

EDITORIAL

SANCTUARY

In medieval times the church building was the place in which the malefactor could seek refuge from mans law the pleading call for sanctuary had reality in the days when the law of God administered by the all powerful church had meaning and value. The concept of refuge in the house of God reaches far back in the history of mans' efforts to regulate the powers of religion. The practice has not had any real meaning since the Reformation but there is a resurgence of interest in the ancient seeking for sanctuary in these latter days of an unpopular war. Young men seeking to evade military service cling to the church altars in an effort to elevate the power of the church as a means of escape. Certain churches have encouraged the idea since it focusses attention on the church like the rays of the setting sun illuminates a magnificant work of architecture, no longer of awe inspiring significance alongside the glittering glass and steel structures erected in the bustling unbelieving world of today.

The fact that there is no escape from the law of the land in which we live is known to all, but there are always the few who seek to evade, or at best delay the inevitable consequences. As one reads of such happenings it seems as a dream of faith and glory when the world was young and the crass facts of life in our modern society had no place or meaning. The undeclared war in Vietnam is the longest ever endured by the U.S.A. and the hope of its ending is much like the desperate dream of sanctuary filling the minds of the young whose greatest sin is loss of faith in the country of their birth and its elected leaders. The great moral values of religion have been lost in the welter of unbelief and it would now seem that the stirring qualities of patriotism are also lost in the flood of words poured out in defiance of the established way each system offering an escape from responsibility.

There never will be escape from responsibility and it is an unmixed blessing that this is fact. Life is valueless if we take no pride in the system under which we live or if the greatest urge of our being is escape from reality. The old clichés about not being asked to be born are still being used, the fact that life is a great and wonderful experience in this expression is overshadowed by the complainers. Where has the idea that life was a splendid adventuresome privilege gone?

There is a true sanctuary of the indwelling spirit that is never failing, the magnificence of the soul of man has somehow been lost in the flood of words and the happenings of circumstances that have placed the values of life not on the spirit, but on "things," more socalled freedoms, more money, more leisure, more of all the "things" of the material world. There can never be escape from reality we cannot cling to the altars built by man in honor of his "UNKNOWN GOD," in this way hoping to evade payment for the benefits of life here and hereafter, from this there is no escape we must continue to offer unto God the things that are God's, while we prepare for the greater Life of the Spirit world by obeying the laws of this world.

The Mysteries of Life

James M. Peebles, M.D.

"I do not doubt but the majesty and beauty of the world are latent in any iota of the world:

I do not doubt that exteriors have their interiors—and that the eyesight has another eyesight, and the hearing another hearing, and the voice another voice; . .

Did you think Life was so well provided for and Death, the purport of all Life, is not well provided for?" Whitman

Life in some of its manifestations is everywhere. In polar glaciers, in tropic sands, and in the profoundest ocean depths, the life-principle is expressed in organic forms. The vitality of seeds belonging to the pre-glacial period has been clearly demonstrated.

The existence of space is no more a matter of necessity to my understanding than the existence of God. Thinking from the conscious Ego—the I am of Myself—I require no subtle trains of logic to demonstrate, to know that God is, and that God governs this oderly uniuniverse by immutable law.

Primal truths are axiomatic. It is want of intuition and moral perception that necessi-

tates so many processes of reasoning.

Full of trust, I consciously see God, the Divine Energy, everywhere, pulsating in the growing corn, purpling in the vineyard, blushing in the peach, smiling in the sunshine, and awing us as we gaze into infinite depths filled with stars, circling suns, and systems of uni-

There is no conflict between science and religion, since they present two aspects of the same cosmos: one treating of the quality of being, the other treating of its quantitative distribution. The real conflict is between science and sectarian theology; and the chasm deepens. The mere scientist, ever cold and semiblind; sees but half the universe—the material side—the shell. With this he experiments. And the little knowledge he thus obtains rests, after all, upon faith,—faith in his five senses, and faith in the precision of his investigations. Can the telescope penetrate infinity? Can the physicist explain the mechanism by which the heliotrope turns to the sun, or the marvelous chemistry by which the turbot assumes the color of the ground over which it swims? Can the microscope detect grief in the brain, or the stethoscope sound the depths of human aspirations? Did the scalpel ever discover a thought in the convolutions of the cranial cavity? Can love be measured with a rod, or hope weighed in a pair of scales? The soul and all its mental operations—the soul and all the spiritual forces

connected therewith—are utterly beyond the

scope of the physical sciences.

All organic life begins in a simple cell. Every organized structure is but an aggregation of these cells "A single elementary atom," says that prince of modern philosophers, Professor Balfour Stewart, "is a truly immortal being, and enjoys the privilege of remaining unaltered by the powerful blows that can be dealt against it."

No solid thinker believes in the destructibility of either matter or spirit. The conservation of spiritual energies is as true as the dem-

onstrated conservation of forces.

The soul being a living force, is necessarily immortal. It is the visible and phenomenal forms and qualities only that change. The celestial angels ever see these elementary atoms, these conscious monads that exist in the golden splendor of their underived immortality. Infilled with pure spirit,—aflame with the divine life,—these monads, these "firsts" of things, vibrate, rotate, repel, unite, form organic relations, and, in obedience to the laws of universal order, take on an ultimate expression by becoming incarnated in a material form.

Consciousness is coeval and coordinate with life. What we commonly consider our soul, is not, logically speaking, ours, but we are its. The soul—a potentialized and individualized manifestation of the Over-Soul, God—is the man. Life is the garment of the spirit, and the body its most immediate vehicle of expression. The spiritual is the real, the permanent, and each mortal is in the spirit world now, though veiled from its surpassing glories by

the material organism.

Absence of consciousness is no proof of nonexistence, inasmuch as sleep and wakefulness are alternating states of the thinking man; and these states should not be confounded with the subject to which they relate. The individual who becomes blind from a cataract upon the eye is still in the same world. Traveling, even into foreign countries, does not help him to the light; but remove the film, and he readily perceives that the light is all around him. The spiritual senses are so eclipsed, so bleared with the material, that we do not see the spiritual world that bathes and enfolds us like a crystal ocean.

Electricity, light, magnetism, interstellar ether.—these are only the etherealized envelopes and elastic vehicles of spiritual forces. Certain conditions develop or bring into outward expression their potentialities. And laws, so called, are the deific methods, the defined order in which the Divine Presence operates. Essential Spirit alone interpermeates and constitutes the qualities of all things. There are no abstract qualities,—that is to say, qualities abstracted from their substances. They inhere

in them. Strength is not outside of the being that exercises it. Acid properties do not exist apart from the substances containing them. So love, goodness, truth, are not abstract powers, but necessary attributes that inhere in the very constitution of every sentient being, whether man or angel. Accordingly, men and women are spirits now. They live and walk in the spirit world, though encased in mortal clothing; their sensations, qualities, and all their higher emotions, are also spiritual, yet veiled for the present under the vestured disguise of matter.

It will be admitted that extension, divisibility, and inertia are among the principal attributes of matter. But be this as it may, matter at most is only the unreal shadowy shell of things—the passive or statical condition for the action of force. It serves as the limiting wall for the utilization of spiritual energies. It is the background upon which the panorama of creation is projected. It is the agent of reaction, as the counterpoise to action, without which equilibrium and the perpetuity of movement would be impossible.

The theory that Force is an attribute of matter is disproved by the fact of inertia. It cannot change its state. It will ultimately be shown, I believe, that **inertia** is the sole attribute of matter, while the other properties usually ascribed to it are simply secondary qualities which inertia involves. Force, therefore, is the antithesis of matter, not simply one of its attributes. Will is the single attribute of force, and will is self-determining,—not motion, but the antecedent of motion, and the antithesis of inertia.

"All that we can affirm of matter," says the learned Clerk Maxwell, "is that it is the recipient of impulse and of energy." And yet materialists, and doubtless the majority of ordinary men, have come to think from their long familiarity with matter that physical forms constitute the only real, that matter is more permanent and substantial than spirit. This is a fatal mistake. Few will dispute that the concrete forms of matter, when reduced to the last analysis, are little more than a filmy appearance, an illusion that dazzles to blind. Take a bit of the hardest granite rock." How solid, how firm and substantial," you say. Let us see. I pass it into the hands of the chemist. He applies it to a most intense heat, and it becomes a fiery liquid; increasing the heat, it becomes a fleecy, limpid fluid; augmenting it still, it is transformed into a gaseous mist lighter than air; continue to intensify the heat, and it utterly vanishes from sight. There, O mistaken materialist, is your matter, your hard granite rock, compose of mica, feldspar, and quartz, driven to a liquid-to a fluid-to gaseous mist-driven from sight—vanished—gone! And so with everything that the hand can touch, the physical eye see, the senses cognize.

Analysis resolves the seen into the unseen, and the dulled senses pale away before our deeper spiritual nature which recognizes the visible and enduring reality.

"What do you know of angels and spirits, or even of spirit, per se?" said a very self-

contained Secularist to me in England.

As much, sir, in all probability, as you know about matter, was my reply; and especially when matter, through analysis, is transformed into a state of invisibility.

"But matter and material things may be seen, handled, felt, and actually tested by the

senses."

And so may spirits, when, by the law of materialization, they desire to demonstrate a future existence.

"I've never seen anything of the kind."

That is quite probable. And then, possibly you have not seen the Brahmans in their burning-ghats; the Parsees in their temples; the Pope in St. Peter's; nor me, with whom you converse. It is only the body you see.

"But I fancy (taking hold of my arm) that

I feel and see you."

Nothing—nothing of the kind, sir. You only feel and see the shell, the vesture, the traveling-dress, in which I, the man, are at present attired. "Never do I tire," said Socrates, "of telling the wise man that the body is not the man."

"Very well; you must know that our knowledge depends upon our senses. And, as a man professing some knowledge of science, I accept the readility of nothing that I cannot see, hear taste, weigh, or is in some manner made to appeal to my physical senses. And further, sir,

I think, or rather, I have an idea." Stop—stop right there! You say you have an idea. Denying it for the moment, I propose to test you by your own method. You say you think—that you have an idea. But I deny it in toto, and call upon you to prove it,—to demonstrate it by an appeal to any one, or all of my five natural senses. Bring out that "idea" of yours, and let me see it—let me hear it—taste it—feel it—or let me weigh it in a pair of scales! What is the color? What the shape? and

what the density of that idea of yours?

This system of reasoning, on the part of the materialists, fails to convince the intellect or meet the noblest aspirations of the human soul. Thinkers ought to understand, so it seems to me, that all laws, principles, aspirations, thoughts, ideas, and unseen forces are, while imponderable and invisible, allied to the spiritual realm of existence, the realm of the real, the perpetual, the permanent, and the imponderable

mortal!

Mortal life is only an incident—tremulous eddy in the cycling stream of time. We are the dead; human bodies are little more than graves.

SPIRITUALISTIC EXPERIENCES OF BIBLE TIMES

Rev. E. H. Eby

The Bible is the record of the religious experiences of the Hebrew race in its development from a primitive state to that of a highly organized ritual, and then on to the deeply spiritual and social experiences of Jesus and the Apostles. It contains the written record of national traditions, and of folk lore, the development of priestcraft, and the spiritual experiences of the seers.

Most of this material was put into its final form between 1000 B.C. and 100 A.D. Previously, there were state records, bits of history, poetry and song, these constituted the literary background of the books as we now have them. Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek are the three languages in which the original was

written.

The early religion of the race was idolatrous and henotheistic. Yahvah was a national deity, and the written description of him reflects the ethical, moral and religious ideas of the people who worshipped him. It must ever be borne in mind that the ideals of the writers living in the 10th to the 6th centuries B.C. are projected back into the stories of earlier periods. Even so, one can trace the lines of progress from the crude state of the primitive tribes.

God was conceived of as having a part in all human experiences. He gave life and took it away. He led to war and gave victory. He was the God of war and carnage and slaughter. God was back of all the physical phenomena of the world. He was the God of Nature and spoke in the thunder and sent the lightening flash. He shook the earth and rode on the storm.

He made the earth and the sun, moon and stars. To that early race the heavenly bodies moved across the sky, the earth was flat and rested on a foundation. God was corporeal as well as personal, having eyes, lips, hands, feet. God was surrounded by hosts of spiritual beings called angels, who were his messengers sent on errands of all kinds. Lower space was inhabited by evil spirits—demons, with a super-spirit called the devil or Satan.

As to belief in life after death, this was a late development. "If a man die, will he live again?" is the query of the ages, for which there was no answer till near the close of

their history.

For us the value of the Bible lies in its furnishing a basis for our study of the development of ethical ideals and religious experiences from the tribal and national periods on to the social ideals as revealed in and taught by Jesus. To take the book in its entirety as the inspired word of God, inerrent and infallible, is to subject one's mind and soul to a slavery as narrow and as cruel and debasing as to yield ones mind and conscience and soul to the dic-

tates of narrow religious hatred. On the other hand, to study the lofty idealism of the seers and prophets, to share the spiritual experiences of Jesus the Christ and of his Apostles is enlightening, uplifting and inspiring.

It is the object of this article to trace the Spiritualistic phenomena thru the history of the Hebrew race as recorded in the Bible. To begin with Abraham, the founder of the race. He is said to have had a series of Theophanies, or visions of spiritual reality such as a man destined to leadership of a nation might be expected to have. Keeping our present knowledge of spiritual reality in mind and admitting the deeply religious nature and spiritual susceptibility of those primitive peoples, it is not difficult to believe that Abraham and his descendents had experiences which can best be explained in terms of Spiritualism as now known. "God spoke." God said. "God appeared." are expressions descriptive of a real experience. It may be explained as subjective impression, an inner voice, but may not those men of old have been clairvoyant and clairaudient, capable of seeing and hearing real spirit beings who were guiding them over the uncharted desert of life? What were the angels but materialized spirits, making themselves visible and audible to those who were capable of seeing and hearing—that is, those who were mediumistic enough to tune in on the spirit realm. Thus Baalam, Joshua, the parents of Gideon, Elijah, Elisha—all were Samson, prompted to their career of leadership by a spiritual experience such as a vision or a materialization.

A genuine mediumistic experience is recorded in the time of King Saul. He went to a small town called Endor where lived a woman called a medium, who at the request of the King, visualized the seer Samuel. That there were many other such characters as this medium is shown by the fact that she was the sole survivor of a systematic effort to exterminate them. The edict to destroy these mediums grew out of a very superstitious fear of their powers. That edict has been the basis of the murder of many people all through history, to modern times.

Elijah is said to have taken his body with him when he passed on—a spiritualized body. Elisha saw him go, borne away by a chariot and horses of fire—a materialization. This same seer, Elisha, was protected by a regiment of cavalry visible only to himself and later to

his servant, at Elisha's request.

In the light of present day happenings, I am inclined to believe that the visions of Ezekiel, Daniel and of John, are to be explained on a Spiritualistic basis. The angel ministrations accompanying the advent of Jesus are remarkable and significant. Here was developed

within a small group of faithful folk, a spiritual atmosphere which made possible a more than ordinary demonstration of spirit forms

and acts.

The Transfiguration of Jesus was a genuine Spiritualistic experience. Jesus exercised mediumistic power and the spirits of Moses and Elija appeared and were heard in conversation; Moses had lived 1400 and Elijah some 800 years before this appearance. The resurrection of Jesus from the dead may be said to be the foundation doctrine of the Christian Church. It constituted the chief message of his followers. It was upon their testimony concerning the resurrection of Jesus that the Church was founded. Jesus' body was laid in a tomb and the tomb was sealed. After an interval of some 40 or more hours his spirit re-entered his body which was instantly changed, spiritualized, and began to perform feats possible only to a spiritualized form. In this new, quickened body, He appeared to His disciples intermittently for a considerable time, and then ascended with it out of their sight.

That the spirit is able to leave the physical body for a considerable time and then re-

inhabit it is well known.

So I assert confidently that the Church of Christ was founded on a Spiritualistic phenomenon which is not an isolated incident, but will become increasingly more common as the laws of spirit become better known.

Paul's spirit once left his body and went to a spirit realm and enjoyed unspeakable experi-

ences.

The Bible is thus shown to be a veritable handbook of Spiritualism, and is valuable as a record of Spiritualistic phenomena. The fact that this phenomena was not understood, and so was misused and was at times persecuted, does not in the least deny its existence back in those early days.

Mrs. Hewitt preached for 15 years before she was ordained in 1942. When she holds services, she wears one of six, simple, stylish gowns she made herself. "A robe doesn't mean

a thing," she says.

A native of Paterson, she has lived in the Carroll Street area for many years. In 1944 she married Howard Hewitt, one of her parish-

ioners for 16 years.

The First Spiritualist Church is on the first floor of a renovated four-story home (the Hewitts live on top). There are two rows with 20 pews in each and a small worship area up front. The place exudes warmth and peace.

The white-haired woman preacher said the Bible is full of spiritual phenomena and, therefore, Spiritualism is not an upstart religion.

"Jesus exemplified practically every type of mediumship," she said. She explained that mediumship is the development of spiritual senses which everyone has. They are the same ones doctors call physical senses—hearing, sight, smell, touch and taste.

When the physical senses are removed at the time of death (which the Spiritualists call "the change") they leave the body with the soul and remain to function as that person on

earth.

"Now to get back to Jesus. He healed the sick, prophesied and chose his own apostles, each one of them a disciple. He developed their spiritual senses in the Upper Room," she said.

"On the other hand, we never think of God as a person. We believe in Him, the infinite intelligence of all life or power that pervades and controls the universe and all life," she said.

Mrs. Hewitt considers herself a psychic, a medium and a healer, a belief shared by members of her congregation. She has many stories of healing "miracles" to her credit. Good works are part of the Spiritualist philosophy.

"A two-month-old baby girl was brought to me once," she said. "The doctors said she'd never see. I held the little blind girl in my arms and asked the congregation to pray for her. By the time she was five months old, she could see everything about her. Now, I'm not saying that I'm a healer, but something happened and I had part in it.

"We all make good by helping others," the minister said. "We don't ask for forgiveness—only for the chance to amend our transgressions. The spirits in the other world are always willing to help us avoid the mistakes they made on earth. Our guardian angels, everyone is born with one, are qualified to help us, and by

doing so, they wipe out their sins.

There seem to be no fairy tales in her private life, either. The minister is kept on the go so often, what with two church services on both Sunday and Wednesdays, that her husband is in charge of preparing the meals and

cleaning up.

However, Mrs. Hewitt doesn't consider herhelf a special person. "Anybody can develop his spiritual powers," she remarked. "I believe in the predictions of Jeanne Dixon (the Washington-based political prophet) but she's not a Spiritualist. You don't have to be a Spiritualist to have developed spiritual powers."

Personally, Mrs. Hewitt is an unusual woman. She'd be the first to tell you she was born

in 1902.

Professionally, she is highly respected in

Spiritualist circles and has been asked to speak this week at Lily Dale, N.Y. the oldest, and probably the most important, spiritual camp in the world.

The Rev. Rose Winter, pastor of the Temple of Living God—Spiritualist church, arrived home last week from a month's trip abroad.


She went to Germany, France, Italy and England. In the different countries she visited different churches and talked to the ministers of different denominations. She was gone 30

We must all strive for the best possible work that we can do. Service and work are identical. There must be no distinction between them. GEORGE FOX

George Fox was the first of the Quakers, and by trade a shoemaker. It is his fortune to have been always either overpraised or unjustly depreciated. Reasons equally strong may be advanced for revering him as a prophet or reviling him as a madman. Those whose attention has been directed solely to his ignorance, his eccentricities, the strange garb which he adopted, the strange actions which he persisted in, the wild vagaries of his talk, the meaningless absurdity of much that he has written, have turned from the spectacle in disgust, or pointed at him the finger of scorn. Those who have contemplated only the fervor of his religion, the warmth of his heart, the greatness of his fortitude, have claimed for him a place among the foremost of mankind. They alone judge such a man justly who, taking into consideration both the strength and the weakness of his nature, pronounce it one in which the gigantic development of certain qualities renders more striking the dwarfish proportions of others. Fox, as an example of heroic fortitude and heroic sincerity, deserves our admiration and respect. For, as a teacher, requires to be followed with ceaseless vigilance and suspicion.

His life is one long record of communion with spirits. His visions were countless. His power of magnetic healing was great. At Twycross he healed a sick person by prayer. At Arnside he restored to a man the use of

one of his arms, when it had long been impotent. At Ulverstone he was himself instantly made whole by his spirit guardians, after having been beaten almost to death by a ferocious mob. He frequently proved himself possessed of the power of prophecy. Several years before the occurrence of that great fire which consumed half London, it was predicted by Fox. He warned several of his persecutors that judgments would shortly befall them, and in no case did the person so warned escape. These spiritual gifts seem to have continued in unabated vigor down to the period when, full of years, and surrounded by a circle of attached disciples, the Apostle of the Quakers died peacefully in his bed.

The first lengthy account of the rappings in the parsonage of Epworth was published by John Wesley in the Arminian Magazine. Had the father of the famous Methodist but thought of questioning the spirits by means of the alphabet, a great spiritual movement might have convulsed England in the reign of George I. The knockings exactly resembled those of the Hydesville happenings in 1848. They gave the

same proof.


