Take special times every day for affirming success, and always affirm it in the present tense. I AM success—not I shall be success some time in the

future.

I AM SUCCESS NOW: That is a statement which if repeated often enough, persistently enough, long enough will sink into your subconscious and manifest the things you desire.

How do you know you are "no nearer the mark than you were fifteen years ago"? "Success" to an actress or an artist is like turning the corner. You may walk along a very long lane then suddenly you turn the corner and there you are. You may wake up tomorrow morning to find yourself manifesting the fame and success that you have in mind. But no matter whether you do or not, remember to keep on affirming I AM success Now. And see that everything you do is done in the successful way, in thoroughness and Good Will.



TET'S EXPECT wonderful things to happen in our world. There is no reason why they can't. Miracles are everyday experiences to most of us, and we are not aware of it. Around us tremendous things are happening, within us great ideas are being generated, and most of us sit back and are bored with the entire

process.

A bored mind is never a creative mind, and we were placed on this planet by Infinite Intelligence to be creative expressions of its mind. People who are listless are never spiritual giants, financial giants, or even good cooks. No one yet has put too much spiritual effort into his work, his home, his family, or his church. The many who claim that they have, are false prophets; and their sick minds, sick bodies and limited finances testify to the truth of this statement.

The lack of inspiration in many of us is due to the lack of expectancy of good. The two go hand in hand. Our life should never be a routine affair; it was never intended to be that by the Mind that created it. Our life should be constantly renewing itself with fresh inspiration, fresh ideas, fresh love. The mind of Jesus Christ was not a stale mind, and therefore he lived in a vitally alive universe. Jesus talked life. He lived a vital life, and he knew that his whole world was vibrating with a tremendous life that was God in action. Jesus expected good every day of his thirtythree years, even on his last day of visible life.

Jesus beheld the life of God in every one he met. We don't, and perhaps that is the reason our bodies die and our minds become stale and our experiences sour. We look around us at other people and we expect problems. We expect to catch colds from them, to be told their troubles, to hear of world problems. We never expect any one of those near us to be the Light of the world; but we

should.

Just How God Helps You

TUST AS in modern physics there is I the wave theory and the quantum theory, so in the affairs of men there is the idea of a purely mechanical form of evolution, and the apparently opposed idea of God as the Creator of all things. Physicists expect some day to reconcile wave and quantum, to see how both — though apparently contradictory of each other - are true and mutually consistent.

That is what every student of New Thought must do in the realm of spiritual physics. He must learn to see that evolution is not only true but is supremely important to him. And he must learn that God is the one Power, the one eternal Reality.

Now let us see how this works out. You want to think of God as your father, watching over you, guiding you, helping you when you need help. But God doesn't sit around in a place called "Heaven," thinking of himself as your father. That part is up to you. God is Basic Power, Potentiality. You are God's highest form of manifestation in this world. For that reason you have the power to draw upon the various attributes of God — to "create" a God whom you can love, venerate, obey.

That means that if you want God to manifest compassion, you must become his compassion, here and now. You get God's compassion by drawing it through yourself and passing it on to others. If you want health, you must yourself become a radiating center of health, contagious to all who come near you. If you want supply, you must realize that you - God's manifestation in Caesar's world - are supply, that unlimited abundance for you can come only from the God power working

through you and in you.

This matter of selecting out the qualities of God which you will worship can work much harm. Man, given true creative power, is responsible for his use of it. Evil men have created gods whom they worshiped, gods of cruelty and ruthlessness. And for a time these evil gods have taken care of their worshipers. But there is a self limiting power in evil and in the end these gods destroy not only themselves but those who follow them. You are seeing that happen today.

Only the good - the beautiful, the useful, the compassionate - has survival power. Think for a moment about evolution, as material scientists have worked it out: for every evolutionary form that attains survival power, a hundred fail and disappear. There was a germ of the Basic Power in them, but it chose the wrong path. If there is such a thing as a truly evil man, he too will disappear after the change we call death. There will be no attributes of good to go on, and the tiny germ of Power will flow back into the vast sea, to start out on a new attempt in an entirely different form.

But for the same reason those who live even in part by the law of love are day by day creating a spiritual body. They are wise stewards, wisely using the talents that are given them.

It will be well for you to think of

yourself as living in two worlds at the same time: In Caesar's world you are doing your work, whatever it may be. In God's world you are communing with him, are drawing power and wisdom and love. Jesus prayed for his followers that they should not be taken out of the world,

but should be kept in it.

And this is how this concept works out: day after day you continue to build up your awareness of God's presence with you - of the God whom you have chosen. He is a God of love, of helpfulness, of guidance. At the same time you use your illumined will and wisdom and power to do the things you find to do — things that are worth doing. The true principle of divine creation is beauty, usefulness, good. Therefore in establishing yourself on this firm foundation, refuse to consider evil or limitation in any form. See good, think good, work for a goal that is wholly good.

Remember that the things you see about you are not real, in a positive sense. Your body, for instance, is real, while you need to use it, just as your fountain pen is. But neither is real in the same sense that you are real. You are eternal Power, Life Everlasting. And evil things are even less real than good things: bombs are less real than fine paintings, because they have no survival value. A time will come when guns and all weapons will be done away with forever, but in that time there will be fine books,

wonderful works of art.

Here is a Truth statement for you to use in awakening the God-self within you:

GOD, MY FATHER, I ABIDE IN THY HOLY PRESENCE AND AM TRANSFORMED INTO THY IM-AGE OF ETERNAL POWER, COM-PASSION, WISDOM, BEAUTY.

Realize and believe that once you awake this inner consciousness of the Presence, within you, working in you and through you, you will become independent of all outward circumstances. Within you, here and now, is limitless wisdom and power to create what you need - a regenerated body, a transformed mind, abounding supply. This won't come all at once. But gradually, as you ignore "evil," the belief that there must be trouble waiting just around the corner, that sickness and aging are necessary, that no man can be declared happy till he is "dead," will dry up and vanish.

Jesus said, "I am the way and the truth, and the life." Say that to yourself very often. For Jesus was a master of realization. He knew that God was within him, at all times, and that when he said, "I am the way, I am the resurrection and the life," he made a law for himself that nothing could withstand.

You can do that, now. In a future issue of Nautilus, I want to tell you about the special ways of applying this principle of limitless power — of a blank check which God gives you — in healing your body and your affairs.

"These Things Can Be Mine"

Part II of "How We Made Our Dreams Come True"

HAVE YOU enjoyed proving that your inner acceptance brings results? Have you proven it over and over again? As to the times you failed, we'll start with those right now. (But if, for any reason, you have not done Lesson I, go back and do it now. Practice it for at least a month before you start with this Lesson II. Don't begin with this Part II.)

The first thing we did in the group after our days of many demonstrations was great fun. Do it now, yourself. Take paper and pencil and write down all your desires - not the things you think you ought to want, but the things you really want, all those things you failed on last month, all the things you've always wanted. Don't skimp at all. There is only one stipulation, namely, that your choice neither binds nor injures any other individual.

For instance, if you put on your list a house, you may specify a brick house with a red tile roof, French windows, four bedrooms and a shower bath with a pink curtain; but it must not be in your thought a specific house. It must not be No. 210 Groveland Terrace, which belongs to Mrs. Jones and is not for sale. And if it be a husband, likewise he must not be Mrs. Jones's husband, nor any specific man, for that would limit his freedom of choice. You may specify the exact qualities you desire in the person, but not the particular person. Beyond that stipulation, go as far as

you like and in great detail. Mentally and emotionally go on a shopping spree, ordering what you want, being careful not to choose what you don't want, for after all, you're going to get these things. This isn't day

dreaming. It is life!

Then fold your list and put it away. Mentally and emotionally let go of it. You have turned it over to a Power far more capable than your own two hands and feet and mind and heart. The things are down in black and white. They will not escape, nor will Mind forget. As for you, you are going to be too busy with this next piece of work to bother with

longings.

If you will think back over the times you succeeded last month and the times you failed, I believe you will find that always when you succeeded you felt a little click of acceptance when you gave your command. And always when you failed, this acceptance was lacking. In other words, when you made your demonstration it was because nothing in you hindered your acceptance. And the reason you sometimes failed, and the reason that some of the things on your list seem difficult, is not because of outer conditions but because you have not yet become in expression the kind of a person to whom that good would happen.

For instance, if you have on your list a sum of money, say ten thousand dollars, and find it difficult to accept, it is because you do not yet have a ten-thousand-dollar consciousness. You do not have a money consciousness. It has often been said that if one were to take from Henry Ford every cent he has, in a few years he would find some way to again serve the human race for which the human race would gladly pay, and in a short time he would be a wealthy man once more. He knows the principle of wealth — that the supply is not in money itself, nor even in automobiles (although in his case that was the immediate source) but the basic source is in himself, in the Spirit within him. So, with no fear of poverty, he would start immediately to build toward wealth.

Now the main thing between us and the fulfillment of all the desires on our lists are not the objective conditions and circumstances, but our own consciousness, our fears perhaps, our self-centeredness, selfishness, self-pity, critical attitude, lack of sympathy, love, understanding, etc. So this month (it was that on which in the group we put the most time), we will practice building within ourselves those qualities necessary to the fulfillment of our good. We'll build them in exactly the same way that Burbank established a new quality in plant or tree or fruit — by selection and repetition.

Take fear, for instance. We could all spend a great deal of time to good advantage in replacing fear with inner peace. Over and over, whenever you think of it during the day, remind yourself that "There is no fear. There is no fear. There is no fear. I am filled with peace." Breed peace in all your relationships with people. Do not fight them, or argue, or criticize, or complain. Agree with them. Rec-

ognize God in them. In every situation select those reactions which deny fear and make for inner harmony and peace. Repeat over and over, "Peace within me. Peace within all people. Infinite peace, peace so deep, so strong, so certain that nothing can touch it or hurt it or destroy it in any way."

Let go of quarrels. Let go of enmitties. Let go of fears. Practice

Then practice love in that same way — love toward all people, toward everyone you meet. Think, "I love you." You do not, of course, love them in the sense that you love those nearest and dearest; but on the other hand, you are not lying to yourself. You are recognizing truth. You are recognizing God in them and in you. You are recognizing an inner reality which, in you, will inevitably open the channel to acceptance of your good.

Choose whatever qualities you need most — peace, poise, power, enthusiasm, love, happiness, joy, intelligence, wisdom — and breed it by repetition of "Peace within me," "Poise within me," etc., over and over, hundreds of times during the day. Say, "Perfect Life within me, God-Life, I am basically Spirit, God."

At first this may have little reality, but it is astonishing how far one can come in even one short month.

Treatment is actual mental work. It is not wishing or hoping or praying. It is conscious changing day by day of habitual thought-patterns and emotional habits. It is definite, active, constructive, and when it is done you have not only made that particular demonstration but you have established within yourself an atti-

tude that will make all demonstration easier for all time.

One other thing, a warning: don't talk about it while you are doing it. Don't tell anyone, unless someone is doing this with you, and even then,

power oozes out with too much conversation.

Action — that's the thing. But the action is mental and spiritual yet none the less action!

Your Sure Refuge When Anxious

MANY TODAY are seeking a ref-uge from the anxieties, the worries and the uncertainties which beset us on every hand. We look to this friend and to that friend when trouble comes. We go to the banker in times of financial need. We go to the doctor when sickness comes. Everywhere we look for help, for comfort, for health, for financial security, except to the sure and only unfailing source — to the Father within. The security we seek is not to be found in strange places, or by seeking it afar. "The Father that dwelleth in me, he doeth the works." He knows the way of peace, of shelter in the times of storm. At different times Jesus demonstrated the protection, not through the power of outside help, but through the power of the Father within, which is ever present.

We find many passages in the Bible where the Lord, this Father within, is spoken of as a defender, a place of refuge, protector, counselor and friend of man. "Fear not, I will help thee." Those words could not have reference to protection for a certain few or certain ones; they have reference to a power which is available to all and not dependent upon an incomprehensible Being in the form of man. Those words could only have

reference to the power within man himself, the Christ within, the Father within as Jesus said, this sure

refuge in time of trouble.

This Father within is an indwelling entity with power to help and guide us when we seek it through faith believing. It is only when we allow fear and worry to lessen our faith in the Presence, the Father within, that we separate ourselves from its power. Through this separation we expose ourselves to the influences of the outside world, and in so doing we are shut out from the place of refuge.

Many times and under varying circumstances Jesus was protected from his enemies by taking refuge within this sheltering power. Daniel, when about to be destroyed by the lions, found safety in this same refuge of God's power. In answer to the king's question, whether his God was able to deliver him from the lions, Daniel made answer: "My God hath sent his angel and shut the lions' mouths that they have not hurt me." Daniel had sought and found this sure refuge and even the lions could not harm him.

The 91st Psalm is a veritable treasure house of promises of protection against every danger, disease, pesti-

think of another woman who was infatuated with a man of brilliant mind, but there was another man less brilliant who wanted to marry her and for whom she entertained some sort of deep affection, he was so fine, so patient and so kind. This woman did not pray to win the man of brilliance though she believed she loved him. She prayed for guidance; each man offered his hand. She answered them that she must wait - and prayed on. Some problems can never be changed, or solved, or healed, except by Time—this was one of these. In time the brilliant one lost caste as a result of a disreputable act, and although she did what she could to restore his prestige she finally married the other.

She is one of the happiest women I know. "I loved him all the time," she said recently of her husband. "When I asked for guidance the Lord told me to wait and I would receive it."

That case reveals a very singular fact that we often pray for that which we really do not desire in our hearts. And when that is so, certainly we pray amiss. St. Augustine in his "Confessions" pictures his mother, Monica, praying all one night in a seaside chapel on the North African coast that God would not let her son sail for Italy, a land of splendor and licentiousness. She wanted her son to be a Christian. And even as she prayed, St. Augustine sailed by the grace of God for Italy, became the protégé of Ambrose and the greatest of Christians. Mother Monica prayed amiss with her lips but not in her heart. If God granted every petition he would deny most of the deep longings of the soul.

The speeches you address to God are seldom your real prayers and they

are only infrequently answered. That plea which expresses the desire and determination of your life is always heard and

is always granted.

Prayers are often not answered because they are ended when one quits praying. Prayer is a means of gaining power to go on. That was the Christ method — to get courage and strength to endure. He prayed on the mountain top and walked and taught with prayer along the shores of Galilee. Prayer is only the approach to the battlefield. Failures in prayer are due largely to the fact that they are separated from life. It is easy to pray for things but not to create them. There is a prayer of life not found in the prayer books. Mary Austin in her book, "Can Prayer Be Answered?", gives a hint of this new prayer. She had gone to Italy to die, suffering from painful symptoms which finally had been diagnosed as cancer of the breast. . . . "So with one arm in a sling and my breath drawn tight against pain, I set out for Italy." Five months later she met friends in Venice who were surprised that she was not carrying her arm in a sling, but she could not remember when she had subconsciously discarded the sling, nor when the pain had left her. Something had happened to her "which I always attach to my intense preoccupation with prayer methods. . . . Somewhere in the business of achieving complete detachment for the furtherance of my prayer project I had left my ailment behind me."

Mary Austin was healed by nobly entering life. It is a prayer you will not find in the prayer books. Any loiterer can pray to be rich, but he will never realize his prayer, he will pray amiss; for such praying is not really prayer. Prayer is the motion of a hidden fire,

trembling in the breast, which is carried out into life. With such prayers you never pray in vain.

Prayer is just one means we use though perhaps the most powerful to create. There is also work; there is self-sacrifice. Our greatest — and really most important — desires demand time, persistence, patience, work and self-discipline. If God granted every plea he would have to send also leanness of the soul.

Telepathy Near-Minute By Minute

IN THIS article I tell of months of telepathy, that was responsive minute by minute, between two people always very near, but with the idea of the subject telepathed completely unknown to the recipient.

It was 1920, I had an apartment in New York, and also a small home and study out on Long Island. I was co-ordinating — trying to weave together — the essentials of many hundreds of reports of scientists re the new knowledge of the atom, of electronic action, and of radiant energies.

At that time, there was little of this advanced knowledge in book form. Practically all of it was in concise monographs, thin pamphlets—some only 8 pages; some 16 or 32 pages. One research scientist had worked on one line, another one on another. No one had yet compiled or co-ordinated the researches of any number of them; so this was what I was trying to do at that time.

These pamphlets were scientific reports, usually available only to other scientists. I had accumulated approximately 2000 of them. They were placed on two shelves, with the pamphlets held up by little metal divisions.

When one looked at the shelves of pamphlets, one could not tell which pamphlet was which. Each was so thin there was no possibility of a title being printed on the back of a pamphlet. Moreover, they were in different languages — mainly German, French and English; but some were in Swedish or Russian, and a few in Japanese. Those which I could

not read contained tables of information which were valuable to me.

I could not remember their titles; and the young boy working with me did not know any of the titles; and certainly he did not know the subject matter of this pamphlet or that one. He was a sort of office boy and had not had even a high school education.

I myself made no effort to remember the author of each pamphlet, but I did have a sort of "register" in my subconscious mind of the knowledge which this or that scientist had reported.

As previously stated, I was trying to co-ordinate the part-knowledge of these reports, for one scientist had discovered this, and another scientist that

And this is what happened every day and many times a day: whenever I wanted one of those monographs I would say, "George, I want—" and then I would hesitate and hem and haw because I did not remember the titles of those pamphlets.

So all I could do was to point at the shelves; and I could never point exactly to a pamphlet, because I did not know exactly where it was. I knew it was "somewhere" within a limit of three or four feet along a shelf, and that was about all.

And even if I had been able to tell George the title of the pamphlet I wanted one minute, or the one I wanted ten minutes later, he would not have been able to find the title, without taking out scores of pamphlets and looking through them. As previously stated, they were so thin

there were no titles printed on the

backs of the pamphlets.

My mind was concerned with the subject matter of the pamphlets I wanted; but George did not know anything of the scientific subjects presented in those monographs.

Yet during months of that work, often many times a day when I would say, "George, I want . . ." and then stop without naming the pamphlet or the author, George would go to those shelves, pick out the pamphlet I wanted at that moment and bring it to me.

Once in a while there was an error, but very seldom. In at least ninetyfive cases out of one hundred, he would hand me the pamphlet I

wanted.

Certainly, George's response was due to some mode of telepathy between my mind and his — although I often wondered what it was that he felt, for I was not consciously telepathing to him either the title or name of the author.

And if I had been telepathing him an idea of the *subject* matter of a pamphlet which I wanted, how could he have received it when he did not know such subjects? He knew no more of the subject of the atoms and electronic energies than my dog knows of the Greek language. So it must have been something else—something different from the idea of the subject matter—which was telepathed from my mind to his.

I sometimes thought that I was telepathing "placement" to him; that is, an image of where the particular pamphlet I wanted was located on the shelf. But I did not even know

that consciously. So far as I knew the pamphlet might be anywhere within three or four feet from where I thought it was. Yet George practically never made a mistake!

So something must have been telepathed from my mind to his consciousness; or else some greater Intelligence which knows all things was directing both my mind and his and uniting them when union was necessary.

You may think that this was not telepathy, but if not, what was it? Certainly George had the capacity of perceiving or receiving impressions of my mind of just the pamphlet I wanted and

at the time I wanted it.

I have lately wondered whether or not George would, if he were living today, show up phenomenally well under the Dr. Rhine tests. I sometimes think he would not, for it is my opinion that all such tests hinder true telepathic communication from one soul to another.

One thing is certain: Telepathy is more than the mere transmission of thought or feeling from one soul to another. There is a power which directs it. It is but one manifestation of Infinite Intelligence, and that Infinite Intelligence is always working through each of us.

What we know of telepathy today should teach us (1) that we are silly if we do not have faith in our capacity to receive guidance and even knowledge every minute; and (2) that we lack common sense if we do not consecrate ourselves enough so that whatever we do receive is so reliable that it will lead us aright.

Hitch Your Work to Love

ORK ALMOST DOES ITSELF

— when you are interested in it.

But O how it drags when you hate it!

Like everything else in this little universe, work responds to love — to good will. You can take out of your work just about what you put into it. Work won't produce unless you give it something in the way of energy to create with. And how can you give energy — productiveness — to your work, if you go to it with a long face, resentment in your heart, hate of your environment and those who people it?

You may say, "How can I love my work when it is carried on in the presence of those who are utterly nonco-operative and disagreeable and hateful?" Well, even under such conditions your own thought-life is free. And you will find that even under such conditions good will tends to dissolve some of the unpleasantness. Do you remember a book by Starr Daily called "Love Opens Prison Doors?" It tells how the doors of prison actually opened, the way was made clear for his release, through the application of the principle of love — good will — to his problem.

You see, love is creative. It creates according to your own deep faith and desire. And it will start working for you no matter where you are or how unpleasant your environment. W. Beran Wolfe, M.D., wrote: "The best piano tuner we have ever found was a blind man who took up piano-tuning early in life at the behest of a physi-

cian who wisely recognized the progressive nature of his eye condition." Even if one is blind or in prison his creative energy can and will work for him if he trusts it and frees it in action.

If you are very conscious of the difficulties in your environment, if you find yourself surrounded with those you deem very disagreeable, it is probable that you are over-sensitive to your condition because you are yourself the victim of an inferiority feeling. What you need is more confidence in yourself - more trust in your own power. You are too quick to resent what you do not like because you feel — away down deep in your heart — that perhaps there is some justice in the attitude of the other fellow. If you are overly sensitive you feel this way even when there is no basis for your doing so. But if you put lots of good will into your work and your living, you will find that things will go so much better that you will soon feel more confidence in yourself; and this will make you much more self-reliant; more indifferent to the unreasonable criticism of others. Why should you care about the faultfinding which others may direct at you and your actions if you can feel sure you have done your best? And you do your best when you love the most — love your work, your play, your surroundings.

Don't be afraid to try this plan of putting love into living. "There is no handicap, either hereditary or environmental, which cannot be com-

pensated if you are not afraid to try," says Dr. Wolfe. Love is the key which releases your unused and hidden energies for use in the way you want to employ them. You can create that which you desire to create; that which you have the faith to believe that you can create. And love inspires faith. "Self-trust is the secret of success," said Emerson. And love leads to self-

trust. Even obstacles become a source of pleasure - because they give you the joy of overcoming - if you are sure in your own heart that you have the power to meet them. And love, more than almost anything else, can

give you that power.

Yes, work and hitch your work to your love. Here is a somewhat mystical verse from Emerson that presents a word picture of the power of love.

Asks naught his brother cannot give; Asks nothing, but does all receive. Love calls not to his aid events; He to his wants can well suffice: Asks not of others soft consents, Nor kind occasion without eyes; Nor plots to ope or bolt a gate, Nor heeds Condition's iron walls, -Where he goes, goes before him Fate; Whom he uniteth, God installs; Instant and perfect his access To the dear object of his thought, Though foes and land and seas between Himself and his love intervene.

Though the Alps seem to lie between you and your objective, if your efforts are inspired with love, the end will be attained. That seems to be the message of this little verse, as I read it.

And here is another little verse which covers the whole field of this subject in very few words.

Work and thou wilt bless the day Ere the toil be done; They that work not, can not pray, Can not feel the sun.

God is living, working still, All things work and move; Work, or lose the power to will, Lose the power to love.

I PRAYED

IT WAS two o'clock on the Saturday afternoon of October 19, 1940. Mother had been ill for months—desperately ill. She was 82 and living in a body filled with aches and pains. She clung to life for she felt I needed her. If she left me, I would be alone. I held her to earth because my heart brimmed with love for her. She was

my life.

We struggled through weeks and months, the days and nights growing more difficult. On the Friday night preceding the day in point, Mother was terribly ill. From midnight on, it was a terrific battle. For hours I did everything I could without a second's letdown. The doctor was not called in during the night for the simple reason that Mother had been ill so long it was a financial impossibility to have so many visits. A doctor was actually needed every few hours, her condition changed so rapidly.

Saturday morning I continued to follow all medical instructions that had ever been given in Mother's case, but nothing seemed to bring relief. At one-thirty o'clock, realizing the situation was totally beyond me, much as I had tried, I phoned the doctor. He was out making his rounds. At two o'clock, I phoned again. The doctor had not yet been located. I turned from that telephone nearly exhausted, and with my mother in agony in the next room, I prayed as I had never prayed in my life before

. . . for help . . . to be told what to do . . . to give Mother the relief she should have. For the first time I let go, and I let Mother go, in

spirit.

As I ended that prayer I stood silent and waited. For what, I did not know. I heard a quick step, there was a knock at the door. On opening it, not five minutes after having left the telephone, I saw the doctor standing there. I couldn't believe my eyes. I asked him if he had phoned his office, for I had been trying to reach him. No, he had not been in touch with his office, he said, but while making his rounds it had occurred to him that he should stop in and see how my mother was getting along. That was the first and only time in my mother's entire sickness that the doctor ever came without being sent for.

Ten minutes after the doctor arrived, a nurse appeared at the door. To this day I have never learned that nurse's name. My mother quieted down. She soon slept. She never had

another pain.

Ask and it shall be given unto you. Eventually Mother passed away. On the day of her passing, the question of a minister for the services arose, as Mother had belonged to no church. I suddenly recalled that Mother had told me many years before that she had gone by herself to some church in the city and had been baptized. The pastor of that church seemed the one to officiate. I had never quite understood why mother had not permitted me to go with her when she had decided to be baptized, and had felt at the time a great sympathy for her spiritual yearning, a very deep admiration for her bravery in doing what she had done. To go by herself to a strange church in a strange city, on such a mission at her time of life, was no easy task. She was a tiny thing, and even then none too well. Mother had never attended the church afterward, partly because she was frail. It was hard for her to sit in a pew, difficult for her to hear well. It upset her to go and not know what the pastor was saying. I remembered all this now, but the entire incident had been dismissed from my mind years before.

The day of Mother's death, I went back carefully trying to bring to mind the name of the church where she had been baptized. It seemed a hopeless task. Finally, I resorted to the telephone book. As I went over the list of churches in the classified section, I earnestly asked for guidance. There were three church names that seemed to stir memories. I wrote them down - one, two, three. Later, I asked a friend if she would call each of these churches for me. There might be a way for them to trace the baptism of my mother so many years before, but it seemed to me almost an imposition to ask.

My friend took church number 1 on the list and phoned the secretary. A sweet voice answered. My friend hesitantly said she was trying to trace the baptism of a little lady who had just passed away and wondered if there was any means of knowing whether it might have occurred in that particular church.

The sweet voice answered, "I'll be glad to help you if I can. What was the lady's name?"

My friend repeated my mother's name slowly. There was a dead silence at the other end of the telephone. After a wait of many seconds, in a somewhat awed tone, these words came over the line: "Please pardon me for not speaking at once, you somewhat startled me. This morning, for the first time, I pulled that lady's card from the files. It is lying here on the desk before me. I was wondering what had become of her."

In an area of over a half-million, from the files of about one hundred and sixty churches, the morning of her death, my mother's baptismal card of thirteen years' standing was waiting when the call came!

THE ATLANTIC CHARTER put I forth by our President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill declares Four Freedoms which they, and All of Us here want to spread round the world. Beginning NOW, and for the duration, and for ever after.

FREEDOM FROM WANT! This

is our basic freedom.

This is the way our Vice President, Henry A. Wallace defines that basic

freedom from want.

"The Fourth Freedom which must be the essence of the new declaration of freedom is freedom from want, which I would spell out as follows:

1. Freedom from worry about a job.

2. Freedom from worry about a dependent and poverty-pinched old

3. Freedom from unnecessary worry about sickness and hunger.

4. Freedom from strife between workers and businessmen, between farmers and businessmen, and between workers and farmers.

5. Freedom from strife between the

races and creeds.

6. Freedom from fear of bankruptcy caused by overproduction of neces-

sary materials.

7. Freedom for venture capital and for inventors of new ideas to expand production of needed goods without fear of repressive cartels, excessive taxation or excessive government regulation.

"Above everything, we are fighting for peace. But the peace will not last long if it doesn't bring to the Common Man everywhere these seven freedoms." - Henry A. Wallace, September 11, 1943.
