Practical Christian Healing

What Is It and to What Does It Apply?

"Christian Healing" is what its name implies, a system, or science of "Healing," founded upon the teaching and practice of "One," who lived 2000 years ago, who bore the name of "Jesus," of Nazareth, and who through the demonstration of his doctrine, and his attainment, became "The Christ."

This "science of Christ," is open to all who wish to follow its teach-

ing.

There is no "Mystery" about it, it is a Truth that can be demonstrated.

"Seek! and ye shall find, Knock! and it shall be opened

unto you."

It applies to all the problems of our daily living; and if it did not, it would not be a "practical Science;" but because it can be proven, and demonstrated, we call it "Practical Christian Healing."

This "Christ Science" is based upon the great Foundation Prin-

ciple—"God is Spirit," and—
"There is a Spirit in Man; and the
Inspiration of the Almighty giveth
him understanding."

To be a successful "healer," one must realize the consciousness of this "Indwelling Spirit"—"I and

my Father are One."

In applying healing to oneselt, or to others, there must be a conscious "Unity" between the Individual Mind, and the Universal Mind.

No man in mortal mind, heals either himself, or another. "It is not I, but the Father within me, who doeth the works."

The power lies with "God in us." "I am the Lord, who healeth thee," says the voice of that One in us, who is "our Lord," God.

"Christian Healing" does not apply simply to body healing, it means more than that, it means a complete casting out of mind all false conceptions, and preconceived ideas; and a renewing of the mind, through the "Higher Spiritual Law." "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he," is so vitally true, that no one can afford to ignore this truth.

So we see, to return to "1st Cause," that mind is the "center," around which all else revolves. Mind is the organizer of every state of consciousness, be it good or evil. This being true, how careful one should be of one's thought—to see that it is "Good."

Seeking to know what mind is, we find it is the "Intelligent Power" in man. If we ask, from whence comes this Intelligence, we find, by looking to "1st cause," that there is an Intelligence manifested in all creation, and this "First Creative Power," we are pleased to call God, Principle, Mind, Spirit, First Cause, Nature, or what we will, all names meaning the same. Jesus, the Christ, the founder of "Christian Healing," spoke of this creative principle, as God, and Father; as "I and my Father are one."

Then the secret of all Christian Healing is, to so unify our mind with this "Universal Mind," that we consciously know they are "one."

Then to properly heal a patient, the healer must appeal to his understanding, and try to awaken his spiritual nature. Teach him, that the illnesses of the body are the reflection of his mind.

Jesus, the "Great Physician," said: "I am, that I am," so, if through the "hereditary thought," I acknowledge myself to be weak, or ill, or declare my inefficiency, I am reflecting into my body weakness, illness, or incapability.

The patient must be taught that all that he suffers from illness of mind, inharmony in the body, conditions of poverty in his surroundings, are the direct result of his thinking.

By "My Word" I create my condition, both mental and physical, even by "the Power" vested in the Son; so I use my power, "my Word," to create. If directed without wisdom (God's gift to man), then I create conditions that are inharmonious; if I use my "Divine prerogative," and unite wisdom with my power, my creations are perfect.

Jesus said: Thy sins be forgiven thee; go and sin no more. What is sin? Missing the mark. Of what? "Of our high calling of Christ." Paul tells us, Sin is not merely a transgression of moral law, it is non-recognition of the "Divine Law."

Jesus was a "teacher of truth." He taught a "real science," so we call it "Christ Science," or "Christian Healing." Is this teaching practical? Yes! It can be applied, not only to the healing of mental troubles, and physical ailments of every description, but to your supply, and environment; to business and social duties; in fact, to every department of life. How do we know? "Prove me now; and see, if I will not pour you out such a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." It is by proving, that we know,

The first essential in proving, is "Faith." "Thy faith hath made thee whole," Jesus said. And as teachers and healers, we find that where healing has been immediate, as in many cases, the faith of the patient has been great. Jesus did

not teach the healing of bodies only, but the quickening of the "souls" of men; his teaching was for the "healing of the nations;" and the healing of nations is more than physical—it has its root in the minds of men.

If all people could be made whole physically, it would not benefit them for very long, for the "cause" must be reached first, and the cause of every condition, of inharmony, or wholeness, is mind; this means that mind being a creator of all conditions, it must be a change of mind, a mental cleansing, a purifying of thought.

The "baptism of the Holy Spirit," is the descent of "Divine Truth," into "Consciousness."

Jesus when speaking in the synagogue said: "The spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the broken hearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, to preach the acceptable year of the Lord."

Was this great "Spiritual Anointing" confined to Jesus alone? No. We have Jesus' own words for proof. He said, "Go ye forth into all the world, preach the gospel, heal the sick, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons, raise the dead." This message was to all the "Sons and Daughters" of God.

The "Call of the Spirit" comes to all when they are ready for it, and to be ready means when you desire above all else, to know God; when body, soul and spirit, are consecrated to his service, then are you an open vessel, waiting to be filled with "Divine Inspira-

tion." As you become filled, you will pour out your gifts to others, thus making room for greater infilling. You become an open channel for God's power, and life, to flow through, and thus you become a savior of the people; a coworker with Jesus Christ.

There are many kinds of healing, such as Magnetic healing, Mesmerism, Hypnotism and Mental healing, on the mental plane alone, irrespective of spirit. All of these have certain temporary power, but have no permanent healing.

Healing to be permanent, must be based upon unfailing law, and this unchanging law is Spirit.—"It is the Spirit that quickeneth, the flesh profiteth nothing."

So long as old race beliefs fill the mind, so long as error thoughts are indulged in, just in the same proportion, will like conditions be manifested in the body, and in one's affairs.

If a Divine healer could heal every physical sufferer on the face of the globe, how would the race be benefited as a whole? Unless the mind were renewed, the same conditions would again be manifested. So we see that Paul was right, in saying: "Be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind."

Every healer should be a metaphysician. The relation between soul and body is revealed by a knowledge of this science, and we find that ideas and words, held in mind, or audibly expressed, are the healing agents.

Thoughts print themselves upon the plastic substance of the body, and becoming rooted there, bring forth fruit, after their kind."

If the thought be of disease, poverty, or death, each brings forth, after its kind. How can it be otherwise? Can I plant thorns, and reap roses? Can I sow hate seeds, and reap love? Can I believe in death, and find life?

Yes. Even "Death" must be overcome; and he who says-Yes, this may be true, but it will be many centuries before it is manifested, is putting off the day of

salvation."

Jesus said, "Now is the accepted time." If each is waiting to see someone else demonstrate it, then all will fall short of the mark.

When going to college, we are not any of us satisfied to sit still and see someone else carry off the honors. Then why so much cowardice in running the "Race of Life?" "Death has no place in Life," and if you have Life now, and every day you are renewing this Life, because of the power of the Life Thought, which is creative thought, why will you so stupidly declare, "Yes, some time, but not now." If I am hungry, I eat now, not some time in the distant future.

When we "hunger and thirst after Righteousness," ("Holiness or Wholeness), we shall be filled. And to be filled means—to be so full of Life, that there shall be no room for anything else.

When the healer through prayer and meditation, attains a Spiritual Consciousness," he is inspired of God, there is a Unity of Mind, and God's thoughts are into the man. Then man realizes, myself can do nothing, it is the Father within me who doeth the works."While treating a patient in

this spiritual consciousness, the spirit quickens the minds of both the healer and patient, and through this, the healing is done.

"All things are possible with God," and so we declare no matter what name has been given to the disease by physicians, all diseases are curable under Divine power.

Anxiety, fear, anger, lust, jealousy, all such thoughts, produce

disease in the body.

The remedy is-Fill the mind with thoughts of trust, peace, love, purity, and thus harmony is manifested, and harmony is health. Man is master through his mind of all the life in his organism, and by right thought, can build a temple fit for the "Indwelling Lord," Diseaseless, Deathless.

This is the "Christian Doctrine" in its Ultimate, as taught by Jesus, and every healer or minister falls short in his calling, who fails

In this world of turmoil the very sight of the word Serenity brings to our weary souls a feeling of strength. The touch of a soul whose conscious harmony stands out against the dark background of strife and discord as a beacon light to guide our faltering steps, gives us a glimpse of another world. This contact of a moment gives us added energy to nerve our arms and lead us safely to that power over the germs of death and disintegration which the soul must conquer to attain.

It lasts but a moment and is overcome by the clouds of inharmony within us, leaving behind only the feeling that Serenity is our rightful heritage, and the memory of the heights we must reach to come into our own.

"It is not outer circumstances that disturb the peace of man, but inharmony within the soul."

Man is so constituted that he must overcome if he would reach perfection. And before the disciple stretch two pathways, leading—where?

The natural man is full of desires for the material things of this life; for wealth and all it brings; for this, he thinks, will bring him happiness. In his selfish struggle, the opposing currents are also selfish. If he wins it is at the expense of another. It is the old story of the survival of the fittest, the theory that might

makes right, the competitive system of social economy. When he has attained what to him is happiness, he must ever be on guard or it is gone. He can never have Serenity in the gratification of these desires, for his possessions are as chaff which may be scattered by any wind.

It is the urge of the Spirit leading man to the realization of the futility of material things to satisfy.

From these desires of man have arisen the conditions that confront us today. As a result, we have error to combat, vitiating tendencies to overcome, degenerating influences to antagonize, falsehood to crush out. Negative conditions, relative conditions, if you will, but conditions that must be recognized and overcome if we attain perfection.

The other path is also a path of desires—desires which are best called Aspirations, and at the beginning of this path is Serenity found. This path is the "straight and narrow way," with many pitfalls, many dark places, many dangers, and the disciple must possess Serenity before he can walk in it.

Serenity is the fruit of Faith; Faith is knowledge and Knowledge is Power.

"We must have Faith if we dwell serene." Faith in God. Faith that humanity is capable of

higher things, and above all, Faith in ourselves as integral factors in that evolution, and we must have the Will to manifest that Faith in action.

It is claimed by some that it is beginning to be recognized as a law that one must first possess a fault before he can see that fault in another, but is this in line with good reason and sound common sense? Must a physician have a disease before he can diagnose a like case? Must one be first an

idiot before he can recognize the lack of intellect in another? No. Every effort which aims at human advancement cries out against such a view. Knowledge, no less than Faith, may be the result of something besides individual experience.

And then comes the Power to work out our own salvation through our Knowledge and our Faith: the Power to work in harmony with the unchangeable laws of God; the Power to help our brother to stem the currents of doubt and discord and despair and to assist him in his struggle for light and truth. How may we do this? By letting him alone to gain his goal through experience and consequent suffering? Did the Christ follow this plan? Rather, we should be not only ready but able to help where help will aid and uplift, to be the Good Samaritan who gives of himself wherever opportunity offers.

"Take therefore no anxious thought for the morrow," for we know of a surety that the things of tomorrow will be perfect for the purpose for which they are manifested even as we know that we may surely turn them to good account. "Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow," not by passive, negative means, but by positive effort. "For your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things." And the soul that knows and dares and does will be supplied with every needful thing.

The Gospel of Enoch The Christ of the Taurian Age

The Building of a Wonderful Underground Temple. The Symbolism of the Golden Lamp. The Twelve Granaries of Heaven.

Akashic Record Transcription.

CHAPTER V.

1 Now Enoch and Zaphara with their son Methusala went forth and in the land of Cain took up abode.

2 And underneath a mountain that the Cananites called "The Mount of God," they made a spacious hall, one hundred cubits wide, two hundred cubits long.

3 And Enoch brought the rarest metals and the choicest woods from every land with which he did enclose this hall, and he procured rich fabrics, for the curtains and choice skins for coverings.

4 And in the western end of this pavilion Enoch built a Sanctum, thirty cubits long, ten cubits high, which was ordained to be his trysting place with God.

5 This sanctuary square was the Sanctorum Sanctum, or the holiest place of all, the larger room was called the Sanctum or the Holy place.

6 Now, in the Sanctum Enoch placed a lamp of purest gold, the lamp had one great fountain for the oil, and from this one great fount, which symbolized the Fount of Endless Light, were seven stems;

7 And on each stem he placed a golden bowl, each bowl contained a burning wick.

- 8 These seven bowls were symbols of the seven spirits of the God of heaven who give unto the universe all the light that is:
- 9 And as the stems, each one rose from the one great fount of oil from which the bowls were all supplied, so every spirit of the Septonate arises from the one eternal Source.
- 10 God is the source of everything that is.
- 11 And Enoch said: This lamp is symbol of the solar world in which the race of man abides.
- 12 The Fount is symbol of the sun, the source of all the atma light that is; and as from out the central fountain seven stems arise, and on each stem a golden bowl of light—the seven moving stars.
- 13 There is no light in all the solar world but that which pours forth from the sun.
- 14 There is no light in all the realm of soul but that which pours forth from the soul of God, and is made manifest by the Elohim, the seven spirits of the One.
- 15 And in the Sanctum Enoch placed a table made of gold, on which were twelve metricious cakes, made from the choicest grains of earth; and they were made anew each day.

16 These were the food supply for those who minister before the Lord.

17 And Enoch said: There are twelve sources of the food supply of man; each cake is different from the other cakes, but all are made from out the substance of the earth.

18 But earth has nothing in herself to furnish food for man; the heavens feed the earth with bounteous hand.

19 There are twelve granaries in heaven, and in the circle of the sun these granaries are found, and from each one, (men call them constelations of the stars) a nutrient line goes forth to feed the earth that earth in turn may feed the man.

20 Behold the glorious symbolism of God!

21 And Enoch placed within the Sanctuary, just before the curtain to the west, another table made of gold; and on this table Enoch placed a golden vessel that contained a coal of fire that was taken from the altar of the living God,a coal that never lost its fire.

22 And from the choicest aromatic spices of the earth he made an incense to be burned upon this living coal; and they who ministered before the Lord must place upon this living coal a measure of this incense every day.

23 And Enoch said: The coal is from the heavens; the incense from the earth. The fire burns; the incense is consumed and

seems to be destroyed.

24 The fire is part of God, and when it burns it takes the holy incense to itself; it folds it up and carries it aloft to God.

25 And this is all symbolical.

The incense is the choicest spices of the man; his aspirations and desires; his prayers, his sacrifice. which he brings forth and lavs upon the living coal of God.

26 The coal transmutes this best that man can give and carries it aloft to God, and it becomes a garnered wealth that cannot per-

ish or be lost.

Pisces People and the River Styx. Remarkable Characteristics of a Remarkable Sign of the Zodiac.

This is the Zodiacal sign of understanding; it is the feet of the Grand Man of the heavens, and at this place in the Circle of the Sun the feet touch and press hard against the head. It is a dual sign and is recognized as the sign of antagonisms. Its symbol is two fishes tied together, back to back, each trying to get away from the other. Ancient Persians believed that these fishes represented their two gods—Good and Evil-who are forever contending, seemingly desirous of getting away from one another. Modern esoteric astrologers, ever trying to put the most pleasing construction on everything, assert that united fishes mean, "United in one common bond of faith and love." They are united, 'tis true, but like many married couples they seem to be making frantic efforts to be disunited.

A Watery Sign. By this description Pisces is astrologically known, and it represents all fluids, but especially it signifies a river, and according to ancient thought this is the mythical river Styx, over which Charon, or Satan carries all departed souls to the blessed shores of Ra, the land of the Rising Sun, the Kingdom of the Blessed.

The story of this wonderful myth is told by the seasons of the year. In Capricorn, the winter of the year, and of mortal life, death

gathers in his harvest. In Aquarius the dead are buried and calmly rest under the white shroud of snow. In Pisces the mystic river is encountered and Charon brings his ferryboat unto the citadels of death, and one by one takes the silent sleepers across until his ferry impinges upon the shores of the morning sun, and Aries calls aloud and the death bands are broken, Life springs as if by enchantment from all the crevices of nature, Spring comes on, and the resurrection is a fact.

The Fish a Christian Symbol. In the early Christian church a fish was the secret symbol of the masters. Didron, a celebrated French Archaeologist, who flourished in the beginning of the last century, wrote:

"The fish in the opinion of antiquarians in general, is the symbol of Jesus Christ. A fish is sculptored upon a number of Christian monuments, and more particularly upon the ancient sarcophagi. It is seen upon its medals bearing the name of our Savior, and also upon engraved stones, cameos and intaglios. The fish is also to be remarked upon the amulets worn suspended from the neck bychildren and upon anglasses and sculptored cient lamps. Baptismal founts are more particularly ornamented with the fish. The fish is constantly exhibited placed upon a dish in the middle of the table, at the Last supper, among the loaves, knives and cups used at the banquet."

St. Clement of Alexandria wrote:

"Let the dove and the fish, the vessel flying before the breath of the wind, the harmonious lyre used by Polycrates, and the marine anchor sculptored by Selucus, be signs unto you."

Turtullian wrote:
"We are little fishes in Christ our great fish."

Pisces was considered a Malignant Sign. Ancient astrologers believed Pisces to be the most malignant of the signs. It indicated violence and death.

Wilkinson is authority for the statement that both Egyptians and the Syrians, because of this malignancy, abhorred fish eating, save on the anniversary of some great catastrophy, when it was their custom to broil and eat a fish in great haste out of doors. In ancient times the malignancy of Pisces was considered so great that watchmen were constantly employed to watch the heavens and announce the approach of the stars of disaster and the stars of The principal employment of ancient priests was to They were all watch and tell. astronomers and dwelt in observatories.

The Pueblo Indians still adhere to the ancient custom and keep watchmen constantly on the alert on the ramparts of their stone dwellings and safe retreats to tell of the night, "What its sign of promise are," and there is great rejoicing when the stars of promise shine clearly above them. A Mystic Symbol. The fish is one of the most wonderful symbols of any age, and he who understands its meaning esoterically has revealed to him the secret of baptism. In the Roman Catholic church the little urn that holds the Holy waters, is a vestibule for Piscina, the fish water.

The Ages. In 2123 B. C. the Vernal Equinox was in the first point of Aries; Melchizedec came to earth as the Christ, and the Arian Age began. About the beginning of the so-called Christian era the Vernal Equinox entered the first point of Pisces; Jesus came to earth as the Christ, and the Piscean Age began. The Vernal Equinox has just now entered the first point of Aquarius and the Aquarian Age has begun.

Practical Aspect of Pisces. Pisces is the sign of life's failures. as well as of grand possibilities. It is the sign of great conflicts represented by the two fish tied together, each one trying to go in a different direction. While conflicts are tremendous, these but make more bright the souls that overcome, and some of the greatest of earth are children of this sign, among whom we may mention our own great poet Longfellow, who was born February 27: Mrs. Browning who was born March 6; Grover Cleveland. March 18.

A Psychic Sign. Yes Pisces is one of the most psychic signs of the Zodiac, so much so that it has been called the "Mother sign of Spiritualism," for there are more mediums born under this sign than all the other signs combined, and these people are so mediumistic that they often fail to recog-

nize themselves from other people. You who believe in obsession, or that wicked spirits do take possession of human bodies, will and in the natives of this sign a marvelous field for study and research for many of the people who are obsessed are Pisceans.

They are most easily influenced by the magnetism of strong people, and are liable to take the ailments of others. Above all others these natives should become efficient in the methods of making themselves magnetic proof, so that others cannot get possession of their wills and their bodies. Kellogg, of Battle Creek, Mich., lecturing on "The New Hygiene vs. Race Suicide," declared the human race is degenerating, and said chronic diseases are twice as prevalent now as they were thirty years ago. He deplored the great attention being paid to the raising of all sorts of live stock and to the advancement of science and discovery, while not a cent is being expended to find out why half of the babies born die before they are 7 years old. His remedy is to return to the simple life, living in and breathing the open air, working hard every day, consuming natural food and wearing sensible clothing. He holds meat-flesh foods of any sort-is the most unnatural food possible to man, and only acts as a poison to the body tissues. Four other vital poisons he enumerated as tobacco, coffee, tea and The lecturer said his favorite articles of diet are rice and buttermilk. He does not approve of many clothes, but he added that some clothes of the right sort are necessary.

Abdomen and Spine Exercises

It is actually weakness and disuse of the muscles of these parts that leads to the vast majority of all our ills (says "Good Health," England). Inactivity leads to sluggishness and congestion of the blood, which normally flows freely through these vital centres. All exercises which cause deepened respiration

or breathing beneficially effect the internal organs, as do also, even more definitely, all movements which bend, extend, and twist the trunk in various directions. bending, the vertebrae of the spine are moved and alternately stretched apart and forced together again, preventing adhesions, which lead to grave spinal disorders. Such exercises also lead to pressure upon or massage to the organs lying within the pelvis, producing a healthy flow of blood to these important centres. An increased flow of blood always leads to a healthier working of a part.

The Viscountess Muriel Helmsley has organized a movement to preach the gospel of health throughout Great Britain and the Empire. Many distinguished men and women and noted physicians have joined the association. Caravans with lecturers and moving pictures are to traverse every part of the country. From the car lectures and demonstrations on health will be given, illustrated by biographic pictures. The following are the Viscountess' Ten Health Commandments:

1. Keep windows open day and night.

2. Do not spit.

3. Breathe through the nose by keeping the mouth shut.

4. Drink pure water.

5. Eat slowly; take well cooked meals; cultivate regular habits.

6. Wear loose clothing of seasonable materials.

7. Take regular open-air exercise in sunshine, if possible.

8. Wash the whole body at least once a week.

9. Work, but do not worry.

10. Get house drains certified

by sanitary authority.

"This is essentially a woman's movement," says Miss R. V. Gill, the secretary. "We want to deal with the health question at its very foundation, and so we are going to teach the mothers of England how to rear and nurture their children that they may become strong and healthy citizens."

There are many similar movements in America confined to local work. It would seem as though a national movement might find abundant support if rightly presented.

The law of our evolution has put us in possession of certain powers and opportunities, and our further development depends on our doing just what these powers and opportunities make it possible for us to do, here and now. The Conquest of Self

One of a Course of Practical Lessons Given by Dr. Dowling in the Aquarian School of the Councilors.

In Lesson 2 of this course on The Pathway to Power we made a study of the Selfs—the two selfs, the higher or soul self, and the lower or sense self. We noted in brief the manner in which the higher self—the individuality, could be strengthened and, in a general way, all the other lessons of this course have been devoted to the conquest of the lower self; but this lesson is specifically for the study of the sense self, known in our outline as

The Army Corps of Selfishness.

The Century dictionary defines the word selfish thus: "Caring only for self; influenced solely or chiefly by motives of personal or private pleasure or ad-

vantage."

The words selfishness and selflove are frequently used interchangeably as though they meant one and the same thing while in fact they differ materially. Whately, one of the best thinkers of the last century, said: "The mention of selfishness leads me to remind you not to confound that with self-love, which is quite a different thing. Self-love is a rational, deliberate desire for our own welfare, and for anything that will be likely to promote it. Selfishness, on the other hand, consists not in the indulging in this or that propensity, but in disregarding, for the sake of any personal gratification or advantage, the rights or feelings of other men"—Moral and Christian Evidences.

Crime is usually the result of selfishness, the determination to satisfy one's desires regardless of the rights of other people. Herbert Spencer in "Social Statics" says: "Were we not selfish, legislative restraint would be unnecessary." Some great thinkers believe that man cannot and should not eliminate selfishness from their lives. Leckey in his remarkable book, "European Morals," says: "The extinction of all selfish feeling is impossible for an individual, and if it were general, it would result in the dissolution of society." Mr. Leckey belongs to a class of philosophers who believe in what is known as the Selfish Theory of Morals-the theory "that man is capable of acting only from calculations of what will give him the greatest pleasure."

Self Improvement Is Not Selfishness. It is man's indispensible duty-a duty which he owes to the world, to develop and beautify his person, and unfold his soul qualities. The human race is made up of as many parts as there are personalities, and each personality has a prime obligation to all other personalities, and that is to bring himself up to the highest degree of perfection. Mark, it is not selfishness to do this unless in so doing one encroaches upon the rights of others, or fails to give all possible help to others in their efforts to develop their personality, and unfold their individuality.

The Master's Law touching these matters is clear and concise: "There is no culture that is permanent unless it is universal in its effects." In other words, whatever is beneficial to a person is helpful to other persons. An ancient aphorism reads thus: "If thou would feed thyself and make thyself a man of strength in world of sense and super-sense thou must behold thyself as part of every self, and every self a part of thee."

With these suggestions all in mind we are ready for the true work of discrimination to distinguish the real from the unreal, the true from the false, the higher self from the lower self and know the foe that must be met, and are prepared to give the countersign and to advance.

The Conquest of the Lower Self Is the Result of the Unfoldment of the Higher Self. The first step in this eternal conquest is the non-recognition of any sort of an enemy. In Fancy's shop men may create a mythical foe. and in due time that foe becomes alive, and assumes all the horrid proportions of a real antagonist. A fear of a foe is pretty sure to materialize one. The work of the hour is, then, to concentrate all attention upon spiritual advancement and proceed to the work of unfolding soul qualities. other master aphorism is in place: "While the heart is filled with good there is no room for amy foe."

Man's Monitors are two question marks; one is before and one

is behind. One is a leader, the other is a prober. One asks: Do my life and my professions agree? Am I living up to the best light that I have: Is my soul saturated with the one desire to be just, to love mercy and to unfold in the light of God as does the rose in the light of the sun?

The prober asks: Am I curtailing any one's happiness? Am I intringing upon anybody's rights? Has any word, thought, or act of mine made anybody sad, cast even a shadow across the way of any creature of the Infinite One? These are magnificent self examination questions. They are put to every advancing soul a hundred times a day by the sweet voice of Inner consciousness, and happy is the man who profits by their suggestions.

Scrutiny of Selfishness. In the events of every day life it may not be always easy to tell just where personal duty ends and selfishness begins. These questions are on the lips of thousands of God's noble men and noble women every day: Is it selfishness when I protect my person and my family from physical harm when attacked by a ruffian or highwayman? Is it selfishness for me to protect my property rights and good name by physical force or by appealing to the so-called courts of justice?

Again, this picture is painted by artist Fancy: If my child or my wife with many other people are in imminent danger, in some great peril, is it selfishness for me to pass by other imperiled people to find my own? Is it selfishness for me to feed and clothe my children well, while others are? starving or dying from exposure in the squalid slums and byways

of the city?

Self Protection Is Not Selfishness. Unless one, by encroaching on the rights of others jeopardizes his own safety, he is not violating the rights of others by defending himself or his property interests. Mark, we are now considering the conquest of selfishness and not the conquest of emotion, which will be studied in subsequent lessons. Self-protection is a prime requirement of physical existence, and must be recognized as within the domain of righteousness until the flesh itself has been conquered and transmutation is established.

Providing for One's Own in preference to others is not selfishness. God has given to certain people certain charges and the care for these is of paramount importance and the All-Father-Mother will not hold any guiltless who is recreant to his sacred trust.

The righteousness of the law of non-resistance has nothing to do with the conquest of selfishness; but this has its place in the studies of this course, and will be considered in succeeding lessons.

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
