#### HOW SHALL I CURE MYSELF.

A Practical Course of Lessons in the Art and Science of Self-Healing.

#### LESSON I.

Our subject is Self-Healing. You want to heal Yourself. You are the one that is to be healed and the one that does the healing. In order to do this intelligently you want to know just who and what it is that needs the healing, as well as who and what it is that does it. And in order to find that out you must study and analyze yourself. You must know what you are and what it is that constitutes the Self, or Ego. We will therefore proceed to take an inventory of the stock on hand, and I can promise you that if this is the first study of yourself, you will find yourself a more interesting subject than you ever imagined.

First, then, you have a body. Most likely it is your body that is sick and needs the healing. But that is not your whole self. When we were children we used to think it was. What a marvel even this body is. The Psalmist exclaims, "Man is fearfully and wonderfully made," but I believe that the wise king did not think of his body alone when he said that. Let us in imagination look at a new born child. There it lays, weak, helpless and ignorant. The physical organs and functions are there with one exception,

perhaps. Although it has a brain, it has no intelligence. If the brain were the mind, then this little bit of humanity ought to be able to reason from the

very first, just as it is able to breathe or digest,

I said that the child had no intelligence. Is this true? To be sure it is as yet unable to reason on what goes on in the new world into which it has been ushered, but there are indications that it possesses a most marvellous intelligence of another kind. There is the inlelligence which enables this small organism to breathe. It knows how to extract the milk from the mother's breast. With almost unerring accuracy it forces the fluid down into its stomach. It knows just how to manufacture the gastric juices which are to help in the process of digesting the food. It knows how to extract from the digested food the very particles which it needs for the maintenance and nourishment of the body. And so we might go on into fuller detail and show that there is resident in this little body an intelligence which is even more marvelous and accurate than the reasoning intelligence which it develops later. For while even the best developed reason makes mistakes, this primitive intelligence never makes any unless it is interferred with from without and hampered in the manifestation of its wonderful knowledge. All the various functions are performed with the utmost regularity and precision. Who taught it all its wonderful knowing? We shall leave this question unanswered, and maybe we shall get a hint or two later on that will help to answer it. Enough for us now to know that it is there. You brought it with you when you were born and it has stayed with you ever since. It is as much a part of you as your other inielligence by which you are enabled to add or multiply numbers. It carries on the functions of your body night and day. It never goes to sleep.

But this innate or primitive intelligence does other

things. Here is Blind Tom, an idiot in whom this other intelligence has been developed but very little. He plays correctly every piece of music which he once hears. He is unable to reason much consciously on the notes he hears, their length, their pitch, their orderly succession and harmonious or melodic relationship. But this primitive intelligence knows all about it. It also knows all about mathematics, as is evidenced by the numerous mathematical child prodigies which have astonished the world. Zera Colburn is perhaps the most widely known example. friends of the parents of this wonderful child suggested that his ability to handle numbers could be improved by giving him into the training of the best professors in mathematics, but the contrary was the result, for as his other reason developed more and more, his primitive reason became more obscure, or more correctly speaking, it ceased to manifest in the old way.

You have heard of people having forebodings or prophetic dreams which come true. You have seen or heard trance speakers. I have known one ignorant peasant girl who gave forth some of the most sublime poetry while she was entranced, that is, while her conscious reason was not active. And right here let me tell you that you must not understand me as implying that this primitive reason is not also a conscious reason, but it reasons on a different plane of consciousness than the ordinary waking consciousness. In order to be understood, I will hereafter call the ordinary plane of consciousness the conscious plane, and the primitive one the subconscious. Some call these two planes the objective and subjective. I am fully aware that all these terms have their imperfections and limitations, but any others we might use would not be without their defects.

The subconscious reason is that which the child brings with it to this earth. "And God breathed into man a living soul." He does this yet with every child that is born. God's Breath and Spirit are one and the same thing. "He made man in His own image and likeness," surely not as to body, but as to Spirit. Do you now wonder why this primitive knowledge is so exact and true? At the present time we will not follow out this line of thought, but I advise you to think of it, the oftener and harder the better, for if you follow the clue given you will come to know yourself better, and also God.

The conscious or objective reason is an aftergrowth. It also is latent in the child as music is latent in the piano. Its instrument, the brain, is built already before it awakens. The primitive or subconscious reason that knows so well how to carry on all the functions of the body, that knows how to add to it and preserve it, this it was which with the help of the subconscious intelligence of the mother built its own future habitation. Before a house can be constructed there must be the intelligence that hnows just how it is going to be built. And the soul knows how to build its temple. It knows how to run the body which in more than one sense is a "machine," and why should it not know how to build it? You may say that the mother fashions the body of the child. Then tell me the hour or minute when the human soul takes possession of its body? You cannot. I know full well that some of our learned physicians try to tell when life enters the foetus, and have justified the destruction of the foetus before that time by saying that it was not yet living. Away with these sophistries and learn, ye child murderers, that wherever there is growth there is life, and the life is in the organism which it builds for itself. And you, poor, blind woman, who thinks it is a burden to bear children, and would be rid of the growing germ, know that if it is murder to kill the man after the body is finished, it is also murder to kill the beginnings of that body when once the forces are at work.

The conscious or objective reason is developed in response to the needs on the objective plane. the player sits at the piano, he touches this and that key, or many at the same time. Each gives forth a sound and all those which belong to one piece go to make up a tone picture. So ever since you can remember has the world without your body played upon you. and every touch has produced a sensation. These sensations you learned to interpret and they became perceptions. The perceptions were translated into thoughts, and your thoughts form the picture of your life. Everyone is painting his life picture. And there are the dark and the light colors, the lights and shades. the sorrows and pleasures, the joys and pains, the high notes of aspiration and the low notes of passion. Some life pictures are brighter than others, and some are more finished. Others seem crude, perhaps. But as the artist existed before the painting began, so will he exist when he ceases or seems to cease painting this earth-life picture. The next picture will be all the better for the mistakes made in this one. Experience brings wisdom, and wisdom means greater power to live and work.

The physical senses are the avenues through which the sensations reach the ordinary consciousness, which might be called the sense-consciousness, because it is awakened and brought into activity through the impressions received through the senses. When the child first opens its eyes to the light it gets the vibrations of light, but it is as yet unable to reason upon them or interpret them. But it loves the light, and soon it will begin to distinguish the objects around it. Knowledge comes through the exercise of the reasoning faculties, which are stimulated by the vari-

ous sense impressions.

It is the mind which sees, and not the eye. The eye merely communicates to the mind certain rates of vibration, and so do the other senses. The horse sees a sack or piece of paper and takes fright. The eyes communicate to its mind certain vibrations which the

latter fails to interpret correctly.

But all the various impressions we receive, the thoughts which we think, and the experiences which we pass through, become the property of the primitive reason, the subconscious mind, or let us say, the Soul. If they are interpreted wrongly then they are out of harmony with the primitive knowledge, which is always in harmony with nature. Suppose the child is taught that 2 and 2 is 6, or that it arrives at this conclusion by a false process of reasoning. The primitive knowledge being in harmony with nature knows that 2 and 2 is 4, and so there is a discord between the objective and subjective planes of consciousness.

Experiments in hypnotism, as well as other facts in psychic science demonstrate that on the subconscious plane the soul reasons deductively and synthetically. It is on the conscious plane alone that it reasons inductively and analytically. It is on the latter plane only that the soul questions and analyzes. Here it is positive, while on the subconscious plane it is negative. Therefore it accepts passively the dictum of the objective reason. If that says 2 and 2 are 6, then the soul takes it to be 6. And it will labor under that delusion until the truth is accepted some day and it is

freed from the falsehood.

The beliefs which you hold control you. If you think it is right to rest on Sundays, you will rest unless a stronger motive forces you to work. But you will not feel just right over it. You will feel uneasy, and this may manifest in remorse, anger, hate, fear, etc., according to the nature of the compelling power and your disposition. This again may lead to nervousness, dyspepsia, headache, or other physical disturbances. In this one simple illustration you will see how our beliefs or convictions inevitably influence our physical conditions. Thought, then, is a power

for good or evil, which I shall demonstrate more clearly

in my next lesson.

I have seen branches sawed off from trees, and after a few years the cuts were overgrown with bark. What caused the bark to grow? Was it not the life (or say the intelligence) resident in the tree that tried to heal the wound inflicted on the tree? Most decidedly it was. And so when you cut your finger the intelligent life forces within you will send greater quantities of blood through that cut. By and by there are deposited so many particles of new material that the blood ceases to flow and the wound begins to heal. It is the same in the case of internal disease or disturbance. The intelligent life forces know just how to act, and if the disturbance is not too great and you make yourself quiet and passive, the life within you will bring about a cure. This tendency to remedy all infringements on the established order and to heal wounds or disease is a universal function of all life. It is exercised spontaneously in answer to the need. and in the vegetable as well as the animal kingdom nature strikes a balance with precision.

But we have seen that the primitive knowledge in man becomes more or less adulterated through the false interpretation of the objective reasoning faculties which the subconscious mind accepts, and so that universal tendency to restore the harmony when lost is often interfered with. The inner knowledge controls the forces which keep your body well, and if that becomes adulterated by false beliefs, then there will be discords and inharmony in the manifestation of these forces. There is nothing truer than this. Jesus said, "According to thy faith so shall it be done unto you,"and Job of old exclaimed, "What I have feared has come upon me." This plainly shows that this law of mental causation was recognized before this day. I have seen a drop of cold water produce a blister on the hand of one who was hypnotized, simply because the hypnotist told the subject the water was hot and would blister his hand. Now it is evident that the hypnotist could not by any power of his produce this blister, nor did the water, because it was cold. What then called that blister into life against all known laws of physics. It was the life within the subject which did The objective reason was inactive in the hypnotic conditon and the subconscious mind passively accepted the falsehood enunciated by the hypnotist. another instance I have seen a circle of blisters produced on the hand of another subject by the edge of a silver dollar because the hypnotist told the subject that the dollar was hot. He did not tell this one that it would produce these blisters, but the subconscious mind of the boy accepted this statement as true and manifested the blisters, mind you, created them according to its inherent belief that hot substances upon coming in contact with the flesh must produce blisters. On the other hand, there are recorded in sacred and profane history many instances where people in moments of exaltation have defied the flames or the heat and passed through unharmed. These facts, which might be multiplied ad infinitum, will give you enough to think upon for awhile.

We know well enough that the limited understanding of man has conceived many errors and falsehoods which have been handed down to us in the race beliefs. They are in the air as it were. We drink them in with the mother's milk. We learn them in school, and, yes, some of them in church. They are to be found in books and in the art creations of the race. In consequence we have inharmonious social, industrial and political conditions. Much of the helplessness, poverty and sickness is caused by these false

beliefs.

"For say a foolish thing but oft enough,
(And here's the secret of a hundred creeds,
Men get opinions as boys learn to spell,

By reiteration chiefly) the same thing Shall pass at last for absolutely wise, And not with fools exclusively."

We all have heard of the liar who repeated his lies so often that he finally came to believe them true. Such is the force of repetition. Some of our diseases are the direct result of our misguided thoughts and emotions, fears, worries, etc. These can be cured by giving the mind repeated counter-suggestions. Other diseases which have an external or physical cause may also be cured by this method of Self or Autosuggestion. You must remember that your internal forces are directed by your subconscious mind, and this may be influenced by the conscious mind through the thoughts and suggestions which come through it. If you are sick, you should this very day commence a line of Auto-suggestions which give a different coloring to your mental activities, and so a different bend to the activities of your life forces. I advise a repeated reading daily of the following healing affirmations. If you are very sick, you should read them or have them read aloud to you many times a day and then think much about them for the rest of the time. You may neither understand nor believe all you repeat, but that need not concern you now. You will get the explanation later. Now you want to get well even if you do not understand the method. But I assure you that these healing suggestions are very serious and contain no lies, as you will understand after the study of subsequent lessons. I want to introduce you into the mysteries of the science of selfhealing by easy stages, and gradually unfold higher truths as we go on. In this lesson we have only reached the lower rung of the ladder that is to lead you upward and out of your present condition. And those who already have a fair understanding of the subject must not get impatient and think that they did not need this first lesson. If you do not need it, others do, and I love you all. Learn to cultivate patience, it is one of the paths that lead to peace. There is no need to hurry through life. Try to think and feel sometimes that you have all eternity before you and the issues of your life are watched over by Eurnal and Infinite Love. Peace; God is Love and not Hate. He is a father and not a jailer. The more you learn to know Him, the more you will loose your fears and love Him with a love hitherto perhaps never known. Perfect love knows no fear.

I see not any road of perfect peace which a man can walk, but to take counsel of his own bosom. - Emerson,

It is so customary for men to rely upon precedent in the matter of collective and individual welfare, and this, too, in the face of the fact that no two occurrences are in every detail purely identical, whether in the matter of cause or in the ultimatum of effect. And owing to this condition we find individuals who are continually seeking advice upon every incident in their daily lives, apparently in the hope of finding someone able to solve their problems of life for them.

This is true of the majority of the race and is, in a large sense, accountable for the mediocrity characteristic of the multitude. It does not apply to the minority, the apparently "favored few," who become prominent in history as statesmen and humanitarians, or as fabulous producers of wealth, or as master artists and inventors.

If men would but turn to nature and study her workings they would soon discover that precedents are the exception and not the rule. No two leaves upon the same tree, no two seeds in the same pod, no two grains of sand are exactly alike, only approximately so. Now, while this applies to the various natural kingdoms, it applies equally well to the social and other conditions obtaining among mankind as an individual in particular and as a race in general. Brown asks Smith what he (Brown) shall do under certain conditions, seemingly forgetful of the fact that Smith is not of the same constitutional temperament and must perforce view the situation from a different perpersonal angle, and that what might appear just and right in the eyes of Smith would lack in equity in the eyes of Jones and Green; also forgetting that his (Brown's) preconceived opinious must to a degree. run counter to the opinions of his adviser, thereby producing vibrations of inharmony and uncertainty to which are traceable the failures that are made by the many.

Indecision begets vacillation and vacillation fosters defeat. Whole volumes have been written upon how to grow wealthy, and between a parsimonious Franklinism upon the one hand, and a set code of laborious activity upon the other, they have brought only negative results to their various adherents. What is one man's nourishment in the way of food has often but

little alimentary value to another, so that from the foregoing we must necessarily infer there can be no code formulated upon any matter which will fit the

exigencies of everyone.

But inasmuch as some men do achieve success in their undertakings and stamp their individuality upon the results of their operations, it must necessarily follow that there is a way by which they have arrived at their goal, and that this may be approximately ascertained.

Emerson, whom I have quoted at the beginning of this article, gives us a clue to follow in the expression there given. That he himself was profoundly impressed with this idea is voiced in another of his essays, in which he tersely says, "Trust the instinct to the end, though you can render no reason." We have here not a following of precedent, neither is there a seeking of advice, but rather the indication of a self-contained faculty which in its workings is productive of that which transcends all advice from any source outside of the individual.

Man is, and has been, so prone to overlook himself in his pursuits that he almost forgets that he has a being all his own. He has been and is the victim of a belief which relegates to others the thinking which is most vital to himself, and which, if duly indulged for himself, must inevitably result in discoveries at once his savior and his friend.

It would seem that the policy of the majority of mankind has been how not to know. Of course our civilization has given rise to schools and institutions of learning of all kinds, but these have been almost wholly in support of the ill fated idea which has so much contributed to his defeat. They have given him anatomical and mental measurements of himself, but for some cause have overlooked or given a minor position to the facultiy best adapted to his success and independence as an individual.

Now and then, however, a Lincoln or an Edison will discover the truth regarding himself in spite of current and recognized methods, and he is placed high upon the page of history and is regarded as "a light

to the world and a salt to the earth."

What is true of Lincoln and of Edison is true of every other same soul in the world. Latent in everyone in whom it does not find expression is a faculty. which, if cultivated, will prove to each and all a source of unfailing good and the mainspring of unalloyed success.

#### HOW SHALL I CURE MYSELF.

A Practical Course of Lessons in the Art and Science of Self-Healing.

#### II .- THE MIGHT OF SUGGESTION.

Not long since I witnessed the following incident. A little girl had been ill for somedays and the mother called in a physician. He had prescribed some medicines which the mother got at the drug store. One bottle contained a very bitter composition. When the mother asked the child to take a dose it consented willingly, but no sooner had the medicine touched its tongue when it began to choke, spit and cry. It had swallowed very little and the mother tried to induce it to take some more. The child refused. Then the mother became angry and impatient. "I shall whip you," she cried, "if you do not take it." The child became frightened and obeyed, but I could see that to its physical discomfort had been added mental disquiet. Now let us analyze this matter a little. The child took the medicine the first time because it had no data on which to reason on the possible consequences which might follow. It simply obeyed its mother's command blindly without reasoning. When it was asked to take the second dose it was acquainted with one quality of the drug, its bitter taste, and both the

instinct of self-preservation which prompts us to avoid a repetition of unpleasant experiences, as well as its infantile reason prompted the child to refuse. It had exercised its reason a little and so arrived at a definite conclusion. This was not to take any more of that medicine. But the mother threatened, and fear of punishment outweighed its dread of the bad taste. It obeyed while it sacrificed its own will in the matter. If this process of cowing the child into submission instead of gaining its submission by force of reason is continued, the result will most likely be a grown-up woman without either force of character, reason or will. The blind acceptance of the dictum, commands or conclusions of others paralyzes our own wills and weakens our reasoning faculties. This is the case, alas, with so many children. Parents do not think it necessary to explain to their children the why and wherefore of their commands. Instead of reasoning with them, they find it much easier to punish or threaten punishment. The process is continued to a greater or less extent in our public schools, colleges, churches etc., and we need not wonder why we have so many credulous, weak-minded and weak-willed people in the world. "Thus saith the Lord," or authority so-andso says so, is taken to be sufficient. This is the reason why so many people are found in dependent positions, and why so many children of "good" parents succumb to temptations of all sorts. With poorly developed reasoning faculties and crippled wills, how shall they master the obstacles which they meet or the temptations which beset them? The very faculties which would make them masters over themselves and others have been left undeveloped, or worse, crushed.

Our common school system is as yet too much a cramming system. It is a constant accumulation of the thoughts, opinions and conclusions of others. Man's god-like reason can be developed only through its untrammeled exercise, free from fear or the worship

of authorities. Then only will its native strength and penetration become active, and man become the mas-

ter of his own and nature's forces.

Now, my dear brother and sister, I am not merely speaking of our neighbor but this matter concerns you and me. We all have gone through this common school of the crushing of our faculties. It is only a matter of degree with each of us. You have been taught that your trouble was an entity or force which was stronger than you, stronger than the forces resident in your soul. You have accepted this suggestion as an ultimatum, and according to your faith, so was it with you. Now, suppose that you rebel against the tyranny of all and every adverse suggestion which holds the sublime forces of your soul locked up unused? pose you shake off this fear of your trouble and rise up in the majesty of your God-given power and say "I will be a slave no longer; I will be a master and free." Suppose you think, say and feel this, what a change there would be! An electrifying and invigorating thrill would pass through your whole being which would cause a revolution.

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
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
