

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
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# "A Peculiar People"

That he might purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works. Titus 2:14.

In these words written by the Apostle Paul stands a phrase reflective of the Spiritualist church and its purposes. Spiritualists are a peculiar people worthy of much more than their quiet approach to life might of itself indicate. If, by chance, you do not number among them, allow me this opportunity to mention a few of their peculiarities, which I feel sure will win your approval and possibly, interest you into seeing for yourself what they have which you do not!

Any belief or conduct which is uncommon fits the description of peculiarity, whether it is offensive or commendable. The closed mind coughs at the thought of being in the midst of Spiritualists, so blazen to announce to the world that they openly communicate with the dead! In itself that is a bold statement. In fact, no other religious group or order makes such communication one of the cardinal tenets of its religion. Yet, is it not true that all religion speaks of an after life? Spiritualism sets it forth as a fundamental doctrine, and proves it at least once a week in every major city of this nation.

The creeds and confession of faith of the Methodists, Baptists, United Brethren and all other Christian denominations are as silent as the grave when it comes to putting the foundation to the test.

In striking contrast, measure these words: "We affirm that communication with the so-called dead is a fact scientifically proven by the phenomena of Spiritualism." This statement is just one of the articles of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches' declaration of principles. So, we have the first peculiarity. Now, reason this out: If such a statement can be proven, it represents a truth greater than the discovery recently made of a new race of people in the Philippines. And yet the discovery was hailed with greater ceremony than the one now bridging the void between what has been described as life and death -- the spirit world. Writers of science fiction would call such a world the fourth dimension. Perhaps, though, just as Buck Rogers was illustrated over 20 years before this improbability became reality, visionaries or more appropriately, seers, viewed life concurrent and co-existing with this one and termed it the fourth dimension.



In 1924 U. S. Secretary Denby announced a great plan which eventually would result in this government annexing much of the 1,000,000 square miles of unknown territory near the North Pole. To meet the task a great dirigible was constructed, thus, allowing a thorough look at this promising new world. Such a waste in view of that new world which beckons to broaden our horizons. The cost is patience and possibly a trying 15 minutes of your time two or three times a week, as a minimum. Such a contrast!

True, journeys into the northern waste lands led to our purchase of Alaska. But there is no need to annex the spirit world. Access is available without a property deed. And in comparison, the cost is negligible, on any scale!

Another peculiarity is that many Spiritualists claim to have sailed the uncharted seas leading to the domain of immortality. Some even offer souvenirs which represent places they stopped over. More often than not these are bits of truth - credible communications developed in contacts and even lengthy conversations with inhabitants of that world.

Daily, Spiritualists chart the once unknown seas much as the great Columbus. Trained psychic researchers pierce the shadows to find that all life is transitory and sooner or later will experience change.

"We have acquired proof of the existence of an invisible world which can enter into relations with humanity." In that statement the late Prof. Zollner of the University of Zurich isolated the primary reason mankind should take a closer look at this concurrent dimension.

Hundreds of great scientific men and women and master investigators, past and present, have declared Spiritualism is true and that returning

# N.S.A.C. Superintendent conducts Lyceum Conference

The 24th Annual Lyceum Conference was held in Lily Dale, New York on July 7,8, and 9. Most sessions were held in the Andrew Jackson Davis Lyceum Building. Ninety lyceumists from twelve different states registered-46 children and 44 adults, the youngest being Dennis Whittle of the Royal Oak Lyceum, Royal Oak, Michigan, age 7½ months.

A Friendship Hour on Thursday evening preceded the official opening of Conference. Refreshments were served by the Lily Dale Lyceum while lyceumists renewed old friendships and began new ones. The Lily Dale Summer Lyceum kindly hosted coffee and donuts during the registration hour on Friday morning. Registration throughout the Conference was capably handled by Mrs. Elaine Kwapich.

At the Friday morning opening session a welcome was given by Cecily Rivers, Lily Dale Summer Lyceum Conductor, Mr. Robert Sabol, President of the Lily Dale Assembly, and the Rev. Joseph H. Merrill, President of the N.S.A.C. We were pleased to welcome five additional National Officers: the Reverends Ernst A. Schoenfeld, Alice Hull, Evelyn Muse, D. Mona Berry, and William F. Melick. Mrs. June Killmer, Supt. of the Bureau of Lyceums welcomed all, stated the objectives of the Conference, and presided over the sessions.

The Conference adopted as their theme "Spiritualism Lights Up My Life". The Conference Recorder was Mrs. Sharon Kuziemkowski and Musician, Mrs. Audra Cutlip.

Eight beautiful Lyceum Banners were displayed in the main Lyceum meeting room throughout the Conference. Each was explained by a representative of that Lyceum at the opening session and each received a certificate of participation. Mrs. Fran Broadstone, the new Spotlight Editor was introduced and spoke of the new ideas she wished to incorporate into The Spotlight. Constructive suggestions were offered.

# Spiritual Evaluation: Requires Reason, Intelligence

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary to abandon the old way of thinking and believing, one learns much that is both new and (useful). Spiritual concerns and spirit manifestations are not intended to be taken as exceptions from this truth.

Reason and intelligence are required to separate things material from those spiritual. All considerations must be weighed if you are to obtain permanent value. It is not enough to fix your view on all that is good, true and beautiful. Man's nature causes such considerations, in time, to waver. Thus, values must be locked in.

At first the grass over yonder hill seems greener, and the desire to achieve true spirituality in all pursuits appears within your realm simply through righteous endeavor. Weighing material and spiritual values is comparable to investment benefits: short term or long term. Each has its place and value. The short term represents the material while the everlasting long term decision molds the spiritual life. All things give way to change, save eternity:

Just as temporal matters are transitory and soon beyond all but memory, spiritual achievements reflect growth of unyielding structure. Each building block becomes a stepping stone from which further advances are possible.

So, while physical attractions have their natural place and order in life, let us for the moment turn from these rapid changes and seek the upliftment given within a life filled with spiritual thought and achievement. Have we not delayed our progress long enough already?

The world is changing and with it man is learning that "all that glitters is not gold." Realities once conceived by but a few are now filling the libraries and workshops by the score. The blending of mind, matter and spirit are well within our reach-within the reach of every human being capable of logic. And because of this abrupt turn-around in recent years Spiritualists can no longer have misgivings about the future and popularity of their faith. The law of progression continues to weave firm the path ahead. Materialism, the great splendor of the rich has exceeded even itself as man desires more. The making of more money is no longer sufficient in itself and achievement after achievement somehow leaves an empty void when the top is scaled. That is where faith with proven truths rests silently for the great masses. Too often in the past the drawing card was grief or fear of approaching death. Now, thanks to the clearing away of ignorance, Spiritualism has gradually supplanted this gross misunderstanding to spiral above pure earthly accomplishments, yet offering the best of both worlds to the true seeker willing to earn his or her wings.

Politico-economic measures lack the merit of loving cooperation. Eventually the road leads to physical and/or mental persuasion for selfish gains. In this simple statement lies the simplicity pointing to why the spiritual path is the best. There is room for every offering, every measure of love and every attempt. The trying is no longer competitive, for each soul is given its just reward in respect to the effort put forth. What does all this mean: that the ultimate is to shine brightly without being tinged with fear or reckless aggression. And if the drive is great enough, both factors become harbored deep inside, for each new possession represents something else to lose, so harder, ever harder must one drive to save what is already temporarily his.

Why temporize? For that matter why give up mental, moral and physical forces to the shadow of fear and reckless pursuit? It is possible to live in the house of divinity and share in the abundance of your present accomplishments. Reaching out for spirit only to find it within doesn't mean forsaking others or giving away all your earthly possessions. In times past drastic proof of the love of God was required. Such demands are not placed before you, for you and you alone decide what demands are acceptable as you will be the one making them.


Many wise and great masters have devoted their entire lives to absolute love. In exchange for the gifts of truth and sight they have left this day to day existence. No one seeks that of you. The doorway is ajar because of the love brought forth through Spiritualism. Of course, there are many truths. But Spiritualism is direct and without demands. The father of Modern Spiritualism had a foster son?

As untiring a worker as ever to grace Spiritualism, Dr. Frank S. Bigelow was the foster son of Andrew Jackson Davis. Bigelow was born in Liberty, Maine. He spent the bulk of his 93 years of life in the promotion of Spiritualism. While he demonstrated many gifts, his greatest psychic ability was healing.

Poor health led to the donation of 37 acres of land to the cause of Spiritualism

A pioneering Spiritualist, George Colby, journeyed south from his New York home to settle in northern Florida in the 1860's. Quick to make friends, Colby gained the support of local Seminole Indians who assisted him in locating acreage resembling his home in the north. After homesteading this land Colby donated 37 acres in 1868 to another purpose he had loved in New York, Modern Spiritualism. Today that land forms the base for Camp Cassadaga.

There were many interesting stories told about him and his sacrifices for the National Association. Mrs. Cora L.V. Richmond was the first vice-president.

# Spiritual and Mental Healing DO!

Always look cheerful! Smile! Smile!! Smile!!! Make yourself so optimistic that you can fairly feel it in every organ of your body.

Keep all physical and mental suffering to yourself; better still; deny to yourself that you are suffering.

Radiate life and kindliness.

Acknowledge the power within yourself to send good and strong thought currents of health through your physical organism.

Mental and Spiritual Healing is becoming recognized by thinking people. Healers are born: not made. A medium who has the phase of healing is a godsend to humanity. Those who put a price on their work or guarantee what they can do for a price are imposing on the public; they are impostors and are depleting your pocketbook and not benefitting your mental or physical condition. No healer can tell what he can do beforehand. Time has nothing to do with it if he cannot benefit you. Avoid the one who demands a price beforehand. Go to the healer you have faith in and one whom you know to be honest in his methods. Keep away from all advertising healers who make promises they never fulfill.

Spiritual Healers need not be told what your mental or physical ailments are. They are impressed as to how your case should be handled without anything being told them as to the ailment. Ofttimes the healing is instantaneous and in others it takes time to correct the trouble. There are many who have responded instantly, while in some cases treatments have been given during a period of from two to six years, and if they had not been thus treated would be in their graves today.

If you are a member of a Spiritual Healing Class do not scatter your forces by joining another class at the same time. Keep your thoughts directed with the operator of the class of which you are a member. Be firm, be steadfast. Ask and you shall receive. Remember, whatever is not worth asking for is not worth having. You should realize also that you must be prepared to follow the instructions of the healer or operator when such a one advises you what you should do in ways beneficial for your improvement.

# Persist, if your intent is serious!

A child born into this world takes years to understand fairly well the forces and possibilities of the material world. The inquirer of spirit lands and life need not expect to find out all about the subject within a single sitting with a medium, in attendance at a seance or through reading the book.

If you are not willing to persist, to overlook possible failures in any opportunity to observe phenomena, to make a serious study of the whole matter, you may do well to abandon the

investigation early.

Well informed Spiritualists are not engaged in trying, like a revivalist at a church meeting, to persuade you to believe anything. They know that if your mind is not open, if you are determined to reject proofs, whether simple or complex, if you are unwilling to be diligent in the task, you will not be likely to attain an understanding of the facts, beyond, perhaps, the condition of mind where you may think yourself very liberal minded if you say: "There must be something in it."

Most Spiritualists have made it a point to learn as much of the evidence on record as possible, often solely to gain a greater understanding; others seeking the basis of these truths undertake their

own investigation.

Those who do not assume one of these roles, who perhaps think such is the more rightfully the duty of the communicating spirits to sell their product are likely to remain ignorant of truths which erase shadows of doubt and open the mind to endless progression.

To give every aid to those who honestly inquire for the evidences of immortality, and of the implications of the proofs of it is a joy to any

Spiritualist.

To seek to convince those who do not ask in sincerity for the opportunity to know the evidence is folly.

Home Sitting preferred

The central unit of the Spiritualist multitudes is not the professional medium. Although the first contact is often such a medium serving a church, many long time Spiritualists have found that they can to a lesser degree generate the conditions suitable for manifestations and teachings. Thus, the long standing preference of many households to hold family circles.

### To teach, to comfort:

The primary purpose of the best mediums is to teach truths and to comfort those who mourn with facts they alone can appreciate. The philosophy taught by advanced spirits is complete and of the loftiest character.

Not only do advanced spirits teach those who will listen to the ways of happy and successful living, but former leaders in the arts often seek to aid the residents of this world in the creation of poetry, prose, painting, sculpture, architecture, music, or the appreciation of life, and nature.

### Proper attitude affects others

Attend at places and in company where with those spirit manifestations are more frequent. Often certain individuals represent stronger batteries or clearer channels. But never approach a sitting or reading for your own amusement. Manifestations are directed by an intelligence, and it is capable of stinging when offended. Unfortunately, such a result will usually break the high rate of vibration being enjoyed by others with more important matters on their minds.

Returning spirits are of the same character expressed here, unless many years have passed and study has molded a different image. Franchion Harwood Dorsch had a saying: "Six months, there or here, isn't likely to produce a changed character. In so short a time a departed spirit should not be expected to be perfect."

Often there is much laughter during a seance. However, it doesn't result from the fact of the communications, rather from the knowing that life never ends in death and that joys once shared can be shared again.

# Creation

Masterpieces of Many Minds

(Part V)

### The Firmament

The clear apprehension of the first day opens up all the rest. The same exegesis would bear repetition in every one, "And God said: 'Let there be a firmament in the midst of the waters,' and let it be a dividing between the waters!...and it was so; and God called the firmament heaven; and there was an evening and a morning, day second." We look back to find them. Where was the morning here? It was this second dividing, and the appearing of this new glory as its result. It is the sky, the atmosphere, and its auroral light. It is the causality represented in this purely phenomenal language by which Moses describes it, according to the conceptions he had of it, and which no more guarantees any vulgar (means common, as used) notion, than it does any science or philosophy, perfect or imperfect, that might be brought to explain it. The more clear determines that which is less so. The new appearing of the firmament being the morning, that from which it had been divided, or that preceding state in which the earth had been left after the separation of the light, and in which the fluid masses of air and water yet remained in their chaotic formations, is the night. And so, as the formula seems to imply, each time it is repeated; in this way there was also an evening and there was a morning, second-in this way, or the only way that exegesis will allow, for there was no visible sun rising or sun setting, no astronomical measurements to make a morning and an evening of any other kind.

The appearing of the dry land as it rose out of the waters, and the quick growth of blooming vegetation that covered it, was the third morning. And then that scene of glory, the first appearing of the sun, moon, and stars in the firmament, now prepared for their revelation-this was the fourth great morning to which the name is given, and not to any particular rising of the sun in the east as the beginning of a common day. As there had been a commencement of *light* or *life* so now there is a

commencement of astronomical time with its subordinate periods of sun-divided days, not to be confounded, as Augustine says, with the great God-divided days of which the fourth was one as well as the rest. Life moving in the waters, and soaring in the air, this was the fifth appearing; and so, according to the ever preserved analogy, the fifth great morning of the world.

Again a solemn pause, with nature left to its repose, how long or short is not revealed, and the sixth morning breaks. It is the latter portion of the sixth day.

### Creation of man

Now man appears. He is surrounded by the animal world, over which he is to exercise his more immediate dominion. The seventh is the morning of divine rest. The evening that precedes is not named in the first chapter, but perhaps we may find it in the supplementary account of the second, where there are mentioned two remarkable evolutions that seem to have no other period to which they can be assigned. They are the naming of things, or the divine aiding the human in the development of language, and that mysterious sleep of humanity (was it long or short?) in which by a process most concisely symbolized, but utterly ineffable in respect to the manner, the female human is brought out as the closing work, and man awakes complete in the likeness of God. "In the image of God created he him; male and female created he them."

### A Gradual Outcoming

It may be said that such a representation seems to make the days run into each other. This may be admitted without regarding it as any valid objection. The darkness still left is the remains, gradually diminishing, of the primeval chaos. Each night is a daughter of the ancient Nox, whilst each new morning is a rising into a higher light. In other words, the evening to each day, though still a disorder and a darkness, is a dimunition of the darkness that went before, whilst the positive light of each new morning continues on, adding its glory to the mornings that follow and "shining more and more unto the perfect day," or perfection of the day, the finished and finishing day- the all including day mentioned as the day when God made the heavens and the earth. And so, as Lange observes, and it is a most important remark, both for the scientific and scriptural view, each is a

"glory that excelleth" but still a building on, and a carrying on, the energies that preceded. Each is a new swell of the mighty organ, combining all the former tones, and raising them to a higher and still higher chorus, until "the diapason closes full on man."

### Bible Not non-committal

We may say that in its ordinary references the Bible may be non-committal as to theories and truthful as to facts. It may speak of phenomena without reference to causes. But we cannot say this of such a position as that taken in the first chapter of Genesis. Here we find an attempt to give a statement of the origin of the world. This trenches on the domain of method. It must be a revelation or a myth....When the Bible gives us history it subjects itself to monumental evidence. But you will say, "What monumental evidence have we for the first chapter of Genesis?" Here we have it on this table. We have here a succession of beds and rocks which have been formed at different periods since it was first created, and a succession of plants, one after another, and a succession of animals, from their beginning up to modern times. This is a series of facts derived from monumental evidence, not from stones inscribed by man, but from evidence which God himself has inscribed. Here we see is the history of the first chapter of Genesis, we can apply this and see whether it is true or not. Supposing we fully understand both, we shall be in a position to put the two together. In so far as this the scripture has submitted itself to monumental evidence. The writer, long before science was so far advanced, has committed himself to a history of the earth. Up to a hundred years ago no one knew, with any certainty, that there were records preserved in the earth that could tell, with God's own handwriting, whether his servant, his supposed servant, had been telling the truth or

### Biblical Creation Not Hurt by Science

Now, it will not do for us to take our stand upon the theory that the Bible was not to be committed to science. Here it is different; and the great error is often made by theorists and writers on this subject when they confound these two distinct things, and talk of the first chapter of Genesis, as not to be compared with science. But common sense teaches us that this is not the way to treat this question. It will suit for the incidental points

which may be true as records of facts which present themselves to the eye, but not with regard to those which man could not see.

This is a hard test for the Bible. Many of its friends are frightened at that test. I do not think they should be. I think they will find that scripture will stand even that hard test, and that it will come, after a time, to be regarded as one of the proofs of the inspiration of scripture.

### Source of All History is Eye-Witness

The source of all human history is eye-witness, be it that of the reporter, or of another whose account has been handed down. Only what man has himself seen or experienced can be the subject of man's historical compositions. So that history, as far as man can write it, can begin with but the point at which he has entered into conscious existence, and end with the moment that constitutes the present time. Beyond these points, however, lies a great province of historic development, existing on the one side as the *Past*, on the other side as the *Future*.

When man begins to be an observer or actor of history, he himself, and the whole circumstantial of his condition, have already come historically into being. Nor does the flow of development stop with what is his present. Millions of influences are spinning the threat still on; but no one can tell what the compound result of all their energies is to be. Both these sorts of history, then, lie beyond the region of man's knowledge, which is shut up in space and time, and can only call the present its own. It is God alone, who, standing beyond and above space and time, sees backwards and forwards both the development which preceded the first present of men, and that which will succeed this our latest present. Whatever the difference of the two kinds of history may be, they hold the same position in relation both to the principle of the human ignorance and the principle of the human knowledge. The principle of the ignorance is man's condition as a creature; the principle of the knowledge is the Divine knowledge; and the medium between ignorance and knowledge is objectively divine revelation, and subjectively prophetic vision by man, in which he beholds with the eye of the mind what is shut and hid from the eye of his body.

# Proper Statement of Theory of Creation

What then, is the actual statement of the theory of creation, as it may be held by a modern man of science? Simply this: that all things have been produced by the Supreme Creative Will, acting either directly or through the agency of the forces

and materials of His own production.

This theory does not necessarily affirm that creation is miraculous, in the sense of being contrary to or subversive of law, law and order are as applicable to creation as to any other process. It does not contradict the idea of successive creations. There is no necessity that the process should be instantaneous and without progression. It does not imply that all kinds of creation are alike. There may be higher and lower kinds. It does not even exclude evolution or derivation to a certain extent. Anything once created, may, if sufficiently flexible and elastic, be evolved or involved in various ways. Indeed, creation and derivation may, rightly understood, be complementary to each other. Created things, unless absolutely unchangeable, must be more or less modified by influences from within and from without, and derivation or evolution may account for certain subordinate changes of things already made. Man, for example, may be a product of creation, yet his creation may have been in perfect harmony with those laws of procedure which the Creator has set for His own operations. He may have been preceded by other creations of things more or less similar or dissimilar. He may have been created by the same processes with some or all of these, or by different means. His body may have been created in one way, his soul in another. He may, nay, in all probability would be, part of a plan of which some parts would approach very near to him in structure or functions. After his creation, spontaneous culture and outward circumstances may have molded him into varieties, and given him many different kinds of speech and of habits. These points are so obvious to common sense that it would be quite unnecessary to insist on them were they not habitually overlooked or misstated by evolutionists.

You shall have a home with me."


"Come children, listen to Jim's last words for us:


### Connecticut Christening

spirits of the once deceased are not limited in time, space nor frequency of occurrence.

Strange isn't it that all the proof and biblical guarantees are completely outweighed when you are confronted and exchanges once regarded as strictly personal are again shared. Somehow, such an instance is more convincing than any written or photographic evidence. Talking with a deceased loved one does just that.

Closed minds hear little that is new or interesting. That's the trouble with most television critics, unfortunately. The viewing public may find a new show a real spell binder, but since the average critic sees nothing new, nothing really different and watering to his literary appetite, the review is termed mundane, hair splitting or less. The listener needs to be as reasonable about communications from the spirit world as he or she would any other fact of significance. After all, the link is much like a telephone and the conversation must first be based on the intelligence level of the two participants. You are never asked to believe a vague uncertainty without substantial proof. But on the other hand if you place the call and then cross-examine the voice at the other end before entering into a worthwhile conversation what can you expect? Take just a moment and ask yourself what kind of a reaction would you give under similar circumstances? It is necessary to define that point further.

How many times have you cut someone short in their statement, presuming that you knew full well what that person was about to say? Perhaps often, sometimes, or not at all? All of us fit one of these examples. But listeners who fill the first two categories usually miss out on a lot of additional information because no one likes to be cut short.

Good works form second peculiarity.

The second peculiarity of Spiritualism is that the foundation of spiritual reward or salvation is based on good works. Choosing to stand alone, Spiritualism avoids the single most debilitating factor associated with many religious faiths: faith alone will save you. This single consideration forms the basis of many beliefs. Far too much emphasis has been loaded upon the biblical quotation: "believe on the Lord Jesus and thou shalt be saved". The original meaning has been stretched out of proportion and burdens the trust these words have meant throughout past history.

The universe reflects law and order. No where can be found such disarray as is implied in pure literal interpretation. And where is the logic or good reason in believing that regardless of the character of a person, whether good, foul, or debased, faith, even at the very last minute of life would free such a life in the world to come from being damned.

Can the slacker win?

Wouldn't it be the pits (to use a modern mid-western college expression to find an old reprobate in heaven who had lived a shameful and degraded life enjoying the splendors of his new found kingdom while knowing he had escaped payment. How contemptible!

The soul of a decent human being would revolt against any such scandalous teaching and would probably assign such thoughts as coming from the devil, if there is one.

If a man sows to the flesh he will reap corruption, said Paul. All the blood of Jesus, even if it were multiplied a million times over, cannot change tares to wheat nor thistles to figs. Man reaps what he sows, not a crop of another's.

A third peculiarity.

Purified unto himself is the third peculiarity which the Apostle Paul wrote. Jesus said: "Blessed are the pure in heart." The essence of this peculiarity boils down to the words of a very wise man who wrote: "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." You are not what you say or do, but what you think, for desires are thoughts in time molding into the complete character known as you.


The peculiarity here lies in the fact that Spiritualists know this to be a rule and wherever possible attempt to abide by the golden rewards of pure heart.

Standing alone on this plane of existence, Spiritualists purpose that all men and women of earth are of the same basic god-like essence and deserve merit for their accomplishments, not their pocket book. Knowledge and goodness, although both are measured in degrees, will eventually pay dividends.

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
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
