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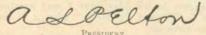
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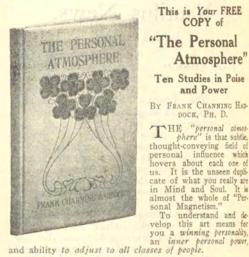

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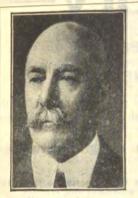

I will tell you what the others do—





they sit still and enjoy their virtuousness. They sit still and enjoy the sensation of throwing the blame for their own situation on to somebody else! They enjoy themselves meandering round in the labyrinth of reason hunting after words that will mitigate the meaning of this statement:

THE INDIVIDUAL IS A SELF-MADE MAGNET THAT ATTRACTS TO ITSELF THE CONDITIONS THAT ARE RELATED TO IT.

He is a great substitutionist. He is always picking out words that are "just as good," but don't quite convey the whole meaning! For instance he likes to say that he "relates" himself through no fault of his own to his unpleasant circumstances, but that he did not by something within himself attract those circumstances. Like Job, he enjoys himself repudiating his boils, instead of acknowledging their source and getting rid of them. He insists upon "holding fast his own integrity," even if he has to make God and Principle a liar to do it.

Delivering Yourself.

And with that goes the correlative that the conditions in themselves are merely counters given by the Good Principle, that you may work out the new problem just presented.

While you sit back and accuse somebody else of putting the problem before you for no reason whatever, and for no good whatever, you do nothing toward solving it. Therefore you are held to it.





Just you accept the first principle of New Thought clear down deep in your HEART, and ACT from it, and it will not be long until you find yourself absolutely free to go or come, absolutely free to act as the spirit within you prompts.

Delivering Others.

THE TROUBLE with you is you have never had the good old Methodist experience of putting yourself "all on the altar." You live too much in your reason.

Reason can prove anything you suggest to it, and never until you put yourself "all on the altar" and act and think and feel from that fundamental principle of New Thought, will you find yourself freed from your limitations of environment.

Not until God enlightens your reason from within your heart, do you begin to realize your real I.

Until then you will go on fooling yourself with the idea that you are "delivering others." You only fool yourself, for one person NEVER delivers another.

The individual is a self-made magnet that attracts to himself all the conditions that come to him, good and bad; every condition affording the counters for the working out of the new problem by the individual; the individual himself always absolutely free and choosing moment by moment what he will think, either the truth of absolute—ness, or the untruth of limitation and either the truth of absolute-ness,

Dominion over your THOUGHTS of course, dominion by choosing truth thoughts.

The Science of Memory.

MEMORY used to be considered a special faculty of the mind with its home in a particular location inside the skull. If memory was poor the bit





of skull over this faculty was flat. If memory was good the skull bulged.

Not so. Man is an organization of ideas. There are some billions of them in a human being, each idea dwelling in its own little cell, each cell furnished with a memory all its own.

The cells which live along the alimentary canal remember their experiences in taking care of the grub you give them. The cells in your brain remember many of the things you see and smell and taste and hear and feel. They store these memories away, and new experiences are co-ordinated and stored with the memories of similar experiences gone before.

Every little cell is an animated moving picture film, which you can throw on the screen of consciousness at will. Sometimes. What is commonly called a good memory is based on two things: the making of good films to begin with, and the proper co-ordination and storage of those films. Given these two factors you can touch the button and your being will automatically do the rest.

The making of good films depends upon INTEREST. Interest is soul-light for memory photography. In memory pictures there are flashlights, snapshots and time exposures of various lengths. The difference of time required to impress the picture upon memory depends upon the amount of INTEREST flashed upon it. Interest is a matter of cultivation and direction.

Interest depends largely upon your powers of observation. No faculty is so easily cultivated as observation.

Portraying Evil.

You can't hide the unhappy things in life just because some people are weak-minded enough to wallow in them. Life itself is not emasculated nor pasteurized, nor goody-ized. The artist must portray life as it is. We cannot banish pain and suffering from all novels any more than we can from life; and it would be unwise if we did. We cannot abolish whiskey, tea, or coffee, or ice water because some people drown themselves in these things.

But the artist in story writing can so present life that the reader will cleave to the good and abhor the evil. Not the incidents in a story or a play, but the INTENT of its structure is what counts. All hail to the American people who won't stand for either a story or a play that "comes out wrong."

To sum up, if the writer gets his heart right and his purpose right he can trust the incidents to the free spirit within him.

As to "glorifying sorrow" I can't recall any of the really *great* poets or prose writers who have ever done it. At least none who has ever done it in his greatest works. No true artist ever welters in unpleasant emotions. The masterpieces of literature appeal to the fidelity, faith, courage, love and wisdom in human nature.

At its best a novel is a cross section out of life, and the reader gets out of it what he brings to it.

If he reads for tears he finds them, if he reads for the uplift the tears are but an incident on the way.

THIS IS the way I do it. I take Vogue magazine and devote one hour to each number of it, carefully studying and comparing lines, and reading only a very little of the descriptions, here and there.

I take also two or three others of the more popular fashion magazines such as The Ladies' Home Journal, Delineator, Pictorial Review, etc., to the fashion pages of which I devote far less time.

Vogue gives me the advance lines. These I study carefully. At first they meant nothing to me but whims. After a year of studying Vogue painstakingly, an hour for each issue, I began to see a meaning and a trend in styles.

This study gives me an instinct that helps me when I go shopping. I can buy more garments in less time and make fewer mistakes than any other woman I know of. I do it by the process of elimination. When I go into Kurzman's in New York or Brigham's in Springfield, I do not allow a sales girl to bring me what she thinks I ought to have. I go with her along the lines of hanging garments and pick out what I readily recognize as approaching nearest to the most advance lines of cut that I have seen in Vogue. You never find in a ready made shop anything that is quite so far in advance as you will find in Vogue. By a process of elimination I decide in five or ten minutes on four or five different gowns or suits between which I shall choose. In fifteen or twenty more minutes I have tried them all on and come to my decision.

Compare this with the trying-on fits





that other women pass through every season, and judge for yourself whether or not I have struck the right way to take care of these things.

When I go to a dressmaker I ask her what she thinks would be nice for me, and then if her ideas do not please me I rectify them by *Vogue* or some other magazine that she may have at hand.

I go to the best dressmaker I can command, and I find her the cheapest because she knows the most and is the most businesslike in her dealings with me. Where I used to spend two hours on a fitting, I now spend fifteen minutes. The best dressmaker studies Vogue, just as I do. And she studies all the other still more advanced fashion magazines.

I am always aiming for what I call the democratic dress; the dress that will be most suitable for the largest number of occasions, without attracting either envy on the one hand nor contempt on the other; the golden-mean dress; the dress nice enough to be at home with the richest and not over-awing to the plainest dressed; the dress useful first and only modestly ornamental.

In studying Vogue and other magazines I am always on the lookout for what I call THE LINES THAT LAST. American women are working out together a sort of democratic dress that will be more beautiful and more suitable and more useful than the old Greek costumes. The lines that allow freedom without unnecessary folds of material; lines that do this with a maximum of grace and simplicity, are the lines that will last. High waistline, large armholes, straight lines, so that

there need be no strictures anywhere, comfortable sleeves, silhouette lines but with some arrangement for fullness that will make the width around the bottom elastic when it is necessary to walk rapidly or to step up onto a car, are all in the right direction.

Given the right lines, adornment may be infinite in its variety. It is the lines of a universal garment that the women of America are working out, and I am doing what I can to study these lines and to help evolve them.

To Vogue and one other of the above magazines I pay my own subscription, and not one of them has ever advertised with us or had business dealings with us of any other sort. I am simply passing along to my women readers a good thing I have discovered—the way to be modish at the smallest outlay of time and energy, the way to select fashions that will not go out of fashion.

### A SCIENCE OF PRAYER

Prayer a Natural Force—What the Author Discovered, From Personal Experience, About Prevailing Prayer—Formative Prayer—The Silence and What it Brings in the Way of Prayer and Recreation—Stambing the

Power and Recreation—Stamping the Right Pattern into the Invisible but Potent World of Automatic Forces.

PRAYER is a natural force, and is subject to definite laws and conditions, just as are all other natural forces. If you shove a book off your desk, gravity does not take time to think the matter over and decide whether there are unusual circumstances in the case which may make it advisable for it to work at right angles or in an opposite direction to its usual course, or perhaps not to work at all. Certain conditions have been fulfilled, and gravity automatically does its part. So it is with prayer. If the conditions of prevailing prayer are fulfilled, it will do its part unfailingly, seven times out of seven. The "vilest sinner" has at times chanced to satisfy these conditions under which prayer works, and at these times he has worked "miracles"-has brought into action direct spiritual energy-just as certainly as any "saint" could have done. On the other hand, very good people often

fail most miserably to find the secret of prevailing prayer, in which case they usually decide that a personal God has looked into the matter and decided to turn down their requests.

I would not willingly make prayer any less sacred or any less of a refuge to any living creature. If you prefer to look upon your prayers as personal appeals from a child to its Father, you are perfectly right, and you also have a right to decide that the mater is too sacred to be farther discussed. On the other hand, you may agree with me that prevailing prayer is too mighty and too holy a thing to be used merely as a balm to wounded feelings, or as a last resort in cases where everything else has failed.

Most of the facts of physical science have been discovered by men who have assumed that certain ideas were true, and have reduced these ideas to formulas or direct statements which they and likeminded explorers tested in a multitude of ways. I have tried to do something of this kind with prayer-force. Long ago, it seemed to me merely a something which probably existed, but which was too vague and uncertain in its results to be of use in every-day life. Then trouble came-it always comes, when we need it-and this vague prayer-force was the only thing which did not put up a "no-thoroughfare" sign. I prayed, as the Nazarene prayed, with an agony of supplication; and gradually light formed itself in the darkness, and something delivered me from the seemingly all-potent evil that had closed down.

I am going to state some of my conclusions in regard to prevailing prayer, not because I think that I have solved the problem and have learned all that there is to be known about it, nor because I think that all I have to say is settled beyond possible correction or change; but because, following this science of prayer which has been revealed to me,

I have come into possession of a feeling of mastery and serenity which I never had before, and because one other than myself has done all that I have done. Together we have been through the dark valley, and our prayer has routed death itself.

I believe that prayer has two poles, just as have many other forces. Receptive prayer, the negative element, is that exercise of the spiritual faculties which draws from the Infinite source currents of Wisdom, or Power, or Love. Formative prayer, the positive element, is the expression, or putting into use, of these currents. Any philosophy which limits prayer to certain formulas of affirmations seems to me to fall short for this reason-it is striving to use a force which it does not always possess, and which it takes no means of obtaining: it seeks to be always positive. We must have received spiritual energy from some source before we can utilize it to control the physical world about us and in the tension of every-day life this receptive process means a definite and regular letting-go of all self-will and desire, for sufficient intervals each day, that the channels between us and the Father may be flushed out and quickened.

In considering quickening or receptive prayer, it may be well to look upon the process as divided into three steps:

First, a direct and serene appeal to the Father within, definitely formulated in the consciousness. In your inner chamber or your darkened study, or your crowded office, make your body as easy as you can. Relieve it for the time of all necessity of holding or supporting itself; you may lie down or sit in a chair, but be sure you can relax without having an uneasy feeling of being about to fall. Then turn your thoughts inward to that chapel of the consciousness where God is, although you may not see Him or hear Him. Everything is quieted within

and without, and if you are sincere, if you are making no conditions, and if you sincerely and silently pray directly to your Father. He hears you as plainly as you can ever hear any spoken voice. You may say, "Dear Father, I ask that Thou wilt quicken me with Thy Spirit of Communion, so that I shall show forth Love and Wisdom and Power. Teach me to radiate life and kindliness, to be broad and tolerant and serene and fearless. And grant that at this time Thy quickening Spirit may permeate me in body and consciousness, and that I may be regenerated." Pray, simply and directly, for that which you especially need in the way of spiritual energy-for Love or Wisdom or Power.

This first step is easy of accomplishment, but that which follows is probably one of the most difficult things which you will ever have to learn to do. You have heard of the wonderful things accomplished by "going into the silence." Well, the silence is the second room which you must enter in receptive prayer. You have made your body comfortable and have turned your attention inward; you have called to the Father within to quicken you with that tide of spiritual energy which you need. Now, you must remain silent and passive, and you must neither suggest nor affirm to the energy which fills you, nor must you let your attention wander outward to the things of the material world. You are just to rest, to be conscious and awake, but passive and receptive. Don't even "try to feel" the energy which is working within you, for your imagination has nothing to do with the process; this is not auto-suggestion, nor is it always a process which makes an impression upon your feelings. You may feel nothing, or you may be so shaken that you will be terrified. You are in the hands of the Great One who formed you out of His own spiritual substance, and

who best knows how to perfect you in body, consciousness, and estate.

There is no certain time which you must remain in the silence. At first it will perhaps be an unsatisfactory experience; but if you are faithful, you will come to recognize these periods when you are conscious but without formulated thought, and when every cell and fiber of your physical body is being cleansed and re-created, as times of wonderful blessing. At the right time, each withdrawal into the silence will terminate itself. Body and mind will awake with an unmistakable demand to be allowed to go to work. You may then shake yourself, physically and mentally, and pass from the chapel of prayer by way of the third room, that of realization. Do not hurry away to your regular employment, but pause a few minutes and silently examine the thoughts that come to you. Perhaps the wisdom which you particularly need will be revealed to you at this time. If not, you may pass on, knowing that you are going forth regenerated.

If you find that your attention keeps wandering to things of the outer world, when you are in the place of silence, it will be a help to you to use a "key thought" to bring it back and hold it receptive to the Spirit of Communion. You may take, for instance, the words, "He that dwelleth in the secret place of the most high." Hold them for a moment, realizing that you are now in the secret place of the most high. Or you can use those verses from Christ's prayer, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done." Realize what they mean: not that you are to give up everything worth while in your life, but that you are serenely and gladly calling in the Spirit which quickens and perfects to fill all of your life, instead of merely a little corner of it. But do not fill this time of silence with affirmations or worded prayers; these are wonderfully potent in their places, but this is a time of passivity on your part; simply bring your attention back, if it proves unruly, and keep your receiving apparatus in tune with the spiritual vibrations by a brief consideration of the nature of the process that is taking place, then rest and receive.

And one other thing: the receptive attitude is one of surrender, absolute and complete, of your will and desire, to the Spirit of Communion; for the time, you are absolutely open to whatever light comes, no matter how greatly it may revolutionize vour life. You needn't be startled or frightened by this idea, for you will never be required to relinquish any real desire of your whole being. If you want to be a painter or a poet or a carpenter or a farmer, your salvation, the perfection and regeneration of your being, will be worked out by making you perfect in the thing you desire, not by forcing you to give up this desire and become a preacher or a missionary. But you must let the greater wisdom of the regenerating spirit direct you at times. until your own vision shall have been perfected. You may be traveling in a circle right now, in your efforts to do the things you long to do. When you enter the silence, don't shut out the light by any mental reservations and don't be afraid; you are not dealing with a trickster, who will try to get the best of you, but with the Father who created you, who is part of you, and who is also the Father and Creator of all your real desires.

Formative prayer, the positive pole, is the science of making or drawing things by the direct use of spiritual energy. Back of every physical shadow is the psychical germ or cause, which forms and reforms substance, and through which substance may be controlled. Every human being has some power to influence this cause germ, but receptive prayer opens the consciousness to that full tide of Wisdom and Love and Pow-

er which is master absolute in the cause world. All the automatic or subconscious forces of nature, including the physical life or vitality of your body, follow a pattern which is stamped upon them from the cause world. This pattern is usually formed at random, and is marred by thoughts and beliefs of sickness, poverty, misfortune, and of the existence of evil as a positive force. Disease does not exist. The man who "dies of tuberculosis" has failed, probably through ignorance, to stamp the right pattern into the invisible but potent world of automatic forces: the socalled "disease germs," which are without consciousness, are more closely knit by this very lack to the cause world, and when their progress is not stopped by the interposition of a higher form of life, they do their work perfectly. No "disease germ" ever disputed ground with spiritual energy, but tissues which are quickened with but a modicum of real life force, and which are continually warped into wrong forms and combinations by wrong ideals and patterns cast into the controlling plane of automatic life energy, are simply so much raw material with which they may work.

Poverty does not exist. The lack of any physical thing which you may have experienced is due to your having failed to use or having used in the wrong direction the force of formative prayer.

Receptive prayer demanded that you put your physical body in an easy position, so that you could forget it. This is the first step in formative prayer. Lie or sit so that you can relax without falling or slipping. Close your eyes, and let your consciousness travel over your physical body, for tension is a matter of habit and your muscles may persist in tying themselves into knots even after you have removed the necessity. Begin with your feet, and let

your attention travel slowly upward, loosening contraction wherever it exists. Note especially the bands of muscles across the abdomen, for fear and worry and strain are often expressed in these abdominal muscles and in the nervous centers under them. Drop the knots and tensions out of them, then travel upward and finish this journey of inspection by loosening any frown or wrinkles from your face.

Now, with your muscles easy and your body relaxed, consider that which, for the time, is of greatest importance in your life. Perhaps it is your business. You want more money, more physical resources. Consider, then, that you are not about to beg the unseen to give you something which you desire, but that you are using a spiritual faculty which was created within you for the very purpose of bringing into your life that which you need. You may direct this spiritual controlling and creative faculty in any one of many ways; for instance, you may form a definite and vivid picture of money, drafts, paper money, gold and silver, being heaped upon your desk or table, coming toward you in invisible currents which are made visible when they reach you, their object. If you take this means, remember that you are neither trying to steal from anybody, nor to short change the universe, but that you are utilizing a faculty which is normal to fully developed man and whose office it is to attract and create things. Remember that when a man rises from the ranks of muscle workers to those of skilled mechanics, he works less and receives more: when he becomes an executive, his work is still lighter and his pay is increased; and when he becomes a director, a creator through mental training and a broad understanding of conditions, he has the shortest hours and the biggest money reward. In this same

line, when you rise above the ranks of those who labor solely through intellect and body and decide to use the spiritual controlling and directing faculties of your being, you are still farther emancipated from the conditions which have bound you. This is not robbery or witch-craft, and you will never secure results which will satisfy you until you have cleansed your consciousness of these old ideas. Remember that the All-Father did not put us here to be servants or laborers; He could have done directly and instantly all the physical work His children have accomplished in centuries; but He did surround us with physical conditions which should quicken within us the desire to rule, and so bring us to the realization of our own true being.

It is essential in securing results through formative prayer that you form a definite picture of that which you want and that you hold it serenely; and you will not be able to do this unless you realize that you are not calling upon luck or magic to aid you, but that you are using faculties which were created for the very purpose you are turning them to. If you are not able to visualize the thing you want as it will appear, if you can't form a picture, you may stamp your ideal or pattern into the world of causes in another way: choose words which express to you all that you desire. These may be in the form of a statement or sentence; instead of picturing money, you may state, "I am wealth; the spirit of Infinite Wisdom and Power and Love flows into me and through me, and at all times I bring forth those physical things which I need to fulfil my highest desires." Or you may form a list of unconnected words, which, as you slowly and silently consider them, will fill your consciousness with thoughts of that which you desire. Again, as in the case of receptive prayer, you are to bring yourself into harmony of vibration with the unseen, but this time it is that you may send forth vibrations of wealth or health or love or peace; you are not receptive now, but formative, synthetic, creative. Your silent thought is to be concentrated and focused upon the inner plane of patterns and ideals until it stamps that which you desire to be brought forth upon the receptive psychical substance, the world of causes and patterns.

Let me repeat that I do not think I have anything final to say on the subject of prayer. In investigating physical science, it has been found of advantage to state certain theories or formulae as if they were fully established, so that many experimenters could put them to many tests. Following this method. I have tried to state as if fully proven some theories in regard to the use of Prayer-force which have come to Whether or not I or others shall modify them greatly in the future, I know that the methods I have described are capable of producing wonderful results. By them physical substance becomes nascent and responsive to the direction of creative thought, and man begins to awaken to his real nature; begins, for before that which is perfect can come he must build for himself a perfect physical mechanism, a regenerated body through which the Spirit of Communion may work. And this, too, is possible.

Regard Your Life Duties as Burdens and You Never Get Anywhere—Our Success or Failure Depends Upon the Character of Our Mental Vizualizing —Many People Allow Their Minds to Get Into Such a Negative State They Cannot Create Joy or Prosperity—What We Think Upon We Build Into Life.

NOT LONG ago I received a letter from a young man saying that, after discouragement and failure, he had decided to "take up the burdens of life." "I intend to take up the burdens of life again and press forward," were his words.

It is easy to surmise from this man's letter the reasons why he is "down and out," as he says. If we regard our life duties as burdens which we take up with a heavy heart, we will never get anywhere. This is not the way to face life, not the spirit in which to take up our life work. Every one of us should look upon his vocation as a superb opportunity to make a man of himself, to train for the large, full, complete manhood, to build up a grand character.

Every one should go to his work with the same eager spirit as the great master approaches his canvas—with his soul, led by a great longing and hearthunger, an all-absorbing eagerness to transpose to the canvas the mighty picture which is consuming his soul.

If you approach your work as though it were a burden which you would gladly get rid of if you could, and do it merely from a sense of duty, you will continue to be a nobody in the world. That sort of a spirit never lifts a man out of mediocrity.

It always distresses me to hear anyone, and especially a young man speak of taking up the "burdens of life." Why, a man who looks upon life as a burden has no business here. He belongs to some other planet.

It was intended that our life work should be a perpetual joy, a constant delight. This attitude creates, upbuilds. Work done in the spirit of drudgery is soul-killing; it blights the ambition, dulls the ideals, deadens the effort.

If your work is a burden, if it is drudgery to you, you have not found your place in life. If you are in the right place, you will feel every faculty and function in you tugging away at your purpose with delight. Everything within you will give its consent, its approval, to your choice.

The mental attitude which we hold toward our work or our aim has everything to do with what we accomplish. If you go to your work like a slave lashed to his task, and see in it only drudgery; if you work without hope, see no future in what you are doing beyond getting a bare living; if you see no light ahead, nothing but poverty, deprivation, and hard work all your life; if you think that you were destined to such a hard life, you cannot expect to get anything else than that for which you look.

Our success or failure, our happiness or misery, depends upon the character of our mental visualizing. Picturing success tends toward our success. If our mind is filled with negative images, images of discouragement and failure, these things will tend to be objectified in our lives. Whatever our pictured projections may be they will be reproduced in the life.

Multitudes of people who wonder why they do not get on, have gotten their minds into a negative state, so that it is impossible for them to create joy or prosperity. These people, who have been permeated by the "down and out" thought, are great sufferers because of their thwarted ambition, and they are often helpless, because they do not know how to get their minds into a positive condition again; and so they drift helplessly-they drift into greater lack, when, if they would only turn about and face the light, they would attract the things they need. Our concentration will either lead us into or out of wretchedness, according whether our minds are negative or pos-

I know a lady who says that poverty had always been her lot in the past and she expects it will always continue to be. She says that all of her ancestors were poor and hard workers. This woman was convinced that her people were foreordained to be poor, to be burden-bearers, to slave for other people.

What we concentrate upon, what we habitually visualize and dream about, is built into the life. If you hold the pauper's vision, dream the pauper's dream, if your whole mental attitude faces towards poverty, you will be poor. Nothing will keep you from being poor until you change your mental attitude. The mental plan must precede the material building.

Many people cannot picture their conditions in anything but terms of limitation.

It is not what we would like to be, not

what we wish we could get, but what we expect, that comes to us. Job said, "The thing which I greatly feared has come upon me." When we long for a thing and are determined to obtain it, we establish a relation and an attraction between ourselves and the thing, and begin to attract it.

It is not what we pray for, but what we expect, that we get. A very religious widow, who lived alone, prayed that a pile of dirt in front of her house might be removed. When she arose from her knees and raised the curtain, she exclaimed, "Just what I expected! The dirt is still there!" That is not the faith that moves mountains. The prayers of most people are not answered, because they have no idea that they will be answered. When they pray they pray for impossible things.

The next time you feel blue and discouraged and think you are a failure, just flood your mind with light, hope, expectation; drive out the black pessimism with the optimistic thought, with hope, cheer and courage. You will find that by persistently holding these thoughts, they will mechanically even neutralize the opposite, the enemies of your advancement.

This mental attitude will soon cure you of your pessimism, will neutralize your discouragement and brighten your hopes and will tend to bring you opportunities. Others will notice the radical change in your mental attitude and they will have more faith in you.

If most of the people in the failure army could be induced to turn around mentally and face towards optimism and persistently hold the prosperity thought, the success thought, for a short time, their lives would be revolutionized. It is their mental attitude that makes or mars their life, that makes them successes or failures.

Everybody knows that a discouraged,

despondent soul cannot accomplish anything worth while. They do not have confidence in such a negative mental attitude, because they know that it is not a producer. It is always the positive mind that wins—the positive, optimistic thought that creates, that produces. The negative pessimistic, discouraged thought is not a builder, it tears down.

Negative characters wait for things to happen. They have a feeling that somehow things are going to happen anyway, and that they cannot do much to change them.

It is the positive constructive mental attitude that has accomplished all of the great things in the world. It is the creative, aggressive, pushing, stimulating power that is back of all achievement. A strong, vigorous character creates a condition that will force things to happen. Knowing that nothing will move of itself, he is always putting into operation forces that do things.

If your mind is inclined to be negative, if you lack initiative, you can soon increase your constructiveness wonderfully by forming a habit of holding the positive, creative mental attitude towards everything.

Our thoughts, expectations, hopes, desires and mental attitude must all be of the highest order because the life will take the direction of the thought conviction. We are always headed towards our mental attitude, whether favorable or unfavorable to our spiritual condition.

What a blessed boon it would be if children could only be taught at home and in the schools these fundamental truths upon which their whole destiny hangs! What a blessing if every child could be brought up to realize, if everyone could be trained to know, that his mental attitude towards life, towards others, the very way he looks at things, will determine the direction of his life;

that all of his thoughts must be friendly, in keeping with his deepest longings!

Our purpose, our view, our mental attitude, our expectations, must all run parallel with our desire. When will people learn the fact that everything must go through the gateway of the thought, before it becomes a reality, and that the conviction, the expectation, determines the character of what we get? Many a man is working for one thing and expecting something else; working hard with his hands to get on and neutralizing it all with his adverse, doubtful, critical poverty-stricken thought.

We must face toward our aim and all our thoughts must be friendly to it, otherwise they will neutralize our efforts. The great trouble with most people is that they do not know that everything must start in the mind, must have a mental origin, that thoughts are the real forces which do things.

It is difficult for many of us to realize that the real forces which accomplish things are silent, unseen. We are apt to attribute the cause to what we can see, to operations that appeal to the vision.

There is only one way of attracting the best, and that is by persistently holding the pictures of the very best in our minds.

Nobody can be successful or happy who faces the wrong way. We go in the direction in which we face. It is not what we would like to do or become, but what we really expect to do or become that counts.

There is everything in visualizing one's ambition, in holding before one's mind a vivid picture of what he desires, what he longs to be and accomplish. It is the ideal, the expectation, that furnishes the life model by which every moment we are being shaped.

The man who visualizes despair, who

holds back pictures in his mind, who always has before him a dismal likeness of discouragement, gloom and distrust, will weave these things into his life web. build them into his character. A girl might as well try to make herself beautiful by persisting in holding the ugliest possible pictures in her mind, pictures of deformity and disease, as for one to expect to build into his life success and prosperity and happiness by holding just the opposite pictures in his mind.

The slovenly, slipshod mind holds the slovenly, slipshod model. The slovenly, slipshod man is mentally lazy. Slipshodness characterizes his mental operations or they would not bring out the picture in his appearance and his work.

Some men leave a trail through life of half-finished jobs, slipshod work, because their original conceptions were indifferent. There was a lack of mental force, of on-pushing, there was no logical sequence in their mentality. A man must think a thing out vigorously first before he executes it. Half-formed thoughts, loose, negative conceptions will never work out into anything effective. There must be a sharply-defined original concept, or the execution will be weak, colorless. The people whom the world calls lucky are positive, shrewd, forceful thinkers.

One of the worst delusions that ever crept into a young man's head is that hard work without a strong, vigorous and well-defined life program will win out. Some of the hardest workers in the world throw away a large part of their labor through the lack of a good program or definite plan. Many youths start out with the idea that if they only work hard, if they only keep at it, they must succeed. A well-defined mental plan must precede all effective achievement. The victory must first be fought in the brain before it is executed by the hands. The Brooklyn Bridge, the ocean

cable, all great achievements, were mental achievements before they were material successes. First make a thorough, complete, careful life plan, and then fling your whole life into it with all your might. No wishy-washy, half-hearted, negative methods will win out. It is positive, forceful thinking and vigorous determined action that does things.

Do not go through life regarding your occupation as a burden, as drudgery. It will cramp your efforts and color your whole life. It will lead you into pessimism. You can never be creative, inventive, resourceful, with such a mental attitude.

Turn your back on the shadows. Be optimistic. Face life with a cheerful, hopeful attitude, and you will attract success instead of repel it. The mental attitude must be right.

### THE INNER CEN-TER AND THE SPIRITUAL LIFE

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THE DISCOVERY of the inner center leads us to start with the idea of God as the basis of the spiritual life in all respects. We thus learn that we are clothed in the universality of the divine, and in the individuality of a specific purpose. Our inner or spiritual consciousness opens us to the great cosmos of the divine order, and thus to the universal. But it also shows us that each of us is an individual, hence we realize that the universal is made specific. Furthermore, through this individuality we are brought into relation with the particular facts of experience. Thus our consciousness becomes concrete, we are grounded in the details and events of life. Thus our consciousness reveals a complete sphere of experience.

Life at large is a co-operative relationship between God, the realm of human consciousness, and the environing world common to all. If we mistake our merely self-assertive experiences for the true self, we readily fall into the notion that we are independent centers of life, and can have things our own way. If we stop with merely finite consciousness, we miss the thought of divine commu-

nion. But, again, if we stop with the self in any sense we miss the world of human society and the world of nature. But truly to find the center is to know man in all these respects as the center of finite consciousness, as the meeting point with God, and as the center of relationship with our fellows and with the world.

When we mistake the merely self-assertive self for the true self we wander away from the center into various sideissues of consciousness, and at times become so enveloped in these side-issues that we are like another person. Hence the pains and tribulations that so often disturb us in a mysterious way, as if a hostile power were at work upon us from without. Not knowing that we are shut within the narrower precincts of our own selfhood, we struggle and complain, finding fault with others and looking far afield for a cause of our trouble. But if we have once learned the vital truth that the trouble arises within ourselves, if we know the difference between the whole self and the partial self, we may acquire a method of return to the center.

The contrast is readily seen in the case of a fit of the blues, an emotion of hatred, anger or jealousy, or any other mental state in which our consciousness is confined to a small world, when we drop the head and draw in as it were into a shell. In a state of hope, good cheer, and joy in existence we lift the head and look aloft into a large world. Knowing the difference between the two types of mental states, we may when we find ourselves shut within a small inner world, open out, expand, as if becoming one with the universe, glad to be alive in this great cosmos with all its blessings. Observing the response which comes when we thus aspire and open out, we may learn more and more definitely to put ourselves into the attitude

of receptivity. We need not trouble that we lose hold and wander far afield. The essential is to return every time we wander. The return shows by contrast that all through the days, months or years of our tribulation there was a cross-current setting in against the inner tide in whose face the world is mirrored. To be centered is to move with the divine tide, hence to have the whole cosmos revealed in order and harmony. To depart from the center into a mood or wilful attitude is to become a lesser self, howbeit through the assertion of our indpendence we believe for the moment that we are enlarging the self. In reality we are partakers of the divine life, not originating centers of it. We possess an apparent independence which enables us to set up a little mental cosmos of our own. Making full use of our freedom, some of us wander as far as possible into the side-streams of consciousness. Thus we live long in the play of external life, in an artificial comedy or tragedy, mistaking external things and events for primary realities. Thus we worship for the time the god of dress, of food, money, or external luxury. Side-issue after side-issue appears, and one may go on and on into externality, well-nigh forgetting that there ever was a spiritual life.

Meanwhile, if we have in any degree known the things of the spirit these beckon us as it were to return. Or, if we have known nothing of the spirit an inner struggle may go on, a struggle that is a complete mystery to us. Back of the struggle, if we could read it aright, would be found the divine life steadily drawing on us even in our tribulations towards the center of peace and happiness. For however enticing the side-issues of life the divine stream of love and wisdom never ceases to flow. We are ever borne along, whatever we do. With all our inventions, struggles

and illusions, we still go on living, reaping the consequences when we mistake the side-streams for the central stream.

Usually we are so far absorbed in our

side-streams that when any one offers us wisdom we insist on the right to understand the situation as it appears in our insurgency. Hence we ask many questions which cannot be answered-while we are enveloped in the play, complaining at our lot, insisting that God has dealt unfairly with us. Such are most questions about the nature of justice, the atonement for sin, the nature of evil, and the degree of reality is assignable to sense-experience. When at last we break free from the play, we may still behold the experience through which we have passed, as we might look at an extensive landscape that lies behind when we reach a mountain-summit, howbeit with different eyes. The experience which meant pain while we were enveloped by it will appear in such a different light that we may wonder how the same self could therein have wrought and suffered. I do not refer to the changes which death brings but to the awakening which may come even here in the flesh to those in whom the eternal type of consciousness is born. Nor do I mean that this external life is sheer illusion, as if due to the veil of our own ignorance. The natural world really exists, it is no dream. But there are degrees of reality from the lowest natural up to the highest spiritual level. The lower or natural cannot explain the higher or spiritual. But when we discern spiritually we shall understand the natural, too.

Clothed with the garments of peace, made in the image of love and wisdom, we may adapt ourselves to the stream of life so that it shall flow harmoniously within us. But such response implies not only knowledge of the main stream and its side-issues, the reality and the

play; it also implies ability to act in adjustment with the influent life. Our conflicts are due to the fact that we are carried along by life's stream while trying to maintain a direction of our own. Torn between two points of view, there seems to be no resource until the central insight shows the relationship of external experience to the inner center. Then we transfer our attention from the process to the power, from the frictions to the product, from outward conditions to inward causes.

The struggle—so we sometimes insist -is the reality; it is mere fancy to allege that there can be peace, or that there is a center of power which commands the entire situation. To have our own way seems at times the only course worth while. Hence we experiment, now adopting material things as standards, now evaluating life as a merely finite possession, or endeavoring to take appearances for realities and rear them into a system without a God or first principle. But forthwith we realize that only at the surface have we been troubled, while enveloped in the mere events and conditions of the day or the occupation, unmindful of ideals. The pain was indeed part of the reality of life, and even the least of the side-issues emerged from the central source; yet we now understand the pain at last through its fruits, we apprehend the part in the light of the whole. The integrity of the self remained despite the struggle, and with it everything that was most worth while in our experience.

I would not then underestimate the realities of external experience, but dwell sufficiently on the change in perspective to make sure the illuminating clue is revealed. By reality I mean life viewed in spiritual wholeness as a gift from God, and by the play any experience in which we are centered in the process, the actuating self-consciousness

which so readily dominates the situation. When I live from the center I am aware of a superior light shining upon the pathway, a guidance which reveals what is essential and significant; and I move with the influent life in ready obedience. This fidelity is not mere submissiveness or self-denial, but is positive adaptation to the promptings of the day, full expressiveness according to the leadings from within.

The inner center is the basis of poise, equanimity, composure, and control, hence our discovery of it is fostered by acquiring these. Poise as thus regarded is a balance of energies acquired through moderation, faith in the central life as the one efficiency, rest in the presence of this Life. Equanimity is cultivated through the growth of peace and serenity in meeting the vicissitudes of experience; it grows out of the philosophic temper, and is a product of patience and the quiet reflectiveness which concerns itself with ideals. Our composure may be deepened by pausing to attain interior stillness, and it grows with the victories we win in quietness and confidence. Control is more complex and demands not merely the composure which enables a person to think before acting but the knowledge which shows what to do, what is under our control and what is not. The poise which has become a habit is a splendid basis for control, so is the equanimity or composure; for if there is balance at the center, habitual moderation and a quiet mode of meeting experience, control in a higher sense may be added. No less important is the spiritual knowledge which is power.

First in order in such knowledge is the great fact already emphasized, namely, that the divine life is a gift, not to be controlled any more than we would crush the heart of a child, or deaden our sensibilities through incessant analysis. Then, too, this knowledge shows that our own selfhood is also a gift to be reared and expressed, a gift which God will make complete by this round of experiences through which we are passing. Life itself is a gift, so is the whole cosmos as reproduced in this wonderful stream of consciousness that flows within us. Hence at heart one wills to preserve the gifts of the Spirit in pristine purity, guided by the divine wisdom, touched with tender compassion, imbued with gentleness, inspired by a contagious joy. Control properly speaking begins with the regulation of the moods, passions, instincts, emotions, and adverse activities which impede the incoming or the expression of the divine life. The keener our insight into these states the less power they have over us. With the increase of such knowledge comes greater power of inhibition. In due course it is within our power to overcome all interior friction, worriment, anxiety, excitement, all disturbing emotions of whatever sort. Control of these states means more energy for the control of thought, hence command of the brain and of the systems that may be brought within subjection through the brain. The growth of control at the center, with its accompanying serenity and composure, means greater receptivity to the Spirit.

# THE MIGHT OF WILL

Inside Workings of the Universal Energy—Persistent Application of Universal Energy to the Work of Life—Steadiness, Firmness, Etc.—Reason of the Extraordinary Power of the Will—We Have All the Will We Can Ever Use, All We Need is to Strengthen the Mental Machinery for Using the Will—One of the Most Startling Manifestations of the Power of Will in Human Life.

THAT STRANGE manifestation of life and mind, which we call "the Will," gives us perhaps the nearest approach to an "inside view" of the actual workings of the Universal Energy that we can ever obtain. The essence of Will is closely identified with the essence of the Universal Energy. Some of the best authorities in the realm of philosophical thought have identified the Universal Energy itself with a grand Cosmic Will, that acts, moves, accomplishes-that "does things" in the Universe. Be that as it may, the fact remains that the Will is found to occupy the very center of being in every living form-in every moving, acting thing.

The very term itself is most difficult of definition. The dictionaries would have us believe that it is solely the part of us that "chooses" and decides; while

the concept is so wrapped up with that of desire that it is most difficult to disentangle them. On the other hand, the popular usage gives to the term the sense of "determined, persistent application," etc. The truth is that the term Will really has for its essence—its heart—the idea of action. It is the Will that does all the acting-all the real work-of Every mental, as well as every physical, act, is made possible only through the exercise of the Will. So you see, the Will is really the motive power that drives all of the machinery of life—the steam that runs the life engine that operates the mental and physical mechanism.

But, we shall not here consider at length the metaphysical or philosophical conceptions of Will. We are concerned here merely with that phase of the Will's mental activity which agrees with the popular conception of the term—that of the "dogged, determined, persistent application" of the Universal Energy in the work of life.

We all know what we mean when we speak of a man of "strong will power," or of one "of a weak will." The first individual, we know, is one who will apply the force of his persistent, determined, dogged will, to the tasks of life, holding it there in spite of all obstacles and hindrances; the second, we are equally aware, is one who is easily driven from his purpose, and who has not enough spirit in him to push through to a successful termination the matters in which he engages often with a primary show of enthusiasm.

We often hear the term "an iron will," and generally believe it to represent the highest form of the manifestation of Will. But the figure may be improved upon. An iron will may be strong, but a sudden shock, or undue pressure, may crack and destroy it. On the other hand, a STEEL WILL is able

to bend and give when necessary, only to immediately spring back into its original position and exert its orignal force. The flexible sword of Damascus steel represents the highest conception of a strong implement-it will "give" momentarily, but it cannot be broken or overcome permanently. Likewise the fine steel watch spring exerts its constant pressure upon the mechanism of the watch, and "makes the wheels go 'round.' '' Steel structures represent a greater strength than do iron ones; and concrete reinforced with steel is one of the most durable and strongest building materials known today. So, friends, let us hear no more of "the iron will"-let the figure be changed to that of the "will of steel."

Several years ago, in writing of the Will, I used the following words, which I shall now venture to repeat, for they represent most clearly my idea of this use of the Will: One of the characteristics of the positive will is its quality of persistence—that quality which manifests in steadfastness, firmness and constancy in carrying out and pursuing the design, business of course commenced undertaken; perseverance in the face of obstacles and discouragements; steadfastness and determination in the face of opposition or hindrance. Stability; decision; perseverance; fixedness of purpose; tenacity—these are the terms applied to the persistent will. Persistency combines the qualities of continuity and firmness-steadfastness and "stick-to-itiveness." The Will presses up close to the task-holds itself there firmly-and stays there until victory is won. Success in many cases depends upon the capacity for holding on. Many a man has fought a brave fight, but, lacking persistency, has relinquished his efforts just before the turn of the tide, and has fallen back, defeated, not by his rivals, not by circumstances, but by himself.

Well has Emerson said of this power of the mind: "I know no such unquestionable badge and ensign of a sovereign mind, as that of tenacity of purpose, which through all changes of companions or parties or fortunes, changes never, bates no jot or heart or hope, but wearies out opposition and arrives at its port."

The reason of the extraordinary power of the Will may be found in the thought that the Will is the DIRECT instrument of the "I," or Ego! All the rest of the mental or physical instruments of the Ego are indirect as compared with the Will. In fact, they are used by the Ego only through and by means of the Willever think of that before? Roll it over in your mind a moment, and see if it is not true! Can you think of even a single action of the Ego that is not performed through and by means of the medium of the Will consciously or subconsciously exerted? You will agree to this statement after thinking over it a little. If is hard to disentangle Will from Desire at one of the poles; it is equally difficult to disentangle the Will from the Ego itself, at the other pole. So stating it in a familiar form, we may say that when we witness a marked manifestation of will-power, we are really witnessing an exhibition of the Ego "on the job"!

I have repeatedly said, during the several years of my writing on the subject, that when we say that we wish to "strengthen our will," we really mean that we desire to strengthen and build up our mental machinery for using the will. We have within us all the Will that we will ever require—that and more, too! What we need to do is to build up, strengthen, and develop the mental mechanism by which we are able to manifest the Will. Our mental machinery, even our mental engines, need to be built up, so that the steam of Will may have an opportunity to show what it can

do for us. It is true that we arouse the steam of Will by fanning the flame of desire, and that we direct its force by means of the mental pictures, ideals, and character of our concepts. But it is also true that the steam of Will, once aroused, will not do the work for us unless we supply it with the proper mental machinery of Habit, Experience, and Actual Use. In our next paper, entitled, "Mental Paths," we will consider the nature of this machinery, and the means whereby it may be built up. In the meantime, let us take a running glance at the several most familiar of the manifestations of the Will in the direction of "doing things" efficiently.

One of the most startling manifestations of the power of Will in human life is that which we generally indicate by the term "resolute," which means: "Having a fixed, unalterable purpose; determined; firm; constant; absolute direction to a certain end." It is this particular manifestation of Will that Buxton emphasized in his famous saying: "The longer I live, the more certain I am that the great difference between men, between the feeble and the powerful, the great and the insignificant, is energy, determination—a purpose invincible once fixed, and then death or victory. That quality will do anything in this world; and no talents, no circumstances, no opportunities, will make a two-legged creature a man without it." And to this may well be added the equally celebrated saying of that master of resolution-Disraeli-who said: "I have brought myself by long meditation to the conviction that a human being with a settled purpose must accomplish it, and that nothing can resist a Will which will stake even existence upon its fulfilment."

It is this Will, manifested as Resolution, that has set the great characters of history apart from the common herd of men. It is this quality that enables men and women to beat down apparently unsurmountable obstacles and hindrances, and which drives them to attainment with an irresistible force. The men who have done things-the great inventors, discoverers, builders, merchants, warriors-have been filled with this mighty power of Resolution, which carried them along almost in spite of themselves. To such individuals always comes the feeling, amounting to practical certainty, that they are being animated by some Power behind them. which fills their being, and carries them along almost independent of their personal force, once the power has been roused into action. This Power is simply the Universal Energy, fanned into action, manifesting as Will, and blazing forth, often in a dangerous manner. once it has found the vehicles and channels of expression. Resolution is the breaking down of the barriers of timidity, doubt, indifference, fear, and unbelief, and thus allowing the Power of Will to manifest itself freely. The Will is in each of us-even in YOU-and will manifest itself in action if you will but trust in it and supply it with the vehicles of its expression.

Another interesting phase of Will manifestation is that which may be called Persistence—the tenacious, neverlet-go, hold-fast characteristics of the successful individual. Such individuals have as their motto: "When you feel that you must let go-then hang on the harder, for victory is near." Such individuals endure, persist, hang-on, refuse to be shaken off, take a firm bulldog grip, and then bid the world do its worst. Many a man of fair resolution, and even great talents, failing in the faculty of persistency and perseverance, will let go just a little too soon, and thus fail to accomplish that which he has rightfully earned. It is the dogged

persistency which wins many a battle of life; and the lack of it which loses many a battle. Hold the tool of the persistent Will up to the whirling block of Life, and you will be able to carve that block into the shape and form indicated by your desires and ideals—but the tool must be held firmly and persistently.

And now, in conclusion, let me call your attention to a fact well known to students of the new psychology, but generally overlooked by the average person—the fact of the wonderful subconscious use of the Will, which accomplishes such great results when once set into motion. So many persons seem to think that the use of the Will depends entirely upon its conscious direction. Many even go so far as to think of Will manifestation as a matter of frowns, compressed lips, and gritting teeth. To such will come as a strange revelation the statement that the majority of the activities of the Will are generated on the subconscious planes of the mind. And yet, such is the fact. Modern psychologists know that the Will, once directed firmly toward a certain object, and held firmly in the mind by persistent attention, will soon begin to generate a marvelous power in the subconscious regions of the mind of the individual, which power will strengthen him and urge him on to fresh and greater efforts. This power will also attract to him the persons, things, and circumstances calculated to manifest the desire-force and will-power striving toward expression.

Persons who have cultivated the power of subconscious Will have discovered that the subconscious mentality may be charged, directed, or commanded to develop within the person the characteristics and qualities calculated to bring about a successful accomplishment of the things desired or willed by the individual. Moreover, they have also dis-

covered by experience that the subconscious mentality, charged with the awakened Will, will develop the necessary ideas, plans, and in other ways perform much of the drudgery of mental work for one. In fact, so far from it being true that the Will is absolutely bound up with the conscious activities, it is nearer the truth to say that nine-tenths of the activities of the Will have their ground work and foundations, actually laid beneath the threshold of consciousness in the human mind. Or, stating it in another form, it is a psychological truth that Will is more fundamental than conscious mentation, and that the latter is rather an evolution of the former than otherwise. In short, that conscious mentation was evolved by Will because it was needed by the latter in its urge of evolutionary manifestation.

When we are able to manifest Will Power on the subconscious planes, we have at our disposal a great elemental force awaiting our intelligent direction and control. When the race of men arrive at a full realization of the possibilities of the use of the Will Power within them awaiting expression, they will become almost as gods. It is well that the Great Plan has evidently provided that before such knowledge may become common, the race must make enormous progress in intelligence, self-control, self-mastery, and, above all, in LOVE, so that this great natural power may be used wisely and well in the interest of the race as a whole, rather than as an instrument of personal satisfaction and gain.

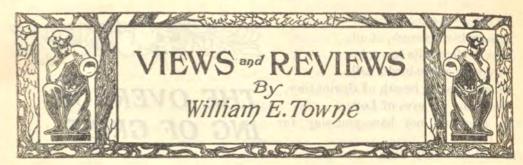
# THE OVERCOM-ING OF GRIEF

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AM WONDERING if there is any greater proof of the potency of the Spirit than the overcoming of a great sorrow. Only a few months have passed since the greatest sorrow that ever comes to the human heart was mine, the loss of a life partner, and for a time it seemed that all that was sweetest and best in life had passed from me forever. But when God spoke to me in words of divine revelation and said, "Thy Maker is thy husband," and furthermore, that I should no longer feel desolate and forsaken because I was to be under the wing of divine love, my faith rose to heights sublime and grasped this truth that as the husband loves, cares for and provides for the wife, that God is infinitely more able to care for me than any earthly husband could ever be. As I contemplated this truth all the sadness and loneliness left me, and trust and joy took up their abode. The desire to minister to others is very strong, and I soon discovered many lonely hearts who were hungering for the words of truth and comfort that I could speak to them. A new life opened up before me, and sorrow and sighing passed from me forever, for, "the joy of the Lord is my strength."



Government Ownership—Theory, Practice.

It is a beautiful thought—that of all the people running the railroads and telegraphs and telephones and coal mines for the benefit of all the people.

It looks plausible.

It looks economical.

It looks like justice to everybody.

It looks as if it would insure low prices for service rendered.

But—an inventor is never sure his machine will work until one has actually been built and tested.

And in the matter of government ownership and the socialization of great industries there is always the human element which the earnest partisans do not consider.

I have in mind a co-operative store which has been started in a neighboring city. For a time it succeeded in making some headway. It looked like a good thing. The theory was sound. It could be demonstrated by figures that the people who co-operated in starting this store would save a great deal of money. But the facts are that the store is finding hard sledding. Perhaps the project will soon be abandoned. The newspapers say the trouble is caused by unwise management. Too large a stock of goods that won't sell, etc., etc.

You see there is no great personal incentive to anyone to get in and dig and make that store a success. No matter how much love for the co-operative cause one may have, it is rather a thankless

task to build up a co-operative institu-

There you have the human element, which will always tend to prevent a cooperative enterprise from being anything like as successful as it seems it ought to be when we figure out the plan in advance.

There is the lost motion which we fail to take into account. And the lost motion is much greater in a co-operative enterprise—very much greater—than in a private business. This is because the incentive of personal gain and benefit to the man who does the work is so largely lacking.

Co-operation is a success only when the people who go into it are far enough developed and altruistic enough to work unselfishly for a common end.

It is doubtful if humanity in the mass is yet ready for any considerable step in the direction of co-operation. Education, growth in the understanding of unity, is necessary before co-operation can be successful.

For an example of the practical workings of government ownership, read the article in March number of The North American Review on "Public Ownership in France."

This article is written by a French professor of political economy, a man of the highest standing in his own country, and possessing keenest insight along his chosen line of work. Here are a few facts from the article referred to:

In the government printing office in



France there is one overseer for every eight workmen.

In private printing plants of similar grade there is one overseer for every thirty workmen—that is four times less.

In the year 1908, the state took over a privately owned railroad. One of the arguments used to get the consent of the people to this step was that the government would soon pay the indemnity which had been granted to the company out of the profits earned.

Under private ownership the road showed a net deficit of 27,000,000 francs the year preceding its being taken over by the government.

Under government ownership and operation the deficit each year has been as follows: 1909, 38,500,000 francs; 1910, 58,500,000; 1911, 71,250,000; 1912 (estimated) 84,500,000.

Moreover while under private ownership there had not been a passenger killed for ten years, under government ownership there has been a series of the worst kind of accidents, and the government has reduced the number of trains and cut down the speed of the principal ones.

Here are some of the reasons which this French professor advances for the failure of government ownership:

A state functionary seldom gets to the top, to a position of power, before he is fifty-five or sixty years old. Hence young, vigorous, aggressive blood is always lacking in the management of state affairs. In private concerns it is men from thirty-five to forty-three years of age selected for their initiative and ability and not as a matter of politics, who hold important positions.

The state office holder is hedged in by

very narrow rules. He cannot use his initiative, if he has any. Everything tends to discourage initiative and create a reverence for red tape.

The state accounting system is so inflexible that it is impossible to get needed funds for necessary and unexpected expenditures for the public good. All the operations of the state are weighed down by a system of routineism.

No man in the government employ shares in the pecuniary success of the business he directs. His salary is always modest, and in the case of one holding an important position, far below what he would receive for similar service to a private concern.

Office holders are always thinking of elections. Politics is foremost. The good of the public hindmost.

The shrewd politicians rule and not the ablest men for the service. No matter how able a man may be, if his politics are not "right" in the sight of the ruling party he must go.

These are some of the facts regarding the actual working of government ownership. We can readily see that most of these facts are duplicated in this country in those government operations which have thus far been undertaken.

# On Cultivating Attention.

Attention, says Prof. Hugo Munsterberg, is the prime factor in all education. Attention is the one great force in building character, in winning success, in achieving one's ideals. And yet, how carelessly do we play with this great faculty of attention, how little we realize or understand its far-reaching importance.

Consciousness is described by the psy-



chologists as a field bounded by a circle. In the center of the field it is very light. As we recede toward the rim the darkness increases, and near the rim the darkness is almost total. In the center of the field the objects, the thoughts which occupy our attention for the moment-disport themselves like actors upon a stage. We select and determine from moment to moment the character of these little actors who make their appearance and play their little parts upon the stage of our consciousness. Upon the nature of the actors depends the strength or weakness of our character and our success or failure in life. We give our attention, for instance, to the accomplishment of some useful piece of workwork that will bring us material reward and mental satisfaction. All around us a thousand voices are soliciting our attention. Our work, for the time being, occupies the center of the stage-our consciousness-where the light is strongest. But perhaps we listen to some of the siren voices that solicit us on every hand, and our attention wanders to some social pleasure. Immediately the thought of our task recedes toward the rim of consciousness. It leaves the center of the stage and is replaced by the new If the pleasure thought is allowed to possess us again and again, the work thought recedes farther and farther into the darkness. It grows fainter and fainter in our consciousness. It plays a smaller and smaller part in our life. It may all but fade out of our consciousness completely, having been displaced by the frivolous and fleeting pleasure thought. We can, if we will, call back the useful work thought. We can bring it back to the center of the stage, into the center of light and activ-

ity, and the thought of pleasure will in its turn recede into the twilight zone of consciousness.

So we are built and rebuilt by our thoughts. Minute by minute, hour by hour, day by day and year by year, we allow ourselves to be formed and patterned by these little thought actors working through our attention.

Deep and true was the insight of Prentice Mulford when he wrote, "THOUGHTS ARE THINGS."

Your power over your own life and destiny depends in very great degree upon your ability to cast into the dark background of your consciousness weak, undesirable thoughts of envy, malice, fear, etc., and bring forward into the center of the stage, into the foreground of your consciousness thoughts of power, self-confidence, unity, health and poise.

Whether you were treated badly or not in your experience of five years ago there is certainly nothing to be gained by thinking about it now. 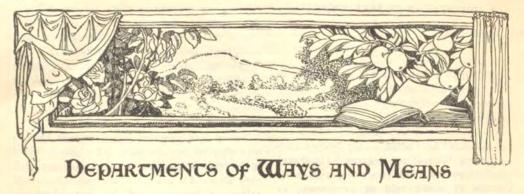

tinctly a neglible quantity. If you ever rode the bicycle you know that when you tried to "avoid" a certain stone in the road you ran right into that stone. When you tried to ride in the middle of the clear road you had no trouble whatever about the stone. It is a fact that whatever we look upon we are attracted toward. As Job said: "I feared a great fear, and it came upon me." It is natural for a woman to bring forth perfect children, and nothing else is natural. She will bring forth perfect children every time, unless in some way she is badly interfered with. Given a healthy father and a healthy mother, there is not one chance in a billion that the child will not be perfectly healthy and normal. And that one chance depends upon some catastrophe of the sort that is not liable to happen in a thousand lifetimes. Dismiss that side of it entirely from your mind, and bend your energies upon living a happy, healthy, normal life, and thinking the highest and best thoughts. High thinking and moderately low living is the keynote. Observe moderation in all things, and there is hardly a possibility of anything else but a splendid child. Don't worry too much about pre-natal culture. You may depend that animal instinct plus "race belief" will take care of your prenatal culture, provided you do your part to-ward high thinking and moderately low living. The healthier and happier the parents are, the better chance the child will have. But what the child inherits after birth is of infinitely more value in fixing its character than all the pre-natal influences you can conjure up. Read "Tokology," by Alice B. Stockham, M. D., but use it very moderately indeed. And don't fail to read Dr. Larson's little 25c book, "The Mother as a World Power." Also read "Religious Education for New Thought Children," by Helen Rhodes-Wallace. If you want normal children, look first to your health and to the health of the father. The clean, healthy child should begin with healthy parents. But this is only the smallest part of making a clean, healthy grown-up. The rest all lies in what the child "inherits" from parents, other children, schools, books and society in the first ten years of its life; plus what the child is trained to do with its knowledge as it comes. It takes a judicious blend of love, knowledge and disciplined action, to make a child the father of a splendid grown-up.

F. B.—Yes, it is just possible that it would have been better if you had had it out with your mother-in-law in the beginning. It is likewise just possible that it might be a good plan to have it out with her now. Remember that having it out with a person must be done once for all and NEVER referred to again. And it must be an absolutely thorough job. the whole truth told; and it must be closed with a wiping off of the slate, and an expressed determination to begin over again and live love instead of the other thing. I know perfectly well that you are exaggerating the "misery" that your mother-in-law gave your husband. He didn't mind her half as much as you did. He grew up with her, he knew how to make allowances because he loved her more or less. Love covereth a

multitude of sins. The trouble with you is you don't love her, and you don't try to love her. It is easier not to. And her faults and failings make an unfailing subject of conversation. Conversation in your mind if not with your friends. Cut it out! You are sowing within your own mind, your own being, the seeds of the same things you see manifested in her. Cut it out! Live love. Remember that others are even as you-that they are one with the same Father and that they are trying just as hard as you are trying to do right and be right. The trouble with us all is that we do not understand. If we did there would be nothing to forgive and we would love everybody. Here's health, happiness and prosperity to you and yours. You certainly have a rich memory of your husband. I should think you would be grateful to his mother for simply giving him birth even if she never did anything else.

# A Plan to Abolish the High Cost of Living:

According to Edmund Thery, the French economist, the maintenance of Europe's armed peace footing during the last twenty-five years was twenty-nine billion dollars in money and constantly excluded with productive industry one hundred and ninety-five thousand officers and three million, eight hundred thousand men. Add to this the billions in money (not counting the lives lost, property destroyed and men kept out of productive employment), that has been paid by the United States for war purposes during the last half century, and the approximate cost of the war budget of the world for that period will ap-

This exhibit is made for the purpose of calling serious attention to a single factor that will place the world on a permanent peace basis. To bring about universal peace in a decent and becoming manner, the president of the United States should say to each of the ambassadors and ministers at Washington, "If your government will pay one equal share of the cost of the Panama Canal, together with one equal share of the cost of maintenance and operation, your ships may pass through the Panama Canal on the same terms and conditions as the

ships of the United States."

The acceptance of this offer by foreign governments will obviate the necessity for costly fortifications at each entrance to the Panama Canal. It will also enable the United States and other nations as well to at once begin reducing their military and naval strength. Then the turrets, guns and armor plates that now load dreadnaughts and battle ships to the danger line may be put ashore and the dismantled ships, together with their transports, may be converted into a merchant marine. Then the converted ships and transports should be apraised and turned over to an International Syndicate, having an authorized capital equal to the value of the converted fleet and transports, plus the value of all the merchant ships and ship yards in the world.

To round out and complete this altruistic work, the ports of all nations that are in the Syndicate should be made free to its ships merchandise and men. Let the angel of justice and mercy dominate this spirit of International Comity, and the high cost of living will disappear from the world. Then life will be easier, the world will be better because the spirit of altruism is abroad in the world.—Charles Hamilton Merry, Los Angeles.

# Why Not a House of Women:

If the various women's organizations, social and civic, would send delegates to Washington to be present during sessions of Congress, organize and hold their own sessions as the Women's House of Representatives, discuss and pass upon all important measures before Congress and originate new laws, such an organization would, I believe, exert a very great influence from the beginning with increasing power that would ultimately result in their becoming legal representatives, with equal powers with the men.

I have presented the skeleton of the idea only. Think it over and if it appeals to you as rational and practical you have the ability and the means to fill in the details and give it publicity. ### We Wonder:
