

In the "Royal Academy of Arts," London, there is a statue of a man running; he leans forward, and still forward hangs a stout forelock.

IIe is catalogued "Opportunity."
From an ancient Greek verse I quote:
"Who art thou?"

"I am Opportunity, open to all."
"Why standest thou on tip-toe?"
"I run forever forward."

"Why are all thy locks before?"
"For him who meets me to seize."

What a lesson is here! I said.

How many of us have failed in life, because of not knowing Opportunity? We have met him in most propitious places, looked, doubted, waited, and then he was gone.

Some have run after him, having made up a mind after he had passed. The lock was before, he had gone on and you were too late!

Opportunity runs forward, and never returns. "A stern chase is a long one." Was it first in youth, when hope was young, and you said "there will be plenty

more opportunities?" But years rolled on and he never returned!

Did a fortune await you; and you said, "O time enough, Opportunity will yet give it to me. I will let this chance pass and seize the next."

Was it health that you most needed, without which fortune, friends, earth and heaven are as nothing?

He sought health in other climates and in many old ways because they were old, not because they were based on Truth, on Science or common sense. The Omnium Gatherum of Hazzardini.

PROF. JEAN HAZZARD.

I

Hajile Nazzalı, the Osirian Hierophant once said: "There are three Zones, the External the Internal, the Supernal. The External, is of the Body, the Internal is of the Soul, the Supernal is of the Spirit.

"The Supernal is the perfectly real. The Internal is its creature. The External is a reflection of the creature. The Supernal is Infinite, the Internal is Infinite-Finite, the External is Finite. Sprain, Soul, Sense, these three. The Pneumical, Psychical, the Physical."

II.

How grand and deep were the thoughts of the ancient sages! Says the Bhagavad Gita or the Lord's Lay; "Constancy in the pursuit of spiritual knowledge, meditation as to the end of spiritual knowledge: this is knowledge: the opposite to this is ignorance."

Aristotle:—"Common sense is little better than no sense at all."

Zoroaster:—"He who knows himself, knows all things in himself."

Ligeiah, the Mahatma:—"A thing is to the sense that uses it what to the sense it seems to be; that it is never anything else."

III.

The very best book, for Christian Scientists, is Rev. W. I. Gill's "Philosophical Realism." It is an epoch-making book. Don't be frightened at the first glance into its pages. You will there learn what the EGO is. You will discover what a magnificent creature you are. You will, also, discover, that as magnificent as you may be, you are yet a creature—the "creature of God."

IV.

If you wish to see where Mrs. Eddy's philosophy really originated, you must read the Bhagavad Gita. Get Molini Chatterji's translations. I have always contended that Mrs. Eddy was a pure Oriental, even if she was born among the New Hampshire hills. Chatterji's notes are "Science and Health," translated into Hindustani. Who knows but that Mrs. Eddy, like Madame Blavatsky, is the mouthpiece of a Mahatma.

V

If Gill is right, each one of us is absolutely alone. "The lone soul with the lone God." Each one has a universe all to himself. You, already "own the earth." And no one can come into your universe. This doctrine makes us very wealthy. Each one owns all there is. And yet no one is robbed. An infinity of Egos, each with a cosmos, all his own. I like books that make me feel big. I hate books that make me feel mean. Gill's book is extraordinarily expansive and expanse-compelling.

Read Gill first and then the Bhagavad Gita. There you learn that grand as you are and much as you own, still all conditioned existence is illusion, that is, as compared with the Supreme Spirit. The Ego is not conditioned, but is the Supreme Spirit, that is, the Ego is identical with the Supreme Spirit. But Gill would say that the Ego was created by the Supreme Spirit. CREATION and EMANATION! These are the representative words of Occidental and Oriental Thought, respectively. Suppose that Occult Christian Science should prove them both true. Two ends of the same stick. Two sides of the same thing. A "double-faced unity."

VII.

What is the primary claim of Mental Healing? This it is. That diseases of the body can be cured by the mind as an agency. What disease is, what is the nature of the mind, the rank and worth of the body, these are all secondary considerations. Whoever believes that bodily sickness can be remedied by mental action, is theoretically, at least, a Mind-Healer.

VIII.

But some fidgety devotee will at once shrick. "It is not the Mind that cures, but divine truth." The divine truth only comes through the mind. The mind itself is built of divine truth. It, at least, is a reflection of divine truth. There is such

a thing as a distinction without a difference.

IX.

There are some others distressed with spiritual fidgets who declaim against the "Will." No "will power" say they. Would these persons kindly inform us how a mind can exist without a will. If the human mind is a reflection of the divine, then the human will must be a reflection of the Divine Will. A little careful study of ordinary Mental philosophy would enormously help some people.

X

I think that jealousy is the meanest emotion of the carnal mind. It is altogether too prevalent among Mental Healers. It has caused a great amount of detraction, disparagement of others, mean insinuations and in too many instances blossomed into open and wanton lying. And not only by words direct, but by looks, conduct, etc. And often from persons whose lips drool with professions of love and good will. Many such an one, that I know of does no business now, for the excellent reason that they have no business to do. All like them will soon follow. Let the true and faithful servant of the Lord Jesus Christ rest his soul.

XI.

I believe Christian Science to be the most wonderful thing that has ever come upon this planet. It is full of new ideas, it works by new methods, it has new purposes and new ideals. It will survive all the ignorance, all the selfishness, all the stupidity that has crowded into it.

XII.

While I deprecate slander, personal detraction and professional envy, yet honest criticism of views and doctrines must be encouraged. A good many unfortunates seem to believe that every word spoken by their teacher must be accepted without question. Is this the "liberty of the sons of God?" Who cares what Eddy or Evans, Swarts or Hazzard may say, except that

they speak the truth. And then all the glory be to the truth. Let us abandon this silly and degrading glorification of persons. I do not believe anything the Lord Jesus Christ said, simply because He said it. I believe in Him because I have found that He always spoke the truth. It was the Truth that made Him and not He the Truth.

XIII.

What a distressing thing "dignity" is. The lofty owlish pomposity which characterizes some people. They know it all. Wisdom will die with them. Often they sit, in solemn meditation and they cogitate and excogitate. Their cogitations and excogitations are doubtless to the effect that the universe would be much better if they had been consulted when the foundations of the earth were laid. Christian Science when realized, makes people modest, and simple, and unpretentious. the true Christian Scientist is not a Chadband. He doesn't talk of "Te-ruth" and then roll his eyes into his head. He doesn't have a spasm when somebody utters the word "Spirit." He isn't a "seagreen individual in spectacles," like Carlyle's Robespierre, "to chop fruitless shrill logic and ineffectually wrestle and wriggle and on the whole to love, or to know, or to be (properly speaking) nothing." Christian Science is full of inextinguishable fun and boisterous joyousness and is destined to thoroughly exterminate all the "old fogies," all the dignified blockheads, all the sour "old maids," of both sexes, in fact, everything that is "poky." It will make folks wholesome and happy, full of "sweetness and light," while the rancorous, high-stepping, fanatical, Pharisaical, "angelic" humbugs will have to step down and out. On that joyful occasion, we will all shout Hurrah! and Hallelujah! New York City.

SECOND ARTICLE.

"No, sir. On the contrary, we have found that, as a rule, it is No pay, no cure.

"That which costs nothing is nothing valued, is a truism which is especially true in our system. We do not claim the per-'Our sufficiency is sonal power to heal. of God,' says Paul. We do not, therefore, charge for a cure, but as the laborer is worthy of his hire we charge for our time, which is just. A disposition to be fair and just is necessary upon the part of the patient. A desire to have the service of another without a consideration is evidence not only of the want of that disposition, but also of a love for and a trust in riches. 'How hardly shall they that trust in riches enter the Kingdom,' saith Christ.

"We have failures, but they are usually no doubt the result of antagonism or the want of hearty cooperation upon the part of the patient or those surrounding him.

"Even Christ could not do many mighty works in a certain place because of the unbelief. If unbelief in your case should prove a barrier the prospect is certainly not very eucouraging."

"Yes, but if he would just cure that boy we would all believe then, and he would get more than a hundred patients right off, in our town, 'cause everybody knows about it, and we are, if I do say it myself, among the best people in town. The young man's father is the postmaster, and you know a man has to amount to something to hold that office. Then, everybody goes to the postoffice, you know, and it would just be the biggest advertisement he could get, because the old man would be that glad he would just tell everybody. He could well afford to cure that boy for nothing, for he'd get more business than he could do."

"Then it looks a little as if you would

like to even have the cure for no pay, or only such as the old man could render in the way of telling everybody, etc.?"

"Well, wouldn't that be enough?"

"We find that those who love money so well as to insist upon a contract of 'No cure, no pay' usually begin early to plan for the unexpected contingency of a cure, and I see you are no exception to the rule. And, now sir, I shall have to ask you to excuse me, as I am very busy. Here are the names of a few of the many in this town who have been healed, and who would gladly testify to the power of Truth to deliver."

"Well, but will you tell the Doctor to run down and see him?"

"I will; but he will probably want to know something about who is to bear the expense, which you are aware is considerable, to say nothing of his time, which is pretty much all taken up with those who gladly remunerate him."

"Well, you just tell him to come down and see, and we'll make it all right. We can get him lots of patients, and money is no object if he can only cure him."

"Shall I tell him that he will be paid for time and expense?"

"Well, if he won't come no other way, I guess we'll have to stand it."

"I will make known your wishes. Good morning, sir."

"Good morning."

The young man called upon the parties whose names had been given him, saw the crutches standing idle in the corner whose owners were still walking and leap; ing and praising God. It was a dark and stormy night, the depot was a mile from the town and was closed. As the signal lights in the rear of the train disappeared, he found himself alone, in the midst of rain, mud, and "darkness visible," with nothing whatever to indicate the direction of the town-not even a walk. (This latter incident is literally true.) Fortunately a freight brakeman appeared with his lantern and piloted him to the beginning of the board walk; After having stumbled many times over loose boards and rough places, the town was reached, but silence and darkness reigned supreme. The driving rain was fast penetrating his clothing, causing an occasional chill to steal over him, and making it necessary for the physician to heal himself. Not a light or a sign could be seen. Finally a faint glimmer was seen in the distance, which proved to be rate hotel. But all was quiet within.

After numerous raps, the landlord appeared en deshabille, and gazed in wonder upon the luckless stranger, who was "taken in."

The "Doctor" rose early in the morning, breakfasted, and began to make some inquiries about the location of the prospective patient.

He soon found that there were several theories as to the nature and cause of his trouble, the most commonly accepted of which was by no means complimentary to the patient, especially in view of the claim of belonging to the best society, etc.

In due time the call was made. The patient was found in great agony. Several hours were spent with him, during which time he seemed to rest much easier.

When the time came to leave for the train the mother claimed she had been to the post office for the money, but her hus-

An instance is on record, in point, of the notorious International Workingman's Association, which, started for the best of objects, became such an engine of terror and blood that the name by which it was finally known-Tue INTERNATIONAL—became a synonym for bloodshed, anarchy and robbery throughout Europe. We believe Christian Science in its interior and more recondite principle, has plenty of safeguards, but the difficulty in this respect, is that so many Scientists are so superficial and contented with a mere surface knowledge. The thoroughness in metaphysical analysis, a wide acquaintance with philosophical writers, a comprehension of scientific symbolism is so lacking that a knowledge of the scientific foundations of organization can hardly be expected. But time will bring us better things. It is curious that early Christianity furnishes a model organization in the Secret Order at Rome when the celebrated "Disciplina Arcani" was practiced. This Order had three degrees -the Catechumens, the Competentes, and The sacred the Illuminati or Myster. ceremonies were vory solemn and impressive and the mysterious truths of Christian Science were set forth by a symbolism as awe-inspiring as it was beautiful. Some of our Boston friends have inaugurated a restoration of these grand rites, and in New York City considerable progress has been made in their exemplification. We trust this good work will go on till we have a Christian Science that is really Christian and really Scientific.

God and Man:

SCIENCE OF PERSONALITY.

ADASHA.

We live in a scientific age. So great is the demand for scientific explanations of the phenomenon and forces of life, that many absurd and untenable theories are put forward and urged with great boldness and force to explain them, and to overthrow the idea of a personal God. This has the effect of producing a great wave denying the recognized truth of ages. But this denial only precedes a rational and scientific explanation of the nature and character of God. Happy will he be who recognizes the full force of the facts here presented. In a previous paper I gave historical facts which no one can ignore.

* * * * * * *

"Man is a microcosm," says science. That is, within him reside all the forces of the universe. He is related to every part of it. But he is not, therefore, as large, nor as widely extended. A great man is one in whom these powers and forces have found unusual development and expression. He is not necessarily large, as to the limits of his person, our daily observation teaches us this fact.

In God resides the absolutely perfect embodiment, expression and power of control of all existing forces. Here is the Perfect Mind, the Perfect Vision, the Perfect Love, the Perfect Expression of every faculty. But this does not make Him of immense size, nor a diffused essence. He is not larger than a large symetrically developed man. But he has a perfect form, which no man has. He is not personally present everywhere, and at every instant. He visits only occasionally in His person any planet or individual. When I speak of God as "He," I use the masculine term

in the same way that we use the word "man," which latter term represents both sexes of the human kind.

Man has a latent power of spiritual sight or vision. In many cases this is already partially developed, so that occurrences and scenes at great distances may be perceived by the spiritual vision of man. In God this power is perfect. He observes what is taking place on this planet, and everywhere in the universe, through this power of perfect spirit vision. "From the place of his habitation he looketh upon all the inhabitants of the earth." (Psa. xxxiii, 14.)

Science tells us that the brain is full of little cells. These are little eyes. They are the avenues through which the brain and spirit perceive. In the uncultivated brain these are not sensitive to the finer impressions. As with the body, so with the brain; when the grosser materials are eliminated, it becomes more refined, making the little eyes clearer, and all the avenues become sources for receiving and transmitting the most delicate impressions.

Recent scientific discoveries, by high authority, have given us some new facts of vast interest and importance, which throw a new light upon the subject of the nature of Yehovah and man. These also explain facts of history and of language. The character of Yehovah is expressed in His name. This name has always been regarded by the Jews as having a secret significance. Its number is twenty-six. In the Hebrew language in which it is written, each letter has a number which indicates its meaning, yet no Rabbi or other teacher has ever been able until now to discover its meaning; but have regarded it as the "mystery of God," which should be revealed in the age of the Divine kingdom.

John, the Revelator, speaking of the same period, says "The mystery of God is finished." This prophecy finds its fulfilment in the discoveries here given and in the further discoveries I refer to. In the meaning of this name and number is the sum of all truth which relates to man. They reveal the masculine and feminine attributes of man and Yehovah!

The human brain, which is an image of the Divine brain in its structure as well as its attributes—for there can be no attributes without structure or organization—contains twelve groups of faculties, each dual in its nature, making twenty-four. A certain combination of faculties distinguishes each individual. The names of these twelve groups of faculties are: Culture, Religion, Rulership, Science, Marriage, Labor, Letters, Familism, Wealth, Art, Home and Commerce. Each of these subdivides into classes or parts.

I will give a list showing the primary and dual division—the first in each grouping being masculine, and the second feminine. The group of Culture subdivides into Amity and Reform; Religion into Faith and Love; Rulership into Dignity and Laudation; Science into Reason and Inspiration; Marriage into Devotion and Mating; Labor into Justice and Industry; Letters into Memory and Attention; Familism into Parenity and Reverence; Wealth into Defence and Economy; Art into Form and Color; Home into Appetite and Feeling; Commerce into Locomotion and Aversion. A reasonably close examination will show the correctness of the analysis. We readily recognize that in each of these faculties the feminine dominates in woman, and the masculine in man.

The brain also has two centers. The back center governs the sensitive nerves, and is strongest in woman, she being the most sensitive. The front center governs the muscular system and is strongest in man, he being more muscular than woman. These two centres are called by the physiologists the "Throne of the Brain," because all the fibres and faculties center in them.

Common physiology has named the two brain centers, the "Thalamus and the Striatum," which words never meant anything but brain centers. Under these new discoveries, or the higher physiology, these centers are named the Motus and Sensus. The Motus or front center is the "chief focal point through which the organs of the brain send the impulses of motion to the muscles." The Sensus is the chief point receiving the impressions made on the organs of sense.

These twelve dual groups of faculties, and their dominant centers, count twenty-six, the number of the name Yehovah—Note this significant fact! Each brain is dual! that is, it includes both masculine and feminine faculties in its structure, the masculine dominating in man, and the feminine in woman. It is a well known fact in science that all'the creative forces in the universe are masculine and feminine, or positive and negative. This is true in the realms of the mineral, vegetable and animal.

The Hebrew characters or letters which form the word Yehovah, and which are regarded by the Jews as involved in the secret of the name, are two vowels and two consonants, or two letters representing the masculine, and two representing the feminine—the separate duality, or the Mother and Father, the Daughter and Son. The family on Earth is a copy of the family in Heaven! In the Divine Family there is a Daughter as well as a Son. Let woman forevermore lift up her head as a true and lineal Daughter of Yehovah even as man is a Son.

THIRD ARTICLE.

Inadequate Conceptions of Mental and Spiritual Being and Development.

The conception of a vital force as an inner agency in the development of a man's material organism, of some law of combination between spiritual being and that phase of spiritual phenomena known as the physical brain, and of spiritual being itself, is far more difficult for the ordinary human mind to attain than the conception merely of material objects, mechanical combinations, and "dead matter." Few persons really are able to comprehend the nature of the existence of matter; and the Natural Realists and Materialists on the one hand and many prominent so-called "Christian Scientists" on the other, are alike incapable of such comprehension.

The mind should not be deluded by mechanical analogies or material resemblances. The mental and spiritual part of humanity cannot be at all adequately apprehended through any such media. The mind must be studied in the light of its own conscious operations, and the perpetual interactions of the sense and the spirit; and while Spiritual Science thus knows to distinguish things that differ, it must also know to estimate the modifications which these different things make reciprocally upon each other. All material being has a law imposed upon it, while all spiritual being has its law within itself; the former moves wholly within the chain of necessity, the latter has its action in liberty and under inalienable responsibility; and all so-called philosophy or science is false which does not adequately discriminate between them.
