Welcome to Rochester - - Home of Spiritual Miracles!

Address to Spiritualist Convention, Oct. 3, 1978

Welcome to Rochester, NY, the cradle of Spiritualism!

It's an honor to welcome you all, and to meet you. My own relatives believed in extra-sensory experiences, and in my 25 years as a local historian I've found many instances of man's continual contact with the unexplainable. Prehistoric civilizations believed, the indians believed, and not a year goes by that I don't learn of several new instances of paranormal phenomena. My 13th book will be a collection of Tales Of The Spirits, both good and evil, but since I'm not yet working on my 10th that's a few years ahead.

Historians know that man's first encounters with divine beings are iost to the mists antiquity, yet history continually affirms their reality in the minds and hearts of succeeding generations. Each day, man rediscovers new proofs that there is indeed a divinity that shapes our past, present and future. Either the whims of fate or that divine force controlling the minds of man ordained that in this nation of ours, as in biblical times, women, usually young, innocent, even naive women, would

become the vehicles for revelations.

The territory that is now Monroe county was unsettled wilderness when the colony of New York became a state in 1777. Several families emigrated from Pennsylvania in the 1780's, and scores of New England Yankees arrived in the 1790's, many from Berkshire county, Mass., many others from Connecticut's River and coastal vallies. Three waterfalls on the Genessee River once impeded Navigation but provided abundant power for many millsites along the banks. The coming of the storied Erie Canal in 1823 swelled both population and manufacturers as artisans handcrafted barrels, edge tools and canal boats. Rochester rapidly became the nation's First Boom Town, heartland of a large flour milling industry fed by the rich wheatlands of the county's agricultural areas. They called it the flour city. Later it was renamed the Flower City because of its seed firms and nurseries. Next it became Kodak City as the business began by George Eastman in 1878 across the street from this building made Rochester World Famous. In this century, it gave birth to the Xerox Corp. We now number over 750,000 souls, in this county named for President James Monroe.

From this populous county have come such innovations for human advancement as the gasoline engine, the vote for woman, the repeating rifle, voting machines, mail chutes, dentist chairs, baby shoes, gold teeth fillings, sulky wheelhubs, plastic watch crystals, solderless tin cans, glass lined tanks, the five and dime store idea, propane gas torches, auto seat belts, automatic percolators, fish hatcheries, flea collars, plastic collars for animals. liquid washroom soap, sterilizers, overhead dentists lights, soft plastic contact lenses, marshmallows, the dry film plate, xerography and fine instruments of many descriptions... all born in Monroe County.

Inventive geniuses of this county rushed the telegraph and gave to the world check protectors, thermometers, moon photography, smut machines, grain elevators, threshing machines, railroad car wheels, railroad signals, electric car starters, calcium burning headlights, street car transfers, sen-sen, certo, the Diamond grape, the 20-ounce apple, the Irondequoit melon and white hot dogs. Many Americans have never tasted the juicy white pork hots developed in Rochester by a German Sausage maker. Don't leave without trying one. The Rochester area industrial complex has been a leading national supplier of paper boxes, glass and plastic containers, gypsum, electronic communications, office equipment, telephone apparatus, pianos, medical, surgical and dental equipment, automotive equipment, railroad cars, pet food, baby and diet foods, salaratus, cabbage, beans, potatoes, wheat, fruit, bean pullers, apple paring machines and potato diggers. We have been a patent medicine center, shoe center, clothing manufacturing center, underground railroad haven, precision capital, optical center, bowling center, publishing center, nursery center and the world's largest computer center. On a per capita basis we produce more manufactured exports than any other area in the nation. The world's largest music library, the nation's largest audio-visual lending library, the world's largest lilac gardens are here. Our cameras and film have gone beyond this world to the moon, unveiling new secrets of the universe. Millerites waited here in vain for the end of the world in 1844, idealistic disciples of Charles Fourier founded three industrial social communities near here, Professor Walter Rauschenbush expounded the social gospel and Prof. William Hamilton proposed that God is dead. The American Bible Society was begun here, Brigham Young and Heber Kimball founded the church of Latter Day Saints, Benjamin Titus Roberts began the nation's first free Methodist Seminary, and Antoinette Brown Blackwell became the nation's first woman pastor. Part of

our diverse and exciting history is that fascinating story of your own organization.

Nineteenth century Americans were optimists. A new nation struggled to be born from the theories of the American Revolution, a nation that considered itself divinely blessed, believed in perfectionism, Millineumism; and they were eager to link the finite with the infinite. Exotic sects, far-out religions, evidences of psychic phenomena and paranormal manifestations were eagerly accepted in a world that was just beginning to learn through scientific discovery of the wonders of earthly communication through the telephone and telegraph.

Clairvoyances, telepathists, poltergists, of course, were not new events on the world scene. Anton Mesmer, the Viennese healer, had demonstrated magnetic cures through what we now accept as hypnotism. Emanuel Swedenborg had announced his visits to Heaven and Hell. Andrew Jackson Davis had prophesied. Magicians such as the Davenport Brothers, levitations by D.D. Homes, the revelations of the Shakers, Mormons, Perfectionists and Milleristes and German sects such as the Ebenezers were widely known. Jemima Wilkinson, the Public Universal Friend, had strong followers in the Fingers Lakes Area nearby and Mother Ann Lee's Shaker community near Albany and the 17 other Shaker communities had reported spirit visits from 1837-1844. In 1844, they suddenly stopped. About the box valed shoot fan

So many waves of spiritual revivalism had swept this area that critics opined that few souls were left who were spiritually combustible. We gained the name: "The burned over district," burned over with fire of faith.


On March 31, 1848, the spirit visits that had ceased to visit the old Shaker communities seemed to resume in a humble farmer's cottage in Hydesville, 30 miles east of Rochester, when the 40 inhabitants of that farming community, mostly peppermint farmers, learned that mysterious noises had been heard in the home of blacksmith John D. Fox and his aged wife. Their change of life babies, Margaretta, not yet 16 and Kate, not yet 12, appeared to be the mediums through which the spirits chose to communicate. Their experiences gave birth, on this very spot where we sit tonight, to the Spiritualist church movement. Nineteenth century America was also a century of many religiously based crusades. The great Napolean, Napolean the invincible, had gone down in defeat. Americans, Frenchmen, Italians, South Americans, all sought freedom. Slavery, labor, agriculture, women's rights, alcoholism, and spirit thoughts held the spotlight. Abolitions, crop rotation,

temperence, land reform, shorthand, photography. the telephone and telegraph, magnetic experiments and cures, phrenology, spirit rappings, patent medicines, graham and bran diets, mineral spas and cold bath, bloomer costumes, were the rage. Finally the industrial revolution gave rise to a climate of opinion where change and miracles seemed commonplace and thus very easily accepted. And Rochester had been a Hotbed of crusaders, a spawning ground for reform. So 34-year-old Leah, the older Fox sister, had no difficulty charging admission to the seances of her sister. She had rented the home of Alvah Strong, editor of the Rochester Daily Democrat. It was America's 18th largest city, with a population of 25,000. Strong, a good Baptist and respected editor was horrified to learn that his property on Troop street was being used for seances. He was the landlord for all this, and upon taking an out of town visitor for a seance became even more chagrined when the good Fox ladies insisted on holding it in Strong's own living room. The visitor, worse yet, became a Spiritualist, embarrassing Strong even further.

Today at Rundel Library, a block away, you can read the Microfilms of the old newspapers of the era and will appreciate the varied reactions of this young city to the miracles of 1848 and 1849.

Well I remember the majestic gothic Spiritualist church that stood near here, Plymouth Church, in my days deserted, haunted in appearance, finally to be demolished by the construction of our expressways, as was the home of the sisters. Today a slim granite obelisk stands as a perpetual reminder of their impact on our history. Hundreds came to see them and went away believing in the ferment of the 1840's. So yes, you are forever part of the warp and woof of Rochester history, firmly interwoven into the tapestry of our past. Here in this outstanding county where spiritual miracles have been continually revealed and tested and miraculous inventions continue to pour forth from the minds and hands of its citizens, enriching the lives of countless millions, we hope you will find new inspiration and challenges, as did your predecessors. It truly, historically, is your town. Come back enjoy our gardens and waterfalls, museums, and public buildings. We're always happy to see you and to say again: "Welcome










The Reverend Joseph H. Merrill, president of N.S.A.C., re-dedicated the Obelisk which was dedicated originally in 1927 by Sir Arthur Conon Doyle. The 25 foot tall granite monument, a result of donations by Spiritualist from all over the world and a memorial to the Fox family and other pioneers of Modern Spiritualism, held the place of honor on the grounds of the Plymouth Spiritualist Church previous location. The church and Obelisk had to be relocated or moved as the city modernized and a loop of interstate required the land. The monument and landmark of Spiritualism

Lyceum Report - - Recommendations

To the Officers and Delegates of the 86th Annual Convention of the National Spiritualist Association of Churches.

Greetings:

The committee on Lyceum Superintendent's report think June E. Killmer should be commended on her work of the past year. She has shown great understanding of the needs of the Lyceum Department of our great organization.



We heartily endorse her search for lesson material for our Lyceumists, as the Lyceum is the backbone of our Organization.

We are in agreement of the necessity of all Churches to do their utmost to aid in the future development of the Bureau of Lyceums. We are the ones who will benefit by such support. Remember we only get out of an Organization what we are willing to put into it.

We endorse the recommendations that were submitted by our Lyceum Superintendent, mainly:

- I. Each state shall have a Lyceum Superintendent appointed by the State Association or by the National Board of Directors where there is no State Association. It shall be the duty of said appointee to assist Lyceums within the state and encourage and help in the formation of a Lyceum in Churches which do not currently have one. In states where there are no Lyceums, the State Lyceum Superintendent shall work toward the creation of Lyceums within the Churches.
- 2. An assistant to the National Superintendent shall be appointed to assist the Superintendent in carrying out the duties of the Office and to assure the continuation of all Lyceum activities in a case where the Superintendent is unable to fulfill said duties.
- 3. All new Lyceum teachers shall be required to complete the Mini-Course for Lyceum Teachers and upon passing the examination shall receive a Certificate of Completion.
- 4. The Simplified Declarations of Principles, No. 7 shall be reworded to read: We bring unhappiness to ourselves by the errors we make and we will be happy if we obey the laws of life.

We, therefore move the adoption of the four recommendations of the Lyceum Superintendent. Respectfully submitted,

In Opposition: Good and Evil

Good is that which promotes development, and stands in harmony with the will of God. For comparison, think of good as a relative of health and beauty and happiness. Counter balancing the scale of life is evil, which retards or frustrates development, and results in injuries to some part of the universe. Its relatives are disease, ugliness and misery!

Development is the unfolding of latent possibilities -- as a bud unfolds into a flower, or a chicken emerges from its shell.

The idea controlling this answer is that growth and development are in accordance with the law of the universe, [one of the axioms of truth.] Destruction, on the other hand, is the mate of decay and is an element of good only in so far as its occurrence begins the clearing away of something better. An analogy of this can be seen in leaf mould which assists the growth of flowers, or as initial discords opening the mind to ultimate harmony. Each prepares the way for good, and in that sense represents development. In the same way conditions and practices which once were good become in process of time corrupt; yet out of ruin must grow the better future.

The old order changeth, yielding place to new, And God fulfills Himself in many ways, Lest one good custom should corrupt the world.

Actions on this plane of expression and the laws governing them often seem out of balance and without direct relationship. That is the short term view and not the will of God in expression. The laws of the universe, and the will of God are synonymous in application. [At another time TNS will attempt to properly define the term God, but for this article it is permissible reverently to use the term for a mode, regarding the universe as invested with what in human beings is called personality consciousness, and other forms of intelligence, emotion, and will.] The attributes noted in the preceeding sentence in italics, undoubtedly possessed by a part, are not to be denied to the whole, however little we may be able as yet to form a clear conception of their larger meaning.

A few minutes spent peering through a telescope brings to reality the painful truth that the universe was not made by man. It must owe its existence to some higher power of which man has but an infinitesimal knowledge. Some primary conception of such a power has been independently formed by every fraction of the human race, and is what under various symbols has been called God.

It is sometimes asserted that God does not possess powers and faculties and attributes which we our ourselves possess. But that is preposterous: for though we may be able to form no conception as to the particular form our powers would take, when possessed by a being even moderately higher in the scale of existence than oursleves; and although vastly more must be attributed to the reality denoted by the term God than we can even begin to conceive of; yet such a term, if it is to have any meaning at all, must at least include everything we have so far been able to discover as existent in the universe. It must, in fact, be the most comprehensive term that can be employed. For practical purposes though it may be permissible to discriminate, and exclude from its connotation, portions such as self, and the world, and sometimes, but with less excuse, even an abstraction like nature; considering these separately from the more purely personal aspect to which attention is directed by our ordinary use of the term God. It is convenient to differentiate the principle of evil also, and to reserve it for separate study.

The totality of existence is often spoken of as the absolute, and the term God is limited to the conception of a being of infinite goodness and mercy, the ultimate impersonalization of truth and love and beauty -- a being whose attributes the highest faculties and perceptions of man are but a dim shadow or reflection.

In man, goodness is the path towards higher development and a radiant beauty is the crown and perfection of life so the trinity of truth, goodness, and beauty, often referred to in literature, may, without undue stretching, be considered as also equivalent to what is represented by the words, the way, the truth, and the life. These three aspects after all comprise one essential unity. That which is good, in the highest sense, cannot help being both true and beautiful. Nevertheless, for many practical purposes, these ideas must be discriminated; and the question is occasionally forced upon our attention whether vitality or beauty can possibly



be enlisted in the service of evil; and if so, whether it is still in itself good.

Still it is a question of application

We have to learn that most things can be misapplied, and that though they do not in themselves cease to be good, their desecration is especially deadly. That the corruption of the best abets the cause of the worst, is proverbial; the prostitution of high gifts to base ends is the saddest of spectacles.

Lilies that fester smell far worse than weeds.

Oratory, the power of persuasion, can thus be debased, and the passions of the multitude may be incited by the divine fire of eloquence. Rhetoric and sophistry have been on this ground condemned when they were misused for the cultivation of the art of persuasion apart from knowledge and virtue; but almost every good gift -- persoanl affection, medical science, artistic genius -- has every now and then been abused; and the higher and nobler the faculty, the more sorrowful and diabolocal must be its prostitution.

It has been an ancient puzzle to consider whether the principle of goodness is the supreme entity in the universe -- a principle to which God as well as man is subject --whether it represents only the arbitary will of the creator. Many answers have been given, but the answer from the side of science is clear:

No existing universe can tend on the while towards contraction and decay; because that would foster annihilation, and so any incipient attempt would not have survived; consequently an actually existing and flowing universe must on the whole cherish development, expansion, growth: and so tends toward infinity rather than towards zero. The problem is therefore only a variant of the general problem of existence. Given existence, of a nonstagnant kind, and ultimate development must be its law. Good and evil can be defined in terms of development and decay respectively. This may be regarded as part of a revelation of the nature of God.

Spiritualistic Mediumship is an Art

The principles involved manifest through every living thing. Phenomena is wrapped with one of the great principles ever to operate. In function it delivers a message to every soul within reach. But before observation there must obviously be channels through which this great expression may be demonstrated. The eternal bosom of spirit wisdom is embodied in every manifestation. It can spring from all levels of invisible intelligence-from every plane within reach of man's immortal mind, either directly or indirectly. It never loses its all knowing and all pervading power to deal with the circumstances involved in communication. The control behind the force is never ignorant of the important principles. On one plane knowledge of the principle is demonstrated through understanding while at the same time on this plane of existence it may appear in the form of a prophecy, and on yet another plane within this physical sphere that very same principle is the reason behind natural consequences set in motion. In the latter this may be as simple as vegetation entering a series of stages which eventually will lead to the production of coal.

In all ages of recorded time mediums have demonstrated the authority of mediumship-those channels mentioned earlier. It has been established by all races, without exception. No people have ever been denied this gift or quality of the spiritual substance. Nor has the question of intelligence, progression or culture been considered before the rendering. Even today the few remaining aborigines of Australia have the ability to communicate with each other without making any known physical action over many miles. Great pain or need is communicated instantly between members of the same families. In the barren desert no known aborigine has ever been found who died from lack of water. What was applies today just as it did when the first medium channeled the energies of

Communication is the attunement physically in one dimension while walking the path mentally in another. Being here while there is quite a feat. But the principle which allows the door to be opened is an eternal law available to all earnest seekers. As a law it is not confined to any one class of individuals and simply is. To some degree this same principle manifests itself in every living creature all matter vibrates, whether described in medical

terms as deceased or alive.

The ability of a medium to respond is dependent upon the vibration under which he or she lives and within the range of frequency to which attunement is practical. Bear in mind this simple point: direct communication with the highest of the most high is impractical. Spheres of contact are those which are not so removed from earthly functions as to deal in equivalences beyond our grasp. For this reality the spiritual essence forms a link capable of uniting equally the savage or the culturally advanced with those in the spirit planes.

Mediumship is a complete channel-a substation capable of receiving, assimilating and transmitting. However, as a channel mediums can do nothing of themselves. They are sources acted upon or through. You could say that a medium is an agent for the spirit world in that one is used to manifest the objective state of another's understanding. The energy is an unknown just as electricity is. Scientists at the University of California recently managed to isolate a drop of electricity and look at it. It appears for comparative descriptions as a minute droplet of water. The physical substance gathered and shaped into form to generate a visible entity was collected by the great English researcher Cooke. But under analysis the sublime substance proved impossible to identify or associate with other known matter. Of course, this occurred before the current state of scientific art. Perhaps today identification would prove practical. While we may not know much about the energy which makes communication possible, we do understand how to connect the circuits which establish the link-ups between the two worlds. The connection is possible when vibration operating in the same general band are projected toward each other and harmonize. Once the link is completed polarized communication is possible-but until then the frequencies must blend, else they would pass each other like ships in the night, unaware. This is attunement. Spirit is more versatile in harmonizing, not because former earthlings have assumed the role of spirits. As a general rule each spirit has been schooled and is thoroughly acquainted with the art. This is why your task is greatly simplified in building the link.





A Mistake Corrected by Age

When I was young, in Cebes, it was surprising how earnestly I desired that species of science which is called physical -- for it appeared to me pre-eminently excellent in bringing us to know the causes of each, to know through what each is produced and destroyed and exists. But I happened to hear someone read from a book, which the speaker said was of Anaxagoras, that it is intelligence which is the parent of order, and cause of all things. I was pleased with this cause, and it seemed to me to be well that intelligence was the cause of all, and I considered that, were it so, the ordering intelligence ordered all things, and placed each thing where it was best.

Harmony between Science and Revelation

There have been scientific theories, no doubt, which were contrary to the Mosaic account of creation; and certain interpretations of the book of Genesis have also been contrary to the established facts of science; but setting aside merely speculative theories on the one hand, and erroneous interpretations on the other, we find in this narrative, as an outline of creation, a general harmony with the geological order. The first two days describe chemical action upon inorganic matter; the third day announces the production of vegetable life; the process of evaporation is still going forward, and the excess of moisture in the atmosphere would, up to this period, have obscured the planetary bodies; but on the fourth day the astronomical heavens were made visible in their relation to our globe; the fifth and sixth days introduce the successive gradations of animal life that culminate at last in man.

Scripture Interposes No Barrier

I am forming no hypothesis in geology. I only plead that the ground is clear and that the dictates

of the Scripture interpose no bar to observation and reasoning upon the mineralogical constitution of the earth, and the remains of organized creatures which its stata disclose. If those investigations should lead us to attribute to the earth and to the other planets and astral spheres an antiquity which millions or ten thousand millions of years might fail to represent, the divine records forbid not their deduction.

Orders of Creation Enumerated

This account of the world's creation (Moses') evidently forms an ascending line, or series of generations, whose highest point and utmost limit is reached in man. The six days' work arrange themselves in orderly contrast; and in correspondence to this are the sections as they have been distinguished. (1) The creation of heaven and earth in general, and which may also be regarded as the first constituting of the symbolical opposition of the two. (2) The first three creative days, or the three great divisions which constitute the great elementary oppositions or polarities of the world, and which are the conditioning of all creature-life: (a) The element of light and the dark shadow casting masses, or the concrete darkness, and which we must not confound with the evening and the morning; (b) The gaseous form of the ether, especially of the atmosphere, and the fluid form of the earth-sphere; (c) The opposition between the water and the firm land. (3) The three last creative days, wherein the above parallel is to be observed. (4) The limit or aim of creation --man--the Sabbath of God.

Bible Takes Up What Science Leaves Untouched Besides this governing and guiding presence, the Bible reveals another link in the chain of material causation. It shows, back of the power, the divine heart of God. It declares that all things work together for good to them that love God. It thus puts a soul and an emotion in all varied interlacing of material phenomena: God the Almighty Creator and His infinite love. Nature is no more a fragment. It is complete. It is no more a blind fatality, but a designed adaptation in its every part. It is no more a cold corpse, but all alive with the pulsations of the heart of God. And is not this revealed truth concerning nature far more important to us than all else which our experimental science can elicit? Does it not furnish rest both for mind and heart, where experimental science would utterly fail? Does it not satisfy the cravings of our souls, which cravings were made to expect this very revelation from our God? And is not our real triumph over nature gained when we can look around on all the grandest and most awful features, and say, in calmness, "My father made them all. His hand upholds and guides them all."

Margaret Foley

Rev. Margaret Foley lived in San Francisco, California but was pastor of a church in Oakland which was subject to taxation. She personally owned the building.

In earlier years, Mrs. Foley sailed the Atlantic and Antarctic with her husband Captain Charles Foley. During those trips her mediumship unfolded and disaster was averted on at least one occasion.

Reports of her mediumship was recorded in the official journal of the American Society of Psychical Research because of her work with scientists. Also reports were published in the Cavalcade of Supernatural by E. P. Dutton in 1939. Her travels included Europe where her achievements in the spiritual work were also publicized. Spiritualists and non-Spiritualists recognized her sincere nature and true mediumship.

Feeling a religion necessitates living it

That tingling of the spine, irrepressable upliftment, complete *high* that, on those few rare occasions, surrounds the upper half of the body and literally spins a physical awareness, jutting from the enveloping aura into every fiber of your life, fades as quickly as it arose. It is more than music, happiness or *at-one-ment*. The sensations which it activates is utter peace, contentment, fulfillment—any of the words which express the ultimate in serenity, accomplishment or complete, all absorbing delight captured in suspended time.

Scholars have written of an inner voice -- a consciousness which beckons you down one road and not another. The Bible, heralding the words spun in a begotten time, give it the breath of life. All this is true. But like most former do-it-yourselfers there must be prequisites that set the stage. There is I believe just one -- one requirement above all. It is religion. And to be felt it must first be lived. Ah, you question the relevance of being able to live a religion and compete in the daily grind of life. Appreciation for one's religion can be expressed in small subtle ways. Saint-hood, though much desired for the goodliness and godliness it imparts is no more comparable to the typicalness than is a monastery to a morning work bus ride. However, the very fact that you must compete daily to earn your living offers golden opportunities to demonstrate your faith in your religion, whatever that religion may

1. Let every deed signal your appreciation of the wonders of life.

2. Apply the Golden Rule and build yourself a code of ethics which merits praise.

3. Ferret out a couple of your self desirable traits. The realization that one is not alone, never has been, nor ever will be, makes any man a match for life's little burdens. To coin a phrase, "how sweet it is." When Jackie Gleason said it he probably had no reference to this usage, but nevertheless it makes the perfect analogy. There are many things which mold a man's character -- discipline, dedication, love - all have their limitation save spiritual unfoldment. Each step forward wraps its host in an ever stronger shield that has the power to attract as well as repel. Once Spiritual truth and understanding have been placed on the same parallel then the fears of the day are the chaff of straw which bow to the winds of the almighty. Injury may come, but its effects will remain less and recovery will result sooner because your belief is entrusted to spiritual love. Fear is a wolf and like all predators first encircles its victim to dramatize the situation.

Religion is not the by-product of institutions or dogmas, neither of beliefs, nor opinions. It is a way of life instituted by the creative spirit, working among all men appropriated in every good and perfect work.

Signs of the health of Spiritualism, especially N.S.A.C., were demonstrated by the spirited nominations for all vacancies of office this year.



Obviously, each instrument (channel) may vary somewhat, with a few rare exceptions capable of demonstrating an extremely wide attunement in all areas.

When a medium sees clairvoyantly, that person is responding mentally and physically to vibrations within a particular range of frequencies, similar to your radio. The same applies to the other senses. On occasion tuning in a station is difficult. Electric storms or local interference weakens reception. Our chemistry is not adapted to amplifying the signal or quelching a part of the received signal as the sophisticated circuity in many citizen band units can. 
