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Why is the word Spiritualism so Misunderstood?

Words are symbols of ideas, and probably there is no word in the English language so misunderstood and misrepresented by the masses as the word

Spiritualism.

Negatively, Spiritualism is not spiritism, nor ecclesiasticism, nor materialism, whatever the word matter may mean. But affirmatively, Spiritualism is the direct opposite of atheistic materialism and sectarian ecclesiasticism. It is a science, a philosophy and a religion.

This misunderstanding of the truths and the aims of Spiritualism is largely due to the theological priesthood and the public press, which, sad to say, is oftener a popular reflector rather than a righteous educator. It is our heartfelt prayer that they both may speedily repent and

reform.

The root meaning of this great word Spiritualism is clearly traced to God, who is pure, immanent and immutable Spirit. "God is Spirit," said Jesus Christ; therefore, God being Spirit,

Spiritualism, centering in and originating from God, becomes a most inspiring, a most sacred and holy word, the moral scale run-Spirit, spiritual, ning thus: spirituality, spiritual mindness, Spiritualism—the ISM referring and relating to its main doctrines, the Father-Motherhood of God, the Brother-Sisterhood of all races, the innate divinity of Man. the immutability of Law, the present day Ministry of Spirits, the guardian care of Angels, the necessity of Holiness, the importance of Prayer, the beauty of Faith, the sweetness of Charity, the grace of Religion, and unbounded Trust in God-the absolute embodiment of Love, Wisdom and Will.

The practical results of Spiritualism were clearly expressed by the Apostle James, "The fruit of the Spirit is Love, Joy and Peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness and temperance." Spiritualism is God's great word, and Spiritualists are the only religionists who have and use the

promised gifts of the Christ, by which gifts they heal the sick, and demonstrate a future conscious and progressive existence.

Neither priest nor press should uncharitably speak of or touch this holy word Spiritualism, only with clean hands and pure hearts; and Spiritualists themselves should honor their blessed gospel of immortality by such righteous lives as to induce multitudes to say, "Behold the lives of these people who see the etherialized forms of spiritual beings, who hear heavenly voices and who walk and talk with angels." In this throbbing, selfish and warring world there are but few real Spiritualists, for as of old, "Straight is the gate, narrow is the way and few there be that find

The philosophy of Spiritualism, being all inclusive, is in perfect consonance with the Hindu philosophy, with the religion of the oriental adepts, with the Christianity of the Christ meeting, unifying and satisfying humanity's holiest and highest heartfelt aspirations.

From what cometh the first of anything?

Science has yet to answer this question. It understands much of the geometric pattern of matter, but falls short in creating something out of nothing.

Regardless of how involved our pursuit of knowledge becomes or profound our philosophy, one simple truth remains consistent -- the creation of the universe and its evolvement reflects order, unification and mathematical

progression.

No manifestation, regardless of its appearance or impact, escapes the universal plan. There are no supernatural exceptions. The word supernatural finds meaning only in the dictionary. It represents an attempt to define the inexplainable. It is given expression by many who seek reality beyond their conscious understanding.

Physics and chemestry --- the governing laws under which man and matter function are merely espressions of Infinite Intelligence or Natural Law. All knowledge and all occurrences follow specific laws. Man acts upon the understanding he has gained. The Laws of Nature are at his disposal and are the governing laws of life. We are judged in the manner we choose to apply them to our world and life. "We make our own happiness or unhappiness as we obey or disobey Nature's Laws."

But there is another who said it better. He was Enoch Fitch Burr, a 17th century theologian and mathematician.

"On the earth's surface, in its dark interior, in the air and vault above, in the instant present and the ancient past -- everywhere, law waves its mighty scepter. Atoms and masses, the ponderables and the imponderables, the organic and inorganic, the living and dead -- all are evidently subjected in their modes of being and action to fixed rules,

sometimes particular, but more often covering whole classes or objects. Not a particle floats at random or as a unit; not a leaf grows or falls save according to rigid general principles of science.

"All Chemical elements have their modes and measures of combination to which they steadfastly adhere. All heat, electricity, magnetism, gravity, act according to abiding methods which philosophers have discovered gradually arranged into the sciences of natural philosophy. The great processes of vegetable and animal life proceed after the same forms and step from age to age. The stone beds of the world are formed and modified in ways which are the same now as in the periods anterior to man.

"Even the weather, so often called fickle, has its stable methods: almost every year bringing to light some new general fact in meteorology, or extending the application of an old one. Day and night succeed each other every twenty-four hours, without variation. The seasons do not change their order or general character. All of Kepler's and Newton's laws are as operative today as they have ever been since their discovery. The planets shoot around the sun and are circled by their own moons, on substantially the same elliptical orbits, in the same times and with the same principles of alternate retardation and acceleration as of old. All known changes in the planetary orbits have been found to be bound in a law of periodicity which is apparently invariable. So beyond the solar system. Law still, nothing but law, law everywhere on ten thousand blazing thrones, largely the same laws that prevail in our own system. As far as we can observe -- and it is so little that has been

observed -- those distant orbs reverence the various principles of gravitation and mechanics, and keep as rigidly to their behests, as when the earliest astronomer gazed at them from his rude uranienberg of a hill top. And every man of science is well persuaded that could his observation alight on particular orbs of those remote and twinkling hosts, he would find their minutest detail bound up in the chains of the same adamantine regularity that rules our own globe."

Many new and exciting discoveries in astronomy and atomic physics have taken place since Burr's passing in 1907, and yet not one of his comments can

be questioned.

Many religions are judged by their impact on society, and by their psychological significance. Seldom though is a religion measured directly as in the case of Spiritualism. Much of this religion's following has come about because it dares to be held accountable. It dares to be put to the test.

Much of the general public regards Spiritualism as a relatively new religion cloaked in mysticism. Often it is cited as one of the new esoteric schools of theology. The description hardly fits. The religion is truely ancient as are many of its practices. Mediumistic aspects Spiritualism can be traced back to the Celts and Druids...tribes which existed in a time paralleling the dawn of civilized growth in Europe...a time before England was little more than all empty stretch of land.

Somehow Spiritualism has failed to establish its place. It is filled with mediumship and mysticism by the casual onlooker.

Spiritualism offers so much more. Yet, there are marked differences from the accepted Christian teachings. But the

Mini book review

Universal Spiritualism

by W. J. Coleville

Copyrighted in 1906. Published by R.F. Fenns and Co., New Y_{0rk} City

Coleville gives a birds eye view of ancient and modern Spiritualism, illustrating the truth behind the famous saying, "There's nothing new under the sun".

Part of the book is devoted to a discussion on selflessness vs. selfpreservation. A entire chapter provides enlightenment on spiritual philosophies of ancient Egypt, Jewish immortality, and Kabala. It covers Persian theories of the soul, Greek and Roman views of life, the Hundu conception of the soul, Vedanta philosophy, Scandinavian beliefs, Mohammedan views of the soul, conceptions in China and Japan, the ancient Jew and early Christian idea of the soul, and news of communication and psychical research in Europe. Another chapter destroys popular fallacies and instructs in spiritual mediumship.

Coleville also finds room to expond on the writings of Charles W. Leadbeater, a psychic who claimed he had visited the heavens.

The book concludes with Spiritualism in all lands. It carries an address by Dr. J.M. Peebles, who writes, "If Spiritualism means conversing with departed mortals, then it is as ancient as remotest antiquity."

Coleville manages to inject descriptions which keep the book moving.

Historical footnotes Keep

Editorial, New York Sun Jan. 5, 1921

Dr. Hereward Carrington has opened an interesting field for discussion and speculation with his statement that a laboratory properly equipped with physical apparatus, principally electrical and photographic devices, for intensive study of psychic and mediumistic phenomena would enable American scientists to reach some defininte conclusions within ten years as to the possibility of communications with the dead. Certainly, it must be admitted, regardless of one's belief or disbelief in Spiritualism or the phenomena generally associated with it, that the possibilities of such investigations are as boundless as they are

In this matter of investigating psychic and occult phenomena, the United States has been leisurely.... but, with the exception of Dr. Carrington--and recently, Thomas A. Edison-there is no notable person in the United States, since the death of William James, Professor Hyslop and Dr. Richard Hodgson, who studied the subject from purely scientific point of view.

In Europe, where the great war gave a tremendous impetus to the study of psychic phenomena and where millions are hoping that there may be some means of communicating with the many who died on the battlefields, psychic phenomena are being investigated by men of great scientific learning and repute such as Dr. Imoda, Professor Mosso and Dr Paul Joire. At the time of his death, Professor Curie was busy devising an instrument which would register and direct psychic energy liberated from the body of a medium in trance. In France, England, Poland, Spain, Italy and even Japan there exist loday well endowed societies which are establishing and equipping laboratories as fast as the proper instruments and machines are invented.

Initial studies have been made by scientists under the direction of the Paris Psychological To the layman, Institute. perhaps, the most interesting and suggestive of these is an experiment made by Dr. Imoda in the discharge of an electroscope by means of rays emanting from the body of a medium. As a result of these experiments Dr. Imoda has concluded that the radiations radium, the cathode radiations of the Crookes tubes and the radiations from the body of the medium are fundamentally the same.

Dr. Carrington points out that man never would have arrived at his present knowledge of the structure of the universe and understand the laws which govern its operations had it not been for instruments now employed by the chemist and the physicist. This probably applies as well to the investigation of psychic phenomena as it does to natural and study psychic phenomena and., yes, even happiness. with instruments more delicate these forces operate.

Mediumship has ancient sisters--Greek **Oracles**

For a considerable time Spiritualists have been calling attention to the resemblance between modern psychic phenomena and that recorded in the Bible. The intention is obvious.

Perhaps it's because there are no pagans nowadays, subject to conversion, that we have not tried to compare our phenomena with similar experiences of classical times. Whatever the reason, it is almost impossible to find a book that throws any light on the supernormal phenomena of Greece from the Spiritualist viewpoint.

We have read of Socrates and his daemon, which has been called his conscience and guiding spirit. It is also known that Plotinus had an apparatus somewhat similar to the present Ouija board. The device consisted of the alphabet spelled around a bowl, above which was suspended a free swinging pendulum. Under a guiding influence the device would spell out messages.

The Phoenicians had their oracles, as did the Egyptians and Babylonians. Even the natives of the Fiji Islands have their sanctuary for communication with departed loved ones. But the Grecian oracles have come in for more comment because of their great influence upon the affairs of the nation and its people.

Few of us know what the oracles were. They were not myths. They were places where people could go to communicate with the gods, and be advised on their future welfare or that of the nation. The advice was given by a priestess of the oracle, who could interpret supernatural signs. Occasionally, direct communication through the medium was even possible. The oracles were chambers where mediums sat to give messages.

Existing records indicate that there were about 260 oracles during the period from 700 B.C. to

300 A.D. At first these oracles were dedicated to fetish worship. Each sanctuary was supposedly inhabited by a discarnate spirit which served as a guide and provided the priestess with the

information she sought.

The oracles were always situated in high places, very often being built over a cleft in a mountain, through which would come volcanic gases or vapors from a subterranean stream. It is supposed that these vapors were used to put the priestess in a trance. The oracles were always small chambers of stone, built with the doors facing west. Any individual desiring contact had to approach from the east.

Some of the oracles were careful to impress upon those seeking their favor the importance of choosing an appropriate time and condition. The Pythia at Delphi used to announce the proper time by a flaming torch. One oracle implored the communicant not to insist upon a message, saying that under forced conditions the advice could not be relied upon. This is strikingly reminiscent of Eusapia Palladino's request to test her with the upmost care lest she resort to fraud under unfavorable circumstances.

Plutarch says that Pythia gave unerring counsel. But Plutarch did not put much faith in the oracle. He cited the priestess with having much personal knowledge of the affairs of men.

The majority of the people of Greece believed implicity in the words of the oracles, and Socrates was put to death because of his failure to honor the gods. Strange such is fate. Just a few years before his death, Socrates was described by Pythia as the wisest man alive.

It is recorded that one great test was made as to the reliability of the oracles. The test was conducted by Croesus, King of Lydia.

Croesus desired to conduct an

expedition against Cyrus, the Persian emperor, but wanted to consult the oracle first to receive the sanction of the gods. He sent six messengers to as many oracles with instructions that on the hundredth day hereafter they were to inquire what he, Croesus. was doing.

Four of the oracles failed in the test. And one was partly right. The pythian oracle at Delphi was entirely correct, stating that Croesus was engaged in broiling a lamb and a tortoise together in a copper vessel with a copper lid. The King was so impressed with the message that he sent many messengers to Delphi with wonderful gifts.

Replying to the momentous question asked by Croesus regarding his expedition, the Pythia said: "Croesus, if he cross the Halys, shall undo a mighty realm." The King believed this answer to be favorable to his desire. He crossed the Halys, started his expedition, and did undo a mighty realm. It was his own.

There is also grim humor in the action of certain Boetian merchants who visited the oracle at Dodona. It told them that the success of their venture would be assured if they would do the most impious thing that they could imagine. It followed that they threw the priestess of the oracle into a caldron of boiling water.

The one outstanding feature in which the oracles differed from our present day mediums is in the influence and position they held. For nearly a thousand years before they were subdued by the new revelation and the political sword of Christianity, the oracles exerted a wonderful power and directing influence over an entire nation. Porphyry believed that it was the oracles which had directed the destiny of

Progression-it's tomorrow's food

Progression is a most potent, unvarying law. greatest hope of achievement within the universe. The law of gravitation, which brought to ground Newton's famous apple, is here, and the time is now. not more unerring than is the spiritual attraction upward, the impulse, the urge of every living thing to advance, to unfold, to grow, to ripen and bear fruit, each after its own kind. 



A detailed description, recounting Lincoln's first sitting is recorded in Nettie Colburn Maynard's book, "Was Abraham Lincoln a Spiritualist" which was first published in 1917 and revised in 1956.

TNS expresses its gratitude to the spiritualist Press in Old Bailey, London for the recorded information of a remarkable character, which continues to have a marked bearing upon the history of spiritualism and upon the literature of the day."

On an evening in December 1862, a Mrs. Laurie and her daughter, Mrs. Miller, together with a very young lady - Miss Nettie Colburn were assembled at the Red Parlour of the White House. Mrs. Lincoln had invited The President was not them. present when they arrived. While Mrs. Lincoln was talking with them Mrs. Miller began playing the piano. Very forcely did the strains of the grand march echo throughout. All at once the music stopped and President Lincoln entered the room.

Introductions were made and a few brief questions relating to the forming of the circle. Quickly Nettie lost all consciousness of her surroundings and passed under control. For more than an hour serious matters of State were Mr. Lincoln was discussed. charged with the most solemnity and force of manner when the discussion turned to the forthcoming Emancipation Proclamation. He was instructed not to delay its enforcement as a law; not to abate its terms, and was urged that all should be carried out by the first of the year. "He was assured that it was to be the crowning event of his administration and his life; and, that while he was being counselled by strong parties to defer the enforcement of it, that they were hoping to supplant it by other measures and to delay action. 'He must in no way heed such counsel, but stand firm to his and convictions fearlessly perform the work and fulfill the mission for which he had been raised up by an overruling Providence'." Such was the majesty of the utterance, the strength and force of the language, and the importance of that which was conveyed by the

strong masculine spirit force giving speech to almost divine commands, that those present lost sight of the timid girl- Nettie. "I shall never forget the scene around me when I regained consciousness. I was standing in front of President Lincoln, and he was sitting back in his chair, with his arms folded upon his breast, looking intently at me."

Some of the men present had a quiet discussion with Mr. Lincoln and after a little while he turned to me. Laying his hand upon my head he uttered these words in a manner I shall never forget: "My child, you possess a very singular gift; but that it is of God, I have no doubt. I thank you for coming here tonight. It is more important than perhaps any one present can understand. I must leave you all now; but I hope I shall see you again."

On March 7, 1891 the following was published in the Banner of Light. It was published from a letter by Hudson Tuttle included this statement regarding Colburn Nettie (Maynard). "For the last three years of the war she was constantly consulted by President Lincoln, and the communications he received through her were of the astonishing character. The results of battles were foretold before the telegraphic dispatches, and on several occasions advice was given and accepted which, acted on, proved momentous consequence."

Socrates and Spiritualism

We are indebted to the Greek nhilosopher Plato for his reconstruction of the dialogues of Socrates under whom Plato studied. Socrates was born about 470 years before Jesus of Nazerath. He was of humble origin. In his time he was a stone cutter and an Athenian soldier. He lacked educational advantages and yet became imbued with the idea that he had a mission in life that affected his fellow man. He became noted for his highly advanced teachings far beyond the thinking of his times. in many respects he performed in a Christlike manner.

Socrates held fast to the idea that man had a soul which was more of a reality than his physical body and that a virtuous life was of inestimable value to the individual following death of the

physical body.

Many of the educated of his time advocated that conduct which was opportune was the acceptable way of life. Socrates said that because of the soul this was unacceptable. He did not make clear what the existance of the soul after death was like but he believed that it somehow could influence physical man.

was unquestionably mediumistic claiming a voice which did not command him, but when a decision was to be made between several courses of action, It merely forbid any one course of action which transgressed justice. It resulted in his being a kindly individual of great integrity.

He was most noted for his school of inquiry to determine precisely why people thought as they did on a particular subject and attempted to prove to them why they may be in error. He demonstrated that people are psychologically inclined to justify their opinions too often through selfish motivation rather than to that which is just and true. His

penetration was marvelous -indication of his another

mediumship.

Socrates never wavered from his pursuit of knowledge, truth and justice. He insisted that truth and justice must remain pure and untainted by any distortion from changes by individuals. Many alternatives were discussed as a profitable way of life. According to the arguments of learned men of the time who favored opportunism, it is easy to see how some of our present politicians must think.

Socrates tended to prove that a way of life that was detrimental to others in any respect could not be regarded as successful and that it was inimical to the soul of the individual. He even held this same extreme view that it would have been unethical to attempt to save his own life when he was officially condemned according to the code of law of the times.

The innovative democracy of the Greeks was criticized by Socrates as being more of a rule of opinion and less a rule knowledge. He was able to demonstrate that opinions of the common people were usually distorted because of ignorance. He thought that a more intelligent rule could be attained through specially trained individuals in a system which he called a republic. Under this system no official could prosper financially -- an idea worthy of rumination in these modern times.

Socrates taught that there are different kinds of learning. "Perceiving that something is so is one thing, but understanding why something is so is more in the way of knowledge. The seen object can be destroyed but an idea can be more permanent and therefore may be more of a reality."

According to Plato, Socrates told of referring to a woman by the name of Diotima who im-

parted considerable wisdom to him. It is not clear if she was a medium, oracle or spirit guide.

Here are some of the ideas that Socrates advocated. "Good is the fundamental concept that underlies all thinking. If we have no conception of good we possess no sense of values. Without a sense of value we cannot attain consequential knowledge. We see by the light of the sun. We understand by the light of good."

"You cannot put knowledge into the soul, for the capacity to know is already there but attention needs to be turned toward the light. Wisdom and temperance are of a similar nature." In other words self control and moderation are essential to the development of the individual. "Our physical senses reveal a world of particulars but as we ascend up the scale of knowledge into a more universal concept we also ascend the scale of reality."

Though Socrates admired the art of Homer and similar poets he was critical of their negative influence. It was characteristic of the poets of the day to write tragedy or epic stories in which they imbued the gods with very worldly qualities. The populace felt that they had license to emulate them. Socrates thought it was a bad influence and that it should be more uplifting. In later times the creative art of poetry became more diverse and most often uplifting.

It was only natural that Socrates was influenced in part by previous philosophers. He espoused the theory that there were only so many souls and that these were used over and over again, but there were enough to spread periodicity extending to one thousand years. It hardly took into account the actuality of a population explosion such as the world is presently experiencing.

In dialogues with Phaedo Socrates explains that in this



The body, mind and spirit of the child should be drawn forth progressively, educated in all the ways of love and wisdom".

The Magic Staff, which is the story of Mr. Davis' life is one of his most interesting works. He wrote at least 30 books. The "Poughkeepsie Seer" should be called the "John The Baptist of Spiritualism".

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
