


The 7th Principle ·

"We affirm the moral responsibility of the individual and that he makes his own happiness or unhappiness as he obeys or disobeys Nature's physical and spiritual laws."

An interpretation given for this statement by former N.S.A.C. president Joseph P. Whitwell states that man is responsible for the welfare of the world in which he lives; for its welfare or its misery -- and for its happiness or unhappiness.

"If man is to obtain heaven or earth, he must learn to make that heaven for himself and for others. Man is responsible for his own spiritual growth and welfare. His sins and wrong-doing must be outgrown and overcome. Virtue and love of God must take their place.

"Spiritual growth and advancement must be attained by aspiration and personal striving. Vicarious atonement has no place in the

philosophy of Spiritualism..."

This interpretation reminds me of a familiar saying, "God helps those who help themselves." This I've always found to be true. It is simply amazing how some people pray, sit back and expect the world to come to them. God helps those who put feet to their prayers.

What do I mean by putting feet to your prayers? I mean taking any and all actions that are necessary to make one's dreams come true. I have more personal trouble "Letting go and letting God." I always try to give strength to my prayers and to help them come into reality.

Joseph Whitwell says that "Man himself is responsible for the welfare of the world in which he lives; for its welfare or its misery, for its happiness or unhappiness." If man's world is in a mess then he has no one to blame but himself. Man is definitely the perpetrator of his own happiness or unhappiness. We know when man disobeys the physical laws, does not eat properly, fails to obtain enough rest or abuses his body with drugs or alcohol, the body suffers. Many of us will gripe and complain. If only people would learn to love each other as brothers; if only there were no poverty in the world; the if's could go on forever.

What we must remember is that we were not promised a rose garden in this life. It is up to each of us to make our own rose garden.

It matters not whether one is rich or poor in material goods. What does matter is what is in a nian's heart and his attitude toward life and others around him.

I realize that it is necessary to be realistic, and that we must keep the wolves away from the door, but too many of us spend many hours thinking about the happiness material goods could bring.

First, one should be concerned with his spiritual growth and secondly, if a person really wants something badly enough, he should try to obtain it through prayer and honest hard work, (providing it brings only good and no harm to others).

Man's daily attitude determines if he will make life on this earth heaven or hell.

Happiness comes from within. If you search for it within itself you will be looking for a long time. Jesus said, "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and the rest shall be added unto you."

The next part of Mr. Whitwell's interpretation states "Individually man is responsible for his own spiritual growth and welfare. Sins and wrong-doing must be outgrown and overcome."

Man must care for his own soul. According to Mr. Whitwell's interpretation, he cannot hang his sins on Jesus or anybody else. This is the trouble with many of the doctrines of the present day churches. They allow people to hang wrong doings on Christ.

When man realizes he is responsible for his thoughts, deeds and actions, he tries much harder not to commit the same mistakes over and over again. He realizes that he will only have to work that much harder to balance the good with the bad.

If a man is growing spiritually, although ne goes through trials, tribulations, tests, and troubles, there are successes that make him truly happy. There is nothing to equal spiritual

happiness and spiritual gain.

To keep growing spiritually one can read spiritual books and other literature, constantly associate with spiritually concerned people, attend classes, take an active part in the church, try to help people on an everyday level, and think more positively.

The next part of Mr. Whitwell's interpretation states "Virtue and love of God must take the place of sin and wrong doing."

When one emphasises the virtues and love in their life, they are obeying natural laws and consequently are happy people. Stop and think a moment. Have you ever seen a person who was really concentrating on the good and virtuous part of living who was unhappy? I haven't!

The next statement in his interpretation continues: "Spiritual growth and advancement must be attained by aspiration and personal striving." This is not something that happens overnight. It must be worked out one day at a

time, seven days a week, 30 days a month, 52 weeks of the year. It must be first and foremost in a person's mind every day, year in and year out. It is not easy! Don't expect it to be! The tempter's snare is every present trying to entice people to take the easy and wrong way. Just because it is not easy does not mean that it is not a worthy goal. Anything worth having is worth working for and over a long period of time.

Certainly if we wish to be on a higher plane after we pass from this existence we should certainly keep spiritual growth ever before us.

The last part of Mr. Whitwell's interpretation of the seventh principle states "Vicarious atonement has no place in the philosophy of Spiritualism. Each one must carry his own cross in overcoming wrong-doing.

I truly believe man is responsible and must correct his own errors after he is taught the difference between right and wrong.

Here are several things about right and wrong to remember:

1. Society sometimes would have us believe that there is a fine shade of grey about morality, But I say how can there be a grey area since with most things there is a right and a wrong.

2. If one gets in the habit of wrong-doing it makes it all the easier to keep on doing wrong. It is like one is on a tobaggon going one direction-(the path of no return down into the dark depths.) So one should try to establish patterns of right thinking, right doing, and right speaking in his life.

The more one develops these patterns of right thinking, doing, speaking, the easier it will become.

3. Another important thing to remember about right and wrong is that no matter how much wrong-doing one has done there is the chance or opportunity to change and start living the right way.

If lately you have been thinking there are some things in your life that you'd like to change, why not take the time today to figure out how you can take some positive steps to change them.

This principle can change people's lives. If you truly comtemplate and take to heart the meaning of this great principle, many fantastically good things can result.

United we stand, divided we fall Within that statement lies the strength of any organization.

Many working in unity and in an agreed direction can undertake and accomplish tasks considered insurmountable for a disjointed

group or for individuals.

The key element which is evident in harmonious organization is a united purpose. An organization without a purpose is one without meaning. The greater that purpose, the greater the will of its people and the larger the accomplishments.

The National Association of Churches was forged from pain and knowledge and love; and

its purpose is a great one:

"To teach and proclaim the science, philosophy and religion of modern Spiritualism, to encourage lectures on all subjects pertaining to the spiritual and secular welfare of mankind. To protest against every attempt to compel mankind to worship God in any particular or prescribed manner. To advocate and promote spiritual healing and to protect and encourage spiritual teachers and mediums in all laudable efforts in giving evidence or proof to mankind of a continued intercourse and relationship between the living and the so-called dead. To encourage every person to always remain open to restatement as growing thought and investigation reveals new truth; thereby leaving every individual free to follow the dictates of reason and conscience in spiritual as in secular affairs."

To do this, people holding these ideals must band together to resist ignorance, superstition and intolerance and those who would, by organized efforts, seek to destroy or pervert the purpose for which an organization stands.

History reveals many individuals, standing alone, even unto death, to make their contribution to these same ideals which Spiritualism advocates today. They did not have the benefit of an organized people to support them and thus surrendered their lives to the organized forces of superstition and oppression.

Socrates (470-899, B.C.), taught many of the same basic principles of life as are taught in the philosophy of Modern Spiritualism today. For

this he was condemned to die.

In his speech at Athens before his Judges, he

said:

"I am moved by certain divine and spiritual influences, which also Miletus, through mockery, has set out in the indictment. This began with me from childhood, being a kind voice which, when present, always diverts me from what I am about to do: but never urges me on."

Again, after his condemnation Socrates said to his friends:

"Is it not strange, my friends, that all I have said to convince you that I am going to the Society of the Happy, you still think this body to be Socrates? Wherefore be of good cheer about death, and know of a certainty that no evil can happen to a good man, either in life or after death. To die and be released is better for me."

There can be no doubt that if Socrates had had the support of an organization such as the N.S.A.C. there would of been less intolerance and

greafer religious expression.

It is obvious that spiritual progression, in an understanding of the continuity of life, after so-called death, is a divine play. In spite of all the forces which have tried to keep the people in ignorance of this great truth, there always have arisen outstanding individuals, ready and willing to be the avenues through whom spiritual truth might be transmitted from the spirit world to man on earth. We are promised that, "The gates of hell shall not prevail against it." (the truth)

It becomes apparent, in our study of history, that superstition and intolerance have controlled and dominated the minds and souls of people.

When Jesus appeared on the scene, he tried to lead the people into a spiritual kingdom; teaching, as he went about, a right conduct of life leading to the kind of character people should develop. He always gave his reasons in an understandable manner, but was constantly met by the organized forces of ignorance, intolerance and superstition. These forces were too well entrenched within their own organization to be disturbed, and he knew that he would have to give up his own life, for the cause of truth, as hundreds of others have done both before and since his time, or discontinue his teachings. This he could not do. His understanding of this great truth was too real and too important to be laid aside. He realized, even as Socrates did that "No evil can happen to a good man, either in life or after death."

Unafraid, he continued to the very end. He was planting a spiritual seed, which by Nature's laws, both physical and spiritual, would

multiply.

It was John Wycliffe(1324-1384, A.D.), who revolted against the powers of the church. He was educated at Oxford and rose to high position. He attacked the abuses of the church and can be called one of the earliest protestants. To appease the friars and the clergy, Richard III finally drove him from Oxford. He died peacefully, but before passing he forged a strong weapon against his opponents in the translation of the scriptures from the Latin into the language of the common people, the first Bible in the English language, preceding the King James Bible by two hundred years.

John Huss (1369-1415. A.D.) the Bohemian reformer and matyr, was only fiteen years old when Wycliffe passed from earth life. When forty-six years of age, he proclaimed his own

views, which were like those of Wycliffe. Thus we observe the divine plan being again expressed through this martyr and again the forces of selfish interest using the power and position they had gained, striving to suppress the truth.

The Emperor Sigesmund ordered John Guss to attend a meeting and express his religious views. He was given assurance that he would be permitted to return home unharmed. In 1414 A.D. he was brought before the council and advocated the views of Wycliffe, for which he was condemned and was then asked to withdraw those views. This he declared he could not do. On July 6, 1415, in the presence of the emperor, who had promised to protect him, he was degraded from the priesthood and turned over to te constables of the city with orders that he be immediately executed.

He was burned at the stake, and thus the coming of the spiritual kingdom on earth, for which so many loyal souls have laid down their lives on the cross, or by fire, was again deferred. The world has been blessed with the presence of many fine spiritual teachers and leaders, but the world has known them not, and has put them to death.

With the birth of America, religious liberty was secured for all, al least in principle. While history shows that persecution has taken place, no one need fear death for his view on religion.

"United we stand, divided we fall." Let us reaffirm our unity in the purpose of our National Spiritualist Association of Churches.

Let us try to understand clearly and teach correctly the interpretations of spirit phenomena, as adopted by the National Spiritualist Association of Churches which constitute the basis of the philosophy and the religion of Spiritualism.

God's Voice I Sometimes Seem To Hear

Material and Spiritual correlation

From what is presently known of the laws of physics and psychical manifestation, it is beyond question that it is possible for man's consciousness to endure in a body of finer matter-one imperceptible to ordinary human vision.

Space is not empty. It is filled with electromagnetic waves and other forces and materials which are just as basic as the so-called matter of the earth. Dawning within the minds of some scientists is an awareness of a connection between the finer grades of matter and the primary grades of spirit energy.

This interest has been long in coming. comes as a by-product and is being studied by Dr. J.B. Rhine, Professor Albert Einstein, and many others. Einstein advanced a theory recently concerning the unity of gravitation and electromagnetism, the latter being a combination of electricity and magnetism considered to be two parts of a single force.

During recent years, scientific work has been concentrated on a study of the minute particles called atoms with a view of trying to gain a better understanding of the material construction of life and matter. Einstein is said to have adopted a new viewpoint during his latter life regarding the forces of gravitation and electromagnetism, which together help to govern matter. He postulated that these are more important to an understanding of the mysteries of life than the construction of matter.

In this regard, it is general knowledge among biologists that electromagnetic fields of force shape and guide the formation of living things. Such fields are among the factors that contribute to the difference between types of animals. For instance, when a human being is at the start of life, made up of only parts of two newly joined tissue cells, an electromagnetic field is present. This force field comes from the tiny cells present in the formation of life. As the embryo forms, this field guides the course.

Einstein's new unified-field theory, the unity of gravitation and electromagnetism is, therefore, most interesting to students of psychical manifestation because as it is held it may explain certain mysteries about matter and energy which go to form physical man and sustain the conscious life. In other words, it may further

demonstrate how it is possible for matter to be so conditioned as to enable the spirit part to enter the body and control and manifest while on the earth-plane.

This departure is surely a great advance in scientific thought along the studies of the general life problem, and is in perfect accord with advanced spiritistic postulations -- to the effect that there is ample theory of the blending of matter and spirit in Spiritland as well as on earth.

The development of that part of natural science called physics, has been slow in coming, most of it developing in the past half-century. It was not until the discovery of x-rays in 1895 that the first modern clue to the subatomic world was confirmed. Formerly the atom was regarded as the simplest particle of matter and as being indestructable. However, in 1887, the electron, an even tinier particle of energy was discovered. The size of an electron is about one-fiftythousandth the diameter of the atom. Other discoveries have lately been made which indicate the composition of the atom is most complex and that natural science is still far from a complete solution of matter in its finer effects. Apparently there is no end to the tenuosity of matter or to the great variety of substances that can be formed by the innumerable combinations of the known chemical elements (an element being a substance that is built up of only one kind of atom).

In an endeavor to gain a partial comprehension of the fineness of matter there is no better example of its different grades than the vibratory effects or frequencies of the various known electromagnetic waves. Starting with the visible light waves (spectrum), we find these waves vary from 32,000 red waves to the inch to 64,000 violet waves to the inch, and with frequencies of from four hundred billion vibrations a second to seven hundred and fifty billion vibrations a second. This makes up what is called the physical world to which man is sensitive. This small spectrum represents a very small part of the innumerable electromagnetic waves that make up the universe.

Next to the visible range of the spectrum are the slower infrared waves (dark heat waves) and longer waves. On the other side are the quicker ultraviolet waves, x-rays, gamma rays, and cosmic rays. What waves may be further on in either direction is not yet known. However, it is known that gamma rays have a frequence of thirty quintillion, and cosmic rays are quicker

Fancy then, a comparison of thirty quintillion -(30,000,000,000,000,000,000) with only seven hundred and fifty billion (750,000,000,000) -- the highest frequency of the physical world recognisable by the naked eye. This is most enlightening because it discloses a possible connection existing between matter of the physical and etheric worlds. In fact, it would appear that the imperceptible chemical vibrations of the etheric or spirit world com-

mence just about where those of the physical world leave off; which implies that the ultraviolet and other faster electromagnetic waves, or similar or related waves, take over and may be used by spirit entities to manifest their presence in the lower realms of Spiritland. In doing this, the lowest or slowest vibrations employed would seem to just touch the normal physical range of people on the earth-plane. This, if true, not only explains how it is possible for sensitive mediums to see spirit forms, but also how it is possible to have a materialization phase of mediumship, and how so-called "ghosts" are visible at times on this earth-plane, not only to mediums but to anyone with only normal powers of vision.

In order to understand the idea of being, one must realize the difference between earth-world conditions and the conditions in Spiritland. This perplexing problem is largely due to the great difference in the fineness of matter, and to a greater range of freedom -- facility of a kind -- of

the soul-spirit ego in finer matter.

At the same time, it should be realized that there is no actual mind or spirit in a molecule or atom, or other particles of any kind of matter, course or fine -- there is only motion. The vital life movement exhibited by and through animal bodies is the real manifestation of soul and spirit, but it is entirely different from the mere chemical movement, rythmic vibration or spin, of molecules, atoms, or their component parts. The fact that all matter is in a state of vibratory motion does not mean that it is always alive in a spiritual sense. Only when properly conditioned, can matter entertain soul and spirit, and, by means of a particular form, exhibit the true life principle of soul and spirit. As soon as the material deteriorates to a certain extent the soul-spirit entity is obliged to leave and what is called the death-process takes place. In other words, it is not the material body which produces life, but it is the true soul and spirit life-force which organizes the material body.

In earth-life, the most difficult and exacting task of the crude physical body is to maintain consciousness. When bodily functions weaken too much the body dies and observable con-In "floating away" to sciousness ceases. Spiritland the disembodied find that similar conditions -- the same general form is retained but the new (astral) body is of a finer texture. In many instances it has to be rested, strengthened and rebuilt, in order to be strong enough to support consciousness and maintain the identity of the individual in its new environment. This is an important adjustment for without identity there can be no individuality, and, obviously, no worthwhile scheme of existence for the individual.

What is needed in the world today for the development of proper metaphysical philosophy is not orthodox emotion and puerile imagination, but more serious study and comprehension along the lines of natural science. Spiritualists, in touch with genuine natural phenomena and the well known facts of modern natural science, are, or should be, in the best position of all to un. derstand and advocate a belief in etheral conditions where beings in the far-flung universes are capable of adjusting themselves to much quicker currents of vibration. By them, spirit entities may be conceived as being so advanced as to be beyond all ordinary powers of com. prehension, yet eventually spiritually approachable and entirely rationale as part of the general scheme of the greater cosmos.

Editorial

Where has all the pursuit of knowledge gone?

Can it be that Spiritualists are now content to leave the pursuit of scientific knowledge to others? Are there no questions left to answer? Or great achievements open to pursue?

Those fields of knowledge once probed and initiated into reason by our forefathers and pioneers have become the foundations of great universities and organizations and the subject of study by many. Must the Spiritualists of today sit back idle in the exploration of knowledge while others gain the treasury first unveiled by our pioneers?

One of the first truths we are taught is that knowledge is available to all who seek it, given the time and understanding necessary to unravel the mystery.

Such an attitude is not exceptable in light of the definitive interpretation given to the word, Spiritualism. In giving birth to Spiritualism, our pioneers assigned three solid layers of supporting structure--religion, philosophy and science. The blending of these three can create a faith free of question, doubt and misunderstanding. The thought which gave birth to Spiritualism on Earth is ever active. It is the drive which brought the National Spiritualist Association of Churches into being.

We are not observers, so an isolated, static attitude can not be acceptable. We must put action to our words and motion to our feet.

Spiritualism is gifted with a solid foundation in its philosophy and religion. In science, it goes lacking. It is this aspect which requires our immediate attention.

In quest of this knowledge, and it is knowledge that we seek, perhaps, we, as Spiritualists, need to reevaluate our definitions and purposes. Let us reflect for a few moments and review the present direction in which we are striving. To gain a true perspective, we must first examine the definitions under which Spiritualism will be reviewed:

Spiritualism is a science because it investigates, analyzes and classifies facts and manifestations demonstrated from the spirit side of life. The phenomena of Spiritualism consists prophecy, clairvoyance, of clairaudience, gift of tongues, laying on of hands, healing, visions, trance, apports, revelations, levitation, raps, automatic and independent paintings, and photography, writing materialization, psychometry, voice and any other manifestation proving the continuity of life as demonstrated through the spiritual senses and faculties of man.



MARTHA MALLERY

At 93, a friend to many goes to her reward. Martha Mallery has passed to the higher life.

she made the transition May 24.

Martha will be remembered by many Spiritualists, as she had served in at least three of the best known Spiritualist camps in America: Cassadaga Camp in Florida,, Silver Belle Camp in Pennsylvania, and Chesterfield in Indiana.

Martha was chairlady for Silver Belle for some years, as well as being an inspiring lecturer on many subjects; one of her most memorable being her stirring lecture on Joan of Arc. She also conducted fine classes in which the mystic quality of her nature lifted us out of ourselves and made meditation, even for beginners, an unforgettable experience.

But above and beyond all this we remember her for the inspiration she brought through her beautiful singing voice. Who can forget her poignant "Eastern Gate"--"I will meet you, I will meet you just inside the Eastern Gate over

there".

Ethel Post Parrish, founder of Silver Belle, in her dying days exclaimed, "Oh, if I could only once again hear Marta singing "The Eastern Gate"! Marta, hearing about the wish, asked them to move Ethel's bed close to the Lodge's window, and standing on the chapel platform cupping her hands, she sent her silver voice over the few yards separating them.

Marta had many gifts. Another in which she

excelled was portrait painting.

As if all this wasn't enough, Marta also was a remarkable medium, though this phase of her personality was known to only a few. She never used his talent professionally as she felt that her greatest contribution lay in her singing.

As a former operatic great, she had met kings and queens, singing in royal palaces all over Europe. Though gifted from birth with an extraordinary voice, she probably would never have come to notice, if she had not subjected

herself to rugged discipline.

Marta, one of twelve children, was born in Danzig, Germany, of Polish parents. They migrated to Syracuse, New York, when Marta was five. Her father died shortly after their arrival in America, leaving the mother to rear the family alone. Marta began by singing in the Roman Catholic cathedral. It was there that her great natural talent was recognized by a Syracuse woman, who offered to sponsor her.

After musical training at Syracuse University, she studied under the renowned Emma Thursby. While still in her teens, another sponsor sent her to Europe to study under the great master,

Antonio Cotogini of Rome.

Marta was an apt pupil and after six months

study was ready to make her Rome debut; but the young singer, envisioning herself as the greatest operatic soprano of all time, was totally unprepared for the tragedy that befell her. On the scheduled morning of her grand debut in Rome, she was stricken with typhoid fever and couldn't sing a note. So great was the shock and disappointment, that it was a full year before she could sing again. However, later on, when she made her Rome debut, it was a grand success.

Then came Paris, where she studied in the French school of singing and acquired a French repertoire. That followed a debut in London, and for the next five years, she spent the winters singing in London, and the summers studying and appearing in Wagnerian and Strauss operas in Germany. Returning finally to America under contract to the Metropolitan, she sang in Philadelphia and New York, and later in Chicago.

When World War 1 broke out, Marta found herself back in London in the role of Joan of Arc. With the theatres closed, she made the round of hospitals and used her beautiful voice to comfort

and inspire wounded soldiers.

Besides her colorful career, she and her husband, Captain Mallery, raised a daughter who is now a successful artist and a son who is now a scientific engineer with Bell Laboratories. Finally, the indomitable Marta formed the Columbus Civic Opera Company, playing leads herself. Her final appearances were with Walter Damrosch in an operatic series.

Marta was known by many in both operatic and Spiritualist circles as a carefully disciplined, and unusually talented performer, but to me she

was a very dear friend.

I consider it a great priveledge to have had her respect and love.

for those who desire to be heard from the other side.

-Plants seem to respond to more vigorous growth when attended by some individuals.

-Some people have energies which may enable things to move by mere thought.

-Some people are able to perceive conclusions to insurmountable problems through unknown

methods.

-Some animals have the remarkable ability to know when to flee an area soon to be subject to a natural catastrophy.

-Records have been made of plants demonstrating reaction to individuals indicating a

willfull intent to injure another.

These are just a few of the many examples which could be offered for discussion. Such things are witnessed fairly regularly and some are under close study. For the present, all of these are without plausible explanation. But more to the purpose of this editorial, each falls into a category which qualifies it as a

phenomenon.

It is time for us to ask ourselves whether we are working fully withing our scope? If we again examine the definitions, we find that they do not limit our viewing; that all the above mentioned phenomenon are indeed within our scope, as listed. Everyone with an unknown energy force. Again, I emphasize if we do not develop tunnel vision, then we can place under our investigation many phenomenon listed as parapsychology, ESP, brain storming, etc. They all fringe on the attunement with an energy force which seems to emanate from and within our minds. Have we As modern Spiritualists, fully explored this? were we not the first to recognize its quality, and first in mediumship. So why stop now?

The scope under which some members are presently laboring is the development of mediumship and teachers only. This can be the apex of their horizon. The cause and effect of the phenomenon seems to be of no concern. Such is

Author of "Did you know" answers questions about Spiritualism

Did you know . . .

-the Shakers predicted the rise of Modern Spiritualism?

History reveals that oft times it has been necessary for peoples to seek new territory in order to practice the religion in which they believe. And, so it was in 1774. Anna Lee, claiming to have received divine inspiration from God, attempted to practice as well as promote the religious philosophy in which she lived and had her being.

It was on the 19th day of May in 1774, that Mother Anne Lee and her Eight Elders followed her divine revelation which provided for an escape from further persecution in Manchester, England, by setting sail for America. Following a near shipwreck, they arrived safely on August 6, 1774, and established their first settlement in Lebanon, New York.

The group became known as "The Shakers," after assemblies witnessed what was termed their 'peculiar' behaviour. They practiced communication with Spirit, materialization, levitation and were exceptionally known for their trance sessions. It was during these

sessions that they trembled or 'shook' violently. Mother Anne and her group rejected atonement, virgin birth, resurrection of the physical body and believed in celebacy as a method of redemption. She affirmed there were seven spheres of heaven, a hierarchy of God, Spirit and angels.

In 1780, Mother Ann and several of the Elders were jailed in Albany, New York. She was later transferred to a jail in Poughkeepsie. On her release in December 1780, she commenced her tour to save the world by travelling throughout New England teaching her philosophy and

Here was one busy man, as Harre was ever busy at some task. Aside from being an excellent trance medium, he was a superb cook. Harre must have liked the work, for I would often see him behind the grill in the Lily Dale cafeteria. He was always ready and eager to help anyone, and cooking represented another way to help get the camp off to a good start.

From the moment I first met him, it was evident he was personality and energy tied together. He proved interesting company and always made the time pass swiftly. If I needed one word to describe him, it would be fun. Harre had a real gift for finding fun in the things of life.

We shared many good times and talks at convention and Lily Dale. He was one of those warm souls who you would welcome eagerly, again and again, as if it was the first time together.

Since Harre never expressed a great interest in giving lectures, I always looked forward to the few appearances he made in the Maplewood Hotel at Lily Dale. As I turn back through memory's pages, it's almost as if I can see him there now. When he got behind the lectern, he would often talk about his mediumship. Occasionally, Harre would begin with something familiar, something like this: "As God is my judge, I would never give out anything except that which comes from spirit." This statement marked the pattern of his life.

The first time that I saw him go into a trance, his most frequent state of work, I was shocked. It seems that the entrance of the entrancing spirit would temporarily set up a violent reaction in his nerve centers. This quickly passed, but when it occurred, Harre would jump from his

seat only to end up on the floor. He later explained that he felt no pain, as he was in a state of trance by the time he hit the floor. This shocking reaction lessened over the years.

Harre's mediumship was very good. To my knowledge, neither he nor it were ever the subject of question.

Even his mediumship was true to his personal nature. It was quite common for one of the entrancing spirits to pause briefly while giving a message and say, "I like you too."

At Harre's passing, a fountain was erected on the lawn at Lily Dale. It was built through donations by his friends, who felt the deep loss of this sincere and unusually accurate medium.

Physical mediumship was very much in evidence with this Richmond Hoosier although many, like myself, were surprised to find him of such slender build.

William E. Hart was well known for his striking demonstrations of materialization. Truly one of his best and most familiar was the box with no top. In this demonstration, he would place an empty box on the stage. It was always a box with sides, but no top or bottom. The stage floor then became the bottom. When the lights were turned off, messages would be thrown out by a hand, which often materialized up to the elbow. Such demonstrations frequently sparked spontaneous exclamations of surprise by some receiving their first spirit message. And ver-

tification was the rule.

william was equally known for an odd characteristic which accompanied every seance he held in the auditorium at Chesterfield. With the start of each seance, an old Seth Thomas key wind clock, which stood a good 15 feet away from the nearest sitter, would stop ticking. I never knew, first hand, but I always supposed that his spirit guide was adverse to the tick of a clock. And although no one was ever near the clock, it would restart again when this spirit had concluded his part of the demonstration.

The thoroughness he learned to achieve as a machinist was clearly reflected in the quality of

the evidence given.

His nature was to be liberal. It was an outlook

which he carried all of his life.

During his life he sat for many prominent people. He was content with the endless amount of work offered to him in the states, and rejected the many offers to go abroad.

William Hart was a test medium, who never refused any reasonable examination, even when

leveled by the most sceptical of sitters.

His remarkable gift has yet to be equalled. Truly, William E. Hart was an outstanding physical and mental medium.

Emma (Mandy) Carpenter

She was a direct voice trumpet and clair-voyant who served Camp Chesterfield for more than three decades.

Mrs. Carpetner was born in California. She began her investigation of Spiritualism at the death of her daughter. The desire to achieve



mastership of the physical phase of mediumship brought Mrs. Carpenter to the attention of Marjorie Tweedy Alexander, a materialization medium. This association developed into a long and rewarding apprentice-ship, which helped her to grow to her full potential.

Emma Carpenter was better known as Mandy, a colored spirit guide who acted as the spirit control in the trumpet seances. Mandy was outspoken and very salty in her language.

One of the amazing stories told her about her mediumship illustrates the quality of her gift: A woman, who apparently was quite psychic, approached her and asked for a sitting. At the time, Mandy was in the company of Nettie Nichol's young son, Ralph. She told the sitter to "go on into the seance room and shut the door. Mandy will take care of you." Within a few

minutes and while Ralph and Mandy were still on the porch, voices were overheard. The sitting continued and without Mandy's presence, to give this lady a very private seance.

When Mandy retired in California near her sons, she gave me her trumpet. I've been

working with it ever since!

History is laced with the yearnings of men who sought immortality at the level of wealth and position earned on earth. But most expressed an interest in their self. They attempted to perpetulate the splendor they had achieved here by trying to take their bounty to the higher life. Unlike the many who shared his desire, James Thomas Crumbaugh invested most of his financial holdings in a philosophy of life known as Spiritualism. He, along with his wife, Elizabeth Wiley, who shared his wish, have their immortality, and today that investment is paying them dividends in the name of Spiritualism in home town of their LeRoy, Illinois.


James Thomas Crumbaugh was a banker, farmer, land speculator, and grain dealer. He was a hard bargainer and successful in almost all of his business dealings. The man was not

subject to whimsical judgements.

He was an ardent and open believer in Spiritualism, who passed to the higher sphere April 3, 1905, after executing a will which would twice be challenged in the Illinois State Supreme Court

When the bequest was first announced in the Bloomington Daily Panatagraph May 13, 1905, the headline read: Princely Gift! It was easily the largest estate ever left for any public,

"I have been interested in the experiments by Duke University and other research societies into the phenomena of Spiritualism. I have made it a point to keep up with the latest findings, but nowhere have I read of any reference on the Holy Trinity. Would you please give the Spiritualist' view for me.

TNS: Theologies contend that the Holy Trinity is composed of Father, Son and Holy Ghost. In the first place this pre-supposes a personal God. Historic note

ANDREW JACKSON DAVIS

Andrew Jackson Davis was born on August 11, 1826, in Blooming Grove, Orange County, N.Y.

Davis was the founder of the Childrens Progressive Lyceum. The first Lyceum was established in Dodsworth Hall, Broadway, N.Y., January, 25, 1863.

He wrote many books, including "Nature's Divine Revelations", "The Great Harmonia," "The Lyceum Manual" plus a library of over 30 books. He is known by the famous magic staff, "Under all cimcumstances keep an even mind."

warning of the troubles to come. In 1782, at a mass meeting, it is said the "power of Spirit" was so great it not only shook the entranced ones but the building and spectators as well.

Preparing for her transition in 1784, she appointed Father James Wittaker, a cousin, to continue her work. He projected as a faithful servant for three years and then he too, became aware of his transition and resigned to reside in Connecticut where he lived until he passed over a few months later in July 1787.

The Shakers continued under the direction of the Elders but because of their belief in celebacy, they became fewer in number and

strength.

However, it is important that we as Spiritualists recognize the Shakers, for it was in late 1841 that they predicted "In seven years the world shall be led into a new dispensation of understanding Spirit communication." And, it was on March 31, 1848, the happenings at Hydesville, New York, brought about the New Dispensation called "Modern Spiritualism."

Why the American Indian is the Spiritualist's helper and friend?

The red man lived a life of spirituality in his total acknowledgement of the Great Spirit. He recognized the natural law of the land and that his abiding by that law provided him with his needs -- physically, mentally, and spiritually. Because of this awareness of his surroundings and the elements of nature as displayed by the winds, the rains, the sun and the moon, he was able to complete his daily tasks in tune with the

Great Spirit.

Being compatible with nature, he learned to utilize the good earth, the herbs, the barks and leaves it provided for food and medicines. He carved his way through the vastness of the plains and the mountains, leaving a pathway for those who followed. His awareness allowed him to utilize all that nature provided. The trees provided his teepee, the animal skins its covering, and the rivers and lakes his water and food. It was a practice of the red man never to kill more than his family needed. Taking life was not regarded lightly.

The family was important. The safety of his family and his tribe was very important to the leader. That leader (or guide) had as his duty the task of providing all things for all his people. The tribe often became totally depended upon him for guidance on material and spiritual

matters.

The Indian had an innate conception of nature and lived in attunement with the phenomena of spirit life. He understood the continuity of life and the values attached thereto. Never did one live a day without considering proper preparation for entering the Happy Hunting Ground -- that which we call the Spirit World.

The red man understood the natural law. He relied on nature for his needs. He looked to the natural elements of the land to assist him. He communicated readily with the Great Spirit and recognized his very breath was a part of that spirit. With his concept of Spirit life, his understanding of nature and natural law, his ability to heal by use of herbs and the power of the source of the sun, he knew the Great Spirit guided his pathway.

As Spiritualists, we know each prepares himself on this plane of existence for that plane in which he shall enter at the time of his transition. Therefore, it is obviously true, the Indian was in perfect attunement with Spirit and is in his rightful place in the Happy Hunting Ground.

A healer, medium or any Spiritualist can never thank the red man enough for assisting the healer as well as guiding the medium through the phenomena of Spiritualism-communication with the higher side of life!

municipal or religious purpose in the county.

The will provided that the income from 1100 acres of farming land be devoted to the building of a free library and for the erection of a Spiritualist church in the city of LeRoy.

Frequent use of the term, forever, was expressed throughout the will, and no provision was given for the disposal of the land. It was also stipulated that the land was not to be mortgaged.

The bequest, was, in fact, perpetual, assuring the church and library continued support for perhaps hundreds of years. Income at the time was judged to reach \$65,000 within 10 years and double that in 20.

The will was twice contested and eventually settled in favor of the original bequest in 1909, when the Illinois State Supreme Court sustained the will and found for the trusttes first named to handle the estate. The court found that Mr. Crumbaugh was "entirely rational and sane and demonstrated to be a man of exceptional judgement, prudence and forethought."

When the air cleared, the trustees had been forced to market 300 acres of farm land. (Presumably these were the acres left to Elizabeth when James preceded her in death.)

The library and church became more the wishes and drawings on paper fifty-two years ago this month when Arthur Pillsbury was commissioned as the architect to design both units together. Construction was completed in 1929.

The church stands today as a memorial to Spiritualism and to the value it held in the lives of James and Elizabeth Crumbaugh of LeRoy.

The funeral services were held in the Methodist Church because the room was needed to accommodate the many friends and guests expected to attend from the farming community

of 2,500. According to records left by Mr. West, this telegram was delivered to him the night before the April 5 funeral during a seance conducted by Mrs. Gladys Cooley. The purpose of the sitting was not to reach Mr. Crumbaugh, but to contact a Kickapoo Indian to gain information about a nearby fort which had fallen into decay. Instead, it was James Thomas Crumbaugh who spoke through the medium. (The following message dictated by James Thomas Crumbaugh bears many similarities now considered truths occurring at transition.)

"Hello, my friends. Don't rush me. This is my first speech and you know I never was much of a speaker. I want you to know that in experiencing the change, I met with no disappointment, but everything is pointing to my advantage.

"I am a pretty big man (referring to his size on earth), but not nearly as heavy as I was this time last week. I get around with ease, and I actually breathe as you folks do, and I am light and easy.

"I want to thank all who gave me a king thought, and I feel, as I stand here, I can truthfully say that they are all giving me a kind thought. I have been close around and so far I haven't heard any of the people giving me hard names.

"I am going to tell you how I felt when I passed on. I was floating out, far away and above

everything. I know I was leaving the housetops and the tall trees. If one could imagine themselves as a wingless bird floating in space, perhaps that would convey an idea to your mind as to how I felt.

"I noticed I was in a wave or a cloud. Through this cloud I was wrapped in, I noticed myriads of faces looking towards me and beckoning me on. Most of the faces were those of my own people, cont'd on page 31.

and all friends and some that I was a boy with, and yet they were as natural as the day I saw them last. At last, the cloud vapor disappeared. Well, I do not know how long it lasted -- oh, I should judge about half an hour of your time, but I am sure I shook hands with at least one hun-

dred people in that time.

"All at once I saw a lawn stretched out before me and I was impelled to walk upon it, and I walked possibly fifty or sixty yards, when in the distance I saw a house, and the nearer I came to the house, the stronger the impression was to enter. (Then a voice from within said: 'Thomas, this is your house.'

"Then, a young man appeared before me and said: 'Father,' and (he) kissed me. I threw my arms around his neck, and he embraced me and I stood, great fellow that I was, and wept on the shoulder of my darling boy. He led me into the house. He said, 'Father, rest and have your

peace.'

"I rested and at last I felt a sensation drawing me to earth. Oh, how different was the scene that I saw. Poor Lib (my wife) was grieving and yet trying to be so brave.
