We already have two rules for Success:

Organize Success in yourself.

2. Create intelligently your Ideal and

hold it persistently.

We now have the third: Build your Ideal with principle and not with details.

As the painter, sculptor, and architect build, so must each one build his life. These begin with the mastery of the Principles underlying their Art. Principle and Power are identical. It is not things that one wishes, but Power to build, possess, or direct things. Things have only a delegated power; that which we agree to give them. MAN is the creator of things. He only needs to know his power to have all things.

Since the Ideal materializes in the obobjective life, it is for us to make that in Ideal which we desire to have manifest. This can only be done by understanding ourself as a Center of Power in the One Infinite Power. Realizing this, I am to Affirm: Omnipotence is all about me! I am in Omnipotence! This Omnipotence flows into objective expression through me! Limitless is the possible Power that is at my command.

This reliance upon Omnipotence gives

birth to Self-Reliance which is the first personal element of Success. The first commandment of Soul Culture is . . . TRUST YOURSELF. There is absolutely nothing in which to trust besides Self.

He who would win in any sphere of activity must have absolute trust in himself. To rely upon any other thought is to rely upon nothing, and nothing produces nothing. and nothing are synonymous. Failure

To deal with Self is to deal with power. To trust Self is to trust Power. To rely upon Self is to rely upon Power. To rely on anything not Self is to rely upon nothing. Can nothing bring Success?

The second commandment of Soul Culture is . . . RELY UPON YOUR-SELF.

Its third commandment is . . ASSERT YOURSELF.

Affirm power in yourself. There can be no failure to him who so asserts and so relies. Helen Wilmans has this quatrain that is well worth remembering:

"He who dares assert the I,

May calmly wait

Meets his demand with sure supply."

Self assertion will bring sure supply in any desired direction. The first Affirmation of Success is born of this recognition of Power to do and to be. It is . . . I CAN!

I have the power to win success in any line I choose.

I rely only upon the power I am. In relying upon the power I am, I can do

anything! These Affirmations build into the Ideal

the consciousness of Power, the Power that you are,—Power which is controlled by the conscious Affirmation, and builds the objective life after the only pattern you have given it, namely: the Ideal. The Ideal is all that one needs to think of, for that, well or ill builded, takes care of itself, and will find its own manifestation. All one can do is to build in Thought, then the thought-form—the Ideal—will mani-

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fest. We have no control of the How, Where or When.

For success after the affirmation, I Can, this is the rule: Decide that Success IS yours, and pay no attention to time, place or manner in which it is to come. LET it come. Remember that just as sure as water runs down hill when barriers are removed, as sure as gravity, is the Ideal in its work of manifestation.

Every expectancy as to manner, when or where is an impediment. Omnipotence, which you have affirmed yourself to be, has an infinite number of ways in which Success can come. In some of them it will come. Every moment spent in looking for success, or in wondering how or when, delays its coming, because you close the ways in which it is to come by looking for it in some chosen way. Jesus saw this when he said: "Watch, therefore; for ye do not know what hour your Lord doth come." Watch no particular quarter, but watch the whole heavens and be ready when it comes.

The next law of Success is laid down in this admonition of Jesus. Be ready for your opportunity when it comes.

FOUR EXPERIMENTS IN SUG-GESTION.

First.—Is it Telepathy? My May class in Suggestion had an open meeting. Mrs. P. was invited and very much desired to attend. She was, however, prevented. But on the evening she went into a quiet corner and entered the Silence. She saw the class and heard me give the suggestion that the class was to take a trip to Europe. She went to Venice with the class. On the morrow she met a friend who was present that night and they compared notes, and had the same story to tell. Each member of the class, who had learned to receive suggestion, had traveled to Europe in an air-ship, and this lady, at quite a distance from our place of meeting, had received the Suggestion, apparently by Telepathy, and had traveled with

them.

A member of the class who readily received Suggestion was asked by one of the class to look at him for a few moments. Soon he said: "You cannot speak your name." "I can," was her reply. "Try!" She tried and after several trials pronounced the given name of the gentleman. When the Suggestion was removed she declared that she had spoken her own name. "For," she said, "I was saying it over to myself all the time."

Here is a positive proof for the position I have taken, that the Conscious man controls the manifestations of the Sub-conscious. The Suggestion taken by the Conscious mind, "I cannot," had mastered the Sub-conscious and she uttered not that which the sub-conscious desired, but that which the conscious willed. This is one of the most significant of facts in the Mental Science we are building.

Third:—Post-Hypnotic Suggestion by Telepathy.

I have a very fine somnambule. I tried Telepathy at one class with him. I suggested that he go and kneel beside the chair of an M. D. in the room. He

went and touched another gentleman. In an hour I tried him again, telling him mentally to go and bring me a book from the table. He went and did the thing I had previously willed him to do, although I had never spoken it and had forgotten it. He has done the same subsequently. And at a public meeting recently another somnambule did the same. Does not this prove that thoughts are verities? that once a thought enters the subconscious, it remains there waiting expression just as the germ waits in the seed? Thoughts are seeds sown in the realm of real life and bring forth their fruit in due time. The thought I sent was, because the young man was negative, received by him in the sub-conscious. When next he gave the subconscious time to act, it influenced his conduct. Had I patiently waited at first, it would have led him to kneel at the doctor's chair. Sprouted then, it came forth later.

Fourth:—Telepathy or Clairvoyance? I had a somnambule asleep and a gentleman asked to try an experiment. I consented. He said to the young man: "Five minutes after you wake you will find that which I have hidden." Five minutes passed. No one paid any attention to the matter. In an hour and a half the young man went to a lady present and asked her for the nickle she had. "What nickle," she asked. "I don't know, I only felt to ask you," was the reply. Here the thing and the person had in some manner been silently conveyed to the young man. Only that, below consciousness, we are all one, just as all islands below the water are all one earth, can I account for this phenomenon.

NOW.

How small it looks. Just three letters. No-w-Now-the present moment, the present second. Spell it backward. W-o-n-Won. Spell it another way, beginning with the middle letter. O-w-n-Own.

This is the absolute truth. The reason the individual has not conquered the negative conditions which lead to sickness, poverty, and death is because he has not "won" happiness by "own"ing himself and living in the Now. He has devoted himself to the past or the future, and in these domains there is no home for any living creature.

The present atmosphere is ours to make use of. We cannot breathe the atmosphere of the past nor of the future. The atmosphere of this moment contains our proper pabulum, and if in our sorrow over the past, or our haste to realize future benefits, we ignore the food of the present, starvation is our portion.

No one who is in a hurry can properly breathe the breath of life. Neither can an anxious person nor an angry or timid person. Many people live in chronic fear. They do not know the meaning of breath. They grasp and gasp, and after a while the supply seems to give out. But that is a mistake. Ignorance alone is responsible for the seeming.

From neglect of the Now, the race has literally starved to death. With material food the people have glutted themselves, but material food is not the real food. The breath of life is the true pabulum, and in the proper use of it this moment lies our salvation; for "now is the accepted time and now is the day of salvation." Common sense is only another name for wisdom. By living in the Now we shall get wisdom and understanding also. No one was ever wise who spent his time in reminiscence or in the endeavor to pitch his tent in the future.

He alone is well on the road to the kingdom who has won liberty by owning himself. Such a one abides in the Now.—Eleanor Kirk.

CONFUCIAN PHILOSOPHY.

Thomas Whitney, in his work on China, says of Confucius:

He conceived man to be endowed with marvelous powers and capacities which made him little other than a god on earth; that by nature he is constituted such, but that through ignorance he has drifted wide of the mark. Confucius' great scheme was to urge man to make of himself what he termed the "superior man"—the perfect man.

Regarding his belief in a Supreme Being, Whitney says:

From perfect wisdom which he saw manifest everywhere throughout the universe, he felt there must be a supreme overruling power governing, which power he styled the Will of Heaven. He could neither grasp nor comprehend it, yet he felt that such a power existed. He conceived it to be perfect in wisdom, omniscient and omnipotent, hence it must be free from mistakes, mishaps or accidents.

He considered everything in nature, from the most infinitisimal monad of matter up to the grandest expression of creative power to be governed and controlled by Law.

The way to reform a nation, he said, "is to begin with the individual. Reform the individual, then this will reform the state and the empire."

As we read this, we wonder if the New

Thought is any in advance of Confucius. Certainly not in theory, not in preaching. This is as good philosophy as NOW gives. It is the ALL GOOD and the MAN IS DIVINE affirmations. We are not far ahead in perception of Truth, but are immeasurably ahead in LIVING. Contrast the stolid, arrested, soul-imprisoned Chinee with the free man or woman who LIVES TRUTH. It takes centuries to put into practice what is perceived. The principles Euclid demonstrated are daily being put into extended application. No one can say that we have only repeated old mathematical truth because we have added nothing to the solution he gave to a square on the hypothenuse. But look at the wide application of geometrical laws. So with Truth in other lines. Confucius saw, Socrates saw, Jesus saw, and the older Aryans saw, but—they all died. Today we see, and we proclaim that in the Truth they saw lies the Victory over death. Truth is one; its application requires the whole race through all eternity. A grander than Confucius is here. 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AFTER SENSATION, WHAT? WHENCE? WHERE?

He hath made of one blood all nations of men to dwell on all the face of the earth. He giveth to all life and breath to all things. They should seek the Lord, if haply they might feel after Him for He is not far from any one of us, for in Him we live and move and have our Being.—
Paul (Acts 17).

Silent we stand when feeling most.-Byron.

The only foundation for Science, Philosophy, and Metaphysics, is feeling. All reasoning arises in the one common phenomenon of sensation. Whence this feeling? Whence this common experience of all forms of life? It arises from the ONE in whom we live and move and have our BEING. Paul shows that he was very near the confines of modern science when he says: "If haply they might feel after Him and find Him, though He is not far from any one of us."

Would we know anything, we must feel after it. Until found in feeling, we do not possess it. Accepted opinions are those some one has felt out and we take them without feeling. When they occasion feeling in us, we begin to know. From feeling all Truth comes and to feeling all Truth tends, and in feeling all Truth ends. All Feeling is Love in greater or less degree. Who would understand the Science of Mind and the Science of Mental Healing must master this sentence:—From, through and in feeling, Truth originates, works and ends.
