



If You are Critical. If you are critical you can find lots of mistakes man has made in trying to improve the earth.

In spite of what *Collier's* says I have a great deal of confidence in E. G. Lewis and all his schemes.

William and I have been watching this man for several years.

The post office department several years ago tried to put him out of business. He had started a new People's Bank that furnished some sort of substitute for the fractional postal notes and fractional currency, which is used by almost every other civilized nation on the face of this earth.

To the express companies are attributed the malign influence which has kept the United States from having this convenience.

E. G. Lewis provided a very good substitute, and immediately the spoilers of our government started in to squelch him and his bank.

This was in Roosevelt's administration, and it is one of the things that I hold up against Roosevelt.

The post office department fought Lewis to a finish. They brought every means to bear that it was possible to bring.

And it is a well-known fact that even Harper's Magazine or any of the big publications in this country, or the big department stores like Montgomery Ward and Sears Roebuck can be ruined by the postal department if the department takes the notion to try putting them out of business. The postal laws are so lax, and so much is left to the judgment of the people who are inter-

ested in prosecuting, that even a legitimate business is not safe if the administration determines to break it up.

In spite of this condition, E. G. Lewis won out on every count. His business was obstructed for two years. The courts of Missouri and, finally, the Supreme Court, stood by him and declared the government's case absolutely unjust and unwarranted.

The governor of Missouri and many prominent and wealthy people came to Mr. Lewis' aid.

His employes showed the most beautiful confidence in him. When the officers came to arrest him and close up his business on that unjust fraud order, it was on a Saturday. All the employes had just been paid, and every man, woman and child on the place had his pay envelope in hand.

After the affair was over and the building all closed up, the employes gone, and the officers, too, Mr. Lewis happened to open his desk, and there he found a cotton sack in which had been deposited every pay envelope that he had given out in the morning.

Along with these was a little note from the employes saying that they did not want pay for the week, that they wanted him to have the money to help, that they were willing to work for nothing until he could get on his feet again.

This one little fact seems to me a most significant comment on the action of the post office department in issuing that fraud order against Mr. Lewis. No man building on fraud could win such confidence from the people who worked with him every day in the year.



Since Then.

That happened several years ago; everything has cleared up and Mr.

Lewis is fulfilling his promises as fast as he possibly can; and that is fast enough to look like legerdemain to the rank outsider.

Collier's repudiated Mr. Lewis' "schemes" and said he had not been able to keep all his promises, and that any town which had a League Chapter had better get the property into its own name. Mr. Lewis himself puts the property into the hands of the local Chapters just as soon as they have earned it. And they earn it by turning in subscriptions at regular rates. Not one cent of money is paid out for these Chapter buildings.

When the post office people held up Mr. Lewis' mail to the extent of \$2,000,-000, covering a period of two years, Mr. Lewis was not able to keep certain promises he had made in regard to dividends or interest. But that was only temporary, and I understand he is meeting his obligations as fast as possible.

This is the only scheme of his that ever went awry, so far as I have been able to learn, and that prosecution was the cause.

The American Woman's League. I have looked into this American Woman's League plan pretty thoroughly, and it seems to me one of the finest and

greatest plans that has been started in this country. It organizes the women for work, but it does it on an absolutely business basis, where everybody gets paid for his work as he does it, and

every step of the work inspires to another step.

At University City they have the visible proofs of the wonderful progress made in the way of correspondence schools, and a central college where star pupils may pursue their studies further.

I spent several hours at University City, and met Mr. Lewis himself, and his right hand man, George Crowley. They are both young men.

Mr. Lewis looks like a fair-haired boy in his twenties, and would inspire confidence anywhere.

He is a business genius, nothing more nor less.

Of course, there is always the possibility of any business scheme going awry. The postal department may be used by people who want to thwart and crush. Then a panic happens along once in a while, and even if a man is honest, and brilliant, practical and wise, there is always a chance that his scheme may be thwarted.

Everybody who invests in a company should take all this into consideration, should count well the costs in case he loses; should be careful that he doesn't put all of his eggs in one basket, unless the basket is his own absolutely.

Mr. Lewis' scheme is a great one, bigger than any other business scheme I know of in this country, better adapted to please everybody who comes in touch with it. I believe that the cosmic forces are with him, and that he will be enabled to fulfill his promises.

Just the same, if I were a poor widow with just \$2,000 or \$200 in the world, I would *not* put over, say fifty or a hundred dollars in any of his schemes!



Because caution would prompt me to put in what I could spare without injury, in case he does fail to keep his promises.

And I would know that no matter how faithful nor how much of a genius he is himself, there is always a chance of such failure.

More Whitewash.

President Taft has whitewashed Ballinger.

Attorney-General Wickersham has

whitewashed Ballinger.

And still the people of the United States persist in believing that Ballinger is black, and not white.

Wherefore, Congress is to take the matter up and apply twelve coats of whitewash. Mr. Ballinger insists upon it. He and President Taft have planned this so well that there is not one chance in a thousand that the congressional committee of investigation can fail to apply the desired twelve good coats of whitewash.

To make things doubly sure, to commit both houses to whitewash, six members of the investigating committee are to be chosen from the senate and six from the house.

To make trebly sure, Joseph Cannon is to appoint the six from the house, and Vice-President Sherman is to appoint the six from the senate.

Does anybody in this country imagine for one minute that Cannon and Sherman will not choose men who are committed body and soul to Ballinger and the Guggenheim interests? Of course not.

Pinchot and Glavis are to be blackwashed to make Ballinger's whitewash shine out more resplendently.

Evidently President Taft is hopelessly and wholly committed to "the interests." If you want to know how he became so committed, read Alfred Henry Lewis' articles on "Traveling With Taft," in the December and January numbers of Human Life. In the Jan-

uary number is published for the first time the story of Cannon's midnight sneak into President Taft's summer home, at Beverly, last August. With Joseph Cannon were Mr. McKinley, of Illinois, Mr. Hemingway, of Indiana, and Mr. Sibley, of Pennsylvania. The conference lasted until the wee small hours of the morning, and as a consequence Taft's program, as well as his speeches, was revised.

Mr. Taft, like all men of his build, resembles a snowball rolling down hill. Once committed to a policy, he gathers momentum as he goes. He is committed to Cannonism, Ballingerism, and with it to the Guggenheims, who are trying to snatch Alaska. From trying to be neutral, President Taft has evidently become aggressive in his policies, all aiming for the good of these interests.

Whereby President Taft digs his own political grave."

All the interests are bent upon compelling Congress to stand by the foxy Ballinger. Will they do it? Are the insurgents strong enough to upset that bucket of congressional whitewash? Heaven help us if they don't. The Guggenheims will help themselves.

Cannot you do something? Cannot you write to your congressman and your senators, and demand that Ballinger be removed, whether he is further whitewashed or not?


They say the bets in Washington are four to one on the Guggenheims.

The Teachings of Nature.

NATURES, HUMAN AND PLANT CONTRASTED—A PROPHECY—CHILD A CUT DIAMOND—TO REFORM BEGIN ON THE GRANDFATHER—IS EARLY SCHOOL-ING ADVISABLE FOR CHILDREN—OVER-EDUCATION THE CURSE OF MODERN CHILD LIFE.

We are more crossed than any other nation in the history of the world, and here we meet the same results that are always seen in a much crossed race of plants. All the worst as well as the best qualities of each are brought out in their fullest intensities. Right here is where selective environment counts. When all the necessary crossing has been done, then comes the work of elimination, the work of refining, until we shall get an ultimate product that should be the finest race ever known. The best characteristics of the many peoples that make up this nation will show in the composite. The finished product will be the race of the future.

In my work with plants and flowers, I introduce color here, shape there, size or perfume, according to the product desired. In such processes the teachings of nature are followed. Its great forces only are employed. All that has been done for plants and flowers by crossing, nature has already accomplished for the American people. By the crossings of types, strength has in one instance been secured; in another, intellectuality; in still another, moral force. Nature alone has done this. The work of man's head and hands has not yet been summoned to prescribe for the development of a

race. So far a preconceived and mapped-out crossing of bloods finds no place in the making of peoples and nations. But when nature had already done its duty, and the crossing leaves a product which in the rough displays the best human attributes, all that is left to be done falls to selective environment.

But when two different plants have been crossed, that is only the beginning. It is only one step, however important; the great work lies beyond—the care, the nuture, the influence of surroundings, selection, the separation of the best from the poorest, all of which are embraced in the words I have used—selective environment.

How, then, shall the principles of plant culture have any bearing upon the development of the descendants of this mighty mingling of races?

All animal life is sensitive to environment, but of all living things the child is the most sensitive. Surroundings act upon it as the outside world acts upon the plate of a camera. Every possible influence will leave its impress upon the child, and the traits which it inherited will be overcome to a certain extent, in many cases being even more apparent than heredity. The child is like a cut diamond, its many facets re-

ceiving sharp, clear impressions, not possible to a pebble, with this difference, however, that the change wrought in the child from the influences without becomes constitutional and ingrained. A child absorbs environment. It is the most susceptible thing in the world to influence, and if that force be applied rightly and constantly when the child is in its most receptive condition, the effect will be pronounced, immediate and permanent.

Where shall we begin? Just where we begin with the plant, at the very beginning. It has been said that the way to reform a man is to begin with his grandfather. But this is only a half truth; begin with his grandfather, but begin with his grandfather when he is a child. I find the following quoted from the great kindergartner Frobel:

"The task of education is to assist natural development toward its destined end."

"As the beginning gives a bias to the whole after development, so the early beginnings of education are of most importance."

While recognizing the good that has been accomplished in the early kindergarten training of children, I must enter a most earnest protest against beginning education, as we commonly use the word, at the kindergarten. No boy or girl should see the inside of a schoolhouse until at least ten years old. I am speaking now of the boy or girl who can be reared in the only place that is truly fitted to bring up a boy or a plant—the country, the nearer to nature the better. In the case of children born in the city and compelled to live there, the temptations are so great, the life so artificial, the atmosphere so like that of the hothouse, that the child must be placed in school earlier as a matter of safeguarding.

But, some one asks, how can you ever expect a boy to graduate from college or university if his education does not begin until he is ten years of age? He will be far too old.

First I answer that the curse of modern child-life in America is over-education. For the first ten years of this, the most sensitive and delicate, the most pliable life in the world, I would prepare it. The properly prepared child will make such progress that the difference in time of graduation is not likely to be noticeable; but, even if it should be a year or two later, what real difference would it make? Do we expect a normal plant to begin bearing fruit a few weeks after it is born? It must have time, ample time, to be prepared for the work before it. Above all else, the child must be a healthy animal. I do not work with diseased plants. They do not cure themselves of disease. They only spread disease among their fellows and die before their time.

Luther Burbank and His Work.



Luther Burbank.

Luther Burbank was born in Lancaster, Worcester County, Mass., March 7, 1849. Of an ancestry which arrived in America during the seventeenth century, English and Scotch with a distant and slight admixture of French, Dutch and Welch, reared in a typical New England home, the large brick house yet standing amid the picturesque scenery of one of the most beautiful of New England towns, the thirteenth child of a family of fifteen.

His father, a farmer and brick manufacturer, was a scholarly man and a great admirer of Emerson, Webster, Sumner and other scholars of the time. The mother possessed an intense love of nature, which, no doubt, was inherited by her son.

Luther was educated in the district school and later in the Lancaster Acad-

emy. At the age of fifteen he was apprenticed in the Ames Plow Manufactory at Worcester, Mass., where he was employed several summers, attending the Lancaster Academy during the winter months. He possessed mechanical and inventive ability and might have remained in mechanical pursuits had not his health demanded an out-of-door life. For a time he studied medicine, but after the death of his father, began seed growing and market gardening in Lunenburg, Mass., where in 1873 the now famous Burbank potato was originated by him.

In October, 1875, he removed to Santa Rosa, Cal., for a time working as a gardener and collector of native seeds for American and foreign firms. In 1877 he established the Santa Rosa Nursery which gained such a reputation for reliability, that in ten years he was doing a very profitable business of over \$16,000 a year. In the spring of 1888, he sold the nursery with one-half of the stock, and having previously purchased ten acres near Sebastopol, Cal., was able to devote his entire attention to experimental work, to which he had already given considerable attention.

As early as 1884 several new plums had been imported by him from Japan. The introduction of the "Burbank" plum was followed by the production and introduction of many new fruits and flowers.

These productions were sold to leading nursery and seed firms, as the experimental work left no time for the retailing of productions. Mr. Burbank soon found that the expense of carrying on such an extensive work was grad-

ually but surely exhausting the small fortune he had accumulated in the nursery business. He would, no doubt, have been compelled to discontinue his large experimental work, in part, at least, had not the Carnegie Institution of Washington, D. C., seeing the great value of scientific data here available, made arrangements by which the work could go on and scientific records be secured. In 1904 a grant of \$10,000 a year was provided. Since that time the work has been greatly amplified and extended.

More new fruits, trees, plants and flowers, of world-wide acknowledged value, have been produced by Mr. Burbank, than by any experimental station, either of private or governmental control in the world.

The Burbank potato has displaced nearly all the old varieties. In 1908 there were some 14,000,000 bushels raised in the Rocky Mountains and the Pacific Coast states alone.

Other successes of his are plums, plumcots, prunes, crimson winter rhubarb, the Logan berry, the yet newer Himalaya berry, the wonderful spineless cactus that will redeem the desert, the rapid growing "Royal" and "Paradox'' walnuts, the beautiful Shasta daisy, crimson escholtzia and the Burbank canna.

All these except the spineless cactus are already producing wealth for thousands; and it is only a matter of time when many more of his productions will prove themselves in terms of human appreciation and cash.

In summing up his work the *Rural Californian* says this of Luther Burbank:

"In conclusion, allow me to say that if Burbank had never introduced a single new plant to gladden the hearts of mankind, he would nevertheless be a benefactor, for he has created a spirit and an incentive in others similarly inclined, in all parts of the globe, to advance the horticultural interests much beyond the ordinary. His indomitable will, determination to succeed, no matter how insurmountable the obstacles apparently were, should, now that he has fully demonstrated his abilities, be the cause of his receiving the encouragement and endorsement of the public so that in the years still allotted to him he may continue in his great work, and when he finally does lay aside his burdens, he may look back with a feeling of pride in having accomplished much that shall be of lasting benefit to the human race."

Consequently the citizen is limited or subordinated by no external power, but only by his own idea of right; for in obeying the laws he is but conforming to his own reason, and in breaking the laws he is acting against his reason, which perhaps re-acts upon him in the shape of punishment—by imprisonment, say —for his correction and the rousing of penitence, which is but the reinstatement of his reason.

A Letter from Luther Burbank.

INTIMATE FACTS ABOUT HIS DOINGS—HIS OWN STATEMENTS AS TO HIS LIFE AND WORK—WHAT NEW THOUGHT HAS DONE FOR HIM—HIS CARNEGIE ENDOWMENT EXPLAINED—GOES TO CHURCH "ONCE IN TWO YEARS."

Your highly esteemed letter of November 19 received in due season, but alas! there are only twenty-four hours in each day, and although I have had two and sometimes three stenographers, it is impossible to think of keeping up with all my correspondence, as much of ture, to write, to travel, etc., for various purposes and propositions innumerable from foreign countries, governments, kings, princes, etc., etc. This only gives you the faintest idea of the pressure I am under every day, Sundays and holidays included, and even this cannot

my time is taken up by visitors from all over the world, and my most exacting business demands with its many acres and fourteen to twenty-six hands, a great amount of the closest possible attention which it is possible for man to give his work. Besides this I have a steady stream of applications to lecconvey to you any faintest idea of the facts.

For the past forty-five years I have been a most diligent student of new thought, psychic influence, and medical lore and similar matters. This all to show that your experiences, which come so direct, appeal to me as much as anything I have ever read on the subject, and they highly pleased all of us. I thank you for the privilege of reading this.

The trouble with much of the new thought is, in my opinion, that it is very crude and impractical, and acres of this kind of stuff which I have read might better never have been published if any benefit to humanity was desired. Much of it I think is written as space fillers and to produce an income for the writers. Now I have given you my plain ideas of the facts of the new thought in brief, but you can very well know that they are crude enough given in this offhand way, and with all the shadings left out which go to make a true picture.

I could name a score of so-called new thought books which have done, no doubt, great good, but, as I have said before, I think that much of the new thought healing methods are still in a very crude state and will be reduced to science only by the study of many minds in different directions. You are exactly right. The people *are* by discussion arriving at the foundation facts and any one who is doing good work in any direction should be encouraged by all who wish to leave the world a little better for having lived in it, than when they came into it.

As to writing an article for *The Nautilus* nothing would give me more pleasure. * * If you could see the great stacks of unanswered letters of a similar nature from newspapers, magazines, and requests for lectures from the different colleges, universities and associations, you would see how impossible it is for me to think of writing any more than I am writing in this briefly sketched letter. Money considerations are nothing whatever to me at the present time. All I desire is to wiggle out of all the work I possibly can in order to do more important work;

and I do a great deal of wiggling I assure you, for which I have from ten to thirty helpers to help me wiggle.

It would be pleasing to me that your splendid journal should have a Burbank number.

I need not tell what, perhaps, possibly I have told you before, that the Carnegie Institution takes up an hour of each day in dictating for a tenvolume eyelopedia in regard to my experiments; that another publishing company are harassing me for copy for six to ten volumes for them.

As to my health, I am glad to tell you about it, as you desire. I was a frail, nervous child, and had a sunstroke and various other matters which nearly wound up my existence about the time I was twenty, but this, no doubt, with the study of medicine, new thought, and such matters may have lengthened out my life in the end, for I had to learn one thing-that is, to take care of myself, and I have never failed to take as good care as possible of myself from that time to this. My health and ability to work has increased steadily for the last forty years, so that now I am able to turn off more work in a month that I could ever turn off at twenty-five in a year and work less hours, for during my life I have put in all the hours in serious work that strength would allow and sometimes have gone greatly beyond this.

As to my living outdoors a great deal, as you mention, I used to live outdoors and work with my men for health and happiness' sake and to observe the experiments as they progressed, fully six, or seven or eight hours a day. I have the last few years, owing to the tremendous interest taken in my work by all classes of human beings, from all countries and from all climates, had to spend a large part of my time writing and talking indoors. This I find does not agree with my health by any means, yet I manage to keep as healthy as most business men.

As to society of any kind, I gave that up long ago. I go out to a lecture or to an entertainment perhaps four or five times per annum, go to church about once in two years, and rarely take a vacation, and to pay for this I have to take an extra pull about a month, for every day that I am gone, to catch up.

I am not financially obliged to do anything as my tastes are extremely simple, and can make ten thousand dollars per month lecturing, if I were willing to leave my present work, which I think not best to leave at present, as it is just culminating in trees, fruits, plants and flowers which will be of tremendous and far-reaching value to the human race.

Would like to make it clear that the Carnegie people do not give me \$10,-000 a year as a gift, by any means. The avowed object of the trustees was "to capture Burbank for the benefit of science," as my work had not been described in its scientific aspects heretofore, and I dictate daily through a large portion of the year—the first volumes will probably be published within a year or so by the Institute. The payments made me are to allow me to have time to leave my ordinary work and to pay the help which is necessary to carry on further scientific experi-

ments for the benefit of the Carnegie Institution. This, many people do not understand, and imagine the money is thrown into my lap for my own personal use,—none of which is, under any circumstances used for such a purpose.

It was not my desire to receive this fund, but some of my friends who knew the value of my work, here in California and Washington, D. C., obtained the grant for me, and I accepted it with many misgivings, and really, at the present time, I feel that it would have been far better for my own personal happiness if I had never had anything to do with it, for it has changed my line of operations quite considerably and has made me thousands of envious persons among horticulturists and florists, who, if they knew the facts, would send me blessings rather than cursings, which they seem disposed to do. But no damage is done to anybody. It is natural for people to be envious and especially of a person who is somewhat prominent in their eyes and engaged in the same line of work. These envious people have brought out some facts, and *facts* are all that is of any value in the end, and are the only foundation for anyone to build on. False statements are made like smoke,-disagreeable at the time, but not affecting the foundation.

The Four Fates and the Future.

LUTHER BURBANK AND LELAND STANFORD—TWO REALLY GREAT MEN—THE DREAM OF LELAND STANFORD—AN ARGUMENT FOR LUTHER BUR-BANK'S ADMIRERS—THE COMING TEACHER'S SLO-GAN—HOW TO GET THE FULLEST OUT OF BODY, MIND, SOUL.

There are, out of many, two men in particular who have been blessed with the vision of the possibilities of life, and through plain, practical, everyday work have realized it. They have *idealized the process*, step by step, to glorious consummation, and have thus done incalculable good to the race, and glorified the future of the world.

Leland Stanford has dropped his work here, and passed on, but not until he had demonstrated not only possibilities, but unalterable facts in his dream of a finer type of horse than had ever before existed.

"This horse should be handsome, clean-limbed, intelligent, docile, strong and swift. These traits were to be not those of one horse alone, a member of a favored equine aristocracy, they were to be bred in the bone so that they would continue from generation to generation the attributes of a special common type of horse. And with this dream ever before his waking eyes, he invoked for his aid the four twin genii of organic life; the four by which all the magic of transformation of species has been accomplished either in nature or in art. And these four once in his service, he left to their control all the plans included in his great ambition.

"These four genii or fates are not strangers to us, nor were they new to the human race. Being so great and so strong, they are invisible to all save those who seek them. Men who deal with them after the fashion of science give them commonplace names—variation, heredity, segregation, selection.

"And in the final result, the horses which were left were the horses of Leland Stanford's dream. The future of the breed was fixed, and fixed at the beginning by the very framing of the conditions under which it lived. It is variation which gives better as well as worse. It is heridity which saves all that has been attained—for better or for worse. It is selection by which better triumphs over worse, and it is segregation which protects the final results from falling again into the grasp of the general average.

"In all this, selection is the vital, moving, changing force. It throws the shaping of the future on the individual chosen by the present. The horse which is left marks the future of its kind. The history of the steed is an elongation of the history of those who are chosen for parentage. And with the best of the best chosen for parentage, the best of the best appears in the progeny.

"And this story is true, known to thousands of men. And it will be true again just as often as men may try to carry it into experiment. And it will be true not of horses alone, for the four fates which guide and guard life have no partiality for horses, but work just as persistently for cattle, or sheep, plums or roses, callas or cactus, as they do for horses or men. From the very beginning of life they have wrought untiringly-and in your life and in minein the grass of the field, the trees of the forest-in bird and beast, everywhere we find traces of their energy." (David Starr Jordan.)

With these same four genii, the second man, Luther Burbank, works unceasingly, and has done much to set the world thinking about the possibilities and the wonders of Nature and of Life, and has demonstrated the limitless extent of accomplishment in the plant world, if set about with patience, love and understanding.

Horticulturists say sneeringly, "He has done nothing we could not do." This is true, in a very limited sense, for Burbank, the Wizard, has only followed Law—but he has followed it with such keen insight, such marvellous understanding, such intuition and skill as is vouchsafed only to the "hundredth man" who loves his work with heart and soul, who knows no tiring, and recognizes no failure.

None of his would-be detractors have done what he has done, yet they claim they could. Surely it would be worth while, even from the commercial standpoint, to follow in the footsteps of the man who gave to the world the Burbank potato and its prototypes, worth millions of dollars annually, and presented at a time when disease seemed eliminating the potato; who has done miraculous things with fruit trees and brought chestnuts into bearing in eighteen months; who has bred the thornless cactus to a point where it bids fair to make the desert lands do more than blossom as the rose, whose only yield is beauty; who has added untold profit to the labors of the grower of small fruits; and who has, in the world of flowers, played with God's laws with almost the wisdom of the Creator himself, and produced what have hitherto been deemed impossible results.

Luther Burbank has the Vision of Life, keeps it ever before him, and works steadily, unhastingly as Nature works, but as relentlessly and unerringly, and above all, lovingly.

To love one's work-is that not the secret of all success, the soul of all endeavor? And Burbank's work, great as it is, far-reaching in its scope, is only a beginning, and points the way to things of greater magnitude and untold value to the race. There may never be a second Burbank, a man with the exquisite delicacy of touch which recognizes through the little brains in the finger tips truths that are sealed to the grosser senses of the ordinary worker, but his work will not end when he leaves. it, for what he has accomplished through selection and environment in the plant world, has opened the eyes of thinkers to the possibilities of the human race.

"Greater things shall ye do," said Jesus. And the Masters of the world, who see the vision in its entirety, realize that to them is given the actual accomplishment of but a small portion. Theirs to lay the foundation firmly on solid rock, to but hint, perhaps, at the superstructure, and then leave it to other hands to carry onward. For no man liveth to himself alone, and the

vision, if true, is for others—not in any limited or personal sense, but for the race as a whole.

And with the aid of the four invincible genii there will some day arise one who will do for mankind what Leland Stanford did for horses and Burbank for horticulture.

His gospel will be for all who are enhungered after righteousness-which is right thinking and right living. He will show us that we are never too old, if real desire backs us, to renew the tissues of the body, change the chemistry of the blood, conquer fear and disease, and alter environmental conditions. And all by perfectly natural and normeans - right thinking, right mal breathing, proper combination of foods, muscular activities consciously functioned for the rousing of deadened brain centers, the whole body put in order so that the tremendous vitality of the universal forces may manifest through it in harmony and beauty.

"Normal growth, yet unlimited growth in accordance with law," will be the slogan of the coming teacher. "Work with the law, and cease to waste your time and your puny strength in opposing it." He will preach the gospel of the rounded life, the balanced development of all the attributes of life, and exemplify the theory that what you wish others to be you must first express in your own life and your own body.

Life and the joy of life—life in its fullest and most perfect expression, will be the content of his teaching, and in this teaching will be perceived a wonderful breath, a summing-up, an imaging, which will give as result not the experience of belief of an individual alone, but the experience and the knowledge of the race, uniting in its precepts the Greek and the Christian ideals. The

love of the Christ-teaching, combined with the belief that the perfect body is but the instrument of the perfect soul; that there must be harmonious mental and physical development for the higher spiritual ends, and that this transcendent unfoldment and perfection of self, this ultimate of self-realization, is not alone for the sake of the individual, but for the race as a whole.

It is not by ignoring or denying the earthly tabernacle that we gain results, but by making it clean and sweet, strong and healthy, that it may properly adapt itself to the uses of the Spirit which dwells therein.

The soul is perfect—but it is a common axiom that the better the media of expression, the better the results. The more perfect the body and all the physical conditions, the more highly sensitized that body becomes, and the greater and better and more far-reaching the expression of the soul. Soul IS perfect—but it cannot express perfection through a diseased body or an unbalanced mind. We are in very truth the temples of the living God—but how defiled, how gross, how pitifully inefficient and inadequate.

The soul is *eager* for expression, longs for it, seizes every opportunity to manifest which we allow, but it is no more possible for it to have free or full expression through an impure body, sodden and heavy and sluggish, than for the electric current to manifest perfectly over an iron wire, or the divine accord of music to sound from an instrument out of tune.

The body *first*—make it as perfect an instrument as possible, for on the healthy body depends the clarity and sanity of the mind and the manifestation of the spiritual forces.

Body, mind, soul—the great triumvirate, each absolutely and inalienably SESC TO BETERRAR

necessary to the other. The soul needs, wants, *must have* the body, for the body is the sheath of the soul, its covering, its envelope and protection; were this not so it would have been discarded long since, as we discard any wornout or useless thing. The brain in this wonderful body is the receiver and distributer of energy and embodies the consciousness, without which soul is helpless as far as expression is concerned.

And it is expression, life and more life, for which we long; life of which the soul is enamored; and life is motion, outward, onward, upward; ever seeking, ever giving, making a channel of the physical for the transmission of its divine energy, and only leaving it when the channel becomes clogged beyond retrieving; then the soul wearies of the unequal contest—and we die.

So to live that the divine life finds its fullest, freest, truest expression in us—here and now—is not that a vision worth realizing, worth working for?

The Oriental Religions and What They Can Teach Us.

BRAHMINISM-ITS SCOPE AND MEANING.

All religions are true—and all religions are false. They are true because all are based upon certain great fundamental principles, upon certain great spiritual laws: they are false because these great fundamental truths are necessarily modified if not quite overlooked, in the effort to systematize and ritualize them into a "church."

The Buddhism of today with its various schools and factions, its hair splitting subtleties, its acrimonious controversies, is not at all representative of the doctrines taught by its founder, the Great Lord Buddha. No more do the religious systems collectively known as "Christian" embody a faithful representation of the pure and beautiful teachings of the Supernal Seer of Nazareth. Even the Taoism of the present day is a much degenerated, much distorted travesty upon the teachings of

Lao Tsze, the Great Founder of the "Way of the Tao."

THE MASTERS SAW THE TRUTH.

The Masters saw the Truth, simple, broad, clear, illuminating—the truth that gives samadhi, freedom, that destroys our illusions, the maya of sensuous misrepresentation, and that confers ynana, the pure knowledge of all things.

The Masters, possessing ynana, saw the truth and taught it. But those who came after, the apostles, the disciples, the priests, the church fathers, the scribes and commentators—they were not content with the great truths taught by the Masters, but deemed it necessary to invent ridiculous "miracles," to devise meaningless rites, ceremonials and mummeries, to impose penances and punishments—in short to establish a corporation, a "system," in other words, a church. Such systems have

always failed, and must always fail. There is not health in them. But ecclesiasticism is not Christianity, any more than table tipping is spirituality, or the rope trick true Yogiism. Those who worship rites and ceremonials, who "bow down to images," graven or mentalized, those who follow the form ignoring the spirit—all such are deceived and are wandering in the gray realm of maya, from which they shall not escape until many, many rebirths and deaths.

BASIC TRUTHS HAVE BEEN VULGARIZED.

The pure, ineffable teachings of Brahminism, the wisdom religion, have been vulgarized in the same manner as the teachings of Zoroaster, Lao Tsze, Jesus of Nazareth and Buddha. If you today ask of the average Hindu professing Brahminism what his religion really is-what Brahminism actually means to him, he will plunge into a garrulous, vertignous, long-winded sequence of inchoate phrases, most of them inconsequential and without a particle of meaning, the rest filched from Buddhism, Mohammedanism or Christianity. Of the actual meaning of Brahminism, of the stupendous truths upon which this great wisdom religion is based-of these the average Brahman knows nothing. If you ask a sage, a true vipra, one born and bred in Brahminism, he will smile and be silent, or pacify you with a phrase. He knows that he cannot explain-in which respect he is wiser than "the present scribe."

THE FOUNDATIONS OF THE BRAHMINISTIC THEORY.

And now let us ask what are these great truths which form the basis of Brahminism? To answer this question fully and intelligently to a western inquirer is quite impossible; and this for two reasons: First of all many of the

basic concepts of Brahminism are in the absolute, and being entirely outside of the domain of relativity, in which the practical man normally "lives and moves and has his being," these concepts cannot be verbally expressed to him, or apperceived by him. To gain such knowledge the student must develop another and higher stratum of consciousness. And the great subject of superconsciousness—what it is and how to achieve it—that, as my Anglo-Indian friend, Mr. Kipling, would say, "is quite another story."

Another reason why it is difficult to impart to the western thinker even an approximate conception of the basic doctrines of Brahminism is one of linguistics. Even for the more appreciable of the Brahministic doctrinesthere are, in many cases, no verbal equivalents in the jargon of the hearthstone, the work shop, the drawing room and the market place. For the esoteric truths of the "wisdom religion" there are no words.

In spite, however, of these difficulties, conceptual and linguistic, I shall attempt herein to give you some general idea of the more obvious doctrines of Brahminism.

BRAHMINISM IS RELIGION AND SCIENCE.

In the first place it must be understood that Brahminism is not merely a religion, like Judaism or a system of ethics like Taoism. Brahminism is at once a cosmogony, a cosmology, an ethics, a philosophy, an ontology and a theology. That is to say its teachings embrace an account of the history and structure of the universe (cosmology and cosmogony), a guide to personal conduct (ethics), the reasons for such rules of conduct (philosophy), a revelation of the soul of man (ontology) and a statement as to the nature of God, Brahm, and His, Its, relation to man

(theology). In this bit of writing I shall try to explain some points of the Brahministic cosmology and cosmogony, leaving other phases of the subject for later articles.

Putting it very briefly Brahminism is a pure Pantheism but not at all a Pantheism in the sense in which that much abused term is used in the West. Pantheism, in the Brahministic sense, means not "the world is God," but "God is the world"; God is not only the Creator but also the actual material out of which the universe was created. Thus Brahminism is a monism in strict concurrence with Taoism and in contradistinction to Judaism. In fact I may remark, en passant, that Judaism has no cosmology or cosmogony worthy the name. The Jewish prophets, even in the height of their splendid powers, had but the crudest notions concerning the history and construction of the universe. Their philosophy was a rabid dualism, recognizing two entities-God and the matter out of which God made the world.

The reference in Hebraic literature to the four corners of the earth, to the rising and setting of the sun and moon and to the installation by their anthropomorphic deity, Jah-Veh or Jehovah, of these luminaries in the firmament for the convenience of man (Genesis I, 14-18)—these references exhibit, as nothing else could, their entire ignorance of cosmology.

THE TWO GREAT CONCEPTIONS OF BRA-MINISM.

Two basic conceptions dominate the cosmology of the Brahmins. One is the idea of alternate expansion and contraction; the other is the idea of the circle or ellipse. Thus the universe, according to the Brahmins, begins as a conceptual point in space. Within this

point there exists in a nascent state the essence of all matter. This matter beginning to revolve gradually extends as a vast whirling sea of what you call nebula revolving in huge spirals farther and farther from the central point.

Certain portions of the nebulous whirling matter become detached from the great mass and begin independent revolutions of their own. Other smaller segments are in time detached from these, and become, in turn, independent whirling bodies, eventually with satellites of their own. Thus the universe at present is a vast mass of matter (prakriti and more refined forms of matter such as ether, prana and manasa)-a vast mass of matter whirling in an inconceivably complicated but physically consistent system of cylic and elleptical paths. This it will be seen is in entire concurrence with the comparatively recent discoveries and deductions of your famous and far-seeing Western philosophers, Kepler, Copernicus, Newton and Galileo.

THE MANVANTURA OR "DAY OF BRAHM."

Now after this whirling mass of matter called the universe has expanded to a certain diameter, has spread out in widening spirals under the influence of what you would call "centrifugal force;" there occurs a moment when the centrifugal push is counterbalanced by the centripetal pull, the attraction toward the center, toward the mysterious point in space already mentioned.

From this moment onward the vast whirling mass of suns, stars, planets, moons and satellites grows smaller and smaller, until, after countless trillons of trillions of years, the expansion and contraction finished, the universe finally becomes again a point in space and the Manvantura is completed.

THE PRAYLARA, THE INEFFABLE "NIGHT OF BRAHM."

And then for an uncountable time begins the Praylara, the glorious "Night of Brahm." This Praylara is the period during which Brahm, the One, fully re-achieves his Oneness. For all that is, or was, or is to be, is concentrated in Himself, in that infinitesimal point in space; from whence, after an unmeasurable period shall again occur the revolving, the alternate increasing and decreasing spiral windings of matter which constitute the next Manvantura, the Day of Brahm.

THE MYSTIC "POINT IN SPACE."

Now just a few words about the Brahministic conception of the state of the universe during the Praylara, the Night of Brahm, the time when all matter, all consciousness, all spirit, if you like, are through infinite concentration reduced to a point in space. To cognise this idea of a point in space containing the entire universe-to imagine this by a process of mere intellection-is quite impossible. To attempt to explain it in terms of relativity would mean to soon be lost in a maze of linguistic subtleties, of paradoxes, of apparent contradictions. It is one of those "spiritual things" which, as the great Roman philosopher, Paul of Tarsus, said, "Must be spiritually discerned."

Perhaps, however, this much may be made clear: During the contraction period of the Manvantura the universe whirling in ever-decreasing spirals has become smaller and smaller, denser and denser, more and more concentrated; and this process continued infinitely means that ultimately the universe is reduced to a mere point in space (Rajahva).

Now (and here is the mystery) this point in space is a sheer abstraction a thing which like the luminiferous ether recently accepted by your own scientists, has no ponderable existence. During the Praylara then it may be said that, in one sense, there exists nothing, in another sense there remains all things in a state of infinite condensation—in absolute repose—in Rajahva, a point an abstraction.

In this state of repose Brahm remains for an infinitude of time; if one may speak of "time" when time has stopped. "A million years are as a day." And then begins another spiral expansion of nebula, another Manvantura during which Brahm shall expand Himself, Itself, into that material universe; with certain small parts of which we are familiar.

As an explanation of the Brahministic cosmology all this is, of course, absurdly incomplete and fragmentary. It will, however, give some indication of the superb energy, scope and daring of those Masters who at a period antedating European civilization by thousands of years formulated that history of the Universe which those Europeans are so slowly and laboriously acquiring today.

Let us glide noiselessly forth; With the key of softness unlock the lock with a whisper, Let ope the doors, O soul.

But she has never learned to cut out the "funeral note," and that fact has given her life a very sombre tinge. S. never tells her troubles to anybody. E. tells hers to everybody who will listen. As a result, S. has many friends, and E. a few who stick to her on account of pure sympathy.

The friends of S. often call her "a good sport." She lives in one room on the top floor of a downtown boarding house. But she makes no apologies,

draws no invidious comparisons and wastes no time in dreaming over what might have been. She entertains her friends in her one room with all the grace of a queen. She is simple and unaffected in manner and speech, and such a person in this extremely stagey day and age is worth going miles to see.

Well, it's good to meet people who bob up serenely no matter how often the billy-club of fate bowls them over. And don't you hate to have to be in the company of those who take bad fortune seriously? What a terrible misfortune it is to be a poor loser! That reminds me of a tennis match.

It is the old case of the North and the South. The final match in the tournament to decide the championship in doubles is on. The team from the South has won the first two sets but has lost the next two, weakening before the fierce attack of the Northerners. The deciding set has gone to four all. South has the service. The server makes a double fault; then another. Then he loses his temper, and with it the match, for the man does not live who can give way to anger and show championship form in athletic sport at the same time.

Now watch the losers. The server, whose poor playing started the trouble, turns abruptly and walks hurriedly off the court to the clubhouse locker-room. But his partner goes up to the net, offers his hand to the champions and looks them straight in the eye as he says: "You sure were too much for us." His manly way of meeting defeat took most of the sting out of it. But the other poor chap's remorse was bitter when he realized that to the losing of the match he had added the far worse disgrace of branding himself a cad in the presence of hundreds of people.

The marks of a good sport in any athletic game are easily recognizable. In golf, he plays his ball exactly where it lies, and carefully observes every rule safeguarding the rights of his opponent and other players on the course. In tennis, he never calls a ball "out" if there is the slightest doubt about it, preferring the loss of a point to the loss of his self-respect. In baseball or football he keeps constantly in mind the fact that he is a gentleman, and gives his opponents credit for being as well bred, no matter how keen the competition or how great the temptation to resort to questionable methods of play.

Not that the athletic fields have a monopoly of the good sports. Far from it. Every mother who is uncomplainingly denying herself for the benefit of her children is a good sport. So is every father who pinches and saves and wears shabby clothes so that John may go to the Tech. So is every physician who cares for the poor and takes for pay the satisfaction of helping somebody. And the nurse who "turns night time into day time," but without the recompense of good fellowship or "the good song ringing clear." And the school teacher who mothers hundreds of children to their everlasting benefit, but herself is mother to none.

Bless you! The good sports are as thick as mosquitoes in Jersey, if we only knew it. Just listen to this. Up in Harlem there was an accident which left a poor woman sightless. Her husband cared for her tenderly, read to her, and took her out to walk and ride in the fresh air. But he became suddenly ill, and died a short time after his wife's accident, leaving her entirely alone. His presence and his cheery care of her had made her happy, even in her blindness. But after his death she spent many a sad hour alone in her endless darkness. wishing that she might have gone on with him.

One afternoon a friend came to visit her. The unfortunate woman spoke pathetically, but not complainingly, of the long hours she was compelled to spend alone with her thoughts.. "If people knew," she said, "how lonely I am, would they not help me to be cheerful, or do they not care?" The friend said that she would find out, and went about it without delay.

She wrote a letter stating the facts very plainly; and had it inserted in one of the evening papers the following day. Within twenty-four hours of the time of publication, she received more than eighty replies from men, women and children who offered their time and services without recompense.

A young man wrote: "I shall gladly read to your friend for an hour or so each day. I am familiar with several languages. Please tell me which one she speaks so that I may select the right books."

A music student said: "Does your friend enjoy music? If so, I will play and sing for her as often as you think she would like to have me."

A wealthy society woman living on Riverside Drive wrote: "If you will tell me at what time of day your friend would enjoy a ride in Central Park, I

shall be glad to call with my carriage and take her out." Others came and brought flowers, and kept the rooms fragrant with them from day to day. And the poor blind woman came to believe that people did care, and that there were in bustling, greedy, materialistic old New York scores and hundreds of those kind hearts which are "more than coronets."



CHAPTER VII.

THOUGHTS UNIVERSAL.

Think not for yourself alone; Echo the pancosmic tone. —Edward Valentine.

In the dim April sunshine of the late Spring, the human flotsam who clung to the benches of Washington Square were like bedraggled sparrows, too disconsolate to chirp. Tramp and worn out tool of the commercial machine and immigrant woman perplexed by the harsh city, they sat in endless, untidy rows along the walks. No one disturbed them, save the important park policeman who occasionally shooed a man from the benches devoted to women and children. They were not so dangerous that they needed to be disturbed, these human wrecks; for they were discouraged.

And among them, facing the Washington Monument, but not heeding how the attempt at sunshine played on that noble arch, was Ralph Pierson, hunched up on a park bench. He was pretending to read a fragment of a sporting page of the *Planet*, but really he was brooding in black melancholy. The "housekeeping rooms" were really a large room with an alcove, dingily opening on a fire-escape, over a bottle littered backyard. They were furnished with the barest of wooden and iron makeshift. Instead of the smart

little japanned gas range, there was a rusty stove for which they furnished a pailful of coal at a time from the "Ice, Coal and Wood" Italian of a neighboring basement. The room was musty from generations of uncleanliness, while the alcove was still stuffier. But with Kate's magic touch, her careful arrangement of their photographs and pictures and the chair or two belonging to her, even this poor place became a home. They cleaned the place with carbolic acid, probably for the first time in its history and lent some of the disinfectant to their next neighbor—for their own benefit as well as hers. Once the smells and cockroaches were slain, they could almost love the place, for, at the cheap, blackened table, it was Ralph and Katherine who sat and looked lovingly at each other, just as much as in the Harlem flat.

On this Sunday, when it was not possible to go out seeking work, Ralph had wandered to Washington Square. Suddenly Ralph smiled, for a reason which seemed to him, afterwards, grotesquely small. Trotting toward him was a little spaniel, a little, curly haired, brown dog with an almost human expression of pert inquisitiveness, wrinkling his nose and twitching his jowls, now gray with comfortable age.

Before one can be healed metaphysically he must become familiar with all the laws of Cosmic Therapeutics. It is not enough that he be told of the existence of this law, and of the possibility of

connecting with it, the human mind still asks more, and seeks definite methods by which it can reunite itself with all the finer action of Cosmic Intelligence.

Individuals are sick because they do not know enough to be well—this is an established fact, but this statement brings little comfort to the trembling life, astray in the inharmonies of consciousness. From every quarter there comes the cry for instruction by which one may reach this law of healing for himself, and become a skillful manipulator of his own Cosmic currents.

The first lesson to learn by those who would master Cosmic Therapeutics is to know that this great Creative Energy of the universe really exists. This is not a hard lesson. The mind must own itself. It must be the divine thinker of its own thoughts, and declare to just what kind of thoughts it will vibrate. It must pick up the thoughts which will reveal to it a perfect plan of life, then project a perfect image of that plan, stand firmly by its own creations, and fashion them again and again with increasing skill, until the whole structure of the human self is brought into harmonious thought at-one-ment.

Remember thoughts are tools, and the life substance is shaped with these tools. Every hour we can stand before our

half-formed self and with tools a thousand times finer than those of the finest craftsman of the physical plane, we can cut from our own thought atmosphere, forms of exquisite perfection, until body, environment, friends, even our whole life, is a world picture of peace, power, love, joy, health and wealth, limitless, whole, free.

After we can hold one thought as long as we desire, and can play with our own thought world as men toss balls, and find that we are really the master of our own ideas, our next step is to begin to create the image and pass our idea into thought form. As long as we have only the idea, we simply have realization; but when we can pass this idea into a perfect thought form, created from the indestructible thought substance of the universe, we are on the path towards actualization, and just a little more practice will make the things we have fashioned come out from the absolute intelligence and cluster around us in finite physical embodiment.

In order to create an image we must see the thought picture of the idea. If we have an idea of health, then we must lift ourselves aloft in a thought form of health. We must stand out in consciousness, whole, vital, radiant; we must work on this thought picture until we walk right out into mental space, our whole being—body, flesh, tissue—glowing, gleaming and quivering with a health divine.

This is not castle building; it is CREATION. In the old days we built "air castles" knowing they must fall. We built them to fall; but in our new understanding we create a new condition. We build these conditions into the very heart of the Cosmic Substance, and work out a finished picture of just what health is; what it means to possess it. If the mind wanders or other thoughts drift in, they are displaced

again and again with the conscious thought of health until only the health thought remains.

Conscious imaging is the call of the human mind to the mind of the atmospheric atom. It has always been used since mind began, but in the past it was used without a full understanding of its power. Suggestive science teachers have always included it in their methods, but were unconscious of its real value, and never instructed their patients in its deep spiritual meaning.

There is not an hour of our life that we are acting without an image. Every thought, every word, carries the form with it. If we speak the word "rose," we at once see some kind of a rose-we do not see a tulip; but something which we have called a "rose" immediately takes form in our mind. We cannot read a poem or a story, but our mind follows form in pictured projection. "Some day I'll wander back again to where the old home stands, beneath the old tree down the lane afar in distant lands." What do we see? Read this quotation again and think about the picture the idea centers project. It is not hard to see it.

Just as the teacher of drawing reads a story to the class, and then each one draws just what his idea centers register, just so are *our thoughts* always telling us a story, and we are pushing out into atomic consciousness the images our idea centers build.

There are some minds which are full of negative images. Their whole field of consciousness is lined with distorted thought forms of poverty, lack, disease, fear, shanties and hovels, built for themselves in atomic consciouness, and revitalized every day by their own thinking; then they turn with puny questioning and wonder why their objective life is hourly taking on the same expression. We must learn this lesson: that just what we project into consciousness cannot refuse to manifest in form in our external world. We must know that we can never expect perfect manifestation from imperfectly formulated thought images.

Some of our first images must, naturally through ignorance, be very crude. So are an artist's first pictures; or a poet's poems; a composer's songs; an architect's plans. But as we go on mastering the art of creating, in consciousness, we grow more and more perfect, until we can project beautiful harmonious images.

When one has really opened his mind to the natural law of his own world: when he has learned to know life as substance and intelligence, and this intelligence correlated by the natural law of thought attraction, he soon finds that "men do not gather figs of thistles, nor grapes from thorns," but that on the path of life, like attracts like; then turning to the deeper side of his own mind, he becomes a conscious manipulator of his atomic consciousness, and he throws out his string of thought to vibrate only with the great constructive forms of life. He then becomes lord of all this lower kingdom, for he is one with the universal atomic mind at every level of living; he knows the kind of things which his thoughts will attract; he is the highest expression of all thought; it is for him to command-the whole atomic world must obey him.

It is written that Jesus talked with

the wind, waves and nature, as men speak with men—and just so, those who know the *will* of the universe and do it, may here and now throw their thought words out at any level of the Infinite Mind, and, knowing their own power, command the atomic intelligence, and they will be obeyed. It is the Great Cosmic Law; there is no appeal from it. When we get understanding equal to a grain of mustard seed, we can say to disease, poverty, limitation,— yea, even death itself, "Be ye removed," and displaced by health, wealth, love and peace.

The whole world of Cosmic Intelligence is simply *waiting* to be called into form, and our recognition gathers the intelligence around us.

Consciousness answers to consciousness throughout all space. Jesus sent His Word and healed; the wind and the waves obeyed His will. It is written that He touched the higher etheric vibrations with the powerful thought of His Master Mind, and the *thought* turned into wine and loaves and fishes —higher intelligence projected into form.

There is no distance between the energy that creates and the things created. Atom touches atom throughout the universe; they form the one mind in all and through all. When in scientific and revealed understanding men shall say, "Thy Kingdom Come".—IT WILL COME.

Lessons in Constructive Science.

WHAT IS YOUR ATTITUDE TOWARDS THINGS— PRACTICAL ADVICE ABOUT DOMESTIC AFFAIRS— HOW TO BUY—WEAR, EAT, HAVE THE BEST—THE BEST NOT OSTENTATION NOR EXTRAVAGANCE— ECONOMY AND THRIFT.

There is a constructive, or integrating principle in nature, and a destructive, or disintegrating principle.—Power applied through the constructive principle builds, forms and integrates; it draws atoms and forms together.—Power applied through the destructive principle dissolves and disintegrates; it disperses atoms and forms, and throws them apart.—To learn how to make every thought and action constructive, is to master the secret of all attainment.

V.

THE CONSTRUCTIVE ATTITUDE.

We have shown you the importance of constructive speech; we have now to show you that the constructive attitude of mind and body is equally important. The outward appearance will be decided by the inward attitude; and the attitude of others toward you is decided more largely by your outward appearance than by any one thing. You are seeking to manifest wealth and power; do you go about presenting the outward appearance of poverty and weakness? What is your mental attitude? Is it that of fear and caution, or of confidence and trust? When you have a twenty-dollar bill, do you cling to it as long as you can for fear it will soon go, if you get it changed? Is that a consistent attitude for one who asserts, "All things are mine?"

In all the things that you have to use

now, or buy now, be sure to get the best. Never buy cheap clothing, or secondhand goods. Never run after "bargains" with the idea of saving money. This does not mean that you shall tamely submit to robbery or extortion, but do not seek that which is cheap. To seek that which is cheap is to express the fear that you will become poor if you buy that which is good, and which is sold at a fair price. You cannot afford to put yourself in the attitude of fear; of being afraid to get the best; of being in the class of those who cannot afford the best. Do not spend money for ostentatious display, but get the best for looks and service. When you buy a pair of shoes, or a garment, do not look among the cheap things; ask to be shown the best; and if you have not money enough to buy a whole suit of the best, buy one garment in the full faith that you will be able to get the rest tomorrow; or pay down what you have, and have the suit put aside for you until you get the balance of the price. Wear the best, and think of yourself as a person who wears the best. Never form a mental picture of yourself as poorly or cheaply dressed. If you form that mental picture, you will surely present that outward appearance.

When you go to buy greceries do net "save" or "economize" by taking second-class foods. If you have only a quarter in your purse, and want sirloin steak, do not buy liver, and save twenty cents for some possible emergency. Invest the quarter in sirloin steak, feeling perfectly sure that if an emergency comes the means to meet it will come with it. If you are to enter into abundance, you must get out of the attitude of fear and caution. As Ingersoll said, "If you have but a dollar to spend, spend it as if it was but a withered leaf, and you the owner of uncounted forests. I had rather be a beggar and spend my money like a king than be a king and spend my money like a beggar." That is scientific. So long as you spend your money like a beggar, you will never command your environment like a king. Kingship does not go with the beggarly attitude of mind, nor with beggarly practices. Take the kingly (or queenly) attitude; wear the very best, and have the best there is to eat.

Do not buy cheap furnishings for your home. If you need a hundred dollars' worth of furniture and have only fifty dollars, do not go to a second-hand store, or buy cheap goods. Get the best as far as the fifty dollars will go, and believe that the other fifty dollars is coming. It will come. Better have one good picture than three or four cheap daubs; better have a fifty-dollar Davenport as the only piece of furniture in the room than to fill the room with furniture so cheap that fifty dollars will pay for all of it. If you start on the fifty-dollar Davenport grade, other furniture of the same grade will come; but if you start upon the roomful-for-fiftydollars grade, all your thoughts will be upon that level, and there you will live. Get the best; get the very best, and have faith that you will be able to get all you need.

If you wear the best, eat the best and have the best in your home, it puts you in the right mental attitude. You see yourself as one who has the best, is of the best, and IS the best; and the best there is in you will come to the surface. You will take the mental attitude of faith, confidence and power, and your success will be assured. You will take hold of your work with conscious power, and your work will be well done. You will BE the best, and by the law of action and reaction, the best will move toward you. On the other hand, if you wear cheap clothes, eat cheap foods and surround vourself with cheap things to "save money" you will put yourself in the mental attitude of cheapness and inferiority. You will think of yourself in connection with cheap and inferior things, and so will see yourself as a cheap and inferior person. The cheap and inferior within you will be brought to the surface, and you will never do your best. You will be incapable of exerting your whole power, and by the law of reaction, cheap and inferior things will move toward you. Get the best of everything, and get rid of the feeling that you are "extravagant"; the best is none too good.

Let me again caution you not to run into mere ostentatious display. The "best" does not necessarily mean the most showy. What you want is to live on the plane of the best, and among the best, but not to ADVERTISE that you are the best, as if you were afraid people would not find it out. Have the very best, but carefully avoid what Elbert Hubbard has well characterized as "conspicuous waste." The man who advertises that he is a good man, or a great man, is neither good nor great. If you advertise your Abundance by lavish and unnecessary display, you show that you are cheap in mind after all. You manifest a poverty of soul

which will sooner or later bring you to poverty of body. The people who are the best will have the best; but they will not flaunt nor splurge. We do not try to make display of that which is natural and normal; and those who make an elaborate effort to show that they HAVE the best, only succeed in proving that they are not really of the best. Get the best of everything, not because you wish to show it to other pepole, but because you harmonize with it. And be sure that you DO harmonize with it.

Be sure, I say, that you get rid of the feeling that there is anything "extravagant" in getting the best of everything. Dismiss forever the idea that you "can't afford it." You cannot afford anything else. There is enough of the best for everybody, and if the supply runs short, the mills and shops will be set running overtime to produce more. You must get out of your mind the last vestige of the old notion that poverty or penuriousness, or "thrift" in the old sense is creditable. You must get rid of the idea that you need to "make things do" when you would like to have better things. You must get rid of the idea that it is necessary to practice self-denial, in the sense of going without what you need for the living of a complete life. All those things belong to the old thought; they have no place in the new thought.

Talk wealth, health and progress, and have the best of everything. It is well enough to provide a surplus, so that you may be ready to take advantage of any new opportunity, but do not lay up for a rainy day. If you live right, think right, and work right, there will never be a rainy day for you. If you lay up for a rainy day, you will impress the sub-conscious with the fear of a rainy day; with the idea of weakness and incompetence, and so you will cause the the rainy day to come. Opportunities for larger work and service will come your way, and you will need a few hundred dollars to take advantage of these opportunities; provide for that, but do not be "saving." Do not be "economical." "Thrift" in the sense that it means doing without what you want, or being content with less than the best of everything, is a vice and not a virtue. Get the very best of everything, and harmonize with the best of everything; then you will be at your best all the time.

The Passing of the Third Floor Back.

ANOTHER PLAY THAT TEACHES—"WORTH FORTY SERMONS"—SUPERIOR IN ONE RESPECT TO "THE WITCHING HOUR"—A FASCINATING STORY—EXCEL-LENTLY ACTED.

The growing popularity of plays that try to teach something definite is a hopeful and significant sign.

Among this class of plays are several that may fairly be termed new thought.

One of the newest and most popular of these is "The Passing of the Third Floor Back," by Jerome K. Jerome.

It comes to New York from a run of over three hundred performances in London. When we wrote to New York to arrange for passes the reply came back: "Nothing doing. Seats all sold far in advance," which we found was true. By resorting to the good (?) offices of the ticket speculators a friend secured two seats (at exorbitant prices, of course), and we consider that we have witnessed one of the great educational plays of the year.

My wife says it is worth forty sermons.

One might easily imagine that Mr. Jerome had received the suggestion for his play from "The Devil"; for "The Passing of the Third Floor Back" is the antithesis of the other play.

In "The Devil" we have the bad angel constantly standing at one's elbow and suggesting evil.

In "The Third Floor Back" the devil is replaced by a character who stands for the higher self and who appeals to

and brings out the higher self in each one with whom he associates.

The weakest point in the play (and the weakest point in every play with a "purpose") is that the moral jam is spread on so thick that the bread and butter becomes rather rich for one's digestion at times.

Even so, I consider "The Third Floor Back" superior in this respect to "The Witching Hour," "The Servant in the House," etc., etc.

A strong feature of "The Third Floor Back" is that the lesson of the play is practically applied and worked out in half a dozen ways right on the stage. The point is driven home so that "he who runs may read."

*

The curtain goes up upon the interior of a London lodging house. The landlady is a grasping cheat. She waters the milk, and by a liberal use of curry powder hides the fact that the veal is spoiled. She charges exorbitant prices —when she can get them—and runs her place with the assistance of one slavey, Stasia, a workhouse girl. Among the boarders are a Shrew, a Snob, a Rogue, a Bully, etc., etc.

One day a new boarder comes. No one knows who or what he is. He persists in treating the landlady like an

honorable person, accepts all she tells him of her rooms and boarders as gospel truth, and insists on paying her more than she asks for a room.

Touched by his confidence and reminded of the time when she was something else than a grasping, cheating old landlady, the woman insists that she has made a mistake in giving him the price of the room he is to occupy, and that it is only half what she first stated.

Then the Passer-by, as the new boarder is known, meets and talks with the boarders, one by one.

In each he recognizes and appeals to only the higher self. By his mental attitude of perfect trust in the one he is addressing, by his clever questions, he forces each one to see himself, and to recognize that his real aims are true and right and noble, and that he is simply side-tracked by the petty meanness and deceits of his everyday life.

A wonderful reform takes place among the boarders, as a result of this one man's mental attitude. The landlady becomes generous and kind. The Rogue becomes honest. The Painted Lady abandons the paint and no longer says sharp things to and about her neighbors. The Coward becomes strong. The Shrew becomes once more a loving wife. Her husband, the Bully, goes to work and supports his family, something he has not done for years, and becomes a considerate lover. Their daughter, who was about to sell herself for money, by means of a rich marriage, becomes engaged instead to the man she really loves. The man whose wealth was to buy her, abandons his selfishness and becomes a helpful friend of the young couple.

Here is one epigram from the play that is worth preserving: "It is not poverty that makes men cowards, but the *fear* of poverty." Forbes-Robertson and his company of English actors do excellent work in this play.

* * Too many are like a workman who, having tools, continually cries aloud to some one or something to give him tools. You have the tools with which to make life a success. Use them. Apply what you learn of new thought. Begin NOW. You can only learn by experiment. Don't always wait for some one to use his consciousness of truth to propel you.

* * * I hope every reader of *The Nautilus* is following the articles on "Barbarous Mexico," now appearing in *The American* magazine. Is it not shameful that certain business "interests" in the United States, that are, I suppose, mixed up in Mexican investments, should be doing all in their power to discredit the *American* articles, even to the extent of trying to get the magazine excluded from the mails?

* * Night after night large audiences gather and listen with breathless interest to plays like "The Harvest Moon," which from start to finish teaches practical psychology and metaphysics. It goes to show the wonderful interest in these subjects. For the playwriters give the public just what they call for and when they call for it. Mr. Thomas is said to have prepared the main part of "The Witching Hour" in the form of a short playlet twenty years ago. Then no manager would look at it.

* * * Another amusing instance of the way plays are made to fit the audience occurs in "Israel." In the

original play as presented in France, Thibault, the leading character, commits suicide in the last act. This was considered too morbid an ending for American audiences. So in presenting the play over here a nice young lady is lugged into the last act, by the scruff of the neck as it were, and made to declare her love for Thibault that he may have an excuse or incentive for continuing to live.

* * * In some respects the conservative East is more liberal than the West. In Seattle the authorities have prohibited open air meetings in the streets and parks. In Los Angeles everyone who lectures (provided admission fee is charged) is subjected to a heavy license fee. (The Los Angeles law has recently been amended, but in such a way that outsiders can still be taxed.) On the other hand, we read that Mayor-elect Gaynor, of New York, is taking active steps to have a place set aside in some one of the city parks where socialists, labor unions and all grades of cranks are free to hold open air meetings and spout to their heart's content without the supervision of uniformed policemen. The idea is borrowed from England, and the mayor designs to establish such an open air meeting place as is maintained in Hyde Park, London.

* * * Free speech is the dearest right of any people. There is no surer way of keeping the anarchs good natured and in a harmless mood than by allowing them every possible liberty in the way of free self-expression. There is no surer way to convert the discontented portion of society into dangerous rebels and criminals than by curtailing their expression of ideas. When you take away an individual's rights you make it easy for him to become a martyr, and a martyr with the power to command

public sympathy is always dangerous to society.

* * Mrs. Augusta Stetson was deposed as a leader of a Christian Science church in New York largely because she practiced "malicious animal magnetism." In other words she was accused of giving absent treatment with evil designs instead of for healing purposes. This brings up an interesting question: Do the "bad" thoughts of others affect us as readily as their good thoughts do?

* * * Negative or "bad" thoughts have just so much power as you invest them with—no more. They have no foundation in principle and exist simply as errors of a disordered mind. Like a phantom they may frighten you, but in themselves I do not think them dangerous.

* * * If you go back far enough you will find there is only one source for both "good" and "bad" thoughts. Are you reading Shelton's "Satanic Science" in *Christian*? He expresses this idea well and clearly.

* * * The famous lotus flower of Egypt springs from the black mud and slime at the bottom of the Nile. A tiny green stem starts up toward the surface of the water. Up and up it pushes until it finally reaches the sunshine and air. Then a bud begins to form and one day there floats upon the shining bosom of the river a beautiful white blossom. But its roots are always away down there in the rich mud at the bottom of the river.

* * * Those acts which we term "good" are often the flower of many negative experiences. As the mud of the Nile gives life to the fragrant lotus, so out of these unpleasant experiences we are fairly forced into the path of wisdom and rightness. All natural im-

• pulses are right in themselves, and more potent for good than for bad. It is our use of these impulses which determines whether they shall flower forth in constructive acts, or whether they shall rule us for "evil" or purely selfish and disintegrating ends. Selfishness and a disintegrating use of our natural powers keep us in the dark places of life. A constructive use of all our forces, a desire for "good" takes us up to the light.

* * * Most women believe (perhaps not unjustly) that a man is only half civilized until he is married.

* * * There is nothing the average conventional man or woman (especially woman) fears so much as a new idea. We dearly love to sink down into a comfortable, easy fitting, narrow little groove and keep on going around and around until we wear ourselves out or the bottom of the groove falls through. But kind old Nature won't have it so. She upsets all our narrow little plans with the unexpected. She knows we can only grow by change of experience. The law of life is the law of change. "People wish to be settled," says Emerson; only so far as they are unsettled is there any hope for them.

Nevertheless, it is a little surprising to learn that the cost of medicine per patient in the Massachusetts General Hospital is less than one-third what it was fifteen years ago, although the price of most drugs has risen in that time.—Youth's Companion.

The Citizens' Union of New York is doing a good work in establishing a bureau for hclping the Italian immigrants to citizenship. Thus far help of this kind has come from Tammany, always on the watch for new members of the political family. It is by such fostering that Tammany has kept close to the citizens of the teeming East Side and captured their allegiance and their votes. It apparently pays the new citizen of foreign birth to belong to Tammany. It will be an important part of the new bureau's work to show that it pays far better for the citizen to ally himself with the forces that work for good government. If such a demonstration cannot be made the Bureau cannot accomplish its purpose.—Boston Herald.

A correspondent asks for "information and opinion" anent the New Theater which opened recently in New York. Simply put, the New Theater is a magnificent building on Central Park West, in which an attempt is being made to give drama and music for drama's and music's own sake. A building where the question of finance need not be considered in so far as support is concerned and where native players, authors and composers will be encouraged though not necessarily preferred.

The building itself is truly a work of art. In point of architecture nothing finer exists in this country—and as a theater perhaps nowhere. Outside and inside it is replete with magnificence that is yet magnificently simple. It runs from street to street and is quite as large as any theater in America. Every comfort that can possibly be given to both the audience and the players has been provided. The stage is said to be the best equipped in either Europe or America, and every attache from Mr. Ames the director, to the page girls, has been selected after a thorough consideration of his or her particular fitness.

The funds for the building were subscribed by several prominent American millionaires, and the support is largely made up of subscriptions as in the case of the opera houses. In this way the general public, while welcomed, is not catered to in its whims, and workers need not fear the jabs of the critics. Whether or not it is a success is too early a question. The first performances were marred by the poor acoustics which have been remedied by removing some of the draperies, and thus far but two new pieces have been produced. One of these made its impress-""The Strife"-but whether or not certain plays fail or succeed, the New Theater is a worthy movement and should be encouraged. It savors of the municipal control of amusements and artistic endeavors-which is surely praiseworthy. course, there are and will be disgruntled actors and jealous managers who will decry its good, and there will be captious critics who will direct their inane shafts at its every move. But sooner or later this beginning will make itself felt in New Theaters everywhere and the miserable star system which is the bugaboo of dramatics, will walk the plank intsead of the boards .- Holyoke Transcript.

One of the largest insurance companies in the country proposes to establish a sanatorium in the Catskills for the treatment of its policy-holders affected with tuberculosis. Several months ago Prof. Irving Fisher of Yale told the life underwriters of the country that the average life of Americans could be lengthened fifteen years by preventive measures, and that it was a practical thing for the insurance companies to undertake a part of that preventive work, through selfish interest, if for no other reason. The plan of the insurance company above referred to is the first step in that direc-Under the New York law insurance tion. companies are barred from real estate investments, but in such a worthy cause this obstacle should be circumvented.-Boston Herald.

The Roman Catholic policy, as developed in cities, seems to be to erect large churches, whereas Protestants build smaller edifices and more of them. The Protestant idea has been carried a step farther by a proposition recently made in New York, to set up in new territory "neighborhood churches," one on every block, perhaps, the lower floor to be used for religious purposes, the upper part to be fitted for housekeeping, and rented. One clergyman might serve a dozen or twenty such enterprises, the rented rooms would help to pay the bills, and although in some instances a neighborhood church might narrow into a sort of family affair, one has no trouble to find precedents of growth from smaller beginnings. Aquila and Priscilla still salute Christians, by the hand of Paul, "with the church that is in their house," and we cannot afford to forget that Christ's "cathedral" on one occasion was a fishing boat.—Youth's *Companion*. Queen Helena of Italy has put herself at the head of a revolt against the monstrous hats which the Parisian milliners are forcing upon a reluctant world this year, and the Italian ladies, following her example, are resorting to the graceful lace mantilla. Herein appears one of the advantages of monarchy—it can set fashions.—Youth's Companion.

The most important permanent memorial to Hudson and Fulton, though not primarily established as such, is the new Highlands of the Hudson Forest Reservation, which borders the Hudson for fifteen miles along the most picturesque portion of its course. Not only from the standpoint of the protection afforded to forest scenery along the river is the creation of this new reservation of interest, but a somewhat unusual importance attaches to it because it is different from any of the state or national forest reserves hitherto established. It is, in fact, a pioneer of its kind, bringing into play a principle unique in the forestry practice of this or any other state in the country, namely, the application of the state's police power to the management of privately owned forests. New York, in other words, has extended over some seventy-five square miles, more or less, of wild mountain land along the west bank of the Hudson River between Cornwall and Tompkins Cove, and extending several miles inland, of which it does not now own an acre of land or a single stick of growing wood, the power, exercised through the Forest, Fish and Game Commission, to tell the private owner how he must cut his wood and care for his standing timber. The putting into practice of the principle that the state, as quasisovereign and represenative of the interests of the people, has the right to enact laws for the protection of privately owned water and forests within its territory, is something quite new in American forestry. Yet the idea is probably no more radical at the present time than was that of the game laws at the period of their promulgation. In fact, the new law, while accomplishing large results, will disturb existing conditions to a surprisingly small degree. Hereafter all owners of timber land within the limits of the boundaries laid down must cut their wood under the direction of the state forestry officials; that is to say, in accordance with rational forestry rules as applied to this particular region by the Forest, Fish and Game Commission. These rules will be interpreted by the commission's forester, appointed for the Highlands of the Hudson reservation, although if it is so desired private property may be forested by an expert in the employ of private owners who has been ap-proved by the commission. The commission will also police and inspect the privately owned forests and protect them from fire, in the same manner as is done in the State-owned Adirondack and Catskill preserves. It will post throughout the reservation such rules as it may establish, and violations of these rules are to be punishable by fines of fifty dollars, which it may collect in civil action .- Harper's Weekly.





P. F. S.—Nonsense! You might as well tell me that you cannot control your fingers when you try to play the piano. Of course you can't if you have never tried to. Controlling your thoughts and controlling your fingers, are learned in exactly the same way—by careful, persistent *practice*, in placing your thoughts and your fingers in just exactly the spot desired; and placing them there again every time they fly the track. You can't hold your mind year long on one thought any more than you can hold your finger very long on a single key

of the piano, and get results. You can think the thought, let go of it, then think it again, and keep on repeating until it is easy and natural for you to think that particular thought. You can affirm any desirable thing, keep on affirming it for ten minutes at a time, two or three times a day, and eventually the thoughts will think themselves without any special effort on your part. But you have got to do the faithful practice first. Go in to win and stick to it. There are many books, and lessons, which tell you how to think. The new thought is a point of view. Keep affirming the point of view until it becomes natural. That is all there is to it.

J. A. N.-I must quote a little of your letter so that our other readers may get the point without any question. You say: "I am a farmer's wife, and depend on my hens for my spending money, clothes, etc., and I wish you would tell me in the Family Counsel why it is that all my hens stop laying when I begin to affirm that they do lay, that they are great layers, and in fancy see myself bringing in large baskets full of eggs. Take last year, for instance,—I very much wanted to take a trip to Boston in February (a time of year when any hen ought to be laying). Well, in November about half of them were laying, and I thought if only the rest of them would lay, I could take that trip, so I began to affirm as above, at the same time giving them, as I always do, the best of care; but gradually the eggs began to grow less and less until in February only one hen was laying, and I not only could not take that trip, but had to use money had saved for clothes to buy feed for them. When I quit affirming they gradually began to lay until about the usual number were laying. Now I have tried this a half dozen times, in as many years, only not always in the winter, with the same result." It seems to me that the cause of your difficulty lies in these few words, "I very much wanted." Anxiety defeats affirmation for the time being. I should judge that your affirmations were made with anxious personal will, instead of being made in faith and love. Love is the universal will which backs you. When you begin to get anxious and strain after a thing, you cut off the inflow of the universal will or love. This results in demagnetizing yourself and your word. But even this would not hinder your word from doing its work, provided you use the personal will only when you are making the affirmations, and at certain set periods of the day. If you can relax and love and believe between times, your word can get in its work anyway. But if you carry the anxious will over into the other hours of the day, you keep your love energy pretty well cut off from yourself and the object of your solicitude. It is better not to set dates for doing things, nor set certain sums of money that you must have on that definite date. All this tends to arouse the personal will to that anxious state which means defeat. Picture what you desire and believe and be happy, knowing that what you desire will manifest in the fullness of time.

A Parrot Story from Mrs. McAdow:-

Let's have a nice, quiet little talk about parrots. Down in the sunny South it is dignified to have a handle to your name, else you don't count for much. I have a parrot and his title is "Major," so he counts for a good deal in my circle. He calls himself "Maja" and "Little Boy," and he calls me "Motha" (mother), and when he's on his dignity and wants me to understand that he has stood all my folishness that he's going to, I am called "Mismacadow" in an emphasized tone that means business. He isn't the smartest parrot I ever heard of but everybody loves him that comes his way, even the old fossils that are always gibing at woman's imbecility over pets.

"Maja" has little human ways of reasoning that made him a never-ending source of wonder to our family and our frequent visitors.
