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President's Message



To the Officers and Delegates of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches, in convention assembled:

Greetings:

Rochester, the site for our convention this year, is rich in the heritage of Modern Spiritualism. It serves as the perfect backdrop for the issues which will be discussed this week.

In retrospect, it is because of heritage that Spiritualist groups united and developed codes of




Often I have been asked "What is the purpose of organization?" As always, the question is prompted by impatience -- and that hyperactive desire to uncouple seemingly invisible chains which to those few reflect a slowing of progress. But, organization is an essential ingredient of growth, not restriction. In actuality it directs the combined talents of many tested through discussion and accomplishment into areas of common good, and greater achievement. Organization breeds solutions many solutions will reach the floor before this week ends. And each of you will have played a vital role in the united conclusion resulting in those very same solutions.

Here, we are concerned with the "Total sum" and how those decisions will impact upon our organization tomorrow.

On the one hand we have direction, stability, purpose and a common goal of achievement. Is this not more preferrable than excessive freedom and laxity? The whole purpose of education is to prepare our youth for the realities of life. To give them the tools to cope with problems when they arise. The age of the Flower Child has passed into oblivion. The age of reason prevails.

Rev. Billy Graham was onced asked, "To what do you attribute your great success?" His reply, a most natural statement, "To a strong organization." Last year his organization handled religious promotions totaling over \$50 million.



As Spiritualists we are bound under a code of ethics -- some of you may prefer the term regulations. Nevertheless, they are still ethics. The fruits of many minds labored long and hard to lay code of ethics before the first group meeting in 1893, when it met in Chicago. And even those efforts were refined further to a simplier understanding. How did the National Spiritualist Association endure through those troublesome years? It organized and like any solid structure stood the test of time - the best barometer of success.

This past summer participants at one of the Thought Exchange programs being held at Lily Dale tried to recapture the excitement and air exercised during those early years of growth. The attempted proved rewarding, but the atmosphere failed to reach the super-charged enthusiasm which must have driven Spiritualists then. Why? The group forgot that in the hey-day of this society the world was ablaze with mediumistic activities -there were no automobiles, television sets or other demanding pursuits to take the mind away to some far place. Spiritualists sprang like mushrooms, often starting at home circles. Churches and societies grew around key individuals. New auxiliaries came to the foreground and flourished within the hyperactivity of the period.

There is a definite yearning for greater emphasis on the scientific aspects within our order. Parapsychology and the new rush evident within the media has accelerated interest among our own and the general public, faster, I might add, then anyone anticipated these past three years. Efforts on the part of the Bureau of Education resulted in a Home Study course which helped to satisfy the hunger of some non-Spiritualists interested in psychism. Certainly more emphasis is going to be required in the years ahead. But where's the return, that all important benefit for Spiritualism. Is our intent to create even greater interest in the psychic side before the door to Spiritualism is opened? One does not lead to the other! The one must be associated as a greater part of the other; then, our numbers will grow.

By cross-referencing one into the other through seminars presented to the general public, but offered through the churches will, I believe, realign this relationship. Myself and a number of highly dedicated individuals -- some perhaps living in your community -- will be acitvely involved in the months ahead to achieve just this end. Greater

personal effort is what it's all about. These seminars represent the first phase of a major promotional campaign directed at reaching the public. It is my personal hope that before the 1980 convention begins that every teacher, minister, and youth leader in the country will have been exposed to one of these presentations.

Arriving with this greater influx of psychic interest has come a wave of legal problems. But I hasten to add that I have personally taken steps to see that the certified members of the N.S.A.C. are protected to the limits of our capacity.

In one case a group within a chartered auxillary withdrew from the National, transferred its assets to a new corporation. Court action was undertaken to recover the assets. To date, the governing court has ruled in our favor. Another recent and important case involves the Lily Dale Assembly, where a dissident group violated the assembly by-laws, harassed the N.S.A.C. The course of putative action is now charted to dissipate confusion of all such groups. Results will have far reaching effects, and not just because the charges leveled by this group were refered to the Department of Justice, the Human Rights Division and the Civil Rights Division. FBI, yes, the Federal Bureau of Investigation case workers were assigned to probe the matter last summer. I personally was interviewed by two of them. And since the thrust of these charges were directed at the Lily Dale Assembly, the N.S.A.C. stepped in.

This test will strengthen our organizational framework It has pointed out the need to be record conscious – a little like tax time in April. Keep your records straight and you can face the problem head on without the slightest concern. In some areas churches lack personnel who have the financial training necessary here. Look to the National. We're to glad to assist you in setting up an acceptable system of book keeping.

To give better support to our upcoming promotional programs and face lift our image, the National acquired its own IBM typesetting equipment. Although the equipment was purchased at a bargain price its condition was first rate. Look at the new National Spiritualist—it's getting better each month. We are now typesetting books and printing them. Once again the Spotlight is being set on our equipment. This was long needed and will become an important work horse in future programs for our churches, seminars, and educational efforts.

The Lyceum department has a new Lyceum Superintendent and a new Spotlight Editor. Both will bring changes for the good into these departments but success will depend on everyone


co-operating with those in charge.

There is a growing tendency for new groups and prospective N.S.A.C. applicants to drop the word Church from the name of the auxillary and place therein the word Center while still using the required term "Spiritualist." In studying the reasons behind this there appears to be a desire to place more emphasis on the various facets of a working church by having various activities during the week such as the devotional service on a Sunday, an instruction class one night during the week, a night devoted entirely to healing and perhaps one night a week devoted to a period of questions and answers for a mid-week service augmented by a few demonstrations of spirit greetings. In the opinion of your President this idea has merit and should be studied for there are those of the public, young people as well as older who have been turned off by organized religion. To them the Church causes a withdrawal of interest.

With the resignation of your President as Vice-President of the International Spiritualist Federation, the Rev. Evelyn Muse was to represent the N.S.A.C. at their Congress which was held in London the week of August 26th.

As we move into the year ahead we do so with more courage, more determination to uphold the banner of Spiritualism and it would be well to adopt as a motto the words of the car bumper sticker and use it in every church "SPIRITUALISM IS THE LIGHT OF MY LIFE."

I that speak in weakness, and ye that hear in charity. Shall not cease to live and feel, though flesh must see corruption;

For the prison gates of matter shall be broken, and the shackled soul go free --

Free, for good or ill, to satisfy its appetence forever.

"What lies beyond the veil we know not!" If learned ecclesiastics, after the teachings of nineteen hundred years of dogmatic theology upon the subject of immortality can make such a declaration, surely it is time that some higher truth touching eschatological conceptions were more generally made known. The popular mind, swayed by the prejudices engendered through sectarian education, has so long and so generally ignored the facts and the philosophy of Spiritualism with its grand and ennobling conceptions as to the nature and destiny of the human soul. More especially as this glorious system has been so emphatically and undoubtedly proved to be not the mere ephemeral superstition charged by its opponents, but a theme of the highest ethical and philosophical importance; a system which takes up man's conceptions of the future where ecclesiaticism leaves them, and carries them on to a more practical apprehension of the vast possibilities of a life eternal. "The convinced understanding," says Mr. Jackson Davis, "speaks as one having authority." Recognizing this as a truth, it is to your understanding and not to your sympathies that (the answer lies.)

True, it may be said that Spiritualism had its original inception through the longings of the human heart after the beloved and the departed, whom the race has been told for centuries in Christendom had gone to an "undiscovered country, from whose bourne no traveler returns."

Nevertheless, this glorious system does not rely alone upon an appeal to the affections for its maintenance in human consciousness. Men and women of the clearest intellect and wisest forethought mark the progress of this movement; and it claims to be able to satisfy the judgement of the scholar, the statesmen, and the jurist. As a science and a philosophy it is being measured and defined, and the best thinkers realize that it grows brighter, and broader and more intensely profound the more earnestly and searchingly the investigation is pursued. Spiritualism, therefore, as it stands before the world is not only a religion appealing to our highest and holiest emotions, but as the grandest scientific fact in nature, and as a philosophic truth boundless in its apprehensions as is the universe of thought.

Death we are told by the Church, entered into this world of ours through sin; that but for the sin of Adam and Eve there would have been no death and man would have remained upon the earth immortal, as a physical being; that all the terrible consequences taught by orthodox theology are likewise the result of this assumed primal disobedience. Hence, that physical death in this world fixes the fate of man forever, either for weal or woe.

To these ecclesiastical dogmas and their corollaries Spiritualism stands diametrically opposed. It teaches, on the contrary, that physical death is as natural as physical life, that the one is the legitimate sequence of the other, in accordance with the known laws of matter; that death and decomposition appertain alone to the physical body; that the real man, after the environment of clay has been laid aside, lives on, the same individualized, spiritual entity, the same being precisely as before he left, save alone the outer covering of the material body; that he enters into the next sphere of being the creature, as here, of an eternal law of progress, the benefits of which may be enhanced or detracted from proportioned to individual effort and desire. Indeed, that "the stroke of death is but the kindly frost that cracks the shell, and leaves the kernel room to germinate."

Regrettably, the following charters have been cancelled: The First Spiritualist Church -- Kansas Church of Two Worlds, N.S.A.C. -- Missouri Chapel of Spiritual Truth, N.S.A.C. -- New York First Spiritualist Church of Clifton -- New Jersey.

We are indeed pleased to welcome into our association the following churches which have been chartered this past year: Chapel of Spiritual Truth, N.S.A.C. -- Seattle, Washington Sunflower Spiritualist Church -- Ashley, Ohio Spiritualist Chapel of Peace -- Melrose Park, PA Church of Spiritual Understanding, N.S.A.C. -- Erie, PA



Our new Lyceum Superintendent has been active. A special thanks to June Killmer for the Founder's day and Lyceum Conference notices mailed to our churches. Numerous churches and individuals have supported the Founder's Day Fund, and the Medium's Relief Fund. This can give all of us pride. The contributors are so numerous that I couldn't possibly acknowledge them all today, but I do want to thank you, thank you, thank you, on behalf of your national organization and the seven persons who are currently receiving a monthly check from the Medium's Relief Fund.

It is wonderful to note that all, but two pledges made to N.S.A.C. during the 1977 convention have been fulfilled.

Answers to questions in the Mini-Course and not vertabim quotes from texts, demonstrate to the N.S.A.C. Board of Examiners the student's mastery of the subject matter. If students will also leave approximately 2" between each answer, comments by the examiners will add to their understanding. Since students are often asked to furnish evidence to their church or state association of having passed a mini course, an official stamp clearly approving each student's passing paper will be used starting August, 1978.

John Brim, CPA for N.S.A.C. Headquarters, suggested internal procedures implemented this year which give N.S.A.C. a more accountable bookkeeping system. Upon receipt of check or cash, a receipt is written. Then the receipt number, name, and amount are recorded on the bank deposit slip, later entered into the ledger and journal. The date of each transaction also corresponds with the date on the renewal travel card, file card, and renewal sticker. This system leaves what is known as an account trail. Naturally, it has created some dissatisfaction as expiration dates on individual travel cards, and stickers will vary slightly from year to year. Your support of the new system is appreciated.

The N.S.A.C. office would not have run as smoothly if it had not been for the devoted efforts of Helen Hanson, David Smalling, Betty Harbison, Farin and Ann Farel -- each giving generously of their time and skills.

In closing, I want to assure you that the secretary's office is dedicated to directing its attention and energies to the growth, assistance, and encouragement of each of our members and member churches. Our pioneers developed an organization to provide an accepting atmosphere for the development and expression of mediumship, and organization that provides support for the preservation and expression of the principles we cherish. The Secrestary's Office will continue to serve these organizational purposes.

It is with pleasure that we bring to you the report of the Bureau of Lyceums.

Your Superintendent was appointed by the Board of Directors of the N.S.A.C. last October along with the following state lyceum superintendents:

Robyn Huerta - Arizona James Johnson - Connecticut May Ridyard - Iowa Gertrude M. Stewart - Georgia Fran Broadstone - Massachusetts William Cabana - New Hampshire Peggy Spencer - New York Verna M. Hentz - Texas

A Curriculum Committee consisting of the following people was appointed: Fran Broadstone, Audra Cutlip, Sue McCall, Evelyn Muse, and Peggy Spencer. They have helped to edit lessons, offer suggestions, serve as a sounding board for ideas of your Superintendent, and continue to be great promoters of lyceum work.

On June 1 the Annual Lyceum Report forms were mailed to all churches and camp associations. Since all were requested to return said forms, it was hoped that through this complete mailing we would have an accurate record of our active lyceums as well as those churches we might assist in the future in establishing a Lyceum. As of August 1, forty reports have been received showing 22 active Lyceums. This is about one-fourth the expected response.

Our Annual Lyceum Conference is a highlight of the year. We met in Lily Dale, New York on July 7, 8, and 9 for our 24th Annual Conference. Ideas were exchanged, suggestions offered, new materials presented, and happy moments shared by children and adults who share a common interest and love for our beautiful lyceum work.



It is unfortunate that through the years the Lyceum Conference has of necessity become a fund raising event in addition to its original idea exchanges, and all those things which will better prepare our teachers for their work in our lyceums. Our children join in lessons, activities, and social events. Much time and effort of adults has been spent on the smogasbord, county fair, pancake breakfast and like events. All this we try to squeeze into 2 and a half days.

The Conference renewed my faith that we do have truly dedicated workers, and a stronger spirit of cooperation is developing. A sincere thank you to the teachers, committees, and the Lily Dale Assembly.

Funds are a part of life and where the Bureau of Lyceums strives to be self sustaining our needs of lesson material and those things which will be of benefit to the individual Lyceum seems to far outweigh our source of income.

It has been traditional for the Lyceum Superintendent to send a letter to each of our churches in January asking for support and financial contributions to the Lyceum Fund as we honor our founder, Andrew Jackson Davis on Founder's Day, January 25th.

Last January 157 letters were mailed for this purpose. Through July 10th, only 11 churches or persons had responded.

Your superintendent of the Bureau of Lyceums is most grateful to the Board of Directors of the N.S.A.C. for their cooperation and support of our efforts. Our National Secretary has been most cooperative in answering many questions and assisting your Superintendent.

As the growth of our movement and the furtherment of the great truths that we represent is of great importance to each of us, should not the Lyceum be a prime concern? Is this not the foundation of our future?

Let us join together in giving the direction, time, and effort needed to aid in the development of this very important segment of our organization. Let us work toward a common goal of a growing active lyceum in every Church.

The following recommendations are hereby submitted:

- 1. Each state shall have a lyceum superintendent appointed by the state association or by the National Board of Directors where there is no state association. It shall be the duty of said appointee to assist lyceums within the state and encourage and help in the formation of a lyceum in Churches which do not currently have one. In states where there are no lyceums, the state lyceum superintendent shall work toward the creation of lyceums within the churches.
- 2. An assistant to the National Superintendent shall be appointed to assist the Superintendent in carrying out the duties of the office and to assure the continuation of all lyceum activites in a case where the Superintendent is unable to fulfill said duties.
- 3. All new lyceum teachers shall be required to complete the Mini-Course for Lyceum Teachers and upon passing the examination shall receive a certificate of completion.


A job it would be to see "help one another" become the guiding principle of one tenth of the population. One kindness deserves another and so the chain would build.

How unaided man would have placed the orders of creation. The first thought that strikes the scientific reader is the evidence of divinity, not merely in the first verse of the record, and the successive fiats, but in the whole order of creation. There is so much that the most recent readings of science have for the first time explained, that the idea of man as the author becomes utterly incomprehensible. By proving the record true, science pronounces it divine, for who could correctly narrate the secrets of eternity but God himself? Moreover, the order or arrangement is not a possible intellectual conception, although we grant to man the intuition of a god. Man would very naturally have placed the creation of vegetation, one of the two kingdoms of life, after that of the sun, and next to that the other kingdom of life, especially as the sunlight is so essential to growth. For the creation of quadrupeds man would have referred it to the fifth day, leaving a whole day to man, the most glorious of all creations.

Creation consists, according to the record of two great periods; the first three days constitute the inorganic history, and the last three days the organic history of the earth. Each period begins with light; the first light cosmical, the second light to direct days and season on the earth. Each period ends in a day of two great works. On the third day God divided the land from the waters, and He saw it was good. Then followed a work totally different, the creation of vegetation, the institution of a kingdom of life. So, on the sixth day, God created quadrupeds, and pronounced His work good; and as a second and far greater work of the day, totally new in its grandest element, He created man.

No parturient powers within the earth. Suppose the world to be in its condition of inorganic progress, we have no scientific ground for supposing that it could pass to a higher state, possessing living beings, by parturient powers within. Or if life exists, we still get no hint as to the evolution of the four sub-kingdoms of animal life from a universal germ; nor as to the origin of the class types, order family or genus types, or those of species, each of which is a distinct idea in the plan of creation. Nature, in fact, pronounces such a theory of evolution absolutely false. The perpetual presence of mind, infinite in power, wisdom, and love, and ever acting, is manifest in the whole history of the past.

Species not evolved from species. Species have not been made out of species by a process of growth or development, for the transition forms do not occur; the evolution or plan of progress was by successive creations of species in their full perfection. After every evolution, no imperfect or half made forms occur; no back step in creation: but a step forward, through new forms, more elevated in general than those of earlier times; the creation was not in a lineal series from the lowest upward. The types are wholly independent, and are not connected lineally, either historically or zoologically. The earliest species of a class were often far from the very lowest, although among the inferior. In many cases the original or earliest group was but little inferior to those of later date, and the progress was toward a purer expression of the type. But geology declares, unequivocally, that the new forms were new expressions, under the type idea, by created material forms, and not by forms developed from one another.

The revealed pieces fit onto the geological record. It is truly wonderful how thoroughly, in its general scope, the revealed pieces fit on to the geologic record. The dynasty of the fish was succeeded by that of the reptile, and the latter by the mammiferous quadruped, and that by man.

In deciphering the record, it is clear that several dynasties were introduced, not in their lower, but in their higher forms -- that in short, that in each of the great divisions of the processions, the magnates should walk first. We recognize further the fact of degradation specially exemplified in the fish and the reptile.

"Redemption is no after-thought, rendered necessary by the fall, but, on the contrary, part of a general scheme, for which provision had been made from the beginning: so that the divine man, through whom the work of restoration has been effected, was in reality, in reference to the

purposes of the Eternal, what he is designated in the remarkable text: the lamb slain from the foundations of the world." Slain from the foundations of the world! With those words could the assertors of the stony science ask for language more expressive? By piecing the two records together -- that revealed in scripture and that in the rocks -- rocks which, however widely geologists may mistake the one, or commentators misunderstand the other, have emanated from the same great Author -- we learn that in slow and solemn majesty has period succeeded period, each in succession ushering in a higher and yet higher scene of existence. Fish, reptiles, mamiferous quadrupeds, have reigned in turn. Responsible man, made in the image of God, and with dominion over all creatures, ultimately entered into a world ripened for his inception; but, further, that his passing scene, in which he forms the prominent figure, is not the final one in the long series, but merely the last of the preliminary scenes; and that that period to which the by-gone ages, incalcuable in amount, with all their well proportioned gradations of being, form the imposing vestibule, shall have perfection for its occupant, and eternity for its duration.

The cause of man's creation and his capacities now becomes the larger than life question. It is a universal axiom of science that "from nothing, nothing comes." As this incorporeal organism has been demonstrated to be an entity -- a real counterpart of the physical structure, since it is only through it that an inheritance can take place and transmissions can occur. It must be a part of some actual substance which had a previous existence; and as the existence of a god has been accepted by most, such a god therefore must be a substantial and intelligent entity. Just as certain as that our material organism necessarily had to come from a source or fountain of pre-existing matter, just so must this mental and vital organism pervading every living creature have come from a source or fountain of pre-existing mind and life.

The way is logically made clear, for the assumption that the vital and mental organism of each living creature consists of a mere drop from

out of the fountain of God's own infinite vital and mental substance. To the primal and miraculously created parents of each species, the creative will must then have transferred an infinitesimal drop of His own being, constituting not only the real entities of these primal parents, but the perpetual specific germ for transmitting the same entity to offspring, and the only part of an organic being not liable to displacement and substitution.

Here, accidentally, we again come to the starting point -- the real, intrinsic, and essential difference between the vital and mental organisms of the human and lower forms of being. From the suggestions already given, the thoughtful reader must have caught a glimpse of an infinite chasm yawning between the man and even his faithful dog. Though its expansion, embracing an eternity of existence and development, may not have been fully comprehended by him thus far. He has only to note the essential constituent element of difference in the vital and mental entities on each side of this hiatus, and it will flash upon him at once as the grandest of biological conceptions. Here it is in condensed form: While the lower animals receive at birth their specific stores of knowledge suited to their environment without the capacity of teaching or being taught, except to a very limited specific extent, thus adapting them exclusively to the single state of existence, the human being receives no knowledge at birth - not a single idea of inherited intelligence -- but, as before observed, an unlimited blank capacity for being taught, having an interior organism capable of being cultivated and expanded to eternity! This alone constitutes a wall as broad as the earth and as high as the heavens between the man and the brute.

As a necessary psychological corollary and scientific outgrowth of this sublime demarcation, lower animals cannot have the slightest conception of a future life, since their vital and mental organisms, as well as their specific stores of inherited knowledge, are only suited to and limited within a temporary existence. Hence, a future life of conscious activity, being unanticipated, undesired and wholly unconceived of, by lower species, would be of not the least advantage even to the most cultivated orang-outang, and would be but an eternal sameness without the eternal advances in culture necessary to make it otherwise, of which their very organic natures are wholly insusceptible.


How Spiritualists meet these tests will determine their growth in numbers, and their influence on the hearts of men.

Truth is not always easy to accept. During the seventeenth century to suggest change or even question was a grave error. Yet during that same period when the physical sciences were arrested, man turned his impulse to thought and an impetus to the spirit of inquiry. Today, those truths are still being felt. The attempt of Galileo in 1663 to establish the system of Copernicus as to the revolution of the earth around the sun fell in direct opposition to the faith and teachings then considered supreme.

During the sixth century, Cosmos, a Greek Christian merchant wrote a book entitled "Christians Topography," the chief intent was to confute the heretical opinion of the earth being a globe along with the pagan assertion that there was a temperate zone on the southern side of the torrid zone. He informed his readers of the true orthodox system of cosmography -- the earth was a quadrangular plan, extending four hundred day's journey from earth to west, and exactly half as much from north to south, enclosed by lofty mountains, upon which the canopy of vault of the firmament rested. Night and day he wrote was due to a huge mountain on the north side of the earth, which by intercepting the light of the sun

the vicissitudes of day and night. The plane of the earth, he said, had a declivity from north to south, by reason of which the Euphrates, the Tigris, and other rivers running southward were rapid in their course, whereas the Nile, having to run up hill, had necessarily a very slow current.

Now remember that in 1492 Columbus discovered America. As monstrously absurd as were these statements by Cosmos, they nevertheless had their parallel in the 1800's. In the Museum of French Academy at Paris are to be found fifteen hundred books and pamphlets in different languages, which were printed during the year 1875 in Europe, with the design of proving by the Mosaic books that the earth was flat.



Light. The Romans thought lightning was a weapon of the gods, and sputtering lamps lit their homes. Science has harnessed the lightning and given us convenient electric light.

William Harvey, who discovered the circulation of the blood in the human body, likewise with Galileo had to buffet the storms on bigotry and oppression. Detraction and presecution followed him, and in consequences of his enunciation of this great truth he was reduced to the most abject poverty and misery.

Des Cartes, a distinguished contemporary of the two other great minds named, deduced from the system of Copernicus that the entire material universe is governed by mechanical laws. He applied this same approach to the circulation of the blood and found that it too was controlled by these same laws. His mighty genius grappled with the revelations evolved from both the microcosm of man and the vast macrocosm surrounding us, at one and the same time. From his study of these he sought to resolve all the phenomena of nature into matter and motion, or forces operating according to mechanical laws.

This theory was well enough as far as it went. But a more spiritual and legitimate conception as to causes is warranted before we cease to probe into the whys. The inference that all the phenomena in so majestic a universe cannot be referable to matter and motion as the only firm values.

Matter and motion need to be properly evaluated. They must be included in any concise formula of material science -- a spiritual power, of which motion is but the untiring agent, and matter but the visible channel of external manifestation -- an infinite power which, through matter and motion, is forever adding to all that has been perpetually transforming all that is.

Spiritual philosphy, the most sadly misunderstood and grossly misrepresented theme of the age, embraces all the physical sciences, and indeed every other groove of advanced thought, within the scope of its mighty reach. Through a long line of hitherto unappreciated phenomena and occult forces this same spiritual philosphy is leading the thoughtful and aspiring soul upward and onward toward a loftier recognition of this *Primal Causes* of all causes — the finger which toucheth the stars.

Des Cartes was grandly intellectual, philosophical, and scientific -- a brilliant luminary along the pathway of material progress, but this theory as to the sources of human thought, as well as to the general phenomena of the universe, adverted to, was radically wrong -- which is proved daily through Spiritualism. He lodged the soul of man in the pineal gland, described it as a heart like substance about the size of a small bean, situated immediately over the corpora quadrigemina, near the center of the brain. The soul existed there, he alleged, as a sort of central office, which, by the intermediation of the animal spirits, became aware of what was going on in the body, and influenced the operations of the same. Scientists of the present day do not generally ascribe so important a function to the pineal gland in an indefinite way, although many have adopted the theory of Des Cartes when they assert that the brain of man constitues the mind or soul.

The ancient Jews also held the existence of a nucleus of immortality, differing from that of Des Cartes in that it was more grossly material. They contended that there was an immortal bone in the human body called ossiculum luz and that this bone was the germ of the resurrected body. In old writings it is said that one might attempt to burn, boil, bake, pound, or bruise this bone but all in vain. No effect could be produced upon it. It was indestructible, incorruptable, immortal.

This theological dogma of a bodily resurrection, borrowed doubtless, in part at least, from the idea of the ancient Jews, has done little, if anything to

overthrow the materialistic conception of Des Cartes, or the materialistic tendency of the present day.

Something more is needed in Christendom than has been offered to satisfy the utilitarian and skeptical mind of the age with regard to the future destiny of the race. For the alleged evidence of past centuries has certainly failed in convincing the aspiring soul of the present as to the perpetuity of individual consciousness beyond the grave. Rev. [professor] Parks, a distinguished clergyman from San Francisco once said: "Outside of the Church is atheism, inside of it there is doubt." This admission must have been founded upon the most painful conviction of its truth, and that it is true the thoughtful observer is fully convinced.

Spiritualism more than any other system within the present compass of human investigation can best supply the important desideratum refered to. This religio-philosophical superstructure is founded upon facts relating to the continuance of life beyond the grave, and its assumptions are capable of being demonstrated by actual experiment—through mediumistic agency—through the agency of extension of the spirit.

Boundless as our wonder;
Whose quenchless lamps the sun and moon supply,
Its choir the winds and waves; its organ thunder;
Its dome the sky.

Spiritualism is a natural religion, with the Infinite Father as its high priest, the angels and the archangels as its ministers, and the entire human family as its membership and its beneficiaries. It teaches that every human soul proportioned to individual effort and desire, even while a denizen of earth, may drink and become saturated with the mysterious beneficiaries of the all-prevading spirit of the universe, through the instrumentality of communion with his ministering spirits.

It is becoming clearly apparent to the thoughtful investigator that this heavenly born system is to the New Testament the textbook of the popular religion of the day what the New Testament was to the Old in the age in which it was first presented—an extension of its views, with a new and stronger light thrown upon its obscurities.

The doctrine of immortal life receives from Spiritualism a practical illustration -- much that was speculation becomes matter of fact, and faith is confirmed by knowledge. In this age of free and bold thought, when the progress of physical science is brought into daily conflict with creeds, and skepticism seems to delight in the demolition of platforms Spiritualism, comes as a savior to true

religion reclaiming the atheist from his cheerless materialism, and bringing back the deist to the consciousness of his own divinity and immortality.

The phenomena of Spiritualism are the result of the harmonious action of natural laws. It derives no powers from beyond the domain of nature. It acknowledges, indeed, no super-naturalism. But embraces the whole range of being from the creative cause to the creature, in one universal system of interdependent action. It resolves all rational being into soul, and clothes soul in those substantial angelic or spiritual forms which supreme intelligence is perpetually evolving from dissolving matter. This soul [or thinking principle] is being continuosly clothed in matter in its most refined, sublimited, beautiful, and durable form. All matter in its ceaseless mutations through the mineral, vegetable, and animal kingdoms is spiraling to a permanent union with the

intellectual, the moral and the spiritual. In this union it finds the accomplishments of the divine purpose and rejoices in the bloom and radiance of immortal life.

Love of God does not mean a clear and smooth road. Because of this there can be no prophetic endowment to claim for Spiritualism universal acceptance in the immediate future. Notwithstanding the tempestuous billows of thought that now retard its progress -- Spiritualism -- that system which is founded upon fact and is capable of demonstrative proof which offers all that the heart craves, the fancy delights in, and the judgement approves, must make its way in the world. Its principle of action is love -- its aim a practical recognition of the fatherhood of God, the motherhood of nature, and the brotherhood of man. It has no arbitrary creed, but is tenets, all times are held subject to higher convictions.

In Conflict: The old and the new

There is a growing conception of religion which regards it not as a thing for special hours or special days, but as a reality permeating the whole of life. The old attempt to partition off a region where divine action is appropriate, from another region in which such action would be out of place -- the old superstition that God does one thing and not another, that he speaks more directly through the thunder of catastrophe or the mystery of miracle than through the quiet voice of ordinary existence - all this is beginning to show signs of expiring in the light of a coming day.

Those to whom such a change is welcome regard it as of the utmost importance that this incipient recognition of a deity immanent in history and in all the processes of nature shall be guided, elevated and made secure. Ancient formularies must be considered and remodeled if they are to continue to express eternal verities in language corresponding to the enlarged acquaintance with natural knowledge now possessed by humanity.

Nevertheless the attempt to draw up anything of the nature of a creed or catechism, unhallowed by centuries of emotion and aspiration, is singularly difficult; and to obtain general acceptance for such a production may be impossible.

Every denomination is likely to prefer its own creed or formula, especially if it has the aroma of antiquity upon it -- an aroma of high value for religious purposes and more easily destroyed than replaced. No carefully drawn statement can be expected to go far enough to satisfy religious enthusiasts: it is not possible to satisfy both scientific and distinctively denominated requirements. All this might be admitted, and yet it may be possible to lay a sound foundation such as can stand scientific scrutiny and reasonable rationalistic attack -- a foundation which may serve as a basis for more specific edification among those who are capable of sustaining a loftier structure.

Even though not yet fully attainable, it is permissible to hope for more union than exists at present among professing [church goers], and among the branches of [religious faith]. With some excellent people the differences and distinguishing marks loom out as if special importance; but from these I can hardly claim attention. I must speak to those who try to seize points of agreement, and who long for the time when all [religious] workers may be united in effort and friendliness and cooperation, though not in all details of doctine.

On the practical side, a concurrence of effort for the amelioration and spiritualization of human life, in the light of a common gospel and a common hope, is not impossible. And on the theoretical side, in spite of legitimate differences of belief on difficult and infinite problems, there must be a mass of fundamental material on which a great majority are really agreed.


A foundation is not to be mistaken for a superstructure. A fullfledged and developed religion needs a great more than foundation -- there must be a building too. The warmth and vitality imparted by strong religious conviction is a matter of common observation, and its a force of great magnitude. But it is a personal and living thing. It cannot be embodied in a formula or taught in a class. Here lies the proper field of work of the churches. What can be taught in a school is the fundamental substratum underlying all such developments and personal aspirations. It can be dealt with on a basis of historical and scientific fact, interpreted and enlarged by the perceptions and experiences of mankind.

A creed or catechism should not be regarded as something superhuman, infallible, and immutable. It should be considered to be what it really is -- a careful statement of what, in the best light of the time, can be regarded as true and important about matters partially beyond the range of scientific knowledge: it must always reach farther into the unknown than science has yet explored.

An element of mystery and difficulty is not appropriate in a creed, although it may be primarily intended for comprehension by children. Bare simplicity of statement, concerning things keenly felt but imperfectly known, cannot be perfectly accurate. Yet every effort should be made to combine accuracy and simplicity to the utmost. Every word should be carefully weighed and accurately used: mere conventional terminology should be eschewed. A sentence stored in the memory may evolve different significations at different periods of life, and at no one period need it be completely intelligible or commonplace. The ideal creed should be profound rather than explicit, and yet should convey some sort of meaning even to the simplest and most ignorant. Its terms, therefore, should not be technical, though for full comprehension they would have to be understood in a technical or even a recondite sense.

To make a statment of this kind useful, it is necessary to accompany each clause with some indication of the supplementary teaching necessary to make it assimilable: and such hints should be adapted not only to professed teachers, but to parents and all who are directly or indirectly concerned with the education of children. It is my hope that the following clauses and explanations

may be of some use also to the many who experience some difficulty in recognizing the old landmarks amid the rising flood of criticism, and who at one time or another have felt shaken in their religious faith. Some of them are sure to have attained emancipation and conviction for themselves, but in so far as their own insight has led them in the general direction indicated by what follows, these will not be the last to welcome an explicit statement, even though in several places they may wish to modify and amend it. They will recognize that there is an advantage, for some purposes, in throwing old and over familiar formula into new modes of formulation does not necessarily indicate a lack of appreciation of the loftiest truths yet vouchsafed to humanity.

The bishop asserted that communication with spirits of the dead "will eventually be as possible as it is now to communicate with the living by wireless."

Bishop Page made this prophecy at a meeting of the Spokane ministerial alliance. He took occasion to give recognition to the Christian Science Church, which, he declared, would gain progress as long as other churches refrained from taking part in the movement toward spiritual healing. In his opinion, "the world is drifting today to a spiritualistic tendency which, though, still in its infancy, may develop to great heights."

properly called the distinguishing characteristic -consists in the fact that no animal below man has
or can have a conception of life after death, from
the very nature of their instinctive knowledge and
the manner of its reception. Whatever other
differences may exist, and they are numberless and
startling, this is incomparably the most intrinsic
and universal.

All this limitation to earthly objects, however, is exactly the reverse with man. With his unlimited blank capacity at birth for receiving instruction, he immediately acquires with his ordinary and rudimental intelligence, even if not specially taught it, a conception of living on forever; and not only such a conception of a future existence, but a desire for and appreciation of such an endless opportunity of acquiring knowledge. There is no reasonable or scientific ground for supposing that a longing anticipation of and a universal aspiration for a life beyond death could have been thus made an indestructible part of man's mental organism where there is no such a possibility as a future life in the divine economy of the universe. This blank capacity for unlimited cultivation and eternal advancement in knowledge becomes the guarantee


of man's immortality -- while the lower animal, having no capacity as a title-deed to a future life, gives back at death the mental and vital drop of its essential entity, which, instead of being annihilated or in any sense lost or blotted out, exists forever -- not as an identity of being, but falls back and is re-absorbed into the great and infinite fountain of life and intelligence from which it originally came as a spark of being -- the same as a drop of water.

Even the infant, at birth, or before it has a conscious thought, is thus the heir by title-deed to immortal life, though its actual knowledge is not the millionth part that of the pig or puppy of the same age. It starts, thus, a blank as to intelligence; but, having the infinite endorsement of its father and mother, which involves the undeveloped capability of analyzing the stars and weighing the planets, it holds wrapped up in its identity; and should it thus die untaught, and even unconscious of its own being, its *magna charta* of selfhood will be its passport to the primary college of the angels, and thence to the university over whose entrance is written in letters of life -- The Garden of Eternal Progress.

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
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
