### Thought Transference.

Thought is the cause of all action. Thought and existence are the same. It is the law of our being that our thought about ourselves should find expression in the physical organism. It is also a law of mind that thought may be transferred from one individual to another. This transference of thought from one to another occurs through the medium of the Universal Spirit or Life Principle. This Principle being omnipresent there is no limit to the distance to which a thought may be sent. It is this fact that enables Mental Healers to treat disease absently. But thought does not transfer itself from one to another, except under certain conditions. If a person wishes to transfer a thought to a friend he must have an intense desire and wish that the thought shall reach the friend. It is also desirable that he believe the thought has reached its desired destination. Jesus expressed the necessity for this belief when he said, "What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and yo shall have them." -Mark xi., 24. It is also necessary that there should be some degree of passivity, a willingness to receive, on the part of the one to whom the thought is sent; for we are protected from the evil thought of others by the inability of one man to enter the mentality of another without the other's consent.

Much of the talk about malicious mesmerism is as senseless as was the belief in the "Salem witchcraft." No one can mesmerize you unless you are willing to be mesmerized. We are not placed at the mercy of the evil thought around us, but may repel it by a simple refusal to receive it. But it is otherwise when we think good thoughts that are in harmony with God and his purpose, for then we have the whole power of God on our side, and may

to a certain extent, enter the mentality of another without his knowledge; but even then, if he persistently refuses to receive the good we wish him, we cannot reach him with our thought, unless we are equally persistent in our endeavor to "overcome evil with good." But if we heartily desire, and our friend is receptive, we may transfer our thoughts to any distance. This is so true that even a very sick man may bring health to his distant friend, if his desire to do so is intense and he believes that his friend receives the health that he desires for him. It is this fact that enables healers to bring health to their patients, even though they be not in perfectly sound health themselves. If a healer is able to form the perfect idea of health in his own mind, and intensely desires to transfer that idea to his patient, he can do so, bringing the patient health, without regard to the healer's physical condition. It is an erroneous idea some have, that a healer transfers his physical condition to his patient. He cannot do The physical condition of a healer has nothing whatever to do with mental healing. Although Paul is said to have been a sickly man, he was able to heal the cripple at Lystra-Acts, xiv,. 8. When both healer and patient desire the health of the patient, the healing takes place, with greater or less rapidity according to the circumstances of the case, and in accord with the law of thought transference declared by Jesus, "That if two of you shall agree on earth as touching ANY THING that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven."

### "The Healing of the Nations."

"Physician, thou art unworthy the name, if ignorant of the intimate connection of spirit with the mind, and through this, the body.

"Inspiration is not confined unto a few of God's children, but hath an avenue leading into every spirit on earth, and through the spirit it can affect all the regulations of man. This governing power thou canst never reach without knowledge from above.

"If thou knowest no more than unaided intellect can teach of man, thou canst never appreciate the power of the spirit, of which thy intellectual power is but a result.

"A result cannot understand its cause. This should be thy first great lesson in Physic.

"To understand the causes of disease, it is necessary to understand, first, the cause of the body, and its connection with spirit.

No man, unaided by Inspiration, can see or understand this connection.

"First, and greatest, and most difficult, the spirit must be understood; not only in relation to the body in which it exists, but in its immediate connection with God, its Creator.

"Thou must in humility seek God; for, remember, all the spirits of His children are connected with Him, and for thee to thrust thyself between them rudely, is certainly presuming. Ask of Him help. If thou hast obtained this aid, disease must fly before thee, as chaff before the wind.

"Disease is simply inharmonious action or passion. To remove this, thou must, of necessity, be in harmony with God, and, through Him, with the elements surrounding thee and the sick."

"For perfect health, the spirit must be harmoniously connected with God, and in sweet communion receive nourishing food—sending down through the mind the joys of perfect peace and revealing itself in form of vigorous manhood in the outer body.

"With those enjoying this peace, yet having, in the outer body, an inheritance which obstructs the spiritual power, all disease can be by the inspired physician removed by the simple touch.

"He, with his powerful harmony, removes the disease or obstruction by simply stimulating the spiritual power of the sick.

"Take away the physician's confidence in his drugs, and they are perfectly useless in curing, and worse than useless unto the patient.

"There is but one true system of healing; this is, that in which love obtains passiveness, and through which passiveness, spirit assists spirit to throw off the inharmonious action of the being, either spiritual or physical.

"Sickness of flesh is not the commencement of disease. It is but an effect of transgression, which, of whatever form or character, makes at last its centre, by entering the transgression of God's law, through which pure love floweth unto the spirit.

"Change of disease is no cure, yet many great fames and great names have been builded upon such change. Faith in God would remove disease from the lot of man. He would then see, in the bountcous love of his Father, all that spirit could enjoy, and would nourish his earthly body with the simplest, healthiest food he could find.

"The enjoyments of animal disease would be left behind, and he would only live to enjoy perfect health.

"Physician, do thy duty. The removing of disease can only be accomplished by understanding correctly the cause of all diseases, and this understanding can only be given by thy Creator, in whose very life thou dost exist.

"Thou must show the preventive of disease as he showeth it unto thee, else his showing will certainly cease. He is just, and giveth unto none more than others equally deserving of trust. Thy vision must, by His aid, be so refined as to pierce instantly all flesh.

"Thou must borrow, as it were, his unlimited vision, and as He does, view his children.

"With him, in his unlimited vision, nothing is mysterious, and unto thee, there is more or less mystery, as thou dost approach or recede from IIim.

"The human form should always be open unto thee, and transparent as air.

Mankind generally judge of any great "Truth," or "Cause," which becomes prominent, by the character of its advocates. If its effects are good upon them, then it must be good; if its effects are bad upon those most intimately associated with it, then it must be shunned as if it were a viper.

"A tree is known by its fruit," instead of by the character of those who pluck that fruit. "A fountain also is known by its water," instead of by the fish or reptiles that drink of or dwell in that water. "Men do not gather grapes of thorns, nor figs of thistles." How often scheming individuals have discovered an opportunity to make some money or worldly notoriety out of advocating a great and sacred Truth. They never become true, sincere believers of that Truth, but prey upon the credulity of those who are sincere, and for the secret purpose of making money, while ostensibly they would have everybody believe that they were earnest, sincere and devout lovers of the Truth which they advocate; but, like Judas Iscariot, when the proper time and opportunity presents itself, they will sell their Lord for a few "pieces of silver," or

the gratification of some morbid appetite. Thus the most sacred truths have suffered shipwreck after shipwreck, until Absolute Truth, and Absolute Good, are generally thought to be impossible to be found in this world. People will admit relative truth, and relative good, and that you caunot estimate the value of truth until you have contrasted it with error, or the goodness of Good until you have contrasted it with evil. Therefore, while it is a fact that "truth is mighty and will prevail," and that it has liberated thousands from their bondage to sin, sickness and death, and has never lost one grain of its saving power, still its advocacy by unworthy individuals has greatly corrupted and prejudiced the mind of many earnest inquirers and seekers after Truth. This has for the time being appeared to greatly cripple it in its results, and to hinder it in its, onward march. Those insincere adherents and advocates must be winnowed out, for the "fan is in his hand and he will thoroughly purge his floor, and gather his wheat into the garner; but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire." Matt. iii: 12. The winnowing time is as essential as the reaping time. And the Master will find occasion to say to the "chaff," "You do not seek me because you saw the Signs, but because you ate of the loaves and were satisfied." "Labor not for that food which perisheth, but for that which endureth unto everlasting life." John vi: 26, 27. That which endureth unto eternal life is The Absolute. which "perishes with the using" has been, alas, too often accepted instead of the Real and Eternal Verity. Well, did the Spirit "counsel thee to buy from me gold which has been refined by fire, that thou mayest be rich; and white garments, that thou mayest be clothed; \* \* and eye salve to anoint thine eyes, that thou mayest see." (Rev. iii: 18.) See what? See the Signs by which you may determine that which is the Absolute. If there were no Absolute, or Real, there would be no use for a counter-

feit. The fact that there are counterfeits also should suggest that there must be a genuine. The fact that there appears to be a relative truth and a relative good should also declare that there is an Absolute, Unchangeable and Eternal Verity, a Perfect and Incorruptible Good.

strengthen and encourage us.


