
continuously strive to overcome them. We must strive to develop that which is good and in accordance with Divine Law and Natural Law.

There are many important factors we must study and take into consideration if we are to convince people that we are genuine in our work.

Let us never be weary from well-doing. May we never cease to testify on behalf of our religion. Our show of courage and patience when in the face of criticism will be well-rewarded in strength and growth, which, in time, will build for a united, universal, scientific religion.



Precipitated artwork is a fascinating subject, even for the most experienced of psychic investigators. A great deal of psychic phenomenon was produced during the late 19th century and into the early 20th century. This phenomenon, as well as others, was clouded with accusations of fraud. But the phenomenon stands the test of time and presents itself as clear proof of the manipulation of physical materials by beings from the other side of life.

Precipitated art can be defined as artwork which appears suddenly, or without forethought. It can also be defined in chemistry as a substance which can appear in solid form without warning from a liquid solution. Author Ron Nagy, defines in his book *Precipitated Spirit Paintings* that precipitated artwork is "a work of art, usually a portrait, which appears on canvas without the use of human hands during a Spiritualist séance."

In 1940, *The National Spiritualist* magazine called this phenomena "Transcendence in oil." Imagine portraits being created out of "thin air" in amazingly short time without being touched by anyone, save the occasional holding the canvas steady at the edges, and sometimes the canvas was not touched at all. This is what was accomplished through Spirit.

The conditions under which many well known "Spirit paintings" were created were generally in low, but good lighting with numerous witnesses to observe the phenomenon taking place. In general terms, a blank canvas would be placed flat on a table or on an easel. There would be paints of every color supplied nearby, but after the effect is achieved, the paints were never used or disturbed. Brushes were not supplied. The image would begin to appear gradually in several ways, sometimes beginning from the edges, other times from the center outward. There was no distinct style or method used which could be traced back to any physical source.

The museum in Lily Dale houses examples of Spirit paintings, and I was fortunate enough to observe these works of art very closely in the company of Ron Nagy. Beyond the skill of whatever Spirit artist was displayed, the amazing detail which stands out is that there are virtually no brush strokes visible on the canvas, and the subjects of the portraits have no eyelashes (as in the case of the Bangs sisters' paintings.)

The Bangs sisters, Elizabeth and May, were the most famous and closely investigated of this phenomenon. They had begun their careers early as children born in the 1850s and were trained by their mediumistic mother to earn money as a family of traveling mediums. Trained as slate and automatic writers, they first gained fame by demonstrating Spirit communications through the typewriter. The Spirit portraits were first produced in 1894. Perhaps under the best of conditions, an artist might paint a rather poor, austere portrait in 5 hours. As the Bangs sisters were timed during these séances, these painting would appear in a range of twenty minutes, up to three hours. Add to this, an amazing fact, that afterwards, when the portraits were in possession of other people, the paintings would often change, with added details and colors. It was as if the Spirit artist had decided to make additional changes after the initial painting was completed.

Admiral E. Usborne Moore, of the British navy, took on the cause of investigating the Bangs sisters in 1909 after receiving a glowing letter of support from a very influential Canadian citizen. From that investigation, he wrote *Glimpses of the Next State*. When he observed the precipitated artwork, Admiral Moore wrote that whatever the substance was which appeared on the canvas was damp to the touch, felt oily and resembled soot. Art experts, after examining these paintings, stated that the substance used was not charcoal, oils, crayons, inks, water colors, or any other known substances. It was best described as the dust from butterfly wings.

During this era of Spiritualism, other mediums also saw fame from the publicity of precipitated artwork. Among these were the Campbell brothers. Although the two men were not related, these were the stage names that Allan B. Campbell and Charles Shourds used. Spirit worked through these two mediums to produce very dramatic artwork. Among these are the portrait of Azur, their Spirit Guide, and a portrait of Abraham Lincoln; both hang in the Maplewood Hotel located in Lily Dale, New York. A fascinating fact about the Lincoln portrait is that iridologists, those who diagnose illnesses from observing the human iris, have examined the highly detailed eyes of the Lincoln portrait and have been able to accurately diagnose Lincoln's medical condition. This is a superior clarity of work which cannot be accomplished by modern painting techniques.

The Scottish medium David Duguid produced fairly detailed landscapes in total darkness, while not being permitted to see the canvas, and without the use of his hands. Frank Podmore, an early parapsychologist, witnessed this phenomenon closely and vouched that there was no trickery involved in producing this artist's Spirit artwork.

The earliest piece of precipitated artwork dates back to 1531 and is in possession of the Catholic Church. There is a legend of Juan Diego Cuauhtlatoatzin, simply known as Juan Diego. Diego was an Aztec convert to Catholicism and claimed that the Virgin Mary appeared to him and ordered him to build a church at the site of his vision. When he told the local Bishop, the Bishop thought it was a fanciful tale and told Juan Diego to bring back a sign of a miracle. The Virgin Mary told him to gather flowers from a hill, even though it was winter and no flowers were blooming. He gathered roses that miraculously appeared in a cloak or apron and presented them to the Bishop. When the roses fell from his apron, the painting of the Virgin Mary appeared in the fabric. The image is still known as "Our Lady of Guadalupe."

The image was studied in 1981 under infrared radiation. It was reported that the portions of the face, hands, robe, and mantle had been painted in one step, with no

sketches or corrections and no paintbrush strokes. In 1936, Nobel Chemistry Prize recipient Richard Kuhn said that the colors used to create the image were not from a mineral, vegetable, or animal source.

Examinations of the image that began in 1956 and continue today have resulted in the discovery of many new and varying details. Tiny images are said to have been found reflected in the eyes of the Virgin including the image of a group of Native Americans and Franciscans.




Experts from the textile industry have said they cannot understand how the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe has been so well preserved since 1531. Having been exposed to dust, heat, humidity and more, it has not shown signs of wearing down, fading, or discoloration. On November 14, 1921, a bomb was placed a few feet away from the apron. The explosion demolished the marble steps of the main altar and windows of many nearby homes. The blast even is reported to have bent a brass crucifix, yet the image on the fabric suffered no damage.

Since 1993, the apron has been protected by bulletproof glass in the Basilica of Guadalupe in Mexico City. It is said that it has the power to cure almost any sickness.

Although Spirit may have moved on to different technologies to demonstrate the higher side of life, we may continue to enjoy these wonderful examples of Spirit artwork. One day, Spirit may again offer us this incredible phenomenon, but until then, let us celebrate this evidence and show the world what Spirit can do.



# Spiritualism & Geronimo



rederick Harding is the author of a short booklet entitled Why Red Indians are Spirit Guides. In this book he states that the interesting phenomena occurring among spiritualistic mediums over the years is that Native American indigenous people frequently appear as Spirit Guides. The author goes as far as to say that these Native American guides are so dominant in the Spirit World, and he refers to them as the "traffic cops and gate keepers" to the Spirit World.

Harding's booklet extols the virtues of the Native American Spirits and explains how they guide, protect and strengthen all of us spiritually whether we recognize this or not. He encourages us to understand the Native Americans and their spirituality. Those who do so will find available to them an inexhaustible treasure of wisdom and healing for their lives. He states that our problem is that Western society never took the time to do this. Westerners came to these shores in the spirit of conquest and dominion, and now much of this truth has been lost. It is part of the Native American creed to "leave no tracks and to honor the Great Spirit by leaving the Earth in its natural state"—uncorrupt and uncontaminated by their existence. Our intention here is to discuss Native American spirituality, how they manifested it, why it works, and why many Westerners can't seem to understand it.

I need to make one disclaimer: The Native American Society was not based on federated states in loose confederations. On the North American continent there were 500 nations of indigenous peoples. There were also many sub-nations. There are estimates that there were as many as 2,000 major tribes, with their own cultures, traditions, and forms of religion and spirituality. Given this fact, I can only do this subject justice by focusing on one people. More specifically, I prefer to focus on one individual. In doing this I can do justice to the overall concept of Native American spirituality without overgeneralization. The individual that I have chosen is one who I feel I know something about.

In the summer of 1981, I spent 10 weeks at a military post that provided a base of operations during the period known as the Apache wars. The individual whose life that I am discussing was a key to the drama of those wars. Born in 1829 on the Arizona and New Mexico border, his name is Goyakla, which in Apache means "one who yawns." He was given the name Geronimo by hostile Mexicans who greatly feared his presence in battle and were said to have said their prayers to St. Jerome for protection from him. Geronimo was not a chief of the Apaches, but a medicine man with unusual powers and psychic gifts, telekinesis and powers of healing. Chief Naches and the Apaches followed him until their physical strength was exhausted. Geronimo only surrendered when it was apparent that his people were too weak to follow him any longer.

The Apache people relied heavily on the power of Spirits in the Spirit World for guidance and sustenance. In the winter of 1869 and 1870, Geronimo came to pray over the wife of his friend whose labor was so painful and prolonged that her death seemed imminent. He climbed a mountain to pray alone. For four days he had prayed. On the fifth day at sunrise as he lifted his hands and eyes towards the east he heard a voice from the Spirit World that said: "The child will be born and your sister will live; and you will never be killed with weapons but live to an old age." The baby was born that day and received an Apache name "Daklugie," meaning "forced his way through."

From that time on Geronimo's connection to his spiritual gifts became a key element to his generalship and his war fighting ability, as he seemed to have clear ideas on how and where he should lead his people.

Geronimo's followers give him credit for once performing a miracle on the battlefield. After driving off an attack from a vastly superior U.S. Army force, the Apaches made a long night march moving down a mountainside and across the wide open San Simon Valley. Geronimo was crossing a level place and wanted to reach the mountains before the pursuing enemy could site him. Geronimo sang a prayer and the night sky remained dark for two or three hours longer, according to his followers.

Geronimo also combined powers of prophecy and telepathy in several recorded situations. It was standard procedure for the Apaches to break up into two groups. One group, mostly women and children, formed a base camp. The other group, the warriors that made up the fighting force, would venture out on raids and attacks. One evening during one such raid the men were gathered around the fire, eating. Geronimo suddenly dropped his knife and exclaimed, "Men, our people we left at the base camp are in the hands of US soldiers, what shall we do?" This is likely a good example of Geronimo's mediumship or psychic ability, allowing him to perceive events at a distance that many have previously found unexplainable. The raiding party was at least 120 miles away and completely out of touch. Deciding to return to their base camp the following morning, Geronimo offered yet another prophecy. He said that on the following day's journey a man standing on a hill to the left would report the capture of their camp. His prediction came true. In the middle of the afternoon a man hailed them from a hilltop and came down to report that U.S. forces had indeed captured their camp and taken people into custody.

Geronimo's spiritual abilities were said to have been a central aspect of his life and the source of all his strength and wisdom. Geronimo spent his years as a prisoner in Fort Sill, Oklahoma after the wars concluded. He still could be found in front of a basket holding an eagle feather, an abalone shell, and bag of pollen, treating patients. Here he would beat his drum and sing his songs to the Spirits.

There are many stories of the people he healed. As Geronimo predicted, he did not die from weapons or injuries from bullets. Rather, his body was said to have been covered with healed bullet wounds. To the Apaches his spiritual power was an object not only of reverence but also of fear.

These well-documented stories of Geronimo and the Apaches are a microcosm of the greater whole. But there are many stories throughout Native American history that mirror their intimate connection with the Spirit World.

If we are to take Frederick Harding's advice and to understand Native American spirituality, then we have to ask ourselves why can't we understand it? Why is it so foreign to the average man's way of thinking? Without answering these questions we will never understand our Native American Spirit Guides. I believe a good answer to this question is contained in the book *The Coming of Seth* by Jane Roberts. "Seth" was a channeled Spirit from our time and culture and has offered an articulate answer to this question. It is as follows.

The basis of the problem stems from the fact that Western culture has created a dual nature for itself, comprised of the outer and the inner senses, in which the inner senses take a subordinate position. The conscious ego, or that which deals with the outer senses and the outer world, assumes the primary position and sits in the power seat. Western Culture only gives the inner senses and the subconscious a grudging, hedging, partial acknowledgement and instead likes to pretend that the conscious ego is everything and that human beings are just a mechanism that is the sum of their physical parts. For this reason, Westerners have cut themselves off from the wisdom of socalled primitive peoples because of their insistence upon an artificial dual nature. Their everyday pattern of existence and cultural values tend to imprison them so that they can view other societies only through the murky maze of misconceptions. When the whites arrived on these shores, they considered native religion to be rather imbecilic, superstitious and prehistoric—a subject for condescension and ridicule, not for learning. But the Native Americans have always understood that humans are born with one nature, one self, not one self that manipulates and does the real important things in life and another lesser self that is best kept hidden in a cage.

There is much hypocrisy in the Western belief system. Data received by the inner senses are as vivid, and in fact more vivid, than any other data that you will ever receive. The irony of the matter is that we actually receive this inner data constantly. We utilize it constantly, and yet consciously we do not admit its existence.

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Western science is also a problem. We are told that this science is the gold standard for our society—that everything worth anything is based on it. But the difficulty arises because Western science does not accept as evidence anything which is not perceivable in one manner or another through the outer senses. But we cannot hold a psychological experience in our hands and examine it. We cannot put an emotion in a petri dish and view it under a microscope in a laboratory. But yet this is the kind of standard that Western Science demands as evidence. To insist upon evidence in terms of outside sensual data is as ridiculous a notion as to expect a camera to play music. Music exists and can be played on a phonograph. Sights can be captured on a camera. But you do not expect music to come from a camera. You do not expect a phonograph to take pictures.

If we once allow ourselves freely to receive inner data in a spontaneous, non-critical manner, we will see that these data are as legitimate, valid and varied, and as powerful as any outside stimuli. But to insist upon translating these data into channels that can first be picked up by the outer senses, and then expect strong clear data, is impossible. Until we realize that there is one self, and not one self who does and manipulates and another self who breathes and dreams, we will get nowhere. In the final analysis the outside senses are nothing but fabricators and the material world they produce, nothing but a fabrication. For this reason, inner fata is more reliable and permanent. The inner self is our friend, not our enemy as the Native Americans figured out long ago.

Our agreement that this explanation holds the truth is one thing, but breaking through cultural bias and reforming it is quite another. Spiritualism has been struggling to reform Western culture since 1848. It has quietly introduced many of the ideas that Western culture is just now beginning to accept. Fifty years ago, the term "near-death experiencer" didn't exist. People who spoke too often about their NDE


were often referred to psychiatrists and labeled as hallucinatory. Within the Spiritualist Church they found acceptance and support. Today these individuals are out of hiding and have the freedom to share their stories of their walks in the Spirit World.

The TV series *The Medium* and *Ghost Whisperer* have a lot to say about today's culture and how we are still lagging behind with our cultural beliefs. Both of the heroines in these stories are forced to keep what they do shrouded in secrecy despite their success. They are constantly doubted and are held in suspicion by even their closest friends and colleagues. Even though these shows are Hollywood fiction, they accurately reflect the bias that our Western culture still clings to.

Mary Anne Winkowski, the real life Ghost Whisperer, shares several such stories in her book about the public's refusal to accept information coming from Spirit. She tells a story about how she used to solve crime cases for the police until one day she discovered that because of the quality of the information she brought forth for one particular case, she herself became a suspect. That is when she decided never again to assist with police cases.

Seth's message was that if we are to understand Native American spirituality, we also need to turn away from our obsession with the outer world and turn our attentions to the inner world. That is where we will ultimately find our connection to our spiritual power. Geronimo was one of those men who were true to the tradition of using his spiritual power in the defense and protection of his people. But most of us are not called upon to perform the legendary feats that Geronimo did. What we are called upon to do is much simpler. We can listen to our inner senses for the voices of our friends in Spirit for guidance, healing and peace.

May all of those Native American Spirits of old strengthen and protect us on our path until the end of our days here on the Earth plane.



## Spiritualist Church Literally 65



"Moves
Across
Town!"



n a chilly April morning, Spiritualists in Western Massachusetts gathered at a construction site to watch as their former church building, constructed in 1887 for about \$13,000, was relocated to make room for construction of the \$950 million MGM Springfield casino.

Some members of the congregation joked that they were witnessing a modern "miracle." The 129-year-old brick structure, aging and in need of repair, was transported about 600 feet without incident. Some joked among themselves about saving bricks as souvenirs when the building inevitably fell apart.

The experts from Wolfe House and Building Movers proved the doubters wrong, thanks to steel support structures placed beneath the church that brought the total weight to about 50 tons.

"I'm happy for it," the Rev. John Sullivan, who has served as pastor since 1987, told *The Republican*, MassLive reporter. "It was home to a lot of people. It's a part of history."

"We're excited," added Linn Humel, church organist who worshiped there since 1983. "We thought it would be torn down. So we're glad they were able to save it."

"I think it's great, absolutely great," said Denise St. Pierre, who has served the church since 1997.

"The congregation had 'poured money, sweat and tears' into the Bliss Street church's upkeep including the replacement of stained-glassed windows to wood-framed windows more in keeping with its original look," Sullivan said. "We're so happy to see it survive."

The move itself took about five hours. You can watch a timelapse video of the move by searching for "First Spiritualist Church of Springfield" on YouTube or on the church's website at: healinghandsoflightspch.com.

Most importantly, the Spiritualist congregation continues to thrive. After selling the building to MGM, services were relocated in 2013 to a much more modern building in Chicopee, Massachusetts, which is known as the Healing Hands of Light Spiritualist Church. The new site, after some renovation, provides the congregation a bright and open space decorated by a member's portraits of sunflowers, a modern kitchen for serving refreshments after services, dedicated classroom space, a sanctuary, a sound system and giant television screen, is handicap-accessible, and—not to be underestimated by parishioners who had suffered through the sweltering heat at the



former church—air conditioning!

The casino's plans for the small Gothic building remain unclear. Among the uses that have been discussed include a retail space, a cafe for a planned ice rink and a chapel for weddings. The cost of the relocation was approximately \$800,000.

The church, which is on the National Register of Historic Places, was built as the first French Protestant church in Springfield in 1887, subsequently sold in 1911 to the Springfield Congregational Union. The First Spiritualist Society, formed in 1898, opened its doors to Spiritualism on January 1, 1918. The Society incorporated in 1919 as The First Spiritualist Church of Springfield and became a chartered member of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches (NSAC).

"MGM is pleased to save such a historically significant building," said Brian Packer, MGM Springfield's vice-president of construction. "This church in its new setting really lends itself as a unique architectural feature and something we can do that is really special," he said. The casino project is expected to open in late 2018.

Springfield Mayor Domenic Sarno described the move as an "engineering feat," and praised it as a part of a major economic development boost tied to the casino project—while also making sure to crack a joke or two.

"Merriam-Webster is another first here in the City of Springfield, but I think if you look at the definition now of 'Holy Roller,' that might fit the bill right there," Sarno said, gesturing towards the church and its wheeled platform.

s Spirit beings, we seek balance and harmony in our lives, which can be difficult to achieve at times because not everything in life goes smoothly, does it? If your life is like mine, aside from the issues that arise from just living day to day, there are so many people! I love people—I like working with and for people. I draw strength from socializing with them. But I must admit—sometimes I do get a bit irked or frustrated with them. I have often thought, if I could control my feelings, how wonderful life would be—but how does one do that without throwing oneself totally out of balance? After all, feelings are an important part of life—we all have them and they seem to make a difference in how and what we do.

Recently, I read a little book written by Marilyn Lee entitled *Speaking Through Your Heart*, and one particular section resonated with me. The author wrote that our thoughts control our emotions. She wrote that as you change your perspective, you will see an event or person differently, emphasizing that we are not ever a victim of our emotions. So, I thought, all I have to do is control my thoughts and I can

avoid becoming frustrated or angry. As I thought about this, I remembered another book I had read by Karol Truman titled *Feeling Buried Alive Never Die* in which she spoke about single-mindedness.

There is a spiritual understanding of single-mindedness. Single-mindedness is generally defined as being focused on a goal or dedicated to the process. But single-mindedness can also be defined as having a state of mind when our feelings and our thoughts are in sync with one another so that our emotions are appropriate for the situation. In other words, what we think and what we feel are coordinated and reveal themselves in appropriate emotional responses to people and situations. Have you ever said or done something that was really quite innocent when you were just being yourself, and someone became totally irate and frustrated with you? Obviously, you read something incorrectly and were out of sync with the situation. That is the opposite of singlemindedness.

Remember that Lee had said that thoughts control our emotions. Here, Truman is saying that our feelings trigger our thoughts, resulting in our emotions. When our thoughts and our feelings are split, then we become conflicted. You can relate this to the left and right hemispheres of the brain. Most of you are familiar with the difference between the left and right hemispheres—the left hemisphere is organized, sequential, logical, verbal—and more

related to the thinking and conscious side of our life. The right hemisphere is intuitive, divergent, playful, musical, and more related to the feeling and subconscious side of our life. Each of us will have a preference for either the left or right hemisphere of the brain. You may try the thumb test to see. Fold your hands together as if in prayer. Which thumb is on top? If your right thumb is on top, you are most likely left brained. If your left thumb is on top, you are most likely right brained. Now, the scientists among us will smirk at my simplistic approach, but most often it works. By the way, if your thumbs are lined up next to each other, you may be wholebrained.

According to Truman, to experience what we think we desire, our thinking and feeling need to agree. If they don't agree, we need to change the feeling so that the feeling and thinking do agree—then we become single-minded. When we are single-minded about what we want, life works for us because the feeling always wins. Yes, feeling always wins. The feeling comes from the



heart, and we always receive the "prayer of the heart."

Kinesiology is a process used in holistic health to test our beliefs, to test what is good for us, to test any number of things. Kinesiology is not dependent upon what we think; it is based upon our feelings. As an example, let's say you are hungry. You have in front of you two plates: a double cheeseburger or an egg salad sandwich. You know which is better for you—you can think it through, but which one will you eat? In the mind-heart, says Truman, the feelings always win.

Obviously, our biggest challenges do not consist in deciding between a cheeseburger and an egg salad sandwich. But the lesson here is that we recognize that what we think may not always be realistic—it may not conform to reality. Let's use our food as an example. If I want to lose weight, I will choose the egg salad sandwich—on one slice of bread. Why? Because I am accepting the reality of the foods in front of me just as they are. I see them as they are. If I eat the double cheeseburger, I will only be angry with myself later for giving in to my fantasy that eating a double cheeseburger won't make a difference.

Let's apply the same process to other people. I will share an instance of a student who walked into my class-room with no book, no paper, and no pen. I became perturbed—this was a 30-year-old male coming into a 4-hour class totally unprepared. Now why am I really perturbed? Because I THINK he should have his book, paper, or laptop, and certainly something to write with. He should somehow show that he is prepared and ready for class. I have this image of what a student should be like. This person looks like he just came in from a softball game.

Did this fellow cause my mental state? No. He has nothing to do with it. I created my own upset. I created it because I did not accept him as he was—I had a mental image of what I thought he should be or do, and he did not meet it. The problem was all mine. I was not letting him be the way he was.

No one makes us feel sad, mad, happy, or fulfilled. We create our own reality. How often during this election campaign season do we become upset or disgusted or whatever because someone does not think the same way we do. Those people have nothing to do with my feelings or emotions—I am the one creating them because I think they should think the way I think. I am not letting them be who they are.

I would bet most of us have experienced situations in which others have become angry or frustrated or whatever with us simply because they expected us to do, be, think, or believe the way they did. From that perspective, we can see that we had nothing to do with their emotional reactions. At least, I would hope we could see that we had nothing to do with them. Sometimes, we tend to take on that guilt, but we need to learn that we do not control others' feelings.

As a Spiritualist, I know that being single-minded is important to create stability in my life and in the lives of those around me. When I am single-minded, I am conscious of the fact that I am one with those around me. The I AM that I repeat every morning during my meditation reminds me that I AM SPIRIT. I am Spirit with everyone else. I am Spirit with every one of you reading this article. We are all connected. I must accept myself as I am. I must accept each of you as you are. We give each other the freedom to be and to grow.

When we are not single-minded, we often find our thoughts and feelings drive us to react in ways we should not act. We place expectations on other people—sometimes the same expectations we place on ourselves, and how unfair is that? We do create our own reality—and our emotional reaction to that reality can make life pleasant or miserable for those around us.

Why become upset? You know this is the reality. So let the feelings and thoughts reflect the reality, experience the stability of sanity, and be peaceful.

Just an afterthought: Common sense must prevail. The situations we all experience usually fall within the range of normal behaviors. I am not referring to dangerous issues such as those involving domestic violence or enduring issues of incorrigibility in children. The main point I am making is that our feelings and our thoughts need to be integrated or coordinated so that we are not expecting something that will disappoint us or frustrate us or create in us superficial happiness or joy.

As we move along our spiritual journey, we set goals for ourselves, accepting ourselves while striving to grow and improve. As Spiritualists, we know we are all Spirit; we are all one in Spirit. As Spiritualists, we let each individual set his or her own goals and accept him or herself while striving to grow and improve, which means we do not make judgments or place expectations on others. Is that easy? No, and that is the challenge. But its also an opportunity.

Instantly connected to our motto, searchers would then read what we stand for in a few words. For example, a short statement might be "honoring the continuum of life after death" or "demonstrating the continuance of life after death" to be placed with the symbol.

In addition, our logo branding could include an accompanying motto stating how we honor the continuum of life after death. It would be a simple, effective statement such as, "Spirit communication through mediumship" also placed below or near the sunflower. A web address and/or phone number might follow, driving interested parties in only seconds to further explore.

Once the logo branding image of Spiritualism becomes recognized by the general spiritual seeking public, more people will likely be drawn to learn more about Spiritualism and trickle into the churches. As an aside, a clear and up to date web presence which supports and magnifies our image and guides the enquirer as to how to become involved would be necessary, as well as a social media presence.

After attracting the prospective newcomer to the church, the presentation of Spiritualism must offer a relevant and meaningful experience. #### The Visits

People who are nearing transition often see dead friends or relatives who come to comfort them in their last moments of life. The perception of these visits become



more frequent as a person approaches the moment of transition. According to a report from the Zee Media Bureau, scientists from Canisius College in New York interviewed 66 patients who were receiving "end-of-life" care in a hospital. The study revealed that most of the patients saw at least

one vision each day. These visions can occur months, weeks, days, or hours before death and typically lessen fear of dying, making transition from life to death easier for those experiencing them.

#### Findings of Studies Exploring Life After Death

Dr Erlendur Haraldson's research into deathbed visions with 500 terminally ill patients showed that they had similar experiences of being offered help to the other side. Near-death experiences are reported by an estimated 200,000 Americans a year and surprisingly 59% of American doctors interviewed believe in some sort of afterlife. In a Study by Dr. Alexander Batthyany, at the University of Vienna, 10% of dementia patients were found to have a brief return to lucidity just before death. These patients' brains are thought to be deteriorated to a point that should make normal mental functioning impossible.



It appeared as though a balloon was attaching himself to his lifeless body. The toddler, not even 3-years-old, explains what the balloon meant. "When you die you see a bright light and you are connected to a cord." Parnia was intrigued that a toddler was able to share such vivid memories of his "death."

#### Your Immortal Self

A Recent Study on Americans' Religiosity published by the SAGE Journals, showed that American adults were less likely to pray, believe in God, identify as religious, attend religious services or believe the Bible was the word of God than they were in previous decades. The decline in religious affiliation found in previous research is now reflected in religious service attendance and personal religious belief and practice. According to the study conducted by a group of psychology researchers from various American universities, the number of Americans who said they believe in God has hit the low point where 22 percent of adults surveyed said they don't believe in God. That's 69 percent higher than those adults who expressed doubt in God when the similar survey was conducted in the 1980s, where only 13 percent said they don't believe in God.

There are even retailers offering to carry out the tomb-sweeping duties on behalf of anyone who can't attend the event. Services include everything from cleaning the tombs and burning offerings, live chats at the grave, and even having someone weeping to express the sorrow of the buyer.

hat does the word success conjure up in your mind? Does it mean financial wealth? Perhaps you believe that being successful means that you have a good job. Maybe, for some, success has the face of philanthropy. While to others, finishing in the top ten finishers of a marathon denotes success. Success has many different faces and all its faces are correct. Our individual definitions of success are as varied as we are.

For example, a person who has been practicing conscientiously and is able to improve upon playing a piece of music feels a measure of success. A person who has rented a home for many years and is now able to get a mortgage and purchase their own home feels successful. Conversely, a person who has never played a musical instrument would have no sense of success about it. A person who has always owned their own home probably feels no special measure of success and longs for the day when their mortgage is paid off. Success for one is not necessarily success for another. It is a feeling that is subject to change based upon the individual's perception of the circumstances.

Spiritual success can have just as many faces as material and physical success. The diverse faces of success are simply pathways to the same ultimate pinnacle: being closer to Infinite Intelligence. The secondary gain of a successful venture is a sense of feeling good about oneself. Feeling good about oneself is one measure of spiritual success. The flow of the universe always seeks an upright position or a positive outcome. When something we perceive as bad happens to us, or we experience events that are unfair or unjust, the Natural Laws of the Universe seek to make lemonade out of lemons.

The mother who lost her child to a drunk driver transformed her loss and founded the organization called MADD. The person who lost a limb in a war now teaches others facing similar losses on how to cope and rebuild their lives. The physical world is not without its challenges. We all experience the gamut of emotions while here; grief, sadness joy, frustration, happiness etc. Spiritual success is measured by our ability to "work through" the challenges of life and strive to realign ourselves with the Natural Laws.

And be less quick to anger and show appreciation more and love the people in our lives like we've never loved before.


If we treat each other with respect and more often wear a smile, remembering that this special dash might only last a little while.

# Stories of Spiritualism

veryone likes a good story, and Spiritualism is full of them. The interesting thing about true stories, is that there is always more to discover. Have you ever been gripped by a documentary or a biography or an historical thriller, to the extent that you find yourself googling certain details about it to resolve unanswered questions in your mind?

In the July issue of the TNS, we looked at some fascinating details about the Fox Sisters that were revealed in Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's book, *The History of Spiritualism*. Now we will take a look at a less well-known story.

Many people have no idea who Sir Oliver Lodge was. I noticed that Sir Arthur Conan Doyle dedicated *The History of Spiritualism* to him and wondered "why him?" Taking my cue from Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, I found that one question led to another, so I began to dig.

Sir Oliver Lodge was a rather famous man of science. Lest you think that those who investigated and experimented with Spiritualist phenomena were a bunch of amateurs, let me tell you otherwise. Sir Oliver Lodge was a distinguished professor of physics and mathematics at University College, in Liverpool. As a physicist, he was involved in the development of, and holder of key patents for radio.

"He identified electromagnetic radiation independent of Hertz' proof." In other words, he was no slouch, scientifically. His interest in psychic phenomena in the late 1800s led him to study it. It is noted that he was a member of "The Ghost Club." That peaked my curiosity, so I Googled it. It's for real and it's still in existence. "The Ghost Club" is a paranormal investigation and research organization founded in 1862 that investigates ghosts and hauntings. It is widely believed to be the oldest such organization in the world.

Sir Oliver's first experience in psychical research dates back to 1883. His most notable observations in physical mediumship were made with the famous Italian medium, Eusapia Paladino. Ah, there's a story! Her story was an interesting and difficult one, for she cheated at times, and it seemed to make no difference to her that she might be exposed for it (as she repeatedly was). When given the slightest opportunity to cheat, she did so. But at the same time, there were manifestations occurring that seemed to be quite genuine. Over the years, Eusapia continued to baffle many scientists and investigators. Some of the phenomena occurring during her sittings included levitation of tables, musical instruments, and even herself. Chairs often moved about the room, and curtains blew.

During a visit to America late in her life, she was detected performing obvious tricks and offended her sitters so much that they rejected her as a fake. But Howard Thurston, a famous conjurer in attendance, decided to continue the sitting. Just as another well-known sitter was reproaching her for moving some object with her hand, another object, quite out of her reach, moved across the table.

The Minerva Scientific Circle calculated that at least 75 percent of what occurred during the sittings was genuine paranormal activity. Late in her career, Eusapia was investigated by a three-man committee with very formidable credentials, including a former magician who had an excellent record of exposing fraud. They concluded, "It was only through constant repetition of the same phenomenon, in a good light and at moments when its occurrence was expected." They recognized that the phenomena occurred, in spite of all their precautions, and stated, "We gradually reached the conviction that some force was in play which was beyond the reach of ordinary control, and beyond the skill of the most skillful conjurer."

Her career was certainly a peculiar one. It has been said that no physical medium has ever more certainly been proved to have psychic powers, and no medium was ever more certainly a cheat upon occasion.

In the field of mental mediumship, Sir Oliver Lodge spent a great deal of time investigating Boston's famous medium, Lenore Piper. In 1889, Lodge invited her to England for tests. He was an exacting researcher, taking every conceivable precaution to eliminate any possibility of foreknowledge or fraud on Piper's part. He went so far as to temporarily replace his servants with others who had no personal knowledge of the Lodge family or Piper. As their guest, she was kept incommunicado and was constantly watched by detectives. With Piper's permission, her private mail was opened and read. Every questionable communication with others was eliminated, yet Piper's Spirit Guides' accurate communication in every test he devised helped convince him that Spirit phenomena were real.

Aside from his experiments, experiences in his personal life convinced him of the truth of Spirit communication. World War I shifted his focus, for his son Raymond was killed in the war. Sir Oliver visited several mediums and wrote about his experiences in a number of books, including *Raymond or Life and Death*. The book includes letters that share insight into Raymond's life, then documents the various messages Sir Oliver received from him through sittings and automatic writing after his passing.

The last chapter of the book, titled *Life and Death*, was written with his hopes to "help people in general to realize that this subject is not the bugbear which ignorance and prejudice have made it; that it belongs to a coherent system of thought, full of new facts of which consistent study is necessary; that it is subject to a law and order of its own; and that though comparatively in its infancy, it is a genuine branch of psychological science."

Again, "the interesting thing about true stories, is that there's always more to find out." Spiritualism encourages us to read, learn, form our own opinions, and reach our own conclusions. We have a responsibility to seek out answers to the questions that puzzle us. Perhaps reading this will have given you a thirst for seeking out the details that will help you make up your own mind... about everything. Be like Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and keep digging. That is the Spiritualist way.

To answer my question as to why Arthur Conan Doyle dedicated this book to Sir Oliver Lodge? Simply because they were friends with a common bond, and they had both lost a son in the war.

that as we begin a process of deliberate or focused self-discovery, we can begin to then experience self-directed personal growth.


The process of self-discovery often occurs through trial and error. If life went according to plan and everything unfolded for you exactly as you hoped it would, you

# Self-Deception

hy is it that we hesitate to deceive others, but think nothing of lying to ourselves? We all practice self-deceit, sometimes with grave consequences. The most common ploy we use is rationalization. That's just a fancy way of saying we make excuses and blame our lack of success on circumstances beyond our control. We don't like to admit we are the cause of our problems, so we invent reasons for our failures.

When you have discussions with others do you often notice that they are wrong and you are right? Isn't it odd that you are almost ALWAYS the one that is right and NEVER wrong? How can that be? This lie prevents us from learning from others. Why do we feel threatened by different opinions and find it painful to admit we may be wrong? Perhaps we are stuck in "either-or" thinking. That is, EITHER they or I are right, when the truth is, some of what *both* say is right and some isn't. They are sometimes right, but sometimes wrong. Remember that just because another person knows more about SOME things than we do doesn't mean they know more about EVERYTHING than we do. Once we understand this, we will feel less threatened by different ideas and more willing to listen, learn, and remain more flexible.

Some lies people tell themselves allow them to destroy their health with cigarettes, alcohol, drugs, overeating or overspending. A favorite lie for many is, "I can't do it because I don't have the time." But if you didn't have the time to do the important stuff, how come you had time to do the unimportant stuff? Another popular lie is "I'll have more than enough time to do it later." These procrastinators often much later in life wonder where time went and why they failed to reach their goals.

Those who are may fear stepping out of their comfort zone and make something of themselves proclaim, "I'm not afraid, I'm just being cautious." Those who year after year fail to make progress announce, "I can't help it. Its just the way I am. I was born this way." These are lies that don't get us anywhere.

As Spiritualists, we learn that unless we end the self-deception, face our fears, admit our faults, accept responsibility, roll up our sleeves and get to work, things will remain the same. Assuming that it isn't what you want, and that you are committed to stop lying to yourself, let's look at some of the patterns we use to deceive ourselves, for once we are aware of them, they will be easier to change.

Rationalization: No results + great excuse = no results. This formula clearly shows that no excuse, regardless how good it is, advances our cause. There's no point in making excuses. Don't waste your time.

It is far better to use that time to take steps, no matter how small, to bring you closer to your goal.

*Justification*: Do you justify your actions, twist the facts,and pretend to yourself that wrongful acts are perfectly reasonable?

Selective Attention: When faced with an opinion that we disagree with, rather than consider we may be wrong, we dismiss, discount, and down play its importance. We remain on the lookout for information that supports our beliefs, and automatically reject anything that conflicts with our preconceived notions.

Denial: Rather than face the painful truth, we choose to ignore it. Wishful Thinking: One pretends that there is truth in what is not true simply because they want it to be so.

*Projection:* One shifts the blame for their problems on another or even upon "life" in general.

Regression: Rather than coping in a mature way, a person under stress or frustration may sulk, whine, or cry with the expectation that others will to rush to their aid.

Repression: One buries the memories below their level of awareness. Although repression alleviates pain and allows one to function, the memories remain intact. Until they are dealt with, one may not be able to form healthy relationships.

Suppression: Memories are consciously hidden.

Displacement: Taking out our frustration and anger on innocent people because you feel you cannot express your anger to the one you really feel anger towards.

Lying to ourselves is a coping mechanism we use to avoid pain. What we must understand is that the pain of *not* facing and handling the truth is greater than the pain we'll experience by actually facing it head on. With that understanding, why do we continue to lie to ourselves? It is one thing to say you understand that it is better to face your problems and quite another thing to FEEL the pain, doubt, and worry that accompanies facing them. In battles between our intellect and our emotions, our emotions almost always win. That is because we usually operate on autopilot, allowing our emotions to run the show. However, with practice, we can interrupt our feelings and ask ourselves "Is the action that I now FEEL like taking really in my best interest?" If it isn't, choose to act differently. When we stop and question our feelings often enough, it becomes habit. Once it is, we will always be acting in our best interests, even when our actions are automatic.

If you don't start acting in your own best interests today, when will you begin? The next time problems erupt, face them. Analyze them and tear them apart. Ask yourself, "What are the best steps for me to take now?" Then do what you believe is best. Study your results, and make further refinements if needed. Don't just talk about it; take action! As author Bernard Baruch wrote, "Approach each new problem not with a view of finding what you hope will be there, but to get the truth, the realities that must be grappled with. You may not like what you find. In that case you are entitled to change it. But do not deceive yourself as to what you do find to be the facts of the situation."

The problem with self-deception is it blinds us to the cause of our problems, thereby making us incapable of solving them. We've got to remove the glasses we're wearing, regardless how bright the light of truth may be. Once we face our problems, we'll be able to overcome them. And that is the truth!

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



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# Spiritual Awareness

t some stage in our journey through life and particularly in our search for meaning we sense we are becoming spiritually aware. But what does this mean and how can we recognize some of the signs? We start to sense dissatisfaction within ourselves and perhaps we consciously ask questions of ourselves such as, "What do I consider to be the six fundamental questions in life? Who am I? Where do I come from? Why am I here? Where am I going? How am I going to get there?" And, "What will it be like when I get there?" It is most often growing older or personal experiences that bring about suffering, grief, pain or sorrow that cause us to ask ourselves these vital questions. Also, as we turn inward with a genuine desire to search out new meaning to life, our spiritual centre awakens and answers our call from deep within. This process can be illustrated by a famous poem of Robert Browning's entitled Paracelsus. A portion of it reads as follows.

Truth is within ourselves; it takes no rise
From outward things, what'er you may believe,
There is an inmost centre in us all,
Where truth abides in fullness; and around,
Wall upon wall, the gross flesh hems it in,
This perfection, clear perception-which is truth;

A baffling and perverting carnal mesh Binds it, and makes all error: and to know Rather consists in opening out a way Whence the imprisoned splendor may escape, Than in effecting entry for a light Supposed to be without.

Note how the author describes how material life as "gross flesh and carnal mesh" can choke off the spiritual impulse and 'bind it, and makes all error." In other words, as we look outside of ourselves rather than within, the imprisoned splendor that is the Spirit stays locked within. If we make our choices based primarily upon material values, we neglect the spiritual. However, this does not mean we should be self-centered and turn inward to the neglect of the world. It means that as more consciously aware individuals we are able to relate more fully to God. We may then grow into the realization that God is everywhere and in all things. This realization should persuade us to value others and our relationships should be permeated with this knowledge.

# "We Are One"

aturday, June 18, 2016, six days after that heart-wrenching horrific act that sent 49 human beings into the World of Spirit and 53 others hospitalized, a Healing Song Service was held at the Spiritualist Church of Awareness on 3210 North Chickasaw Trail in Winter Park, Florida, a suburb of Orlando. It was a service to bring peace of mind to those who attended and send love and healing to those who made their transition, to those who were in the process of mental/emotional and physical healing, and to the families of all 92 who were dealing with the loss of life of a loved one or those who were dealt physical harm. The lighted billboard at the church was surrounded by 49 American flags, placed by Lee Peters, to signify each life that was taken. Although not all of the victims were American citizens, we want the community to know that Americans grieve all of those who transitioned.

The service opened by a welcoming from the church Pastor, the Reverend Jeannie K. Lerch. The congregation sang "Whispering Hope," followed by the Invocation. Candles in the five-place candelabra were lit one at a time. We light this first candle for our grief. Like the heat of this flame, the pain of losing our family or friend is intense; the second candle represents our need for courage and strength, and we know our loved ones, both here and in the Spirit World will help us; the third candle is lit with memories: family games, private jokes, traditions, and plans for the future; and the fourth candle is the light of love. Each day we cherish the special place in our hearts that they touched—their laughter, encouragement, support, strength, inspiration, and spirituality has given us a life-long gift to cherish. We light this final candle for healing. Their transition has left emptiness in our hearts, our homes, and our lives. Now we must comfort one another; rebuild our lives; and move forward as they want us to; knowing that their presence and love will always be with us. We know they are going to be watching over each and every one of us until we meet again.

Rev. Lerch then read 1st Corinthians 13:7 and 13:8. She then led the congregation in reading the Spiritualist Healing Prayer, followed by a few moments of silence. Church member Marsha Hall played the Native American flute as inspired by Spirit. The Rev. Marilyn J. Awtry then offered words on the medicine for healing simply called Love. She followed this with quotes on Love from countries around the world concluding with a Chinese Proverb: "If there is light in the soul, there will be beauty in the person. If there is beauty in the person, there will be harmony in the house. If there is harmony in the house, there will be order in the nation, and if there is order in the nation, there will be peace in the world." This segment of the service was completed by the Pastor offering insight from the Dalai Lama as follows: "The past is past; nothing can change it. But the future depends on the present; we still have the opportunity to shape it. This is not a matter of employing technology or spending money; it's a question of developing a sense of concern for others' well-being. We need to show each other affection, to be sensible, warm-hearted, more compassionate human beings."

The congregation then sang "Peace Like a River." The finale of the service was offered by Church member Lee Peters who took the congregation into a deep meditation as he played the singing bowls. The Service concluded with the singing of "Let There be Peace on Earth." The pianist for all the hymns was Church member Carol Collins.

# Learning to Work with Spirit

utumn is in the air. It is the time of completing harvests and starting into cooler nights, frosty mornings and gradually working our way into the holiday season. The evenings are longer, it gets dark earlier and we have time in the evenings to settle in and be cozy and comfortable in our homes. With yardwork finished or nearly so, there is more time for reflection. I personally find television less appealing than ever. Do you relax with a book? Do you think about just doing nothing? Perhaps if there isn't a lot of noise in the house it is a good time to attempt to learn to meditate a bit.

We should think about being responsible to ourselves rather than always to the needs and requests of those around us. We speak of tuning in to the Spirit and trying to just be still and listen. You don't have to plan on so much as a half hour, you just need a few quiet minutes to tune in. In the solitude, just still your mind and listen. Remember to ask Infinite Intelligence to be with you and only draw to you those with your highest and best interests. If you have a clock that ticks, hear it and give thanks for your ability to hear. Maybe there are still crickets chirping outside. Try not to focus on anything in particular. Try to lightly close your eyes and float above yourself seeing with your mind's eye how things would appear to a stranger.

Is the air serene? Does the house have a peaceful feeling? Are there cracks or sounds that many call the house settling but may also be Spirit attempting to catch your attention? If you are alone, speak aloud to the sounds quietly but firmly so Spirit knows you are receptive. Ask if Spirit is there with you, then just listen. When you hear something again ask if there is anything Spirit wants to tell you; again, just listen. It is that simple and easy to be with Spirit. After about 7 to 10 minutes, thank the God Force for being with you and giving you the sense of peace you have received.

Part of working with Spirit is believing you can! Spiritualists know they are never alone. Spirit is around and about each one of us at all times. It is true that a grieving person whose aura and atmosphere are "heavy" with sorrow has lower vibrations, making it more difficult for Spirit to reach through to them. If you carry the knowledge that the soul lives on beyond Earth plane, you are better able to overcome grief. That is one of the most important lessons that

we as Spiritualists teach, and probably one of the most difficult for people to accept. Yes, their minds want to accept the belief and the comfort it brings, but they also have to reach the point where it becomes real in their hearts.

Believing Spirit can reach you and allowing yourself time to give them a quiet time daily is one of the best exercises to bring them into a communicative state with you. Start your quiet minute with meditation to the highest Force of God that you can accept, and then quietly let your mind drift. When you receive a thought or inspiration you don't feel is typical of you, it may be that Spirit brought that into your mind. With practice, the subtle communications Spirit brings to your mind become stronger, and you'll grow more sure of their presence.

Those of you who are trying to develop your mediumship for others should share the message exactly as you have received it. It isn't for the medium to understand. The message is for the recipient to recognize or work with until it falls into place with them. Sometimes it takes a while. If you are receiving nothing there is no dishonor in simply saying "right now I don't have anything, but thank you." Part of the problem with Spirit demonstration has to do with ego, and those who are practicing mediumship need to be open and honest.

You should also know that not everyone is going to receive a message each time they are in a Spiritualist Church. Spirit can actually be present and around you without having anything significant to say at that particular time. Just as you may be attentive to a conversation with others, perhaps learning from it but having nothing constructive to add at that time, Spirit entities also may present for the conversation but listening rather than speaking.

Never feel left out when you do not receive a message. Frequently a message given to one will also fit another person in a different way. It can be frustrating to a medium when someone who has received their message gets restless while others are still being served by Spirit. We advise sitting quietly and listening to what is given and seeing if what is being given would also apply in your own life.

Messages are about Spirit greetings, and often are given by entities who may not have been able to reach through in the past, but who see the light of the service and wander in, surprised themselves that they are able to get through and make contact. As we know, many churches do not participate in this type of service so there aren't many of opportunities for these souls to touch in.

Try to sit quietly for a few minutes each day in the presence of Spirit and Infinite Intelligence. Meditate, and realize you are in the presence of loved ones, listen, and if nothing is given, just thank Spirit for being with you. Perseverance pays when you are learning anything new.

I hope this helps those who desire to be able to contact Spirit, and for those with experience, I hope this refresher inspires you to continue to grow in your quest.
