

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President Merrill's Address

To the Officers, Trustees, and Delegates of the 85th convention assembled at Daytona Beach, Florida, October 3-7, 1977 -

Greetings:

Once again we are meeting in sunny Florida with miles of sandy beaches, the scene of the Daytona 500 races, and the close proximity to the


N.S.A.C. headquarters in Cassadaga.

Because of the resignation of our former Secretary and the appointment of a new one there are facets of the office that are unknown to a new appointee and we appreciate your cooperation in whatever matter your church might have been involved in and which needed the attention of the Secretary.

To be encouraged over the results of the past years activities would be misleading, and for those who confine their activities to one particular church, gains or losses are localized, whereas on a national scale these are magnified to the point that we may well ask ourselves the question "Where do we go from where?"

It was pointed out in the President's message of 1975 that to maintain strength is to maintain a high standard and enforce these standards though it might not please a minority. The N.S.A. came out of a banding together of Spiritualist groups and societies from all over the country and withstood the test of time. The teachings that came forth, and the acceptance of our Declaration of Principles by non-National Spiritualist groups made the teachings, as taught by the N.S.A. (now N.S.A.C.) as authoritative. We know and realize that being human, many individuals need a crutch to lean upon and it is difficult to throw off the shackles of paganistic orthodox teachings, but it is difficult to understand how Spiritualists can move in the direction that Spiritualism appears to be moving, and this does not mean in the area of science.

Practices of Spiritism instead of Spiritualism causes confusion in the minds of the general public and also in the minds of the Spiritualists themselves. Self-styled Bishops, Holy Eucharist Communion services have no place in Spiritualism. It may be said that such cases are isolated by publishing such to the world through



the news media only confuses the inquiring mind.

This brings me to our Bureau of Education. The line of communication is woefully lacking. Education is sorely needed in our own churches as well as an expansive program that reaches to the outer fringe areas of interest. Cooperation is a two way street and each group must walk the

street if real progress is made.

A definite plan for promoting seminars and work-shops throughout the country by regions will be undertaken and which is hoped will reach into schools and non-National Spiritualist groups as well and utilize some of our teaching talent which otherwise may be lying dormant. One fact is growing more and more evident - the connotation of "Spiritualist" does not strike the responsive chord that "Psychic," "Awareness" or a similar term is used. How to combat this is a question.

In moving about the country and talking with individuals who are interested in Spiritualism but will not get interested enough to become active, we feel a growing feeling that an overemphasis on messages tends to degenerate our religion, and is it possible that we have overemphasized "religion" and under-stressed our philosophical way of life. Young people with a younger generation of thinking, being turned off by organized religion, knock at our doors and on entering receive a message and they have a right

Since the last convention we have received a reply from the Federal Communication Commission relative to our protest of the "Good Morning America" program when Lamar Keene degenerated Spiritualism and mediums in general, and the reply from the FCC states in part "... mere mention of a person or groups, or even certain types of unfavorable references thereto, does not constitute a personal attack, as defined in the Commission's rules." A proper campaign of education, properly organized and publicized is one method of combating such propoganda.

Next, it is indeed a pleasure to welcome aboard our newest chartered churches which are: Spiritualist Society, California; San Gabriel Valley Spiritualist Church, California; The Church of the Spirit, N.S.A.C., Washington, D.C.; Spiritual Enrichment Center, N.S.A.C., Florida; and First Spiritualist Church, New Jersey.

Regetably, one charter was cancelled and the church property sold by The First Church of Spiritualism in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

The healing and mediumship mini courses authored by the Reverend Joseph H. Merrill have been a booming success. We heartily congratulate all those who have passed these courses and we look forward to assisting each of you in reaching the goals you have established for yourself.

Each treasurer and secretary of a member church must submit annual report forms to the national office that are time consuming and almost as irksome as an internal revenue service form. These forms are the basis for an annual filing with internal revenue by your national office, and a late or incomplete filing jeopardizes our non-profit status. We greatly appreciate the extra effort made by those officers who submitted their reports on time (this includes most of you), and we respectfully urge all procrastinators to not only remember us with your prayers but also with your reports. The usual analysis of these reports will be made by the duly appointed committee during the course of this convention.

I particularly want to acknowledge here, publicly, the extra effort made by Catherine Schneider of Way Memorial Temple in Wheeling, who monthly submits reports that are as timely, complete, and consistent as could ever be expected for our healing center activities.

The new Lyceum teachers mini course became available in June. It is an excellent source of information and know how for our teachers. We are most greatful to June Killmer, who compiled and prepared this course and generously donated the copyright to N.S.A.C. It was my pleasure to provide the assistance needed to get this course published.

Many of you who remember that exceptional exponent of Spiritualism, the late Arthur Myer, will be delighted to learn that we have had his booklet reprinted and it is now available from the N.S.A.C. book store. Many thanks to Deborah Reynolds for proof reading this book and the teachers mini course, as well.

All N.S.A.C. accounts and investments have been audited and found to be in order by Public Accountant, D.T. Mumford, who completed his report in late June. All deeds, copyrights, and documents have been organized and placed in a safety deposit box. Other internal procedures suggested by the auditors will be implemented during the coming months, to give you a more effective, efficient N.S.A.C. headquarters.

A complete inventory of all library books, office equipment, and office supplies was very conscientiously completed by Gladys Reid in April

Numerous cnurches and individuals have supported the Founders Day Fund, the Gratitude Day Fund, and the Medium's Relief Fund in a manner that can give all of us great

pride. As a matter of fact, the contributors are so numerous that I couldn't possibly acknowledge them all today, but I do want to say thank you, thank you, thank you, on behalf of your national organization and the six persons who are currently receiving a monthly check from the Medium's Relief Fund.

The N.S.A.C. headquarters building at Cassadaga has required considerable attention, since I took office. The board authorized, and I contracted for and supervised the following

improvements:

1. Fumigation for termites. This required

closing the building for two days.

2. Removal and replacement of termite infested wood, repair of the roof, and painting of the roof and garage. Thank you, Rob Chandler, of the Spiritual Enrichment Center for your well done work - and at such bargain prices!

3. Patching and filling of large wall cracks and painting of walls and woodwork of two work rooms. Six gallons of paint and the heroic efforts of volunteer workers, Betty Mercer, Barbara Smith, Sylvia Flories, Jessie Snowdon and myself were needed for this job. Thank you girls, the rooms look great and are so cheerful.

Replacement of the badly worn, discolored carpet in three rooms with wall to wall carpeting. We are greatful to Casazza Tile and Carpet Inc. for suppying the carpet at wholesale and installing it at cost. Again, thanks to Rob Chandler and Barbara Smith for their labor in moving furniture for the carpet installation, and also to Lois Cronebaugh for her assistance.

5. A complete mammoth spring cleaning of

the entire building.

Your national headquarters receives an immense amount of mail - about 500 to 600 pieces monthly. You want answers to your inquiries and the supplies you have ordered, and you want them now, so I have made a concentrated effort to answer every inquiry or fill every order the day it is received, with the assistance of our capable office assistant, Barbara Smith. This has not always been

possible, particularly during the three week span when I was the victim of two major auto accidents by other drivers who were ticketed; but I am sure that Bee Dorbandt, Francis Owens, Lena Walters, Ed Nixon, Frieda Vollmar and others will attest that they have been receiving their replies as fast as the pony

express could get there.

You will be amused at one problem I have encountered. When I entered office, the sunflower flags were being ordered at the rate of one per week. Well, when we got down to one flag, I said to myself "My heavens, apparently everybody knows how gorgeous these flags are. I had better order some more." So I did, and not one has been requested since the order came in; there they sit, pining for your attention and taking up entirely too much inventory cash.

The Spiritual Enrichment Center donated the delegate badges we will wear during this convention. Thank you David Smalling, for your kind assistance. Other Florida church have worked closely with Reverend D. Mona Berry to make this a successful convention. At this writing, I do not have available detailed information about individual contributions, but thank you First Spiritualist Church, Cassadaga; Spiritualist Church of Awareness, Winter Park, and Spiritual Research Society, Orlando, for the assistance donated to this convention.

During your visit to Florida, please be sure to visit our N.S.A.C. headquarters building in Cassadaga. We are hardly a half hour away, and we really look forward to seeing you. The welcome mat will be out on Thursday afternoon, and lots of refreshments, and conversation will be available. Arrangements for transportation can be made providing there is sufficient interest.

This year has been very fruitful for the N.S.A.C. Lyceum Department. Slowly but surely we're making progress. It has not been an easy task but most rewarding. We are not seeking or asking for personal rewards in the work being done but for the rewards in spiritual progress for the youth of our organization and for the youth who may in the future years find a lifeline to a greater understanding of this beautiful truth. This is the task and the goal we hope to attain. Our quest is not the impossible dream but one that can be reached with cooperation and a willing heart and hands to pull together for the sake of the continuation of the cause that we love--Spiritualism.

We have had wonderful cooperation where we have been invited this year in the interest of the lyceum movement. There has been great interest in the organizing of new Lyceums, but teachers and ministers to direct the work have been in short supply. We have found in some cases that individuals capable and qualified to organize a Lyceum for children and-or adults are defeated by another's inspiration. It is sad when we find competition existing in our N.S.A.C. Churches. Again, we find teachers and ministers with such heavy duties that it is impossible for them to do any more without some help from members of the church. The churches are suffering for the need of ministering members.

The churches with lyceums are more active, enthusiastic, growing and progressing. We must keep trying to promote the lyceums in all our

churches and in camp associations.

The SPOTLIGHT, our Lyceum monthly publication is very educational and most helpful for teachers and students. The editor, Mrs. Rosanne Captain and her capable staff are constantly striving to improve each edition of the magazine and meet our needs in every department of lyceum class work. Have you thought to compliment the editor? Have you thought to send a thank you note? Instead of offering

friendly criticism to assist and help her-have you found fault and destroyed the image of being a faithful lyceum helper or a good Spiritualist?

It is so easy to say "Thank You."

The National Spiritualist Association of Churches and the Stow Memorial Foundation, Inc., have printed a great number of Lyceum Quarterlies, lessons by great lyceum teachers: booklets; lyceum teachers mini-course, etc. during the year. We pray that they shall be utilized or else our work, money and efforts are fruitless. We have had some complaints that some of the lessons, quarterlies, etc. are old and some too orthodox. Do you have new material to offer? Have you contributed any material for publication to replace the old tried and true lessons? In a letter dated August 1977 from the former N.S.A.C. Lyceum superintendent, the Rev. Clyde Dibble stated "--wished that we could find copies of all the old quarterlies of Dibble and Whitwell; Reverend Elsie Bunts; Rev. Melvina Hostack and the dear Anna Wallace." We are happy to announce that some of this material has been found and we have reprinted what is available.

The truth never grows old, and when we have come to the point in life where we fail to find lessons in the written pages of pioneers or saints who have journeyed on, it is a sad situation. Perhaps you did read and study these lessons in years past, but will the lyceumists of today hear them read and discussed? They are stepping stones, wonderful knowledge that can be used and expanded with present day experiences relevant to the lives of our youth. The Bible never grows old. The A.B.C. never grow old; the message heard by the Fox sisters on March 31, 1848--"There is no Death" will never grow

old.

We hear it said over and over again, "it's only human to complain." How often have you heard that phrase, "It's only human?" The marvel and the mystery of existence defy the mind; secrets of human life elude the genius and the sage. Ever probing, scientists admit the unfathomable nature of creation, and of the human mind and spirit. We, as Spiritualists and lyceumists sense the glory and joy of being human. It is the glory and joy for which each individual was destined. We move to help our fellow mortals realize the greatness in each of us.

field of the Lyceum.

The N.S.A.C. has acquired, through the generosity of Mrs. Gladys Gove Wade of Belfast, Maine, a treasure to be added to our museum. Four paintings belonging to Andrew Jackson Davis, handwritten prescriptions, the cape that he wore on occasions, his surgical kit, letters exchanged between Dr. Davis and his foster son Dr. Frank Bigelow (who has been overlooked as one of our pioneers from the state of Maine), together with other memorabilia which will go into the museum. We are most appreciative to Mrs. Wade for leaving these treasures for posterity to be appreciated by all Spiritualists.

Ever since our monthly publication has been printed it has been paid for by Stow Foundation. We must give closer attention to this publication and determine how we might increase interest and bring it from the red into the black, for the subsidizing of this magazine is taking away

funds that might be used for printing much needed literature or out of print books.

Let us not overlook the field of the missionary. If members of the N.S.A.C. know of some area where there is no N.S.A.C. church, yet an interest in establishing an eventual church is manifested, a concentrated effort should be made by our missionaries to promote interest in the area and at the time of establishing a church it is possible that the National Board could aid in the venture. This seems to your President as being real missionary work for it is easy to go into already established churches but real missionary work would seem to move in new, fertile areas.

As we move into the 85th convention, when reports are read of the various bureaus and the reports of the committees are submitted, it is by the acceptance of these reports that the policies of the organization are shaped, for the acceptance of these reports is a mandate to the National Board to follow and act on.

Purpose is one of the most important things in life, here and in the hereafter. World turmoil follows in the wake of wrong values and wrong motives. I feel that men's minds are being centered more and more on material accomplishments. Fewer take time to look within, until, at last almost nothing of their attention turns to the inward searchings that maintains spiritual growth.

The why is more important than the what. If our motives are false, worldly success will be unsatisfactory-- perhaps even bitter, and spiritual success will be much less than we would

wish.

Often spirit speaks of those who were considered so great and successful in this world. They must frequently start at the bottom in the world in Spirit. A beautiful spirit once said, "The great ones of your world are not necessarily the great ones of my world. We see greatness as greatness of soul, greatness of spirit, greatness in desire to serve."

To have a successful story you must have purpose, conflict, and result. There really are only three basic plots: the 'come-to-realizer,' where the main character comes to realize a great truth in the end; man-against-theelements, and man-against-man. In the classic plot of the latter, the hero's purposes are pure and good, while his antagonist, the villian, is a pretty sneaky character and has all the wrong motives. This conflict, and its results, usually make an acceptable story, if handled properly. Sounds trite, doesn't it: But isn't life a great deal like that? Results always go back to motives-- or if we put it the other way, cause-and-effect.

Let's take some examples of wrong purpose. A woman (let's call her Mrs. Anderson), gives a helping hand to her sick neighbor. When the neighbor recovers, she doesn't thank Mrs. Anderson properly. So for weeks Mrs. A. feels angry and sorry. She keeps telling everyone about all the tasks she performed for her neighor and how ungrateful the neighbor has been.

We all like to receive thanks, but should our acts of kindness be done for that reason? If they are, then we would probably be better not to help

at all, for our purpose was wrong.

Next let's take two men working for success. One is thinking in terms of wealth and power -another wants to give the world something that will make everyone's life happier and easier.

The first man climbs the ladder of success ruthlessly, making enemies on his way up. Work becomes his obsession rather than a source of satisfaction. He even becomes a stranger to his family, and often ends up, unhappily, with just money and ulcers.

The second man, thinking of how he can be of service, is absorbed and happy in his work, but not obsessed by it. He shares his satisfaction with his family and they are happy for him.

The whole difference in these two examples

rests in their purpose.

Take the man who donates a great deal of money to his church or college for publicly acknowledgement. He wants people to say "What a great philanthropist that fellow is."

Another man gives because he believes in his church or college and wants to see it thrive. He asks that no mention be made of his donation.

What about purposes here?

In the spirit aspect of the universe, our purposes are at once apparent, and if they do not express good will and cooperation or concern for another's welfare, it will be known. This reality may free a change in our thinking if we wish to earn the respect of those in the beautiful dimensions of spirit.

So let's examine our motives carefully and honestly daily. Let's be sure they are neither selfish or inconsiderate. Then we will gain happiness and satisfaction in what we ac-

complish.

If it spiritual unfoldment we are striving for, our spirit teachers and loved ones will then find it much easier to communicate with us.

Mark A. Barwise

In 1853, Spiritualists in America numbered in the millions. Counted among them were the greatest scientific minds and educators the world had then seen. Spiritualism was at its peak before the turn of the century. Even congressmen and senators rallied to our support and joined our ranks. During one period in Washington, D.C., twenty-two senators and fifty congressmen were listed on our membership rolls. Spiritualism drew the very best this nation offered.

Spiritualism has long been fortunate in reaching the standard bearer of our society. Such a man of principle was Maine State Senator Mark A. Barwise. He served the official board of the Maine State NSA chapter, the Sons of the American Revolution, and held the thirty-second Mason degree--the same as President Harry Truman.

For many years Mr. Barwise played an active part in organized Spiritualism. He presided over the Unity Spiritualist Society in Bangor, Maine; was President of Temple Heights Camp for seven years; and held the office of President of the Maine State Spiritualist Association for ten years.

At one point in his career, he was elected to the National Spiritualist Association board. He held numerous offices in the national organization: Executive Committeeman of the NSA board; Curator of the Bureau of Phenomenal Evidence; Associate Counsel of the Bureau of Legislation and Law; and Assistant Superintendent of the Bureau of Education.

Perhaps his most important service to the movement came in 1920, when his decisions as chairman of the Committee of Revision of the NSA Constitution and By-Laws greatly strengthened the organic law of Spiritualism.

He was a profound student of Spiritualist philosophy, and exceptionally well versed in its history. His lectures were informative, filled with his assertiveness, yet easy on the ears.

Mr. Barwise was often called upon to lend his legal assistance. And he gave freely each time of his talent.

The religion of Spiritualism is founded on science, the ever constant mediator of life and reality. It attracted Mr. Barwise, who realized the value it held.

As we assemble in convention, please let all of us promote the greatest possible "unity of purpose" and harmonious achievement, for the progress of Spiritualism.



Ernest accepts each client as the only client. His words are soft and every detail of what he will do is carefully explained. Before beginning the therapeutic session, Ernest selects some meditative music to further your relaxation. After starting the record player, he rejoins you and asks you to hold the Holy Bible with him. Then, as Ernest put it, he becomes the mediator, and places himself at the direction of his doctor.

At first you'll notice the traditional passes, but perhaps you will find yourself surprised as I did, when you feel the intense heat of his hands. They seem to radiate nothing but body warmth when he passes them above areas in sound condition. But each pass over an old injury or current pain sparked rapid increases in the warmth of his hands. And at each point the right or left hand lingered, as if to allow more time for healing. (Later I found that Ernest was not aware of this, not could he recall where he paused.)

When the healing session is over, Ernest remarks that he "is stepping out of your aura." It is his belief that his doctor must work through the aura, it serving as a conductor to the

material body.

Although I regard myself as being in excellent condition and asked for the healing as an excuse to write this article, I am now convinced that healing can also serve as a beneficial tool to tone the spiritual aura and recheck the alignment of magnetic energies which periodically require fine tuning.

This is the third article of a continuing series about some of the greats and near greats of Spiritualism whom Rev. Paul D. Wilson has met and known. At the very least his commentary will add color and personality and give you a brief look at the person behind the name. Rev. Wilson's reputation as a healer and psychic investigator has achieved national repute.

Etta Bledsoe Rarely does a gifted medium also possess a silver tongue. But Etta Bledsoe did. The great Charles Laughton would have been proud to have been on the same stage with her. She was truly remarkable. Etta could capture the very essence of her subject and project it with such superbly descriptive oratory that she always

managed to hold her audience spellbound. Even when her listeners consisted of a small group, her ability was in strong evidence.

Etta was equally gifted in her mental mediumship. It was the outstanding combination of these two remarkable abilities that made her irresistible to many organizations and churches, placing her in constant demand as speaker and medium.

Etta lectured and traveled extensively. She and her husband Scott Bledsoe, a Christian minister, worked as a team for many years. After his death she was aided by her sister, Evelyn Burnside, a clairvoyant and trumpet

I can recall one of her many visits to

Chesterfield. Etta seemed to have a personality which super charged the group attending her lectures and message sessions.. She was always in full command.

Santa Cruz, Calif., served as home to Etta for most of her adult years. The church she started there is still doing God's work. It's pastored by one of her students, Mitzie Monroe.

Daisy Lane

The first professional Spiritualist I ever knew was Daisy Lane, a rance and trumpet medium from Bedford, Ind. We met in the accompaniment of her secretary, Lillian Griner, in Martinsville, Ind., where Daisy frequently held seances in 1925 and 1926. I was introduced to her by Seth Bales, a chiropractor.

Even now it's easy to recall that first seance. Never before had I witnessed flashing lights in a totally dark room. And my questions were always met with sound, logical answers, something which I had not expected.

At these seances I learned about the Spiritualist movement and about Camp Chesterfield.

Sometimes the funniest things happen in seances. Such was the case one night at one of her sittings. A spirit who identified himself as Abe Howell was puzzled and concerned that no one recognized him. He had not materialized,

Although she frequently referred to me as her baby, we were more like close friends because for three years she shared with me all her intimate secrets, such as little girls have.


There were many times when she took me to bed soaking wet from her tears. It took several days for my sawdust to dry out after some of the more severe soakings.



The Sunflower has been the Official Flower of Spiritualism since 1898

Time obscures many things. Hopefully, the true investigator of Spiritualism will uncover the full story of the Sunflower. Until that happens, I will share with you that which I have found. The records from earlier periods suggest, however, that it was chosen even before this.

In 1900, Mr. W. H. Bach manufactured the first bins bearing the Sunflower. He also produced buttons, brooches and watch fobs faced with the

flower. In 1928, the Sunflower was adopted as the official badge of "International Spiritualism" at the Conference of International Federation of Spiritualists.

The Sunflower song was composed by Mrs. Grace Linn Sandy of Indianapolis and adopted by the N.S.A. in 1928, as its association song.

Also in 1900, Mr. N.F. Ravlin, speaker of the First Association of Spiritualist of Philadelphia, formed the Young People Twentieth Century Sunflower Club.

As I look at the flower, I can readily ununderstand why it was selected as the international representative of Spiritualism. The sunflower is native to the soil of the United States. It has been transplanted to many other soils all over the world. In 1948, Spiritualism was then recognized as a religion in thirty-eight nation.

The Sunflower is like a magnet. It attracts selectively! The uncommon nectar of Spiritualism is very similar to its official flower. Spiritualism appeals not to the masses, but to the individual who seeks reason, the individual who seeks something beyond mere faith.

The Sunflower rests atop a strong stalk. Spiritualism also demonstrates to mankind that peace and understanding here and in the hereafter depends on a strong character.

The long reach of the Sunflower protects the weaker plants and flowers to its sides and helps shield them from angry winds. It tends to balance the natural forces to give protection to the plants it is near. Spiritualism can easily be considered in the same light. It protects man from superstition that prohibits his spiritual growth and provides him with a solid foundation upon which he can base a firm groundwork of understanding of why he is here, what he must do, and where he is going.

You must remember, the Sunflower also provides great medicinal value and contains almost a complete balance of all that nature calls vitamins and minerals. Spiritualism stresses the value of spirit in healing.

As the Sunflower turns its face to the light of the sun, so let Spiritualism turn the face of humanity to the light of truth.

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Massachusetts community of Onset celebrates Spiritualism centennial

Spiritualists from Boston, New Bedford and Fall River founded the village of Onset 100 years ago: that's a fact which is being commemorated this weekend with a Centennial celebration throughout the town.

The Spiritualist Church was officially organized in Chicago in 1893, and is governed by an elected board of directors, with auxiliaries, state organizations, and local churches.

According to the Rev. Kenneth Custance, copastor with his wife Gladys, of the First Spiritualist Church of Onset, "the set-up is similar to Methodism." The clergy are ordained and study a comparable course of theology.

The minister, as in most churches, serves as a spiritual director, and conducts religious services. However, in the Spiritualist Church, the minister, who is frequently certified as a medium, may also give spirit messages.

A medium may address a message to someone sitting in the congregation, the Onset minister explained, and tell him the name of a deceased relative or acquaintance, the specific relationship, and mention some specific means of identification, such as the circumstances in which the person died, or a special talent he had.

"(Mediumship) has kept families together, and kept people from suicide," he added, describing an instance when his wife, also a medium, informed a woman that her plan for suicide was unwise and selfish. Although the woman initially denied such intent, she finally

admitted it, and resolved to abandon the idea. When asked how it was possible for one to determine if he had the ability to act as a medium, Rev. Custance replied, "Everyone is psychic. They have hunches and intuitions, but at some times it is more evident than others. If there is potential, it begins to show, if they have the inclination."

A medium, as defined by the Spiritualist Church, is a mediator between two worlds.

"These people have been trained in their church, prepared for public work, and examined by the state Spiritualist board," Custance stated.

Certified healers also play an important part in the Spiritualist Church.

"We trace our healing abilities to the Bible. Jesus had great healing powers, and said, 'What I have done, ye can do also.' We can emulate this ability, but we don't make any claims for instantaneous healing."

"When you go to a doctor, you don't get cured by the first pill you take," he commented. "If people come regularly, the results are usually very good."

He cited the example of a young woman who came in to a healing service in pain from swollen knees. The healer took hold of her ankle, although the woman pointed out that the problem was in her knees. Without manipulation, he said, something snapped, and when she stood up, she was free of the discomfort.

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
