## I AM THINKING.

"You say that no one was ever healed by thought. I have read it over and over, but can't get at your meaning."

"Mortal thought, my dear, mortal thought! When the I AM thinks, it is a Creation; when the mortal thinks, it is a picture. 'Only speak the Word and my servant shall live.'"

Now doesn't that make you smile? Shelton comes out flat-footed with the statement that "nobody was ever healed by thought." Then in the very next issue of *Christian*, he takes it all back and says no one was ever healed by "mortal thought," but that when the "I AM thinks, it is Creation." So when you get Thomas pinned down to as plain a statement as such a champion Gemini-cricket can make, you find that he knows it is thought that heals after all. I AM thought creates and heals, and mortal thought—oh, mortal thought is *nothing at all!* And he and Mary Eddy look mysterious and triumphant.

And you are puzzled to know I AM thought from "mortal thought." In your dilemma you are inclined to discard both kinds of thoughts and just swallow Shelton's statements whole—or else swear off on "Science" altogether.

But I say unto you be not muddled. *There are no thoughts but I AM thoughts. There is no thinker but the I AM.* Behold, I AM makes peace and creates evil by thinking. I AM makes peace and evil for you by thinking good or evil through your brain and body. I AM does the same for me. I AM is the thinker of "mortal thought" as well as immortal thought.

It isn't a question of thinking or not thinking, —it's a question of the kind of thinking. I AM good or bad, strong or weak, just as I AM thinking. You are strong or weak, good or bad, just as you are thinking. Get rid of this mysticism and settle down to the business of exercising your dominion in the only domain you can call your own—your thoughts.

You are the I AM. You are God. "God" is the "soul" of everybody and everything. He is the Something which by thinking creates and re-creates bodies. He is the Something which withdraws from a body at death. He is the real you—the I AM of you, the thinking principal of you. Your body is the result of its thinking. Your body changes as its thought changes. In other words amounting to identically the same thing, your body changes as your thought changes.

You and the I AM are identical.

"But I can't realize my I AM self," you exclaim. And that cry is the burden of hundreds of letters that come to me. Well, what of it? What is realization that you should chase it ever-

lastingly? Why does it ever elude, like a will-o'-the-wisp?

Folks go a-hunting realization as if it were some concrete show they must set eyes on. The same people pay ten cents to view the "Biggest Hog in the World." They can realize the Hog, having seen it. But they cannot realize realization because it is an abstract idea. You see, they are materialists, ever seeking material things. Their spiritual eyes are as yet unopened.

Realization is like light; you see things IN it, but you never see it.

Your divinity, your I-AM-ship is like light; you see things IN it, but you never see the divinity itself. You never see love; but you see things which are in love. You never see air, but you see things in the air.

You ARE God; but if you go hunting until Gabriel blows his trumpet hoarse you will never see yourself as God. You will never hear yourself as God; you will never feel, smell or taste yourself as God. You may see, hear, smell, taste, touch your body which is IN God, in you, but the God, or you, as a whole you will NEVER realize. Quit trying.

Take it for granted that you are God—that "you and the Father are One"—and act as if you are. Look up. Quit nosing around in the dirt after realization. Look up and out and see the whole world in realization—yourself included. As you look at a man remember his divinity. Remember that his I AM and yours are One; that the same Spirit is thinking through you both. Respect that other man and his opinions—he is God.

But not more so than you are. The thoughts the I AM thinks in you are just as important as the thoughts of the other man. For you they are more important.

Respect your own thoughts. They are God's thoughts—I AM thoughts.

Are your thoughts poverty-stricken ones? Are they crooked ones? Are they "bad" thoughts? Are they helpless thoughts? They are not to be despised for that. Andrew Carnegie used to be a poverty-stricken atom in the world of men. He outgrew it. Owen Kildare used to be a "bad" atom. He outgrew it. Every man began as a helpless atom. He grows out of helplessness into power. But what if we despised all these helpless babies and strangled them?

Quit despising and strangling your helpless and poverty-stricken and "bad" thoughts. Quit trampling your "mortal thoughts" under foot. Quit condemning your negative ones.

NOT A NEGATIVE THOUGHT BUT WILL GROW INTO A POSITIVE ONE IF YOU GIVE IT HALF A SHOW. NOT A MORTAL THOUGHT BUT WILL PUT ON IMMORTALITY IF YOU DON'T WITHER IT WITH CONTEMPT.

Value your thoughts. Give them room, and love, and honor; and encourage them to grow up in the way they should go. Treat your thoughts as a wise parent treats his children. Give your thoughts pleasant occupations and plenty of exercise, and they will soon outgrow the helpless and negative stages.

Always remember the divine origin of all thoughts. If you find slums in your mind go in with a smile and study those slums with a view to improvement of conditions. Give the slum-thoughts something to do, and don't get mad or discouraged because they don't do it in a day or a week. It takes patience and faith as well as works, to grow mental or material slums into

heavenly homes. And you don't do it in either case by despising and killing off the dwellers.

What are mortal thoughts? They are thoughts of sin, sickness, death. What are immortal thoughts? They are thoughts of wholeness, happiness, life. *In every mortal thought there is the germ of immortal thought, and this germ is trying to grow up.* Give it room and a smile to grow on.

Remember your divinity. Remember the divinity of your thoughts. Despise not the day of mortal thoughts.

WATCH your thoughts kindly, and learn from them. It takes real love and consideration and confidence, as well as wisdom, to rule successfully in any kingdom. It takes the same qualities when it comes to ruling "the imaginations of the thoughts."

A real king is ruler simply because his people delight to please him. They work to please him.

Smile at your thoughts and they will smile back and do your bidding. Frown at them or despise them and they will be ugly and unruly. Thoughts are not only "things"; they are little people. They will prove good fairies or bad fairies, according as you treat them well or ill.

I long for a wedded life of pure blessedness and love and joy without even a pinhead of bitterness ever finding lodgment in our household. How can I attain this state of peace? This is what I now do: I enter into the Silence daily at a particular hour and enjoy the mental picture of how I desire to be when married. Am I right? Please tell me how to make my ideal real." Tudor, Island of Ceylon.

The above letter comes from a member of the Success Circle who is a highly cultured and interesting looking native East Indian. We have a full length photo of him in native costume.

He asks if "this is the working of the Law of Attraction." Certainly it is. Just as the sun acts through a sheet of glass so the Law of Attraction acts through the conventionalities of a race. Whatever comes together is drawn together by the Law. Whatever is held together is held by that same Law of Attraction.

This is just as true in unhappy marriages as in happy ones. If two people are distinctly enough individualized; that is, if they understand and command themselves sufficiently; their attraction and marriage will bring to them only pleasure. If they are not distinctly enough individualized there will be a monkey-and-parrot experience whilst they are working out the wisdom for which they were attracted.

When soda and sour milk are drawn together there is a great stew and fizz, but the end thereof is sweetness and usefulness. So with two adverse and uncontrolled natures; but out of the stew comes added wisdom, self-command and rounded character for each.

When each has finished the work of helping the other to develop they will either find themselves really in love with each other, or they will fall apart. Some stronger attraction will separate them at the right time—perhaps through divorce, perhaps through death.

All our goings and comings are due to the Law of Attraction. The Law of Attraction giveth, and it taketh away. Blessed is the Law. Let



it work. And forget not that *all* things are due to its working.

This does not mean that the Law has no way of working *except* through the conventionalities of a people. Many times the attraction is to break away from the conventional. *The stronger attraction always wins*—whatever is, is *best* for that time and place.

"Tudor" says he "enters into the silence daily at a particular hour and enjoys the mental picture of how he desires to be when married."

His success all depends upon the *equity* in that picture; upon its truth to the law of being.

An impractical idealist lives in the silence with beautiful pictures of "how he desires to be when married." When he gets married there isn't a single detail of his daily experience which is like his mental picture. He is sadly disappointed and perhaps embittered or discouraged.

It all depends upon the picture. If Tudor's picture contains a benignant lord and master and a sweet little Alice Ben Bolt sort of wife who shall laugh with delight when he gives her a smile and wouldn't hurt his feelings for a farm; who does his bidding before he bids and is always content with what he is pleased, or able, to do for her; if this is the style of Tudor's mental picture he is certainly doomed to disappointment.

I have a suspicion that Tudor is a natural born teacher. His mental pictures may represent himself as a dispenser of moral and mental blessings. He may see Ada sitting adoringly at his feet, ever eager to learn. If so there will certainly be disappointment. East Indian girls may be more docile than American girls; East Indian men may be better and wiser lords and masters; but "Ada" is a Human Being before she is an East Indian; and a Human Being instinctively revolts from a life passed in leading strings. If Tudor continues to remind her that he is her schoolmaster she will certainly revolt; inwardly if not outwardly. Whether the revolt comes inwardly or outwardly harmony is doomed.

The first principle of happy marriage is *equality*. The second principle is *mutual confidence*, which can NEVER exist without the first.

I do not mean by "equality" what is usually meant. One member of the married twain may be rich, the other poor in worldly goods; one an aristocrat, the other plebeian; one educated, the other unschooled; and yet they may be to each other what they are in *truth*, equals.

Equality is a *mental state*, not a matter of birth or breeding, wisdom or ignorance. The TRUTH is that *all* men and women are equal; all are sparks of the One Life; all children of the one highly aristocratic "Father"; all heirs to the wisdom and wealth of the ages which go to make up eternity.

But all men and women are more or less unconscious, in spots at least, of this truth. They spend their lives "looking down" upon each other. Men "look down" upon their wives as "weak" or "inferior," and women look down upon their husbands as "animals" or "great brutes." Men are contemptuous of their wives' visionariness, and women despise their husbands for "cold and calculating" tendencies.

Every man and woman values certain qualities highly, and in proportion as another fails to manifest these particular qualities he is classed as "low," and his society is not valued.

This is the great source of trouble between husbands and wives. Each values his or her own qualities and despises the other's. So in *their own minds* they are not equal, and the first principle of harmony is missing.

The real truth is that in marriage a man is schoolmaster to his wife and *she is equally schoolmistress to him*. This is true in a less degree, of *all* the relationships of life.

The Law of Attraction draws people together that they may learn.

There is but one Life, which is growth in wisdom and knowledge.

There is but one Death, which is refusal to learn.

If husbands and wives were equals in their

*own minds* they would not despise each other and refuse to learn of each other.

The Law of Attraction, or Love, almost invariably attracts opposites, and for their own good. A visionary, idealistic, woman is drawn to a practical man, where, kick and fuss and despise each other as they will she is bound to become more practical and he more idealistic. They exchange qualities in spite of themselves; each is an unconscious agent in rounding out the character and making more abundant the life of the other.

Much of this blending of natures is accomplished through passion, the least understood of forces. And the children of a union of opposites, even where there is *great* contempt and unhappiness between the parents, are almost invariably *better balanced* than *either* of the parents.

I cannot believe that unhappy marriages are "mistakes" or that they serve no good purpose. The Law of Attraction draws together those who need each other at that particular stage of their growth. The unhappiness is due to their own foolish refusal to learn; and this refusal is due to their contempt for each other. They are like naughty children at school, who cry or sulk and refuse to work out their problems. Like those same naughty children they *make themselves* unhappy, and fail to "pass" as soon as they might.

Remember, that contempt for each other is at the very bottom of all marital unhappiness. The practical man despises his wife's impulsive idealism and tries to make her over. The wife despises his "cold and calculating" tendencies and tries to make him over. That means war, for it is impossible to make over *anybody but yourself*.

Because the man despises his wife's tendencies and she despises his, it never occurs to either to try making over *themselves*, thus helping along the very thing they were drawn together for.

If Tudor's picture holds two people who are *always* equal though utterly different; whose future actions are an unknown quantity to be taken as they come, and each action to be met in a spirit of *respect* and inquiry, with a view to understanding and learning from it; if over and through all his picture Tudor spreads a glow of *purpose* to preserve *his own* respect and love for *her*, at all costs;—if this is the sort of picture Tudor makes in the silence he will surely realize it later.

It requires but one to strike the keynote of respect and personal freedom in marriage; the other will soon come into harmony.

You can readily see that all marital jars come from this lack of equality in the individual mind. If a man thinks he is perfectly able to take care of and to judge for himself he resents interference from another. On the other hand if he believes his wife is equally able to judge for *herself*, he *never* thinks of interfering with her actions. Of course the same is true of the wife. It is lack of respect and confidence which begets the making-over spirit in a family, and from this one cause arises all inharmonious.

Individual freedom is the *only* basis for harmonious action; not only in marriage but in all other relationships of life.

And individual freedom *cannot* be granted by the man or woman who considers his or her judgments superior to the judgments of another. A man *must* accord his wife *equal* wisdom and power with himself, else he *cannot* free her to act for herself. A woman must accord her husband that same equality, or she *cannot* leave him free.

It is human (and divine) nature to correct what we believe to be wrong. Only in believing that the other "king (or queen) can do no wrong," lies the possibility of individual freedom, in marriage or out.

The man or woman who knows he or she is believed in and trusted is very careful to *deserve* that trust. Did you know that? The sure way to have your wishes consulted is to exalt and appreciate the other party. Did you know that a man or woman will cheerfully sacrifice his or her own opinions in order to retain the respect and love of the other? But if he thinks the respect and love of the other party is growing less he will give free reign to his own desires.

Married people "grow apart" for the one reason that they find fault with each other. Of course it begins by their being disrespectful to each other's faults, but it soon develops into disrespect of each other. From "looking down" upon a husband's faults it is only a few short steps to looking down upon *him*. His faults keep growing by recognition, and his good points keep shrivelling for lack of notice, until in *your mind* there is nothing left but faults. From trying to make him over you come to despair, and give him up as an altogether bad job.

And there isn't a grain of sense in all this madness. Stick to the TRUTH and you will get rid of the madness and the friction too. The truth is that your husband, or your wife, would be an egregious *fool* to follow your judgments. You don't know beans from barley corn when it comes to the actions of anybody but yourself. The One Spirit which enlightens *you* as to *your* actions is also enlightening your other half as to *her* actions; and do you suppose this Spirit is going to favor *you* with better judgment about your other half's duties, than it has given *her*? I guess *not*. Don't be presumptuous, my boy. Do your own little best, and *trust* your other half to do hers. Trust that she is doing the best.

And above all trust the One Spirit to run you both.

If you do this your wife will *rise fast* in your esteem. And the higher she finds herself in your esteem the harder she will try to please you—and rise higher.

And, girls, don't forget that the shoe fits equally well the other foot. Either man or wife can bring harmony out of chaos simply by *respecting* the other half and *all his or her acts*.

A marriage without "even a pinhead of bitterness" is a marriage without a pin-point of fault-finding, mental or oral.

### A FEW VIBRATIONS.

"Some time will you define vibrations? I do not quite understand."

Vibration is Life. Vibration is motion. All motion is vibration. All motion is Life. You expand your chest with an inhalation of air; you contract your muscles and exhale. This is vibration. Your heart "beats." This, too, is vibration.

Every tiny cell in your body is "beating," or vibrating, just as your heart and lungs do. When your chest expands you *take in* fresh air, which goes not only into your lungs, but into all parts of your body. The air blows like a fresh breeze around the countless millions of cells which go to make up your body. These little cells in their turn expand and take in the air. Then the cells contract and force out the air, and your lungs, too, contract, and force the air clear out of your body.

Now this air which is thus vibrated through your body serves to *clean* it. The decaying particles of your body cells are thrown off and carried out in the streams of air which are vibrated through your body. If it were not for this vibration of your body, which keeps the air flowing through, your body would soon become clogged with dead matter.

The nerves and arteries in your body are constantly contracting and expanding, contracting and expanding, to move along the blood, which carries food supply to the cells and bears away their sewage in just the same way that the air is carried to and from the cells.

It is by constantly vibrating—contracting and expanding—that your stomach and bowels digest food.

It is by vibration of the cells of tree and plant that the sap flows through and feeds the tree.

Even a stone is composed of tiny cells which *breathe*, just as the cells of your body, and just as your body as a whole does.

Every individual, be it cell, plant, animal or man, lives by vibrating; by expanding and contracting to take in the new and force out the old matter. Every *mind*, too, lives by vibrating—by alternately expanding to receive new ideas and contracting to get rid of the old.

Then there is another sort of vibration by which



one individual communicates with another. Imagine to yourself that the ether is made up of infinitely small elastic balls. If you strike any one of those tiny balls it will strike those next to it and rebound, and those hit will strike the next, and so on the blow will travel from one tiny ball to the next, clear to the edge of creation—if you can imagine such a place. The blow you strike sets all the little elastic balls to vibrating, or moving back and forth.

Now if I stand away out in space and I feel the little elastic balls vibrate against me I know it means Something. By experience I learn *what* each kind of movement means. If you clap your hands together the vibrations of those tiny elastic balls strike my ear and I say, "I hear someone clapping hands." If I face your way the vibrations strike my eyes and I say, "I see someone clapping hands." In any case *your* motion caused the ether to vibrate and I felt the vibrations. If I had no ears or eyes I could not *feel* the vibrations, but they would be there just the same.

Every movement made sets the ether to vibrating to its particular pitch; and wherever there are eyes or ears the vibrations are recorded. When you talk it sets the ether going just the same whether there are ears to hear or not.

And when you keep perfectly quiet and think you set the ether going too. Your brain sets vibrations going, just as your tongue does. There are people who can hear your thoughts, just as you hear another's speech. In due time we shall all hear thoughts—we are all growing mental ears.

Thoughts are higher vibrations than spoken words; and they "carry" farther. You know a deep, growly bass voice makes a great noise when you are close to it, but a shrill treble call can be heard much farther than the growly bass. The high voice makes short, sharp, far-reaching vibrations. Now thoughts make infinitely shorter, sharper and farther-reaching vibrations than the voice can; and thought vibrations carry farther and far more quickly.

And wherever there is another thinker ready to hear, the thoughts are recorded.

Many times we hear the thoughts of other people and mistake them for our own; for everybody has at least a little mental hearing.

When you speak clearly and distinctly your voice carries much farther than if you speak hurriedly and carelessly; and other people can more readily understand what you say. If you mumble your thoughts or your words the etheric vibrations carry mumbled meanings.

As people learn to think distinctly their thoughts carry farther and find more listeners. In course of time and with due practice, we shall easily think so that people on the other side of the earth can hear us. Not only that, but we shall think so clearly and high that the inhabitants of Mars and Venus and the sun, too, shall easily hear us.

I wouldn't wonder if what we call sun rays are really the thought vibrations of the sun's inhabitants. What if we receive and respond to their thoughts and think them our own!

### A POT OF HONEY.

"The February issue of Henry Harrison Brown's magazine, *Now*, contained an article on 'Opulence.' I've read a good many articles on opulence; some have impressed me, some fell flat—flat as a pancake—this one didn't. First of all it placed all my former theories in a wrong light; my idea was to say 'I WANT.' It is quite true that when I did this I generally got what I wanted sooner or later, but H. H. B. says you must not say, 'I want'—in effect he says you must affirm, 'I don't want dollars; dollars want me.' A very little consideration will show this is right; but consideration wasn't enough for me—I put it to the test. The first five days my receipts fell almost to zero, but I was determined to hang on. I felt it was right, the drop in business must be due to the re-adjustment of the vibrations, for long experience has taught me that you cannot turn round from one method of thought to another very suddenly without disturbing the currents, and these have to get re-adjusted to the new rate of vibration before you can work them. The sixth day my patience was amply rewarded; for every one order I had been in the habit of receiving, I got twenty, and it has kept up ever since. Now I never weaken my position by affirming that I want anything. I say it

wants me, and I know it will come. It is not any use making that statement, of course, if you doubt it. You must back up your statement with faith and feel it is already yours. It is rather on the principle of the honey-pot and the swarm of summer flies; you are the pot of honey—the dollars are the flies. (Of course you must have some honey to give them—dollars won't drop into your lap if you have nothing to give in return, nor can you expect to make much progress if you are like one of my readers, in some post which can only give you a fixed sum weekly and no chance of a rise.) Now the honey doesn't worry about the flies, it is content to be sweet, to give off a faint sweet smell and to stick, but the flies do want it, they come from all quarters, they swarm into it, sip its sweetness, and buzz-zz-zz all round. The honey is a power—irresistible power so far as flies go—they want it, it is a great center of attraction. Now, say you run some particular line of business—you are the honey—in the world there are many people who want what you have to give them, who will gladly pay cash for it, who cannot help being attracted to your honey, as the flies might be. Your thought, as I have so often told you, is strong and potent beyond measure, but when you assume the 'wanting' attitude, although you do most certainly attract, it is nothing like the powerful attraction formed by your quiet, confident attitude of absolute conviction that the thing wants you. Again it enlarges your whole outlook, you may sit down and think you want a hundred pounds and it seems a big sum, perhaps, when cash is coming in by shillings. But supposing the dollars want you, want your brain and hand to use them, as H. H. B. says, how absurdly small that sum appears; watch them (mentally) being drawn to you; what is a paltry hundred, when they want you to put them to work? The attitude of desire is strong, but the attitude of certainty—of possession—which this new thought makes possible is wonderful, and a veritable tower of strength; it has made things possible to me that were quite out of the question before." O Hashnu Hara.

I reprint this item from *Wings of Truth* because it is too good to be missed by the thousands of American readers who never see that bright little English magazine. I believe the idea that money wants you will help you to the right mental attitude for attracting it. Be a "pot of honey" and let it come!

And I want you to particularly note what O Hashnu Hara says about disturbing the vibrations. I have noted the same thing many times. Every time I enlarge my mental picture of success and begin "concentrating" for something greater, even if it be directly in line with the old one the first thing that manifests is a falling off of money receipts. But as soon as my vibrations get settled again the receipts come in faster than ever.

This falling off of receipts lasts only a few days, and is greater or less according to the degree of difference between the old aim and the new one. For instance, suppose I had been "holding" and working for, say, \$1,000 a month income, and I suddenly raised it to \$10,000 a month. There is a wide difference between the two and my vibrations would be, for a few days, greatly disturbed by the change. If I had enlarged my mental picture just a little—if I had raised from \$1,000 a month to \$1,100, and then later to \$1,200, and so on; raising each time as my real receipts began to approach my mental ones, there would be almost no disturbance of my daily receipts.

Whatever disturbs the mind and imagination disturbs for the time being your drawing power. This disturbance of vibrations is exactly what is referred to in that Bible sentence, "Let not him that wavereth think he shall receive anything of the Lord."

Let not him whose mind is changing expect to receive anything. Whether his mind changes from hope to despair, from success to failure and back again; or whether it changes from one picture, or aim, of success to a greater one,—whichever the change the immediate results are the same.

To make up your mind what you mean to "concentrate" and work for, and then to STICK TO IT, counting adverse appearances as momentary nothings, which cannot hinder, is the only way to bring about the thing you want.

Until you have manifested such a degree of success that your faith and feelings cannot be easily shaken it is better to enlarge your aims and mental pictures by slow degrees, taking care to hold yourself mentally steady but wide awake, as you make the changes. The steady grower has no unexpected "reverses" to meet. His growth

may not be phenomenal but it is solid as that of the oak.

This is not, however, an admonition to "go slow." We are generally too slow to enlarge our ideals and business operations. Enlarge as fast as possible, but go no faster than you can go steadily.

When you do enlarge your aim do not be scared out of it by any falling off of receipts or other adverse signs. The surest and the quickest way through, is straight ahead. Hold steadily to your new ideal and make the best of conditions. As soon as the new vibrations become established conditions will quickly manifest in their image.

Keep steady and sweet—be a "pot of honey."

With all our boasted Yankee wit it is absurd that seventy millions of us are still sending sticky, stuck and unstickable stamps over all this land as a medium of exchange. Let's go back to the beads and wampum of the Indian. It would not be so nerve racking and disgusting. As three years of this (to be) wonderful 20th Century have already 'slippit awa' surely this matter ought not to be Post-poned longer." R. Dugal Hall, Avon Park, Fla.

Good! That is just the ticket. This sending stamps for money is an utter nuisance and a disgrace to the American nation. I wish every reader of *Nautilus* would sit right down this minute and write a courteous but emphatic request to every one of your senators and representatives asking them to immediately push that C. W. Post bill, or some better one, through Congress, and relieve us of the necessity for sending "sticky, stuck and unstickable" stamps instead of money. It is an expense as well as a nuisance to have to purchase a money order for every twenty-five cents or fifty cents or \$1 we want to dispatch by mail, and it is really an imposition to send stamps instead. In damp or hot weather the stamps are damaged. And at all times they are hard to get rid of. Stamps are merchandise, not money, and the Government will not allow them to be returned to any post-office, and business houses dislike to accept them because in small sheets they are much slower to handle than in the large, original sheets in which they are sold at the postoffice. Firms who sell things by mail are greatly troubled by this stamp nuisance. Do please, friends, help us out by writing to your U. S. Senators to hurry up some relief measure. The C. W. Post bill provides for fractional currency which can be passed like any paper money, and yet be turned into a sort of check for use by mail, simply by writing upon it the name of him to whom it is payable, and affixing a one-cent stamp. Here is a chance now for 40,000 or 50,000 people to stir up this matter. DON'T consider it "too much trouble," and DON'T put off until tomorrow what can be done now to help make the world more convenient to live and love in. And you can do another thing to help us out. When you do have to send stamps instead of money send one-cent ones in solid sheets, fold the gum side against waxed (not greased) paper, and see that the folds are made according to the perforations. To fold a stamp breaks it in two. Don't on any account stick even the tiniest corner of one stamp to the letter or other paper. You do not need to stick the Washingtons and Lincolns fast to keep them from hopping out of a sealed envelope.

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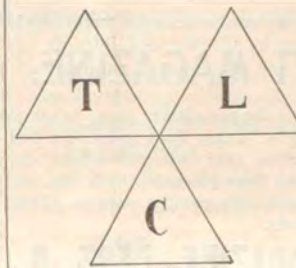
