

Dear Sir: To-day I received the April number of my leved Magazine, and in this I respond to your request for personal experiences.

Some years ago I learned the law of directing the subtle forces which control environment by a definite and attainable mental attitude. We had never been prosperous since our marriage, and at that time my husband and I were carrying on a small and unremunerative photograph and engraving business, which was not paying necessary expenses. I therefore determined to put to practical use my newly acquired knowledge by trusting for ample supply. In less than a month money began to flow in more freely, but long accumulated debts would occasionally arise, as threatening ghosts of past misfortunes, to face me.

Each time this occurred I settled myself still more firmly in my mental attitude of Trust and worked on. In time the ghosts vanished, and so did the debts.

Prosperity increased rapidly for a year or two. Then came the summer of 1903, when the whole country was swept by a financial fear and consequent stringency. I have to acknowledge that when its effects were only too apparent upon our affairs my courage and faith went down with the sweeting current, and once more we faced a steadily diminishing business.

In spite of having so plainly proved the Law of Success, the long years of poverty combined with the present exigency made vain for several menths my efforts to recover a proper mental attitude. But finally,

almost overwhelmed by a constant decrease in income and increase of my old enemy, debt, I compelled my self to

trust.

At once all fear left me, and though a long, hard year went by without apparent result, except greater poverty and more debts, I never once faltered.

Then came a day I can never forget. We had reached a point where, for days, not a customer had entered our door, and we had not a stroke of work to do in the gallery. My husband having hired a horse and cart had gone into the country to photograph some farm horses, hoping in that way to make a few dollars, woile I was in my little sitting-room adjeining the studio— edway. But what of that? I was perfectly happy, and my heart kept singing a little song. "The earth is full of the goodness of the Lord," and I knew I had all the money I wanted, and that it mattered not where it was kept for me.

Then I heard the gallery door open. Fateful opening! A gentleman entered who had come to offer my husband a situation as photographer and engraver in an institution only twenty-five miles away, at a salary of more than a thousand dollars a year. This man was a stranger. The institution he represented we knew nothing about except its more existence. We had no knowledge of its having any department of photography and engraving, nor had my husband ever contemplated seeking any such situation. Yet it was brought to our very door, and to us seemed wealth indeed.

In ten days it was all settled, and my husband was in full charge. Was it not wonderful? Had it mattered that I could not see where God had banked my money? Nor was this illustrated in the hadron of the surely I could not now dore to fail.

I hired a young woman to keep my house and do my printing, and I set earnestly and most trustfully about my business. People began to come for pictures. I welcomed each one with a warm heart and a specific personal interest. I never did better work.

How my human did not now done to fail that way nearly two years, and the last that I doubted the profits of any previous year, often making until midmidth to keep up wath my orders.

INFERIORITY OF WOMAN IS ONLY IMAGINARY

By PROF. J. MOVICOW, the Eminent Russian Sociologist

ROM time immemorial woman has been robbed of a great part of her happiness on account of naving always been considered inferior to man intellectually as well as physically.

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If it could be proven that this inferiority was not real, she would at once step forward as the equal of man, and we would in the future know her as an entirely different being.

It seems to me extremely important to examine very carefully whether woman is really inferior to

No scientist, no sensible person, has ever tried to prove that the tigress were less intelligent than the tiger, or, in fact, that any female animal were inferior to its male partner.

What right have we men, then, to make this statement in regard to woman, when her sex has produced women as prominent as Hypatia, as Clemence Royer or as Sophie Kovalevsky?

In the whole animal kingdom the difference between the male and female is almost imperceptible, even physically. And among our nearest ancestors, the authropopitheci and the anthropomorphe simians, only a very close examination shows any physical difference.

Why should, then, any material difference in brain and intelligence have developed in the human species during the comparatively short space of time that separates us from our anthropomorphe ancestors?

In fact, evolution proves that this proposition is a pure contradiction.

In prehistoric man, as well as among modern sayages, there was absolutely no intellectual difference between man and woman. The differences between the sexes is not psychological or physiological, but merely social.

Letourneau makes this very clear where he says: "Already in antiquity there was an effort to divide the necessary work between man and woman. The man would hunt and go to war, while the woman was left in charge of the home and the children; but the primitive woman was by no means less hardy and strong than her husband, whom she very often helped in his fight against human and animal ri-

It is a biological law that exercise will developyes, even create—an organ, while lack of practice will make an already existing organ deteriorate and dwindle down, and the work that has been given to woman for ages has made her physically weaker, but at the same time more graceful.

But, as I have said before, woman's inferior position is not a result of her lack of muscular strength; it arises from the very start from social

For centuries hunting and carrying on war were the most important part of man's occupation, and, as woman had become excluded from these, she appeared of less value to man, who did not see in her work anything to dignify her position. Even a man, who reasoned as clearly as Aristoteles, makes the statement that woman is far inferior to man

for this very reason. Let us look a little closer at the problem to see if there is any foundation to make the general state-

ment that woman is physically weaker.

If we do so we shall find that this statement is entirely conventional. Even in our own modern times there are women who are exceedingly well developed, physically, while we find an ever increasing number of men that are mere weaklings, and if we go to statistics we shall very often find that woman's

endurance is superior to man's. Right here in Russia you may find hundreds of thousands of women employed by factories, who are working daily eleven hours in the factory and four or five hours at home at domestic work, a strain that would break down most men in very short time.

Women who are able to live under these circumstances should not come under the classification of the "weaker sex.

It is also claimed that, besides being physically stronger, man also possesses more physical courage than woman. But this remains to be proven.

Anyone can name examples of women who have shown themselves as brave as men, even in war, How many men have been able to face death with as much courage and heroism as Charlotte Corday?

And during the Boer War have we not heard of hundreds of heroic women joining their husbands and fighting by their side in the long, hopeless fight against the hated foe, and fighting with a courage that would put many of us men to shame?

Physical courage is absolutely a matter of indi-

viduality, not of sex You hear so often that man is superior to woman intellectually that it is impressed upon you almost

as if it were a fact, and yet it is absolutely without any scientific foundation. Psychology is still in its swaddling clothes, and is, so far, almost altogether a result of internal in-trospection, and though this method is very useful, it cannot be denied that it is purely subjective.

If a woman should stand up and state that after having studied herself very carefully she had arrived at the conclusion that she was intellectually far superior to any man that ever lived, how would you prove to her that she was wrong?

Not by the introspective method, as it was this that led up to her conclusion; and as long as objective experimental psychology has not reached a higher degree of perfection than now, you could

prove nothing by that.

Many reason this way, that as intelligence is dependent on the weight of the brain, and as the brain of the average woman weighs less than that of man, she must be less intelligent; but it is by no means proven that a heavier brain is a sign of a higher degree of intelligence, and, besides, c mparing the weights of body and brain, the average woman's body is much lighter than the average man's, more than enough to offset the difference in weight of brain, and as she, with the smaller body, does not require as many ounces of brain matter to govern her physical life it follows that she has so many more cells for mental work.

But, it is then said, it is incontestable that woman has not had as important a part as man in bringing about civilization. There has never been any feminine Aristoteles, Descartes or Newton.

This is true enough, but we men have for centuries kept woman away from all mental work and in every possible way delayed her intellectual development, and until we have seen the results attained by women whose intelligence has not been stunted by unreasonable restraint we have no right to say that it is impossible for woman to reach as

Descartes and Newton were the products of two factors-their individual capacities and certain

social circumstances that favored these capacities.
Suppose that they had been shipwrecked as babies and raised among barbarians, speaking no civilized language, it is safe to say that none of them would ever have distinguished himself, and still his brain would have been as highly developed, it would have contained exactly the same number of cells. This also applies to woman. So, while we have never heard of any feminine thinker as prominent as those named, we must remember that woman has always been badly handicapped, and women in possession of as highly developed brains may have lived and died unknown and unheard of because of lack of opportunity to show any results of their thoughts.

The fact is, that where the opportunity has been given to woman, as for instance in America, she has proved herself the equal of man in every respect, and I am perfectly sure that a century or two from now, when man has reached a little nearer to civilization, the idea that woman is inferior to man in any respect will appear as wrong as the custom of Indian tribes to leave all the heavy work to their squaws

appears to us to-day.

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

It was many weeks before a letter was received from her by the teacher, saying the Light had come to her soul and she now understood the meaning of the words, "There is no death."

I once heard Moody speak in the Auditorium, Chicago. He said the same, but used different words. He said, "There is no death" (Psalm xxiii, 4). "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death." He brought out the idea very clearly that we did not walk through death even, but only through the SHADOW of death.

Emerson seems to make it very clear and plain in a few words. "There is no death," he says; "what seems so is transition."

Sun Bath

THE sun bath is a great help; "stimulating to the cells of the tissues, also acting upon the nervous system in a most powerful manner."

"Sunlight is one of the most powerful of all hygienic and curative agents. As a hygienic measure it is of great value in the destruction of dangerous microbes, the most of which are unable to resist the action of the direct rays of the sun for more than a few minutes. Sunlight is thus the most important of all disinfecting and sterilizing agencies. The value of sunlight in the maintenance of health is well shown in the dwarfed development of plants deprived of its stimulating influence.

'It has been noticed that in hospitals a larger percentage of recoveries occurred on the sunny side than on the shady side of the ward.

"In taking the sun bath, either the whole or a part of the body may be exposed to the direct influence of the solar rays, or some protection may be afforded by a covering of white cheese-cloth. Always protect the head from the direct rays of the sun. The length of the exposure will depend upon the intensity of the sun's rays.

"If the light is very intense, or the person very feeble, the duration of the bath should not be more than five minutes, if the whole body is exposed. Others, or those accustomed to the sun bath, may take from twenty minutes to half or three-quarters

'A noted French physician once said to some people who had brought their children to him for

treatment:
"Take these children to the country; feed them as well as you can, but above all, roast themroast them in the sun.'

Yet it is by this voluntary servitude that the child learns to spell and to read, to understand sentences, thoughts and Ideas, forgetting in its unfoldment the early steps that seemed so hard, so arbitrary, so meaningless.

So, too, the more mature mind, which is the mirror for reflection between the unseen spirit and matter, between the divine Light and the outer darkness, this mind which is so subtle and moves about without a body, this mind and will must submit, must take on the yoke of the spirit in all seriousness. It must thus learn the law of the Spirit and of Truth and Kindness. It must learn the PRIMACY OF THE SPIRIT OF LOVE.

THERE is one Source of power in the universe and only one. It is that Divine Principle of Being

All the troubles and difficulties which man encounters are due to his getting out of harmony with

the Source of this being.
Worry, anxiety, greed, anger or any intense emotion will serve to destroy the harmony which naturally exists between man and the Divine Prin-

When a little child is growing into manhood or womanhood it is naturally responsive to all the vibrations of the Infinite Principle. But as life becomes more complex, the average individual, unless naturally blessed with a very harmonious organization, begins to resist, oppose, grow strenuous, and thus the delicate poise of the child life is overcome. He then takes on the strained, hurrying, worrying vibrations which are usually manifested in later life. He grows farther and farther away from the Divine Source. He wanders in the mire and jungles of doubt and despair, which he has created by holding on mentally. He is hypnotized by the senses until he loses sight of Principle.

If you are continually thinking about yourself and studying your own sensations you exhaust your power and become unpoised. You shut off your connection with the Source of Being because you become blinded to it by studying your own sensations. To be sell-controlled you must forget yourself largely, i. c., your physical self.

complete rest and entire cessation from all activity. Now, if we add to the Eastern habits of repose, meditation and self-control the idea of positive and eternal activity and growth along lines of harmony and happiness, and hold before us the ideal of ultimately becoming so responsive to the laws of the universe that we shall instinctively and naturally vibrate in harmony with the Great Whole, with every manifestation of Nature, then we shall, it seems to me, have arrived at the golden mean be-tween the two extremes of the Hindu philosophy and Western materialism.

Desire is not to be extinguished, but brought into harmony with Divine Law. It then becomes a mighty power for the accomplishment of all good purposes. We should seek, not for entire separation from the material body, but to so refine and harmonize this body that it will become a perfect instrument for the use of the soul.

"The soul itself is its own witness, the soul itself is its own refuge; offend not thy conscious soul, the supreme internal witness of man." Thus saith the Brahmanical law.

Cures depend entirely upon suggestion. The explanation is simple and scientific. Any man or woman of ordinary intelligence and a common education can understand it. Not only so, but when properly understood and rightly applied in practice, by what we call Specific Suggestion, the management of all diseases heretofore treated by all mental or mind-cure methods is reduced to a positive science, and the results are marvelous. We assume that the law has been discovered by which the mind can be trained to control the bodily functions in health and disease, and that under this law, by suggestion, all diseases are amenable to relief and cure.

By suggestion in the treatment of disease we mean the presentation of thoughts to the mind of the patient in a manner and under conditions that will result in the functional and organic changes necessary to restore conditions of health.

That Christian Science, Divine Science, Mental Science, and other mental cure methods have relieved thousands of people nobody can deny, and we should give them credit for all they have done, and for what they are still doing. Tim teaching in the medical college is most paradoxical and perverse. Disease is treated in its various a peets and details, but hyglene is never touched upon. The idea which seems to prevail among professors and students is that the sick munis to be the prey of the young saw bones, and sick ness is all he studies. Health is no part of his business, and he be not instructed concerning the natural environment, attributes and characteristics of that condition. Discuse fills the doctor's purse, and the longer he can protract a case without being found out the better for him. Search any medical text book on the origin and prevention of Bright's disease, cancer, blindness or consumption, and you will gather very scanty information. Medical science has not fathomed their origin, and that is why it is inadequate in the treatment of these afflictions. Volumes could be filled with quotations from medical writers of the highest standing, all purporting that the nature of disease is quite unknown to the drug dispensers. What, then, does their treatment amount to? It is blind, selfish experimenting on life and health. We use this harsh and strong language in the faint hope of arousing a few of our readers from the indifferent attitude humanity manifests toward the way health is ill-used and destroyed by perpetual drugging. Those who turn a deaf ear to warning and remonstrance will suffer in their own persons, not we in

Examine and think for yourself. That is the only just course in a free country. If one is too lazy to read, too dull to reflect, that is another matter. If the world is progressing, the latest ideas must be the most mature. The medical advocates are averse to innovations because they do not possess new thoughts: they walk in the old ruts of their predecessors. America and the Affirmative Intellect

By Charles Ferguson, in Mind

HE real battles of history—those that have issues—are those waged between the men of affirmative and creative intellect on one side and the men of negative and passive intellect on the other. The creative intellect is that which is dominated by the ideal—never for a moment abundoning the heart's desire and the inner law of humanity. The

beart's desire and the inner law of humanity. The passive intellect is that which is coved by the appearance of things and prostrated to an external law. On both sides there are those called a priorists and those called a posteriorate—on both sides men of letters, men of science, and men of affairs.

On the side of the creative intellect there are creative, and there are men who spend their lives over inference and in inheratories, side by side with the makers of states and armons. And on the ide of the negative intellect may be found the arrange who positions to a book the authority of their own souls, listed in common cause with information who would govern society by the motions of interia and states men who would buy an arrange has and slay a nation for the sake of the eactives of property law.

The "original sin" of the world is, as we have been told, the rejection of the human ideal and the going in search of a non-human law of good and evil. The world's redemption is in the Man who is utterly true to his humanity—in whom it is discovered that the depths of a man are real freedom and creative power. So it may be said of the poet, the artist, the man of science—any one who lives and works on the strength of the creative mind—he is begotten, not made; he is not of the substance of the creation, but of the Creator.

The history of the world is a struggle—on the whole a successful struggle—of the creative intellect against the terror and the discouragement of the external law. It is the progressive endeavor of the human spirit to make itself at home in the universe, and to fashion the stubborn things of Nature according to the uses of the soul.

The central drama of history is Christianity, which is in its broadest aspects simply the attempt to supersede the old world social order, governed by an external authority and the prepossessions of the passive intellect, by a new world-order governed by an internal authority—the faith of the affirmative spirit

The meaning and use of the historic Church are that it has served as a mighty causeway between the old order and the new—between theocracy and democracy. It belongs to both the old and the new. For a thousand years it gestated the soul of the West in the womb of the East. The very nature of the Church, in its medieval constitution, was contradiction; it could not otherwise have done its work. Every dogma of the Church was a proclamation of liberty couched in the language of slaves. Every succament was a pledge of equality, making its difficult appeal in the acceptable symbols of privilege and caste.

The inner logic of the Church's great system of administration was not the permanent separation of the sacred from the secular, but the winning of a new polarity of social organization. The social ideal of the modern world was born out of the bosom of the Church. Americanism is the evolutionary product of historic Catholicism; for the quintessence of the old Catholicism was simply the attempt to establish a great social order, not by external authority and the compromise of interests, as in the "kingdoms of the world," but by the purification and the concurrence of wills.

In the last analysis there are but these two possible forms of social order—there are these two opposite and contradictory conceptions of the sanction of social law. The sanction, the force of the law, is either outside of humanity or it is within humanity. Either it is in the nature of things and the arbitrary will of God, or else it is the will of the people—the heart's desire of humanity.

The idea that the will of the people could be the source of social law was born into the world with great travail. It was for ages difficult, even impossible, to conceive such an idea. The wills of the people seemed so shallow and weak, or else so irrational and contradictory. But real Christianity is the discovery of the judinite depth of the human will. And so for nearly two thousand years it has is en possible to imagine that a multitude of mencontrolling element of a population- might be brought to desire and to will with steady insistence though that are beautiful and just. The Church of the Middle Ages steed as a provisional plan of such a social system. In the midst of a world-order based upon an opposite principle -the principle of the external law—the Church wrought into concrete forms and the solid structure of institutions the democratic ideal. It was a marvelous achievement -this magnificent rough-sketching of a new world in the oppngnant materials of the old.

In the sixteenth century the idea of the social law as proceeding from the sanified and consennation wills of the temple was fairly born into the social world. The Church had breathed out its very outlof liberty in the breath of the modern will And for four hundred years democracy has

wrestled for the spiritual order—for the sovereignty of the human ideal—in the open arena of the secular world. The issue has commonly found a statement in terms of politics and the forms of government, but that is suffered al. The issue reaches to the intimacies of life; it is revolutionary in the spheres of morals, law, art, science, and economics.

Despite the political forms of democracy, more or less esponded by every nation of Europe, the trembling scale has nowhere in the world fairly turned acainst the old regime save in one country—the United States of America. In England the scale balances in an unstable equilibrium, but with a marked tendency toward reaction and a return to the past. In every other country of Europe the social centre of gravity still rests unmistakably in the old order.

Everywhere a State-supported Church stands as the symbol of the unbroken sway of dogma—the preponderance of the passive intellect, the rule of a non-human and external law. America stands alone for a Church-supported State—a faith-supported commonwealth. She has burned her bridges and cannot go back. We have openly discredited here every semblance of external authority, and have removed all the symbols of dogma from the forum of our common life.

If there be only a God of Sinai and no God of the Soul of Man, certainly we are in a way to find it out with cost—for we have rested the stupendous weight of a vast social system upon the chance that a controlling majority, or minority, here will wish for what is fine and will a law that is fair.

The law of America is not static, but vital. It rests upon no tradition, no code, no perfected system; it undertakes to win and dominate the world by the sheer kinetic reasonableness of the creative intellect.

America—standing alone among the nations in the morning of the last cycle of two millenniums girds herself to the fulfilling of the ancient faith.

Home is where the heart is; in the heart are the issues of life; life is divine; the divinest known manifestation of Life is the human; we find this human life beginning in the home. Home, then, is the innermost sanctuary—the holy of holies; and no cathedral dedicatory rites, no array of dignitaries, nor organ pealing, nor voices choiring, nor censers swinging, nor incense burning, nor splendor of robing-none of these ceremonies, however imposing, can invest any place with that sacredness which the birth of just one little child brings to the home: for in the child-soul we have, indeed, the real Presence. Thus the home of little children, whether in mansion or hovel, is alike holy ground, and none require preparation and the consecration of holy rites more than those who here assume control.—Abby Morton Diaz.

It is related of Procrustes, a celebrated highwayman of Attica, that he tied all his victims upon an iron bed, and stretched those of short measure. while those who were too long he cut off. Would that the operations of that iron bed had been confined to Attica! Paul, in his second letter to the Corinthians, speaks of those "who measuring them-selves by themselves and comparing themselves with themselves are without understanding.

As well thrust an active, vigorous animal into a cast-iron mold as once for all to define truth in external formula. In either case life is extinct. A tortoise carries his stiff habitation with him, but as it has been grown from within it is a graceful and perfect fit. Its size corresponds to the proportions of the occupant. If the unseen cages in which men live and carry about with them were once made visible, there would be a marvelous revelation. And it is common not only to insist upon wearing our own cage but we are inclined to urge it upon everyone else. We may safely assume that the iron bed of Procrustes was fitted to himself.

A fresh interpretation of freedom is now possible. Two external forms of slavery which have oppressed humanity in former times are substantially abolished. With rare exceptions, the servitude of the body to an outside master has ceased. Human dictation and persecution to fetter the aspirations of the soul by imposed religious forms through coercive measures has also vanished from the domain of civilization.

Turning from the past to the present, it becomes us to inquire if freedom is yet complete, and if not to find what is lacking. Is there still a disposition, even though not outwardly and forcibly enforced, to cut people off or stretch them to bring them to our own length? It requires but a glance to see that many regard it even in the light of a duty to shape others to their own special and dogmatic proportions. It is far better to hold aloft the truth of spiritual ideals, and it surely will attract men and at the same time measure them. Rather they measure themselves by it, and are conscious of an inner righteous judgment, and this takes the place of the comparative judgment of the self with others. Attempted impositions of measurement are mainly composed of limitations, but to commend general aspiration is always wholesome.

But, on the other hand, strangely enough, many seem to strive to be like everybody but themselves. They carefully avoid any semblance of originality, and only move in the deeply worn ruts of others. Only he who is original can be free. Individual liberty must be based upon higher development. One must make a daily flight among ideals, otherwise he will be in danger of becoming "cabined, cribbed, confined." Conventionality finally solidifies into a veritable prison-house. Who can afford to linger in a cell, self-incarcerated, until he takes on its color and loads himself with its leaden gravity? Those who dare to cultivate mental and spiritual freedom in the light of an elastic optimism ever find larger realization. Hope is a divine human faculty. An intelligent faith brings future good into nearby view and even present possession. But the world usually characterizes the uplookers as visionaries. But where would it be to-day had it not profited through the visionaries of the past? In his beautiful essay upon the education of hope, James Freeman Clarke says of Columbus:

"His expectations were considered extravagant, his schemes futile; the theologians opposed him with texts out of the Bible, and he wasted seven years waiting in vain for encouragement at the Court of Spain. He applied unsuccessfully to the Governments of Venice, Portugal, Genoa, France and England. Practical men said, 'It can't be done,' 'He is a visionary.' Doctors of divinity said, 'He is a heretic; he contradicts the Bible.' Isabella, being a woman, and a woman of sentiment, wished to help him; but her confessor said, 'No.'"
The servitude from which men suffer is within

themselves. Fashion is a social cage, and few dare

to beat against its bars, much less to break them. In many ways it is a tyrant. It often demands a tribute which robs one of health, comfort, usefulness and even life in the vain attempt to do exactly the correct conventional thing. While none of us can be entirely free from this kind of slavery, we may increasingly assert our liberty and strive in some measure to emancipate both ourselves and those around us. It is important to hold up the ideal of freedom, even if the same be not at once fully realized.

Prejudice, in its various degrees of rigidity, is another oppressor, but it is so common that we take some measure of it quite for granted. How little openness to truth and calm judicial temper do we find! How few can see more than one side of a many-sided question! How Truth, instead of being sought as a pearl of great price for its intrinsic beauty and value, is colored and misinterpreted until it becomes deceptive in its conclusional How our sect, our party, our union, our nation are expanded until they cover the whole field of vision! The world appears in fragmentary and shattered proportion. Freedom is found only in the wellrounded truth.

Pessimism is a short iron bed, and one must shrink or cut himself off to lie upon it. The pessimist kicks against the pricks which he sets up around him. He paints his own world black, and then wonders that he sees no light. He thinks God made it that way, and thus cheats himself out of every

good that is rightfully his own.

One may add spikes to his iron bed by coming into servitude to some bad habit, physical appetite or propensity. The spikes are not apparent at first, but they are invisibly forging themselves. What untold thousands of bright young men are gradually enslaving themselves by the cigarette habit! How many persons tardily awaken to the fact that they have slowly but surely bound themselves by the influence of some drug through its insidious temptation! These are but specimens. Servitude subtly presents itself in innumerable forms and each should awaken to his own particular oppressor. Once for all break the bond and the freedom will bring you untold joy. No one can deliver you but yourself. If you reply, "God only is able to break my chain," remember that it is God in you more than outside. He works in you "to will and to do."

The divine strength is only available for you as it flows through you. The infinite life in you is you that is, your deeper and higher self. As it is developed temptation is left stranded, behind and below. It cannot lift itself higher than its own plane. Through the spiritual consciousness you pass up higher. It is when man separates himself from God that he becomes weak. To be strong the soul must live in and from its own divine centre.

To free ourselves from the Procrustean beds of all their forms is the supreme accomplishment. Through the intelligent exercise of the creative power of thought we are to put away weakening beliefs in the power of slaveholders, seen and unseen. We must make beds for ourselves that will expand with our growth and refuse to be bound. Rigidity of every kind prevents the entrance and activity of the Spirit. The province of freedom is where the soul deals with and interprets the Divine Mind. Conventional thought and logic become veritable iron beds unless freed and uplifted by spiritual optimism.

But perhaps the most subtle and unconscious bondage consists in the homage which is centred upon things in the place of God and the inner spiritual life. There is a disposition to blindly adore the Bible, the Sabbath, the sacrament and the creed as though they had a holiness aside from their elevating influence upon man.


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Is the Sphinx Doomed?

THE present is a period of the vanishing monuments which have stood for thousands of years, The other day Venice lost one of her famous relies of past days, and many another building in the lovely Queen City of the Adriatic is threatened with

And now comes the news that an even more famous, an infinitely more venerable monument is likely to disappear. It is said that the Sphinx, which has stood on the banks of the Nile since the shadowy days of the Pharaobs, cannot long withstand the crumbling occasioned by modern conditions in

Since the British have been in control of Egypt they have altogether changed the face of the country. Land that was once desert is now smiling with verdure. Irrigation has reclaimed thousands of acres, and the great dam at Assouan will result in a marvelous increase in the size of the region under

All this has resulted in so modifying the atmosphere of the country that the dry air, which allowed the preservation of the Sphinx, no longer exists. Everyone knows that the preservation of the mono-liths in London and New York, however carefully they be watched, cannot be continued indefinitely, and it is said that the same trouble which caused so much discussion here in regard to Cleopatra's Needle is threatened in the case of the famous figure

that has inspired so many poems and pictures.

The Sphinx was built before the Great Pyramid, somewhere about 4,000 years before Christ. It is a recumbent man-headed lion, 188 feet long, hewn out of a natural eminence in the solid rock, some defects of which are supplied by a partial stone casing. There is a temple in front of it, but all efforts to prevent the sand from settling over the building have

In front of the breast of the Sphinx originally appeared an image of a god, the weather-worn remains of which may still be made out. The head of the Sphinx was a work of art of the highest type known to the Egyptians, and finished with the greatest care. It is now greatly mutilated, but, in spite of all its injuries, its calm, majestic, pensive expression still appeals to the most thoughtless of trav-

Perhaps means may be found to avert the threatened ruin of this noble figure, but the battle between modern conditions and ancient monuments is one that usually results in only one way.-New York

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Nature Study

THE constantly growing interest in nature study is shown in no way better, perhaps, than by the flood of books on mammals, birds, fishes and insects which comes from the presses of the publishers. These books find a warm welcome among adults and children alike, and unquestionably do great good. Yet, after all, while they are awakening an interest in natural history they tell about them only a part of what a child wishes to know. The untechnical personage obtains a very unsatisfactory and often an entirely mistaken idea of the object about which he is reading from the description as it appears in type.

To learn what this description means he must see the object or a representation of it. Pictures, of course, are good, and help very greatly, but they are not to be compared with seeing the actual thing, and in these days the actual thing is usually to be

found in some form or other. The country child, passing much of his time abroad, in fields or woods or on country roads, sees for himself many of the common things of nature and comes to know them. He learns what they look like and what are their ways. He can name the birds, the flowers, the trees and the insects, though the names that he gives them are, perhaps, of his own coining, not those of the books, and not understood by others; but they serve his purpose.

The city child's opportunities are far less. Everything that comes before his eyes is artificial, a part of civilization, something in which nature has no share. Yet, on the other hand, a city child has opportunities which are denied the youth of the country. In most of the cities there are museums that he can visit, where a thousand things are displayed that the country lad never sees; there are zoological parks, where are confined strange beasts from foreign lands, such as perhaps Livingstone or Du Chaillu saw when they traveled through the swamps and jungles of Africa with their friendly negroes.

The country youth, if a book be given him on the birds or the mammals or the insects of his own locality, will speedily teach himself about them more than most scientific men know. The city boy should have a like chance, and it should be a part of the schooling of every class in the schools of our city to have a local museum and zoological garden, and to be told about the things that may there be seen.
Such plans are being adopted in most all of our

cities of any note, and cannot fail to do great good, and it is not to be doubted that this method of teaching the children will spread as soon as its advantages become generally understood.

The pupils of the public schools at Washington visit the Smithsonian Institution, the National Museum and the National Zoological Park, and in these visits learn a thousand things not taught in books that it is yet well to know. In the same way, by the London Board of Education, visits to museums and instruction in outdoor life are reckoned as school attendances, and in many schools are now regulated as a part of the plan of education.

In country districts where collections are inaccessible, school excursions into the fields and woods in charge of competent persons might well take the place of museum visits, and might awaken in many children who have no special leaning toward natural history study a desire to know more of what is going on in this beautiful world about them.

Politeness

POLITENESS and civility cost nothing, but they constitute important links in the bond of association, and their cultivation is a matter of necessity to any and all who would preserve that bond from disunion and disjunction. I am not by any means upholding a false pride, "rotten to the core," which weakens and detracts from individual nobility of action, but I am supporting and asserting with a strong conviction the claims of mutual civility and politeness consolidating and building up character in its highest and truest aspect. The origin of politeness probably arose from the necessity of it, for no man or woman who should be lacking in this respect would be able to be tolerated in any intelligent and respectable society of any community.

Having spoken a word about pride, let me assert honest pride is an incentive to higher effort and a potent factor in character development. It has openness, frankness and candor environing it.

But let us consider how advantageous politeness is, as well as necessary to everyday social intercourse; it equalizes all classes for the time being, and removes every barrier of prejudice or bias, and diffuses the spirit of common brotherhood and reciprocal regard and good feeling toward one another.

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

Professor Dolbear's Prophetic Talk About Universal Energy Within the Ether

What is most needed in the world to-day, says Professor Dolbear, is a supply of available energy. Until within a few years it was not imagined there was any other source of energy than the ones we have used so long. Now we are assured beyond a peradventure that practically the whole of space is loaded with energy. So abundant is it that every cubic inch of it contains an equivalent of not less that 500 horse-power, each cubic foot more than all the full working steam engines in Massachusetts. This energy resides in what we call the ether, and out of it come all the forms of energy we know and employ-gravity, heat, light, electricity, etc. The enormous reaches of telescopic space are filled with ether and its energy in as great a measure as that between the thumb and fingers, and of course is inexhaustible.

For our purposes energy needs to be adapted. We adapt the energy of coal by employing a steam engine; we adapt the energy of the steam engine to electric work by employing a dynamo; we adapt electric energy to lighting purposes by employing a suitable lamp, and so on. Each form of energy requires some mechanism through which it can act and be transformed, and without mechanism and transformation no phenomenon is possible. We need, therefore, some piece of mechanism through which this ether energy may be adapted for our economic wants, transforming it into mechanical energy of the common type, a piece of machinery which shall do for ether energy what the electric motor does for electrical energy, for even electric energy cannot be used directly; it must be transformed.

There is nothing in the nature of things to discourage expectancy of such a machine, and one may look for it any day. Monopolies of heat light, transportation and other human needs will be no longer possible when anyone may tap the universe for energy for his needs. The Wilkesbarre coalbeds will no longer be of importance and Niagara may continue to roar. I submit that such an invention or discovery as this is of greatest importance and is imminent.

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
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


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Get Together


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
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How to Live with God

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

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
