

Church members send your representatives to the Eighty-sixth Annual Convention in Rochester, New York. Elect your delegate at once. Remember credentials of delegates must be properly executed and received in the office of the N.S.A.C. secretary at least 20 days prior to the date of the opening session of convention. Credentials must be signed by the proper church office and forwarded to the State secretary (when applicable) for approval. Allow ample time for these procedures.

A member living in one state may be elected as a proxy from another but the credentials must be signed by the officers of the church represented and all above steps properly followed.

No member will be accepted as a proxy delegate whose credentials are not processed in the proper manner.

Color -- It's Spiritual Influence



Counseling the dying patient - Our challenge

Healing rites for the dying person have been with us for centuries. The Last Rites of the Roman Catholic Church are correctly called Extreme Unction and is a healing service, not, as many believe, the final pronouncement of death. However, the counseling of the dying to prepare them to meet death unafraid is a new and strange concept to many. Until recently all such counseling outside Spiritualist circles was directed toward the vigorous, the healthy and the young. As soon as it was suspected that an individual might die, all conversation regarding death stopped. Death was never more mentioned except in whispers in hallways and darkened corners of rooms.

Traditionally, the family of the terminally ill person has turned to the orthodox clery for solace and comfort. Based on what they had been taught all their lives this was considered quite adequate. Now, however, with the recent body of scientific evidence collected by serious researchers, the public is going to be clammering for more than the usual pap and platitudes handed them in the past. They will want assurance that life continues and that one does not have to belong to a particular sect. They will want to be told that there are helpers on the other side to assist them in the transistion. And if they so desire, they may communicate with their loved ones from beyond. These are assurances that we can give them with

any degree of authority and conviction.

It is logical that this responsibility be placed in the hands of our Spiritualist healers. For it is the healer who is going to be called -- to heal. The patient, the family and the doctor will be holding out for a last minute miracle. It is from this initial encounter that the question of 'life after death' will be raised. Often the patient himself has perception of the situation more acute than his family wants to believe. But, are all our healers adequately trained for this mission? I, for one, would hesitate to send inadequately trained individuals into a desperate medical situation. Certainly our certified healers are devout, consciencious people, but their training, for the most part, has not been geared to counseling the terminal patient.

Many doctors are still skeptical, but are willing to bend to the wishes of family, friends and the dying patient himself. Here we are breaking virgin ground and early impressions are going to be

lasting.

In order to counsel we must know what to say, how to say it, when to speak. We cannot go forth unprepared, trusting that Spirit will guide us. We've all seen too many speakers stand at the lecturn, ad lib, waiting for Spirit to take over and the end result has been an abyssmal flop! You may not get a second chance with your dying patient or his family. In addition, the physician may discourage any such occurrences with his patients in the future.

If we are to be convincing we must not only be comfortable with the subject of death, but we must be able to handle suffering without panic. Virtually everyone we will be called upon to counsel in a terminal condition will be in a hospital environment. Many of us who are perfectly comfortable with death are terrified by the hospital hardware, i.e., the electrocariagram monitors, respirators, IV tubing, catheters and all the other life-support equipment. Furthermore, we cannot always time the arrival of the Spiritualist healer-counsellor with the patient's pain medication. A patient in a semi-narcotized state may often appear more coherant than he actually is. Thus, instead of pacifying, we may end up terrifying.

All orthodox religions, and some not so orthodox, are now undertaking this service. Why should we, who have been teaching and preaching the continuation of life since the beginning, now sit back and ask that others take over our duties?

Now is the time to move with a concerted, well-planned and efficiently executed effort. Where training material is available it should be ordered and studied. We should be holding seminars, inviting members of the medical profession to provide input as well as to learn from us. Doctors and nurses can serve as an excellent source of referrals.

Death has always been mankind's great unseen enemy. Now that the public is being deluged with books, articles and movies affirming that life continues after the change called death, we should be in there to keep things on an even keel. I hesitate to imagine the rules and regulations that will be imposed on the followers of some religions to assure them a smooth transition, a good trip or a seat in heaven. We must get involved now; comforting, guiding and educating - imparting to the public that vast storehouse of knowledge that has been left in our keeping.

Did You Know?

An endowment of \$60,000 was placed in escrow for the University of Pennsylvania to investigate Spiritualism?

Henry Seybert, a well known Spiritualist, in 1884 sought to gain university grade recognition of the psychic phenomena sweeping the country. To this end he put his dedicated belief into a grant to the University of Pennsylvania.

In making the request to the university his message read in part: "Gentlemen, being mindful of the uncertainty of life at any advanced age, and feeling deeply the importance of making permanent provision for certain interests that seem to me of the highest moment, I hereby offer to your honorable board, fifty first mortgage bonds, Raleigh and Gaston Railroad being equal in total to the sum of sixty thousand dollars, to be devoted to the maintenance of a chair known as the 'Adam Seybert Chair of Moral and Intellectual Philosophy', upon the condition that the incumbent of said chair, either individually or in conjunction with a commission of the university faculty, shall make a thorough and impartial investigation of all systems of morals, religion or philosophy which assume to represent the truth, and particularly of Modern Spiritualism.

I further empower your board to invest the said sum of money in such securities, strictly legal or otherwise as may be deemed best, provided that the interest along shall be expended for the purpose of maintaining the said Adam Seybert Chair. I further empower your board in case there may be an income arising from said sum of money of the incumbent of said chair, to dispose of such over and above the amount required for the salary excess of income in such way as may be deemed best to promote the views I have expressed. I have the honor to remain, your obedient servant, signed Henry Seybert."


The endowment was accepted in what at first appeared good faith. In 1884 the University of Pennsylvania appointed a special body identified as the Seybert Commission to probe fully Spiritualism in conformance with the wishing of the donor. Three years later a preliminary report of the body's findings were published. But the evidence was highly bias to the negative side, and to the repute of facts to the contrary, offered little



fruit nor did it meet the outline set forth by Seybert.

Objections were long and loud. Alas, all fell on deaf ears as the preliminary report was the only one issued. Prejudice is not new. Every new and unveiling opportunity poses a threat to the continuance of old ideas. Such was the case here. The funds were eventually turned over to the pursuit of studies considered secondary in the words of Seybert.

A ssistant Editor-This was only one commission of several which failed to carry out an unbiased study of psychic phenomena and Spiritualism. Perhaps the most prominent one was conducted in Europe in the 1920's and later reviewed in the 1930's. For the present the "why" of these predicated falsehoods must remain unanswered. However, TNS is in the process of making some inquiries to see whether sufficient documentation is available to unravel the riddle of "why." If so, results of our correspondence and probes will be used for an up and coming article.



What is the nature of evil?

Evil is not an absolute thing, but has reference to a standard of attainment. The possibility of evil is the necessary consequence of a rise in the scale of moral existence; just as an organism whose normal temperature is far above "absolute zero" is necessarily liable to damaging and deadly cold. But cold is not in itself a positive or created thing.

The term evil is relative: dirt, for instance, is well known to be only matter out of place (if it is found in the home). Weeds are plants flourishing where they are not wanted. There are no weeds in botany, but there are weeds in gardening. Even disease is only one organism growing at the expense of another. Ugliness is non-existent save to creatures with a sense of beauty, and is due to unsuitable grouping. Analyzed into its elements, every particle of matter must be a (fact) of law and order, and, in that sense, of beauty.

Discoveries in connection with the internal structure of an atom, whereby the constituent particles are found to move in intricate and ascertainable orbits-leading to a new science of atomic astronomy-emphasize this assertion to an extent barely credible (at the turn of the twentieth century).

Even what can be called filth, that is to say material which to the casual observer, or when encountered at unsuitable times, is disgusting, may to an investigator or under circumstances be of the highest interest; and may even arouse a sense of admiration, by reason of manifest subservience to function.

Many social evils are due to human folly and stupidity, and will cease when the race has risen to a standard already attained by individuals.

Excessive hunger and starvation are manifestly evils of a negative character: They are merely a deficiency of supply. They have no business to exist in a civilized and organized community. Famine and pestilence can be checked by applications of science.

Pain is an awful reality, when highly developed organisms are subjected to wounds and poison and disease. Some kinds of pain have been wickedly inflicted by human beings on one another in the past, and other kinds may be removed or mitigated by the progress of discovery in the future. Physiologically the nerve processes involved are well worthy of study and control. Premature avoidance of pain would have been dangerous to

the race, and not really helpful to the individual. But great advances in this direction are now foreshadowed.

Already surgical operations can be conducted painlessly, and a time is foreshadowed when by hypnosis excessive and useless torture can be shut off from consciousness, by intelligence and will, somewhat as the random leakage of an electric supply can be checked. All this will come in due time.

The best is yet to be,

The last of life for which the first was made:

Our times are in His hand

Who saith a whole I planned,

Youth shows by half: trust God, see all, not be afraid.

The contrast between good and evil can be well illustrated by the contrast between heat and cold. Cold is only the absense of heat, and is made at once possible and necessary by the existence of degrees of heat. The fact that we regard excessive cold as an evil is only because our organization demands a certain temperature for life. There is nothing evil about cold in itself: it is only evil in its relation to organisms sufficiently high to be damaged by it. The real fact is their normally high temperature, and their delicacy of response to stimuli. These things are good; and the only evil is a defect or deficiency of these good things.

The power of assimilating food leaves the organism open to the pangs of hunger, that is, of insufficient nutriment, manifestly only the absence of a good.

Every rise involves the possibility of fall. Every advance seems to entail a corresponding penalty.

In a world devoid of life there is not death. In a world without conscious beings there is no sin. In a world without affection there would be no grief. To a larger vision much of our grief may be needless:

My son, the world is dark with griefs and graves, So dark that men cry out against the Heavens. Who knows but that the darkness is in man?

A mechanical universe might be perfectly good. Every atom of matter perfectly obeys the forces acting upon it, and there is no error or wickedness or fault or rebellion in lifeless nature. Evil only begins when existence takes a higher turn. There is not even destruction or death in the inorganic world-only transformation. The higher possibility

Taylor Church Celebrates 50 Years

On Sunday, May 21 members and friends gathered to celebrate 50 years of worship in their church building. The first Spiritualist Charter was granted to a group of about 60 Czech immigrants in 1912. These Spiritualist meetings were held in various homes until 1925 when they invited the Rev. August Cervin of Dallas, to hold services in the old city hall auditorium. On April 8, 1928 the American Spiritualist Church was dedicated to the service of mankind by the Rev. C.L. Sharp of Fort Worth. Attendance that day was over 300, with 150 in the Lyceum and 22 in the choir.

Rev. Cervin continued to serve the Taylor church as well as the Cameron and Austin churches until his passing to higher life in 1940. His beloved wife, Rev. Jennie Cervin, served the church for several years. Rev. Henry Hegdahl of San Bernardino, California was pastor until he graduated to spirit in 1963. Rev. Alma Johnson, eldest daughter of Rev. Cervin, and H.B. Kelley served as co-pastors. Today the church pastors are the Rev. Elmer Actkinson and James Bradley.

During the last 15 years the interior of the church has been completely remodeled.

Charles Jessup III, pastor of the First Church of Divine Science of Houston, gave the lecture entitled "Search for Tomorrow". James Bradley conducted the Memorial Service. The History of the Church was narrated by Denis Adams. The Cervin Family provided the special music for the day.

A dinner was served in the Church Social Hall, followed by the healing service and messages.

MASSACHUSETTS CONVENTION

The Power of Patience

"Patience, while not the best remedy for every trouble is a virtue worth possessing."

Life is what you make it. Life can be tolerable, or beautiful, or it can make life unbearable and one constant waiting game.

Patience happens to be one of the biggest lessons in life.

The dictionary credits patience with-

1. The bearing of suffering, provocation, delay, tediousness, with calmness and self-control.

2. Endurance stresses the capacity to bear suffering or hardship.

3. Fortitude suggests the resolute endurance that results from firm sustained courage.

4. Forbearance implies restraint under provocation or a refraining from retaliation for a wrong.

Concentrate for a while on the implications of these words: Delay, provocation, tediousness with calmness and self-control. Immediately, I think of all the times we are called up to wait. To name a few:

1. Every day as we drive to and from work, school, business, or anywhere we must wait at one or more stop lights. Not to forget the problems that sometimes arise on our marvelous freeway systems, it takes a lot of calmness and control not to lose one's temper.

2. When we go to the market, we wait in line at the checkstand. Sometimes it seems to take forever to be waited on. But it can seem particularly irritating if someone manages to push ahead.

3. When we go to the post office or to the bank sometimes there are twenty-five to fifty individuals ahead of us, we wonder if the wait is hardly worth the trouble. Yet we must do our business.

4. And oh! the list would not be complete without mentioning the wait one must endure sometimes to see a doctor or a dentist. And the list goes on, from the bank to the dentist and on again.

All of these situations pass more quickly if one has learned the golden lesson of patience.

The capacity to bear suffering or hardships is akin to patience. If one is called upon to bear mental or physical suffering for whatever the reasons, it will not improve the situation by being bitter or grumpy. "Why me?" I've said, but "Why not me?" This may be one of the lessons that you or I must face to learn to prepare for something else.

Fortitude, the third implication, suggests the resolute endurance that results from firm, sustained courage. Many times we are called upon for sheer guts and fortitude to work our way out

of severe situations. The death of a husband, or wife, children, can weigh heavily. Even financial pressure can often prove beyond an immediate resolve. If we do not have patience during these extreme times, things usually get worse.

The fourth implication, forebearance, implies restraint under provocation or a refraining from retaliation. Now this one proves to be a dilly. So many things can provoke us to retaliation. I see situations develop like this often in the classroom. One student does something to another student, so the other student feels he has the right to retaliate. But that doesn't make it right. Two wrongs never made a right.

To carry the idea of patience further, it could be said that there are three types of patience a person needs to have: 1. Patience with others; 2. Patience with things and situations beyond our control; and 3. Last but not least, patience with ourselves.

What happens to a person when he doesn't have patience with others? More and more we are learning the effect of stress. If we lose patience the results can lead to severe changes in our personal lives.

Whereas, if a person shows patience with others, loved ones, his life will run smoother, and there are often fewer physical ailments due to less stress. The patience we exhibit with others can do much to help our cause as Spiritualists. When others see less patience—those who have patience think to themselves how much they'd like to be in control! A person can do much for others by being a living example. In his play, "Othello", William Shakespeare said, "How poor are they without patience." One could safely say then that when we exhibit patience with tired frustrated spouses, irate children and angry co-workers we are actively doing something to make this world a better place in which to live.

The second type of patience needed most is patience with things and situations beyond our control. Some of these conditions are: A child must get bigger before he can do certain things; as a teenager, one must wait to get through high school. Everytime we turn around we must wait for something and we cannot always control the variables that present themselves to us in our daily lives. If unforseen happenstances do occur, then it would seem if we could learn to bear them with patience then we would be doing our sometimes frazzled nerves a favor. We should always try to make the best of the present.

Perhaps one of the biggest lessons one has to learn is patience with himself. By not having

Critic of the Most High

For almost everyone there's that nearly perfect job. Being a critic of the most high, a truly descriptive statement of what George R. Plagenz, Harvard graduate of Divinity School, does best, some of his criticisms have created quite a stir. Nevertheless, Plagena dispenses his *Amens* in a most unique way. He awards stars according to the religious performance. George Plagenz is the religious editor of the Cleveland Press. And to him, every religious service is placed into four categories: worship service, music, sermon, and the friendliness of the congregation. Rating each service he attends has made him famous.

The rating standards used are strictly his own. A perfect score calls for 12 stars, three for each category. If he is prejudiced toward a peculiar type of decoration and ceremony within the inner sanctuary, his readers would never admit it. In his capacity as religious editor, Plagenz has granted only two perfect scores and one went to a black congregation meeting in a storefront church.

Some readers consider his reviews sacrilege. Plagenz on the other hand calls himself a religious detective, seeking to generate the very best motivation possible from any given setting and speaker. When questioned about how he can compare halls of God to hotels or broadway plays, he replied: "Why not, for goodness' sake. My purpose is to see whether they are doing a good job of presenting God to people in an effective way. Can you think of anything more high minded than that?"

Catholics, Lutherans, and Baptists have all fallen to his typewriter. One congregation he reviewed was chastised as a "private club."

In this day and age this is not merely different, but unique in a time when little is truly new. Plagenz looks at every church in three ways. How does the service impress him, how do the congregation members react, and what is keeping people away from the church? While he personally has concluded that his reviews may do nothing to brighten the appeal of any particular church, it should make more people aware of what they go to church for!

Primordial things finished before the last creation begins-- "And the earth had become a waste and a void, and darkness was upon the face of the deep; and the Spirit of God was brooding upon the face of the water." This sentence, therefore, does not necessarily describe the state of the land when first created, but merely intimates a change that may have taken place since it was called into existence. What its previous condition was, or what interval of time elapsed between the absolute creation and the present state of things, is not revealed. How many transformations it may have undergone, and what purpose it may have heretofore served, are questions that did not essentially concern the moral well-being of man, and are, therefore, to be asked of some other interpreter of nature than the written word of the Bible.

This state of things is finished in reference to the event about to be narrated. Hence, the settled condition of the land, expressed by the predicates "a waste and a void," is in studied contrast with the order and fullness which are about to be introduced. The present verse, is therefore, to be regarded as a statement of the wants that have to be supplied in order to render the land a region of beauty and life.

A second clause of the verse points out another striking characteristic of the scene: "And darkness was upon the face of the deep." Here, again, the conjunction is connected with the disorder and solitude which then prevailed on the land. It forms a part of the physical derangement which had taken place on this part, at least, of the surface of

Pre-adamic scene further described--

It is further to be noted that the darkness is described to be on the face of the deep. Nothing is said about any other region throughout the bounds of existing things. The presumption is, so far as this clause determines, that it is a local darkness confined to the face of the deep. And the clause itself stands between two others which refer to the land, and not to any other part of occupied space. It cannot therefore be intended to describe anything beyond this definite region.

The deep, the roaring abyss, is another feature in the pre-adamic scene. It is not now a region of land and water, but a chaotic mass of turbid waters, floating over, it may be, and partly laden with, the ruins of a past order of things: at all events not at present possessing the order of

vegetable and animal life.

"Day" and "Night" -- The designations of "day" and "night" explain to us what is the meaning of dividing the light from the darkness. It is the separation of the one from the other, and the orderly distribution of each over the different parts of the earth's surface in the course of a night and a day. This could only be effected in the space of a diurnal revolution of the earth on its axis. Accordingly, if light were radiated from a particular region of the sky, and thus separated from darkness at a certain meridian, while the earth performed its daily round, the successive changes of evening, night and morning, day, would naturally present themselves in slow and stately progress during that first great act of creation.

Thus we have evidence that the diurnal revolution of the earth took place on the first day of the last creation. We are not told whether it occurred before that time. If ever there was a time when the earth did not revolve, or revolved on a different axis, or according to a different law from the present, the first revolution or change of revolution must have produced a vast change in the face of things, the marks of which would remain to this day, whether the impulse was communicated to the solid mass alone, or simultaneously to all the loose matter resting on its surface. But the text

gives no intimation of such a change.

At the present, however, let us recollect we have only to do with the land known to antediluvian man, and the coming of light into existing arrangement of day and night. How far the breaking forth of the light may have extended beyond the land known to the writer, the narrative does not enable us to determine.

Entrance of light -- We are not prepared to conclude that the entrance of light into this darkened region was effected by such a change in its position, or in its superincumbent atmosphere, as allowed the interchange of night and day to become discernible, while at the same time so much obscurity still remained as to exclude the heavenly bodies from view. We have learned from the first verse that these heavenly orbs were already created. The luminous element that plays so conspicuous and essential a part in the process of nature, must have formed a part of that original creation. The removal of darkness, therefore, from the locality mentioned, is merely owning to a new adjustment by which the pre-existent light was made to visit the surface of the abyss with its

cheering and enlivening beams.

In this case, indeed, the real change is effected, not in the light itself, but in the intervening medium which was impervious to its rays. But it is to be remembered, on the other hand, that the actual result of the divine interposition is still the diffusion of light over the face of the watery deep, and that the actual phenomena of the change, as they would strike an on-looker, and not the invisible springs of the six days' creation, are described in the chapter before us.

Then was evening, then was morning, day one. The last clause of the verse is a resumption of the whole process of time during this first work of creation. This is accordingly a simple and striking example of two lines of narrative parallel to each other and exactly coincident in respect to time. In general, we find the one overlapping only a part of the other.

When the Day Begins -- The day is described, according to the Hebrew mode of narrative, by its starting-point, "the evening." The first half of its course is run during the night. The next half, in like manner, commences with "morning," and goes through its round in the proper day. Then the whole period is described as "one day." The point of termination for the day is thus the evening again, which agrees with the Hebrew division of time.

To make "the evening" here the end of the first day, and so "the morning" the end of the first night, as is done by some interpreters, is therefore equally inconsistent with the grammar of the Hebrews and with their mode of reckoning time. It also defines the diurnal period, by noting first its middle point and then its termination, which does not seem to be natural. It further defines the period of sunshine, or the day proper by "the evening," and the night by the morning; a proceeding equally unnatural. It has not even the advantage of making the event of the latter clause subsequent to that of the former. For the day of twenty-four hours is wholly spent in dividing the light from the darkness; and the self-same day is described again in this clause, take it how we will. This interpretation of the clause is therefore to be rejected.

Days of twenty-four hours each -- The days of this creation are natural days of twenty-four hours each. We may not depart from the ordinary meaning of the word without a sufficient warrant either in the text of scripture or in the law of nature. But we have not yet found any such warrant. Only necessity can force us to such an expedient. Scripture, on the other hand, warrants us in retaining the common meaning by yielding no

hint of another, and by introducing "evening, night, morning, day," as its ordinary divisions. Nature favors the same interpretation. All geological changes are of course subsequent to the great event recorded in the first great verse, which is the beginning of things. All such changes, except the one recorded in the six days' creation, are, with equal certainty, antecedent to the state of things described in the second verse. Hence, no lengthened period is required for this last creative interprecition.

interposition.

Where did creation begin -- In discussing these questions exegetically, much depends on the correct interpretation of the substantive verb and was, in the second verse. Does it denote a time contemporaneous with the verb created in the first verse, or does it denote something succeeding, either as state or event -- namely, that the earth and heaven, which had been created by a distinct and separate act there related, was afterwards (whether as having been left so, or as having become so by some cause or causes not mentioned) waste and void. Or does it mean (as the Jewish authorities maintain) that this condition, whose time is denoted by was was the beginning of the creation described, or the chronological date when this creation, called the Mosaic, began. In other words, came the expression "And the earth was," denote, grammatically, a succeding instead of a contemporaneous event.



Always promoting progress, he took part in many changes and improvements in our organizations.

Mr. Reichel was active at Cassadaga when the hotel was purchased by the Stow Foundation and the Morris Pratt Institute. It was his hope that the Hotel could be a home for retired mediums and workers. When this could not be done he was very disappointed. Emil was not a medium or speaker. But his secretarial duties were outstanding.

During the Los Angeles Convention in 1941 when both Mr. Reichel and Mr. MacDonald were nominated, Emil rose and declared, "Vote for Bob MacDonald." This showed to the delegates his preference based on ability and an unselfishness rarely found.

Emil and I often worked together in helping to keep conventions moving smoothly. I remember one time at Convention when we held services in one place and the business sessions at another. We carried whatever we needed from one to another.

Emil was very much interested in making the Stow Foundation a success and helped establish its activities so that it could conserve its assets. He was a tireless worker for Spiritualism. Also he worked with the Morris Pratt Institute all of his active years.



Jeannette J. Knepprath

Jeannette Knepprath was the daughter of Dr. Kraft of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. He was the author of *Dorio* a book worthy to be in anyone's library. Students of the Morris Pratt Institute class of 1931 received an autographed copy. Jeanette's sister, Louise, lived in Los Angeles for a time and joined the Central Spiritualist Church. Although different in temperament, both were tireless workers for Spiritualism. Mrs. Knepprath was first elected on the N.S.A.C. official board in 1956 and was thereafter reelected until her death. She was quiet but active and did much for Spiritualism. Having often served on the budget and finance committee with her, I remember that she insisted on taking the committee to dinner while doing their work.

She established the M.P.I. Tuesday Breakfasts at the N.S.A.C. Convention. Her husband was a very quiet man who seldom attended the Conventions.

Jeannette was the president of the Women's Bowling Association for years and participated in other civic activities. She was neither a practicing medium nor speaker. She arranged for a school building at Lily Dale which is maintained by the M.P.I. and is used for classes during the summer season. She had no children.

It was a great surprise when she left her estate to the Morris Pratt Institute, the Bureau of Education of the N.S.A.C., for promoting the correspondence courses. The MPI is now well financed due to the provisions of her will and her influence will long continue in the field of education.

The evil is null, is nought, is silence implying sound.


What was good shall be good, with, for evil, so much good more.


On the earth the broken arcs; in the heaven a perfect round.

- 7. Patience is the key to paradise.



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

Several years prior to the Hydesville Raps, Mr. Davis predicted the exact year (1848)in which they took place. "New channels will be formed for the inflowing of new Truths. Mines of treasure will be discovered in the earth and floods of Spiritual Light will descend from the Heavens".

From "The Harmonial Man" by Davis; "The education needed by man is general education in the vitalizing doctrines of Liberty, Fraternity, and Unity. Ignorance deforms and degrades man. Go forth; teach the Principles of Nature, expand your minds into unity, strength and teach justice. Find the means by which the greatest happiness may be secured by the greatest number."

A. J. Davis passed to spirit January 13, 1910 at the age of 83.

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
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
