

I know of a certain case which, after a four years' struggle, was perfectly healed by the complete reformation of a certain habit of self-condemnareformation of a certain habit of self-condemna-tion. The person in question, having a very mor-bid conscience, was continually seeing faults in her conduct and disposition which she bitterly con-demned and over which she mourned almost un-ceasingly. The physical disturbance was a con-dition of almost total blindness which instead of abating seemed to increase, notwithstanding the efforts of the lady herself and many of the most successful and prominent mental healers. It was only after a resolve to let the matter of healing drop from her mind and to turn her whole attention to living the ideal life, so far as it was possible, one moment at a time, without condemnation or regret, moment at a time, without condemnation or regret, without anxiety or fear, that she finally came into a state of spiritual vision wherein she saw no faults in heaven or earth, no motes, no imperfections. Her spiritual eyes seemed opened and consequently

her physical eyes were restored to a state of wholeness. Do you see the analogy, dear hearts?

mental picture of the disease, but a mental picture of fear. Holding to this as tenaciously as she held to the desire to be well she had a divided mind and consequently a divided house or body.



He may accumulate millions many times repeated, but they will not buy what he wants. Possibly, he may gradually become conscious that the feeling of incompleteness is absolice.

Human cravings begin in the simplest way and upon the lowest plane, and constantly expand in every direction. The infantile demand for simple warmth and nourishment is but the starting-point of desires of illimitable extent. One may as well chase the rainbow to find its end as to expect the satisfaction of his multiform humas to expect the satisfaction of his multiform hunger. But in spite of all the world's history to the contrary, men continue to feel that the attainment of the present specification will "fill the bill." The artist sets before him a high standard which

will fulfil his aspiration, but in due season that which he craved has been left behind. The in-ventor will make a wonderful improvement and then rest serenely upon his laurels, but lo! grander achievements loom up in the opening vista and beekon him forward, and still forward.

Do we condemn the law of perpetual dissatisfaction? No, for one who had fully attained everything which he desired would be rightly classed as abnormal or idiotic. There will be unsatisfied desires and unrestful aspiration until every human being realizes that all "things" are his own. Paradoxical as it may seem, the real goal is a satisfied dissatisfaction, while the usual kind is of the dissatisfied order. Here lies the subtle parting line between realism and idealism. line between realism and idealism.

The desire for possession is normal, but everything depends upon its application. When in adult humanity its activity is exclusively, or even mainly, upon the material plane, there is perversion. The normal hunger is sometimes termed a "divine discontent."

"divine discontent."

Everyone may rightfully aspire to "own the earth," but not through physical conquest, sharp financiering or legal exclusion. There is a higher and truer kind of possession. A proper ambition for the private ownership of material things is right and legitimate in its own order, but it is of a subordinate quality. A true socialism does not consist of an arbitrary division of visible property, for this would be both impracticable and demoralizing. It would involve a sordid external legalism izing. It would involve a sordid external legalism which would be destitute of spontaneity and without a social freedom of overflow which is the evolution of t lutionary ideal. Man must develop love and goodness from the centre, for no legislation or social order from without can plaster them upon him.

The higher and most real ownership requires capacity, and this comes only from cultivation and development. The value of beautiful and desir able things consists of a sense of their inner qualities, and this is not subject to sale or purchase. The quintessence of the value of things is in their

spiritual reality.

We need not in the least impinge upon the legitimate rights of material ownership in its own domain. This right is recognized by all orderly governments and is necessary to prevent social chaos. The outward control of things must remain subject to such mutual contract as shall be free and voluntary on all sides.

free and voluntary on all sides.

But in the deepest sense one owns just that which he can absorb, appreciate and become one with, and no more. A man may have the title-deeds in his peaker to a great library, art museum deeds in his pocket to a great library, art museum deeds in his pocket to a great library, art museum or conservatory, and yet be incapable of their real ownership. To him they are merely pieces of property. Their only intrinsic value consists in their distinctive uses and purposes. Their envied "owner" may exchange them for other things which are just as elusive, but nothing is gained. As a man, or the ego, is really mind and not an animated statue of clay, possession is really a mental and spiritual power and privilege. As a physical organism, he can only appropriate those

few things which minister directly to his material necessities. Here his capacity is extremely limited. Every effort to crowd it reacts and inevitably brings penalty.

Even in the widest sense material ownership is have but one owner. But every ideal—and ideals are real assets in proportion as they are firmly held in consciousness—may belong to all. But instead of the ideal possession of every desirable thing which should be our privilege and pleasure, our eyes are mainly centred upon a negation—deficiency. As thought space is virtual ownership, we are therefore rich in negation—action—just in proportion as it occupies us

nothing—just in proportion as it occupies us.

Poverty is a condition of soul. Regardless of great wealth, if one feels poor his poverty is veritable. What matters it if all the dainties of the world are heaped upon our table if we have no digestive power?

digestive power?

Let us turn from this ever-present sense of deficiency and claim our own. Paul's significant aphorism, "All things are yours," is not a mere moral abstraction, but it is ideally psychological and scientific. Every ideal that we really own is an actuality in the making. If sheltered and consciously held, its incubation is certain.

Our divine sonship makes us legitimate heirs and possessors of harmony, health, goodness and every other desirable entity and condition. If an ownership of evil, disorder and negation be not desirable,

ship of evil, disorder and negation be not desirable, let us disclaim them. How they have been produced and multiplied by a depressing realism!

The developed sense of a general proprietorship bears a varying definition, depending upon the point of view. From that of pure psychology, some have termed it the "cosmic consciousness"; from that of philosophy, scientific idealism; and from the religious standpoint, it may properly be called spiritual dominion. It involves the divinity of man and its corresponding rights and privileges. As we develop the Christly consciousness within, which is that of sonship, we are warranted in speaking from standpoint of the Universal. Emerson gave a hint of his ideal possessions: son gave a hint of his ideal possessions:

"I am own of the sphere,
Of the seven stars and the solar year,
Of Cæsar's hand and Plato's brain,
Of Lord Christ's heart and Shakespeare's strain."

Emerson's claim is only a modern idealistic form of Paul's: "All things are yours."

This leads on to the climax of our conscious possessions. We rightfully speak of our God, and of my God. Is even the Deity among our possessions? We may reverently answer yes, in so for as we are in alternative.

Aspiration is only the craving for universal ownership. "Divine discontent" is the motor which urges us forward. We never become but always are becoming. In the realm of real ownership there is no exclusiveness. But though untold treasures are in waiting, we do not enter into their actuality except through consciousness.

HE word "spiritual" is of such uncertain significance that one must first define it, and show what is not meant when one uses it, as well what one chooses to have it mean. If we observe

people who are said to be spiritual we find a great variety of opinions and customs. It is surprising to find how different are the likes and dislikes, the methods and terms of those who claim to be seeking the spiritual life. Again, it is interesting to find so many people of diverse ways of thinking insisting on just their way as the only true method. Thus the extremes vary from the true method. Thus the extremes vary from the hermit, the ascetic and the mystic, on the one hand, to the self-denying social worker, the asthetic devotee, and the thinker who seeks to make a science of spirituality, on the other. It will be worth our while to consider some of these types of belief and conduct before we turn to the more positive of the second of th tive characteristics of the spiritual life.

There is apt to be a certain narrowness in the life of those who make a specialty of the spiritual life. It is unnecessary to look as far back as the ascetic of the Middle Ages to find narrowness. Nor is it necessary in our Western world to prove the one-sidedness of asceticism. That experiment has been given up once for all. In our day this narrowness has assumed new forms. For example, some indictive regirdly another coming of all things from sist so rigidly on the coming of all things from within—the finding of the Kingdom of God in a particular way—that they will not lift a finger to particular way—that they will not lift a finger to co-operate externally. They seem to think that the things which are to be added will gravitate to them by a kind of mechanical process. Yet all the while they are shutting God out by condemning part of His world as "external." For example, such people are frequently heard to speak in a high-strung voice, full of nervous tension. Suggest to them that it would be well to lower the voice, and you will be told, "That is of the external." But who gave man his voice? What more direct way is there, sometimes, of entering into the kingdom of peace than to lower the voice and the kingdom of peace than to lower the voice and speak in gentle tones? Others object to physical exercise, because that is "doing things with the body." But what is the body if it be not "the temple of the Holy Spirit?"

I was once impressed by the comment of an energetic woman on the doctrines of a little paper devoted to a particular type of spirituality: "Why, it leaves one so little to do!" The criticism was perfectly just. To that woman it would have been a backward step to lead so limited a life. The spiritual life is rich, it takes nothing from our activities, it adds to them. Consequently one is justified in turning aside from these narrowing modes of

Others declare that the spiritual life partakes of the "impersonal." But this word conceals many illusions. Those who declare themselves "imper-sonal" are usually the most personal of mortals, sonal" are usually the most personal of mortals. Penetrate behind the illusion and you will find dogmatism, egotism, pride. It is because people want things to go their way that they claim to be "impersonal." I have yet to find a single person who made this claim who was not in reality "throwing dust in the eyes," as the French say. The man who is honest with himself knows that persons constitute the world. It is personal desires which prompt us, it is for personal reasons that we claim to be disinterested. Or, it is mere theory, borrowed from the Orient, for example, when we are told to be disinterested. Or, it is mere theory, borrowed from the Orient, for example, when we are told that the mother should love all children as she loves her own, that her children ought to show no preference for her. These are the ideas of people who subordinate family life and trample on the sacred ties of love. Nothing could be further from the spiritual ideal than this.

Far from this position is the noble ideal that true love deepens one's love for humanity. When

true love deepens one's love for humanity. When the mother loves rightly, she loves all children, too; but only on condition that she love hers first and in a special sense. That would be a strange child who should not show preference for those who have bestowed tender care upon it. To this tenderness a large social sentiment is in due time added. Thus the universal is added to the particular, but it does not absorb it. Be untrue at home, and your universality shall count for naught. Be truly a person and you may help mankind to attain freedom. There is nothing nobler than to be a person. One who is truly such is an agent of justice; he is fair, impartial. But to be a large-minded lover of truth and of your fellow-men is to be very far beyond that stage which has been denominated "impersonal."

Again the spiritual realm has been thought of as afar from man and from the world. Spirituality has been for Sundays, or for "saints." This idea of separateness has done more than most any other notion to raise a barrier between and man. Only when we consider the entire

universe, both large and small, as a revelation of the Holy Spirit, are we in the right state to be truly spiritual. Each moment we live is a spirit-ual moment. Each hour may be made sacred by remembering how that hour came to be. Indeed, to become spiritual is precisely this: To show by to become spiritual is precisely this: To show by our conduct that we believe that the universe is one, that there is one God, one supreme law. When we live in fragments we are not yet spiritual; we are materialistic or selfish. The Spirit unites. Hence the very heart of Spirit is love; hence it is

that love is regarded as the supreme test.

Aristocracy is another of these negative signs whereby people show that their spirituality is not quite genuine. "We are the chosen people;" others happen to be barbarians, heathen or infidels. On the other hand, the truly spiritual man is democratic. He recognizes that every man is a son of God. There are no barbarians in the realm of the soul. Every person has faith, somewhere in his heart. If ignorant of his sonship, he needs our brotherly sympathy and help. As a son of God, he has a perfect right to worship in his own way. The superiority of his critics is a sure sign that their hearts have not yet been touched. The greatness of our Master is most of all evident in those touching incidents where he welcomes the sinful into the Kingdom, where he associates with those people whom some of his modern followers (in word, not in spirit) would deem unfit to share their society.

Nor is the spiritual life mere submissiveness Humility and receptivity are points along the way rather than goals of the spiritual life. The spiritual individual must become as a child, but he is also a man; and the active individuality of our Western world may become as true a servant of God as the self-abnegation of the East. Devotion is the positive word, not self-denial.

What, then, are some of the positive characteristics of the spiritual life? From what has already been said we see that broad-mindedness is promi-The spiritual man is tolerant. He is conservative of the faith, he keep the great ideal ever in view, and will not allow himself to be turned aside. Yet just because he believes in the universality of the Kingdom, he knows that many pathways lead to the same summit. The conditions are secondary; the kind of life manifested under these conditions is the test. One man may seem to another to be an atheist, yet his critic may be compelled to confess that the one he condemns lives an expensive of the condemns of emplary life. As a matter of fact, some of the most pious men in all the ages have been scornfully condemned as atheists. Narrow indeed are our theological standards, but how broad is the life wherewith men truly show that they believe in the heavenly Fether! heavenly Father!

Again, we note that the Kingdom of God is far from being confined to the inner life. Yonder saint from being confined to the inner life. Yonder saint in his library chooses to serve God by tirelessly searching for truth. Another worships the Father through an elaborate ritual, with incense and symbolism. But, as a Roman Catholic once remarked, such "externals" are only external to him who does not put the spirit into them. The person who gives exquisite care to all the details of external life is often classified as "not yet quickened" by one who emphasizes the inner life, and who perhaps permits everything about his home to fall into ruin. But all our idols are not made of wood or stone But all our idols are not made of wood or stone. If one man is inwardly unquickened, another may be outwardly as undeveloped. It is not for the apostle of the inner life to cast the first stone.

The spiritual is both objective and subjective. It is many-sided, beautiful, universal. It includes both individuality and brotherhood. It pertains now to the contemplative life and now to the life of service. Sometimes it is "good works" which most truly make it known, but again it is the quiet life of which the most truly make it known, but again it is the quiet life of which the most result in the property of the service of the serv life of which the world sees and hears nothing, It does not have much to say about itself. most spiritual people are not those who call them-selves so. Spirituality is shown by the life, what-ever that may be, and you must be sure that you really know a man's life, for temperaments differ enormously

Again, it is made known by a kindly spirit. genuine spirituality exhibited in a quiet little home where peace and love prevail than in many a church and seminary. Plain human life is much more acceptable than the self-conscious activities of those who set up as guides to all that is occult and unseen. It is easy to lecture about is occult and unseen. It is easy to lecture about the next world and about reincarnation. It is easy to live a single life amidst a group of admirers. But the real test is apt to be home life. If one is kind and zentle there, one's doctrines have real worth. Hence it is the little deeds and words that tell. It is the gentleness amidst much that tends to provoke its expensive that to provoke its opposite, the beauty which triumphs

Spirituality is also generous, liberal. It is not bargain-driving, nor is it economical to the last bargain-driving, nor is it economical to the last farthing. To try to buy everything for the least possible sum is to narrow the soul. Generosity invites beneficence, and liberality brings provision for its further existence.

It is needless, perhaps, to add that spirituality unselfishness. But one must surely declare that It is needless, perhaps, to add that spirituality is unselfishness. But one must surely declare that it is gladness, for long-faced people would fain persuade themselves that they have found it. It is practical, moderate, refined, noble, pure. It is for this world, and no circumstance is too mean to make it impossible of attainment. It does not condemn the present life as a "dream," nor indulge in the false generalization that "our senses deceive us."

For the natural life is the spiritual seen for For the natural life is the spiritual, seen from another point of view. It is not our senses that deceive us, for they are true and God-given, it is thought that deceives, and no thought is more erroneous than the conclusion that spirituality cannot be intellectually and naturally known. True spirituality is universal; it excludes no faculty in man. Hence we must penetrate the errors and negations which have obscured the spiritual life, and regard it in the pure, clear light of illumined

# The Financial Value of Suggestion

Suggestions are usually statements and it is with the statement as a suggestion that we have to deal in the field of finance. In the discussion of this question, let it first be borne in mind, man has but one initial basis of action—he acts upon what he believes. Whatever incites belief, is a sugges-

Money is the only standard value we have to place upon a human product. It is the only measure of value that has been adopted by the world at large, that can be exchanged between persons who wish to exchange commodities. That part of our political economy which deals with money and cash values is called finance.

The only standard of measurement of the value of human effort is its money value. All who have offered suggestions of value to the world, have put a price upon those suggestions. Those who have received suggestions upon which they have placed value, have been willing to pay the price. suggestion unworthy of price is unworthy the effort of adoption. It is on this principle that man, as an honest being, conscious of his own integrity, will not receive something for nothing. This financial statement is as distinctly recognized as the converse of the proposition, "Thou shalt not have something for nothing." Man places that value upon his products he thinks is in accordance with its relative value in the known medium of human exchange. That which is freely offered, upon which no price is placed by either the receiver or the giver, is not constructed as having value.

All the great professions are constructed on the hypothesis that man will not consider of value that for which he is unwilling to pay a price. Neither should he give that which he considers of value,

without adequate compensation.

What has the lawyer or the divine to offer, in response to what he receives from his client or his listener? The lawyer's success is contingent upon his capacity to offer suggestions which are of value to his client. Otherwise, his clientage would fail. In all professions, money is the only known medium of exchange. Hence, each professional act calls for a financial equivalent.

The school teacher has nothing to offer except

The school teacher has nothing to offer except his suggestion. Some of these suggestions are not considered of value, most are. I believe we should speak of the teacher in the feminine gender, because seventy-five per cent. of the teachers in the public schools are ladies. I think this is due to the fact that the safest instruction, other things being equal, comes from the femi-nine side of the family. No just estimate of the value of a suggestion can be made, for it is impossible to follow its effect in the lives of others. But a monthly income must accrue to the teacher. I can remember suggestions of my teachers which became axioms to me. The teacher's suggestion, when she has the confidence of her pupils, has in it

an element of unceasing and unmeasured value.

The teacher in Bavaria, who suggested to his pupil that "Things that have to be done must be learned by doing them," did not receive in financial returns one millionth part of what that suggestion was worth, because there is not a single line of achievement under our present civilization into which that saying has not been incorporated as an

integral factor.

The author of that suggestion simply reiterated the statement of Jesus Christ, "He that heareth these sayings of Mine, and doeth them." But the nature of Christ's statement had not been correctly interpreted to men. The force of Comonius's statement was not permitted until after he had placed it above the door of the schoolroom, as something to be absorbed into the life of every pupil. Then it became the watchword of all the schools. It may be asked, "Did a money value inhere in Comonious's words?" Certainly, It taught the money value of effort. The man

who adopts this suggestion can have dominion in his own realm.

American journalism records a suggestion which had in it a money value to the world. In a which had in it a money value to the world. It a very brief time it gave its author recognition as the greatest operator of his time, and fixed his reputation for all time to come as America's greatest electrician. Edison said, "I do not believe that such a thing as an impossibility in electrical inventions exists." His financial remuneration came many years later, and he is to-day receiving pay from the accumulated momentum of that thought. There is a sense, however, in which such

The suggestion has values beyond human conception.

The suggestion, "Go West, young man, and grow up with the country," was worth more in the development of the brawn and sinew of the young men of our country, infinitely more, than the most sanguine dream of its author could have fore-shadowed. The constant application of hordes of young men for employment at the Tribune office may have called forth the command, but Horace Greeley stated a truth. When his reputation became national, he journeyed to the West and there noted, in its marvelous prosperity, the value of this utterance to the young men who had de-

veloped the Western area.

The world has always placed high value upon high suggestion. The man who, without personal investment, has scarcely tried to identify himself with some wonderful achievement, never gets any-thing of value. He is in the attitude of the thief, who never has a clear conscience after he has stolen his goods and failed to escape

The man who takes that which is of value and re-turns no equivalent, knows there is no manhood in the act. This is the principle I am trying to enun-

There are many things which we owe to humanity One is, the honest expression of a truth, as soon as that truth is discovered, because when we find truth, it is not ours. It belongs to the eternal years. Truth must ever constitute some basic principle in the educational, scientific or religious domain of effort.

It is important to discriminate between sugges tions which have no moneyed value and those for which the world is ready to pay a price. Sugges-tions given from the actual experiences of man, or from the realm of his absolute consciousness always command the highest price. A suggestion offered by a man who is learning a subject, until he has acquired mastery of the same, is not a marketable commodity. It is an incomplete thing. It does not cover the whole range of the subject, hence it is an unfinished offering.

If a man wished a decision in law, which had in it

the quality of life or death, he would not employ the

law student to render the decision.

The theological student, who is endeavoring to analyze some momentous question which carries with it the repose of his own soul, would not appeal to a young theologue for an interpretation.

The following serves to illustrate my theme: Two gentlemen were traveling in the same train. One gentleman decided he knew the other, hence approached him and said, "Sir, I have met you somewhere, have I not?" The other gentleman answered, "No, I think not."

I think I met you in Atlanta; your face looks

"Why do you want to pay me for it then?"

This indicates the value which may be placed upon suggestions of a given character. The men of all professions are to-day giving suggestions which are of money value to the receiver.

Henry Ward Beecher at one time was preaching in a given church on a salary of \$200 per year. Going to a neighboring city on business, he was invited to preach in a church of the city, after which the membership decided they were willing to pay \$200 a sermon. I do not intend to convey the impression that a financial estimate can be placed on Christian work, but Henry Ward Beecher accepted the proposition and exchanged a \$200 for a \$10,000 the proposition and exchanged a \$200 for a \$10,000

salary.

Sam Jones said he had often been approached by his critics and told that the price he put upon his sermons was exorbitant; far beyond the sums received by other preachers. He replied, "I will admit I have heard sermons some of you have preached which if you had received ten cents for them, you would have been better paid then I when I would have been better paid than I, when I was getwould have been better part that I, when I was get-ting \$500 an hour, because what I had to offer them was worth the money." Sam Jones was justified in his retort. There were many churches eager to se-cure his services at that rate. It will be seen, therefore, that a suggestion of intrinsic value always has a money value.

The preacher receives money for his services and he is justified. It is one of the aphorisms of Chris-tianity that he is worse than an infidel who does not

tianity that he is worse than an infidel who does not provide for the mental as well as the spiritual wants of his family. A free Dispensary is never an attraction to the self-reliant man.

Daniel Webster's opinion was rated higher than any other lawyer of his day. Webster placed a specific value upon the opinions he rendered, and often his clients would receive a thousand per cent. on the information furnished. His suggestions had

on the information furnished. His suggestions had a value beyond price.

I knew a gentleman who went to an attorney and stated an important case. He asked, "What shall I do?" The attorney gave him the requisite counsel, as the client supposed. The advice of the attorney was followed. The case was lost. Hereturned to the attorney and said, "I lost that case."

"What case?"

What case "The case which I presented to you on October —, on which you counseled me."

"I don't remember it. What did you pay me for

the counsel?"
"Nothing, sir."

"Nothing, sir."

"Now I understand why you did not win your case. You placed no value on my advice because you had paid nothing for it. I placed no value on it for the same reason. Hence, I did not expect you to act on the advice given. I am here for what I know and I do not give counsel for nothing."



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
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### Procrastination

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
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### Passes Away in His One Hundred and Twenty-first Year

Among the oldest centenarians now living in England are Charles Green, of Brighton, 108; Kate Livingstone, of Fishnish, Isle of Mull, 107; James Macnalty, of London, 106; Mrs. Rebecca Birks, of Doncaster, 103; Mrs. Bembridge, of Lidmouth, 102, and Mrs. Caroline Neale, of Runwell, Essex, 102.



HE only reliable guide is principle, truth, God. Until one finds God, comprehends principle or realizes truth he is tossed about in a sea of doubt and confusion.

The Universe seems a chaos, the dominant note of which is chance or luck.

Principle must be formulated and accepted intellectually before one may comprehend it.

Man is a unit, each plane of whose life is essential equally. The concurrent conscious development of each plane is essential to a symmetrical character.

Man is spiritual, mental (or intellectual) and physical. One's comprehension of principle, his realization of truth or his finding of God demands the constant co-operation of the physical, intellectual and spiritual natures, for normal consciousness is incomplete in the degree that this co-operation is incomplete in the degree that this co-operation is

Principles, however, may be formulated simply and truth may be stated in terms readily comprehended. A perception of truth does not demand a great intellectual strain. That one knows what the words signify, and that they are logical and are consistent with the measure of one's understanding is enforced.

consistent with the measure of one's understanding, is sufficient.

In the Science of Numbers the solution of problems is dependent upon one's perception of principles. It is so in the Science of Life. The problems of life are involved in one's daily experiences, and these may be solved only through one's perception and comprehension of the principles of life. Exactly as the solution of mathematical problems leads to one's realization of the truth of the principles involved, so the solution of life's problems leads to one's realization of the truths of being.

leads to one's realization of the truths of being.
Experience, perception and realization are representative of the physical, intellectual and spiritual planes of being. One's perception of principle is tested and converted into realization through

ciple is tested and converted into realization through the avenue of experience. What one believes to be true he acquires knowledge of and faith in, through the test of experience. That which is absorbed first by the intellect afterward is assimilated by the understanding through the activities of life.

The physical, intellectual and spiritual are inseparable, and each is essential equally. In order to assimilate a truth completely one must make it his own on all three planes. This demands physical manifestation and intellectual expression, as well as spiritual realization. Most truths are capable of presentation in a manner acceptable to the average intellect.

average intellect.

Intellectual perception alone is insufficient. In addition, one must test truth in the laboratory of physical activity. The physical and intellectual are the soul's instrumentalities whereby it arrives at a greater realization of the truths of being.

greater realization of the truths of being.

One who is developed normally tests each truth equally on every plane. One whose consciousness is concentrated abnormally on any one plane to the prejudice of the others demands abnormal tests on the plane of his special devotion. The distinctly intellectual person, for example, would reject as insufficient the presentation of a truth that might be quite acceptable to one whose intellectual faculties were developed but slightly.

Although experience is indispensable to realization, there is no exact relation or proportion between the two. One may realize little or much from a given amount of experience. But while the time expended varies with each individual, the process is the same for all. Life is a unit, and all of its manifestations are governed by the same principles. The realization gained from any specific experience may be imperceptible, but there is a gain, and it finds its appropriate place and relation in the great mosaic of life. Whatever exists is necessary and has a purpose.

essary and has a purpose.

The perceptions, experiences and realizations of each individual, at any given time, differ from each other as well as from those of all other individuals. One's perceptions are always convertible into realization through experience, and any experience may lead to realization through one's perception of the

truths involved in them.

The combination of perception and experience

The combination of perception and experience produces exactly the amount of realization that one is prepared for. Emerson says: "God shields us evermore from premature ideas. Our ideas are holden that we cannot see things that stare us in the face until the hour arrives when the mind is ripened. Then we behold them, and the time when we saw them not is like a dream."

While it is true that growth is slow, and one's perception of truth is quick, there are grades or degrees of perception. There is a process of development, both of perception and of realization, although one's consciousness of either comes in an instant. It is true that the view from the mountain top bursts suddenly upon one, but only after he has climbed laboriously up every elevation of the mountain side.

Life develops along the lines of a spiral. Again and again does the soul pass through similar experiences, but never through identical ones. At each new turn of the spiral one is able to extract a deeper realization from his combination of perception and experience. And, as life's spiral is eternal, one's realization is limitless.

Experience without perception has no immediate value, nor has perception without experience. But in conjunction both are invaluable equally as the preliminaries of realization. Perception and experience are necessary ingredients, and in the absence of either there could be no finished product of realization.

of realization.

of realization.

A perception of the truth that "God is Love" is attained readily. But what this perception, or the realization resulting from it, means to any individual depends upon his stock of perceptions, experiences and realizations. His perception of this truth, at any given time, will not be his only and final one, for it will deepen and broaden as he traverses life's spiral. He tests it actively through experience, and passively through silence and meditation. It penetrates and illumines every previous perception and realization, and thus modifies or changes them. changes them.

As the new perception is tested actively and passively, it is appropriated and assimilated by the whole being, and the soul becomes conscious of more light and more life. The words or symbols cease to be of importance, for their underlying realities have been reached and appropriated.

Living the life is the essential of realization. One must act as well as think. Passivity is important,

must act as well as think. Passivity is important, but it is no more all-important than is activity. Life's equilibrium requires that activity and passivity balance and offset each other.

One lives the life when he acts on his higher perceptions of truth, when he exemplifies them in his daily life, when he manifests his faith in principle. His being expands as he liberates the best he has, and surgeously others with the atmosphere of his and surrounds others with the atmosphere of his higher perceptions. This living and testing, this manifesting and acting, are the expression parts of one's experiences, and they are inseparable from realization.

One's perceptions are his ideals, and one never lives up to his ideals. One's horizon is always at a distance. But one always thinks and acts in accord with his realizations, for these are so identified with him that they possess him even more than he possesses them. One manifests his realizations. tions always, for he cannot be other than what

The difference between individual methods is denoted by the extent to which each approximates his ideals or higher perceptions in daily life. It is in the degree that one is faithful to the truths of his higher perceptions that he lives a life of principle, and more and more converts perceptions into realizations.

A life of principle does not lack in expressions of love, sympathy or emotion. Quite the contrary. A life of principle is the very embodiment of love and sympathy above all else. It is also deeply emotional, but the emotions are controlled, and are not permitted to counteract one's exercise of love and justice.

love and justice.

It is very easy to be swayed by one's emotions or to put aside reason and discretion. But this is not evidence of love, nor does it manifest a life of principle. On the contrary, one who pursues such course prefers luck and chance to law and order.

The Universe is governed by law, and is exact and invariable in all its activities. Mathematical accuracy does not preclude love on the contraction.

and invariable in all its activities. Mathematical accuracy does not preclude love; on the contrary, it is love's highest expression. It is the guarantee of justice, without which there can be no love. There is neither coldness nor lack of love in infinite justice. And the more nearly just one is the more nearly Godlike is he.

A normal life involves the perception and realization of the conception of unity. The normal soul is living these, both in expression and manifestation. It has converted sense impressions and intellectual perceptions into spiritual realizations. Impression and expression co-operate, and the inner and outer work in conscious harmony. With this realization of unity the soul expresses mental peace and manifests physical health.

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
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
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# One Cause of Poverty
