



Facing Moments of Truth

Many times in your life you will be called upon to face up to moments of truth which teach you about yourself and others around you. How you handle these responsibilities help mold your future growth as a person.

A moment of truth is a learning experience. It is defined as the quality of being true (to yourself); the quality of being in accordance with

experience, facts or reality.

Actually, they're opportunities. Although the result is often a confrontation, each moment of truth represents a learning experience. Occasionally, the by-product is a small, internal glimmer that things need to be changed. Confrontation with realization can prove extremely rewarding. It can speed your personal development by forcing upon you a situation that calls for a quick and precise conclusion. Growth is not always pleasant. On occasion, it may be necessary though less than joyful.

Moments of truth shear away the insulation which often allows us to deceive ourselves. It forces realization of the problem in terms one

cannot always ignore.

Moments of truth are presented nearly every time one must make a decision. A very young child may find he is not bright or as comely as other members of his family or friends at school. Children need to be taught how to deal with moments in a positive fashion, if they are to live full and happy lives.

Today adolescents and young people face many significant moments of truth in dealing with lying, stealing, the drug scene, sex, and various other problems. A sad commentary about some of the young came while I was talking to a saleslady in one of the dresshops that I frequent. She spoke of a young lady who after being caught for stealing, informed her that one

of the initiation processes into high school was for each student to steal \$100 worth of mer-

chandise from local shops.

To me, as a teacher for the past thirteen years, one of the main things that many of today's young people either have forgotten or failed to learn is that they must eventually face the consequences or responsibilities for their actions. Now I realize the judicial system and other involved agencies are partially responsible for this by the kinds of laws established to protect young people's rights. However, I think we must stand back and take a look at what is happening. The rights of young people must be protected, true, but young people must be taught that there are certain responsibilities which go along with their rights and freedoms.

One of the things that really make it tough for young people in their decisions about lying, stealing, drugs and sex is the pressure of the peer group. This is definitely one of the barriers, as they view it. I witness it in my class daily. Those who are regarded as squares, or part of the establishment are made fun of, picked on, and ousted from the group. It is better to be a square now and have less problems with ones life

later.

Another important moment of truth for people is when they decide to get married. The choice of a mate is one of the decisions in life we should be the most careful about. We need to know ourselves through and through and to know our future mates as well as possible before embarking on this life-long journey.

Many people have such a flippant attitude about marriage. They seem to think that if it doesn't work, divorce will. Problems should be approached headon and resolved quickly. It never hurts to compromise if the end result is a

better future for all concerned.

Another equally important, but devastating moment of truth that has to be faced by many is that of losing a mate through death or divorce. If you love somebody deeply and you lose them, eventually you must face up to the situation and decide what you are going to do next with the hours in your life and how you are going to handle the future.

No one ever promised that life would be a rose garden free of problems. Sometimes it takes sheer guts and all the inner fortitude you can muster to deal with crisis such as these. It is incidents such as these that prove the real character builders and create opportunities to

offer a chance for individual growth.

Another moment of truth arises for parents who have children who behave differently than they did. They complain that they cannot understand why their children are turning out so radical. Even parents who have had the good fortune to raise healthy, little angels experience

anxiety on occasion. The task of parenthood is trying. It's filled with many lessons, often more for the parents than the children...success, love and understanding come hard, but last a life time.

The tendency to find a solution, perhaps only postponement, is no where more rampant than in present day society--it strikes the success motivated junior executive, the over worked employee and the bored, isolated house wife. Some turn to the bottle, others seek the private dream land afforded by a death dealing needle. Still others become addicted to patent medicine. These are problems which build gradually, almost without notice. When reality delivers its moment of truth in cases such as these, the experience can shatter a life, change a person's future or worst. Here, the outside counselor is often helpless and totally inadequate. He becomes a crutch, a lending post that buys time-and again postpones the moment of truth. The true solution often rests in self discipline--that inner most determination which can pull life back together.

Society appears ruthless. It is when we fall prey to materialism and the all-consuming attitudes it develops in a shop keeper or even a hard working employee. Your moment of truth may come when you decide to work together, with your boss and other fellow workers, or go for the jugular vein. Others can find themselves boxed in, trapped in a less than desirable job and caught in the economic pinch that makes a switch in employment difficult. When logic offers little comfort, then the wisest thing is to

turn the matter over to God.

True, God helps those who help themselves. But the wisest man recognizes the time to "let go and let God." This is one of the hardest lessons to be learned in life.

Additional moments come when a person begins to reach middle age. He realizes that he has come to a certain point in his life--that he is not going on much farther. He feels despondent. To the contrary, this should be a period of evalutation--a tlime of decision--a time to plan the second half of life. It can be the most valuable time.


A lot of people change vocations in their middle years. They have discovered new meanings to their lives and are learning how to

of Principles that man has the moral responsibility for his own happiness or unhappiness; therefore, it would follow that facing one's moments of truth and dealing with them effectively would certainly have a positive effect on one's life.

An Interpretative Review of Swedenborg's Heaven and Hell

PART II by Herbert F. Schneider
(Part one was featured in the May issue of TNS)

On occasion, it is necessary to substitute terms used by Emanuel Swedenborg for those which are now more readily understood. In Heaven and Hell he made constant use of Lord when making reference to God, and divine in referring to spirit or spiritual. The word Lord, even in earlier documented times, carries the description of one in authority. This can lead to confusion when applying it to descriptions given in the Bible.

Even today it is somewhat difficult for many of us to discriminate between traditional Christianity of centuries and the new, more modern conception of life as taken directly from Spirit. Interpretations of biblical scripture must take this into consideration. Just as we occasionally experience some misunderstanding or confusion, so perhaps, did Swedenborg. This point seems particularly clear in Heaven and Hell, as there is little progressive religious thought in the work.

The conflict between Swedenborg and accepted Spiritualist teachings hinges on his interpretation of the understanding that the Supreme Being was one with the Lord and man Jesus. This single conception forms the basis for The Church of The New Jerusalem.

Aside from this marked difference, there is so much of what he tells us that is completely rational and in complete agreement with the logical and common sense teachings fostered by the Spiritualist movement and the governoring fathers of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches.

The great Swedenborg is neither the first nor will he be the last to confirm many of these teachings. He is merely one of a long line of mediums and psychics, who since the time of Andrew Jackson Davis have confirmed the revelations of the Spirit World.

Part II of the Review

Swedenborg says that it is man's own decision to consort with good or evil spirits. In this respect he is free. He can make his choice, and not be forced because that which is forced does not abide. Man draws certain sustaining power from the spirit, be the source good or evil. The power of his own will must determine the quality of that force.

As man is born into the physical world, it is essential that there be an influx from spirit so that he will be brought into an order consistant with spirit. It is through spirit that man is governed. Part of the influx from spirit comes from conjunction with Infinite Intelligence and part from affiliation with spirits. Swedenborg says that in spite of the fact that man neither admits its presence nor is consciously aware of spirit, he cannot exist, even for a moment.

without his tie with spirit.

There is a connection of all things through intermediates with the **Primal Cause** and whatever is not disappears. Nothing can have permanent existance from itself. Existance is a perpetual springing forth from the **Primal Cause**. There is a correspondence of all things in the Natural World with all things in the Spiritual World.

Swedenborg gives credit to the Bible, which he refers to as The Word, as a substitute intermediary between man and the Spirit World. This was because man turned away from direct communication with spirit. (This is still true.) He reverenced the Bible but emphasized that there is a literal and a spiritual meaning and unfortunately most of mankind chooses to gnore the possibility of a spiritual meaning. It was

probably intended that man not become conversant with this wisdom until he possessed the consciousness to discover it for himself.

The author deplored the fact that the Christian Church has falsely taught judgement day, resurrection of the physical body and the lack of continuity of life. He claims that this has caused the intellectual to lose all faith in religion. The intellectual in turn provokes the question of dissatisfaction among others.

The teaching of a personal Devil or Satan and

fallen angels is also a cruel falsehood.

Swedenborg says all of the inhabitants of Heaven and Hell are from the human race, and that transition is natural in the continuity of life: "The internal part of man called his spirit is in its essence an angel." Also, "man was created to become an angel." Here Swedenborg uses the term angel to describe a developed spirit.

He tells us a man is just the same after death as before. It is then that a gradual change takes place in accordance to the true motivating qualities of the individual. Man inherits some strains or tendencies to evil so that not even children are perfect, but in heaven no one is punished for such things beyond the individuals control. However, each entity is responsible to the extent that he has yielded to these negative tendencies. The reason is simple—the influx of good from Infinite Intelligence is so great that all evil can be overcome. (This also applies here if we but open up the channel for good.)

From this we conclude that the fallacious doctrine of original sin is a misinterpretation of

hereditary imperfections.

In his meditations he was told that pious withdrawal from society with self sacrifice is not a virtue. You can not do good to your fellow man if you isolate yourself from him. You merely become self centered and selfish. In heaven there is joy in doing good to another rather than for one's self. This means loving thy neighbor. It is something not understood by those who have been avaricious.

Swedenborg found earthly intellectuals in the Spirit World whose acquisition of knowledge was acquired strictly through reading. Their own intuitive knowledge was wholly undeveloped. They had no notion whatsoever in determining truth from falsehood on questions pertaining to life or anything outside their chosen earthly pursuit. They possessed intellect, but no wisdom.

Swedenborg tells us that only those who are able to think wisely are enlightened so as to believe what is true. Thinking and willing without acting on it is the same as lack of will-like a seed that falls on poor soil and fails to germinate.

Good thoughts must be followed by the will to do good and must be carried out in good deeds. This alone is what enters the credit side of your ledger. There is no accomplishment without good deeds.

After death man lives in accordance to his predominate interests in earthly life, often following the same pursuits. Swedenborg calls this man's ruling love. In this way, if the love is of a spiritual nature man is drawn upward and if it is of a corporeal or worldly nature he is drawn downward. The fortunate are "those who love what is good, honest and just for its own sake and who do it and live it." (Those who do good only for the sake of self gain are unfortunate and suffer consequences.)

People of lower inclinations have no actual faith, he tells us. In its place they have a persuasion that a thing is true because it serves their purpose and they are led to accept falsities. True faith must have its source in the spiritual.

Love in action is what endures. It is a life of doing actual good from the will of loving good for its own sake. This is the one thing that leads to

spiritual progression.

Swedenborg tells us that at transition man enters a temporary spirit realm for days, months or a year at most where most of mankind awaits a period of time to qualify for the true heaven world or a lessor status of a hell which has as many corresponding planes as Heaven to produce a balance between good and evil.

(I do not think that so much of the human race is basically evil, but there is no doubt that ignorance largely prevails. A complete reorientation would be necessary for most of mankind; and education in overcoming selfishness would be a basic need before spiritual

progression would be possible.)

Swedenborg points out that loving your own is not sufficient qualification because it is basically selfish, your own being indirectly a part of yourself. In this way it becomes an extension of self love which he regards as evil. Family love qualifies as spiritual if it extends beyond possessiveness and reaches out to your fellow man.

He claims that man has intuition about life after death. The thought is brought to us by spirits and it is often evident in simple primitive people but others have been educated away from it and will find that the wrong teaching will be to their detriment. You can not develop very far

spiritually if you are in total ignorance of spirit. (He says that, "the soul is nothing but the life of man, while the spirit is the man himself; and the earthly body is merely an agent whereby the spirit is enabled to act fitly in the Natural World.")



With such revolutionary concepts as to the nature of what is actually spiritual and what is not, had Swedenborg lived earlier—in a country dominated by ecclesiastics he probably would have been tortured and died a martyr to truth as had many other notable persons in history. It is remarkable in retrospect that in appreciation of his sincerety and integrity he was honored in several courts of northern Europe where monarchs and queens listened to him with fascination and asked him questions about life after death.

Be Ye Not Little

Society is composed of a complex group of unique human beings. Some live, breathe and serve out their life in intricate mazes free of the simple knowing that all life is eternal. Others merely lack the vision to see beyond their shallow lives and thus cling in desperation to the possibility of something else. Then we have the historians whose faith is contingent upon the written word. For their sakes, let us hope that The Word is never disturbed. The best segment is among the least -the Spiritualist gives purpose to his life as he builds it for tomorrow.

Life is as limited as your mind. You are possessed with a spirit which owes no segment of


society its birth.

State Board Members, Fellow Delegates at the 73rd Annual Convention of the Indiana State Association of Spiritualists in Convention, Assembled, April 29, 1977


Greetings:





Orthodox Christian Churches



VS Spiritualism

by B. F. Austin, D.D.

On the horizon, and before our very eyes, stand two great organiztions, the orthodox Christian Church and Spiritualist Societies. Both stand ready and eager for the contest. Each one pulsates with the desire for leadership in the future religion of the world. Which shall claim

victory?

At the very outset it must be admitted that Christian churches have a headstart. possess many great advantages. First, they have the ripened experience of centuries in organization, training, and the general management of religious bodies. This places them on firm ground. For experience is the great teacher of the ages. Then, these churches have the equipment for their work. Much has been gathered through the centuries. They lead in the number of churches, literature, established form and ceremonies, which are rendered dear and sacred. They have the approval of the general public. Many are well attended, and are rooted in the affections of millions. They are regarded as the leaders in moral and religious reform, and in all works for the relief of suffering and the general good will. They have had access to the hearts and homes and good will of the people and are skilled in the arts of gaining cooperation and financial help. Their leaders are masters at the management of great enterprise. These admitted advantages are so numerous and so great that any attempt to oust them from their present position of leadership may at first seem foolhardy.

The changing trend favors Spiritualist societies! The thoughts, beliefs and customs of the past are changing daily. We are now living in a new world of challenge, question, understanding and progression. We have in religion today a new God to worship, a new conception of the future, and all indications point

INSPIRATION SPEAKING

And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power.

I Corinthians 2:4

PSYCHIC COMMENTARY: Paul's preaching style! Did he have a particular approach to speech and preaching? Ah, yes! Vividly did he describe his method: Paul did not rely upon captivating words, enticing formulas, intellectual prowess, or the mechanics of formal addressing. He depended upon the SPIRIT. Paul became a "spokesman" for the Spirit, a "messenger", acting as an "amanuensis" and "living, breathing testimony" of the Spirit: to demonstrate its power. His enticement was not of man's worldly appeal, but of the magnificence of the Spirit "working through mortal man". PSYCHOMETRY:

And when he (Agabus) was come unto us, he took Paul's girdle, and bound his own hands and feet, and said, Thus saith the Holy Ghost, So shall the Jews at Jerusalem bind the man that owneth this girdle and shall deliver him into the hands of the Gentiles.

PSYCHIC COMMENTARY: Paul had this indirect experience with psychometry through another. It is cited because it had been an "accepted" demonstration by Paul. He did not

refuse Agabus' action.

Psychometry, as in biblical usage, is much the same today. The psychic sensitive holds an article belonging to a person and extends psychic risings from the subtle effluvium (invisible emanation) about the article. Agabus took an article from Paul - "a girdle" - and as he intuitively gathered advance information on Paul's future, he felt led to bind his own hands and feet. From this subtle psychic perception involving clairsentience action, he predicted Paul would be bound by the Jews of Jerusalem, as his own hands and feet were bound, and would be delivered into the power of the Gentiles. A foretelling in time, well in advance of its earthly happening, and a foretelling, that came true in every respect.

Fascinating and potent are the words Agabus uses in his preface to his psychometric message: "Thus saith the Holy Ghost"--in modern

parlance, "thus saith the Good Spirit".

TRANCE:

And it came to pass, that, when I was come again to Jerusalem, even while I prayed in the temple, I was in a trance.

Acts 22:17

PSYCHIC COMMENTARY: Psychic ter. minology abounds in the Christian Bible. Consider the abundance of often repeated words and phrases: "visions", "spirit", "angel", "dreams in the nite", "inspiration", "prophesing", "Counsellor", "led by the Spirit", "pressed in the Spirit", and the like.

Add to the psychic terminology another psychic term, "trance". Paul knew what it was to fall into a supernormal state of sleep, referred

to in psychic science as trance.

In current psychic seminars, the developing sensitive is taught that the psychic dimension is not reached without a shutting off of the material level of everyday functioning. Paul, apparently from his own experience, knew that "preparation" preceded the trance state, and while it is not known whether the state itself was a spontaneous occurrence or a controlled manifestation, the fact that he complied with the requisite quietness is contained in the scripture passage: "I prayed". In the physical dwelling of the Holy of Holies, he opened the way to the inner Holy of Holies within his being through aspiration. Through this appraoch, the intuitive phenomenon of Trance took place.

PAUL'S DIRECT TESTIMONY OF A PHYSICAL EXPERIENCE:

And it came to pass, that, when I was come again to Jerusalem, even while I prayed in the temple, I was in a trance;

And saw him (Jesus) saying unto me, Make haste, and get thee quickly out of Jerusalem: for they will not receive thy testimony concerning me.

And I said, Lord (Jesus) they know that I imprisoned and beat in every synagogue them that believed on thee:

And he said unto me, Depart: for I will send thee far hence unto the Gentiles.

Acts 22: 17-19, 21

PSYCHIC COMMENTARY: In Paul's defense, the above explanation was offered to the Jewish peoples--it speaks clearly of Paul's personal, psychic contact with a transitioned Jesus. The purpose was to save the physical life of Paul and the psychic directives given to Paul from the beyond contact spoke in meaningful terms of practicality, much like the modern messages of psychics. A message of practical concern and advise for the builder of the Christian Message--Paul's safety was needful for the continuation of the Jesus Message of Love of

God, Love of Man as well as Love of Self (Divine Self).

MORE PSYCHIC VISIONS:

And the night following the Lord (Jesus) stood by him, and said, Be of good cheer, Paul: for as thou hast testified of me in Jerusalem, so must thou bear witness also at Rome.

Acts 23:11

entry in Paul's Psychic Journal, so to speak, deals with a night vision and message from the "transitioned Jesus". The message brings a feeling of togetherness with Paul in his distress, but also prepares him for the task of bearing witness of the New Message at the court of Caesar. The popular scientific critique is found in this question: "Did the informative night vision and message come to pass in earthly events?" And to that question, biblical documentation fully authenticates this advance knowledge. It did happen in the way foretold.

TWO PSYCHIC WARNING PREDICTIONS:

(Paul) said unto them, Sirs, I perceive that this voyage (to Rome) will be with hurt and much damage, not only of the lading and ship,

but also of our lives.

Acts 27:10

...Sirs, ye should have hearkened unto me, and not have loosed from Crete, and to have gained the harm and loss. And now I exhort you to be of good cheer: for there shall be no loss of any man's life among you, but of the ship.

For there stood by me this night the angel of

God...

Acts 27: 21-23

PSYCHIC COMMENTARY: Paul is very frank in relating that an "angel" came to him in the night hours, and, as it is said today, "the angel loved one" warned him that the ship would run into danger if it followed its scheduled departure for Rome. There would be "hurt" and "much damage" to goods and ship, but his words were not heeded by the ship owners.

After the ship had embarked upon its voyage and the storm came upon the ship with much havoc, a second prediction came to Paul from an angelic source. This time the message was that goods and ship would suffer loss, but no human

life would be lost.

One wonders how the ship owners felt when the first warning came into manifestation. Did they laugh, as many moderns do, at the possiblity

that a psychic could actually view the future? If they did, when the second message proved true, there must have been a "reevaluation" in the ship owners opinion of the psychic prognostic ability of Paul.

PAUL'S CONTRIBUTION TO PSYCHIC UNDERSTANDING

Weight should be accorded to Paul's psychic pronouncements not only because his psychic encounters are presented to many under the authority of the Holy Scripture, but, as well, because the extensive phenomenal range of psychic demonstrations, which have been presented, indicate that Paul was an "experiencer" of the psychic flow through the greater part of his living ministry. Being an "experiencer" of the psychic flow, as with modern psychic sensitives, Paul felt the aliveness of the subtle dimension, felt its functionings in personal manners, though not through an intellectual comprehension. He knew of the Spirit through spiritual insight and through psychic manifestations, hence, he is an authoritarian to the spiritual scholar and a developing psychic sensitive through knowledge and experience.

Before religious maturity can ever be achieved, one thing must first be understood. Only the good is real. It is the only thing that endures throughout time.

to greater liberality of thought and action. The once disputed Christian Church teachings are now questioned. The popularity of the past is no

longer just reason for acceptness.

Every church in Christendom is honey-combed with new thought--Christian Science and Spiritualistic teachings. Every orthodox congregation has a large percentage of its hearers, who at heart reject Bible Infallibility Vicarious Atonement, and General Practices of Judgement, Teachings dealing with Resurrection of the Body, and Eternal Punishment, along with an equal number who are more interested in heretical teachings than in once popular orthodoxy.

The orthodox church is in the condition today of our old, weather-beaten, water-logged, over-loaded ship with a tremendous cargo of dead and deplorable dogmas, offensive to the good taste of intelligent investigators. It would take much time in steady application to scrape off the

barnacles of these out-grown creeds.

Along with this decline, let us note the great world-wide interest of intelligent men and women everywhere in the spiritual phenomena and spiritualistic teachings. Every country in Europe has it's own organization of psychic research. England is ablaze with intense interest in Spiritualism and a marvelous enthusiasm is manifest among its leaders and mediums. New Spiritualist publications are springing up everywhere. The general, worldwide movement is so intense that it is awakening the clergy from years of sleep. No longer can the teachings of Spiritualism be denied. Investigators are finding that its teachings are

quite biblical and in close harmony with those of the great Galilean Master. The ship of Spiritualism isn't as far behind as it once appeared.


A few have forseen the impending tug of war between Orthodoxy and Spiritualism, and have persuaded themselves to accept the belief that a possible union of the two might occur--Orthodoxy possibly opening its doors and swallowing Spiritualism, or perhaps the reverse. These few have advocated that the churches accept Spiritualism and mediumship--or to use a common expression, lock, stock and barrel. But why consider impossible illusions?

Christian churches cannot rid themselves of orthodox dogmas and customs, nor would Spiritualists ally themselves with the Orthodox creedal system. And it is doubtful if these churches could govern and manage medium-

ship.

Spiritualists feel that they have a mission to demonstrate the continuity of life and to illustrate the truths of nature. These people could not be governed by creedal systems that sprang largely out of priest-craft with an admixture of some of the finer teachings of the Galilean Prophet. They would never feel at home under a ministry saturated with orthodox teachings. They realize they have a world mission and a lofty gospel in the truths of nature and of life, and that they have the cooperation of angelic forces. Their own particular mission is to demonstrate the continuity of life and spirit return. They could never form an alliance with creeds that sprang out of savagery or with dogmas that orginated in the jungle. They would not allow themselves to be diverted from their high and holy mission by illusory promises of cooperation and support. They want no alliance but with the higher forces of the spirit world, they hold their commission from On High.

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
