

BEAST VERSUS MAN.

(Part II.)

The Medical Section of the American Life Insurance Association has given out what it calls its "ten laws of Heredity." Here we have not theories but results from the study of cold facts.

It is worth while to append here the most of them for future reference, for they are wonderfully corroborative of the positions NOW has taken in this regard. All Science is Science of the Mind. All physics, including medicine, must sooner, or later, array itself beside our Mental Science. We can wait! Please notice the fact that we do not inherit disease but we do inherit "a TENDENCY!" This tendency is a lack of power to withstand. It is Nature's law of Selection which from ameboe up to Man lets the weak die, that a stronger generation may succeed.

As to health it was decided that heredity is an important element in longevity, though only a few diseases are inherited. The tendency to disease is, however, often handed down from parents to children. The following ten laws of heredity were acknowledged to be correct:

The child tends to inherit every attribute of parents.

Contradictory attributes cannot be inherited from both parents.

The child may inherit the attributes of either parent solely.

It may inherit the father's attributes for one period of existence, and of the mother's for another.

Some attributes have the quality of prepotency,, or the tendency to push aside or overrule other attributes.

Attributes which are similar in both parents tend to become prepotent, giving rise to convergent or cumulative heredity.

Attributes may be transmitted in latent form from one generation to another, in a third or fourth, or in still more remote generations, a phenomenon termed revision. Attributes tend to appear in the progeny

Attributes of the father tend to be inherited by the sons, and of the mother by the daught-

Heredity plays an important part not only in tuberculosis and cancerous affection, but likewise in diabetes, rheumatism, gout and many other diseases.

We do not inherit tuberculosis, but we do inherit a lessened vitality, or a tendency to contract tuberculosis infection.

Underweights are usually people who have inherited such a lessened vitality, and they run the further risk of infection from their underweight brothers or sisters who are apt to be infected.

The Affirmation—I AM WILL. is the most tremendous assertion in all the Universe of Mind. Men are divided into those who are WILL and those who are only partially Will.

The whole Human effort of the One is to develope Man as WILL. The tendency of Nature is to let those who are not developed as WILL die off. tendency to any form of weakness in the child arises from lack of manifesting

as Will in parent.

Nature's way of selecting the strong and leaving the weak to die is counteracted in society, in civilization. chooses the weak and lets the strong carry the burdens of an impedimenta that no army would carry, and thus destroys its strong, in protecting and keeping alive a lot of useless material, in the form of men and women who are not WILL enough to rightly live.

I know I shock the sensibilities of many when I say this, but I am not writing poetry, but scientific philosophy. Our charity, our philanthropy, our sympathy, our medical fraternity, our sanitary measures, are all tending to weaken the race, to destroy its possibility of perpet-We by protecting the nating itself. weak as well and receiving their progeny are helping along the conditions which

under the early Nile Valley nations Greece and Rome, and still more ancient nations, and under which modern nations are going out of existence. It was not the physical superiority of the Goths, the Huns and the Vandals that enabled them to destroy civilized Europe, but their barbarian Will and the enervated men and women of civilization AS WILL. This enervation previously almost destroyed them and then barbarians completed the task.

From cradle to grave we are doing too much for children, and too much in helping adults; keeping them in childhood unfollment, by making conditions easy for them. We are keeping alive weak children, to perpetuate weak wills, in their offspring. We are prolonging the lives of weak men and women, and they are breeding, not physical weakness, but weakness as WILL. We feed thousands, whom nature would not allow to live, and they beget like weak Thousands of these fed are betwills. ter physically than are those by whom they are fed. There is one thing to look for; one thing to cultivate; one thing to educate; and that is MAN AS WILL. The one constant assertion for parent, teacher, philanthropist, reform-cr, legislator and priest to affirm—YOU CAN. No matter where you LIFE IN YOU IS INFINITE. You are also able to direct that power. Now WILL. If you WILL not then let nature care for you. I heard Dr. Jordan in an address upon this Law in Society say virtually over twenty years ago of this impedimenta: "Let us with due considerations of sympathy, gently and lovingly let them down into the other side of life.

Look to the Individual power as MAN. measure him as WILL, and never mind I know the physical. that then the physical will be health, but not from physical, but from Mental cause.

As I am writing this paper comes a statement in the daily press of the amount of money needed for the State of California's expenses

the coming year.
The insane institutions need \$621,800. Blind institutions, \$172,000. Prisons and penal institutions, \$1,535760. Total \$2570,034.

How California compares with other states in proportion to population I do not know. Besides this there is a vast sum expended upon the sick. Every city has its public hospital and private hospitals sanitariums and the sick in private homes, from an immense burden not alone upon the taxpayer, but upon society that besides dollars must fur-nish keepers and officials for prisons and asylums, nurses and attendants for the sick in homes and hospitals.

When we come to true religion and honest responsibility and to the Ought of Duty, I feel that we should put it as a Man's first duty: To be well, and next—To be self-supporting at some necessary occupation. This will induce self-respect and self-reliance, the two needed and the only needed elements of

Manhood.

Where there any way of creeting a standard of Will, of Self Control, for the requirement for marriage, were it possible to check the reproduction of the unfit through law and regulation, I would ask for a Mental standard manifested in the ability to think and to from one's convictions of and Conscience. This means Will.

The Atlantic Monthly has recently published an article with this title by Jacob H. Holister. I quote a few paragraphs. NOW readers will remember an editorial in April, 1911, entitled "The Economic Problem of the Twentieth Century solved in the present New Thought movement in which I stated that "Enough is now produced to reed, clothe and house every person better than the average person is now fed, clothed and housed ir rightly distributed." That fact takes the question of want and poverty from the realm of economics and places it in the realm of ethics. It was a question or distribution, now it is a question of Righteousness and not of ability to 18 IT RIGHT? produce. the ONE ONLY QUESTION that can bring solution. One LAW will decide "WOULD I every question of Right. WISH IT DONE TO ME!"

We are deluged with over-legislation in all directions. Reforms of all kinds are

no reform. I wish my readers to note this fact—The only people who do more harm than bad people are good people. "Hell is paved with good intentions." All attempts to legislate GOODNESS into people—to make them moral by law—is to make conditions worse than they were before. All history teaches this. A wave of Social Hygiene is upon us. legislate. Vice is never cured by Law. Is not a subject for Law. The distinction between vice and crime is seeming-

that has failed ever since man began to

ly obliterated. Public opinion will sustain any law against real crime. It will not sustain a law against vice. Why?

Because there opinion is divided.

Simply because an act is not to my liking; is offensive to me; is degrading to me; is disgusting to me; is far below the ideal I set for myself; is not a reason why I should set the same standard for others. I must learn that it is not a crime unless it interferes with my right to act my convictions, and to live my life, or interferes with the liberty or life of those whom it is my (society's) duty to protect. When persons have reached legal years of manhood and womanhood, I have no more right to be a self-appointed guardian of them than they of me.

Till they commit some overt act against society or against me, I am to allow them the same right to act as I claim myself. To draw the line of personal responsibility for others is a most difficult thing. But this is sure,—the line of the evolution of government and civilization is more and more to keep the hands off the individual, and give more and more confidence to the Divinity in man.

"Is it right?" I will give one answer and you another. But when it is asked "Do you wish it so done to you?" there will be but one answer.

The "Golden Rule" is WORKABLE. I have tried it in school-room and in daily life. IT IS WORKABLE in legislation. "Pure food"? Do you, Mr. Grocer; do you, Mr. Manufacturer, wish to eat impure food? Then, why any special law? Why not say by legislature—No person shall sell or make that which he will not eat himself? Why not boil all legislation down to two words—BE JUST! Be Honest.

I shall have much to say on this line during the year. We must protect ourselves from the "Good" folk who would make us good.

Here are the extracts from Mr. Hollister's article. It begins at the beginning—Supply.

But the lesson of modern industrial history has been that an increase of one factor ordinarily compels a more efficient rearrangement of existing forces, and thus secures a larger product. So long as the supply of laborers augments in amount and in skill, so long as the motives operate that lead to the accumulation of capital by the foregoing of present for future satisaction, so long as the secret energies of nature continued to be unearthed and utilized, so long as captains of industry are evolved with gifted faculties of leadership-so long will the total product of industry increase in greater proportion than those whose wants it must supply. This is true even as to primary food. In the last fifteen years the population of the civilized world, excluding China, has been increasing at the rate of about one per cent a year, whereas the average annual increase in the five great cereals, wheat, corn, oats, rye, and barley, has been about 2.5 per cent. In other words production has increased two and a half times as much as was necessary to keep per-capita consumption constant.

If what is true of cereal food obtains with respect to economic goods in general—and this is convincing evidence that such is the case,—if the loaf in the aggregate is not only large enough to satisfy amply the hunger of

all who need be fed, but is actually increasing in size relative to the number of claimants,—the existence of poverty passes from a problem of economic production into one of economic distribution. There is apparently enough to sumce; the 'national dividend' is abundant and to spare, but the process of allotment seems to give not enough to many and, by interence, too much to some. The question immediately presents whether this chronic under-apportioning of the many is a necessary consequence of private property and competitive industry. Collectivism asserts that it is, and demands the socialization of all means of production. As against this, economic individualism magnities the service of laissez-taire, and maintains that poverty is the mere friction that attends industrial progress. The student of economic activities holds a median position. Reluctant to take a leap in the dark, yet profoundly moved by the compelling evidence of social dislocation, he seeks further light. In so far he reflects the hard-headed sanity of the thinking elements of the community, whose inarticulate creed is the noble declaration of John Stuart Mill, of two generations ago: 'If, therefore, the choice were to be made between Communism with all chances, and the present state of society with all its sufferings and in-. all the difficulties, great or

It represents a demand for the use of constructive thought in lieu of and as an antidote for destructive forces.

It represents a wider tolerance of individual belief.

It represents a growing appreciation of the power of the individual to control heredity and environment and to secure personal deliverance from fear and failure.

It represents a demand for a larger life among men, greater liberty for the individual, greater Solidarity for Society. It represents a growing appreciation of the meaning of life through a greater knowledge of the Unity of Life itself. It asks no sacrifices of conscientious belief, no sacrifice of honorable means, no sacrifice of worthy associations. It stands for voluntary contributions,

whether of service or money for all benefactions, recognizing that giving or withholding is a matter that rests with the individual conscience.
