# Modern Socialism Its Moral and Spiritual Significance

Let a few bold generalizations suffice to uncover the age-long wrong that the race has endured

Never in all human history have the toiling people who have done the work of the world, received the product of their toil. The product of the labor of the people has been perpetually filehed from them, and they themselves subordinated and cowed in their slavery and penury. The great masses of the people have been eternally held in helpless servitude to the powerful and privileged classes. The history of "man's inhumanity to man" in Social Injustice is one long terrible tale of cruelty, brutal oppression, and unforgivable outrage upon the bodies and minds and souls of the teeming millions that have populated the nations.

The masses of the people come here by the natural operation of procreation. But the earth and its products, and equipment for labor, these new millions find already in the private possession of the economically powerful. This possession of earth's resources is possession.

But these millions must live. And rather than leap into fire or water, or over the rocks, or perwater, or over the rocks, or perwater of life, these by the innate love of life, these by the innate love of life, these millions may live only on one condition, viz. to offer their labor for whatever it will bring as the slaves or seris, or hirelings or wage-earners of the few who conwage-earners of the few who control the earth and the fulness thereof.

Rather than die, they have chosen to live a living death under the dominion and at the mercy of those who controlled the only resources by which men can live.

#### ANCIENT SLAVERY

I say this economic and social injustice is the supreme unrighteousness of the ages as a crosssection of history anywhere will reveal. The Assyrian kings back in the dim past boasted of the hordes of human beings that they captured and forced into exhausting labor. The empires of Babylon, Persia, and Egypt and the Republic of Greece and Rome were all built upon the bleeding backs of baffled, degraded, and terrorstricken children of men, numbering millions upon millions.

Alexander the Great on one occasion sold into slavery 30,000 inhabitants of the one city of Thebes at \$16 per head. The Roman General Paulus Aemilius put up for auction on a battlefield 150,000 human beings. Even Great Caesar took thousands of Gauls to Rome and sold them like beasts of burden to the noble pa-

tricians.

A paragraph from the pages of a recent archaeologist gives an account of the almost universal industrial oppression of the work-

ing classes:

"Here in Egypt are the tombs of kings, stupendous monuments not alone of monarchial glory and pride, but of the reckless waste of innumerable human lives. Deep in the sands dug a myriad slaves, ignorant of everything save the stern necessity of yielding up every bit of strength in their bodies, and every last gleam of intelligence in their minds, to

the demands of the king. In the quarries, on the roads, and on the walls for scores of years, there toiled these thousands of men. wageless and half-fed. worked and scourged, sick, dizzy, and exhausted. The only hospital they knew was the taskmaster's whip, which stimulated into one last, agonized effort, the exhausted muscles of a used-up body or the frenzied movement of a reeling brain. Whether the glory of monarchs demanded the speedy completion of some expression of his selfish pride, or a too rapidly growing race must be reduced to manageable proportions without massacre, the whole picture of that useless, grinding toil testifies to an ugly, wicked contempt for human life.'

That is the picture of Babylon, Assyria, Egypt, Greece, and Rome. Romaine Patterson says of Babylon: "There was justice. but it belonged to a few, and had never penetrated the great dumb laboring population.....Babylon was great. She used science, and she used art, but she abused humanity. . . . She could calculate a star's eclipse, but not her own. No state has been more guilty of the waste of human life. when we see her ruins lying like a mysterious autograph scrawled over the desert, her history appears to be full of warning." Of Greece he tells us: "The truth is that behind her splendid facade-of art, and literature, and philosophy, and eloquence-we discover an industrial tyranny and workshops full of slaves." The gleaming city of Athens was one of the greatest slave markets of ancient world. We knew

that Rome employed servile labor on the most gigantic scale the world has ever known. It was good economy to exploit the strength of a slave to the uttermost since his place could be so easily filled from the hordes of cheap labor. Mommsen says that "compared with the sufferings of the Roman slaves the sum of all negro sufferings is but a drop." Capitalists of that day speculated on slaves, as many as 10,000 being sold in a day. And this record of ancient history finds its modified continuance through middle age serfdom down to the French Revolution. We find the horrible parallel in the white slavery of the mill workers of England up to 1825, and over into the chattel slavery of America to 1863, when in the black code of South Carolina death is the penalty for him who dared "to aid any slave in running away or departing from his master's or em-And in the ployer's service." memory of men now living it was a crime punishable by imprisonment for a white man to teach a negro to read or write. It was left for Christian slavery to do what pagan slavery never didprohibit instruction to the slave.

But the sad story does not end there. The present chapters of Capitalism of the long-drawn-out affliction of the enslaved working classes may now be read in the daily records of twentieth century Capitalism with its sweating, and unemployment and labor wars; in the accounts of poverty-stricken multitudes exiled from the face of nature and besieged by necessity in the unwholesome and filthy streets and alleys of our great in-

dustrial centers. In daily papers we read of a senator leaving 30,000,000 of dollars to his family, and a railroad king leaving \$60,000,000. And an oil king, worth hundreds of millions, while one-half of the producing classes are property-less and millions live on the verge of deepest want.

At this very moment while I speak and while you listen, millions of human brothers and sisters, old and young, not in heathendom, but of our own religion and language, and kin, and millions more in all western Christiandom, are ekeing out the miserable existence of un-owned slaves in the poverty, degradation, and hell of our modern industrial centers. At times hundreds of thousands cannot sell themselves by the day at any price to the masters of the machine and the market. Men, women and little children consume their lives away in a bitter struggle, merely to exist, while "wealth sits a monster gorged 'midst starving populations."

#### SOCIAL INJUSTICE

Up to this moment the people who have made the bread of the world have never received the bread their hands have made. They have hungered, and hunger today in the presence of the wealth their own hands have created. Perhaps never in history has wealth concentrated in such large sums and with such startling rapidity in hands that never earned it as in the days of McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft. A recent press report declares that Morgan is at the head of twelve billions of industrial resources. The American people are being legally and respectably robbed of the produce of their labor, and the tremendous and titanic forces and resources to supply means of life are being monopolized by the rich to still further complete their power over the people.

#### NO POVERTY IN NATURE

Be it distinctly declared that during all these long ages and down to the present moment from the days of Nebuchadnezzar to Roosevelt and Taft and Rockefeller and Morgan, there has been no poverty in the wonderful gifts of kindly nature; no poverty in the skill and muscle of the workers; no lack of equipment, no poverty in the actual products of labor.

But always and ever some small ruling and privileged class has possessed itself of that which they never earned. They have perpetually taken the surplus product of the toil of the working classes. Tyrants, nobles, patricians, barons and now the Capitalist class of Carnegies and Rockefellers, have secured unto themselves the vast surplus product of the labor of the working class.

#### THE SECRET

These industrial and social masters and oppressors of the people in all ages, and at the present moment, secured and perpetuated their mastery and oppression by one simple economic method: They owned and controlled (1) the natural material resources of the earth; (2) the industrial opportunities and mechanical equipment and the market; (3) and utilized these resources for their own private enrichment.

The private ownership by the few of the sources of life and labor

for all—thus is the one abiding base of all slavery and poverty from the days of the Pharaohs to Modern Capitalism. The control by the few of the sources of life God gave to all—this is the ground of slavery. This is the secret of poverty in the midst of plenty. This is the one ignored and evaded root-unrighteousness of human history.

Privately own and privately control for private profit the sources of the bread and labor supply, and the toiling millions are in chains, visible and invisible, and the product of their toil must inevitably flow into the hands of a class that never earned it, as it does this very day, while the workers in spite of excessive labor, marvelous machinery, and an enormous product are reduced to comparative poverty in the midst of that abundance. That is as plain as words can state it.

Thus robbed of the natural private property in the product of their toil, and deprived of access to the means of labor except on the terms of the masters of the market, all other elements of life have been denied. Their physical servitude has resulted in intellectual deprivation and social degradation, and the ethical and moral possibilities, the possible fellowships and brotherhoods of life have been rendered impossible by the strifes, antagonism, and competitions into which the unnatural struggle for existence has forced them.

Robbed of the produce of their toil, permitted to labor on the terms of the ruling class, untold intellectual, social and moral degradations inevitably follow.

No sane reasoning man considers this to be a chance world. The coming of the eclipses and the regular return of the seasons, prove it to be a world of order under the reign of immutable law.

Naturally, I am intently skeptical, yet was ever brave enough to investigate all subjects connected with science, religion and the destinies of man; and when thoroughly convinced of a truth I am invincible and immovable. While endeavoring to blend dispassionate reason, sound judgment with devotional fervor and with spiritual unfoldment, I have sometimes written with an iron hand and a sharp-pointed pen; yet under the pen-strokes glowed the spirit of sympathy and kindest fraternity.

The Key to Mysticism. Aquarius is the mystic sign of the Zodiac, and the key to mysticism is found in its chambers. It is an airy sign and still fixed. The very fact that it represents fixed air shows its mystic character.

Aquarius represents the Seventh Race and only a very few of earth's millions have yet attained to this high plane. It is the transition sign where the physical is dropped and the higher life attained, and, for this reason, it has two rulers—Saturn and Uranus. Saturn is the end of the physical; Uranus is the beginning of the spiritual.

Astrologers speak of Aquarius as a masculine sign, yet, strictly speaking, it is masculo-feminine, for it represents humanity perfected, which is both masculine and feminine. Here is the heavenly plane where human beings, like the angels of God, neither marry nor are given in marriage

Sign of the Son of Man. Because Aquarius is the sign of perfected humanity it has ever been recognized as the Sign of the Son of Man, Jesus speaks of this sign and alludes to the precession of the Equinoxes thus:

"But when the people have been punished for their crimes, the tribulation days will end; but lo, the time will come when all the world will rise, like gladiators in a ring, and fight just for the sake of shedding blood.

"And men will reason not; they will not see, nor care to see a cause for carnage, desolation, thefts; for they will war with friend or foe.

"The very air will seem surcharged with smoke of death; and pestilence will follow close upon the sword.

"And signs that men have never seen will then appear in heaven and earth; in sun, in moon and stars.

"The seas will roar, and sounds will come from heaven that men can never comprehend, and these will bring distress of nations with perplexity.

"Hearts of the strongest men will faint with fear, in expectation of the coming of more frightful things upon the earth.

Earth Rule. Aquarius rules over the earth from 60 degrees to 30 degrees west longitude, which covers much of the Atlantic ocean, where once was the proud continent of Atlantis. It also rules part of South America. This sign refers to the period of Janus, the double faced divinity—the month of January, and in South America we have the river Janus-Janero.

Aquarius is the center of the serving trinity; water is the symbol of purification and so this Son of Man comes as the bearer of the waters of the baptism of purification for the world. They who attain unto the fullness of an Aquarian character are blessed indeed; for they are at one with the Infinite.

Characteristics of Aquarius. The three words intuition, patience and perseverance will describe Aquarian natives.

Their wills are strong and demand constant activity. They must be busy. When idle they are simply miserable. A child is apt to be saying when unemployed, "Mamma, I don't know what to do." But they will do something and if not kept busy with useful and good industries they will drift into wicked pleasures, for with these people more than with most others,

"Satan finds some mischief still For idle hands to do."

They are usually mentally strong and able to concentrate thought, and if not in touch with the divine they are pretty certain to fail to recognize the Christ within:

Darwin is an example in this matter. He possessed one of the keenest intellects of any age; he

was a thinker among the best, and a logician of no mean ability. His works in science were superior and his reasonings were correct. Regarding the "Ascent of man," his premises were wrong, and though his reasonings were logical, his conclusions were false; but he demonstrated the true Aquarian characteristics, of deep thought and persistence.

The intuition and ready language of Aquarian people are illustrated in the lives of Charles Dickens and John Ruskin, children of this sign. Better writers of character sketches never lived. They not only saw and described the superficial characteristics of all classes of human beings, but they felt the deep throbings of the heart; and were able to bring out in the clearest of light the thoughts and intents of their heroes and heroines.

Aquarian Callings. Aquarian people do not often tread in ruts; neither do they like ordinary avocations. Uncommon things and uncommon callings always attract their attention. Few are there of these natives who do not take a liking to electrcity, or callings in which it is used. Thomas Edison is an Aquarian. He was born February 11, 1847, and a better example of the type of people I have been describing cannot be found. His whole life has been spent in blazing paths through untrodden wildernesses and his intuition and untiring zeal in electrical discoveries, has done more to make of the world a single community than that of any other man.

But electrical callings are not the only ones in which these natives excel. No sign produces

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shrewder traders, better artists or clearer writers. Phrenologists, physiognomists, palmists and other readers of character are produced by this sign, and I think that the best clairvoyants of every age have been Aquarians.

Emmanuel Swedenborg is an example of a true Aquarian clairvoyant. Few men of any have had a clearer view of the realms beyond the river. His works are grand and worthy to be read by all students of the mystical; but they illustrate a caution that cannot be too decidedly impressed upon the minds of soulplane visitors. He was a man of decided convictions and a strong mentalist. No man had a greater field of imagination than he and what he imagined assumed the form of conviction, and his opinions became basic principles. So with a whole volume of these preconceived opinions he was wont to go into the Silence, and on to the soul plane, these opinions biased everything he saw, and his visions were tinctured with materialism.

He who goes into the Silence must lay aside every self-opinion, or he will not see things as they are. If you wear colored glasses everything will appear the particular color of your glasses, and preconceived opinions are but colored glasses, in the realm of soul.

When an Aquarian makes up his mind to become a Seer he seldom fails, for his motto is "everlasting at it," and this is all that is required of a true child of this sign to guarantee clairvoyant success.

These people quite often, and

in a very humble way, seek advice on ever trifling matters; but they very seldom follow the suggestions they receive.

Just to be odd these people are antiquarians and seekers of odd and curious things. Their dens are likely to be filled with geological and minerological specimens as well as with

Aquarians can usually be depended upon when placed in positions of trust; they are faithful and when employed give satisfaction, for naturally they have wonderful hypnotic powers, and this they unconsciously use to obtain and retain the good will of other people.

A positive Aquarian has almost unlimited power of projecting thought; he can cause people to change their plans by simply willing them to do so, and I have known natives of this sign to bring people to see them from great distances, simply by the powers of thought.

While they place a high estimate on public opinion they do not like the conventionalities of modern society, and are seldom conventional; so they make model reformers. Every one must admit that they are honest in any attempted reform, and this alone inspires great confidence.

They are usually devoted marital companions and are true to their marriage vows. Women, especially, born under this sign have fine love natures and make devoted, faithful, virtuous wives.

Faults and Peculiarities. People of this sign who have had little opportunity for culture are apt to take great pride in their "blue blood," if they have any, and are constantly reminding people of the fact that they are scions of a remarkable family tree; but they are, often, such miniature twigs that they would not be heavy enough to switch a school boy. Raphael says: "Among the faults of these people are found vacillation, procrastination, promise breaking, selfishness in regard to attention, pride and a running of too great risks to secure personal requirements."

But these enumerated faults are seldom found among the cultured children of this sign. They are acquisitive without being miserly, and are apt to spend their lives and fortunes for the good of others. George Peabody was an Aquarian and most of you know something of his great heartedness and liberality.

Logically Aquarius is at home in the eleventh house, the house of friends and it is truly the sign of friendships, for these children seem to recognize all people as friends, and because of their excellent judgment and insight into the lives of others, a traitor seldom gains access to their heart of hearts. It is enough honor for any individual to be born under this sign, for if he wills to break away from the mere trappings of the physical he may soar to the highest planes of true excellency.

Aquarian people will do well to choose their companions in marriage from among those born between February 19 and March 21, or between July 21 and August 21.

Capricorn-Aquarius Cusp. People born between January 18 and 26 are children of the Capricorn-Aquarius cusp in whom the stub-

bornness of the Goat and persistence and originality of Aquarius seem to blend. They are endowed with a cool, reflective nature, and make the best of merchants and business manipulators generally. Women of this cusp seem especially endowed with business tact and can successfully conduct almost any kind of an enterprise.

They are not stingy, but they have definite practical ideas of economy, and this with their earning capacity is a tolerably sure guarantee that they will never come to want; in fact, that they will have of this world's goods plenty and to spare.

They are usually generous and give to the needy, and to charitable and other institutions with great liberality; but they decide for themselves to whom or to what they will give, and they are not apt to see things as others do; so it is no uncommon thing for them to refuse assistance when everybody else is enthusiastically giving, and to give with much enthusiasm when nobody else thinks of it.

These people are not usually given to excesses or sensuality unless Venus be prominently pos ited, or a fiery sign be rising at the moment of birth. When either o these testimonies are introduced the natives of this cusp, or in fact of Aquarians proper, will need a large army of guards to keep them from falling through the "Devil's Bridge." These same people, however, when they overcome the afflicting sensual aspects, and become consecrated to the higher life, are marvelous personalities in the work of uplifting mankind.

## Universal Peace

E. L. DOHONEY.

On the 22d day of March, 1910, President Taft, in an address before the National Peace League, said:

"I have noticed one exception in our arbitration treaties as to reference of questions of national honor to courts of arbitration. Personally I do not see any more reason why matters of national honor should not be referred to a court of arbitration than matters of property or matters of national proprietorship."

Under a joint resolution of congress authorizing the same the President has appointed a Peace Commission of distinguished American citizens, headed by Senator Root, of New York, to confer with other nations as to carrying into effect of this humanitar-

This action of the United States, through its president and congress has met with a hearty response from both the government and the people of Great Britain. A treaty between the two nations with plenary power to settle all difficulties by arbitration seems to be favored by all classes in England.

Sir Edward Grey, British Secretary of Foreign Affairs, in a peace address before the House of Commons, endorsed the position of President Taft to settle all differences between the two nations by arbitration. And Hon. A. J. Balfour, leader of the Opposition, in response said: "The Secretary for Foreign Affairs will find no heartier friends of such

a policy than those of the Unionist party." So we find the parliament of Great Britain, both Liberals and Unionists, united in favor of Universal peace as suggested by the United States.

And both the clergy and the press of England are unanimously in favor of this great humanitarian object. Therefore congress should fully empower our Peace Commission to enter into a treaty with Great Britain at once, to settle all differences between the two nations permanently by arbitration or decision of the Hague Conference. And said commission should be vested with full power to negotiate and invite treaties with all other nations willing to co-operate. France would no doubt readily agree to such a treaty and three great powers, the United States, Great Britain and France, standing for universal peace would exercise a wonderful influence on the world.

The secondary powers of Europe, as Austria, Italy. Norway. Sweden, Denmark and the small kingdoms of southern and Eastern Europe, and all the American governments would soon fall into line. China would do the same, and the international peace sentiment would become so strong that war powers, like Germany. Russia and Japan would finally join.

Already the Socialists, who have between 30 and 40 members of the German parliament, have responded to the peace policy of the United States, and will introduce

a resolution in the reischstag (German parliament) endorsing the movement, and will advocate such a treaty between Germany and England, its great maritime

rival and alleged enemy.

The Baroness Von Sutteran, a noble advocate of peace, who resides in Dresden, Austria, has published a remarkable article endorsing the action of President Taft in appointing the Peace Commission. She says: "President Taft's government means business in furthering a world wide crusade against war."

Let us show the world that we do "mean business." Let every

friend of peace write to his congressman to leave no stone unturned until congress has not only fully empowered our peace commissioners to act, but directed them to proceed at once to negotiate such peace treaties with every nation willing to join in the movement. Let everybody who is opposed to the horrors of war join in this great humanitarian purpose. We especially call on the pulpit and the press to constantly preach and teach the divine words of Iesus the Christ. "Peace on Earth and good will to men."

## Rythmic Breath V

BY REV. T. V. JAKIMOWICZ, D. D.

Madaznan Philosophy is of Zoroastrian origin, based primarily on the science of the breath, controlling rhythm, in diverse position, for life, health and wisdom; because inspiration, illumination and endurance comes therefrom.

The physical body consists of matter and energy containing electric force and magnetic power; one is within, the other without energizing and protecting manifested life. If there should be an excessive surplus of electricity, the body will be overactive, self-consuming; if the magnetic power prevails, the system would remain sluggish and dull. We cannot accomplish anything unless we are well balanced. These forces of electric and magnetic nature we call electrism and magnetism.

To control properly the nervous system as well as the cellular tissues, together with the bone structure and the inner organs it will not suffice to concentrate upon the joints or the ganglionic centers; nor simply to exercise the power of mind over matter, for it is immaterial whether we affirm or deny its condition, the original cause is still there and we never can control effects without controlling the cause.

Breath will regulate and equalize electrism and magnetism and give energy to the system inducing the thought power to find active expression. To control the muscles by will power and then to distribute magnetism and elec-

trism throughout the body we have two special exercises, together with the rhythm of breath.

Take a standing position and after you have taken the prelude breath, short inhalation and short exhalation through the nostrils, and having thoroughly emptied the lungs, inhale gradually and gently and at the same time swing the right arm with a circular motion in front of you, the palm of the hand toward the body, making a perfect circular movement. To begin with it might be easiest after the first inhalation, to exhale slowly making six circulatory motions with the arm; then without interrupting the motion inhale slowly while making another six circles, which makes twelve circles altogether; then at the twelfth stop, when the hand is above the head. holding breath strike the floor with your fist clenched and gradually exhale. Do the same with the left hand, swinging the arm twelve times and strike the floor in front of you with the fist clenched. Observe the rhythm in inhalation exhalation. Remember to hold your breath while striking the floor and exhale while bringing the arm to its proper position.

If you do not touch the floor at first be not discouraged; bend the body as far forward as you can but do not bend the knees for this should be a hip movement.

In passing through this movement one should not be harnessed into corsets and other trappings which act as impediments to your easy and graceful movement of the body. It would be even better to practice this barefooted where it can be done so conven-

By this development of the body iently. and mind all deficiencies that seem to disgrace you, all crippled and conditions, will brought to a normal state by natural means. You will not only reduce protruding abdomen and flabby cheeks, but will develope the bust, neck, face, arms and chest to a perfect form and beauty, and you will insure to yourself perfect health, clear and unbiased mind, normal brain conditions and the enjoyment of perfect happiness

This exercise should be taken of life. four times a day. In the morning facing the east; at noon turn toward the south; in the evening face the west and before retiring turn the face toward the north.

# THE FIRST AQUARIAN CONGRESS OF NORTH AMERICA HELD IN LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA,

MAY 18-24, 1911.

The Congress.

It is finished — the great Congress,—and an important chapter in the world's history has been written.

#### The Consecration Service.

In the evening of May 17th a consecration service was held at the home of Levi, the Aquarian Hierophant, 503 South Figueroa Street, in which nearly every Aquarian in Los Angeles participated. This was indeed a splendid "Service of Preparation," and the members of the Congress and the electors were in verity "Spirit baptized," receiving "power from on high."

Opening Session.

At 2 p. m., Thursday, May 18, the first session of the Congress was held in Abbotsford Inn, Eighth and Hope streets, at which time Levi made the opening address on "The First Aquarian Congress of North America; Its Plans and Purposes." Members of the Congress from many states were present, and several interesting addresses were given.

. Birthday Anniversary.

On the evening of May 18 the session in Abbotsford Inn became a Birthday Anniversary, it being the sixty-seventh milestone in the life of the Hierophant. Levi delivered an address on the "Aquarian Age and Its Sacred Books," which address will appear in the great book of the Congress called "The Spirit of the New Age," which will contain the principal

papers and addresses given at the Congress. This book will be published within a few weeks. Most excellent music was furnished by Miss Anna Ethelyne Read of New York and Mrs. T. V. Jakimowicz of Los Angeles.

#### Third Session.

On Friday, at 10 a. m., the third session was held, at which time Dr. Alton R. Harvey of Whittier, Cal., read a most excellent paper on "Healing," and brief addresses were given by Dr. Wm. C. Watson of Detroit, Mich.; Mrs. Josephine Morris of Kansas City, Mo.; Mrs. M. L. Shane of Pablo Beach, Fla.; and Rev. T. V. Jakimowicz of Los Angeles, and others.

#### Fourth Session.

This was held at 2 p. m., Friday, and was one of intense interest. The principal paper was given by Prof. Younger P. Rothwell, Registrar of the Aquarian College of Teachers and Healers, on "The Key to the New Age Requirements." Prof. Rothwell is a critical scholar and his paper certainly showed that he has a clear insight into the needs of the new humanity.

#### Fifth Session.

This was held in the Walker Auditorium on Friday evening. The principal paper was from the pen of Miss Adelaide Johnson of Rome, Italy, a true Aquarian and one of the most celebrated sculptors of that great city. The theme was, "The Place of Art in

the Work of the New Age." Mrs. Kate E. Tucker of Pasadena, Cal., read the paper and she was master of the occasion and was able to bring into prominence the strong points and the great beauties of the production.

The music was furnished by the De Chevenet Conservatory of Music, assisted by Mrs. T. V. Jakimowicz, and was of a superior

character.

#### Sixth Session.

This was held at the parlors of Abbotsford Inn at 10 a. m., Saturday, May 20. The first paper given was by Mrs. Florence Watson of Detroit, Mich., on "New Age Ideas in the Care of Those Not Able to Care for Themselves,—Children, the Aged, and Others Mentally and Physically

Incapacitated."

The second paper was given by Dr. W. C. Watson, of Detroit, Mich., on "The Most Humane and Practical Method of Caring for Those Who Are Criminally Inclined." Dr. and Mrs. Watson are practical "globe .trotters." They have been everywhere searching for knowledge, and they have certainly succeeded in gathering it in. Their papers were eminently rational and their suggestions, if adopted, would revolutionize the crude and unsatisfactory present-day method of caring for the nation's wards. Many valuable suggestions were made by other members of the Congress.

#### Seventh Session.

This session was held at Abbotsford Inn at 2 p. m. Brief papers from the pens of Prof. W. J. Colville and Dr. Charles Mildenberger, both of Brooklyn, New

York City, were read. Prof. Colville's theme was "The Aquarian Gospel and the Akashic Records." The principal paper of the session was from Dr. Julia Seaton Sears of New York City on "The New Age Key to Health, Wealth and Prosperity." The paper was read by Mrs. Eva S. Dowling, National Aquarian Scribe, who made conspicuous the teeming beauties and practical features of the paper.

Dr. L. H. Worthington, of Sawtelle, Cal., gave a well-worded and most instructive paper on "The Greatest Needs of the New

Time."

Dr. J. W. Kolachny, of Oklahoma, gave a splendid address on "The Divine Method of Cure." Dr. Kolachny is himself a healer of power and spoke from actual experience.

#### Initiation.

There was no session of the Congress held on Saturday night, but a "Service of Initiation" was held at the home of the Hierophant, and nearly a score of persons were inducted into the Inner Circle of the Silent Brotherhood.

#### Eighth Session.

This session was held on Sunday at 10 a.m., in Abbotsford Inn parlors and proved to be the most historical of all the sessions of

the Congress.

The first paper was given by Mrs. A. D. Patrick of Los Angeles on "What is there in the Religions of the Orient that may with propriety, be accepted by the Philosophers of the New Age." Mrs. Patrick has just returned from an extended tour of the Orient, and while abroad made a critical study of ancient

religions, and was well qualified to handle her subject in a practical way. It was a most remark-

able paper.

Levi made an address of "The Feasts, Festivals, Rites and Ceremonies of the New Age," and by the authority of the Supreme Council instituted the "Spiritual Feast of Aquarius," or the "Dinner of the Holy Breath," which is to be recognized as the one great feast of Aquarians during the Aquarian age. The names of all persons who partook of this Spiritual Feast were recorded in a book and these persons will be historically recognized as the Institutors of the Aquarian Dinner of the Holy Breath.

#### Ninth Session.

This was held at 2 p. m., Sunday, in the Inn parlors. The principal addres was given by Rev. T. V. Jakimowicz of Los Angeles, sixteen years a Catholic priest, on "What is there in the Catholic Religion that may consistently be accepted by Aqua-rians?" The address was most clear and forceful. Brief addresses were made by Dr. J. M. Peebles, Rev. Mr. Grimshaw, Dr. Worthington, Mrs. A. D. Patrick. Mrs. Kate Tucker and others.

#### Tenth Session.

This was indeed the culminating session of the Congress. It was held in Walker Auditorium on Sunday night. Levi made a brief introductory address, which was followed by a splendid paper on "The Spiritual Trend of the Ages," by Dr. J. M. Peebles. The paper was read by Robert Sudall, after which Dr. Peebles gave a well-timed address.

Rev. C. C. Pierce, for many years pastor of the Memorial Baptist Church of Los Angeles, gave an address on "The Ideal Creed of the New Age." This was one of the most forceful and practical addresses of the Congress. In another part of the magazine we print the suggested creed, and it would be hard to find a person who cannot without reserve subscribe to every article of it.

The music was furnished by Miss Anna Ethelynd Read of New York, Mrs. Case of Chicago, and the DeChevenet Conservatory of Music of Los Angeles.

#### Eleventh Session.

This was held at the home of the Hierophant at 10 a.m., May 22. Levi gave an address on "Soul Liberty and Slavery," emphasizing the great danger of socalled development as practiced by the average clairvoyant and medium.

The following papers were read: "The Greater Needs of the New Age," by Mrs. M. W. Bowen of Oakland, Cal.; "Individual Liberty," by Eben L. Dohoney, Paris, Texas; "Serenity," by J. S. Slack, Richmond, Mo. These papers were all highly appreciated by the members of the Congress.

#### Twelfth Sesion.

This was held at 2 p. m. at the home of the Hierophant. Mrs. M. M. Hunter-Jones of Ocean Park, Cal., read a remarkable paper on "Christian Healing." The subject was discussed from many points of view by other members of the Congress.

## Thirteenth Session This was held at the home of

the Hierophant in the evening. Levi read a number of chapters from the Aquarian Key, the third of the Sacred Books of the Aquarian Age, in which the true science of the Holy Breath was quite fully considered from the standpoint of Ancient Masters.

#### Fourteenth Session

This session—10 a. m., May 23, was held at the home of the Hierophant. "The Ethics of the New Age" was the specific theme considered. Levi read a number of chapters from the Aquarian Key, which is in reality the book of Aquarian ethics.

#### Fifteenth Session

This session—2 p. m., May 23—was held at the home of the Hierophant, and was devoted wholly to the "Good of the Commonwealth." Under the direct inspiration of Dr. W. C. Watson of Detroit, Mich., the Congress resolved to raise a propaganda fund of \$25,000 and subscriptions were at once made to the fund which aggregated nearly \$1500, and prospective subscriptions for over \$5,000 more were announced.

The interests of the Aquarian New Age, the official paper of the Commonwealth, were considered and excited much enthusiasm and every one present entered heartily into the work of bringing the list of subscribers up to 5000 during the coming year.

#### Sixteenth Session

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
