

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
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Truth! Often so simple it boggles the mind

This yearning, indescribable to most Roman Catholics or Protestants, forms the search for truth and the question facing the religious constituency of this country, and perhaps the world.

adult western High Noon. His compassion, courage and sense of dedication as displayed in the film made Coop a name in film history. That film changed the concept of good guys, bad guys and made westerns adult entertainment, instead of Saturday matinees viewed by teeny-boppers.

While today is important, there's something to be said for constructive hero following. Particularly when I find stories in my newspaper about a New York City youth who, when asked to name his hero singled out the neighborhood dope pusher. The boy's reasons were simple: "He's tough."

Unfortunately, incidents like that are becoming all too common. I can recall when boys thought of growing up as Jack Armstrong, the all American boy.

Andrew Davis saw things in the youth of his day that he felt were wrong. He was an illustrious pioneer, reformer and educator. His idea of a teacher was one who could verbally capture his students and draw them into the lesson. For his time, that was original.

Davis initiated the Band of Mercy, a program aimed at teaching Children kindness to animals. Perhaps you could say he was emulating the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. In either case, it was a first, like most things Davis did.

Davis objected to the heavy emphasis placed on catechism teachings. He believed that one does not achieve spiritual growth by memorizing a series of questions with officially correct answers. Some of the precepts which he taught over 115 years are now being applied in the education of youth. He felt that each student, regardless of age, was an individual, and should be given all opportunity to express his original attributes and potential.

Today we understand a few of these precepts. We know that personal responsibility is the keynote of the philosphy of Spiritualism. But even more. It should be obvious that such responsibility is needed for a better society.

Spiritualism comes to the world to prove survival and to give comfort. It extends to mankind a better way to achieve salvation, while affording direction toward happiness here and now.

The seeds of personal responsibility that influence the youth of today will help in the future to unite all mankind in harmony.

The challenge of the decade is to become worthy of being emulated. In the words of William Butler, "when the ceremony of innocence is drowned," and "the best lack all conviction," such as now, heroes are needed most.

Jayne Mansfield

In the fall of 1966, when Jayne Mansfield was in town for the San Francisco Film Festival, staying at the Fairmont Hotel on Nob Hill near where I lived, I began having premonitions about her. The first occurred when I read in the San Francisco papers that she had been asked to leave the Festival. I scanned the article and turned the page. Suddenly I felt that familiar feeling that goes with premonitions. Turning the page back, I studied the picture of Jayne. The premonition took precedence over other thoughts in my mind. Something dreadful would happen to her in a year's time or even before that. I couldn't imagine what it would be.

I forgot about Jayne until one rainy evening on my way home from work, I waited for a bus under the awning of a photographer's shop. I suddenly felt compelled to turn around. When I did, I saw a display of pictures of Jayne Mansfield taken when she was very young and new to Hollywood.

When I realized the premonitions were persistent I thought of notifying Jayne Mansfield by sending a letter to her Pink Palace in Beverly Hills. But since I had nothing concrete to pass on to her, I felt it wouldn't help to send letters of caution. Perhaps my letters would sound like threats. So I waited.

Later, I read an article that jarred me back into awareness of Jayne. She had, according to the article, visited an animal park with some other adults and her children. A lion attacked her young son, Zoltan. For days his condition was very grave and surgeons worked hours to save the child. Complications set in. recovery was doubtful. This had happened about a week after Jayne returned to her Beverly Hills home from the Film Festival in San Francisco. Eventually her son did recover and came home for Christmas, 1966, to convalesce. As I read this story I knew it still wasn't the dreadful thing of my premonitions. I began to wonder just what was to happen to Jayne.

By way of background, I knew very little about Jayne Mansfield except what I occasionally read in the papers. I heardly knew she existed until the fall of 1966 when she was in the news in relation to the Film Festival. I lived close to the hotel where the festival was held and saw crowds gather to see the stars.

By June, 1967, I had forgotten the premonitions. So it came as a shock when I read of Jayne's fatal accident. It was assumed she was asleep when her car accident occurred. Her son Mikelos had asked his mother to shut her eyes and go to sleep before he did. Jayne's middle children were in the car with her and her baby and oldest daughter were at home in Beverly Hills. The collision came on the road between Biloxi, Mississippi and New Orleans. Late at night, the car struck a parked vehicle used to spray the swamps for insects. That spray truck was apparently the obstruction in my premonitions.


Two weeks after the accident, the middle of July, I encountered her spirit. It was a pleasant evening. I wrote to a friend and sat back to daydream. I thought of Jayne Mansfield decided to write a letter to her Hollywood columnist friend, explaining my premonitions and my feeling that she would communicate with me in some way. As I finished the letter it happened. I heard a pretty soft voice say, "Tell her I love her." I did not need to be told that this was the voice from a movie I had seen about five years earlier... I knew intuitively it was Jayne Mansfield's. I stopped writing and wondered for a moment whether I had heard what I thought I heard. The radiator hissed rather noisily and the rain beat against my window. The cage elevator arrived on my floor and there were footsteps in the corridor. Suddenly these normal sounds were supplanted by a profound stillness. I felt as if I were in a vault made of marble or a cave.

Next came an all-encompassing sweet odor. I have smelled a lot of perfumes, but I never before smelled anything like this. It was light and yet eerily sweet. I realized that I was caught in something that I had never imagined possible.

Jayne repeated what she said, "Tell her I love her." She added, "My daughter, tell her I love her." I knew she meant her eldest child, Jane Marie. Then the mood in the room changed from profound love to deep sadness and pain. Jayne began crying and sobbing. I realized that there was an oval-shaped cold spot on my back running from right shoulder to the left of my waist which seemed mentholated. Possibly this was where Jayne and I were connected. I did not see her but her presence was strongly felt and I did hear her voice. Moreover, I felt her emotions.

Once man has looked into his real inner self and understands what is created within his very inner most being: and probed his consciousness, his subconsciousness, then and then only can we say:





Hugh Gordon Burroughs



I first met him when he was vice president of the N.S.A.C. at convention. Although his clientele in Wasihington, D.C., registered among the diplomatic elite, both foreign and domestic, he quickly gained the nickname of Pappy. His career began early as a lecturer and both work and dedication to his studies expanded to encompass mediumship and healing. He served his church in Washington well. Even today The Church of Two Worlds seems to be synonymous with his name.

His friendship was hard for many to earn, as few held his confidence. The few who did were measurably enriched by his character and talents.

Few men or women have ever achieved the wide recognition of Hugh Gordon Burroughs. He was perhaps known to more workers and non-Spiritualists than any single person. He moved in Washington society with the ease of a cabinet member, confident and in command of all he surveyed.

Despite his dedication, he never aspired to the presidency of the N.S.A.C. Spiritualism was his life's work. He gave to it his full pursuit and dedication. And Spiritualism returned to him a measure of compensation for the loss he endured early in life. Hugh never married. His plans were cut short when the woman of his life died before arrangements could be settled.

Today you can see a painting of Hugh Gordon Burroughs that hangs in the Chesterfield museum. It's nearly life size. It was given to him as a token of his outstanding devotion to his church in Washington, D.C., by members. That painting is much like the man in that nearly everything he did was life size.



Mary Langley Beattie

Like father like daughter. Communication came easily for Mary Langley Beattie, whose phases included materialization, trance, trumpet and mental mediumship. She was born in Ohio and proved to be the equal of her medium father, John G. Hinder.

She made herself available to research societies, so that her gifts could receive the full study they deserved. This was unusual in itself, but her daylight demonstrations of trumpet at the camp grove meetings at Chesterfield were even more unusual, if not astonishing.

While it was and is today customary for helpers to assist a medium and act as a buffer between her and the sitters, Mary did not always ask for this. In fact, she was always ready and even eager to hold a seance. Truely, this medium was a sitter delight. Even though she was in high demand seldom did she lack the necessary force. However, I recall one occasion when her energy level was apparently lower than normal and her guides changed a materialization seance to a trance demonstration. Full materialization wasn't possible -something was lacking. Before the sitting began Mary sensed a problem, but rather than disappoint the sitters, decided to go ahead. She was like that. The materialization was to the satisfaction of the group, but having witnessed her materializations before I realized that the white form which stood at the front of the cabinet was less than her usual excellent quality.

Did You Know

There were two major forerunners of Modern Spiritualism? EMMANUEL SWEDENBORG became known as the Swedish Seer. He came into an earthly life in 1688, and passed to the life of invisibility in 1772. The first fifty-seven years of his life he was known as a scientist and a philosopher. He formulated the nebular hypothesis of the creation of the universe. He discovered the functions of the ductless glands and the cerebellum. At the age of thirty he was given a position in the Swedish House of Nobles.

However, it was not until the age of fifty-seven that he claims he was called by God in a vision and was chosen then as a selected vessel. He was instrumental in giving the world its first clear and acceptable explanation of the Spirit World and life therein.

He surveyed all that was understood of psychology at that period of time. He began interpreting his own dreams and followed with yoga like practices of suspending his breathing and drawing his attention inward. From 1744 to 1771 he claimed to be in constant touch with the world of Spirit. He probed the vast regions of the soul and engaged in lengthy discussion with Spirit.

Swedenborg was and is considered the wayshower and he prepared the minds of the peoples for Modern Spiritualism. Because of his place in the scientific world, as well as the Swedish Government, his theories in regard to spirit and a spirit world were accepted.

FRANZ ANTON MESMER became a physical being in 1734, and passed to higher life in 1815. Mesmer was a Viennese doctor who received great attention in 1788, because of his display of magnetic cures. He helped establish the naturalness of spiritual and psychic manifestations. Many mesmerized subjects demonstrated great psychic abilities and often became the subject of Spirit controlled trance.

Among his acquaintenances and patients we find such noted persons as Mozart, King Louis XVI, his queen Marie Antoinette, as well as Empress Maria Theresa of Austria. Much of his work was done in France as well as in Austria and Germany. Mesmer deserves much credit for the early benefits he established for Spiritualism.

The National Spiritualist Association of Churches has many historical dates?

1900 - The Sunflower Club was established on November 16th by Mr. N. Raulin of the First Association of Spiritualists in Philadelphia. The purpose of the club was to fulfill the need for a gathering of young people. Thus was established the Young Peoples Twentieth Century Sunflower Club.

1919 - The National Spiritualist, the official organ of the association was first published on January 18, 1919 in Chicago, Ill. Dr. George B. Warne was the first editor.

1922 - The Bureau of Education was established following a suggestion by Rev. T. Grimshaw. At the time two courses of study were prepared, The General Course and the Advanced Course. In October 1925 the first students received their National Spiritualist Teacher certificates.

1927 - The National Spiritualist Teachers Club was organized at the San Antonio Convention. The continuing purpose of the club was and remains to keep members in touch with the Bureau of Education and to stimulate and maintain enthusiasm in education of our workers.

1932 - The First Spiritualist Yearbook was published. The book lists our principles and other pertinent information. It lists ordained ministers, certified licentiates, mediums, healers, teachers, and missionaries as well as auxiliaries.

1932 - The National Spiritualist Booster Club came into being through the efforts of Ava Whiston, then business manager of TNS. The purpose of the club was to ban together those interested in promoting the truths of Spiritualism by soliciting subscribers to the magazine.

1934 - The NSA Junior League was established at the Syracuse Convention in 1934. It's purpose and aim was to encourage young workers.

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




stood by.



Sir Arthur Conan Doyle

Spiritualism is a system of thought and knowledge which can be reconciled with any religion. The basic facts are the continuity of personality and the power of communication after death. These two basic facts are of as great importance to a Brahmin, a Mohamedian, or a Parsee as to a Christian. Therefore Spiritualism makes a universal appeal. There is only one school of thought to which it is absolutely That is the school of irreconcilable. materialism, which holds the world in its grip at present and is the root cause of all our misfor-Therefore the comprehension and acceptance of Spiritualism are essential things for the salvation of mankind, which is otherwise destined to descend lower and lower into a purely utilitarian and selfish view of the universe. The typical materialistic state was pre-war Germany, but every other modern state is of the same type if not of the same degree.

It may be asked, why should not the old religions be strong enough to rescue the world from its spiritual degradation? The answer is that they have all been tried and have failed. The churches which represent them have become to the last degree formal and worldly and material. They have lost all contact with the living facts of the spirit, and are content to refer everything back to ancient days, and to pay a lip service and an external reverence to an outworn system which has been so tangled up with theologies that the honest mind is nauseated at the mere thought. No class has shown itself so skeptical and incredulous of modern Spiritual manifestations as those very clergy who profess complete belief in similar occurrences in bygone ages, and their utter refusal to accept them now is a measure of the sincerity of their professions. Faith has been abused until it has become impossible to many earnest minds, and there is a call for proof and for knowledge. It is this which Spiritualism supplies. It founds our belief in life after death and in the existence of invisible worlds, not upon ancient tradition or upon vague intuitions, but upon proven facts, so that a science of religion may be built up, and man given a sure pathway amid a quagmire of

When one asserts that Spiritualism may be reconciled with any religion, one does not mean

that all religions are of the same value, or that the teaching of Spiritualism alone may not be better than Spiritualism mixed with any other Personally the author thinks that creed. Spiritualism alone supplies all that man needs, but he has found many men of high soul who have been unable to cast off the convictions of a lifetime, and yet we have been able to accept the new truth without discarding an old belief. But if a man had Spiritualism alone as his guide, he would not find himself in a position which was opposed to essential Christianity, but rather in one which was explanatory. Both systems preach life after death. Both recognize that the after life is influenced in its progress and happiness by conduct here. Both profess in the existence of a world of spirits, good and evil, whom the Christian calls angels and devils, and the Spiritualist guides, controls, and undeveloped spirits. Both believe in the main that the same virtues, unselfishness, kindness, purity

and honesty for a high character. To Spiritualists every path upwards is commendable, and they fully recognize that in all creeds there are sainted, highly developed souls who have received by intuition all that the Spiritualist can give by special knowledge. The mission of the Spiritualist does not lie with these. His mission lies with those who openly declare themselves to be agnostic, or those more dangerous ones who profess some form of creed, and yet are either thoughtless or agnostic at heart.

From the author's point of view the man who has received the full benefit of a new revelation is the man who has earnestly tried the gamut of the creeds and has found them all equally wanting. He then finds himself in a valley of gloom with death waiting at the end, and nothing but plain, obvious duty as his acting religion. Such a condition produces many fine men of the Stoic doctrine, but is is not conducive to personal happiness. Then comes the positive proof of independent existence, sometimes suddenly, sometimes by slow conviction. The cloud has gone from the end of his prospect. He is no longer in a valley but upon the ridge beyond, with a vista of successive ridges each more beautiful than the last in front of him. All is brightness where once gloom girt him round. The day of his revelation has become the crowning day of his

All that is natural in the gospels comprised the basis, the original, the foundation of a record of a man who, as the centuries passed, came to be looked upon as a god. Jesus, the Jew, over a period of three hundred years, became just another pagan Christ, being officially added to the pantheon of sacrificed god men at Nicaea. Just as this came about, so was attributed to him what was attributed to the god men worshipped by the religions surrounding Palestine. throughout the entire New Testament we have the man Jesus, who is referred to seventy six times as the son of man, and intertwined with him is the god Christ, who, in course of time, became interwoven with Jesus. The result is that we have a composite portrait made up of the original and an entirely different one painted over it. In places the man obliterates the god, while in others the god obliterates the man, so much so that the original portrait of the man is well nigh impossible to discover. Jesus is indeed a misty figure in history.

I shall try to disentangle the two, and relate side by side what we may reasonably believe the name of Jesus stands for, and what the Christ of Saint Paul and the Christian Church represents.

Jesus stands for the friend of sinners. He is the advocate of free thought and the one who saw the errors of the religion of his time. He taught that as we live on earth so would be our place hereafter. Christ stands for the Church, for othodoxy, and salvation through belief and faith.

Jesus stands for the man of sorrows who could find no resting place, because of the intolerance and bigotry of the prevailing religion which made him a wanderer from place to place. Christ stands for God, for a name above every name to which every knee must bow.

Jesus stands for a martyr, a reformer, and for one who suffered for his convictions. Christ stands for a crucified savior god, who took the sins of the world and suffered in the place of

humanity.

Jesus taught us to look on God as our Father in Heaven, who pities us, and cares for us as a father does his children. Christ stands for original sin and the need for a savior, a mediator between an angry God and sinful man, who had to be sacrificed and suffer to satisfy the wrath and vengeance of God.

Jesus taught the brotherhood of man, and that

we should not judge others unjustly because ourselves wish to be justly judged. Christ stands for a god of injustice, a tyrant, who has consigned practically every one of his creation to eternal hell. Jesus stands for peace, harmony and international brotherhood; Christ for war, Christianity having been the cause of many of the wars of Europe up to the 18th century.

Jesus taught love, charitableness, loving kindness and long suffering. Christ is responsible for saying "But those, mine enemies, which would not that I reign over them, bring hither and slay them before me." This was one of the texts which caused the Inquisition to be adopted in some countries.

Jesus lived a Jew and died a Jew. He never founded a church or a religion. Christ stands for the church, theological colleges, monasteries, convents, and also for priests, clergymen, ministers of the gospel, who claim to be his representatives on earth for the purpose of revealing to man an ecclesiastical salvation.

Jesus possessed neither riches nor honors. His life was one of poverty and great simplicity. Christ represents papal crowns and miters sparkling with precious stones, processions, crucifixes, images, pomp, ceremony and the vast wealth owned by his church.

Jesus is reported as having partaken before his death of a simple meal of farewell with his disciples, which has been turned into a mystical

ceremony

Jesus taught that the Kingdom of Heaven is within us. Christ stands for an immense organization, which claims him as its cornerstone. Jesus taught that as we live on earth so shall our place be hereafter. Christ, on the other hand, is represented as the only way to salvation.

God's love toward us, and our love towards God and our neighbor is what Jesus stands for. He showed his contempt for the priesthood, because then as now it spread false doctrines. Christ stands for dogma, doctrine, baptism, the confession, confirmation, the churching of women, the marriage and burial services, and the doctrine that whoever his church binds on earth shall be bound in heaven.

The church lifted this sublime man out of his setting after his death, made him its possession and emblem, and its priests paraded him about the world, attributing to him what its early theologians had invented. By cunningly distorting and misrepresenting his mission in life it has amassed great wealth, which its followers have contributed in fear.

Have you wisdom enough to teach?

The measure of every teacher is reflected through the growth evident in the minds of his children. Learning is never simple, nor is teaching. Both require understanding. But the real burden befalls the teacher, who must communicate across unreached borders to inspire and challenge the minds of the young. Not every child is capable of displaying the same degree of learning. Few have naive intelligence

capable of seizing each thought.

It takes imagination to be a good teacher, even more to interest the advance student. To achieve more than mere instruction places one in the role of an educator. Perhaps you can recall one such person from your own school days. For me it was a geographic professor. He had the amazing flexibility to command compassion for a moment in history and then demand and get complete dedication to his studies. In his spare time he sold encyclopedias. His life was teaching. His joy came from watching the minds of his students absorb the knowledge of history. He expected everyone but the insensitive to feel, as he did, a compassion and appreciation for the past and those who lived it. No one has ever matched his place or filled the definition of education that he gave me.

Here was a man who knew his subject well. To him the characters were alive, a living memory of another time. His materials were the simpliest: speech, history books, an occasional map, a familiarity next only to having been there, and a personal nature which made everything he did

totally believable.

He was so easy to get to know. Within a few days everyone thought of him as a friend. He wasn't a statistician who assigned tests and reading lessons. His communication was so complete that often students would turn to him for counsel. And he always had time for a troubled student. If his tongue was ever sharp it was because there wasn't an alternative way to reach the student. Perhaps as I look back, it was insight which made him so superior.

Instruction techniques have changed much over the past 20 years, even more during the last five years, but he certainly possessed all that was necessary. Always he delivered the lessons in an orderly manner. He packed each incident of importance with descriptive illustration and constantly suggested other reading which would tell us more. This is the kind of educator who I wish had served my lyceum class. For I'm sure

that no child would have drifted off to sleep, or disrupted the class. First of all, he commanded our attention fully. And if someone did forget that he was in class, this man was quick to turn the subject around to where the disinterested was suddenly in the middle of a discussion. He asked more of us than a good memory. He wanted us to understand why these things happened as they did. He wanted our full attention, our ability to reason out the why.

I suppose he was a good psychologist too. He probably understood the basic methodology of learning. He reached out to all five senses whenever possible. He tried to impact through sight and sound. He asked for group discussions to let us assume the role of the characters we

studied.

When he depicted a scene he understood how to build the setting, to convey to each student a sense of nervous excitement. Truly it was at these times that my mind raced ahead following each new discovery with a kind of living thought.

This is the mystery of knowledge. It can be exciting. It can reach into our brains and charge our very souls, the ultimate storehouse of all

knowledge.

The nervous system is the sentinel of the soul. In it all flashes of thought are changed into spiritual values and stored for all time. A thought once made is no longer a product of the brain, nor the mind. It becomes the property of the soul. It losses sensation, changes from a precept to a yet unknown quantity. The interrelation between knowledge, thought, matter and spirit is also a part of the mystery of knowledge, for no sooner is one thing said then it becomes a part of the soul.

We cannot say that knowledge enters the mind. It travels to the brain via the nerves. The accumulation of knowledge is more complex than this. Things that exist in the external are only occasions of knowledge. The first thoughts of all things dwell and originate in the real of Spirit. Knowledge comes from the Spirit and just as quickly as our thoughts are expressed, return to Spirit. This is a point well worth much consideration. No teacher should assume that he or she merely speaks to the young or unlearned as individuals. Every word is destined to reach the soul of man.

How does the mind obtain this knowledge? And what does it do with it? Worthy questions. But both are beyond our simple ability to explain here. A fact is a reality in God's plan. But to you and I it may only be a brief existence.

In search of proof of the existence of a spiritual world

Part II

It may seem an obvious objection that many of the natural laws have no connection whatever with the Spiritual World, and as a matter of fact are not continued through it. Gravitation for instance -- what direct application has that in the Spiritual World? The reply is threefold. First, there is no proof that it does not hold there. If the spirit be in any sense material it certainly must hold. In the second place, gravitation may hold for the spiritual sphere although it cannot be directly proved. The Spirit may be armed with powers which enable it to rise superior to gravity. During the action of these powers gravity need to be more suspended than in the case of a plant which rises in the air during the process of growth. It does this in virtue of a higher law and in apparent defiance of the lower. Thirdly, if the spiritual be not material it still cannot be said that gravitation ceases at the point to be continuous. It is not gravitation that ceases -- it is matter.

This point, however, will require development for another reason. In the case of the plant just referred to, there is a principle of growth or vitality at work superseding the attraction of gravity. Why is there no trace of that law in the Inorganic World? Is not this another instance of the discontinuousness of law? If the law of vitality has so little connection with the inorganic kingdom -- less even than gravitation with the spiritual, what becomes of Continuity? Is it not evident that each kingdom of nature has its own set of laws which continue possibly untouched for the specific kingdom but never extend beyond it?

It is quite true that when we pass from the inorganic to the organic, we come upon a new set of laws. But the reason why the lower set do not seem to act in the higher sphere is not that they are annihilated, but that they are overruled. And the reason the higher laws are not found operating in the lower is not because they are not continuous downward, but because there is nothing for them there to act upon. It is not law that fails, but opportunity. The biological laws are continuous for life. Wherever there is life, that is to say, they will be found acting, just as

gravitation acts wherever there is matter.

Please note. We have purposely indulged in a fallacy. We have said that the biological laws would certainly be continous in the lower or mineral sphere if there were anything for them to act upon. Now laws do not act upon anthing. It has been stated already, although apparently it cannot be too abundantly emphasized, that laws are only modes of operation, not themselves operators. The accurate statement, therefore, would be that the biological laws would be continuous in the lower sphere were there anything there for them, not to act upon, but to keep in order. If there is no acting going on, if there is nothing being kept in order, the responsibility does not lie with continuity. The Law will always be at its post, not only when its services are required, but wherever they are possible.

Attention is drawn to this, for it is a correction one will find one's self compelled often to make in his thinking. It is so difficult to keep out of mind the idea of substance in connection with the natural laws, the idea that they are the movers, the essences, the energies, that one is constantly on the verge of falling into false conclusions. Thus a hasty glance at the present argument on the part of any one ill-furnished enough to confound law with substance or with cause would probably lead to its immediate rejection. For, to continue the same line of illustration, it might next be urged that such a law as Biogenesis, which as we hope to show afterward, is the fundamental law of life of both ehe natural and spiritual worlds, can have no application whatsoever in the latter sphere. The life with which it deals in the Natural World does not enter into the Spiritual World, and therefore, it might be argued, the Law of Biogenesis cannot be capable of extension into it. The Law of Continuity seems to be snapped at the point where the natural passes into the spiritual. The vital principle of the body is a different thing from the vital principle of the spiritual life. Biogenesis deals with **Bios**, with the natural life, with cells and germs, and as there are not exactly similar cells and germs in the Spiritual World, the law cannot therefore apply. All which is as true as if one were to say that the fifth proposition of the First Book of Euclid applies when the figures are drawn with chalk upon a blackboard, but fails with regard to structures of wood or stone.

In search continued

The proposition is continuous for the whole world, and, doubtless, likewise for the sun, moon and stars. The same universality may be predicated likewise for the law of life. Wherever there is life we may expect to find it arranged, ordered, and governed according to the same law. At the beginning of the natural life we find the law that natural life can only come from pre-existing natural life; and at the beginning of the spiritual life we find that the spiritual life can only come from pre-existing spiritual life.

There is not two laws; there is one -- Biogenesis. At one end the law is dealing with

matter, at the other with spirit.

The qualitative terms natural and spiritual make no difference. Biogenesis is the law for all life and for all kinds of life, and the particular substance with which it is associated is as indifferent to Biogenesis as it is to gravitation. Gravitation will act whether the substance be suns and stars, or grains of sand, or raindrops. Biogenesis, in like manner, will act wherever there is life.

The conclusion finally is, that from the nature of law in general, and from the scope of the Principle of Continuity in particular, the laws of the natural life must be those of the spiritual life. This does not exclude, observe, the possibility of there being new laws in addition within the spiritual sphere; nor does it even include the supposition that the old laws will be the conspicuous laws of the Spiritual World. It simply asserts that whatever else may be found there; and that they must project beyond there if there be anything beyond there. If the Law of Continuity is true, the only way to escape the conclusion that the laws of the natural life are the laws, or at least are laws, of the spiritual life, is to say that there is no spiritual life. It is really easier to give up the phenomena than to give up the law.

Two questions now remain for further consideration -- one bearing on the possibility of new laws in the spiritual; the other, on the assumed invisibility or inconspicuousness of the old laws on account on their subordination to the new.

If man could but awaken to the knowledge that Infinite force of the universe knows only love, and that its one purpose is to uplift those who come within its vibrations, then, man's very thinking would be transformed -- completely.

Wisdom continued

The problem is one of understanding. Each thought can be traced by our special senses to its resting place in the mind.

What was first a physical force becomes a spiritual thing; one simple element that joins the temple of knowledge. The character of these elements determines the substance of the temple. A temple cannot build what it lacks.

Consider carefully what this temple of knowledge should be like and what your teachings are building. Now perhaps you begin to understand the value of placing the correct things in the soul and in keeping out others.

The power of the mind to know its own products it called consciousness. The mind, not the body, creates and brings the simpliest elements to the highest precepts. Attention is the power of the mind by which it focuses the consciousness.

For these reasons a teacher should incorporate poems, pictures and other art forms into each lesson. The pupil should understand that all of these are products of limited actions and are not enduring realities. They merely represent the measure of knowledge in our present status.

It is equally important to convey that thoughts are organized feelings molded into permanent forms in memory. The molding force is

imagination.

Instruction may differ in quality, but in quantity each lesson must be complete. It still is a good practice to test students on what they have absorbed before beginning another subject.

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
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
