



Onset Bay is a lovely reach of water about fifty miles south of Bos-

ton. It is an inlet from Buzzard's Bay. In the center of it are three small islands, one of which Susie C. Clark says looks like Alcatraz island in San Franeisco Bay. On this island lives a doctor who built himself a fine house thereon, surrounded by lovely grounds and pine trees, and lives there all by himself. He keeps a horse and a cow there. The horse swam across to the island, but they had to make a scow to ferry the cow on. Where the doctor gets his patients I don't know. He probably isn't troubled much with night calls or calls in bad weather. It would reduce doctor bills and increase selfconfidence and health generally if some other doctors would get the island habit.

At the head of Onset Bay there stands on a ridge among the pines a row of nice summer cottages owned by Spiritualists. In the center stands Bay View Cottage, a story and a half wooden structure, the first house built at Onset, erected thirtytwo years ago by the Lorings, and occupied every summer by Mrs. E. S. Loring, who still owns it. In front of the cottage runs a good road. . The houses stand high with stone walls to hold the banks in place. Looking out through the fringe of pines and over the bay, in the early morning shine or in the shimmer of a full moon, one sees a picture entrancing and unforgettable.

Onset Bay is a lovely little town of 1,500 or so people which used to be owned and controlled by the Onset Bay Grove Association of Spiritualists. Through legal technicalities and squabbles, the control has passed largely to



outsiders. But the Association still owns a goodly slice of property, with a block of cottages, two open-air auditoriums, a large temple and a comfortable administration building in the center of the town. And hither come every summer several hundreds of Spiritualists to hold high communion, enjoy the lovely prospect and breezes, and listen to addresses from all the noted Spiritualists and a few speakers from the outside.

Dr. George E. Fuller has been the association head for many years—a head that reminds one a bit of Edwin Markham's, and evidently directs affairs with tact and efficiency.

Among the not-Spiritualist speakers at Onset Bay this season were Elizabeth Towne on August 16 and Elbert Hubbard the Sunday following. The aforementioned spoke for an hour on the subject of "Salvation Through Combination," and the newspaper reports said she addressed the largest audience at Onset this summer.

The subject was a large one covering some nine hundred million years of experience and the world's Two Great Ideas, a practical view of some of the doings of the world today, with a peek into the future. Nobody nodded. Once or twice I thought I saw folks breathe fast, as if they were getting a hard run for their money. Once in a while there was hand clapping, and several times the audience looked like an advertisement for Sozodont and Pear's soap. And the pine trees nodded frequently and whispered something, I couldn't tell what.

After the meeting there was general handshaking and one man said he and his friend had agreed that just my smile was worth the admission fee. He said nothing about the rest. They came from

Boston to hear about "Salvation Through Combination." Others came from Boston, too, and some from greater distances.

THE SPIRITUALIST MOVEMENT.

"How do the crowds here compare with those of

previous years?" I asked a prominent Spiritualist at Onset Bay.

"Attendance has fallen away very materially. I have attributed it to the hard times," was the answer.

"How is attendance at other centers of the same sort?"

"Light everywhere, I believe."

"Can it be," I queried, "that dishonest mediumship is killing the Spiritualist societies, as I have heard intimated? Would it perhaps be better to frown down paid mediumship, because of the frauds who practice it?"

"Spiritualism depends upon mediumship," was his prompt and emphatic reply. "To my mind the cutting out of the mediums would mean immediate disintegration of the societies."

"What else is there to hold them together?" he proceeded. "Nothing except the philosophy, which probably could easily be satisfied in some church. No, Spiritualism and paid mediumship must stand or fall together. But I am not one who believes there is as much fraud in paid mediumship as some people would have us believe. I have seen too much for that, and I know mediumship from experience, though I do not practice for money."

Then he told us many wonderful experiences of his own that would have convinced us of the genuineness of many "spirit phenomena"—if we had needed convincing.

And I told him some very unsatisfactory experiences of mine, with paid mediums. These he deplored of course.

The conversation was long and interesting, but it left us all right where it found us.

I am still one who disapproves of professional mediumship.

Not because it demands pay. No. But because it weakens the individuality and retards the growth of those who depend upon it for direction in their daily living.

We are here on earth to develop our own powers by using them. The man or woman who runs to mediums or to "spirits" for advice is looking away from his own source of power and stunting himself.

The same is true of the man who runs for advice to his neighbors in the flesh. But better run to neighbors than to mediums, because neighbors profess no greater powers than one's own and the temptation to lean is, therefore, not so great.

Are all political parties and individuals inheriting and reincarnating the spirit of socialism, while the body of the Socialist Party shrivels in senile old age?

She is too sick to work, so she spends her time "resting" around in the house, perhaps with a relative or two who is sick too, or fidgety and cranky, or slowly dying. Among our readers must be a number of just such "nervous" women who need Alice's sermon. The men rarely get nervous, possibly because they have to work right along anyhow. Perhaps, too, because they don't try to fritter their lives away within four walls.

Here is Alice's sermon to the nervous ones:

I believe you'll feel a lot better when you are launched upon some work. Surely a little inspiring, hopeful work should not hurt one who is thought to be equal to all sorts of severe draining and saddening "duties." My views in this matter would not exactly coincide with the usual one. To tell me not to read, not to dictate nor revise letters or literary matter, not to think or work or worry, would be to bid me die. I should certainly do nothing but worry. It is to say to the mental man exactly what it would be to the physical man to tell him not to breathe, giving as a reason that he was tired, and his lungs needed rest. ### Cosmic Energy.

We are living hourly in the midst of a great physical and metaphysical abundance of health of which the majority of mankind know nothing. Some live and die, and never consciously recognize the secrets of the world in which they spend their existence.

Others are forced into investigation because they find themselves in a condition of disease and pain, and try as they will, they do not seem to find a way to set themselves free from some law with which they have unconsciously connected.

Disease, more than any other factor in human life, causes humanity to turn back into itself, in sober questioning; through its own crying need it reaches out for something tangible, which it can use, and with which it can rescue itself from itself.

The great pulsing life of nature is always around us; we breathe it, live it, hang our whole life on it, and yet never seem to sense its presence; we do not know that it has in it all that mankind can ever need, or use, for every need in human life, and that it only awaits our own awakening to bring us into union with it.

There is one great atmosphere, and two expressions of it; there is first the universal cosmic energy pervading all space, and incorporated in all being, and we will understand it better if we name it the universal ether. It is all life.

The other, and more familiar atmosphere is a part of the first ether and for the sake of clearness we will call it the common atmospheric ether; the energy which we breathe and use in every day life.

Anyone living normally, breathes a certain amount of common atmospheric ether daily, but one of the greatest factors in physical malnutrition can be traced to lack of care in the aeration of the physical body. None of the vital centers of the body can remain normal, when they are deprived of the necessary amount of natural air. One thing is certain; as long as an individual is under the power of physical laws, he cannot function normally, if he is ignorant as to the amount of common atmospheric air he owes his body.

The body has its own laws, and he must become developed to that extent where he is the absolute master of his physical body, and able to make it live under such laws as he declares for it through his higher understanding, or he must recognize the natural laws and their limits.

Many individuals come to us with a story of sickness which has its whole inception in the fact of under aeration of their physical cells; the poor starved half dead cells shriek for air, and instead of opening their physical lungs, and airing the physical house they resolve themselves into invalids and seek some healer or doctor.

Long deep physical breaths fill out our lungs with atmospheric air, and help depose the worn out material within our bodies; it fills our blood currents with new vital constituents, and sends rich red blood coursing through our veins bearing physical life to every center of our body. Long deep physical breaths exercise the diaphragm, loosen the blood pressure by relieving interior congestion, and set into vibration and increased function the molecular activity of our cells.

More than this, long deep breaths can, and do raise our bodily vibration, and by deep breathing we can lift our life from gloom or despondency into a position of joy and hope. Breathing has a direct effect upon our mental conditions; through breathing we can control our emotions and stay our reflections, and through it we give the external mind a new object for concentration.

Many students master all there is given them about the physical breathing, and stop there, never knowing that they have only begun on the path of great psychological discoveries.

The final, and really great truth is the secret of the finer air, the all life of the universe, or the pranic ether.

The very air we breathe is filled with this substance; all life floats in it like an island in a great ocean and if it were not for our unconscious union with it we could not exist.

We are inseparably connected with the pranic ether through our solar plexus center; really "before we ask it is given," and "ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you." But when, through wrong thinking, either inherited or acquired, we have separated ourselves from the cosmic energy in such a way that we are not receiving our normal supply we can by conscious thought union with it, in connection with our physical brain, increase our amount at will, and reconnect our own body.

# What I Have Discovered About Success and Failure.

Some years ago when I kept a boarding house in Boston, I found myself getting behind with my rent and in many ways failing to make my business a success. No sooner had I begun to feel that times were dull and that it was a hard task to make "both ends meet," than I discovered that nine out of every ten people that I met and conversed with were "in the same boat" with myself. Naturally this revelation added to my own depression and, though sorry, I was not surprised to find business still

my own attitude toward things in general, that my business was mine and theirs was theirs, so I proceeded to put my private theories into practice and went steadily forward attending to my own affairs in my own way regardless of the opinions or methods of my neighbors. Very soon, my house was not only full, but overflowing, and that in the dull season (July and August), when the city was supposed to be pretty nearly deserted. Not being able to accommodate all who sought admission to my dwelling, I began helping to fill my neighbor's empty room, and very soon I was deluged with inquiries as to how I could possibly keep my house so full when "everybody was out of the city," and much more in the same general direction. As I held no magical secret for house filling during the "off season" I hardly knew how to reply to my interlocutors, but feeling inwardly convinced that there must be some adequate cause behind every effect in the universe, I meditated deeply on my changed experience, with the result that I was irresistibly led by the force of relentless logic to the definite conclusion that my altered mental attitude lay behind the great alteration in my exterior conditions. There are two reasons for success as there are two for failure, and these two in both instances, act in such close conjunction that it is almost impossible to decide where one begins and the other ends. Our mental attitude alone will not transact material business, nor will outward industry compensate for lack of mental stamina. Equilibrium, or equipose, will alone account for success in any undertaking, and this means confidence and grit, as well as energy.

We all hear people constantly explaining why they do not succeed, assigning superficial causes for non-success which they foolishly call "reasons." When in England, a few years ago, I met an excellent clergyman in London who officiated in an old church not far from the City Temple, Holborn Viaduct, where the Rev. R. J. Campbell at present ministers. This worthy rector of an ancient parish in the course of a plaintive description of an almost empty edifice on

several successive Sundays, explained the vacant pews largely by reference to the weather, exclaiming at the end of a protracted conversation of a depressing theme, "You know that people really will not go out to church in such horrid weather."

I had listened with quiet attention to all the reverend gentleman had been pleased to say, then when his speech was over and his final argument completely stated, I ventured the rather rude inquiry, "How is it that the weather is so very good a few streets away from your church, and so very bad in that building's immediate vicinity?"

"I don't understand," replied the

clergyman sharply.

"Well," I continued, "as I have attended seven services, five on Thursdays and two on Sundays, during the past five weeks in the City Temple and found the attendance so large that often it seemed difficult to find seats for late arrivals, if people will not go to church in wet and windy weather, there must be a barometric mystery connected with Hol-born Viaduct.'' Finding my elerical friend at a loss to reply to my rather cheeky observation, I ventured to expound my own philosophy in such a manner as to more than half convince him that he, having settled down to a mental rut of gloomy mal-expectancy, was actually the unwitting cause of the very experiences over which he grieved but which he considered insurmounta-

I do not believe in luck, chance, fortune or anything else outside of ourselves as determining factors in our destiny, therefore I place no confidence in charms, "lucky hours," or anything else that leads people to depend on something over which they can exert no rational control; on the other hand I have made a sufficiently deep study of practical psychology to know that auto-suggestion is an enormously potent factor in determining one's career, therefore whatever influences our minds in the direction of self-confidence, and an assured sense of coming victory, is valuable to that extent even though intrinsically and otherwise ridiculous.

### Beauty in Relation to Growth.

The idea of beauty is universal, but it escapes all effort at definition. There is no fixed standard by which to measure it, and no quality in external things to which we can apply it. If

it inhered in the objects around us, we should all equally perceive and enjoy it. But we know this is not true.

If we should attempt to generalize the many conceptions of beauty current in the world of thought, the one strong feature in the composite idea would be "that which occasions pleasure."

Our capacity for joy determines our ability to appreciate beauty in the phenomenal world. In fact, the beauty we find in any object is really our pleasure projected into it, and regarded as a property of the object. The beauty of our world is determined by the responsiveness of our inner being to the thousand appeals it is making to mind and sense.

Pleasure is a sense of expansion, and pain is always associated with a sense of limitation. The power to feel pleasure and pain, to rejoice in expansion and growth, and to suffer under limitation, is called sensibility. Nature has used this power as the means and the mark of growth through all the course of evolution. The cell feels the attraction of other cells, and reaches toward them. The simplest organism reaches out after food, and develops limbs and organs to serve it in seeking pleasure and avoiding pain.

When we reach man we find him capable of feeling pleasure and pain in new ways. He has attained fine and complex physical sensibility, and begins to use his sense to gratify artificial appetites, instead of yielding them to the sway of Nature, to serve for protection and growth as in the animal world. He analyzes his pleasures and seeks to reproduce them by appeals to the imagination.

Moreover, he has learned to feel pleasure and pain in regard to his mental states and moral relationships. The power which knowledge brings gives him pleasure, and he fears the weakness and confusion which result from ignorance and error. He realizes the supreme joy of his life as a moral being in harmonious companionships, and the most cruel of suffering in separation from those he loves, and the antagonism of those who oppose him or interfere with his desires. So he has added to his capacity for pleasure and pain, intellectual and moral sensibility.

Whatever gives him pleasure, whether it be the color and flavor and fragrance of a ripe pippin, a truth discovered or proved, or a noble moral act, man calls it beautiful, and seeks to preserve or to possess, to extend or to reproduce it. When he becomes conscious of this process in his mind, he develops what we may call artistic sensibility.

It will be noticed that in all grades of sensibility, we feel both pleasure and pain. There are many who maintain that these elements are in our lives for contrast, and that we should not appreciate pleasure if it were not compared to pain. There is some measure of truth in this, but it leaves much unsaid.

Pain is a sense of limitation, and exists until the limitation is overcome, when it becomes strength and joy to us. Pain is not good for us because it pun-

ishes us for our sins, or because it makes our pleasures sweeter by contrast, but because it stimulates us to growth, and so serves the same purpose for which pleasure is intended. If we bent our will upon growth, we might overcome many limitations without feeling them as such. If we responded to all the beauties of our environment, we should overcome indifference and the habit of criticism and eliminate much of the pain of life. Nor would the continuous joy of such a life

pall upon us. There is no monotony where there are so many degrees and varieties of beauty. To compare the sun with a candle flame gives us a greater sense of its magnificence than to compare it with blank darkness.

Let us look to it, then, that the passing moments are devoted to the building of beauty into our thoughts, our actions, and our environment, and to the deepening of our capacity to respond to the beauties about us. This is the law of Growth.

### Sermons of a Scientist.

NO. 2. THE LARGER LIFE.



He that findeth his life shall lose it, and he that loseth his life for My sake shall find it.—Matt. 10, 39.

As a teacher Jesus of Nazareth labored under peculiar difficulties. The age in which He lived was a dark

one, brutal, cruel, licentious,-in short barbarous. The earlier civilizations, such as that of Chaldea, Persia and Greece, which, fine as they had been, were at best merely local and temporary -these civilizations had passed; and Jesus was born at a time when the world was under the iron rule of Rome-at a time when the barbarian influence of Rome had degraded and brutalized the people. The Jews, stung and humiliated by their conquest at the hands of the younger but more powerful people, would have been ready enough to welcome a Darius or an Atilla, but were in no mood to listen to a prophet who told them frankly, "My kingdom is not of this world."

And even among these people Jesus, by reason of his birth, his occupation and his habits of life, was considered a man of no importance, and save in rare cases, as in that of Nicodemus, He did not come into contact with any but the lower classes.

Jesus preached to the rabble; and, master orator as He was, expert as He was in every trick and device of verbal presentment, He found it impossible to make Himself fully understood. He failed then, even as, two thousand years later, He fails today.

Metaphor, hyperbole, paradox, anecdote,—question—all these devices of oratory were brought into play in the effort to put before his clod-hopper auditors the truth which He believed it was His duty to tell.

And among the most brilliant of his many brilliant epigrams was this: "He that findeth his life shall lose it; and he that loseth his life for My sake shall find it."

For the human being there is but one actual possession, and that is life. To have it is to have all—all possibility, all opportunity, all joy. To lose it—is death. That seems plain. And yet we are told that to find one's life is to lose one's life, and that to lose one's life is to find one's life. "A paradox, absurd, a mere jumble of words," sneers the unbeliever. "There are some things which it is not given us to understand," meekly says the church member. "We must have faith."

Both critic and believer are wrong—equally wrong. The magnificent utterance which heads this writing is not an absurd and meaningless jargon of terms; it is not, on the other hand, as the church member believes, at all beyond the comprehension of any thoughtful person who will take the trouble to ponder its meaning. The epigram is merely another example of that brilliant wit and profound knowledge of human nature which marked all the utterances of the greatest philosopher the world has ever known.

And after all, the meaning is very simple. Each of us has two lives—two distinct modes of action. One of those lives is personal, selfish; the other is

impersonal, unselfish. In living the personal, selfish life, we aim to please ourselves without reference to others. In living the impersonal, unselfish life, we find that, owing to a wider viewpoint, a greater sympathy, we cannot be happy unless others are at the same time happy; and so we aim to please ourselves by pleasing others. In the larger life, therefore, we strive to make others happy in order to be happy ourselves.

The selfish child has an apple. He devours it greedily in the presence of his little sister, not only refusing her request for "a bite," but perhaps enjoying the apple rather the more because of her wistful face. Sometimes he is more than four years old, too.

A child of finer feeling would often refuse to eat his apple until he could share it with his little sister because, as one child explained to me once, "He

couldn't enjoy it that way."

Now in these crude pictures of childhood we can see illustrated the two lives, the selfish and the unselfish, the one inconsiderate of others, the other regardful of others. And in the axiom of the Master which we are considering, the word "life" is used in both of these senses.

"He that findeth his life," he, that is, who seeks his own selfish joy, irrespec-

tive of others, shall lose his life, that is the larger life, with its splendid possibilities, opportunities and joys.

What are its advantages—this larger life of self-effacement, this life of service? They are—everything. Freedom from the dominion of those carking, cankering friends, jealousy, anger, revenge and greed. Perfect comradeship, universal love and a sincere welcome everywhere. Wisdom, all wisdom; for only he who loves others will take the trouble to really study them—only he will ever truly know them.

And the little selfish life, the life of self seeking—to what does that lead? Do we not all know? Could we not, any of us, name people whose insistent selfishness has left them at the end with an ugly body, a repellant personality, an embittered soul and an unstored, inefficient mind; cheerless, friendless, perhaps homeless? That is the answer.

And so you see, it is quite simple, after all. He who seeks to live a purely selfish life shall lose his real life, his infinitely large, beautiful, godlike life.

And he who foregoes that selfish life for the sake of the real "I am," the indwelling Spirit of Christ, shall find the larger life,—the life of the Spirit.

### Osteopathy and New Thought.

A good many of you know of the injuries received by myself and my sister in the Helicon Hall fire a year ago last March. These were almost identical and consisted of the slipping of a couple of vertebrae in the spine so that

while the backs were not, as the phrase goes, broken, they were so out of the normal position that the nerves which branch from the great spinal cord were pushed or pressed upon in the little opening between the vertebrae and thus sensation and motion were both interfered with in the parts to which these nerves went. Also the blood vessels got their share of pressure and the nourishment of the parts suffered.

Now, as you know, I believe in self healing. I do not think a human being should go to another to be healed till he has exhausted the possibilities of making himself well. My sister and I talked this matter over very exhaustively. We were flat on our backs for a while and in great pain—not a good position to "take off" from, as the phrase would go in the hunting field where one was attempting a big jump. There was a great deal of congestion. Fasting would be good, that we both felt sure—and fasting was, Also Fletcherism, which as modern living goes might almost be called modified fasting, kept us more supple than anybody concerned with the matter expected us to be.

We never relaxed on the matter of mental effort. I know that this is the reason I stayed in the body, for every operator who has looked at this back of mine says it is the nearest broken of any back he ever saw on a living subject. I did stay here, and I got to work and made some efforts toward earning my living before I could raise my head from the pillow, and I never faltered for one minute in the knowledge that I could get well, and that I would.

It is my belief that fasting, exercise, assertions would eventually replace the vertebra in both spines; but—and here we come to the thing which gives room for any concessions—I had my living to earn, and two children to support. I got in debt a good deal while we were down. Also I had the race thought to contend with on the matter, and nothing short, it seemed to me, of the tremendous exal-

tation which followed the long fasts of the prophets, their weeks and months of isolation from their kind in the desert, would avail to accomplish such a big proposition.

Meantime we were put into the hands of osteopaths. The treatment is entirely without drugs, and ought to be perfectly harmless unless one learns to lean too heavily upon it. I do not think I should look even to such a harmless means as this for mere illness, being sure that to reach the spiritual root of the thing which had made me ill and pluck it up would be the better way; but we have carried our beliefs and our assertions right alongside of osteopathetic treatment, and we do not find them antagonistic. New thought counsels you to get up and do, to make an effort with whatever means you can reach, and it praises you always for doing. In our own case it seems likely that a few months more of hearty co-operative work will see the end of what, in the old way of treating and believing would have been life-long deformities and shortened years. Perhaps we are less than we should have been had we taken it upon ourselves to cure these troubles from a purely spiritual basis, but cured they will be, and less or more we shall go on to attack the best work we can in the best way we can-and even a horse, as the saying goes, can do no more.

"I am not a church member but I have been trying to frame for myself a practical but spiritual Christian religion? What should I read to meet my needs?"

"Pragmatism," by Professor William James, of Harvard University, is the latest book by that gifted psychologist and defines his theory of spiritual ideals working out in practice. His references will lead you to other books. Also, "The Religion of a Mature Mind," by Professor Coe. Also "The Forgotten Secret," by W. J. Dawson, 50 cents; "Paths to Power," Floyd Wilson, \$1.00; "The Life of Christ," Holtzmann, \$1.00; The Psalms, Gospels, Paul's Letters and "The Twentieth Century New Testament,"

Have a devotional book that shall lift you into communion with the saints, as "Francis of Assisi," and "Brother Lawrence," Ecstacy of soul is a legitimate fervor and may well take the place of the occasional bread and wine sacrament of the Orthodox churches. There was a time when this meant a searching out of every vagrant impulse, yielding all to the divine eye and since I resolved as this correspondent has, to frame for myself a spiritual and practical religion I realized that antagonism had no part in it, and often through family relationships many are held to perform observances which they feel do not express a vital meaning, I resolved that ignorance nor prejudice should keep me from any good thing, and whenever I found myself a member of a congregation gathered to celebrate the Lord's Supper, I would not deprive myself of this inspiration by refusing to partake, nor would I give it over to a preacher who had no idea of the

transcendent life out of material conditions through transforming the bare bread and wine into soul force, so I had to make my own affirmation as I partook. I know that wherever there are a few gathered for such a service and in a place consecrated by repeated use to the highest vibrations of which the human soul is capable, that there is a high potency vibration that I want to share, be it Protestant, Catholic, Hindu or Mohammedan. In their roots and fruition they are the same. So as I eat the bread I lift my soul high as if on wings and say slowly, letting the words sink into my mind:

"My Father, now as I eat this bread and it becomes my physical body, so do I eat Thy law and it becomes my spiritual sense to discern and appropriate Thy truth that it may become in me the bread of my existence." And as I drink the wine say, "Thou Soul of the universe enter thou into my being as the wine of life and let this be the symbol of Thy divine inflow." Then as the preacher closes his invocation with, "Thus do we proclaim the Lord's death till He come." add your own value to it thus: "Yea, as I feed upon the spirit of truth I take its inmost essence into my being; as I celebrate the death of Christ, I continue His life through the perpetual renewal of His purpose and I incorporate His spirit of sacrifice, separation from the world and the overcoming of evil as the ruling power of my life. My Father, I empty myself of self to be filled with Thee. Absorb me, animate me, dominate me until merged with Thy spirit all the avenues of my being manifest Thy will and Thy law."

Do not cut yourself off from one of the powerful avenues of spiritual inflow by refusing to co-operate whenever it is best.

"I have read and am reading the books you suggest but I have made little if any progress towards the Eternal Silence."

Only at intervals can we take our spiritual temperature. We do know that where once we found ourselves against a stone wall, we later realize that we have surmounted that wall and are leagues beyond it, but just how or when we cannot tell; it is the chemistry of the unseen. It is our duty to rise into the consciousness of ideal perception and visualize to the subconscious mind and to reassure it and ourselves.

There are not so many books worth while that we can allow any one which has a particular message for us, one that has lifted a vision to our inner sight, to be laid aside and a new book sought. Better eat one thoroughly than to have a vague idea of many. 1 Kings, xix; 9-12 is the story of the same expectation by Elijah; he looked for the voiceless communion in the wind, the earthquake or the fire, but he found it not in one of these; it was the still small voice. The processes of the spirit are quiet and peace; it makes no noise; "The wind bloweth where it will and thou hearest the voice thereof, but knoweth not whence it cometh and whither it goeth: so is everyone that is born of the spirit." Some enter the high potency life through deep and prolonged intellectual struggle, others through violent emotional upheavals, and still others enter gradually through a slow transforming be-coming process. The true religious life is not an air tight compartment released on occasion, but an attitude of mind, radiating good, a growing perception of the inclusiveness of all life. Be not mystified concerning the difference between a good life and a religious life, they are not different except in living it

more abundantly. It takes courage to make the soul's emphasis operative on the objective plane but this domination must prevail if we are to have a practical, spiritual Christianity. Each one's path of development is born of needs and no one arrives at the moment of awakening merely to pass away the time. Heed the soul hunger and feed it, help the soul to enuciate itself.

Should a student of new thought ignore a weak heart, sluggish liver, choice of food or a delicate constitution? Am I doing wrong to try physical helps?

There are many paths to the one goal and one is influenced by temperament and training. Each one struggles up the path of self mastery, carrying all the woes of life neatly packed and labelled and when the light comes, when realization dawns flooding the entire conscious fabric, fasting, diet, lack and the rest slide off like melting snows in sunlight, Could you have left them behind at the beginning? No, they were the goad that whipped you up the hill. Anything that releases the bondage of the body is good and an occasional fast is a great developer. My own preference is for a no meat diet. I see no difference between getting warm by a fire or by means of a hot water bottle, and I recognize every means that accelerates the high potency life and prefer adding to one's resources rather than negating them. Spiritual and physical helps may be friendly. I consider deep breathing, rest, sleep, pure air, food, mental atmosphere, refined surroundings as god-given helps. That a study of domestic science is far to be preferred than the haphazard cooking by ignorant persons. gineers know how to feed their engines and keep them free from clinkers, but the human dynamo no man regards; built for endurance and speed it is side tracked on a narrow level road. Knowledge, more knowledge, is what we need. Analyze all experience that you may have your private code for the divine vocabulary. No one person can give you a cut and dried plan; you, yourself must think and reason and develop your power of initiative that shall help you to elect what you believe is good for you and add to your resources as your perceptions grow. Life is fluid. Be willing to leave behind any outgrown theories.

What would you advise concerning the teaching of the mystery of life to a child and at what age? Do you know of any helpful book? Do you think a mother should be able to know unaided what is wisest to say?

During the last year the Ladies' Home Journal inaugurated almost a crusade against ignorance of the fundamental laws of our nature and the lack of any high moral ground for parent and child to commune and fortify against unknown, awakening normal developing tendencies. This exchange of mother experience is most helpful and suggestive. Few parents are wise enough to have sufficient resources to meet all questions without suggestions from other mothers. The two books, "Almost a Man" and "Almost a Woman," fifty cents each, by Mary Wood Allen, are fine. Consider that we live in a world of people and that if your child is normal it will ask. "Where did I come from?" and yet when a child is born we act as if some new shame had befallen a family. The attitude is shameful and mothers need to know that this matter is receiving more attention now than since modern civilization began. Consider the foolishness of equivocation and make-believes and evasion, as if our children must be duped in order to be virtuous. Truth is the only law for strength. Ideals are the only framework of marriage and every part of life can and should be idealized, else we brutalize.

At what age to tell a child? At whatever age it asks and tell it truly. All your mental reservations have no place in the telling, only the high truth of life. No child is too young to talk of the birds. and be sure that your baby sees the robin's nest, and you two watch the young ones hatch and grow; if not the birds then the chickens; then when he asks of himself, let this be your beginning. Tell him that all life comes from an egg, that sometimes the eggs are kept warm outside the body and sometimes the mother keeps the egg inside the body close to her heart until the little one grows big enough. One little boy, three years old asked how she got it out; she said that a tiny door opened low down in the body for it to come out. He was filled with love and wonder for the mother who kept her baby close to her for so long. It is safe to say that children should be told by the time they are nine, for awakening adolescence is upon them and they will hear it from others in a way you can never overcome. Tell a girl of the effort of the body to attain maturity; that from month to month the body forms these eggs if it is kept strong and well, and as they pass from the body the so-called menstrual period occurs; that she needs to take special care of the body at such times. To all say that this is a secret between mothers and children, that the mother always tells the child and never to tell another child nor talk about it. for it's a mother's secret. For them to come to you with all the questions, that you will tell him all he wishes to know. Invite this confidence and then make good. A mother's authority is her own girlhood, where your child is you once were. Search your own heart and learn your child's. Each child must have peculiar points of contact through which the knowledge may be given. Oh, the undeveloped intimacies of mother and daughter, the wonderful and fearful newness of this strange life to her. Be her elder sister and keep the source of her knowledge pure.

#### PART II.

Three weeks before the Galveston disaster, I saw one night while asleep, a huge wall of water, like an immense tidal wave, sweep in from the sea and overwhelm a great city. Hugh timbers were picked up like toothpicks while the houses were swept away by the onrush of waters like so many dry-goods boxes. The wave came from the south and it seemed to me it was on the Gulf coast. When the telegraph brought the news of the Galveston tidal wave, I was furnished the key to my vision.

Some time ago my little daughter, then a mere baby, was taken ill with pneumonia. She gradually grew worse and finally the physicians gave up all hope for her recovery. The end was momentarily expected. Our other baby had passed away a short time before. In despair my husband and I lifted our hearts in prayer with all the force and intensity of our agonized minds, asking that this little one might be spared us.

Suddenly I saw the vision of a little evergreen tree lashed by a terrible storm. It looked like a miniature Christmas tree.

Fascinated, I watched the scene, intuitively realizing that the tree symbolized my child, and the storm, the fever and disease; that the struggle depicted before my eyes was the illness of my little one and the battle between the forces of Life and Death. I seemed to know that if the little tree snapped, my little girl would die. Bending to the ground, first this way and then that, before the fury of the storm, twisted and torn until every moment I expected to see it uprooted, there came to my inner consciousness the words: "Fear not! Seest thou not that

the little tree withstandeth the storm." From that moment all fear was gone. Though the little one slowly sank lower and lower until every labored breath appeared to be the last, I had implicit faith in the promise of the vision. Two days later the change came and my baby was spared.

Who spoke to me? Was it God? Was it my own Soul? Was it my Higher Self? What matters it.

I was sick unto death. Outwardly in a semi-conscious state, but inwardly my senses acute, I lay on my bed in a large hotel in San Francisco near the City Hall. Two physicians were working over me. It was April 4, 1901. There swept before my vision the picture of the destruction of the city by earthquake and fire. I saw the hotel in which I was lying, crumbling and the \$8,000,-000 City Hall across the street in ruins. Water pipes were bursting while from broken gas conduits all over the city leaped little jets of flame which soon turned into immense pillars of smoke. I felt the shaking and trembling of the earth, saw the terror of the fleeing multitudes as they rushed into the street, myself among them, the dead and the wounded. The scarcity of water and food and my flight to a high hill. I did not know when it would occur beyond that it would happen within seven years. How vivid the picture, how true even to minute details, I did not realize until I saw the actual picture and took part in the scenes five years and fourteen days later.

It was in July of last year. I had spent the evening in reading and retired about ten o'clock. I soon fell asleep and saw a steamer plowing its way to the northward. The scene appeared to

be north of me. It was a quiet calm The water was smooth and I could hear it lapping and splashing against the side of the vessel. I saw the little white line as the bow cut through the water and in the wake of the ship the foamy billows. An opaque light shimmered like the moon shining through a fog. I realized that the vessel would sink in a few minutes, yet was at loss to account for it, because no rocks seemed to be in the vicinity and I could see no danger threatening. Yet I was absolutely certain that disaster was close at hand with much loss of life. I said to myself: "I will look for the list of passengers in the morning paper." With that, there floated before my eyes a paper, with big headlines and containing a list of the lost. I awoke and looked at the clock. It was 11:30.

Eagerly I waited for the morning paper. It contained nothing. I was puzzled. The following morning, Monday, a steamer crept into San Francisco with a life raft and a story of the sinking of the San Francisco and Portland passenger steamer Columbia by the steam schooner San Pedro during a collision in a fog Saturday night between 11:30 and midnight. Out of about 120 passengers, mostly women and children, 80 perished. The first paper I saw was the counterpart of what had floated before my vision.

The day before the announcement that the battleship fleet would be sent to the Pacific, while looking into a finger-bowl of water at the table, there appeared in the water the picture of the Emperor of Japan, sitting in a red tent or room. On either side of him was another figure. I could not see their faces, but intuitively knew they were not Japanese, although clad in the loose garments of that country. Arising, the Emperor stretched forth his hands, saying, "Come! we must prepare to fight." One

of the figures quickly grasped the hand stretched out to it, the other man hesitated, drew back at first and then reluctantly took the other hand of the Mikado, but apparently very unwillingly. With that there stretched across the Pacific from Japan to America. a broad black ribbon; on it in a peculiar reddish orange was the word "Conflict." reading from America toward Japan. Suspended from the band was a heart pierced by a red arrow. From the American side, several Jackies, dressed in red, pushed a large cannon into the water and trained it on Japan. The picture changed, and I saw the Mikado walking back and forth saying, "I will make my people acceptable to the people of every land." Again it changed and the Japanese flag was floating over Hawaii and the Philippines.

The following morning the announcement was made that the battleship fleet would be sent to the Pacific. The vision was not necessarily a prophecy but may have merely been a reflection of the thoughts current in the two countries, aroused to unusual activity by the intention to send the fleet to western waters, as was undoubtedly already well known in diplomatic eircles.

A friend whom I had taught much, which for a time was heeded and then disregarded largely, as he slipped back into old ways, recently came from the East and stopped a few days at my home. He had a bad cold and cough.

As he walked through the hall the day after he arrived, I saw following him a huge figure robed in sable black, majestic and awesome. Stretching out one hand toward the young man, I heard it utter the words, "To him who hath it shall be given; to him who hath and useth it not, it shall be taken away even unto his life."

Today the young man is battling with the dread disease, Consumption. The meaning of the words were plain. Had he applied the knowledge that had been imparted to him, had he been obedient when warned and as he himself admitted that he knew, to change his business and mode of life, he would have avoided the battle that is now before him.

The question is often asked by those who have little or no conception of such matters, "Why did you not know this or know that?" Were you to ask a wireless operator, "Why did you not answer the signals of such and such a station?" he would reply, "I was not attuned to the ether wave lengths of the station."

In wireless telegraphy the various component parts and instruments must be syntonized with each other, that is, they must be in delicate adjustment, and next, must be "in tune" with the vibrations of such stations as they wish to communicate with or receive communications from.

If this is true of mechanical instruments, how much more is it true of the delicate mechanism of the Spirit, the Soul and the Mind. They must be syntonized with each other; in perfect adjustment and harmony. When a wireless outfit is not "in tune," it picks up every static discharge and there comes to the ear of the receiver a jumble of sounds, indiscriminate signals and parts of them, mixed with an occasional word or correct signal.

The character and type of the visions I have related, and the laws governing them, are very different from ordinary clairvoyance and psychic perception with its jumble of indistinguishable, contradictory and confusing impressions.

Vision of the higher type and character is positive. It comes from within. It is the true compass on Life's stormy That of ordinary clairvoyance, psychism and impressionability is the most negative form of receptivity which catches every stray thought and impression, unreliable, misleading, and in many instances absolutely harmful. Its acquisition is not to be encouraged. The All-Wise Creator gave us five senses, as yet crude, undeveloped and little known. They were not meant to supersede or to dethrone the physical senses. On the contrary, they were intended to assist, fortify and uphold them.

### Swastika Symbols on Santa Catalina Island.

"Princess Fiatisi. bring me the new lot of Swastikas by your brought brother Ahura from North Gautama; and the copies of mural paintings from our province of the sun, Heleste. in Zha. Pan."

These words could, no doubt, have been spoken by a provincial queen to her daughter many centuries ago, in Whaga, the prehistoric continent, far later called Pan, and before the mighty convulsions of the earth which developed as volcanoes, earthquakes, hurricanes,

falls of meteoric fire and stones, and which destroyed the nations, the whole culminating in a terrific deluge, which submerged the continent and its cities beneath the Pacific Ocean. North Gautama was the Panic name for North America, and the Zha' Pan for Japan. New Guinea, Borneo and the Philippines are portions of the great continent, so great in altitude that they were not submerged. The same is true of all the islands of Polynesia. "So also will I, the Lord, provide in the Kosmon era, to discover the sunken land of Whaga, that mortals may comprehend the magnitude of the work of the Lord." And the Kosmon era began in A. D.

The Queen Tussica received the golden case filled with swastikas from

the hands of her beautiful daughter Fiatisi, and upon opening it, she turned the contents out upon a table of pearl.

There were more than a hundred shapes and patterns. And these were wrought in gold, silver, copper, iron, bronze, ivory, bone, wood, stone, leather, pearl, cinnabar, sea shell, marble, jade and a number of other materials. These had been collected upon her orders, by ship captains, traders, travelers, geologists and scientists, from all parts of the world then inhabited. They were for her great museum in the capital of her nation. There were swastika symbols from Asia, Europe, Africa and the three Americas. A number were artistic, especially those wrought in pearl and the precious metals, for Queen Tussica was an archaeologist, and she may have had copies of this prehistoric symbol from our own magic island, Santa Catalina, thirty-two miles south of San Pedro, on the California coast. That is, there was once a vast continent large enough to include all Polynesia, as that host of islands now exists on the wonder book, Oahspe is fiction.

And then, Henry O. Forbes, Smithsonian Reports for 1894, in his treatise on "Antarctica: A Vanished Austral Land," is in error if the land never existed. But he is not mistaken because he gives proof. And the languages of the natives of Polynesia also give proof. So do the traditions, buildings and religions of Peru, Yucatan and ancient Mexico. And statuary exhumed in Polynesia also proves that a race of sculptors once lived there, able to hew obdurate stone.

On July 2-3, I made an archaeological expedition to a very ancient cave temple on Catalina in the wilderness, sixteen miles from Avalon. The cave is under a broad and high facade of very hard

stone. This, and the ledges of rock roundabout the entrance, and the stone roof within, are painted here and there, in dull red prehistoric characters in that world-wide sun worship paint cinnabar, an ore of quicksilver.

I discovered four rude swastikas in the midst of these glyphs. One is exactly in position where rays from the sun in its rising falls upon it. The rich symbolism of the swastika has made circuit of the globe. I stood within one of the most ancient cave temples. The swastikas are similar to those on the temple of Mayapan in Yucatan, in New Mexico, Arizona and Ohio.

Solar disks with flaming rays are also on the facade, in deep red cinnabar, one of the most durable pigments known. I have seen it on mummy cases from Egypt that are known to be more than four thousand years of age. All races once worshipped the sun and millions do now. But they all used cinnabar when able to get it, for decorating temples and altars to the sun.

The swastika, a cross of arms or bars, is the oldest symbol of man. Its origin is the crossing of the equator by the sun at the equinoxes, the vernal being left, East, spring, sunrise, female and negative; the autumnal, right, West, autumn, sunset, male and positive. A fascinating book could be filled with the esoteric symbolism of the venerable swastika.

It will be remembered that the use of this symbol suddenly spread all over the country a few years ago. This was because Kasko, an Indian in the employ of P. E. Kern & Co., Skagway, Alaska, began manufacturing them for tourists from gold nuggets. I saw them at work in Skagway. J. C. Bloom & Co., Denver, make swastikas, and also imitate the ancient colors. "Good luck" represents perhaps a hundredth part of the true meaning.

### Live Your Own Life.

these negative suggestions, thoughts (mostly from outside yourself at first) and feelings are not allowed to leave their impress upon your subconsciousness.

What would you think of a captain who turned his ship away from the open channel and endeavored to run it where there were rocks on every side? That is what you are doing when as captain of your own life forces you allow them to be centered on these negative suggestions which come to you from the outside.

The law of Life is health, harmony, joy. All nature seeks to heal. When you realize this you will not find it so difficult to cultivate fearlessness and self-reliance.

When you sit on the throne of your own life and realize something of self-reliance, you will question each suggestion that comes to you from the outside, and decide whether or not it is desirable to admit it into close relationship with your consciousness. You will be "captain of your soul" and make the decision for yourself. You will not be constantly seeking, striving, searching, planning for something or some one to lean upon. - Nearly three hundred years ago a party of Breton sailors were beating up the broad St. Lawrence river in the midst of a terrific storm which threatened shipwreck to their light When the tempest was at its height, they vowed to build a shrine to their patron saint, St. Anne d'Auray, should she guide them safely to port. (St. Anne was the mother of Mary, hence the grandmother of Jesus.) These sailors landed at what is now St. Anne de Beaupré, near the present site of the magnificent church, which hundreds of thousands of pilgrims, curiosity seekers and devout Catholics annually visit.
- \* \* \* In 1670 there was brought from France a relic-a bone-of St. Anne, so tradition says, to be kept at the new shrine, St. Anne de Beaupré. It is said that hundreds of the lame, halt and blind who visit this shrine each year, leave their ills at the church door, after having prayed to the good St. Anne. Around four pillars near the door are stacked innumerable crutches from floor to lofty ceiling, these having been left, we were told, since the first of the year by grateful ones who had been healed at the shrine. Outside the church we found a booth where the ubiquitous colored post cards were for sale, also souve-

nirs of the church, including tiny images of various saints, which were supposed to bring you good luck if you carried them in your pocket.

\* \* \* St. Anne is located twentyone miles below Quebec in the beautiful fertile St. Lawrence valley. We took the electric train at Quebec, and after five minutes' ride found ourselves in the open country, where all the little houses and barns looked quaint and foreign, and each green acre, or half acre, was carefully, primly fenced with a wooden rail fence, extending as far down towards the river as the land could be cultivated. On the upper end of each of these oblong squares stood a tiny house, with its roof curving up toward the bottom and barn and other outbuildings nestling under a high bank which may have been the river bank away back in the past. This bank seemed to extend nearly or quite twenty-one miles down the valley to St. Anne. And it looked for all the world like one long village street the entire distance. We could not tell where one village left off and another commenced. And nowhere were the houses scattered, but always one house and barn to each little square lot, and the lots extended in a straight row along the river bank for practically the entire distance. Back of these houses the ground ascended to a dense woods, but no houses were visible except along the one straight street. The land here appears very fertile, and the farmers were cutting an abundance of second crop hay. They used the funniest little two wheeled one horse carts for drawing it to the barn. Each cart would hold about four or five respectable tumbles, I should think.

After the load was on if they happened to want the horse for something else before going to the barn, they took him out and the cart and load tipped upbackward, the shafts going up into the air at an angle of about forty-five degrees and the back end of the load striking the earth. When ready to put the horse in again they simply reached up and grasped a shaft and brought the cart and load back to a level position. No wonder the horses all looked sleek and fat if they never draw heavier loads than those we saw. Frequently the women worked side by side with the men in the fields, and there were hosts of children who in many instances were conducting the haying by themselves, amidst great jollity, and with the assistance of numerous dogs. I could not conceive of a more quaint, interesting place in which to lead the simple life than amid these descendants of the simple Breton folk who founded St. Anne nearly three hundred years ago.

THE AURIC ENVELOPE: ITS COLORS.

Of all the colors radiating throughout the aura, red and green have the most widely varying significations according to their purity or degradation. When these forces are uncontrolled, they become "the red and green monsters within us."

Under the present conditions of life—the average of racial development—exposure to sunlight is believed to be the principle factor affecting the complexion of people; black, brown, olive, and copper-hued races originating in tropic zones; and Occultists do not consider the color of the skin any criterion of the mental or spiritual state of the man within. Though he were white-skinned, the aura of a very vicious man will be a brown-red, or a hot black; the extreme antithesis of the dazzlingly luminous

one surrounding an adept, which "shines with a sun-like splendor far beyond all imagination in its glorious loveliness."

The adept's Causal body is not only much larger than that of the less developed but its colors are differently arranged. Mr. Leadbeater says, "These no longer move in whirling clouds, but are in great concentric shells, yet penetrated everywhere by radiations of living light always pouring forth from him as a center. The order of the colors differs according to the type to which the adept belongs, so that there are several well-marked varieties amid their glory."

Absolutely unselfish love expresses itself in a lovely rose-color, and when it is exceptionally brilliant and tinged with violet, it indicates spiritual love of humanity and exalted maternal affection. Pure crimson denotes less elevated love; jealousy tinges it with brown, and selfishness mingles clouds of dull grayed green which sink below, while pride degrades it with orange. All heat and passion flush the aura with outbursts of red from the brilliant scarlet of righteous indignation to the lurid flame-color which cuts acutest triangular flashes through black hate-forms. Dark, dull red is passionate and earthy when not malevolent. After fits of passionate anger, Mr. Leadbeater says, "Terrible thought-forms of hate may be seen floating like coils of heavy poisonous snakes in a man's aura."

The variety of green in the visible world is exactly typical of the versatile human characteristics which this color manifests. Its prevalence in the aura indieates strong personality, adaptability, and too often selfishness. But these traits may be high or low according to the shade and hue. Grayed and browned hues signify that shifting indecision which is all things to all men: really a selfish cowardice ever seeking its own ends, having evolved no principles beyond desiring the obvious advantage of the moment. This green abounds in the auras of those who permit others to do their thinking for them. Selfishness varies from brown-gray to bottle-green, and is, alas! very common in the desire sheath.

Green is pre-eminently a material color, and "greenbacks" are aptly tinted and named, for the financial currents of the earth are deep, bright grass green. Purely material phases of intellectuality, the brains that are absorbed in things external, cram with book-knowledge of the day, with statistics and crude facts, send forth vibrations of bright green.

Strong self-consciousness, the sense of personality, is vivid, clear green; and according to the striving for growth, the hope and aspiration felt, may shade from apple to emerald. Where soulconsciousness and individuality—as distinct from personality—develop, the green changes through peacock-blue to deep, luminous sapphire. Higher mental qualities which bring distinction in the arts and are nourished from springs of intuition vibrate in this exquisite azure.

All the music of the spheres vibrates in the indigo-blue of Akâsha, in which are all colors and out of which they flow. With respect to music and other arts, Mme. Blavatsky says they are the children of either the Higher Manasic or Kâma-Manasic principle proportionately as Soul or technicality predominates. Thus there will be more red and green in the aura of the technique devotee than blue.

Pure deep blue indicates devotion; pale sapphire, spiritual perception; and the light hues, as turquoise, cobalt, and robin's egg, exalted ideals and emotions. Yet blue, too, may be degraded. If grayed or muddied, the religious devotion is mere bigotry or selfish fear. Sudden fright casts a ghastly livid-gray veil over all.

It is almost superfluous to remind the student of the lofty character of yellow, or of its beneficial effects when prevalent in the aura. It spreads the joyous contagion of its own vitality, calming and stimulating at one and the same time as effectually as the gloomy, pernicious gray of depression exhausts and disturbs. So if you would benefit your fellows, see to it first of all that you radiate health-giving colors from your aura.

Not until the Causal body is developed sufficiently to control Lower Manas and Kâma, does this beneficent and forceful current find a favorable medium through which to act. The prevalence of clear, deep yellow and good pure green in the aura indicate a happy, generous, sympathetic and hopeful character evolving to higher states.

Yellow manifests the highest and noblest intellectual effort, true wisdom and aspiration, freed from objective, material striving, and therefore represents the highest power and loftiest aspect of spirituality which our race is capable of grasping and understanding. The positive power of this Principle is proved by its dominance over all other colors with which it is blended. Pride vibrates as orange, but in the degrees that the red is shaken out of it, is it raised to pure

aspiration.

Because of its penetrative power, yellow is the color most easily perceived by normal sight; and it has been visible as a veritable halo round the heads of speakers engaged in some supreme effort of enthusiasm which freed the soul to its fullest expression. In such cases the vigor of the astral vibrations rouses "a sympathetic vibration even in the coarse and heavy matter of the physical plane."

Exalted spiritual vibrations cause a violet cloud to rise from the crown of the head in the midst of surrounding yellow of a luminous tint, and the violet sparkles through and through with

golden specks.

Although the colors of all these auras are as constantly shifting and changing as the waters in the seething whirlpool at Niagara, the particles pulsating with inconceivable velocity, yet yellow, rose, blue and violet if present, are always found in the upper part of the aura about the head and shoulders; while red, from pure crimson to its hot, lurid hues, radiates midway, from shoulders to thighs; and the debased colors of debasing qualities are below. The purer the color the higher; thus most greens and deep orange are about the feet and lower limbs; but the pure green of versatility and sympathy is seen above the shoulders.

The all-penetrating, all-permeating force, binding all together, the aural light, is the manifestation of the Spirit within, which forms the "Envelope" or "Egg," and appears as a faintly luminous silver-blue-violet shadow, irradiated with the hue which gives the key to the individual. The more highly developed the person, the more distinct is this hue, the unmistakable mark of the ruling hierarchy, and the evidence of the presence of the special ray connecting every individual soul with its hierarchy.

Even a slight understanding of the nature of the influences with which men people the contiguous astral realm, influences which are constantly affecting man for good or ill, according to the nature of the thoughts and desires which he permits to dwell in his consciousness, would inevitably increase the sense of responsibility as to the purity and elevation of his habitual thoughts and aims.

Ignoble thoughts, selfish, jealous, or passionate thoughts, or the stings of deadly hatred, enter only the centers where like thoughts hold sway. So he who indulges such polluting, discordant thoughts draws added incentive to his own evil thinking, while heaping on fuel to that of his fellows. It is through the medium of astral matter that all our thoughts vibrate. They take form there instantly and change with the utmost rapidity, seeking always their affinity or pursuing the direction in which they are consciously sent. Every unselfish emotion purifies all the vibrations as pure air clears a smoky atmosphere. Loving thoughts help all the region through which they pass.

You see there are thought-forms just as there are tone-and voice-forms. Mrs. Besant puts this very strongly, and says thoughts may be angels or devils, and man is held responsible [not by a vengeful God but by Law] for their creation. And she gives this comforting thought: "Many a mother's loving prayers go to hover round her son as angel-forms, turning aside from him evil influences that perchance his own thoughts are attracting" (Ancient Wisdom. Pages 77-81).

The outflow of spiritual or psychic energy from the auras of those who through ceaseless aspiration are advancing rapidly on the Path is of marvelous potency. There is scarce a limit to be placed upon the beneficence of such characters, of the effect of their work and influence; their mere presence is felt as an inspiration, as a healing blessing. Aspiration is the exercise of the Soul, through which it grows to heights invisible. Who can doubt that the present awakening of the public conscience, the great moral wave sweeping round the world, is due to the pure vibrations emanating from the ever-increasing army of those who have come under the great Light through the widespread teaching of the Power of Thought to manipulate Life's Forces? It is the real "Life Science," explaining God's purpose and his Laws.

### CHAPTER V. DIVINATION.

Divination from the standpoint of occult psychology which is, strictly speaking, the viewpoint of science, differs widely from necromancy and sorcery as exploited by the Ancients. It is not a weird, uncanny performance of black magicians, concentrating on a black spot, or a mysterious mumbling of cabalistic words, nor utterances of sibyls, whose senses have been drugged into unconscious trance or whirled into oblivion or ecstasy by the maddening dance. Indeed, there is no consulting of entrails by high priests or flight of birds by soothsayers, nor even of stars or strange phenomena of nature. Black magic, in any form, is not divination. To divine, one must be a seer or prophet, whose spirit is exalted to a state of illumination. This, like seership which the learned Swedenborg possessed, one can divine by the stars, it is true, but astrology is a branch of occult science which deals with stellar signs, while divination is a form of clairvoyance which deals with the supernormal activities. To divine is to know life as from the astral book, as Jesus knew the woman of Samaria (John 4), and to know life by divinity and not by reason or experience or any sentient faculty. When Paul wrote in Corinthians that it is the spirit of a man that knows the things of God, he implied that God in man knows the man in God.

might say that intuition is divination and yet while that is not strictly true, they are not opposed to each other. Diviners of old exploited their powers much as mediums today. Few realized that it was God or the spirit of God in them that enabled them to divine. Intuition is the oracle of Divinity which reveals truth to the intelligence, but divination foretells prophesies, forecasts events and reads the enfolded, occult things of one's life.

In order to practice divination, one must become familiar with spiritual laws. The first law is that all things which are to ever happen are potenially in life now and here. The second law is that Spirit, not the ego immured in the senses, not the sensuous mind at all, can know the order before it manifests itself.

In order to practice divination one must put himself in an attitude of childlike purity and saint-like humility to receive or see the supernormal silhouette of anyone's life or of public life in any phase, before they are actualized or given historical shapes. The mind must be trained to introspection and sublime meditation. The will must be measurably free. The intellect must be pure and devoid of prejudice. The heart should be cleaned and not obsessed by desire or appetite. If these conditions are complied with, it will be strange if the inner workings of the spirit are not laid bare, so that one can divine.

## Unlocking Men's Energies.

Practically every one knows in his own person the difference between the days when the tide of this energy is high in him and those when it is low; though no one knows exactly what reality the term energy covers when used here; or what its tides, tensions, and levels are in themselves. . . . . . . .

One can be in what I might call "efficiency—equilibrium" (neither gaining nor losing power when once the equilibrium is reached) on astonishingly different quantities of work, no matter in what dimension the work may be measured. It may be physical work, intellectual work, moral work, or spiritual work. Of course there are limits; the trees don't grow into the sky. But the plain facts remain that men the world over possess amounts of resource, which only very exceptional individuals push to their extremes of use. . . . . . .

There are in everyone potential forms of activity that actually are shunted out of use. The existence of reservoirs of energy that habitually are not tapped is most familiar to us in the phenomenon of "second wind." Ordinarily we stop when we meet the first effective layer, so to call it, of fatigue. We have then walked, played, or worked "enough," and desist. That amount of fatigue is an efficacious obstruction, on this side of which our usual life is cast. But if an unusual necessity forces us to press onward, a surprising thing occurs. The fatigue gets worse up to a certain critical point, when gradually or suddenly it passes away, and we are fresher than before. We have evidently tapped a level of new energy, masked until then by the fatigue-obstacle usually obeyed. There may be layer after layer of this experience. A third and a fourth "wind" may supervene.

Mental activity shows the phenomenon as well as physical; and in exceptional cases we may find, beyond the very extremity of fatigue distress, amounts of ease and power that we never dreamed ourselves to own; sources of strength habitually not taxed at all; because habitually we never push through the obstruction, never pass those early critical points.

The arrests for the first sixteen days of no-license were thirty-nine, while the number for the same period a year ago was 228.—Holyoke Transcript.

A remarkable petition has just been sent to Washington, to the forest service, from nearly 1,400 school children in northern California, asking for the establishment of a redwood national park. This petition which is from the children of the schools of Eureka, Humboldt county, Cal., is unlike any other which has ever been sent to a government department to ask for the preservation of forests.—Springfield Republican.

Mrs. Clarence H. Mackay, who has been so prominent in school reforms of various kinds in Roslyn, L. I., and a school trustee for the past three years, has just been elected a member of the local board of trade.—Springfield Republican.

New York state is doing wisely in establishing a state farm for women serving out sentences in penitentiaries and confined in almshouses. The excellent effect of health and morals induced in caring for fowls, working in the field and garden for both men and women prisoners has been noted again and again. In Europe employing convicts in agriculture has long been recognized as a remedial agent. In this country also it has been used with good effect.—Springfield Republican.

By the addition of \$5,000,000 to the \$10,000,000 which he gave three years ago to establish the Carnegie Foundation for a retiring allowance to teachers in colleges and universities, Mr. Andrew Carnegie has provided for the extension of the benefits of the fund to teachers in state universities, who were not included in the original plans. The faculties of nearly forty institutions are affected by this gift.—The Youth's Companion.

The following is from an article that appeared in the Scientific American Supplement, of October 27, 1900. It is from an article written by Dr. Inazo Nitobe, of Sapporo, Japan. "So, in the Shinto shrine you see no image no idol; only a mirror hanging in the midst of the temple; and the idea is, that if you look at the mirror and see your image reflected there, you see God; because God is nowhere but in you. Look in the mirror, look at yourself; there is God. It is simple; very simple."

And it is simple-this believing in the Inner Light. Just as simple as everything else in Nature. There are no difficult problems to solve in Nature; all its laws are extremely simple and easily carried out. All that is required is patience and perseverance, and a constant looking to the within for the Inner Light that will

It is called the Silence because the outer mind must be stilled before we can enter the inner state. But do not make the mistake of trying to shut out the external. In trying to do this you center the mind on the external, and it is impossible to still the outer mind by thinking of it. Turn your whole attention to the within.






