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SPIRITUALISM AND JESUS

Spiritualism blesses the world with many revelations of truth and knowledge, among which is the light it sheds upon the life and message of Jesus. Spiritualism reveals the path, which leads to a true understanding of Him and His message. This knowledge comes

direct from the fountain-head of all truth, the spirit world. No longer are we dependent upon the opinions of men, opinions that change and differ, no longer are we misled by the dead letter, but our minds are illuminated by the living spirit of truth.

The one supreme feature of the religion of Spiritualism, is that it does not rest on the shifting sands of faith, but upon the rock of knowledge. In this fact, it stands above and beyond all other religious bodies, which depend upon faith, for their very existence. Faiths that differ with each other, no two being alike, and all at variance with each other.

Under the light of Spiritualism's revelations, the Bible stands forth as a book filled with wisdom and truth, which is blended with error and unimportant features. The Bible is like unto a gold mine in which one has to dig a great amount of dross to find the pure gold. To receive therein that which is true and let the rest go, is the solution of all the problems concerning this great book. Spiritualism conveys the necessary knowledge, by which one can dis criminate and thereby accept the good, the true and reject the bad, the false.

and reject the bad, the false. The first important feature concerning Spiritualism's relation to Jesus is, that it recognizes Him not as a God, but as a man. In being a man, he was born in the same manner, that all men are and died as all men do. Jesus declared Himself as the son of man repeatedly and only as the son of man can Spiritualism accept Him. In His relation to the Divine Spirit, He was as all souls are who live a good life, a son of God.

If He was God, why then did He cry out upon the cross in the dark hour, "my God, why hast thou for saken me? and when on another occasion a man addressed Him a "Good master" did He not reply to him, "Why callest me good? There are none good, but one that is God." Mat. 19.17. Again, when the Jews were about to stone Him, they declared, "Thou being a man makest thyself God." He replied to them saying, "Is it not written in your law Ye are Gods?" and the scriptures follow in saying, "He called them Gods unto whom the words of God came and the scriptures cannot be

broken." (John lo. 33, 34, 35.) Herein Jesus clearly reveals that all who come into the kingdom of the Spiritual truth, are sons of God, like Himself.

In recognizing Jesus as God, all the reality of His teachings is lost and they become mere words devoid of all vital meaning. For did He not say, "He that believeth in me, the works that I do, shall he do also and greater works than these shall he do." John 14.12) This promise would be impossible of fulfilment if He was God, for we are not Gods. When we receive Jesus as a man like ourselves, then His words ring true, for He is one with us, and we know there is possibility of our becoming like unto Him and thereby do the works of the (continued on page three)

Jesus said, "God is Spirit and he who worchins Him must worship Him in Spirit and in Truth."

The Spirit of Truth is simply this. Man must identify himself with his father . . . must orientate and adjust his spiritual values until he is in attunement with the Infinite.

A late candidate for the United States Presidency wrote a book entitled, "One World." How true it is! There is only one world One God . . . One Great First Cause; by whatever name man attaches to his spiritual awareness.

Irrespective of creed, color or nationality, this Unchangeable force is immutable and illimitable!

Forms of government may change according to man's intellectual needs . . . his technological advances . . . his spiritual and cultural progress . . . but in no stage of his conscious unfoldment is he separated from Spirit.

Men in charge of world affairs must listen to the voice of The Prophet of the long ago, when he said, "Come — let us reason together." Spirit cannot be heard in the market place, nor in the confusion of uncontrolled emotions; but in the quiet stillness of the heart when it has been emptied of hate and the viciousness that would seek to destroy. spirits as He did.

Jesus never alludes to His birth as being miraculous. The virgin birth is not mentioned in Mark. It is ignored by John, while in Matthew and Luke it is recorded with conflicting details. Truth is reasonable, and that which is not in harmony with reason cannot be true. Truth is one, it never contradicts itself. One truth cannot contradict another truth. Error can contradict itself, so there can be many errors, all at variance with each other.

In being guided by a blind faith and not by the light of reason is like the great thinker, Tolstoi, so ably put it, "Man has received from God, only one instrument, wherein to know himself and to know his relation to the universe. He has so other, and that instrument is reason.

One thing is certain, no one can follow two masters. It is impossible to bring into unity the life and teachings of Jesus, with the creeds and theology created around Him by the Orthidox Church. It is a choice between creed and Jesus, between the church with its false theology or Jesus with His living message of truth. As Dr. Fosdick declared in one of his sermons — "If Jesus should come back right now, to hear the mythologies built around Him, see the creedalism denominationalism carried in His name; He would certainly say, 'If this is Christianity, I am not a Christian.'"

There are some Spiritualists today who are seeking to make the revelations of our great religion dove-tail into some of their pet views, on the theology of the church they have left. All true Spiritualists will defend the cause against any attempt to make Spiritualism in any way blend with the creedalism of the orthodox church. They will never allow the poison of dogma to be inoculated into the pure body of Modern Spiritualism.

That Jesus was a Spiritualist and a medium is revealed in His message and in His works. When He said, "I speak not of myself, but the Father that dwelleth in me, He does the works John 14.19). Then in the Spiritualist seance held on the mount. He demonstrated His powers as a medium. The account is in Matthew, Mark and Luke. Thus there are three of the four evangelists to testify to its occurrence. With Jesus in this seance were his three confidential disciples, Peter, James, and John. The materialized spirits were Moses and Elias.

Jesus said that after His death, the Spirit of Truth "Shall teach you all things and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you." (John 14.26). This was to be the Comforter. Now there is nothing in this world that has brought comfort to a sorrowing humanity like the religion of Spiritualism.

How clearly He reveals His knowledge of the spirit world, when He said, "In my father's house are many mansions," a statement which agrees perfectly with the information received through modern mediums concerning life in the spirit world. The text says, "Many mansions," not two or three different places, but many indicating a large number, many spheres, many planes, with many different kinds of work and accomplishments, without which eternity would be dull and unthinkable.

In giving a real comprehension of Jesus, Spiritualism emphasizes the value of His teachings. Jesus did not seek to organize a religion, He came to reveal a way of life, which if followed, would lead to a form of living in which love and peace would play a vital part. In His sermon in the mount, are found all the vital elements which make up His message, the great theme of which is the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of Man. The condition necessary to follow, to attain His way of life, are quite clearly laid down in this sermon.

We must be pure in heart, we must be merciful, we must live in harmony, we must serve God in deeds, not in words. In this great message do we find anything agout the fall of man? Nothing! Is there anything about the Virgin birth? Nothing! Or about the deity of Jesus? Nothing! Anything about three Gods in one? Nothing! How much of the orthodox creed? Nothing This message is so simple, a child can understand it. There is nothing mysterious or complex about it. It is but living the life of love and service and has absolutely nothing to do with the theology, the orthodox church teaches in His name.

The keynote of his message to the world lies in a single sentence, "I give you a commandment, that ye love one another." This one commandment, put into practice, would solve all the problems of this old conflict torn world. It would teach us to love more and hate less, for in love lies all the elements with which the higher life of peace and true power can be permanently created.


With Jesus, the attainment of the higher life is one of effort. He illustrates this fact so clearly in Matthew, when He declares "Whosoever heareth these sayings of mine and doeth them, I will liken unto a wise man, who built his house upon a rock. But every one that hearing these sayings of mine and doeth them not, shall be likened unto a foolish man, who built his house upon the sands."

It is plain, according to the teacher's own words, his religion is not one of form, of cere mony, of public prayer, but of effort, work, service, good deeds. His method of salvation is the rational one, the only one that thinking people can grasp as real, that man must work out his own salvation. No one else can do it for him. He is to do it for himself.

Jesus declared, "The Kingdom of God is within you" (Luke 17.21). It is kingdom of the spirit which dwells within man, that the religion of Spiritualism seeks to awaken in man. Therein lies the immortal essence of His being. What Spiritualism is accomplishing for its followers, is to make real once more the Divine outpouring of love, which Jesus manifested, but which the church reared in His name obscured. It is as though we stood once more among those who heard the Sermon on the Mount in all its wisdom, its beauty, the sweetness of His words. As the result; all the debris of false theology is swept away, of all the dreary conflict of creeds nothing remains, but the great message which fill our lives with love and truth.

In Spiritualism today are being reproduced the works of Jesus. In our great cause we find the prophecies and promises of this great Soul being fulfilled. For He declared. "Ye shall know them by their fruits" and "These signs shall follow them that believe." It is in the repetition of His works, that we find the vital essence of our relation to Him, besides which, tht acceptance of creed and dogma pales into insignificance.

Spiritualism not only reveals Jesus the man as he really was and is, but what is more important, it reveals the power of his message of the truths He uttered. In them and in them alone lies the supreme and potent power of salvation — a salvation that is neither begged or bought, but earned by effort, a religion the worship of which is effort, prayer put into practice, good thoughts, high aspirations, actualized in daily conduct.



Declaration of Principles

4. We affirm that the existence and personal identity of the individual continue after the change called death.


5. We affirm that communication with the so-called dead is a fact, scientifically proven by the phenomena of Spiritualism.

8. We affirm that the doorway to reformation is never closed against any human soul here or hereafter.

9. We affirm that the precept of Prophecy contained in the Bible is a Divine attribute proven through Mediumship.



MRS. LENORE E. PIPER

The data gathered for this article on the pioneer, Mrs. Lenore E. Piper, came from the "One Hundred Anniversary of Modern Spiritualism," compiled by Dr. Victoria Barnes, "The Survival of Man" and "Raymond," by Sir Oliver Lodge and from "Human Personality" by F. W. H. Myers.

Mrs. Lenore E. Piper, of Boston, Mass., was considered the most famous trance and writing medium, in the history of the Society for Psychical Research. Her mediumship became apparent when she was eight years of age, too young for her to understand the great work yet before her. She was married to Mr. William Piper in her twenty-second year and it was after this event that she became aware of her spiritual talents. It may be said that she was discovered by Professor William James in 1885 and she served the Psychic Society of England in 1889.

The first time trance occurred (as Mrs. Piper afterwards said) it came as an unwelcome surprise. An instance of this kind occurred at Cambridge, lasting about a minute, later on the time lengthened to an hour. In America and in England, those who have witnessed the work of Mrs. Piper, both in and out of trance, and capable of judging, all agree in affirming: (1) that many of the facts given in the trance state could not have been learned even by a skilled detective: (2) that to obtain the facts given would have taken time and an expenditure of money, both impossible for Mrs. Piper, and (3) that her conduct, never at any time, gave any ground whatsoever to suppose that she was capable of fraud or trickery. Few persons have been so carefully tested as Lenore Piper, she convinced all observers with her candor, honesty, and through uprightness of character.


March, 1892, Dr. Richard Hodgson, Professor William James anl Mr. W. F. H. Myers, reported much evidence tending to prove the identity of the source of the manifestations in spirit. Important private matters were brought to their attention at various sittings which they alone knew about, while references were made concerning incidents unknown to them at that time and which later were proved to be true. Dr. Hodgson had Mr. and Mrs. Piper watched or "shadowed" by private detectives for some weeks with the view to discover whether Mrs. Piper (at that time employed in a large Boston store) went about inquiring into the affairs of possible sitters, or whether Mrs. Piper received letters from friends or agents conveying infor mation. It was proven to the satisfaction of all concerned that Mrs. Piper made no attempt to acquire knowledge, even about persons whom she had reason to expect would come to sit with her.

Mrs. Piper's trance may be divided into three stages: (1) where the dominant controlling personality who was known as "Dr. Phinuit" and later called "Rector," controlled the vocal organ almost exclusively, communications were mainly by automatic writing, while in trance, under the direction, more particularly of the control known as "George Pelham," or as "G. P.", although Dr. Phinuit also communicated by speech during this period, 1892-1896; (3) where supervision is alleged to be exercised by Doctor, Rector, and others, with the communications mainly by writing and occasionally by speech.

In some of Mrs. Pipers work two or more spirits would simultaneously control different portions of the organism, in other instances there was no utterance as a rule, or at least no prolonged utterance, by the automatist's own spirit, but there was either writing or utterance during the trance state.

It may be in the knowledge of some individuals that in the year 1901, absurd, misleading articles appeared in the American press, and were copied by some English papers, that Mrs. Piper said, "I intend to give up the work I have been doing as I do not believe that the spirits of the dead have spoken through me when I have been in the trance state, it may be that they have but I do not affirm it."

Dr. Richard Hodgson, on October 25th, 1905, says that Mrs. Piper dictated the following statement to a representative of his: "I did not make any such statement as that published in the New York Herald to the effect that spirits of the departed do not control me, my



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opinion is today as it was eighteen years ago; spirits of the departed may have controlled me and they may not. I confess I do not know, I have not changed, I make no change in my relations.

While Miss Robbins was having a sitting with Mrs. Piper in Greenfield, New Hampshire, August 8th, 1915, Miss Alta Piper (daughter of Mrs. Piper) sent the original script to Sir Oliver Lodge, which said, "that some blow is going to fall, or likely to fall" the other message said "that all is not well or has been". Sir Oliver Lodge said "the above message reached me near the beginning of Sept. in Scot. Raymond, my son was killed near Ypres on Sept. 14th., 1915 a fallen or a falling tree is a frequent symbol of death (Eccl. 11,3.) and "that all is not well and has been", but this was too indefinite to lead Lodge to understand the warning, given three days later, about the falling tree, this happened two days before Raymond's death. Sir Oliver Lodge has said of Mrs. Piper, "concerning the particular means by which she acquires the different kinds of information, I can only say with certainty, that it is by none of the ordinary methods known to Physical Science."

Buffalo, New York

Mona Berry, will conduct the services. Special afternoon and evening services are planned for the 20th Anniversary of the church on Sept. 20th. Rev. Raymond E. Burns, of Stamford, Conn., is to be guest speaker for this very special occasion, visiting ministers will serve as clairvoyants for this service. The church ladies are planning a sumptuous dinner to be served between the afternoon and the evening. The choir, always a special feature of this church, will be at their best under the direction of the Rev. Louise Orr, choir director.

Austin, Texas

The First Spiritualist Church of Austin, has had the honor to be served by the Rev. Jennie Cervin, of Taylor, as guest speaker. Her many friends were so happy to see her so well and quickly recovered from her recent severe illness.

El Paso, Texas

At the First Spiritualist Church of El Paso, Texas, we have had an unusual privilege, that of having as a visitor, Sr. Antonio Grasso, of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. He is doing some work for his government at Fort Bliss and in his leisure time he is gathering information and ideas concerning the work of the Spiritualist movement in the United States.

Sr. Grasso has been a Spiritualist for about fourteen years and is connected with the group in Rio de Janeiro. He is a teacher and lecturer; when he mentions the work of Spiritualism his face shines with enthusiasm, giving a look of strength to his whole body.

Since it was impossible for him or Rev. Halstead to ask and answer all the questions in their minds at our regular meetings, by a special arrangement we spent three very inspiring hours in the mutual exchange of ideas and information.

Previously Sr. Grasso had prepared a list of questions to which Rev. Halstead had written the answers; but he had more questions concerning the structure of our organization and words such as "controls," "guides," etc. These were answered to his satisfaction and he made notes of the explanation and the Portugese equivalent. Then he answered our questions concerning the framework of their organization and their historical background. The Portugese Spiritualists consider Allan Kardec as the patron of the movement and recently the Brazilian Government honored the Espiritistas with a centennial commemorative postage stamp.

All Spiritualist work in Brazil operates un der an organizatiin known as Federacao Espirita Barsileira. The governing body is called the Directory which has representatives elected from all the states.

This body has its own publishing house which publishes the magazine, "Reformer," founded in 1883 and also the books of the Spiritualist writers. I examined the December issue of "Reformador," which was a 36 page edition with pages the size of "The National Spiritualist." There were fifteen contributing writers and numerous articles signed by the spirit control and the controlled medium.

The magazine advertises books on several pages. The most prolific writer is Francisco Xavier (his control calls himself "Emmanuel"). Francisco Xavier has the gift of automatic writing and he began to write in 1932. His formal education was very meager but the quality and scope of his work is phenomenal. He now has about sixty books to his credit and there is no casual explanation for the brilliance of his writing.

The Federacao Espirita Brasileira also has a great program of social assistance which includes work in hospitals, orphanages, schools, assistance to widows, medical service, moral and spiritual assistance.

This association has as its dedication — God - CHRIST - CHARITY. This inscription appears on all the written work. This group aids in all spiritual education work for the move, ment in Brazil, having courses and literature for teaching use. They have also put part of their literature for teaching use. They have also put part of their literature in Esperanto (an international language) for distribution where Portugese is not used.

This central association is self-supporting and draws no revenue from the state associations and independent churches. It acts only as an inspiration and guide. It imposes nothing on the associations or churches but gives assistance when called upon.

Next are the state associations and independend Spiritualist centers. Their work is the same as the parent body with the exception of the publication. They are organized under the Directory which is elected by the members.

There are smaller associations organized on the same plan where the work can be done better in a smaller group.

Next is the individual church and Sr. Grasso used as illustration the church in Rio de Janeiro where he has his affiliation. It is under an elected Directory which provides a place for meeting and schedules the various activities.

Their work has three divisions — social assistance, youth meetings and the regular meeting. The social assistance work consisted of hospital work of comfort and inspiration as well as physical care, and a program of help for the poor in money and food and clothing.

The youth meeting had its own Directory and had a study program and fund raising activities which financed other activities of the church. The young people put on plays and fiestas. They keep their young people happy by keeping them busy.

The regular meeting is used for development of mediums; preaching which is done by those inspired to talk; healing and spiritual charity.

Rev. Halstead asked Sr. Grasso concerning certification of workers. He said there was no certification of workers — a person desiring to lecture asked the Directory for a place on the schedule of services and the Directory placed his name in a service if they feel he had sincerity and ability to do what he requested to do.

The healing service follows the preaching. The healers do not touch the person being treated and the healer faces the patient and uses some passes into the aura of the person being treated.


Another group work for the spirits who need help in the spirit world. This is a specially selected and dedicated group.

Sr. Grasso mentioned other writers. Zilda Gama has written a romantic book dictated by the spirit of Victor Hugo. This book has been translated and published in Esperanto. Yvone Pereira has two books on suicide. They were dictated by the spirit of a famous Portugese who committed suicide. He spent his time in darkness and then he tells of his education in the spirit world from his emerging from darkness until the present. Leon Denise is their recognized writer on reincarnation.

Sr. Grasso took the addresses of all the Spiritualist churches in El Paso and he will visit as many as he can. Once a year all the churches meet together on the anniversary of Modern Spiritualism in March but the united meeting had already taken place before his visit.

His visit was inspiring to us and perhaps in some way we can pass on the inspiration of our Brazilian brother in the beautiful work of Spiritualism.

Your superintendent is wrestling with the problem of trying to produce a new set of Lyceum lesson leaflets for classes of various ages, and also instructions for teachers.

However, the finest material in the world is of little avail, even in the hands of good teachers, if there is not a feeling and atmosphere of love between teacher and student.

The objective and goal of the Lyceum teaching is not a catechism of certain questions and answers in the intellect, but a spontaneous unfoldment of the spiritual faculties.

Before searching for new material, the greatest possible use should be made of the old, to be sure we are aware of and are using its full resources. The Spiritualist Lyceum Manual is filled with fundamental lessons for all ages, including Spiritualist interpretations of the Bible by Moses Hull, for those who need them. In addition, Miss Verna Kuhlig, former National Superintendent, painstakingly and thoughtfully listed a suggested reference reading for those who would become Lyceum teachers. I wonder how many of you have read the books suggested in the Lyceum Manual.

How many of you have ordered from the Beacon Press, 25 Beacon St.. Boston, Massachusetts, those two wonderful books, "Todays Children and Yesterdays Heritage," and .'Consider the Children, how they Grow?"

How many of you have read pages 36 to 46 of the Lyceum Officers Manual, for practical suggestions to reach the mind, heart and attention of children of various age groups. How many have read the Catechism of Spiritualism by W. J. Colville? We believe these new lessons represent the best material currently available for teaching children and young people the science, philosophy and religion of Spiritualism. However, the success of the material depends upon the teachers ability to adapt, interpret, improvise and adjust to the varying needs of each individual child.

Natural entry to the spiritual resources of the child mind is gained through love, kindness, reason and confidence, and not through fear, anger, force, impatience or superstition.

Spiritualism still stands as the forerunner and the most advanced religious thought, not appreciated by those who are not ready to think for themselves in religion. The Lyceums start with the wholesome beginning that children are born in love, not sin, and have a divine heritage, which if fully understood and developed, is capable of all the redemption they will ever need.

Therefore, the success of true spiritual teaching cannot be determined by set, fixed answers children may give to indocrination, but an intimate appraisal, often impossible in the known presence of adults, of the change and growth of innermost feelings toward Life and Nature. Truth is already within them and with them, they need but to be guided. Real learning is more maturation than teaching.

We teach them that when fully understood, Death is not any more a fearsome thing than Birth. When mediumship is fully developed, communication and continuity with different vibratory realms is natural and real, not strange and doubtful.

Article IX — INTELLIGENCE

"It is better to understand a little than to misunderstand a lot," said Anatole France; and the Bible has it, "Withall thy getting, get un derstanding." Real Spiritualists improve their use of intelligence to increase their own knowledge and to help them deliver and interpret that knowledge to others.

The use of intelligence is well illustrated by the oldest and rather amusing detective story known as "Bel and the Dragon." No older detective is known in all the world, we are told. It took place during the reign of King Cyrus, when the Daniel of the Bible was his helper and in Babylonia. At the time of the Jewish captivity, the Babylonians had a huge image of an idol called Bel they worshipped and to whom they offered daily 12 bushels of fine flour, 40 sheep and 50 gallons of wine. They believed Bel devoured all this; but Daniel told Cyrus that the idol was only clay inside and bronze outside and ate and drank nothing. These words made Cyrus angry. He called the priests to tell them they must show him who ate these provisions or die. Likewise the same words were spoken to Daniel. The 70 priests of Bel replied, by asking King Cyrus to place the usual offering before the god, shut the temple door and seal it with his signet ring. The king agreed to do this. But after the food was placed before Bel, and the priests had retired, Daniel got the King's permission to have serv-ants scatter ashes all over the temple floor. Then the king himself sealed the door. Danielknew through his clairvoyant powers that the priests had a secret opening under the table in the temple by which they and their families could enter unobserved and eat and drink nightly of the offerings to Bel.

In the morning King Cyrus, with Daniel, came to the temple, broke the seal and opened the door. Since there was no offering to be seen, he thought for the moment that the god had devoured it. But Daniel called attention to the footprints of men, women, and children all over the temple floor. When Daniel showed him the secret door through which they came to eat the food and dring the wine, Cyrus called the priests and had them put to death and turned the igol, Bel, over to Daniel who destroyed it and the temple.

Intelligence comprises readiness of comprehension, understanding, discernment, penetration, discrimination, sharp-wittedness, and the ability to exercise high mental powers.

One of the well-known fables of Aesope illustrates intelligence in a crow that was half dead with thirst. The bird came to a pitcher that once had been full of water, but now there was but little in the bottom of the pitcher and out of his reach. The poor bird was about to give up when a thought came to him. He took a pebble and dropped it into the pitcher, then another and another for a long time. At last he saw the water mount nearer to him, and after casting in a few more pebbles he was able to quench his thirst.

In contrast to this incident is that of an employee who accidentally locked himself into a refrigerator car. Unable to escape or attract attention, he resigned himself to his fate. As he felt himself become numb and wishing to record the story of his approaching death, he scribbled on the walls of the car, "I feel my body growing numb." He wrote, "I am becoming colder, slowly freezing. I am half asleep — these may be my last words." When the car was opened, the man was found dead, but the temperature in the car was 58 degrees. The refrigeration unit was out of order, but there was sufficient air in the car and the man had not suffocated. There was no physical reason for his death — he was the victim of an illusion.

The really intelligent Spiritualist knows he has to guard the doors of the mind, or imagination or false ideas may cause his decease. If one can control his thoughts he can control his destiny, for the mind is the rudder that steers the ship of life. "It is when Fate destines one to ruin," says James Fraser, "it begins by blinding the eyes of the understanding."

But with all one's best intelligence and right thinking, the real Spiritualist does what Jacob, in the Old Testament, advised his sons to do when they were preparing to go into Egypt to buy food in famine times. Jacob said, "Take the best fruit of the land to the man as a present and take a little honey." When people are disagreeable and hard to get along with, they have run out of "honey," so to speak. A part of intelligence is to be sympathetic, understanding, sweet, attractive. joyous. People can carry "honey" in their faces, hearts, and in their actions. They can speak a kind word, do a helpful act, and give away some of their "honey." There are many that are fainting, faltering, and perishing for a little bit of understanding. A bit of the "honey" of discernment will sweeten somebody's sorrow, brighten his ioneliness, comfort his sadness and hearten him in his depression. Figuratively speaking, the good intelligent Spiritualist will carry a "little honey" with him at all times.
