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
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# **Spiritualism Is Growing !**

Are Spiritualists declining in numbers?

Census figures on Spiritualists that go back over a hundred years don't mean much. Even census figures to-day concerning Spiritualists would be difficult to back up. Polls are expensive and the results depend a great deal on who conducts them and what specific questions are asked.

Everything has its "ups and downs" whether we talk about the stock market or the Catholic church. Many religious organizations are having difficulties. The Shakers are almost nonexistent. One report stated that there was only one colony left - in Maine.

Some believe that the Catholic church is having one of its major problems in keeping priests in the fold. The percentage of priests that resign or quit each year has the Vatican worried. Many parochial schools have had to be closed or consolidated because of lack of funds.

The Episcopal church is having a big upheaval from the new policy of ordaining women. Some congregations have split off and formed a new organization because they object.

## **Impact on Spiritualist Religion**

Spiritualists are inclined many times to fail to grasp the full impact of our religion.

If it is true that there were 3,000,000 Spiritualists in 1860, it is safe to assume that all of them have gone to the spirit world by now. If they believed in Spiritualism then - surely they must believe in it now. If they were interested in communication and manifestation when they lived on earth - in the main - I would assume they still are interested. Now, however, they would have to be working on the sending or transmitting end rather than the receiving. This concept is being demonstrated today in so many striking ways as we read reports of teenagers who demonstrate psychic and mediumistic faculties. So much of this nature has happened in the last decade that we have new words coined such as "geller-like" after Israeli Uri Geller.

People in spirit are bringing to bear a great psychic pressure and seeking out people on earth who have the chemicalization in their bodies for psychic demonstrations. Many of these are definitely physical phenomena.

That's what it took in 1848 and that is what it is taking today to wake up and shake up the world.

## **About Religion**

Little or nothing has been said at this point about religion. However, the public's attention has been called to the phenomena - and, best of all - many scientists have investigated these, key-bending and watch-startings and found them true and free from fraud. In trying to explain all this the scientists are inventing new words and they conclude the results due to mental concentration. Even though that is not the correct explanations that were circulated about the Fox sisters.

When demonstration programs have been televised we find that some of the listeners in their own homes have demonstrations similar to those in the studio, according to hundreds of letters the studios have received.

Another aspect of our present day lies in the research of Dr. Kubler-Ross and Dr. Moody. Spiritualists have always known of the spirit leaving the body when the heart ceases beating. However, after reading the books available today on the subject, Spiritualists would have to agree that the material gives new strength. Scientists are confirming what we already know.

The great spiritual experience Dr. Kubler-Ross had in her office building was spontaneous materialization - the spirit affixing a signature in full light. This was a marvelous demonstration by the spirit world that they wanted her to keep on with her investigations and not quit as she was considering.

## Early day studies

History of the early days reveals that many Spiritualist groups were not churches. Some were societies. Quite a few of them leaned towards the psychological, the investigative and the scientific. Some groups were studying hypnotism as well as phenomena.

Today we should realize that the success of our religious movement depends on hard work on our part and hard work by the people on the other side of life. The number of people in spirit working on this must be enormous, but I have no statistics. They are selecting and developing human instruments at a greater rate than ever before. Of this I am firmly convinced, as I keep in close touch with psychic events world-wide.

# Questions Probed Today, Find Expression Tomorrow

Many Spiritualists have pondered the future of their religions and attempted to attest its impact in terms of numbers -- the size of its churches, financial acquisitions and membership rolls. But doesn't such an objective evaluation bode well to the true impact witnessed by the human race? It's doubtful. Spiritualism has a history rich in achievement, but when put on the scales numerically, it fares weak against other religions. Modern Spiritualism exploded in 1848, unlike most other religions which have influenced mankind for centuries.

Small, but mighty, Spiritualism has managed to focus increased attention on the scientific aspects governing life. It has sparked renewed interest in ESP, baptized parapsychology to a skeptical world, and erased much of the fear that at one time surrounded dream interpretation cloaked in cultistic mysticism. These realities are fact, despite the official attitude taken by some major religions which ignore the tangible significance proving life ever lasting.

Spiritualism places strong emphasis on the importance of natural laws, the governing facts which may act across all dimensions within this universe. Spiritualism has drawn tight the once vague speculation that man is a God in essence, an embryo responsible for its actions. Now these views have weight.

Truths recorded early in the dawning of Spiritualism have today attracted researchers of renown personage, just as it did in the 1800's.

A few years ago, a book was written entitled, **The Heyday of Spiritualism.** It took a look **back** at history and the pioneers who made it happen. Our heritage is beautiful and worthy of study. But today is as vital as that early period. Spiritualism is making an impact on society. Our teachers have much new to learn and to share with others. In a sense you might say that we are at a Heyday to our future.

More and more proof is being gathered, proof that will enlighten the world and emphasize the natural laws which represent the great strength of our religion. Blind, theological theories of the past have to catch up, if they are to hold their congregations. In time other religions will do much as Spiritualist organizations have done -- learn to meet the spiritual needs of their congregations by opening the gifts of spirit within their churches.

Two years ago the Readers Digest carried a story about a coalition of religions. The article referred to common spiritual experiences shared by Catholics, Protestants and Jews, who joined hands to sit in a darkened room to await invisible presence -- commonly termed by Spiritualists, a seance.

Today is really no different than the day in 1848, when spirit said, "We have to unite all mankind in harmony and convince the skeptic of the immortality of the soul."

God gave us ministering angels to watch over us, guide and direct us. In our silence, let us pray, believing; let us listen, receiving; then we shall be made happy and blest. We shall find the kingdom of heaven in which God dwells. God and we dwelling together, will become copartners in the activities of objective life.

# Creation

Over the next months this series will attempt to answer some of the most perplexing questions about Creation. Perhaps it will even pose a few worthy of pondering.

**Charles L. Brandenburg** What is the origin of the universe? Whence came those far off planets and stars? Whence came this earth, these mountains, and oceans, and rocks, and molecules and atoms? What is the origin of things? It is, perhaps, the sublimest question mortal man can ask. According as it is answered, you have unspeakable consequences; either a God and the possibility of a blissful immortality, or no God at all, and the annihilation of religion itself. Do not imagine, then, that this question of origin of the universe is only a secular, or scientific question. It is profoundly the religious question, going down to the very roots of truth, and science, and theology, and Moreover, it is a character, and worship. question which thoughtful men are everywhere asking and this, too, with an unprecedented intensity. It is the stupendous problem of the thinking world of today. Neither imagine that it is being asked only in yonder scientific cloisters; the dreadful answer which you are fondly dreaming is confined to a few philosophers and avowed atheists, is, as a matter of fact, being openly installed in many of your scientific institutions, and is subtly gliding into your universities and academies, your clubs and workshops, aye, your very churches. -- Boardman

An Exegesis of Gen. 1:1 -- "In the beginning had God created the heavens and the earth." This great introductory sentence of the book of God is equal in weight to the whole of its subsequent communications concerning the kingdom of nature.

It assumes the existence of God; for it is He who in the beginning creates. It assumes his eternity; for He is before all things; and as nothing comes from nothing, He himself must have always been. It implies His omnipotence; for He creates the universe of things. It implies His absolute freedom; for He begins a new course of action. It implies His infinite wisdom; for a Cosmos, an order of matter and mind, can only come from a being of absolute intelligence. It implies His essential goodness; for the sole, eternal, almighty, all-wise and all-sufficient being has no reason, no motive, and no capacity for evil. It presumes Him to be beyond all limit of time and place; as He is before all time and place.

What It Assumes and Asserts -- It asserts the creation of the heavens and the earth: that is, of the universe of mind and matter. This creating is the omnipotent act of giving existence to things which before had no existence. This is the first great mystery of things; as the end is the second. Natural science observes things as they are, when they have already laid hold of existence. It ascends into the past as far as observation will reach, and penetrates into the future as far as experience will guide. But it does not touch the beginning or the end. This first sentence of revelation, however, records the beginning. At the same time it involves the progressive development of that which is begun, and so contains within its bosom the whole of what is revealed in the book of God. It is thus historical of the beginning, and prophetical of the whole of time. It is, therefore, equivalent to all the rest of revelation taken together, which merely records the evolutions of one sphere of creation, and nearly and more nearly anticipates the end of the present things.

This sentence assumes the being of God, and asserts the beginning of things. Hence, it intimates that the existence of God is more immediately patent to the reason of man than the creation of the universe. And this is agreeable to the philosphy of things; for the existence of God is a necessary and eternal truth, more and more self-evident to the intellect as it rises to maturity. But the beginning of things is, by its very nature a contingent event, which once was not and then came to be contingent on the free will of the eternal, and therefore, not evident to reason itself, but made known to the understanding by testimony and the reality of things. This sentence is the testimony, and the actual world in us and around us is the reality. Faith takes account of the one, observation the other.

Written by Man and for Man -- It bears on the very face of it the indication that it was written by man, and for man; for it divides all things into the heavens and the earth. Such a division evidently suits those only who are inhabitants of the earth. Accordingly, this sentence is the foundation of the history, not of the universe at large, of the sun, of any other planet, but of the earth, and of man its rational inhabitant. The primeval event which it records may be far distant, in point of time, from the nnxt event in such a history; as the earth may have existed myriads of ages, and undergone many vicissitudes in its condition, before it became the home of the human race. And for all we know the history of other planets, even of the solar system, may yet be unwritten, because there has been as yet no rational inhabitant to compose or peruse the record We have no intimation of the interval of time that elapsed between the beginning of things narrated in this prefatory sentence and that state of things which is announced in the following verse.

## **Creation continued**

Dictated by Superhuman Knowledge -- With no less clearness, however, does it show that it was dictated by superhuman knowledge: for it records the beginning of things of which natural science can take no cognizance. Man observes certain laws of nature, and guided by these, may trace the current of physical events backwards and forwards, but without being able to fix any limit to the course of nature in either direction. And not only this sentence, but the main part of this and the following chapter communicates events that occurred before man made his appearance on the stage of things: and therefore before he could either witness or record them. And in harmony with all this, the whole volume is proved by the topics chosen, the revelations made, the views entertained, the ends contemplated, and the means of information possessed, to be derived from a higher source than man.

What it Denies -- This simple sentence denies atheism: for it assumes the being of God. It denies polytheism, and, among its various forms, the doctrine of two eternal principles -the one good and the other evil: for it confesses the one eternal creator. It denies materialism: for it asserts the creation of matter. It denies pantheism: for it assumes the existence of God before all things, and apart from them. It denies fatalism: for it involves the freedom of the eternal being.

It indicates the relative superiority, in point of magnitude, of the heavens to the earth, by giving the former the first place in the order of words. It is thus in accordance with the first elements of astronomical science.


It is, therefore, pregnant with physical and metaphysical, with ethical and theological instruction for the first man, for the predecessors and contemporaries of Moses, and for all the succeeding generations of mankind.

The Verse an Integral Part and Not a Heading -- This verse forms an integral part of the narrative, and not a mere heading, as some have imagined. This is abundantly evident, from the following reasons: (1) It has the form of a narrative, not of a superscription. (2) The conjunctive particle connects the second verse with it, which could not be if it were a heading. (3) The very next sentence speaks of the earth as already in existence, and, therefore, its creation must be recorded in the first verse. (4) In the first verse the heavens take precedence of the earth, but in the following verse, all things, even the sun, moon and stars seem to be appendages to the earth. Thus, if it were a heading, it would not correspond with the narrative. (5) If the first verse belonged to the narrative, order pervades the whole recital; whereas, if it be a heading, the most hopeless confusion enters. Light is called

into being before the sun, moon and stars. The earth takes precedence of the heavenly luminaries. The stars, which are coordinate with the sun, and preordinate to the moon, occupy the third place in the narrative of their manifestation. For any, or all of these reasons, it is obvious that the first verse forms a part of the narrative.

As soon as it is settled that the narrative beings in the first verse, another question comes up for determination, namely: whether the heavens here mean the heavenly bodies that circle in their courses through the realms of space, or the mere space itself which they occupy with their perambulations.

# Did you know?



Spiritualism flourished in Pennsylvania in the 1850s.

Progressive Philadelphians were among the first to formerly establish Spiritualist churches. In 1851, a group called The First Association of Spiritualists in Philadelphia was formed and leased a building in Stockton to which the group gave the name Harmonial Hall. Founded on simple, but firm beliefs, these early followers held to three common truths:

1. Man is a spirit here and now.

2. Spirit has unbroken and continued existance.

3. Under favorable conditions spirit can communicate with those in visible, physical form.

This first group met regularly on Sundays and Fridays. Every Sunday afternoon they held lyceum classes. Special conferences were presented during the mid-week.

Word spread and a second society was formed. It was called The First Spiritualist Church and meetings were held on Sundays in Philadelphia at a building on Thompson Street. Then came a third, The Spiritual Union, which met weekly at Washington Hall.

All three churches established lyceums initially to ensure favorable teachings for the young.

Records from the 1850s show estimates for the number of Spiritualists. The Catholic Council placed the number of Spiritualists in the nation at 11,000,000. Liberal papers, a Philadelphia publication, estimated the number in the city to be around 30,000. Estimates made by Spiritualists Dr. Peebles and Mr. Tuttle put the number in the state at 250,000.

## William T. Stead

William T. Stead, champion of Spiritualism, editor, and publicist penned his own epilogue 19 years before he went down with the Titanic.

The Blue Island is as familiar as its author, William T. Stead. But it's little known that his venture into journalism with the founding of the Review of Review in 1890, turned out to be his introduction to Spiritualism. In 1891, the Christmas issue carried his article, Real Ghost Stories. That issue was a sellout. The following year he included another article along the same line: More Ghost Stories. By then his interest had grown considerably in psychic phenomena. And within a year he had established communication with the Spirit World through automatic writing.

Snead's contact was Miss Julia Ames, herself a journalist, who had recently made the transition. Another publication of his, Borderland, carried quarterly articles authored by Miss Julia. In 1897 Stead used her articles to make a book. It was entitled: After Death.

He penned his epilogue in 1893 when he wrote: From the Old World to the New. Supposedly, it was fiction, a story in which he described the danger of icebergs in the Atlantic to ocean liners. He wrote a narrative to his book for the Pall Mall Gazette. In the article he chose to caption a photograph showing a sinking vessel with these words: "This is exactly what might take place if liners are sent to sea short of boats."

Stead was aboard the Titanic April 14, 1912, along with 1,600 passengers who became statistics.

Three days following the ship disaster, Dr. Sharp, Spirit guide to Mrs. Wriedt, a prominent medium, gave full details of the sinking and many accounts of heroism that occurred that day. Stead also spoke through Mrs. Wriedt. Those in attendance were clearly able to establish his identity.

Circumstances must have intervened that night, perhaps to give aid to the stranger I spoke to. That's just one example of why I testify for my faith.

There are many incidents which I could recount, some as simple as finding a parking space during a snow storm, but these little blessings happen to us all. That's the nice thing about miracles, we all seem to get our share.



It was at the Christian church in Hartford City, Indiana, that she met her husband to be, William Dennis. Some of you will recall that he succeeded Dr. Myron Post as president of Camp Now, here's another name, Chesterfield. Franchion Harwood Dorsch -- she was their daughter. Perhaps now the familiar names I first spoke of becomes a little clearer. Mabel Riffle was a relative.

Anna was the pastor of the Madison Avenue Spiritualist Temple in Anderson for more years than I can rightfully recount. It was charter number one of the Indiana State Association of Spiritualists. A lyceum teacher par excellent, she loved to work with children. Anna kept the lyceum work going at the Camp for many seasons. She counted the phases of direct voice, clairvoyance and materialization among her gifts.

# **Striving for balance**

The spiritual Law of Balance has a lot to do with all of us, for if we do not establish proper balances in our lives, they can deteriorate.

As a small child, it was not my nature to be moderate. I was either all for something, or all against it. Consequently, someone always reminded me that my life would run more smoothly if I would seek a middle ground. Those warnings from my childhood came back to me about a year ago when I read a message that lead me to adopt Andrew Jackson Davis' phrase: "Under all circumstances keep an even mind." I determined to establish a balance in all areas of my life.

The dictionary defines balances as mental or emotional equilibrium. The Advanced Course of Modern Spiritualism offered by the Morris Pratt Institute states that mediums must have a balance in their everyday lives and that balance is fundamental to the Natural Laws which govern us. Psychic force reaches mediums according to their chemical balance and individual attraction.

Alfred Armand Montapert in his book The Supreme Philosophy of Man says, "the law of moderation runs through the whole of life. Moderation is strength not weakness, it requires self-command and self-control. To live in moderation means to follow the middle course as much as possible. Avoid extremes of good or bad, pleasure or sorrow, elation or depression, affluence or poverty."

A balanced mind is an absolute necessity for the individual who is concerned with developing spiritually. But varying conditions in life such as joy, sadness, wealth, and poverty make it difficult to keep an even keel. Unpleasant circumstances result from wrongful actions.

A person who lacks spiritual insight is accustomed to both his pleasure and pain. Here the Law of Attraction comes into play. In a selfenduced negative situation, a person draws even more negativity to himself and makes the situation even worse. When a situation holds pleasure, the mind becomes attached to the harmony and cheerfulness connected with that state of mind. In spiritual ignorance we develop an attachment to pleasure. We falsely believe that the objects of the world cause our happiness and we become dependent on external sources of stimulation.

Spiritual aspirants know that we should develop an objectivity to both pleasure and pain.

But we crave more experience of pleasure. However, if we turn our minds toward the Infinite Intelligence and do good works for others, then, we will have little time to run after the things of the world. Concentration on the Infinite Intelligence reduces the influence of pleasure and pain. We must sooner or later realize that happiness, spiritual peace and harmory do not come from any person or worldly object. Happiness is something that comes from within our soul and it is through spiritual development that our thirst for happiness becomes fully gratified.

We should strive to maintain a balanced life. If we do, we can taste the joy which comes as a result of prayer, meditation, communication with our spirit teachers and as a result of service to others. Our minds will work harder still for spiritual joy.



## Sir William Barrett: First to establish a society for the scientific inquiry of psychic phenomena

As May marks his passing, TNS thought it timely to remind its readers of the father of psychical research: Sir William Barrett.

His credentials were impressive: 1862 -- appointed assistant to Professor John Tyndall. British physicist, Royal Institute, London. 1864 -published his first scientific paper, -- "A Physical Analysis of the Human Breath." 1865 published his second paper, "The Effect of the contact of a Hydrogen Flame with Various bodies." This led to the practical detection of inflammable gases in coal mines. 1867 -published his third scientific paper, "Sensitive Flames." That defined how an ordinary flame responded to various sounds. The investigation led to his being offered the Chair of Physic in the Royal College of Science in Dublin. He accepted the position in 1873 and stayed on as Professor of Experimental Physics until his retirement in 1910.

William Fletcher Barrett was widely recognized in his time for pioneering much of the study and investigation into magnetism and radiant heat.

Beyond these initial singular achievements, his record of scientific firsts are too vast to recount here.

"A chance invitation," Sir William once said, "led me to investigate psychic phenomena. I first witnessed it in 1867 at the home of an Irish gentleman, who interested in hypnotic experiments: had found the perfect subject capable of demonstrating 'mental traveling'". At first Sir William doubted his ears, but

repeated tests sparked his interest and eventually resulted in the founding of the Society of Psychical Research in 1885.

Because of the ridicule learned men like Dr. Alfred Russel Wallace and Sir William felt that an organized society that would observe and where possible, test the veridity of the presented, would eliminate the scoffing and bring to the forefront perhaps a new knowledge, then unknowned to man.

Sir William Barrett was born Feb. 10, 1844. He passed to spirit May 27, 1925.

# The Law of Continuity

## by Henry Drummond

## Part II

Let us begin by conceding that there may be new laws. The argument might then be advanced that since, in nature generally, we come upon new laws as we pass from lower to higher kingdoms, the old still remaining in force, the newer laws which one would expect to meet in the Spiritual World would so transcend and overwhelm the older as to make the analogy or identity, even if traced, of no practical use. The new laws would represent operations and energies so different, and so much more elevated, that they would afford the true keys to the Spiritual World. As gravitation is practically lost sight of when we pass into the domain of life, so Biogenesis would be lost sight of as we enter the Spiritual Sphere.

We must first separate in this statement the confusion of law and energy. Gravitation is not lost sight of in the organic world. Gravity may be, to a certain extent, but not gravitation; and gravity only where a higher power counteracts its action. At the same time it is not to be denied that the conspicious thing in organic nature is not the great inorganic law.

But the objection turns upon the statement that reasoning from analogy we should expect, in turn, to lose sight of Biogenesis as we enter the Spiritual Sphere. One answer to which is that, as a matter of fact, we do not lose sight of it. So far from being invisible, it lies across the very threshold of the Spiritual World, and, as we shall see, pervades it everywhere. What we lose sight of, to a certain extent, is the natural **bios**. In the Spiritual world that is not the conspicuous thing, and it is obscure there just as gravity becomes obscure in the organic, because something higher, more potent, more characteristic of the higher plane, comes in. That there are higher energies, so to speak, in the Spiritual World is, of course, to be affirmed alike on the ground of analogy and of experience; but it does not follow that these necessitate other laws. A law has nothing to do with potency. We may lose sight of a substance, or of an energy, but it is an abuse of language to talk of losing sight of Gods' laws.

## Laws have no kingdom; they merely apply

Are there, then, no other laws in the Spiritual World except those which are the projections or extensions of natural laws. From the number of natural laws which are found in the higher sphere, from the large territory actually embraced by them, and from their special prominence throughout the whole region, it may at least be answered that the margin left for them is small. But if the objection is pressed that it is contrary to the analogy, and unreasonable in itself, that there should not be new laws for this higher sphere, the reply is obvious. Let these laws be produced. If the spiritual nature, in inception, growth, and development, does not follow natural principles, let the true principles bc stated and explained. We have not denied that there may be new laws. One would almost be surprised if there were not. The mass of material handed over from the natural to the spiritual, continuous, apparently, from the natural to the spiritual, is so great that till that is worked out it will be impossible to say what space is still left unembraced by laws that are known. At present it is impossible to even approximately to estimate the size of that supposed terra incognita. From one point of view it ought to be vast, from another extremely small. But however large the region governed by the suspected new laws may be that cannot diminish by a hair's breadth the size of the territory where the old laws still prevail.

That territory itself, relatively to us through perhaps not absolutely, must be of great extent. The size of the key which is to open it, that is, the size of all the natural laws which can be found to apply, is a guarantee that the region of the knowable in the Spiritual World is at least as wide as these regions of the Natural World which by the help of these laws have been explored.

No doubt also there yet remain some natural laws to be discovered. And these in time may have a further light to shed on the spiritual field. Then we may know all that is? By no means! We may only know all that may be known. And that may be very little. The sovereign will which sways the scepter of that invisible empire must be granted a right of freedom--that freedom which by putting it into our wills He surely teaches us to honor in His. In much of His dealing with us also, in what may be called the paternal relation, there may seem no special law--no law except the highest of all, that Law of which all other laws are parts, that Law which neither nature can wholly reflect nor the mind begin to fathom--the Law of Love. He adds nothing to that, however, who loses sight of all other laws in that, nor does he take from it who finds specific laws everywhere radiating from it.

## **Continuity of Existence**

## **Taken from the Substance of Faith**

## What is meant by life eternal?

## by Sir Oliver Lodge

Whereas our terrestrial existence is temporary, our real existence continues without ceasing, in either a higher or a lower form, according to our use of opportunities and means of grace; and that the fullness of life ultimately attainable represents a growing perfection at present inconceivable by us.

Continuity of existence, without break or interruption, is the fundamental idea that needs inculcation, not only among children, but among ignorant people generally. And the survival, from savage times, of an inclination to associate a full measure of departed personality with the discarded and decomposing bodily remnant, under the impression that it will awake and live again at some future day, should be steadily discouraged. The idea of bodily ressurection, in this physical sense, is responsible for much superstition and for some ecclesiastical abuses.

A nearer approach to the truth may be expressed thus: Terrestrial existence is dependent for its continuance for a certain arrangement of material particles belonging to the earth, which are gradually collected and built up into the complex and constantly changing structure called a body. The correspondence or connection between matter and spirit, as thus exhibited, is common to every form of life in some degree, and is probably a symbol or sample of something permanently true; so that a double aspect of every fundamental existance is likely always to But identity of person in no way continue. depends upon identity of particles: the particles are frequently changed and the old ones discarded.

The term body should be explained and emphasized, as connoting anything which is able to manifest feelings, emotions, and thoughts, and at the same time to operate efficiently on its environment. The temporary character of the present human body should be admitted for purposes of religion; it usefully and truthfully displays the incarnate part of us during the brief episode of terrestrial life, and when it has served its turn it is left behind: its particles being discarded and dispersed. Hereafter -- we are taught -- an equally efficient vehicle of manifestation, similarly appropriate to our new environment, will not be lacking; this at present unknown and hypothetical entity is spoken of as a "spiritual body," and represents the serious idea underlying crude popular notions about bodily resurrection.

Our bodies have been likened to ripples raised by wind upon water, displaying in visible form the motion and influence of the operating breath, without being permanently differentiated from the vast whole, of which the ripple is a temporary individualized portion: individualized, yet not isolated from others, but connected with them by the ocean, of whose immensity they may be supposed for poetic purposes gradually to become aware.

"But that one ripple on the boundless deep Feels that the deep is boundless, and itself Forever changing form, but evermore One with the boundless motion of the deep."

There is much to be said for some form of doctrine of a common psychological basis or union of minds -- some kind of Anima Mundi, some world-mind, of which we are all fragments, and to which all knowledge is in a manner accessible; but the analogy of ocean ripples or icebergs need not be pressed to support the idea of a cessation of individual existence, when a given ripple or a given iceberg subsides. All analogies fall at some points. The ocean analogy happens to suggest indistinguishable absorption of nirvana, but others do not. The parts of a jelly are linked together and vibrate as a whole, but each little sac of fluid is partitioned off as an individual entity; in touch with all the rest, but with a texture and a color of its own.

Continued personality, persistent individual existence, cannot be predicted of things which do not possess personality or individuality or character: but, to things which do possess these attributes, continuity and persistence not only may, but must, apply; unless we are to suppose that actual existence suddenly ceases. There must be a conservation of character, notwithstanding the admitted return of the individual to a central store or larger self, from which a portion was differentiated and individualized for the brief period during which the planet performs some seventy of its innumerable journeys around the sun. Absorption in original source may mass, but need not destroy, identity.

Even to a villager, picked out as a recruit and sent to the seat of war, may serve his country, may gain experience, acquire a soul and a width of horizon such as he had not dreamt of; and when he returns, after the war is over, may be merged as before in his native village. But the village is the richer for his presence, and his individuality or personality is not really lost; though to the eye of the world, which has no further need for it, it has practically ceased to be.

The character and experience gained by us during our brief association with the matter of this planet, become our possession henceforth forever. We cannot shake ourselves of them, even if we would: the enlargement of ideas, the growth in knowledge, the acquisition of friendships, the skill and power and serviceableness attained by us through this strange experience, all persist as part and parcel of our larger self; and so do the memories of failure, of shame, or cruelty, of sin, which we have acquired here. To glory in these last things is damnation: the best that they can bring to us is pain and undying remorse -- their worm dieth not and the fire is not quenched. There is not a way out, save by the way of mercy and grace; whereby we are assured that at last, in the long last, we may ultimately attain to pardon and peace.

The class of things which is certainly not persistent, but must indubitably be left behind us forever, is the weird collection of treasures for which most work so hard, scorning delights and living laborious daysfor their acquisition.

In this blind and mistaken struggle -- a struggle which in the present condition of society seems to be unavoidable, even meritorious, but which in a reformed society will be looked back upon as something hard to understand -- we do not even make to ourselves friends of the mammon of unrighteousness. Its mottoes are "each for himself" and "vae victis." Fortunately very few of the human race wholly succumb to this temptation, nearly all reserve great regions of their lives where kindness and friendliness and affection reign, and they try to check the evil results of their worser or self directed efforts by charitable doles.

In a more ideal state of society there would be no need either of the poison or of its antidote.

To bring about such an ideal state of society is the end and aim of politics, and of all movements for social reform. Efforts in these directions are the most serious things in life, and may be the most fruitable in vital results: since few individuals are strong enough to withstand the pressure and tendency of their social surroundings; only a few can rise superior to them, only a few sink far beneath them; the majority drift with the crowd and become -- too many at present -- irretrievably injured by the base and ugly conditions among which their lives are cast. At present, for the majority of (all), life is liable to be damaging and deleterious: initial weakness of character, so far from being strengthened and helped by the combined force of society, is hindered and enfeebled thereby -- a disastrous and disquieting condition of things. But when the efforts of self-sacrificing and laborious statesmen, ministers in the highest sense -- when these efforts at cultivation bear fruit -- then, notwithstanding individual lapses here and there, society at large will be indistinguishable from a human branch of the Communion of Saints. Then will feeble impulses toward virtue be fostered, cultivated, and encouraged; the bruised reed will no longer be broken and trampled in the mire.

The life eternal in its fullest sense must be entered upon here and now. The emphases is on the word **life**, without reference to time.. "I am come that ye might have Life." Life of a far higher kind than any yet we know is attainable by the human race on this planet. It rests largely with ourselves. The outlook was never brighter than it is today; many workers and thinkers are making ready the way for a spiritual rebirth of the logos in the heart of all men; the heralds are already preparing their songs for a reign of brotherly love.



## a Perpetual Change

The mortal nature is seeking as far as possible to be everlasting and immortal; and this is only to be attained by generation, because the new is always left in the place of the old. For even in the same individual there is succession and not absolute unity. A man is called the same, but yet, in the short interval which elapses between youth and age, and in which every animal is said to have life and identity, he is undergoing a perpetual process of loss and reparation -- hair, flesh, bones, blood and the whole body, are always changing.

This is true not only of the body, but also of the soul, whose habits, tempers, opinions, desires, pleasures, pains, fears, never remain the same in any one of us, but are always coming and going. What is yet more surprising is that this is also true of knowledge; and not only does knowledge in general come and go, so that in this respect we are never the same; but particular knowledge also experiences a like change.

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## Interpretation Hinges on the Visible

It is clear that we can only express the spiritual laws in language borrowed from the Being dependent for our visible universe. vocabulary on images, if an altogether new and foreign set of laws existed in the Spiritual World, they could never take shape as definite ideas from mere want of words. The hypothetical new laws which may remain to be discovered in the domain of natural or mental science may afford some index of course mean that the latter were no longer foreign but in analogy, or, likelier still, identical. If on the other hand, the natural laws of the future have nothing to say of these higher laws, what can be said of them? Where is the language to come from in which to frame them? If their disclosure could be of any practical use to us, we may be sure the clue to them, the revelation of them, in some way would have been put into nature. If, on the contrary, they are not to be of immediate use to man, it is better they should not embarrass him. After all, then, our knowledge of higher law must be limited by our knowledge of the lower. The natural laws as at present known, whatever additions may yet to made to them, give a fair rendering of the facts of nature. And their analogies or their projections in the Spiritual Sphere may also be said to offer a fair account of that sphere, or of one or two conspicious departments of it. The time has come for that account to be given. The greatest among the theological laws are the laws of nature indisguise. It will be the splendid task of the theology of the future to take off the mask and disclose to waning scepticism the naturalness of the supernatural.

## Laws although Commonplace Go Unnoticed

It is almost singular that the identification of the laws of the Spiritual World with the laws of nature should so long have escaped recognition. For apart from the probability on a priori grounds, it is involved in the whole structure of parable. When any two phenomena in the two spheres are seen to be analogous, the parallelism must depend upon the fact that the laws governing them are not analogous but identical. And yet this basis for parable seem to have been "This overlooked. Thus Principal Shairp: seeing of Spiritual truths mirrored in the face of nature rests not on any fancied, but in a real analogy between the natural and the spiritual worlds. They are in some sense which science has not ascertained, but which the vital and religious imagination can perceive, counterparts one of the other." But is not this the explanation, 

that parallel phenomena depend upon identical laws? It is a question indeed whether one can speak of laws at all as being analogous. Phenomena are parallel, laws which make them so are themselves one.

In discussing the relations of the natural and spiritual kingdoms, it has been all but implied hitherto that the spiritual laws were framed originally on the plan of the natural; and the impression one might receive in studying the two worlds for the first time from the side of analogy would naturally be that the lower world was formed first, as a kind of scaffolding on which the higher and spiritual should be afterward raised. Now the exact opposite has been the case. The first in the field was the Spiritual World.

## The Unseen Existed Before the Seen

It is not necessary to reproduce here in detail the argument supporting the unseen universe. The conclusion of that work remains still unassailed, that the visible universe has been developed from the unseen. Apart from the general proof from the Law of continuity, the more special grounds of such a conclusion are, first, the fact insisted upon by Herschel and Clerk-Maxwell that the atoms of which the visible universe is built up bear distinct marks of being manufactured articles. Secondly, the origin in time of the visible universe implied from known facts with regard to the dissipation of energy. With the gradual aggregation of mass the energy of the universe has been slowly disappearing, and this loss of energy must go on until none remains. There is, therefore, a point in time when the energy of the universe must come to an end. And that which has its end in time cannot be infinite, it must also have had a beginning in time. Hence the unseen existed before the seen.
