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

What is happening?

The world today is becoming more and more conscious of being "psychic" and a great interest is sweeping the country on all matters pertaining to the psychic. Newsstands that carry books on the psychic are becoming more and more popular, ESP and Parapsychology are household words; much different than fifteen or twenty years ago. We are moving, as a human race, in the realm of psychic research and parapsychological studies are bringing people into a better understanding of Spiritualism and the workings of the spirit, for Spiritualism is a religion philosophical system while psychic research is a systematic investigation of the modus operandi of the phenomena.

The proof that Spiritualism offers is that of continuous existence and the continuation of memory, not so much by names, for names are more or less common to many individuals, but more of the life pattern of an individual is better proof than common names.

Our orthodox Christian brethren today are opening their doors to what the Spiritualists have been preaching for one hundred and twenty-nine years. Immortality is one of the pillars of the Western religion but there is a lack of understanding that we are living in immortality here and now, and it is the proof of continuity of the soul that should be the main interest of the seeker.

Frederick Myers has said that psychic science, which in reality is Spiritualism, is "the preamble to all religions." The world at large, and more particularly the modern press is moving, slowly but surely from hostility and scorn to the present day partial acceptance, and because of the research done in parapsychology, and the acceptance by more and more people, the day is surely coming when the press will have a complete acceptance of a matter-ofcourse.

Astronaut Edgar Mitchell's statement to the English press that "Death means transition to continuous life," Raymond A. Moody, Jr., M.D. and Elisabeth Kubler-Ross, M.D. in their respective books "Life After Life and "On Death and Dying" are once again confronting the thinking individual to investigate. The sceptic public must re-evaluate the facts. The soul does live after the change called death and does communicate.

We believe, and teach, that the Law of Cause and Effect is unchangeable and operative and the Christian world is undergoing the effects of breaking this law. When Gallileo looked through his telescope and told the peers of his church that the world is round and revolved around the sun they cried "heresy" and silenced him. When Joan of Arc paid attention to her "voices" she, also, was persecuted. When Bernadette saw what she believed to be the Blessed Mother she also was silenced, and history shows a parade of instances where the Church broke the Law of Cause and today is witnessing the Effect.

Modern psychologists and psychiatrists who once thought that "mind is a function of the brain," and that psychic phenomena simply did not exist are gradually revising their understanding and acknowledging the fact that the brain functions because the mind operates on it, and with this new knowledge modern science must reconstruct some of the fundamental postulates. The physiologist would experience great difficulty in believing that mind is apart from the brain because he is in daily contact with the close workings of the two. The physicist can understand this more easily because he is accustomed in dealing with imponderable and intangible energies, residing and active in space.

Because of the thinking of such individuals the question is often asked "what is the practical value of psychic phenomena even if true?" Questions can be raised in many areas. Of what use are meteors and sun spots? We know that they are phenomena and are observed when they occur. To the average individual it makes no difference what the structure of the atom, its existance is a reality. To the man of science it is highly important which theory turns out to be correct. So, if psychic phenomena really exists (we Spiritualists know that it does) it is highly important, since it deals with human life and human destiny.

In the Soviet Union psychic phenomena is heavily endowed and it is a shame that in the United States the men in high places turn a deaf ear to the matter of investigating the workings of

the spirit and the matter of psychic research because it is in this area that humanities of nations can blend into a better understanding of co-relationship among themselves.

Psychic research, and Spiritualism, does not consist of sitting around a table waiting for spirit messages but rather it represents a science upon which the whole cosmic philosophy is built. And physical research and Spiritualism is the ONLY science which gives an answer to man's future. All other sciences deal with man's present or his past.

The physicist should more easily understand the working of the spirit since he does not expect to encounter invisible energies in space but rather the effect they have on the matter. Witnessing the effect the invisible energy (spirit) manifesting in the physical, is but a step away.

The day is dawning when the physical scientist will merge investigation of invisible energy with the spiritual scientist and then will come the breakdown of temples made of stone and mortar. Out of the rubble will come the foundation of all religions, the workings of the spirit, built upon the rock that Jesus spoke of when he asked of his disciples "who dost thou say that I am" and Peter said "Thou art the Christ"—to which Jesus said "Flesh and blood do not reveal this to thee, and upon this rock will I build my church." The solid rock of spiritual awareness, the psychic perception, the workings of spirit This is the solid rock of truth. All church and State Associations should be represented at the 85th Annual Convention of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches. However, this is not always possible. Therefore, any auxiliary not sending a nominated representative to the convention is urged to comply with the printed procedure for seating a proxy delegate.

See page 30 of the Constitution and By-Laws, Article VI, section 4:

"Unrepresented auxiliaries may authorize in writing some member of the convention to select proxies for them and may send sealed instructions to such proxies."

Send one copy of the "CREDENTIAL OF DELEGATE" and a letter or certificate of authorization of proxy to the N.S.A.C. secretary's office at least 20 days prior to the opening of convention. Sent the other copy to the member authorized to select the proxy.

Proposed amendment changes

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The following are proposed amendment changes to the N.S.A.C. Constitution and By-Laws, and will be acted upon at the 85th Annual Convention to be held in Daytona Beach, Florida, October 3-7, 1977.

1. "The term of office of the officers and trustees of the N.S.A.C. shall be limited to a three term period, or nine consecutive years. When a Trustee is elected to a higher office the period of time shall apply to the office to which he has been elected."

2. "That, the N.S.A.C. Board of Directors shall have full responsibility of reviewing, grading, and notification to all Applicants on written test examination for Healing, Mediums Licentiate and Reverend. Questions to proposed Applicants for "Certificates of Certification," to be agreed on and furnished by the N.S.A.C."

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Spiritualists can again become

the forerunners of scientific achievement

In last month's article on scientific investigation in Spiritualism, I tried to present objectively its scope and the role that Spiritualists could play. Now, I hope to explain what could happen to this religion if its leaders do not take a position of responsibility and openly investigate parapsychology.

The first scientific probes of the demonstrable phenomena caught the attention of such pioneers as Professor Hare, Judge Edmonds, Horace Greely and other established leaders who were willing to put their reputations and livelihoods on the line in defense of Spiritualism. These men were firm in exclaiming that through their findings and research they had determined that life does not terminate with physical death. The end of life signals only one phase in a continuing chain of life. It represents a continuity of consciousness that transcends death.

The immediate change which seems apparent is that the end of physical life as we know it here and now is freed of all old restrictions. Our being goes on but without three dimensional limitations. Perhaps this is a electro-magnetic energy which simply reflects our former form and intellect? Too little is really known about it to make firm statements. At present I can only equate this phenonema to the continuous cycle of life in nature. The first two leaves which sprout after a seed is planted are almost identical in appearance and introduce the plant to the light. As the flower or vegetable grows, the first leaves are over shadowed and their usefulness ends. These leaves wither and return to the elements. That doesn't signal an end to the plant's life... it doesn't die. It lives on in greater beauty and usefulness continues. It is the same with human life. Life newly begun wants to grow and be useful! Call it change, growth or evolution, this is natural law in application. Nothing in nature is static! Not where there is life!

Like the flower, Spiritualists can grow and multiply, or wither away. The choice is not simple. Action is required to sustain life and even more to develop an ever greater usefulness. That is why I believe our religion must be based equally on continuing scientific research and illuminating our philosophy. If our groups of Spiritualists around the nation become placid, we could wither as an organization just like the first leaves of a seedling. The choice is held by each of us, not just our leaders, as they can only reflect the wishes of the whole organization. Now, today and especially at this coming national convention, we have the capacity to grow, mature and show leadership for the betterment of all.


We have the link to the other dimension of life, and the means to tap into knowledge which may otherwise be years in coming. Properly used this link could serve to project Spiritualists as the leaders in the frontiers of scientific achievement.

Already, universities have begun to teach a number of subjects which qualify under the general listing of parapsychology. Industry employs think tanks. And the United States

In the dark there is much moaning and enough whoo-ing for a roost of owls. Soft voices are heard but somehow they are made indistinguishable by Hollywood type discordant background music. Eventually a feeble voice is audible which proclaims to be the devoted and loving husband of Mrs. Arbutus. A flash of lightning reveals a ghostly white figure hovering about the room and Mrs. Arbutus overwhelmed with emotion falls off her chair.

Barrett, responded to his election by saying:

"To be elected the first president of a legally incorporated National Organization of spiritualists of the United States of America, I deem the highest honor ever conferred upon mortal man. I pledge you my earnest endeavor to work for Spiritualism in fair weather and stormy times, as much as my feeble ability will enable me to do; pledging you that the interest of this association shall be my interests, and this religion, the purest and noblest ever vouchsafed to man, shall be advanced in every possible way for the highest good of all mankind. It is the eternal truth, and by standing together as a people, in the same spirit that prevails in this convention, we can redeem the world from


Side Glances

It is so important to remember that man is the captain of his own ship and master of his own destiny.as one thinks so he becomes.





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

Mitzie Monroe

Mitzie Monroe had become the second pastor of a fledgling church in Oakland, California, First Temple of Spiritualism, when I first met her. She was quite young at the time and spent the rest of her life working for the church in everyway she could. The church in Oakland grew and prospered under her influence.

Mitzie had other opportunities outside the church to utilize her executive ability and she did. She was employed for years in a large department store and was a leader in the labor movement.

With the help of Ralph Parker from Chicago, Mitzie was able to develop trumpet mediumship and the voices she transmitted were the loudest and clearest I ever heard. In later years this ability lessened. When we first met at a C.S.S.A. convention in 1938 I was sure that Mitzie and her husband Milton would be my fast friends. For years she was a member of the C.S.S.A. board and participated in both National and State conventions.

She was always in the midst of some project or activity that took not only her time but her strength. Mitzie wrote courses for her students. In fact all of the members of her church were her students and she set the same high standards for them as for herself.

She had a trait as a trance medium which was the opposite of anything else I have ever seen. Usually in a trance condition the medium's eyes will be closed, but Mitzie was occasionally entranced by a young girl who was killed in a terrible accident with her eyes wide open. In the trance Mitzie's eyes also remained ajar, though she saw absolutely nothing while under the influence of this particular spirit.

This is the second of a series of articles written by Paul Wilson, an esteemed N.S.A.C. healer and psychic investigator of national repute. Many of his articles will give you personal insights into some of the greats and near-greats of Spiritualism. At the very least, they will add color and personality to the names.

Melvina Taylor

Melvina Taylor and I met one morning in the office of the Morris Pratt Institute. The year was 1930, about twenty years after the school had opened and I had come eager to enroll. I questioned Miss Taylor about the school being naturally curious as to whether it would be worthwhile for me to attend. When I posed the question, "Who are some of your graduates?", she didn't waste any time or words in answering. She named one student only, William Elliot Hammond. I found her response very odd indeed but something about her personality enticed me to enroll in spite of the fact that the Institute might have only one graduate to its credit!

She was an able lecturer; she had to be because we studied thirteen different subjects taught by a staff of three. She was joined in the teaching effort by Mr. Grimshaw and Alice Hughes. I think Melvina would have preferred to teach college level students because sometimes older pupils were a challenge even to this fine teacher. She taught us a variety of things including public speaking...I've made good use of that training over the years.

Later, Melvina married Frank Hostack and continued to serve as a mental medium, lecturer, teacher, and official of the W.S.S.A. She was also a church pastor and made her home in Wisconsin every summer for years.

Did you know . . .

...Years and years passed before the spiritualists had a Hymnal?

Long before 1911, it was recognized that the Societies of the Churches of Spiritualism needed a hymn book which would stimulate congregational singing.

Under the direction of the Board of Trustees, the first collection of hymns was prepared by Rev. G. Tabor Thompson and this was later supplemented by Zaida Brown Kates, a well known missionary of the N.S.A. of the USA.

Dr. J.M. Peebles donated the National Spiritualist Association the plates and ownership of **The Spiritual Harp** from which a number of songs were taken. The other selections were the contributions of interested individuals or were obtained through the assistance of various music publishers.

The book was completed and copyrighted in 1911 by The National Spiritualist Association of the United States of America and it contained one hundred fifty-four hymns. The soft cover hymnal stated on its cover: Spiritualist Hymnal, A New Collection of Words and Music for the Congregation and Choir Specially adapted by Spiritualists Meetings -- Published by N.S.A. for U.S.A., 600 Pennsylvania Avenue, S.E., Washington, D.C.

In 1960, a committee of three, Rev. Joseph H. Merrill, Kenneth D. Custance and Richard D. Row, revised the hymnal. The hymns selected were studied, old tunes were accepted and lyrics were adapted to the Spiritualist concept. Some of these words were published for the first time in this 1960 hardcover hymnal of two hundred and one hymns. The second and third printings of the hymnal were in 1964 and 1972, respectively.

And as time goes on, all is subject to change. At the National Spiritualist Association of Churches Convention in Phoenix, Arizona in 1976, a discussion was brought to the floor proposing some changes in the hymnal. Time to deal with the matter was limited so discussion was tabled until the next convention.





That Spiritualism was popular in the Nation's Capitol long before the National Spiritualist Association of the U.S.A. was chartered in 1893?

An organization of Spiritualists first held a convention in Plymouth in 1859. A National Organization of Spiritualists was not formed until 1864. At that time they had some eighty auxiliaries functioning in the name of Spiritualism. A statement was made in the 1871 Yearbook of Spiritualism that "Here in the Nation's Capitol, Spiritualism is an established fact and is daily growing in the estimation of an intelligent public."

The First Society of Progressive Spiritualists of Washington, D.C. was organized on the last Tuesday of May in 1867. Their leader was John Mayhew. The Society had a well furnished leased hall and held weekly conferences. Noted

speakers of the day included Dr. J. M. Peebles, Cora L. V. (Richmond), Emma Harding Brittan, Moses Hull, and Nellie Brigham along with many more.

The Children's Lyceum was formed and the manager was George B. Davis. The conductor of the Lyceum was Mary B. Hosmer, Guardian.

A great portion of Spiritualists came from what today we call "The Hill". Of the sixtyseven senators, twenty-two were Spiritualists and of the two hundred and five Congressmen. approximately fifty fell within the ranks of spiritualism. However, of this fifty many fell under the title of closet spiritualist. For to autwardly embrace Spiritualism did not provide in all instances a secure career. Although these ifty attended seances, services and the like, they did not outwardly acknowledge to the world that they were spiritualists. But early records bear their names. The early days of Spiritualism were founded on intellect. The ranks included auditors, authors, editors, commissioners, generals and presidents of our country.

Regardless of the fine intellect that surrounded the movement, the organization dwindled and is last recorded in 1873. Why the organization fell is only an assumption. The assumptions are reasonable: 1) The time was not ripe for organized Spiritualism. 2) The movement became dominated by an element expressing reviews not upheld by the true Spiritualist and thus could not continue to exist.

It was on September 27, 1893, the first Delegate Convention of Spiritualists Societies of the United States met at 77 E. 31st Street, Chicago, Illinois and organized the National Spiritualist Association of the United States, inc. In 1920, at the Ohio Convention, the name was changed to the National Spiritualist Association. However, thirty-two years later, 1952 at the Tulsa, Oklahoma Convention, the name was again changed to the National Spiritualist Association of Churches, (N.S.A.C.).

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
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Declaration of Principles
