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

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is static, except as outside stimulus sets it in motion; and only as it moves do we feel the pleasurable sensations of health, happiness and success.

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This is why drudgery kills people, and new thought saves them.

New thought gives them a new point of view, and stores new batteries. They see their work in a new light, and therefore get a new stimulus from it, a new connection, a new touch.

There is a limit to the capacity for routine and drudgery in every individual. This work limit varies in different people, of course. But the limit is somewhere in every human being. No person can recover from depletion without change of activity.

In other words, if you had to work at that farm work all day and all night, how long could you live? Only a few days. Your batteries would be completely exhausted, and you would cease to react at all. If you were working hard this way, day and night, you might last longer than your husband, or vice versa. The limit is different in each individual. But in every individual is the limit beyond which he cannot go and retain his body.

A Vacation A Day. You have exhausted yourself so far that it is doubtful if you can react without giving yourself a

physical change, to relieve your mind

that it may bound back again to its normal state; to permit your storage batteries to fill up again.

The person who lives normally takes most of his vacations in short periods every day. If you could pitch in and work hard at your routine for eight hours a day, and then hop into an automobile with your husband and skip off to the nearest city and hear a good opera or some delightful lecture on a subject that you want to know about, or go to a card party with a lot of friends, you could go on doing your routine work year in and year out without being depleted.

New thought people are quite apt to sneer at so-called "society" as frivolous. Social life is just as necessary and life-giving as useful work or a set of new thought lectures—provided it is sandwiched in between useful work and high thinking, instead of being pursued as a business in itself.

Social intercourse stimulates nerves and stores brain centers that are never touched or used in ordinary work or in communion with oneself or with books.

All sides of life should be cultivated, all sides should have exercise every day, or at least every few days.

Hire somebody to help, and both of you get away from the farm at frequent intervals, and get lost in something different.

Discouraged Desire. Follow your desires into all sorts of new fields. Desire will guide you, unless you have si-

lenced it under too much routine.

In that case you will have to "lay

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for your desires" and gratify them as fast as they crop up, no matter how foolish the desires may seem. Keep on encouraging your desires by "laying for them" and gratifying them all. After a time they will come back again to normal functioning, and will be infallible guides to what is best for you and yours, best for your self-development.

And the development of self is all you can give to the world—every developed soul radiates life and inspiration to others.

Discontent and bad temper are simply discouraged desires — desires squelched until at last they are cross and sulky.

You just make your business to lay for your desires and gratify them as fast as they come up, no matter how whimsical or expensive they seem, and you will quickly find your equilibrium again.

Drop the work-leave the beds unmade, and the dishes unwashed, and the meals uncooked-let your husband get his own meals or go without-live on baker's bread-or on boiled wheat and milk and syrup. Nothing more wholesome than the latter, by the way. Cut your work down, and make time to get away on some kind of a vacation. If it is truly impossible to go away for a month, then take a vacation every other day or take one whole day a week, and several hour-vacations every day. Let go and rest there, and let your giving out come in answer to desire, all in new directions. your farm work to an absolute minimum for a while, no matter what people think or how things look.

This is not impractical nonsense, dearie, it is the most important thing in the world to you, and to your husband, and to everybody whose life your life touches. Do it.

You cannot make high thinking take the place of change of activities, except in a very limited degree, and for a short time.

High thinking with soul in it is dependent upon right physical stimulus, and all-around high thinking of the educational sort you want is dependent upon all-around physical activity, all-round physical touch with the whole world about you.

There must be an interchange of ideas between your world and your soul.

At the last convention of the National Education Association in Boston Mrs. Young was elected president of that association on this platform: "We are presenting her not as a woman but as the best human being for the presidency of this association."

So Mrs. Young's ideas and influence will go on through the N. E. A. to every public school in the United States. We are in the midst of a sunrise of practical idealism. The public schools under Mrs. Young are a great force which makes for true socialism.

And here and there over the country are many other private schools which are working for the same ends. Such is the Stout Institute which makes teachers that make the man and woman of tomorrow.

Just one generation of children trained according to Mrs. Young's vision, and we shall have the full Millennial Day. Think of that!

What You Can

Read all these things and get enthused with the spirit which is making the man and

woman of tomorrow. Look into the schools in your own city. Use your power to wipe politics out of school affairs, to see that the best superintendent of schools obtainable is secured, and that he is made responsible for the entire school or schools and given a free hand in the selection and management of teachers. See that he is a man in line with Ella Flagg Young and Mrs. Parsons, and the Stout Institute, a man who is devoted to the highest ideals and who loves children. The key in your city is the superintendent of schools. Get the best you can possibly afford.

See that you have public playgrounds in your city or town, with the right kind of playmasters to direct the children.

See that you have a Boys' Club to supply the heart-side and the art-side of training to the children of squalid homes.

See that your schoolhouses are put to good use as civic centers where the parents may meet and learn as the chil-

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dren do. Use your schools at night as neighboorhood club houses, as many of the eastern cities and towns are doing; as the New England country villages have always done.

Ask the Spirit what you can do. Help the schools and the playgrounds and the Boys' Club, instead of standing off and criticizing. See that you don't neglect your social duties for your home!

Ask the One Spirit what you can do to make the world One in social body as it is in spirit. Keep on asking until you receive the answer. Then, if at first you don't succeed, try, try again!

Now let's all pull together for the Millennium.

And This!

In order to have right schools you must have right politics. There is no

way around this. Corrupt politics means corruption on the school board, a superintendent whose allegiance is owned by the book concerns and his own private aims.

This means that the city superintendent is either owned by the school board, and the teachers are appointed through personal preference, or else he is continually at war with the school board over the board's appointment of incompetent teachers. In either event there is no peace and no progress for the schools.

There is just one thing at the bottom of all the political deals in this country, and that is bi-party politics. The two parties combine, elect some of the officers from each party, and the Republicans shut their eyes to the grafting of the Democrats, and vice versa. Then

all the petty offices are filled by private pull. Incompetents or worse are put into office for the number of friendly votes they can bring. Others are put in or kept in because they know too much to be turned out. And from the top to the bottom little is considered except petty pulls and private profit.

The office holders are not working for the people but for themselves. They couldn't get their graft except for the bi-party arrangement so of course they work for the machine. This means that they help every other officer and appointee to get what he wants out of the public crib.

The bi-party political machine is a school for the turning out of public pick-pockets. Even an honorable man will be corrupted to a certain extent by such politics. If he doesn't pull and be pulled on money he does it on friend-ship, and he deliberately winks while his neighbors waste the public funds in a way that no man would waste them if the public business were his own private affair. If he doesn't graft himself he winks at it in the other members of the machine.

The Cure.

The only cure for this is Publicity. And there can be no real publicity as

long as there are party primaries where the deals are made. We must have all officers elected at large and no ward politics. And we must have the referendum and recall.

For the United States Government we must have senators elected directly by the people, no government elections at the same time as state elections, and

we must have public nominations.

Everything must be done openly and above board, every candidate must be thoroughly well advertised so that the people may know for whom they are voting, and every candidate must be publicly pledged for the right measures. Given these requisites and you may depend that the voice of the people is the voice of God.

The right man will get into office and he will work for the right measures. Only by eliminating the intermediaries between the people and the candidate can the candidate be made to realize that he is working for the people, that he gets his pay from the people.

Here's to publicity that will burn out craft and graft!

Gay Paris. Eiffel

We ascended the Eiffel Tower in Paris. Unless you get hold of just the

right kind of picture and study it carefully you have no conception how the height of this tower dominates the whole country. If you have steady nerves you can afford to go up to the top and look off. Paris lies all around you at your feet, her tallest buildings—dwarfed into insignificance, her moving people mere ants, her wonderful Seine a curving drab ribbon slotted with many beautiful stone bridges.

Paris is a walled city. There are thirty-eight miles of masonry surrounding her, still in use. Three million people live inside these walls, and there is no entrance or exit except through the guarded gates.

Just outside the walls on the west runs the magnificent boulevard, the Bois de Boulogne. On the east side the old moat still shows, the bed of which is now used for drill grounds. No structures of stone or brick are allowed within sixteen hundred feet of the walls of Paris. The moat and walls of course are useless for purposes of defense. They can never be of service again to protect the city from invasion.

What to do with this sixteen hundred foot strip of land all around the city is the question. They are planning to run a magnificent boulevard entirely around the city, and perhaps the expense of making this will be met or partially met by selling off the balance of the sixteen hundred foot strip. They want a curved boulevard thirty-eight miles long, a magnificent boulevard like the Bois.

On the east side of the city now stands

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innumerable little wooden houses where the million or two poor people live. A guide told us that outside the walls of Paris, crowded as close to the line as possible, built solidly, there are the homes of three million people. So if the Paris wall were done away with Paris would be a solid city of six million people, as large as London, and covering much less territory. Only the three million people count who are crowded inside the walls.

The only use now made of the walls is to keep people from smuggling in taxable goods. When we started for the forest and palace of Fountainebleau, in the big American Express Company's touring limousine, we were halted at the gates and our gasoline measured. When we came in again at night we were again halted and our gasoline measured. We asked the courier about it and he said that for every extra gallon of gasoline that they brought into the city they had to pay twenty cents.

Things which are brought into Paris are all heavily taxed, and these taxes go to keep up the wonderful old city. We found that we could buy French things in Brussels at from twenty per cent to forty per cent less than in Paris itself. Brussels was the finest shopping city we found anywhere on the continent, the nicest shops, the Frenchiest things, at the most reasonable prices.

Trees in Europe. There are splendid trees in Paris and around it, the big horse-chestnut predominating. And

they have a funny fashion over there of cutting back their trees in the country every year so that in the spring you see only the great stub sticking up out of the ground eight or ten feet with a big knotty place on the top of it. Out of this knotty knob spring a hundred or so shoots which are allowed to grow all summer and perhaps until the next spring. Then they are all cut off again and used for fagots, or possibly for some other purpose which we did not discover. The trees have a queer dwarfed look, but I surmise that in a closely settled country it is necessary to cut the trees back like this in order to allow the sunshine necessary for the crops. It is likewise necessary to use every shoot for some special pur-The American who has seen France must find his heart bleeding at the waste of trees which goes on in America. We saw large trees in France but nothing wonderful. And everybody kept telling us that in the forest of Fountainebleau we would see marvelous trees, giants. But when we got to the forest itself they told us that in order to see the giant trees we would have to stay over and walk way back into the depths of the forest.

As it was, we saw no trees in France nor in any other country we visited which began to compare with the wonderful trees in America. The largest we saw over there would look like saplings beside the redwoods of California, or the firs of Oregon. And the wonderful old English elms proved to be not nearly so large or graceful as the elms of New England, which sprang from them. English elms are very old and gnarly. The English are proud of the "artistic shapes" of their elms. To us many of them look grotesque.



The palace of Fountainebleau is thirtyeight, miles from

eight miles from the gates of Paris,

and the road runs as the crow flies. Nearly half the way we ran over those fierce stone blocks that are as bad as cobblestones or corduroy. But tall trees shaded the way on either side, and in spots there were two rows on each side. The fields and pastures were green, the houses quaint, pink-roofed and neat. But none of the land has the thrifty, rich, well-nurtured look that England bears. Rural France is comparatively poor.

We passed through miles of the sort of land which you see pictured in Millet's "The Angelus," and "The Gleaners."

And we came to the little town of Barbizon which was the rendezvous of Millet, Corot and their cronies, designated in the history of art as the Barbizon school. We saw the very scenes immortalized in their paintings. We saw some of their homes in the little town. We saw the wonderful trees, the lakes, rocks, the grotesque things, the plains,

the hills, and the same stolid laborers that are forever immortalized in the art of these Barbizon painters. Many of the paintings themselves we saw in the Louvre, and in the other galleries of Europe and England.

Barbizon stands out as the most attractive and typical French town which


we saw. No wonder the great painters made it their rendezvous. It is situated in the very heart of the Fountainebleau forest, and even in our hasty trip through we saw more quaint, beautiful and curious bits of landscape, waterscape, and treescape than in the same amount of territory anywhere else.

One of the quaint things there is the twin tree, or "the charmed tree." Two trees of different kinds growing side by side, a branch of one tree having grown entirely through the trunk of the other. The limb which passes through that tree and out at the other side bears leaves of both kinds of trees. We did not see this curious twin tree but we brought home a picture of it.

In one direction is a curious rocky canon, a small picture of which appears in this number of *The Nautilus*. The trees are very old and gnarled, and charming roads wind away on every hand.

How To Teach Without Friction.

THE TEACHER'S PERSONALITY—HARMONY AN ALL IMPORTANT ESSENTIAL—OTHER REQUISITES—THE RIGHT SORT OF LOVE—WHAT GOD IS TO CHILDREN.

In a very able article which appeared in Harper's some years ago on "What Makes a Teacher" the author, George Herbert Palmer, made three or four essentials depend-

ent on the teacher's personality and only one on his knowledge. In view of this, and of the importance which other eminent educators attach to the character of the teacher, I do not feel that I am establishing a precedent in coming at once to the discussion of the teacher's personality. Any educated person who has the ability to express himself in intelligible language is, of course, capable of imparting information, is able to teach facts and expound theories; but there is something vastly more than this in being a teacher, and it is with this something which distinguishes the real teacher from the spurious one that I have to deal.

All teachers will admit, I am sure, that one of their most important tasks is the establishing of a harmonious relation between themselves and their young charges. As order is the first condition

for good work, so also is harmony the first essential.

I do not think one can overestimate the value of friendly relations between employer and employee, mistress and maid, teacher and pupil. In each of these relations it is necessary for one to control and the other to be controlled. It is not an easy or a pleasant thing (and it is daily becoming harder and more unpleasant as we are glimpsing the potential powers of the individual) to lay down one's will at the word of another. But there is an anodyne which transmutes this painful process into something positively pleasant, so that one can not only lay down one's will but actually delight in the doing of it. This anodyne has existed since the beginning of time and has been known to the choice souls of every century, but it was the gentle Savior who published its virtues to the world and taught the method of using it in such simple words that a child may comprehend them. name of this anodyne is love, and those who undertake the subjection of another spirit without it are like a doctor going into an operating room without an anæsthetic,-it may be they can perform the operation successfully, but fearful pain will result.

I do not believe any teacher deserves

the name of educator who does not love her pupils and her work. When I speak of "love" I mean, in Mrs. Towne's words, not "sentimental gush, but divine emotion," and used in this sense I consider it an indispensable factor in education.

It would no doubt be very interesting to go back through our lives and note the number of persons who have professed to love us and the various ways in which their love was manifested. We would see that some of them were insincere, some unstable, some well-meaning but unwise, and so on down the list; but I am sure we would find that in every case the love which was of help to us was love for that imperishable part of us called the soul.

There is a great deal of so-called love which leaves a brown taste in the mouth. It is like an intoxicant which gives us a few hours of pleasure and then abandons us to a dejected and disillusioned awakening. But now and then on the road of life we meet a friend who looks beneath our surface qualities and discovers that in the heart of us there is the germ of a god. In some dark corner of our being, buried perhaps beneath accumulations of debris, there glows the spark of aspiration, and the real friend tends and feeds this spark till it has grown into a light great enough to disclose to us our wonderful destiny. This is the kind of love that wins our everlasting gratitude.

For we are spirits, not bodies. We are sons and daughters of God who have wandered from our Father's dwelling and hidden in the deepest recesses of our consciousness are memories of the home we have left. We are ever hungering for the heavenly manna. If we were not of noble birth, we should laugh to scorn the messengers who come to tell us of our heritage, but in our hearts we know we are divine, and when they come

to us, speaking the language of our Father's Court, some latent memory stirs within us and we cry "Yes, I know I am immortal. I know there is nothing on earth which can satisfy my craving because the things for which I long are not material, but spiritual. I hunger for the Kingdom of God and its righteousness. Show me the way hence and I will gladly follow you."

It is with this hidden, interior life that the teacher has to deal and in order to come to her work with the proper dispositions she must be a "born discerner of spirits."

The ideal teacher is not given to admirations of a particular sort. She does not "adore" dark eyes and dislike blue ones. She does not go into raptures over golden hair and look with indifferent eyes on locks of brown. She does not lavish her attentions on her brightest, most vivacious pupils and leave the backward ones to shrink still farther into their shells. She does not shiver when a dirty child approaches her; rather she attracts it and tries to teach it cleanliness by allowing it to note the difference between her immaculate attire and its soiled raiment. In short, she is not hyper-critical, but is made up so entirely of admirations that no matter how poor or insignificant a child may be she can discover some present or potential good in him.

She has amity for all sorts of persons and praise for every kind of loveliness.

There is a large unselfishness about her which makes her delight in good wherever she beholds it. Her pupils love her, but they never look to her for a particular or exclusive affection. It is part of her charm that she loves them all,—loves all goodness, all heroism, all beauty, all truth.

She is firm, constant, self-poised, "wise as a serpent, tender as a dove." Children cannot apprehend the nature

of God. To tell them that He is eternal and unchangeable, all-wise, powerful and loving adds but little to their conception of Him. But they sense Him through the characters of the noble men and women they meet. And when they come into daily contact with a nature sane and sweet, in which there is neither dissimulation nor fear, they feel behind that personality a strength which whispers to them of the Infinite. Nothing I have seen in the natural world nor any argument advanced by any thologian speaks to me so convincingly of the existence of God as do the characters of the best men and women I have known. For how could their lives be so heroic, unselfish, and God-like if they were not fed by a source divine?

Children love the temperamental virtues. They have as yet no passions and no appreciation of self-control per se. Other things being equal, a child might love a glutton or a libertine quite as well as an ascetic or a saint. They have but little mind, and accordingly but little appreciation of mental power, though they may be susceptible to mental charm. They are almost entirely heart and soul and they love the qualities which are the outcome of development

along these lines. Dignity awes, but cannot subjugate them; in fact, they give their hearts into the keeping of none save those who have preserved the secret of youth inviolate and who by its aid are enabled to return at will to the enchanted kingdom they have outgrown.

Unless you are some such person as I have described, you will never be in the fullest sense a teacher. You may win wealth and fame in other lines of endeavor and reap a goodly harvest of material blessings, but the schoolroom will never yield you a harvest of hearts. If you have no love for souls; if it is no joy to you to watch a character grow from glory unto glory; if you do not believe that in each of us there is an immortal part and that it is only as life ministers unto the growth of that part that it becomes significant, then your calling is not to teach. But granted that you have these qualities, then the schoolroom may be to you a little kingdom in which you can rule joyously and with benefit to yourself and your youthful subjects.

In my next paper I shall talk of government and explain some principles which my own experience has proved true.

The Psychology of the Solar Plexus.

SEEKING UNFOLDMENT—UNDERSTANDING THE LAW OF OUR OWN BEING—ENERGY A PART OF THE INFINITE SOURCE—UNCONSCIOUS COSMIC UNION—THE SOLAR PLEXUS THE CENTER OF THE SYMPATHETIC NERVOUS SYSTEM.

There are many ways in which the human mind seeks knowledge, but no matter what pathway it chooses, it comes in the end to the finished product of its search, viz: the unfoldment of a perfected harmo-

nious Self-hood.

There are many people who seek unfoldment along the lines of scientific research, and many who seek it along the lines of philosophy; and then again, there are those to whom all life is simply a system of religion and worship. These lines of research all add their mite to the sum total of wisdom, but often after these things have been fully exhausted, we find that there are many things latent within the consciousness which have not yet been answered; we are unsatisfied, and do what we will, the mind remains disquieted and incomplete in its connections until it is linked with the unfathomed laws of the psychology within itself.

Science, from the plane of Science, is wonderful, and fascinates us with its far-reaching laws of material relationships. Philosophy, from the level of philosophy, is fascinating also, and leads us through a labyrinth of conclusions and deductions more or less purposeful, but after a while all these conclusions connect us with other lines of consciousness which they reveal but do not interpret; and we find that after the last word of science, philosophy and religion have been said, there still appear levels of mental and spiritual expression which have not been included.

Looking at life, then, from the inclusion of a larger spiritual perception, we find that in order to build sublime and lasting interpretations which will stand the test of time, the human mind is called upon to interpret life not alone as a science, philosophy, or even a religion, but in all these ways linked together psychologically, giving the race the example of life as an art.

We cannot know life as an art until we know and include in our conclusions, the action of every phase of human consciousness, both seen and unseen; and then, through higher scientific and philosophical training, based upon finer psychiatry, the race can come into larger methods for human progress, and

through these methods eradicate sin, sickness, poverty and lack of every nature.

In order to know these finer laws of relationship, we must understand not only our own being, but the laws of the universe in which we live. The energy which operates the physical human form is derived from and is a part of the Infinite Source; it is eternally existent as Universal Intelligence. This Intelligence creates and manifests form, in the world of substance around it, in just the degree of harmony and power that the human instrument is attuned to transmit Creative spiritual impulses.

Unless all the states of consciousness and their corresponding cell centers are correlated in perfect at-one-ment, the thing called *life* must take on a perverted form.

New thought recognizes two distinct centers in the physical body through which this Infinite Intelligence manifests, and through these centers the whole physical phenomena of human consciousness is brought about.

Through these two centers we are related first to our source of intelligence, and second, to our environment, and through these centers we also receive, generate and send out thought force, which, embodied in form, becomes the body and the environment.

These centers should normally act together; they have unconscious Cosmic union, and when not broken in their normal chain of functioning, will faithfully perform their work, demanding no attention from us; but to those who have drifted into false plays of consciousness, and broken their own normal union, through negative thinking and destructive acting, they become points of great disturbance, and unless they are regulated and passed back to normal, the result is disorder of body and lasting disease of the mind.

One of these centers is called the brain and the cerebro-spinal system of nerves; the other is known as the solar plexus, or abdominal brain, and the sympathetic system of nerves.

These centers with their connecting nerve fibres, make the physical mechanism for the manifestation of human consciousness or mind. A prolonged break in normal consciousness is followed with a break in the functioning of this chain of physical nerves and centers; and any break in the connecting centers of these systems brings about a corresponding interference in the normal expression of the mind, and thus a vicious cycle is established and maintained, and in order to again move the physical mind and body at its normal expression of health, the union of these psycho-physical nerve centers must be re-established.

The human brain with its system of nerves, is the point of connection between man and the external world of things, and it is with these that we operate our daily affairs. We have physical touch, taste, smell, sensation and motion through these avenues, and without them we would be useless. Children have been born and lived a year without a brain or spinal cord, but they were idiots simply because there were no centers through which normal human consciousness could manifest.

The human brain is the receiving station through which the Ego directs physical action, and the physical body can no more act without it than a piano or violin can play without a player. All conscious life is simply motor response to sensory stimulus, and this stimulus is being received both from within and from without.

The physical brain is filled with idea centers through which intelligence is active, and with these centers intact, we are fit instruments to register all sensation from without, and all emotion, illumination and revelation from within.

In order to understand inner impulses, we must be familiar with the function of the center from which they arise; this center is the solar plexus or abdominal brain, and the sensations are transmitted through its intricate system of ganglions and nerves.

The solar plexus is a large collection of nerve cells, and it forms the great center of nerve-generating energy for the sympathetic nervous system. It is situated at the middle of the upper border of the pancreas. It surrounds the ceoliac axis and root of the superior messentary artery, extending downward as low as the pancreas and outward to the suprarenal capsules.

The solar plexus is whitish gray in coloring, very much fenestrated and flattened in form, and is attached to the second and third sacral nerves of the cerebro-spinal system.

The nervous system accompanying the

solar plexus is a series of other smaller ganglion, connected by intervening cords and extends from the base of the skull to the coccyx, on each side of the middle line of the body, partly in front and partly on each side of the spinal column. The communication between the nerves of the sympathetic centers and the cerebro-spinal system is accomplished by each system throwing out fine nerve tendrils, some passing from the sympathetic to the cerebro-spinal, and from the cerebro-spinal to the sympathetic; and in this way a double exchange takes place between the two systems.

The point of entrance for the life energy into the physical body is through the solar plexus, and it is transmitted over its nerve fibers to the cerebro-spinal nerves through the physical tissues; and while it is in fluidic solution in the body, it brings about the functions called life and consciousness.

The reason the millionaire invests his money in that which benefits society is because it gives him pleasure to invest it that way. Now, there is James H. Stout. When the bottom dropped out of the lumber industry in his section of Wisconsin he might have stored his wealth in a vault under his home at Menomonie. Like a good business man he re-invested it. He kept it working. Out of his income he spends tens of thousands in personal pleasure. He has one of the greatest and one of the most expensive and one of the most fascinating hobbies in the

world. In indulging himself he goes the limit. His hobby is of the limousine and not of the runabout variety.

His hobby, I must tell you, is education. He has made possible that wonderfully efficient school known as the Stout Institute. He has made Menomonie, a little city of six thousand souls, on the Northwestern line, eighty-four miles from St. Paul, the Mecca toward which

educators everywhere turn their heads. Here boys and girls are taught to work with head, hand and heart. One great building houses the Stout Institute which is a training school for teachers, and right next to it is the city school building, which houses the high school and the many grades down to the kindergarten in the sunshiny basement.

Here boys learn manual training in connection with their academic work. They learn how to make things. They sense the joy of liberating creative energy. All boys want to make things. And the school which does not gratify that desire for self-expression in doing things is the wrong kind of a school. Lack of wise self-expression does not result in self-repression but in unwise selfexpression. If the natural channel of a stream is dammed up by us, what right have we to damn the stream because it overflows its banks and wets all our kindling wood in the basement. Animal spirits not directed into creative channels will break out in destruction. Hoodlumism comes from good energy misdirected.

And so I say, up in Menomonie they are teaching boys how to do useful things. They are giving boys a chance to choose a trade. If the boy decides upon a trade he would like to follow, he may elect work in the Stout trade school during the last two years of his high school course. Graduates from this trade school have gone out and done infinitely better work than men who had worked at the trade for years. The reason is, the Stout men are trained scientifically. They learn reasons why. They look for the cause which will produce a desired effect.


Cax Holmes and I were talking just the other day about industrial education. He cited his own experience to illustrate the wisdom of learning the principles which underlie all trades. He once applied for a position as superintendent of printing for a big institution. There were forty applicants. Cax got the place because he knew the

science back of the art of mixing colors. He had gone to Paris for the special purpose of working with artists and learning how to mix colors. Thus, when he desired a certain color of ink for a special job, he knew that forty per cent of one, ten per cent of another, and fifty per cent of a third would produce the desired effect. The untrained man would simply have to experiment until he secured what he desired. Cax didhis like a trained man. And —well, you remember that famous advertising line, "Send for Murphy, he knows."

So, in Menomonie they teach woodworking, blacksmithing, plumbing, cabinet-making, mechanical drawing, designing, and a score of other things, to the boys. For the girls there is the same training if they wish it, but in addition they have domestic science, home-making, kindergarten teaching and the rest. Many of the boys and girls, after finishing the city schools, enter the training school and become teachers after graduation. The Stout Institute is a social center of great worth that prepares men and women so that they, too, may go out and establish other social centers.

This little city has a \$75,000 gymnasium and natatorium, a \$100,000 library and auditorium, an agricultural school and a county normal school. It is one of the biggest little cities in the world. My vagabond journey to Menomomie, Dunn county, Wisconsin, was the richest

I ever made. Every vagabond will find it rich with good things. And a vagabond, you know, is one who in wandering around finds the best in persons, institutions and cities. Menomonie has much that is "best." Go and talk with Senator Stout, Superintendent Harvey, G. L. Bowman, C. F. Niles—the latter is a combination of Robert Louis Stevenson and



remain and worship.

And what is the latest news from this Athens of today? I'll tell you. A few months ago I was sitting quietly and inoffensively in a Pullman car on a western road when I was commanded to tell all about myself, good, bad and indifferent. I took the blow calmly and waited until my inquisitor was seated opposite me. Institute." I knew that would make him leave me alone.

His eyes lit up. Senator Stout is not a talker. He doesn't gush and doesn't want others to gush. He is a business man, silent, efficient, farseeing, gentle and just. But he rides his hobby hard. He loves his great schools. Most of his thought is for them. He is filled with enthusiasm and has a great fund of educational information. I have tapped him before. He knew I was vitally interested in his proposition and in his dreams.

"Our next step is to establish a maternify school," he said. "A while ago we established a home-maker's course. Girls were trained for life in the home. They learned how to do houseworkreal practical, everyday, scientific housework. The course was a success from the start. We emphasized the dignity of housework, showing that the preparation of nutritious food is one of the greatest tasks in the world. We taught the girls how to change a mere house into a real home—a place where folks would love to live. There should be a thousand of those schools-every city should have one.

"And we have now come to the next step. We are about to teach girls how to become true mothers. We are preparing to better the men of tomorrow. To educate the children of today properly we should commence with their grandparents. We cannot do that. But we can do the next best thing and that is to educate the mothers of the men of tomorrow. Than motherhood there is nothing more sacred—nothing that is more divine—nothing that deserves more care. Men and women must be made to see it as it really is and not as it is seen by the masses of today. On this we need education. The public needs more light."

In this school girls will be taught what the Greeks made part of their religionthe sacredness of their bodies. They will learn that the body is the home of this spiritual force which some call the soul, and that a great soul cannot express itself perfectly in an unclean, unhealthy, ill-formed body. They will learn to free themselves of the fetish of false modesty, and they will see that their whole body is sacred and that every part is prepared for natural use. 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Women Directors of the Men of Tomorrow

Mrs. Ella Flagg Young of Chicago is the woman who has established a precedent in that city. She is the first woman to be unanimously appointed superintendent of the public school system in Chicago, and she re-

ceives the satisfactory salary of \$10,000 a year. Although five men of recognized ability were her rivals for the position, the undeniable excellence and originality of Mrs. Young's educational ideas, outlined in a two hours' speech before the fifteen members of the Board of Education, won her a unanimous vote. Her broad grasp of educational affairs, keen insight into the school systems' needs, her tact and the impression of sterling, undaunted power which emanates from her, led President Harper of the Chicago University, always a strong opponent to the appointing of women to important posts, to view her work and personality with large respect, and finally to acknowledge her as one of the finest educators of the day.

Mrs. Young's life work began when, as a girl of seventeen, she entered Chicago's school department as a teacher on the modest salary of \$25 a month. Working her way steadily upward, she

passed from grade to grade till she reached the position of district super-intendent of schools which she held for twelve years. Some years later, the degree of doctor of philosophy was bestowed on her by the University of Chicago, and she was made a professor of pedagogy in that institution. In 1905 she was made head of the Chicago Normal School, which position she held up to the time of her present appointment.

A characteristic incident in connection with her degree of Ph. D., is related. When President Harper offered her a full professorship in the department of education, Mrs. Young declined, because she did not possess a doctor's degree. "Pshaw," said President Harper; "it's the woman, not the degree I want." Notwithstanding this high tribute both to her character and scholarship, Mrs. Young persisted in waiting till the degree had been granted. After it was gained, she occupied a professor's chair for six years. During her term of service, she introduced several innovations, delightful to the students, but looked upon askance by other instructors who were more conservative. One of these was the serving of tea and coffee to the students who met weekly at her house for recitations. When Mrs. Young asked President Harper how this appealed to him, he murmured plaintively: "Good idea! I only wish I had some of it," and remained her loyal friend and stanch supporter in all she did till his death.

Mrs. Young was born sixty-four years ago in Buffalo, but received her early

education in the Chicago public schools. In her long acquaintance with the department both as teacher and pupil she has acquired a personal knowledge of Illinois teachers that is unexampled. It is said that at one time, she knew every teacher in Chicago. In her present position, it is not her aim nor desire to introduce revolutionary methods. She desires only to make the Chicago school system the finest, broadest, possible. Whatever changes are instituted will be along the lines of the cutting out of useless "fads," of emphasizing the necessity for the extension of industrial training, and in giving rigorous attention to the simpler elementary branches. These declarations indicate the large and vital nature of the standard of excellence demanded. While giving herself almost wholly to her work, Mrs. Young is essentially feminine in her love of rare and beautiful objects. Her surroundings in her home show exquisite taste, but her dress, though elegant is marked by extreme simplicity. Her husband, William Young, died shortly after their marriage which was childless. As an example of true and tolerant womanhood in public life, Chicago's woman superintendent of public schools is a shining mark.

It is the optimists who do good in this world. By believing firmly in hopefulness, cheeriness and vital energy, and applying these helpful thoughts toward the problem of doing something for somebody. Mrs.

Mrs. Henry Parsons somebody, Mrs. Henry Parsons of New York, has suc-

ceeded in making ten thousand New York children-little denizens of the tenement and factory districts-happy. She has done this by her system of childfarming; which means that in threequarters of an acre of land allotted her by the city in De Witt Clinton Park, long used as a dumping ground, she has established 460 little farm plots, four by eight feet each, which, twice a year, 500 children plant with vegetables and flowers. Seven kinds of vegetables are planted—beans, onions, radishes, lettuce, beets, carrots, and usually, one stalk of The children soon learn to be corn. genuine little farmers, digging, watering, hoeing, sowing and cultivating with as much care and anxious consideration as if the crops of the nation depended on their efforts. The farms have been in working order for some years, and all crops obtained have gone toward reducing the food bill of the children's families and the consequent improvement of health conditions by the use of fresh, sweet vegetables straight from the soil.

To get a good look at Mrs. Parsons, is in itself an object lesson. Although close on her sixty-second birthday, her eyes, alive with interest, show that none of her energizing vitality has been sapped. She has not permitted it. She fairly radiates bracing, helpful, sunshiny thought. To hear her talk to her girl farmers is an inspiration which makes you long to be up and doing yourself. She urges, corrects, gets down on the farms to show how a thing should be done, reprimands, praises—and all in the breeziest and most cheerful manner imaginable. To watch her in the big garden with the youngsters of the neighborhood gathered about her, is to gain an insight into the sort of work she is doing; work, which almost more in the future than in the present, will show active and far-reaching results.

"I don't want these children to be mere farmers," Mrs. Parsons says. "I want them to grow up into wide-awake men and women with a working knowledge of the big principles involved in big national questions. Right here in these tiny plots we enter into the questions of the uplift of the farmer, the good roads' problem and the preservation of the forests. Practical farming experience brings these things very close to the child; and there isn't one of them that isn't interested in them to the degree that he can illustrate what he is taught, on his farm.'

As an outgrowth of the farm idea, the International Children's School Farm League has been formed, which, in turn has established a garden farm for little convalescents at the Bellevue Hospital, New York. A garden training class for teachers is in operation at the New York

University Summer School, and lectures in various cities and towns are being constantly delivered with the idea of extending the movement along broad lines. That the effects of all these things, are highly helpful in bettering the state of the children physically, esthetically and morally, is seen in the different medals and diplomas awarded Mrs. Parsons in recognition of her pioneer work. One of these medals is from the International Congress on Tuberculosis which convened in Washington last year, and which reads: "- in recognition of a beautiful work, wisely planned, successfully demonstrated and prolific in results." Many exhibits of the garden work have been made, and, on its broad catholic basis, the plan is spreading every year.

FAMOUS PEOPLE INTERESTED IN METAPHYSICS—SARDOU, DR. CHARCOT, URIO—TO WHAT THEY ATTRIBUTE THEIR POWER—ALMOST WEIRD EXPERIENCES—AN ODD QUESTION—THE TENOR'S MODE OF LIFE.

Two distinguished personages attracted my notice at the Paris Psychical Society. The leading masters and savants were members, with whom I conversed concerning the art values necessary in high art, and the means of production. Suggestive therapeutics and mental science were taught as first lesson in conceiving original work in music and painting.

Victorien Sardou, the man who became the leading dramatist, took his first lesson in metaphysical science, in the rooms of the society. He was undeveloped, knowing only what other people knew of the drama; he recited from Moliere, and entertained us in an amateur attempt at dramatic art. He was very sensitive and humble, but he

had overcome the resentment caused by criticism.

Alphonse Urio, the Italian tenor, of the London Covent Garden Theater, was another brilliant example, who proved that the mind is master of all. Urio, like all the other members, studied everything, but was a master in voice tones, softness, expression, appealing to the innermost souls of his hearers, as though a god of the muses were speaking a soul language, full of supplication, poetry and feeling. He attributed his success to the influence of mental science, received at the society's rooms, and from Dr. Charcot, who taught the members.

Sardou began to read seriously the French dramas, he could not say what impelled him in that direction, but in the mental environment of the society, he got impressions, new and strange to him. He acted out what he read, and was filled with a happy enthusiasm, as he wrote down the words of the puppets, which came before his high strung imagination. He told me that these speeches seemed senseless at first, but eventually they took proper form in dramatic construction. As far as I remember, I give his exact words here:

"There are times when I feel morbidly miserable," he said. "I am unhappy when my brain is inactive, the remedy is in Parc Monceau, when I commune with the flowers; rest and tranquility make me sad. I am normal and rational when writing my speeches and seeing my characters. It is a disease with me, an incubus clinging on my neck. It is pleasant enough, but I wonder why I should be chosen to make a reaction in dramatic art."

Dr. Charcot, in my hearing, declared that Sardou was overpowered by the mental vibrations of other minds, running in the line of dramatic art. I mentioned this to Sardou and he answered:

"I am wondering why I should be miserable in my normal state and very content in this abnormal state. Are we instruments? Is it a healthy condition to be thus inspired."

This answer recalled the theory of guardian angels, advanced by the church, and I desired to know what such an angel can accomplish, when a proper instrument appears, and if the saints were used in a similar manner to heal and to write.

Critics say that Sardou was a unique genius, full of power and high class drama, elevating and calling forth our emotions. If so, I knew that Urio, the tenor, was similarly inspired. I asked him if he heard dramas enacted or saw pictures.

"No!" was his reply. "I hear voices singing when I am asleep. I dream of hearing people singing all kinds of operatic music. It came to me in Italy, when I sang in the cafés. My parents told me that the good angels were singing, and that I would be inspired to sing like them if I attended to my Christian duties."

In trying to find the causes of art and music, I elicited from Urio a strange fact; he was temperate and very plain in his diet; his mind wandered in dreamland, where he was happy. Like the other masters he was unhappy in rest, and perfectly happy, sane and healthy when busy with his music and his pupils. As one of them I feel honored, and can never forget the happy times we spent together in his studio.

Electronic Chemistry.

ELECTRONS ARE MENTAL—THEY KNOW WHERE TO GO AND WHAT TO DO—THEY BUILD GEOMETRIC-ALLY—ANCIENT ESOTERIC THEORY OF ILLUSION—DIRECTION'S MYSTERY.

Come along within limitless and winding ways; search out electrons, see them pulsate, and with rythmic motion build structural matter — differentiated force. Discover cosmic ether within ether even to the fourth refinement.

Call the etheric, the dynamic realm that of the fourth dimension if you will; but hurry along in labyrinth and corridors, ever on the alert; waste no time, but explore.

The entire list of physical sciences is now rapidly changing, except mathematics, and it is expanding beyond all imagination. It cannot vary, but simply grows. The mathematicians themselves are astonished over the labors of their own hands, and wonder how can it be. All physical science is becoming specific. We have specific speed-motion of translation; specific rates of oscillation; specific quantities of combination of specific kinds of atoms, and specific rates of disintegration; specific risings into nascency; specific pressures; specific tensions, and to crown all, specific mathematics for each of these, all crowding

along and coming in from infinity demanding a hearing, in a bewildering procession, majestic—limitless, true. PRI-MORDIAL PHYSICAL ELECTRONS. I will never hesitate again, but will assert here and now, that they are hyperphysical; they are mental. It is useless to argue against this assertion. Electrons, these monads are mentioned as well as dynamides. They know what to do, where and when to go to build matter.

Know is a mentological word. They are alive; they are life; they expand and contract as if breathing. They whirl and twist in spirals, and the different directions of their rotations on their axles determine whether they are positive or negative. This is true of all currents of electricity when making expression in polarizing needles, magnets or atoms. The absolute, ultimate physical body is the electron; so is the mental the indestructible electron. Mentation is continuous and cannot be quenched.

The nature of force is at present unknown, but a stream, current or line of force cannot be distinguished from a flow of electrons. And by methods of telepathy from a mental flow. A physical flow of electrons manifests as light; another as heat; another as electricity in ordinary use, and another as mind. This

much is apparent in the present state of science: all nascent, or working electrons in existence are directly and bodily handled by a mighty geometrician, or they go now here, now there of their own volition. A dot over any letter i in this print is made of many billions of electrons of carbon and other kinds.

Every atom in existence is exceedingly complex, but rigidly geometrical. And were not the geometry perfect the mass would not be an atom.

See this: Where there is a mathematical impossibility there is known to be a physical also. Let investigators memorize this rock-hewn law. Electrons build geometrically. Formed atoms: These erect molecules and these structural forms. We name these matter. But there is room for far more matter, in any rigid solid, than the quantity employed, even in platinum, osmium or diamond. And this leads to a most remarkable deduction: the very ancient esoteric theory of illusion. The fifty-three bibles of mankind teem with this wonderful doctrine of illusory appearance of everything with which we come in contact.

A WHIRLING SPARK OF FIRE.

Ignite the end of a stick of wood; then whirl it rapidly around. One ring or circle of continuous fire will appear in a darkened room. Now apply this to electrons and atoms; the result is beyond all limits of human imagining.

Draw a triangle and mark the angles A, B and C. Make a dot of A, call it an electron and imagine it to be vibrating at the specific speed-causing light. Now let the shining electron at A, move to B, thence to C and back to A, and repeat the circuit nine times per second. Then a brilliant impression of a triangle will be received on the retina of the eye. This, as in the case of the spark on the stick, is due to the fact that impressions

on a normal retina endure one-ninth of a second. That is the human eye will see the creation of one face of a crystal. This is digging around and about the very base of Nature.

Let three electrons move in this succession, then the image of the triangle will be three times brighter on the retina. Increase the specific speed of the electrons to many billions of times per second, then illimitable wonders will appear in formative or creative processes. Draw hexagons, octagons and so onward to any regular geometrical number of sides and angles. Then if electrons, atoms or molecules make rapid movements along the sides and change direction at each angle, these beautiful forms will appear in living light. Mystery deepens when geometrical solids are studied.

Draw a pyramid consisting of three faces all triangles, resting on a triangular base. Then there are four planes, four angles, and six edges, all straight lines. Mark the angles A, B, C and D. Let a light generating electron move with sufficient velocity to make a continuous impression on the retina, from A to B, B to C, C to D and D to A; then, an apparently solid pyramid will appear.

If we look at a diamond having many facets, we see half of them because the gem is opaque. Now let glowing electrons rush from angle to angle with inconceivable speed in space, then we would see the entire diamond, front and rear, because the whole interior space is empty! Each angle, each edge of the jewel would flash out in the blackness of darkness as if instantly created. much for structural form or matterbuilding. The interior of all crystals thus formed are empty, so far as matter is concerned; but full of neutral electrons: nascent electrons only do the work of building.

Suppose that impressions are made on the nerves of the fingers fast enough to appear as one continuous sensation: then we will think that we are touching a solid. Let this rapidity of impulses be, thirty per second; then a stream of minute grains of sand, the distances between each particle being 6,200 miles, would seem to the touch as one moving solid wire, if the velocity of the stream should be the standard speed potential of energy as light, heat, electricity, or 186,380 miles per second. Thus a dim form of a diamond, or any other elemental form of matter could be cut out by only one electron moving fast enough through space angles and edges. Could the fingers feel one electron, moving over angles and lines with this original specific speed, then it would feel a solid crystal, -rigid matter.

What we call visible, tangible matter is motion of primeval electrons.

Electrons are not things,—matter,—but they are the only builders of what to our senses is matter. They build by merely moving: but they must move in the clutch of the laws of geometry. Mind

only can recognize or sense, or obey mathematical law. It is evident that electrons move themselves or are moved. If they move themselves, then mind is within; if moved, then the moving mind is incredibly near; so close to them as to submerge all imagination, striving to comprehend.

THE MYSTERY OF DIRECTION.

Stretch a wire across a room; suspend a needle near it; send a current of electricity through the wire, the needle may be attracted and move toward it; if so, change direction of current, and the needle will be repelled and move away. If electrons forming an atom, move, say from right over to the left, then if another atom whose electrons are moving in this same direction be brought within their mutual spheres of influence-electro-magnetic-then they will at once move away from each other. But a right over to left atom brought near to a left over to right atom will attract and unite to form a molecule of matter.

LESSON XI.

MENTAL CO-OPERATION.

I walked out into the country the other day and about two miles out from town I came to a farm which was evidently owned by a man of unsocial spirit. On every post and tree by the side of the road was a sign, "No Trespassing," "Keep Out," "Keep Off this Property," and so on.

In one place was a grove encircling a natural pond, a spot of real beauty and attractiveness, but entirely neglected and uncared for, surrounded by signs, "No Fishing," "No Swimming," "Keep Out" and others of similar import. Evidently this man having become possessed of the legal title to a little portion of the world God made for us all, firmly intended to keep that little corner for his own private use and benefit, and as far as possible to prevent the rest of us from getting any enjoyment from it.

Two miles away was the city of fifteen

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thousand people, cooped up in stores, working in hot, stuffy mills and factories, and longing for a chance at the cool shade and water of the little grove. No doubt the man had been annoyed by trespassers, but how easy it would have been to put a self-closing gate in the fence beside the pond, post a notice asking people not to deface the trees or property and at least have given the boys of the town the blessed privilege of using his pond for a swimming pool.

However, he was not obliged to do so. The property was his own, and legally he had a perfect right to insist that no other one of God's creatures should set foot upon it. One thought, however, came to me: This man's property received its real value from the near proximity of the little manufacturing city. It was the presence of the fifteen thousand toiling, sweating, laboring human beings, two or three miles away that made his land worth a hundred and fifty dollars an acre; that gave him a market for all he raised, and that made it possible for him to draw a living from his farm, and in the evening when his work was over to come to town in his automobile.

Suppose the city should be moved away; suppose all his neighbors should move away, and the man should be left without another living soul within a radius of five hundred miles, what would be his condition? He might take down his "No Trespass" signs, and all his warnings. There would be no one to come near him, but his land would be worthless, his product unsalable, he would have no store at which to purchase even the necessaries for a comfortable existence and he would be in a miserable state indeed.

That man's happiness and all his opportunities in life spring from the presence of the very people whom he is so anxious to exclude from the blessings he enjoys, and I do not believe that he has any real happiness. In my judgment no man can ever be really happy who surrounds himself with "No Trespass" signs and shuts himself off from either physical or mental association and cooperation with his kind.

The trouble with most new thought people is that they are too much like that man. They are trying to use the power of thought for their own benefit and for their own benefit alone, not recognizing the fact that the power of thought receives its value from the lives and loves of the people by whom we are surrounded and can only be rightly exercised in full co-operation with all of human kind.

The value of mental association and co-operation is shown by the wonderful growth of the Christian Science Church. The members of that body do not consider themselves as detached and separate units independent of one another in the search for health. Each one looks upon himself as a part of an organic whole. In recognizing health in himself he recognizes it in all; and in seeking health for himself he seeks it equally for all. Each member has the mental and moral stimulus and support of the consciousness of mental association and co-operation with all the other members; and that gives each one in time of difficulty a strength, the power of which is beyond estimation.

This is what we need in the new thought movement, both in the search for health and in that for wealth and happiness. With us it is too much every man for himself, while we may think kindly of everybody (no doubt the farmer with the pond thought kindly and benevolently of the boys whom he warned to keep away from it) yet we are almost invariably trying by thought to attain things for ourselves, of ourselves, and by ourselves, without real regard

for the rights or happiness of any other person on earth. And right here is where many of us fail.

There are altogether too many people who seek to use mental power as a means or instrumentality by the use of which they can get something for nothing; who think that in some way the new thought may be used in taking advantage of other people, and whose mental science is in reality nothing more nor less than an attempt at robbery. It goes without saying that sooner or later these people are going to come to failure and disaster. In this lesson, however, I am not speaking so much of our correct attitude toward the whole of humanity as of mental co-operation with other new thoughters who are aiming at the same ends we seek to attain in ourselves.

In wealth getting what we need most is the same sense of organic unity that Christian Science gives in health getting. If all new thoughters were mentally united into a great body, co-operating with one another and each affirming, for all, all the good that he affirmed for himself, the result would inevitably come to be the complete success of all. It is time for us to take the first step in this direction. This is not to be done by forming any external organization, for organization does not give unity of spirit. That is one point which should be considered by all reformers, social, religious and otherwise: that organizations never give unity of spirit while unity of spirit always results in organization. The first step toward strong and permanent organization of any kind is the cultivation of unity of mind and a desire to co-operate with one another.

Let each reader of these lessons begin more and more in his own mind and thought to recognize his unity with all who are using similar means to attain similar ends. Think of this until you feel unity. Take advantage of every opportunity to meet those who are traveling in the same way, and when you do meet them, fully recognize them as brothers and sisters in a special and peculiar sense. "Do good to all men," said Paul, "but especially unto those of the household of faith." Have no desire but for good to any living soul. Affirm for, and desire for all, but especially unite yourself in mind with those of the new thought faith. Take advantage of every opportunity to correspond with your fellows; give encouragement where it is needed, and receive instruction from those who can give it to you; and by all means be sure that you do not fall into the way of feeling contemptuously toward those whom you consider merely beginners. There is no living soul, however humble and however small in attainment, who has not something to teach you and something of value to give to you.

Practice concentration of thought upon this point, cultivate in yourselves the sense of unity with other new thoughters and a willingness and desire to co-operate with them. Recognize this same feeling and spirit as existing in others; affirm for all, desire for all, work for all and know and feel that you are one with all. In unity is strength.

You have not fulfilled every duty, unless you have fulfilled that of being pleasant.

Last month we gave you a letter which was written for a young girl on her Commencement Day. Please be sure to read that one in connection with this, so that you will get the full import of this second letter, which went along with the first.

Here is Letter No. 2:

FOR MARY.

June 25th, 1910.

Believing that any person's income, whatever it may be, is not well managed unless each month shows an addition to a savings account, and

Desiring you to realize that I am very anxious to have you manage your money well, that you may get out of it and out of your future life all the peace and happiness which comes from an income well managed,

Therefore I have decided to make you a special inducement to save money out of your regular allowance.

Here is the inducement:

FIRST. If, at the end of one year, you have lived according to the terms of your allowance, and can show me in addition a savings account equal to ten per cent of your entire allowance for the year,

I will give you a present of twenty-five dollars cash, to be used for anything you wish which does not happen to come within the terms of the allowance agreement. These savings amounting to ten per cent of your allowance must not be eked out by extra money presents which may come to you from relatives or friends.

SECOND. If, at the end of one year, you can show me a clear slate, no debts and no grievances against the size of your allowance, and in addition a savings bank account amounting to at least fifteen per cent of your entire allowance for the year, I will give you a cash present of fifty dollars, which you are to use exactly as you please.

The saving of money is just as necessary as the paying of bills for the absolute necessities of life.

Here is a little item that will help you in managing your allowance.

When you get your allowance at the beginning of a week or month divide it into four allowances for yourself.

FIRST. Set aside the amount of money you must spend for absolute necessities.

SECOND. Set aside the sum which you determine upon to add to your savings account.

THIRD. Set aside another sum to cover THE UNEXPECTED things which may erop up before your next pay day, such as extra expenses of visits or treats, charities, etc.

This division will leave you a fourth sum which you can conscientiously spend before your next pay day for things which are not necessaries, in case your fund for non-necessaries runs out before your next pay day.

Don't make the mistake of encroaching on your fund for THE UNEX-PECTED until you have got your next allowance. Then when you divide up your next allowance you can add your left-over fund for THE UNEXPECTED to your new fund for the non-necessaries, and you will have a little extra to spend for all such things before your next pay day.

If you will practice this a few weeks or months you will find yourself getting into the spirit of it and thoroughly enjoying the sense of power and self command which will come to you from managing money so as to have plenty at all times for any of THE UNEXPECTED things, with a steadily growing savings account in addition.

Later you will find yourself almost unconsciously dividing your income in this way so that you will never run short and will always have a savings account growing. Until this becomes a habit you will find it necessary to hold yourself religiously to your subdivisions of the allowance. Only by so doing can you quickly grow the habit—and the satisfaction which comes with the habit.

If, at the end of a year, I find that you have not only managed your allowance well, but that you have also managed your present stock of clothing well, I will increase your allowance and turn over to you more of your necessaries to buy. I would like to turn all your buying over to you, and give you an allowance sufficient to cover it, but I do not feel that I can afford to do it until you demonstrate step by step that you can really be trusted to manage money for your own well being and happiness. Rest assured that the better you manage your allowance the more inclined I shall be to increase it and leave the responsibilities all to you.

It is possible that you will some day marry! Remember that this learning of the problem of managing your income will eliminate at least fifty per cent of the chances for friction between you and your husband. So in making a success of this managing of money you are already helping to build the harmonious home every girl desires and hopes to have. And the things which you could get for your home with your money savings are only a drop in the bucket compared with the solid satisfaction and capable management which you could put into making that home an ideal one.

The Man of the Hour.

* A few have seriously objected to our commendation of Mr. Roosevelt. They think he is too strong a man to be intrusted with more power! Upon the surface this may appear true. But I believe this country has great need at this crisis of just such a strong leader as Roosevelt. We are standing between the greed and unscrupulous use of power by capitalism on the one hand and the chaotic mob rule of socialism on the other hand. Only a strong, progressive leader like Roosevelt can bring the nation safely through this period of readjustment. All strong men have faults. Roosevelt has his. But a weak man, however virtuous, cannot be trusted at a national crisis such as we may be nearing.

Napoleon guided France out of the anarchy and chaos following the French Revolution, established order upon a firm foundation, restored prosperity and did more than any other one man to give to France all that is best in her laws and institutions today. No other man could have done the work.

Napoleon was a strong man, in many ways a great and noble one, but not always scrupulous in the use of power. He was largely a product of his times and the only man for the place. Even so Roosevelt seems to be the only man, so far, who is at all fitted for the work of shaping this nation at the present time.

The people need leaders. The more I come in contact with people in the mass the more I am convinced that the welfare of society depends upon strong, honest leaders—leaders with self control and conscience. Perhaps at some distant day we may be far enough evolved to develop conscience in the mass, and possess enough of the co-operative spirit to build a real republic, but the time is not yet ripe for such an undertaking. A benevolent monarchy seems about the most practical form of government the world has so far evolved.

When you get down to the roots of national life you will find that each nation is shaped and molded by its great leaders—whatever form of government it may profess. Monarchies and republics are simply instruments used by leaders to accomplish their work for the nation.

I did not used to be very enthusiastic about Roosevelt, but I have come to believe that he is "the man of the hour."

mances, the idea of world peace was conceived early in the 19th century by no less a person than Napoleon Bonaparte. Napoleon was not only a fighter, but a dreamer of dreams. 

The women of Yonkers, N. Y., have established a "woman's institute" for the exclusive use of domestic servants. Here the girls may meet their friends and spend their evenings in attractive club rooms. The dues are not large, and in addition to the recreational features there are classes in domestic science, and an employment bureau for those who desire to make use of them.—Springfield Republican.

The world's first regular aerial passenger trip was made recently when the new giant Zeppelin dirigible, the Deutchland, commanded by Count Zeppelin and with ten invited passengers with him, flew from here to Duseldorf, 280 miles to the north. The trip which was accomplished in ten hours was in every way a huge success and marked the inauguration of a regular passenger service in dirigibles.-Holyoke Transcript.

The Third International Congress of Physical Therapeutics, held the week beginning March 30, in Paris, was opened by the president of the French republic. An excellent meeting is reported. The growth in popularity of non-drug therapy is shown in the fact that the second congress, in 1907, had onl- seventeen hundred members, and this congress had five thousand; that is, nearly three times as many.-Life and Health.

Negroes in the South are gradually acquiring the property habit. The publication of the Atlantic University gives some striking figures on this subject. In 1900 the total property listed by negro citizens in North Carolina was \$9,478,000; in 1908 it was \$21,253,000, a gain of 123 per cent; in Virginia the increase was from \$15,856,000 to \$25,628,000, a gain of 62 per cent; in Georgia, from \$14,118,000 to \$27,-420,000, a gain of ninety-one per cent.-Holyoke Transcript.

I am sure that what has happened in New York will happen in the nation at large, and that prize fighting will be, as it ought to be, stopped in every state of the Union. I sin-cerely trust that public sentiment will be so aroused, and will make itself felt so effectively, as to guarantee that this is the last prize fight to take place in the United States; and it would be an admirable thing if some method could be devised to stop the exhibition of the moving pictures taken thereof.—THEODORE ROOSEVELT.

A department for instruction in methods of healing without drugs is to be established at Temple University, the first of its kind to be part of a medical school. The head of the new department will be Dr. J. Madison Taylor, a physician of high professional standing in this city. Dr. Taylor has been a close student of the effects of such treatment as massage, rest, diet, suggestion, electricity, baths, light and the like for several years. The new department will be known as that of "non-pharmaceutic therapeutics." Dr. Taylor will hold an adjunct chair in therapeutics. He has sailed for Europe for a period of advanced study in new methods of drugless healing.-Philadelphia Bulletin.

The Southwest will, with time, meet its various perplexities and adjust them to the greatest ultimate profit. That spirit which is change ing the barrens into granaries and gardens will uproot the economic prickly pears, along with the other bothersome growths of the prairies. A new type of man is rising to power. The Southwest will add a distinct type to the great national potpourri. It will breed original thinkers and workers; it will produce leaders with far visions, and builders with great dreams. The crossing of strains and the blending of brains will enrich the twentieth century with sturdiness and imagination. The son of the pioneer is heir to ambition, pluck, and tenacity. He is physically fit and mentally clean; and it is in such men that the boundless hope of the Republic lies.-Herbert Kaufmann in June Everybody's.

The Boston children are taking to the new playgrounds just as religiously as in Holyoke. Boston has twenty-seven of these public playgrounds and the daily average attendance is now about three thousand a day. There are five playgrounds in South Boston, four in Charlestown, four in Roxbury, two in the South end, three in East Boston, three in the North end, one in Jamaica Plain, three in Dorchester and two in the city proper. They are kept open until sunset every day. This is an innovation this year. One of the most interesting features of the work this season is the work of special teachers, who dramatize child stories for the pleasure and instruction of groups of children. Other teachers give instruction in folk dancing. Instruction in athletics and swimming is made much of. This all contributes to the mighty work of helping the children on and up. This is the work that Holyoke is busy with and splendid results are sure to follow .- Holyoke Transcript.

More About Stout Institute:-

I do not know that I can name you any of our graduates who have yet achieved distinction, although we have a good many who are doing good work. Our training school was organized in 1903, and as this is our seventh year, we hardly expect any of the people who have gone out from us to have yet achieved great distinction. Our graduates have taken charge of departments in manual training and domestic science in city systems of schools; in high schools in large cities; in state normal schools; and in state agricultural schools, and they have been successful. Many of them have organized one or the other of these two lines in cities of medium size, handling the entire work throughout the city schools.

The one thing that we are particularly proud of is the fact that not one of our graduates has made a failure as a teacher. This is due perhaps to three causes: first, the quality of instruction and training we give; second, the requirement that every person shall show actual teaching ability before a diploma is granted, and third that we take special pains in trying to recommend people to positions to

which they are especially adapted.

Thomas Dreier was in high school when I came here to organize the training school work. I knew him as a good high school student, and I have known him in his newspaper work since he went away from here. I did not know that he was writing such an article as you mention. From what I have known of Mr. Dreier I think he is not inclined to make statements without being thoroughly convinced of their correctness .- L. D. HARVEY, president Stout Institute, Menominee, Wis.

From the Head of a Girls' School:-

I was writing yesterday to a very able intellectual woman friend of mine, about The Nautilus and advised her to take it. She really needs thought along sunshine lines. Perhaps it might be well to stimulate my suggestion by mailing her a sample copy.

I thought that when vacation came I should be able to read more of your books but I enclosed you my little letter sized brochure about our Burton-Hampton school for girls, to show

you why I am so busy.

For several years past my sister and I have been deeply pained in our work here as teachers to see so many girls coming to New York from distant states with the idea of carrying away some of its culture and bearing its educational uplift to far away homes, and ending with nothing after a year here but the thought of spending more largely for material and evanescent things. We have felt that there was an ethical work for women of our opportunities, a crying need for it in fact, and we hope now that the time has arrived when we can be about it.

Have you ever written any talks for girlsnew thought, virile, elevating talks? You might help me in my educational work if some time you could write such a book for them. At any rate I shall do what I can until you do something of this sort, to create the habits of constructive thought among my girls at the Burton-Hampton, and to make my school a splendid broadening institution. But I am writing you a letter and I started out to ask you for a list of books. However I must tell you that my sister and I keep the July, 1910, Nautilus on top of the magazines on our table and whenever we get disheartened and fearful of success for Burton-Hampton we read "Pin Your Faith To the Unseen Things" and so forth. Wants to be Whole:-

In the June number of The Nautilus is a letter from Mary H. Force, which is decidedly the most helpful I have seen. She tells something of what can be done with new thought in healing the body, and gives a clear idea of how it is done.

There must be others, I am sure, besides myself who know but little of this new way and what we want is plain talks about the

healing power of thought.

I have for the past year been sorely afflicted with stomach trouble which medicine has failed to cure. The diagnosis of several physicians is catarrh of the stomach and too much acid, which causes a sensation of burning of the throat and tongue. My diet, by order of these physicians, is confined to toast, milk, rice and eggs. I know quite a number of persons who have been healed by Christian Science, and I have taken two months' treatment but without any benefit. For several reasons I greatly prefer new thought to Christian Science and am exceedingly anxious to know more of it and to be healed by it. I have read enough to know something about denials, af-firmations and the "silence" but I seem to get nothing out of them. When I read of others being cured I determine to give it another trial, but when after a few days or a week of deny-

ing and affirming I am no better I become completely discouraged and feel that it is no use to try longer. I have done this a number of times and now I write to the Nautilus readers trusting that I may receive help. Tell me, please, how long I shall keep up the denials and the affirmations and the concentra-tion and the "silence?" One week, two weeks, one month or six months? I am nearly fiftynine years old and I suppose my age is against My physicians have told me so, and I sometimes feel that it is useless for me to make further efforts to be healed. H. Emile Cady in the chapter on denials, in Lesson in Truth, says, "Repeat these denials several times a day," and again, "Just begin to practice these denials in an unprejudiced way and see how marvelously it will, after a little, deliver you.' "Several times," and "after a little." Now, I have repeated them forty times, at least, without the slightest prejudice for days only to wake every morning with the same old burn-ing of throat and tongue. Then what is to be done? I hope you'll tell me. Of the affirmations Emilie Cady says "Strangely will they act to deliver you out of the greatest distresses, places where no human help avails." Well, I have affirmed and affirmed over and over again and have not been delivered. How am I to get up the faith to deny and deny again, to affirm and keep on affirming when I see that nothing comes of it? Shall I just keep it up without faith? Have any of you known a case of stomach trouble cured in this way? Honor bright .- MRS. L. H. RUSSELL.

Value of Rapid Deep Breathing:-

A simple and effective method of stimulating mental processes (says The Literary Digest), while increasing physical endurance, at the disposal of any one without apparatus and without expense, would seem to be worth attention. Such a method is noted by D. F. Comstock, of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, in a letter to Science (New York, December 3). The writer modestly disclaims all pretense to originality; he simply calls attention, he says, to important facts that have been generally neglected. He refers to the effects of enforced deep breathing, lasting for several minutes. Besides the results noted above, this produces ability to hold the breath for an unusually long period, and quickens the pulse. Writes Mr. Comstock:

"It has been noticed by others that deep violent breathing for several minutes so changes the system as to make respiration unnecessary for perhaps as much as five minutes after this preparatory breathing is over. In my own case I have found that four minutes' enforced breathing makes it possible to hold the breath for 31/2 minutes, whereas without this preparation 56 seconds was my limit. The time during which it is possible to do without respiration increases, of course, with the length of time during which the preparatory breathing is carried on. The increase does not go on indefinitely, but reaches a definite limit, beyond which further length of time given to preparatory breathing does not increase the time during which the breath may be held.....

"The preparatory breathing is effective long after the 'washing out' of the lungs must have been completed. The change produced in the system is certainly, therefore, more fundamental than a lung change, and would appear to a layman to indicate a temporary change in blood constitution.

"The effect as a mental stimulant is very pronounced. I have noticed in my own case that mental fatigue may be postponed, far beyond the usual point, by two minutes of rapid deep breathing at half-hour intervals. A feeling of sluggishness or sleepiness may be almost completely dispelled. I have never noticed any reaction as in the case of most stimulants and altogether it seems to me very satisfactory.

"The effect on muscular fatigue is also striking. A difficult arm exercise with heavy weights which I could not repeat under ordinary circumstances more than twenty times, I found after four minutes of this preparatory breathing that I could do twenty-seven times, i. e., about 30 per cent more. This increase I found to exist at all stages of fatigue, as might be expected.

"The pulse beat goes up very rapidly while the breathing is continued, in my own case from about 65 to 106 after four minutes' breathing.

"Another curious effect which perhaps is worth mentioning is the apparent rapid lapse of time during the latter half of a hard breathing period. This change in the time-sense is very noticeable......

"I should not have ventured to describe phenomena which are so easily in the reach of every one, had I not found in people at large, and even among scientific men, a surprising ignorance as to their existence. I have seen some very amusing betting on how long it was possible to hold the breath, and have seen the cocksure bettor laid low by not knowing of this possible resource of his adversary.

"As a mental stimulant, and as a means to increase the time during which the system can do without respiration, violent breathing might find considerable useful application, and daring rescues from suffocation are common enough to make a knowledge of this possible three-fold endurance without air of no little value."

Growing Mentality, and Trusting:-

Being at one time a student in a Normal College, I was compelled to select one of four orthodox churches where I should attend at least one service every Sunday. I accordingly made my selection. The first time I attended I thought I would drop into the Sunday School. He was there all through my childhood and for many years after, and should I go back tomorrow, I believe he would be there still the same big puffy old froggie.
